Jump From Tenn-Tom Bridge Claims Life Of Young Corinth Man

The bridge which crosses the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway at North Crossroads was the scene of a tragic accident for a young Corinth man Sunday evening.

Charles Edward (Shelby) Lane, III of Orchard Lane in Corinth, died following a jump from the Hwy. 25 bridge into the waterway below. Lane, age 20, and a friend jumped from the bridge into the water, which is normally only 13 feet deep. The bridge, also known as the Scruggs Bridge, is some 80 feet from the water.

According to Tishomingo County Deputy Bobby Flynt, he answered a call to the boat ramp around 7:50. Lane had been

pulled from the water and was being given CPR by a Paramedic from Memphis who just happened to be on the scene.

Flynt said Lane and a friend, Robby Thompson had come to the bridge by boat with several other friends. The two boys had climbed up a ladder from the water to a ledge on the bridge and had made one successful jump into the water before the second try around 7:30. Lane, who witnesses said dived head-first, apparently hit the water at the wrong angle and suffered internal injuries.

He was pronounced dead at the Iuka Hospital Emergency Room around 8:35.

Flynt said that witnesses

indicated that this was not the first time the youths had jumped from the bridge in the last several weeks.

Shelby Lane is the son of May and Charles Lane, Jr. of Corinth. He was a 1997 graduate of Corinth High School. He attended Northeast Mississippi Community College and would have entered Mississippi State in the fall. He was a former employee of the Corinth Gas & Water Department, Eugene Keller Contracting and Dennis Landery Farms. He was a member of the First Methodist Church and an Eagle Scout who enjoyed the outdoors.

North Crossroads Home Destroyed By Lightning

A North Crossroads couple returned from vacation Saturday to find that their home had been destroyed by lightning while they were away.

The home of Tommy and Remonda (Cummings) Miller located just off Hwy. 365, near the North Crossroads Fire Department, was hit by lightning

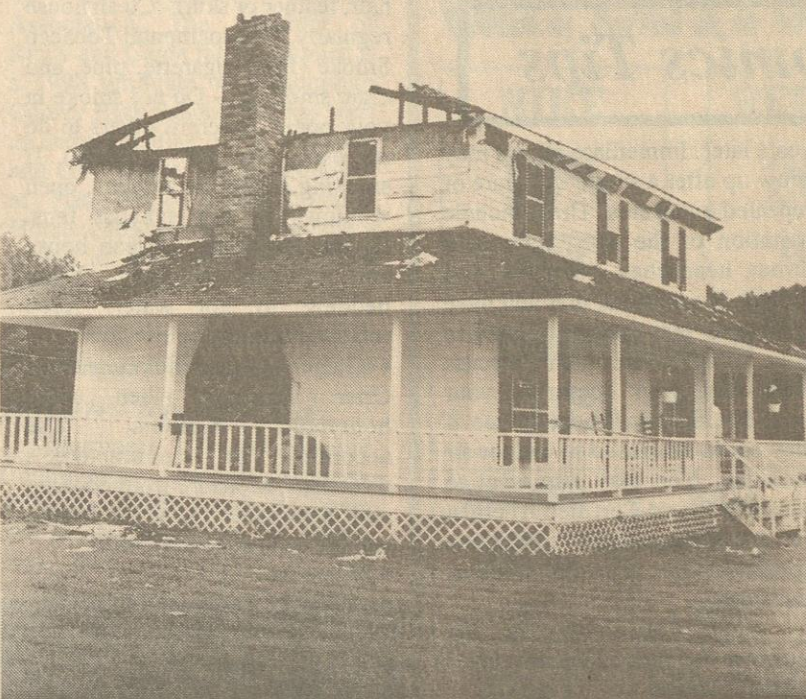
Thursday night around 7:45 during a thunderstorm that went through the area.

According to Mrs. Betty Cummings, Remonda's mother, neighbors reported the fire just moments after the lightning hit. Raymond Morris, who lived nearby, was in an out-building working on a lawn mower when he heard the "explosive noise". Immediately following the lightning strike which was heard for miles around, he saw flames coming from the Miller's home.

The lightning apparently hit the chimney of the two-story vinyl siding home, projecting bricks throughout the yard.

The North Crossroads Volunteer Fire Fighters responded within minutes to the call for help, but the home was quickly engulfed by the flames. Neighbors, Raymond and Carol Morris and Lisa Buck wasted no time in calling 911, after hearing the explosion. Despite the fast response of the fire department, there was extensive fire and water damage to the structure.

Iuka Middle School To Receive The Essential Learning System Learning Lab

Iuka Middle School will receive the Essential Learning System (ELS) learning lab. The ELS provides a solution for at-risk students, dyslexic students, 504 students, underachieving students, discouraged students, special education students, non-English speaking students, adult illiterates, adult underachievers, and correctional education students.

The ELS was created by the Creative Education Institute (CEI) located in Waco, Texas. CEI was established in 1987 with the firm conviction that everyone can learn. CEI is dedicated to the research, design, and marketing of methods that offer all individuals the opportunity to reach more of their learning potential. CEI offers an interactive, computer-based therapeutic approach to help people with learning differences build language skills. The ELS lab is designed to develop new learning patterns and strengthen weak processing areas. The result is a more independent, self-confident learner who is able to read, write, and comprehend on an appropriate level.

CEI's programs (the ELS) are based on a multidimensional, therapeutic approach that addresses each student as an individual. The learning programs address learning difficulties, such as visual and auditory difficulties, poor motor-kinesthetic coordination, poor eye movement coordination, sensory integration concerns, and auditory

and visual memory problems.

The heart of the ELS program capitalizes on the brain's capacity to adapt or develop pathways to learning. It's exercises link visual, auditory, and motor-kinesthetic pathways in the brain. An individual's ability to implant and recall information can be significantly improved by using a prescriptive series of these sensory integrated exercises.

With the therapeutic approach, the ELS cultivates learning. It provides (1) Interaction that engages students wholly in responding to each stimuli; (2) Computer-based learning that allows for flexibility and individualization; (3) Educational therapy that provides therapeutic exercises designed to strengthen learning patterns and produce more independent learners; and (4) Multi-sensory learning that combines sight, sound, touch, and movement to link learning pathways.

The ELS uses software that is designed with facilitation materials to enhance effective teacher and student interaction. It focuses on mastery, positive reinforcement, and human interaction in conjunction with an extremely individualized series of integration exercises.

It's holistic approach often results in significant gains in grade-level equivalencies, test scores, self-esteem, and classroom performance.

Thanks to donations of local individuals and businesses interested in the education of our students, the administration at IMS, and the administration of the Tishomingo School District the ELS learning lab will be available for IMS students in the

first few weeks of school in August.

Recipe of the Week

Cheddar Salsa Biscuit Bites are Irresistible on the Appetizer Menu

Party-givers everywhere seem to agree that the hardest part of entertaining is planning a fun, easy appetizer menu. "One of my favorites is a plateful of Cheddar Salsa Biscuit Bites served plain or with avocado and sour cream," says Martha White® baking expert Linda Carman. Heat oven to 425 degrees. Generously grease large baking sheet.

In large bowl, combine flour and cheese. Add salsa, butter and water; stir just until blended. Turn dough out onto lightly floured board or pastry cloth; if necessary, knead gently just until smooth. With floured fingers and floured rolling pin, press and roll dough evenly forming a 6 x 12-inch rectangle. Cut into 1x2-inch strips with knife or pizza cutter. Using thin spatula, place on greased baking sheet about 1/2-inch apart.

Home Economics Tips

How Healthy Is Your Home Environment?

Did you know that most Americans spend over 90% of their time indoors and that the pollution we are exposed to inside is often greater than outdoor? Take a moment to familiarize yourself with some common indoor environmental problems and with some simple steps you can take to protect your family.

All of us face a variety of risks to our health as we go about our day-to-day lives. Driving in cars, flying in planes, engaging in recreational activities, and being exposed to environmental pollutants all pose varying degrees of risk. Indoor air pollution is risk that you can do something about.

Indoor pollution sources that release gases or particles into the air are the primary cause of indoor air quality problems in homes. The many sources of indoor air pollution in a home include combustion appliances, tobacco products, building materials and furnishings, wet or damp materials or conditions, products for household cleaning, and radon.

Health effects from indoor air pollutants may be experienced soon after exposure or, possible,

years later. Immediate effects may show up after a single exposure or repeated exposures. These include irritation of the eyes, nose, and throat, headaches, dizziness, and fatigue. If you think that you have symptoms that may be related to your home environment, discuss them with your doctor or your local health department to see if they could be caused by indoor air pollution. You may also want to consult a Board-Certified Allergist or an Occupational Medicine Specialist for answers to your questions.

What Can You Do To Improve the Indoor Environment in Your Home?

Check the following items and make changes, if necessary, to

reduce health risks in your home:

- **BEDROOM** Humidifier - Clean according to manufacturer's directions. Refill with clean water daily.
- **Bathroom** Moisture, Mold and Mildew - Install and use exhaust fan. Fix plumbing leaks promptly. Personal Care Products (hair spray, nail polish, etc.) - Open window or use exhaust fan. Follow directions for product use.
- **All Rooms** Animals (dander,

hair, feather or skin) - Clean house regularly. Environmental Tobacco Smoke (from cigarette, pipe, and cigar smoking) - Do not smoke in your home or permit others to do so (especially near children). If smoking cannot be avoided, open windows or use exhaust fans. House dust mites - Clean house and vacuum regularly. Wash bedding in hot water. Keep relative humidity below 50%.

- **Kitchen** Household cleaners - Open windows when using household cleaners. Use according to manufacturer's directions. Moisture from cooking and dishwasher use - Install and use fan exhausted to outside.
- **Basement or Ground Floor**

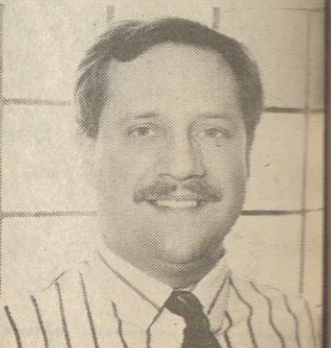

Factors such as diabetes, loss of bone under the gums and factors in the patient's medical history and psychological profile also contribute to the success of the implant procedure.

A candidate for an implant must have a jawbone that is high enough, wide enough and dense enough to accommodate the implant. Good general health, healthy gums and a commitment to oral hygiene also are important requirements.

Because several steps are involved, the implant process can take from three to nine months depending on the type of implant.

Some Change Could Be Warning Signs

A change of pace, a change of scenery, a change in the weather: Some changes are good for you; others are not so welcome.

How do you decide whether a change is good or bad? With investments, it's important to watch what you own — for, sure enough, all investments experience change. Being aware of and monitoring those changes is the best way to determine whether they're good or bad.

Here are some investment changes you should watch. The examples apply to mutual funds; however, these types of changes also occur with individual stocks and bonds.

1. **A sudden change in management.** Management changes are commonplace with mutual funds. Change is no cause for panic, only a reason to watch. Learn about the new manager. Are you comfortable with his or her experience and philosophies? The new manager may be as good as or even better than the previous one.

When a well-known, successful manager left one of America's biggest growth-and-income funds, he was replaced by someone who previously managed the company's over-the-counter (OTC) stock fund. The new manager had an excellent reputation; OTC stocks, however, are not the same as the fund's predominantly growth-and-income portfolio. This may not have been a reason to jump ship, but it certainly was cause to watch. When the new manager left a year later, the pic-

ture became more complex and warranted an even closer look.

The frequency of change in mutual fund management is a reason to consider funds that have successfully used team management for years. Each team member manages a portion of the portfolio. If one leaves, the integrity of the entire fund is not compromised.

2. **Change of ownership.** It's not uncommon for entire mutual fund groups or companies to be absorbed by others. When this happens, do your homework on the new owner. Make sure its investment objectives agree with your needs.

3. **An unusual rise or fall in a fund's total assets.** A significant drop in assets, beyond normal changes in market value, could be a sign of low investor confidence or mismanagement. An unusual rise in assets could handicap a manager in meeting a fund's objective. For example, a fund whose primary objective is to invest in small companies primed for growth might find it hard to meet this objective should the fund quintuple in size. It may now be an excellent growth fund, but the original objective of maximum gain may no longer be possible.

Change is a part of life and a part of investing. Some changes are good, while others are bad. Successful investors try to find opportunity in change. When there's no opportunity to be found, it may be time for the investor to make a change.

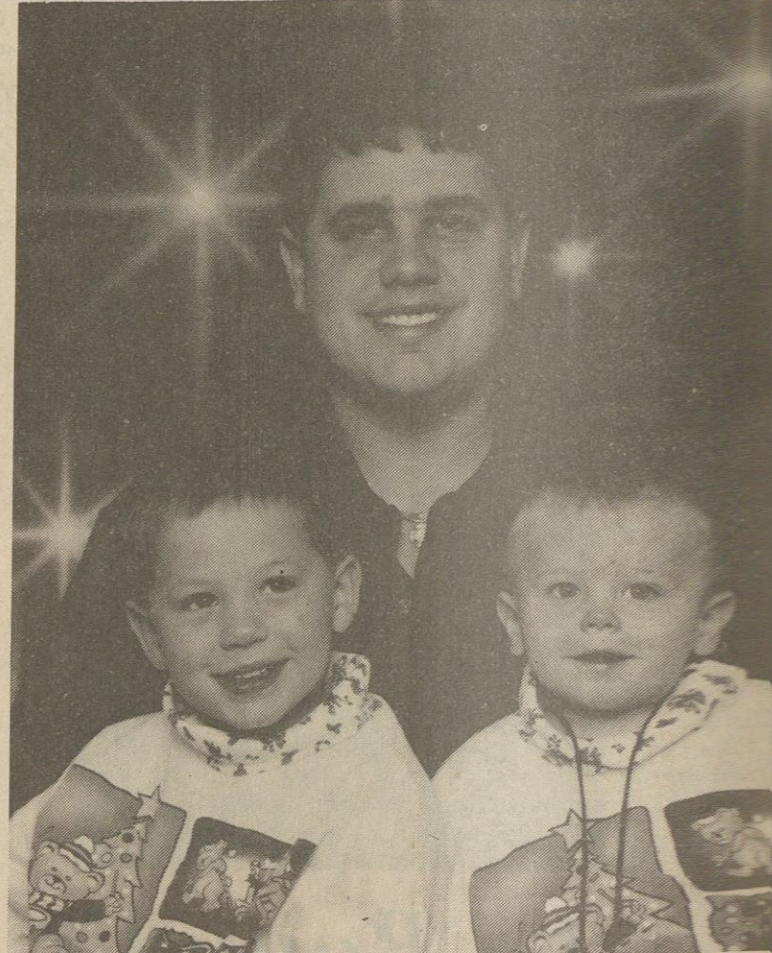

My Friend, My Hero, Buster Tucker

Turning through the local paper in most any southern community during the summer, you will see pictures of people with the biggest watermelon grown, longest snake killed or largest string of fish. As I pause over one of these photos it makes me think "Boy, do I miss Buster!"

Buster Tucker was a local character. Everybody in this area can recall seeing Buster walking down the streets of Iuka. Someone once asked him why he didn't get a car or truck. Buster exclaimed, "I don't need one of them dad blame things!" Then he looked up at the fellow asking him why and he said, "Give me a wagon and a couple of good ox or a pair of strong mules! That's all anybody needs!" Throughout his entire life, Buster never owned his own mules or oxen, he borrowed other's teams when he had to plow. If he could not borrow a team, Rachel would put the harness on while Buster manhandled the heavy plow. This is how they made a crop to eat. Most folks would laugh at this but old Buster was serious. He came from another time and another way of life.

The Tuckers lived north of Iuka at various places over the years. Buster's father died when he was young. He lived with his mother "Etta" (Everybody called her "ET") and his sister Rachel. Buster had a reputation for being the fastest runner in the county when he was a boy. Some of the old-timers in the area recall watching him run rabbits with the dogs. One old man said some years back, "My father and I were running dogs one day with Buster. He weren't no more than a kid then. He had on thick boots and his gallses (overalls) and weren't wearin' a shirt." The old man's face began to glow in a grin as he stammered, "The dogs got to barkin' and look off. Buster was runnin' right up in there with em'. He must of seen that rabbit out ahead cause he fired up ahead of them dogs! That boy was gittin' it wide open! Beat anything Daddy and I had ever seen. When we caught up with Buster, he had matched that varment up by the ears!" We sat in amazement at hearing the tale, then the man concluded laughing. Daddy said, "Buster, what cha got thar?" Buster looked at that there big ol' swamp rabbit and said, "I reckon he's supper!"

The old man has been gone for several years now. He said he had seen it with his own two eyes so who am I to say he was blind or stretching the truth. Actually, others told of similar experiences with old Buster. Sometimes truth is stranger than fiction.

A hunter once told me of meeting Buster out on Chicken Run one morning dove hunting. They admired each other's guns and fired off a shot to check for distance. "Buster's twelve gauge sounded like a cannon going off!" he said. "I told Buster, 'Boy, That's a little high powered heavy shell for you to use for doves isn't it?' Buster replied, 'Yeah, it might be high powered but if I hit

him, he's fer sure gonna die!"

The family lived on land belonging to Ples Dean soon after youngest son Tommy was born. "Buster used to help us weigh cotton at picking time," Tommy says. Most people thought Buster was dumb, well, he wasn't dumb, just uneducated. Actually, he could count and take care of his own business to a certain extent. Olene Jones recalls a story showing that Buster really had a lot of common sense and natural ability.

"My lawnmower quit one day. I couldn't get it to crank. I went down the hill to pick up Buster and see if he could get it to running," Mrs. Jones recalled. Buster tore down the engine in her carport. "When I saw he had the motor in pieces, I thought I was gonna have to buy a new mower," she laughed. "Buster asked me where we kept the gas and oil and he got it out of the shed. Buster ate lunch and went back to work on the mower." Later that afternoon, he finished putting the mower back together. "I was amazed!" Jones declared. "Buster pulled the crank cord and the mower roared to life on the first try!" When she asked him where he learned to work on a mower he replied, "Well, I just watched the fellers at the shop workin' on em' and picked it up, sorta."

Bill and Judy Moore welcomed Buster into their store every workday. Bill would set Buster's watch every day on the correct time whether it needed it or not. Buster could tell time and didn't want to miss anything! Tommy gave other examples of Buster's abilities: "We were weighing cotton one summer and Buster called out the weight after putting a bundle on the scales. Daddy would right it down as we went." Then Dean started to giggle and said, "Daddy got behind cause there were several bundles one right after another. He got a little confused and had already forgotten my last weight. Then Daddy turned to Buster and asked, 'You don't remember what Tommy's last weighed do you?' Buster looked up at him and said matter of factly, '(Heck) Ples, I am only weighing it! Don't ask me to remember it!'"

Ples Dean also had a fruit and vegetable stand by the highway. He taught Buster how to count and deal with his money. Buster was not going to be cheated by anyone and would not cheat anybody. He insisted on working hard and paying his way. In his younger days, Buster worked from daylight till dark. He never complained about working hard, he never knew any other way of life.

He didn't always HAVE to walk to town. Sometimes folks would pick him up and give him a ride. One lady passed poor old Buster on a hot day in her new car and was going to drive on by. It started raining and her conscience would have ridden with her farther than Buster was needing to go. She went back and gave him a lift.

George Jones was once known to drive his lawnmower to the store when wife Tammy Wynette took his



car keys away from him. Buster is also remembered for riding his lawnmower in to town. He mowed yards for people all over town. (If anyone has a picture of Buster on that lawnmower, I sure would like a copy!)

Buster once made a little two wheel trailer to pull behind the lawnmower. He could now haul groceries or carry Rachel on his daily trip to town. Most days he would come to Marie's and later Ellie's Snack Bar to get a couple of slug burgers and a "little Coke" in a small bottle. He was known for repeating his most remembered line worthy of Socrates, Aristotle or Jeff Foxworthy as he said time and again, "HAVE YOU EVER NOTICED THAT IT RAINS EVERY FRIDAY... OR IT DON'T?"

Buster would go pick blackberries in the fall. One lady who was with him on one of these mornings saw him step into an underbrush covering a ditch. She yelled, "Buster, you better get out of there before you get snakebit!" He replied, "You don't see snakes in the bushes much, they are mostly seen out in an open place and that's where most folks get bit!" (Even if Buster was right, I don't go ten feet near an area where there MIGHT be a snake!)

If you ever saw Buster, you knew him. He wore boots or tennis shoes with his overalls and a cap. Most of the time, he wore a dark toboggan on his head. One lady recalls seeing him in front of a store one day putting black shoe polish on new white tennis shoes. It was a custom to wear dark shoes in the winter in past days. Buster, being unable to find comfortable, cheap dark shoes simply bought what felt the best and colored them himself. Still, the lady recalled, "Buster polishing those shoes was one of the strangest things I ever did see!"

A fellow writer once wrote a story on Buster. She said his face reminded her of a "Monster Mask". I think her meaning was misunderstood and upset some people who knew Buster. Well, I guess in a way, it's true. Buster would never make the cover of G.Q. but neither would I! I think what she was trying to say is how I feel. See, with Buster, the outside was not all there was to the stooped over little man. I liken him to the character Quasimoto in the tale of "THE HUNCHBACK OF NOTRE DAME". Though he was not handsome and to some a bit odd looking, Buster, like Quasi, had a kind heart. He would help you if he could and be a friend. (Like another old man said, Buster knew when you were joking and when you were making fun of him or cutting him down, "Just don't get on his bad side or you could expect the 'DAWG CUSSIN' of your life!")

He took care of his mother through her later years and Rachel, whom he always just called "Sister" until her

death. He was now alone. He worked all his life without much to show for it. The doctors gave him crutches to help him walk. He could go a ways down the road with them then decide to tuck them under his arm and walk without them. One man said he

stopped and offered Buster a ride one day. The man told him, "Buster, you better quit walking on those legs without those crutches or you'll get hurt." The man laughed as he told how old Buster muttered under his breath, "Ain't nothin' wrong with my (Dang) legs! It's my feets what hurts me!"

I remember when he moved in a few apartments down from me when he got a place at Hiett Circle. I went over to visit him a day or two after he moved in. His place was still neat, he hadn't had time to mess it up. He had few possessions. He had left some things at the old house he rented from the Lewis family on the old Cagle place out on Chicken Run.

We sat out on the little front porch on the cool fall evening. He talked about hunting, from what I could understand of him. The old man had a pacemaker and his health was obviously not good, it was really farther along than he let on. He wasn't one to complain. He had his overalls, jacket and a black boggan on his head. There was a breeze blowing and he laughed a time or two. Not long after that Buster passed away in his sleep in his little place. He was not alone anymore. He would be laid to rest beside his momma and sister. I'm sure he was already on that golden road making his way to heaven. As the angels led him home, Buster probably ran through those gates, no longer needing his cumbersome earthly crutches!

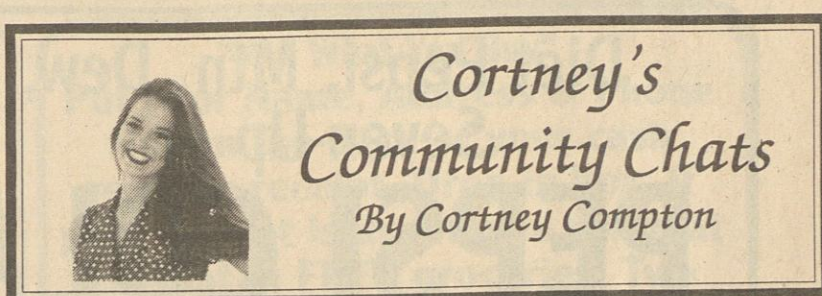
Buster was a simple man. Most folks never really got to know him, I know I really didn't like I probably should have. 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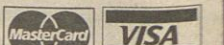
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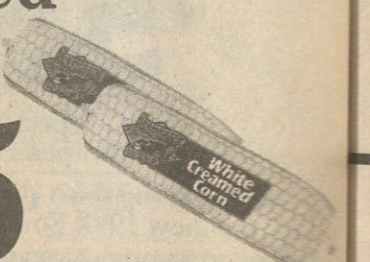
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Stolen Goods Recovered By Sheriff's Department

There came on for consideration the matter of issuing special obligation negotiable, interest-bearing combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, and after a discussion of the subject matter, Aldermen offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY-TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$872,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS AND EXTENSIONS TO SAID COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID MUNICIPALITY, CONSISTING PRIMARILY OF THE ACQUISITION OF THE ASSETS OF THE MIDWAY-PLEASANT HILL WATER ASSOCIATION THROUGH THE ISSUANCE OF A REVENUE BOND OR BONDS OF THE MUNICIPALITY IN EXCHANGE FOR THE OUTSTANDING NOTES OF SAID ASSOCIATION.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "Municipality"), acting for and on behalf of the Municipality, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates and declares as follows:

1. The waterworks, water supply, sewage, and sewage disposal facilities of the Municipality have heretofore been combined and are operated as a combined system known as the combined water and sewer system of the Municipality (the "System").

2. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the Municipality and its inhabitants to issue combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Eight Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Dollars (\$872,000) to raise money for improvements, repairs, extensions to the System, consisting primarily of the acquisition of the assets of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association through the issuance of a revenue bond of the Municipality in exchange for the outstanding notes of said Association (the "Authorized Purpose"), for which purpose there are no other available funds.

3. Said acquisition is necessary, is economically feasible and would be of public interest and of benefit to the Municipality.

4. The Municipality is authorized pursuant to Chapter 982, Local and Special Laws of Mississippi, Regular Session 1998 ("Chapter 982") to construct, improve the water distribution facilities portion of the System for a distance of and not to exceed the ten (10) mile limit therein authorized.

5. Under the provisions of Sections 21-27-11 through 21-27-69, Mississippi Code of 1972 (the "Act"), the Municipality is authorized to make such improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, in whole or in part, by the issuance of bonds, the principal and interest of which shall be payable from the revenues of the System.

6. The Municipality reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures in the performance of the aforesaid purpose prior to the issuance of said bonds and that it should be reimbursed for such expenditures made in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds.

7. A sum not exceeding Eight Hundred Seventy-two Thousand Dollars (\$872,000) must be provided and raised by the issuance of special obligation revenue bonds in said amount, payable both as to principal and interest from the revenues of the System, as authorized by the Act.

SECTION 1. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, and may be sold in the regular procedure for selling such bonds.

This resolution shall be published once a week for at least three consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in the City of Iuka, Mississippi, and having a general circulation in the Municipality, being a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than twenty-five (25) days prior to the date fixed herein for issuance of said bonds, and a third such publication shall be more than ten (10) days prior to the date specified in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 4. The Clerk of the Municipality shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary copy of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body of the Municipality on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.

County Agents Notes

Fall Armyworms Showing Up In County

Fall Armyworms are beginning to appear in pastures, lawns, gardens and row crops. Their favorite food is bermudagrass but they will feed on anything. You must go out into the pasture to look for these insects. Small larvae feed on grass at ground level and are hard to detect. Once they get about an inch long, they are easy to see but by that time, your bermudagrass is about gone! After they reach about 1.25 inches long, there is no need to treat them because they will soon pupate (go into the ground and emerge later as an adult). We may have another generation in September! Treatment threshold for pastures is 5 to 7 small larvae per square foot. The material of choice to control these insects is Carbaryl (Sevin) at 1.25 pounds active ingredient per acre. There is a 14-day waiting period for grazing or harvest. Volume of spray is important. Use 20-30 gallons of water per acre.

Peaches And Plums
Now is the time to control peach tree borers on peach,

nectarine, and plum trees. Trunk sprays prevent newly hatches borers from getting into trees. Preventative sprays are a must because there is no acceptable way to treat once the trees are infested. Thorough coverage of the tree trunk is essential. Follow the recommended spray schedule using sevin, diazinon, or malathion. An application of Thiodan should be made immediately after harvest and then one more application 4 weeks later. Use two tablespoons of Thiodan 9.7 EC per gallon of water as a trunk and scaffold branch spray.

Mixing Legumes In The Pasture
With increased fertilizer cost, many producers are considering adding legumes (e.g., clovers) to their pastures. Legumes will supply nitrogen to themselves and to plants surrounding them. Along with saving money, the overall quality of the pasture is improved. Legumes need a pH of at least 6.0 and adequate phosphate and potash. With our close proximity to a source of lime, we should take advantage of this and keep our soils at the recommended pH for the crop that we are growing.

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BONDS IN A MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED SIX MILLION FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$6,400,000) FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING AND EQUIPPING A FACILITY NECESSARY FOR OPERATION OF A PROJECT FOR INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT PURPOSES, AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body"), acting for and on behalf of Tishomingo County, a political subdivision of the State of Mississippi, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates and declares as follows:

1. The Governing Body, acting under authority of House Bill No. 1050, Chapter 907, of the 1985 Local and Private Laws of the State of Mississippi, (the "Act") heretofore established the Tishomingo County Economic Development Authority (the "Authority") on August 9, 1985.

2. Alliant Techsystems, Inc., ("Alliant") has entered into an agreement with the Boeing Company ("Boeing") under which Alliant is to build certain components for the Boeing Delta IV Composite Structures project, and Alliant proposes to use and operate such manufacturing facility to build such components at Tri-State Commerce Park in Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Facility").

3. For Alliant to build such components, it is necessary for the Facility to be equipped with an autoclave measuring 20 feet by 60 feet and other related equipment (the "Autoclave").

4. The Act authorizes the Authority to equip facilities necessary for use and operation of projects for industrial or economic development purposes.

5. Building of components of the Boeing Delta IV Composite Structure project is an "industrial enterprise for the manufacturing, processing or assembling of...products of agriculture, mining or industry," and the Autoclave constitutes a "project" as defined by Section 57-3-5 of the Mississippi Code of 1972 and thus, is within the authority of the Act (the "Project"). Such Project would foster the industrial and economic development of Tishomingo County and is thus for industrial or economic development purposes.

6. Equipping the Facility, with the Autoclave, including without limitation purchase and installation, is necessary and convenient for the planning, development, use and operation of the Project.

7. The Authority, at a duly called meeting held on June 23, 1998, and at which a quorum was present, adopted a resolution requesting, pursuant to the Act, the Governing Body to issue bonds to purchase and install the Autoclave, the principal and interest on which bonds are payable solely out of the revenue derived from leasing of the Project and its facilities or other sale or operation thereof.

8. The contract for acquisition and construction of the Autoclave is to be entered into upon the basis of public bidding pursuant to Section 31-7-1 et seq. of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to issue industrial development revenue bonds of the County in the maximum principal amount of Six Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$6,400,000) to raise money for the purpose of acquiring and installing the Autoclave.

SECTION 2. The Governing Body proposes to direct the issuance of said bonds in the amount and for the purpose aforesaid at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the Tishomingo County Courthouse on August 17, 1998, at 10:00 a.m., which date so fixed will be not more than seven (7) days after the last publication of this resolution; as directed by Section 3 hereof, and not less than twenty-one (21) days after the first such publication. If a written protest against the issuance of such bonds signed by not less than twenty percent (20%), or two thousand (2,000), whichever is less, of the qualified electors of the County shall be filed on or before August 17, 1998, 10:00 a.m., then an election on the question of the issuance of such bonds shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, at any time within a period of two years after August 17, 1998.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in The Tishomingo County News Vidette and Belmont News, a newspaper published and having a general circulation in the County, the first publication to be not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date specified in Section 2 hereof and the last publication to be not more than seven (7) days prior to such date.

SECTION 4. The Clerk of the Governing Body shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 2 hereof.
