Iuveniles Arrested For Vandalism At luka Girl's Softball Park

Three juveniles have been arrested by county authorities in connection with the vandalism of a local ballpark.

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith reported that a window was broken out leading into the concession stand and a porta-john was overturned at the luka girls softball field late on Friday night, July 10 or early Saturday morning, July 11.

After investigating the incident, the Sheriff received information leading to the arrest

of a 17-year-old and two 16-yearold males from Burnsville.

The juveniles were arrested July 16. Two of them were taken to the juvenile detention center in Corinth. The other juvenile was released into the custody of his parents.

County Tishomingo Investigator Steve Vatalaro said that the teens may also be linked with the theft and destruction of 35 to 50 bags of ice from the softball field and with vandalism of the bathrooms at the Burnsville Boat Ramp.

Supervisors Award Bid For Rock Crusher Road Project

A bridge on Rock Crusher Road in Tishomingo County's third district which was washed out in early May is closer to getting the repairs it needs after the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors awarded a bid to a Faulkner Monday Mississippi company The Gray Corporation has been selected as the low bidder for roadway repairs with a bid of \$96,906.86. Others bidding on the project were the Bonds Company of Burnsville, Harris Millwright and Construction of Nettleton, Haves Company of Tupelo and Trax Company of Iuka. The project will be funded by State Aid road department, according to District Engineer Charles Shelton. This money allocated to Tishomingo County for repairs is from gas taxes, Shelton confirmed. The project can not be completed for approximately five weeks because of the time it will take for the 12 ft. x 8 ft. precast concrete box culvert to be manufactured by Choctaw, Inc. When questioned about why the project was not completed earlier, the members of the Board of Supervisors said that those questions would have to be

answered by third district supervisor Danny Ryan who was out of town at the time of Monday's meeting.

located on Rock Crusher Road, were on hand for the opening of the bids Monday. One of the men explained that they wanted to attend the meeting to find out when the roadway will be repaired.

The trucks which haul rocks from Hoover have had to take a new route since May which includes crossing over into Alabama. This adds an extra 10 miles to each trip they make to the quarry each day. Also, many of the drivers had to purchase Alabama stickers in order to go the new route which is an extra out-of-pocket expense for the drivers. The spokesman said that about 99 percent of the loads out of the quarry go back into Mississippi.

The men also commented on the dangerous curves and hills the trucks have to travel on the state line road.

Several residents who live on the road also have to travel the extra distance to get to town and some, to their churches which are only a short distance on the other side of the washed out bridge.

TWO OLD FAVORITES COMBINE IN SUMMER SQUASH AND CORNBREAD CASSEROLE

Nothing says summer in the South like a good old squash casserole made with baby-smooth yellow summer squash and sautéed onions. "Instead of serving cornbread on the side, why not bake it right on top of the squash," says Martha White® baking expert Linda Carman. A plateful of Summer Squash and Cornbread Casserole, fresh green beans seasoned with country ham and sliced ripe tomatoes make for a great summer supper.

SUMMER SQUASH AND CORNBREAD CASSEROLE 1/4 cup butter or margarine 1 large sweet onion, cut into thin wedges 2 lbs. yellow summer squash, cut into 1/4-inch slices (about 8 cups) 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon coarsely ground

Farsightedness

Farsightedness is a type of vision in which seeing is clearer at far distances than at near. When the eye is relaxed, the combined powers of its optical elements are not enough to bring things into focus. The person who is farsighted must maintain a focusing effort to keep things clear when focusing either near or far. This focusing effort frequently causes fatigue and discomfort. Do that assume not farsightedness simply means clear distance vision and blurred near vision. Symptoms of farsightedness include difficulty maintaining clear vision while reading, fatigue, headaches, tension, nausea and burning eyes.

In farsightedness, also known as hyperopia, the image of an object falls behind the retina and is therefore out of focus. This can be corrected nicely with eyeglasses containing "plus" lenses which are thicker in the middle than on the edge. They bring the image of an object forward, focusing on the retina. This reduces the focusing effort and results in clear and comfortable vision.

2, 4-D No Longer Considered **Restricted Use Pesticide**

The State of Mississippi has repealed the Regulation Designating State Restricted Use Pesticides. 2, 4-D is one of these products and can now be sold as a general use product. Although the Federal Government has never considered 2, 4-D as a Restricted Use Pesticide (RUP), Mississippi has always regulated it because of our traditionally large cotton acreage (cotton is extremely sensitive to 2, 4-D). Now that the state has repealed that law, our cattle producers will be able to purchase this chemical without having to be a certified applicator. This is great news because 2, 4-D is a good, safe, cost-efficient method of

controlling many weeds in pastures and hay fields. Like any other pesticide, it should be used with care, so follow label directions.

We've all heard the old adage that a dog's age equals one year for every seven human years. Well, that's not quite true. Actually, at six months, a puppy is equivalent to a 14 years old teenager. At one year, a dog is about 27 by human standards. And a dog ages another five human years for every year after

Here are some signs that owners should watch for in older pets:

• Kidney Failure: Kidney failure is common in older dogs and cats. Early signs are excessive drinking and urinating. Late signs are loss of appetite, vomiting and weight

loss.

• Heart Failure: Heart "attacks" are EXTREMELY rare in cats and dogs. However, heart "failure" is a chronic disease caused by gradual inability of the heart muscle to pump blood. Signs to look for are decreased exercise tolerance, difficulty breathing, persistent cough and fainting spells.

• Vision: Most older dogs will eventually have changes in the eye that affect vision and may cause blindness. Cataracts are common.

• Hearing: Most dogs over 10 years experience progressive hearing loss. There is usually no treatment.

• Cancer: There are more than 200 types of cancer. Early detection and treatment will help manage the disease. Be on the lookout for lumps under the skin, unusual bleeding or sudden weight loss.

Dental Disease: Infected gums and teeth are common in older dogs. They might have halitosis and bleeding gums.

Many old age health problems are difficult to see, so it's important for pets over 6 years old to have an annual physical exam. But regardless of your pet's age, if you notice any of these signs, have your animal examined immediately.

Running & Swimming: Bad For Your Teeth?

Unknowingly some fitnessconscious people may damaging their teeth. Long distance running tones muscles and raises aerobic endurance, but it can cause dental damage in a roundabout way.

Some runners suck wedges of lemon to prevent the mouth and throat dryness that results from exertion and perspiration Although the lemon stimulates saliva flow, the acids from it can erode the tooth's protective enamel. The result can be an outbreak of cavities and the need for extensive restorative dental treatment.

Tooth erosion itself can be painful. Often marked by yellow or chalky-white discoloration and a feeling of grittiness, the condition can make teett sensitive to temperature and pressure.

Individuals who swim their way to fitness in gas-chlorinated pools are at increased risk from "swimmer's tooth." Erosion of dental enamel and other changes in the teeth can occur when water in a swimming pool reaches higher-than-recommended levels of acidity. When the chlorine gas mixes with the pool water, i produces hydrochloric acid. which can destroy enamel. If you use a gas-chlorinated pool often remind the pool manage that the pH (acidity) level of the water is just as important as the chlorine level. 





John Glenn - An American Hero

John Glenn

"I see the moon, the moon sees me. God bless the moon and God bless me!" so goes a child's prayer and nursery rhyme I repeated a thousand times with my mother as we gazed upward pointing toward the earth's mysterious nightlight. It is kind of strange how I still say that when I see a full moon even today. The moon, the stars and everything to do with space have always fascinated me. I can remember being four years old and sitting in front of our big brown color Curtis Mathis television set late one July evening. We watched Neil Armstrong leave the capsule of the lunar lander and ease down the ladder to the final step where he said, "One step for man, one giant leap for mankind." He then literally stepped into the pages of history books forever as the first man on the moon.

This was the crowning achievement of a dream that had eluded man since the dawn of time, at least until our century. Though gliders and balloons have existed for some time, sustained mechanical flight was not realized until the Wright brothers flew at Kittyhawk, North Carolina in 1903. Just to fly was a great achievement yet man looked up at the moon and stars ready for the next step, to go there. It took us nearly sixty years more before America sent a man into space.

The Russians launched the first space probe "Sputnik 1" on October 1, 1957. To the horror and humiliation of the United States, this date marked the beginning of the "Space Race" (and we were behind!). There were a number of setbacks for the early American space program but these would ultimately lead us to some of America's greatest shining moments. In 1959, the fledgling National Aero-

Canaveral.) There was a giant rocket mover with track wheels like a tank or bulldozer to move the spacecraft from hangers to the launch pad. I recall the massive launch pads and the huge support towers to hold the ship in place until the man at mission control counted down "Five, four, three, two, one, ignition," (then a brief pause as everyone takes a deep breath recalling the loss of three Apollo astronauts on the pad on January 27, 1967 and later the loss of the Challenger seven almost 19 years to the day later) then a great roar and cheers broke out when the controller announced ". . . We have liftoff!

Many Americans became complacent about the space program over the years. The fascination has never completely gone away from those of us who hold these heroes and memories so dear. I was fortunate enough to work in the United States Senate as an intern two summers for Sen. Thad Cochran of Mississippi. There were many evenings after work on the weekend where I would go to the Smithsonian and just look around. I spent hours in the National Air and Space Museum. I marveled at the Wright Brothers' first plane next to "The Spirit of St. Louis". Underneath the hanging planes sat first American in space Allen Shepherd's capsule.

Next to Shepherd's craft was the Mercury capsule in which John Glenn made the first manned orbit around the earth. Nearby were moon rocks and the spacesuit Neil Armstrong wore as he made his historic first moonwalk. Just being in this room should make any true American's heart swell with pride!

It was while running an errand on

to the man he was with and said,' Neil, I have someone I would like for you to meet. As the man and I shook hands, Senator Glenn introduced us.

sissippi," then he turned to me," Chris, this is Astronaut Neil Armstrong." In shock I again stammered, "I've admired you since third grade!" then we all laughed. I wonder how many people can say the first man to orbit the earth introduced them to the first man to set foot on the moon? This was not only one of the most exciting moments of my life, it was also an honor and a privilege to be in the presence of two men who were not only my heroes but also America's heroes

Armstrong. (The only two who come close to me were meeting Barry Goldwater and Ray Charles! I'll write about that some other time.)

There is a poem on the wall in an exam room of Dr. Kelly Segars' Clinic. Segars is a Korean war veteran who later became a pilot. The poem is called "Angel Flight". As I read the words recently, I recalled the same poem being read by then President Reagan in a memorial service at Cape Kennedy for the seven astronauts killed in the Challenger disaster in 1986. The final passage reads "... to slip the surly bonds of earth and touch the face of God." When you think about it, we all have this dream in one way or another. Only 508 Americans have been in the American Astronaut program. After Challenger, a number of them were asked if they still wanted to go into space. Every one of them enthusiastically responded 'YES!"

Our home of Tishomingo County has been the proposed site of several federal projects, two of which were space affiliated, that never quite got off the ground. These failures parallel those seen in the space program but like the remaining astronauts, the people of Tishomingo County refuse to give up and endeavor to persevere in attracting industry and economic growth to our area. A new facility related to aerospace component products is scheduled to start production soon. Though we have stumbled in our past and fallen let us not use these mistakes to keep from getting up and walking proudly into the future. Let us bravely take a lesson from the astronauts and look to the opportunity we now have and accept this challenge like the astronauts by wholeheartedly welcoming this project with a resounding "YES!"

For over twenty five years after leaving the space program, John Glenn has kept his flight preparedness physicals current. His dream was to go back into space just one more time. His dream is about to come true. The Senator John Glenn once again became Astronaut John Glenn when he was picked last year to fly on a shuttle mission in October 1998. Old friend and collogue Allen Shepherd

had told Glenn he wanted to be there to cheer him on. Shepherd passed away on July 21, 1998 the day after the twenty-ninth anniversary of the first moon landing. "I am sure he will

be right there with me when I go on the shuttle," Glenn said in a CNN interview upon his friends death. Glenn prepares everyday just as hard as the men and women in the program less than half his age. In 1984, Glenn was awarded the prestigious Harmon Trophy for Excellence in Aviation. He shares this honor with other notable aviators including Charles Lindbergh (1927), Howard Hughes (1936 & 1938) and Iuka native Henry T. "Dick" Merrill who won the international award in 1937

When President Kennedy challenged Americans to land a man on the moon in his inauguration speech in 1960, he said, "... We do not strive to do these things because they are easy, we do them because they are hard." At 77, John Glenn is the oldest astronaut on record. As Shepherd passes to the ages, his spirit and those of all others who have bravely gone into the new frontier ride with the real rocketman, John Glenn. We who have been touched by his courage and service to his nation gratefully send our cheers and prayers into space with Astronaut John Glenn on this mission. He will always carry our respect and admiration in all he does. Though he is forever recorded in our past, let us

again honor the challenge he sets for

us today and as we enter the 21st

century. From all of us who to dream and imagine the pos of man's potential, we salu Glenn and those who courage dare accompany him on this n God's speed to a true "An HERO!'

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nautics and Space Administration selected seven "Top Gun" test pilots to form the first class of American "ASTRONAUTS"

I can remember the excitement when we turned to the section of our yellow third grade reader to the section on space travel. What would have been science fiction only a few years before was now real science! As we read in Mrs. Wadkins' class about the rockets and astronauts, I became excited! I even read ahead of the lessons. Names and events were engraved in my mind as I read of mankind's greatest adventure. Some of these were Alan Shepherd, John Glenn, Neil Armstrong, Gus Grissom, Deke Slayten, Buzz Aldren and space monkeys Able and Baker, all of these I could not get enough of. We watched Star Trek reruns in the afternoons after school but THIS was the real deal!

I learned my first Greek and Roman mythology with names like Apollo, Gemini, Mercury, Titan and Saturn. I would daydream as the pen I held in my hand became a rocket blasting off my desk. Dad may have missed his pens but he shared my fascination with these dreams. When I was about 10, I recall our group of two families traveling to Huntsville, Alabama to tour the Redstone Arsenal. This national laboratory for developing space technology held a spe-

cial place of awe for me. Though I had read several books in addition to the reader by that time, I recall the field of rockets, seeing moon rocks and seeing my first "real celebrity", the Space monkey named "Miss Baker" a.k.a. "T.L.C." who was on display daily for over thirty years at the center. I recall getting freeze dried ice-cream like the real astronauts ate. The gift shop fueled my imagination with models from science and science fiction.

We made several trips during those waning years of moon shots to the new era of Skylab and space shuttles. I remember our family going to the space center to see the prototype space shuttle "Enterprise" riding piggyback aboard a 747 for tests and publicity. (I note with the name "Enterprise", also the name of the fictional star ship in the popular sci-fi sixties series, science fiction's Star Trek finally met reality "to boldly go where no man has gone before.")

There were also a couple of trips to Cape Kennedy to tour the launch site for most of the rocket and shuttle liftoffs. (Dad and many others still call it by the original name, Cape

my job that one of the most memorable moments in my life occurred. I was waiting for an elevator in the Russell Building when a man walked up next to me and pushed the button. I did a double take as I held out my hand. "Mr. Glenn," I stammered, "My name is Chris Evans and I have been an admirer of yours since reading about you in the third grade." He smiled and shook my hand. He asked who I worked for and I told him. We talked about his unsuccessful presidential bid in 1980. I mentioned his stop at the Neshobia County Fair during his stumping days. He smiled, "They said previous winners had set in the rocking chair." It is a political tradition to sit in the old rocker for good luck. "Reagan sat in that old rocker and look at him, Sen.Glenn chuckled, "In hindsight, I wish I had set there.

I ran into Senator Glenn from time to time while I worked in the Senate. Though he could not always recall my name, he did remember me and where I was from. He would simply call to me in those great halls as we spoke, "Hello Mississippi!" and always shake my hand no matter how big of a hurry he was in. I recall. asking him about his astronaut days as I had followed him. I don't recall any quotes offhand other than he did tire somewhat of being called "Mr. Right Stuff" after the movie documenting the story of the seven original Mercury astronauts had come out. I told him how I not only admired his courage but his personal convictions. The movie portrayed a scene where Glenn's wife became upset when she was overwhelmed by the paparazzi in the early years of the program. John Glenn stood up to them in the movie and ordered the press to leave his wife alone or they would answer to him! I let him know that I admire any man who protects his wife and family regardless of any potential "Bad Press". In a way, I think I respect him as much if not more for this gallant defense which showed true love for his wife than for his numerous accomplishments in the Space Program and in Congress.

My most memorable meeting with Glenn occurred on a small subway platform while waiting for a ride to the capitol itself. I saw the Senator was in the company of a gentleman so I thought it best to keep quiet. He saw me and said, "Mississippi! Come here a moment!" As he reached to shake my hand he almost whispered," Mississippi, what is your name again?"

Old Tishomingo Traces By: June Bullard



Elmer and Liller McDuffy

Every summer, no matter where lived, I always made it a point to ome home in August for the ittlejohn and Bullard Family Reunions, and to visit relatives on oth sides. Even though it has ditionally been the hottest month of he year, it is one of the most eautiful. Most of the "old time" lowers such as marigolds, zinnias, etunias and scarlet sage are in their eak blooming season. In the early nomings, especially on the ackroads, one can still see armhouses with older couples sitting nder spreading oak trees. They are usily peeling apples or shelling peas, etting ready for the cold months head, while they try to escape the eat under the shade of large trees in he front yards, and wave at passersby. Back in 1987, on a typical August day, I was driving down Highway 365 between Burnsville and Doskey when I felt a compelling urge stop and see Liller and Elmer McDuffy. My sister Audrey Gross, who was visiting from Houston, Texas, and I, living in Quincy, linois, had met at our brother Denzol Bullard's house on the outskirts of Corinth. We were on our way to visit our first cousins Dutch (Bullard) and ames Cole at North Crossroads.

As I turned off the pavement nto a dirt road, which cut through a ield in front of Liller and Elmer's nhouse, Audrey asked me where I was going. In my anticipation of seeing the families of my childhood, I had failed to tell her that we were ping to see Liller and Elmer. We ad arrived quicker than she expected, nd her sense of direction was a little orted because of the new roads. strange how roads are shorter, ills are not quite so high, and nation are reached much quicker an they were years ago. Elmer and ller were our friends from long ago. ller was our kin, too. Her randmother was Jemima Bullard urtis, who was a sister to our randpa Ben Bullard, which made us cond cousins. When we drove into the yard, ickens scattered in all directions and gray-speckled rooster flapped his urdy wings and crowed loudly to ounce our arrival. Liller, in her hties and with failing eyesight from

old age and diabetes, peered through the patched screen door as we walked up the steps and onto her front porch. As soon as she recognized us, her face creased into a friendly smile and she gave each of us a warm "country" hug. She told Elmer to drag up some chairs under the large beech where we could sit and it would be cooler under the shade. She said that the house was hot because she had just a little while ago finished making apple jelly. She

said Elmer was wearing her out by bringing in so much stuff to can or freeze. Every time he came into the house he had an armload of work for her

Elmer, in his faded overalls and straw hat with a green sun visor on the brim, inspected the metal lawn chairs to make sure they were free of spiders or bird droppings, and asked us to take a seat. Liller, a tall, robust woman, pulled up her apron and wiped perspiration from her lined, sunbrowned face. She took a side comb from her hair and gathered up a wisp as she replaced the comb. Liller was a wonderful story-teller and remembered everything she had ever heard or seen, good and bad alike. I asked her to tell some tales about the Bullards as I retrieved my pen and note pad from my shoulder bag.

She smiled, looking pleased as she said, "You don't want to write about stuff I remember? It ain't worth nothing." I assured her that those tales of days gone by were, indeed, worth a great deal to me.

Aunt Mary and me walked over to Uncle Cal Bullard's place, just a little ways down the road from Uncle Ben's. Uncle Cal was a big, red-faced man with white hair and a mustache. He was a Civil War veteran. He shore didn't have nothing good to say about Yankees. He was awful bad to cuss and Aunt Mary told me to pay no attention. That was the way he was but he don't mean no harm by it. We sat for a spell, and you know, while we was there, Uncle Cal didn't say one dirty word. When we left, Aunt Mary said that was the first time she had been around Cal that he didn't cuss."

Without my asking her any more questions, Liller went on with, "You remember hearing about Dick Morgan? Well, he wasn't no Morgan. Him and Grandpa Bill Curtis was good friends. Grandpa Bill married Jemimy and Dick married Rebecca Bullard, your Grandpa Ben's sisters. Well, as the story goes, one day Uncle Dick told Grandpa Bill that he had

made up his name. I think it was that he had been out West - maybe Missouri. He says to Grandpa Bill, "I ain't no Morgan. I took that name to hide from the law." We thought he might of been with the James boys but don't know for sure. He just dropped off in Iuka and stayed and nobody knows where he came from."

Liller was wound up and I didn't say anything, just smiled and nodded. She went on, "From what I heard about my great Grandma Billings, Jemimy was her name. She was a rounder. She'd take off on a big horse, riding like a man. One day she took some hen eggs over to Henry Massey's Store, which was on the branch below where Marian Robinson's house is today. She'd take eggs to trade for groceries. After she

I could have listened to Liller's stories all day, but it was past lunch time, and my stomach was growling and we had more kinfolk to visit. Liller and Elmer both invited us to eat with them but we kindly declined the offer, since we were there unannounced. Liller said, "I got a pone of cornbread and a mess of new string beans just waiting for us in the kitchen." I knew we were missing a treat because I had tasted her beans before.

After our goodbyes and promises to drop by to see them next year, we drove about two more miles down 365 and turned on 25 and went about another two miles. We stopped at Otha's Country Store. But, much to my delight, there were three or four tables set up in the back of the store and a menu written on a blackboard that read, "Pinto Beans, Onions, Slaw and Cornbread - \$1.35." After a hearty meal of beans and all the trimmings, and the reminiscences about relatives and old times, I thought to myself, "This is what Tishomingo County means to me - good food, friends and an extended family who can bring me closer to my beginnings."

I have many other memories of Liller and Elmer. They were wonderful people whom I am proud to call kinfolks. Even though both have passed on, they are still very much alive in my memories and in others who loved them so dearly.



If a written protest against the issuance of such bonds signed by not less than twenty percent (20%), or two thousand (2,000), whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the County shall be filed on or before August 17, 1998, 10:00 a.m., then an election on the question of the issuance of such bonds shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, at any time within a period of two years after August 17, 1998.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in The Tishomingo County News Vidette and Belmont News, a newspaper published and having a general circulation in the County, the first publication to be not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date specified in Section 2 hereof and the last publication to be not more than seven (7) days prior to such date

SECTION 4. The Clerk of the Governing Body shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.


