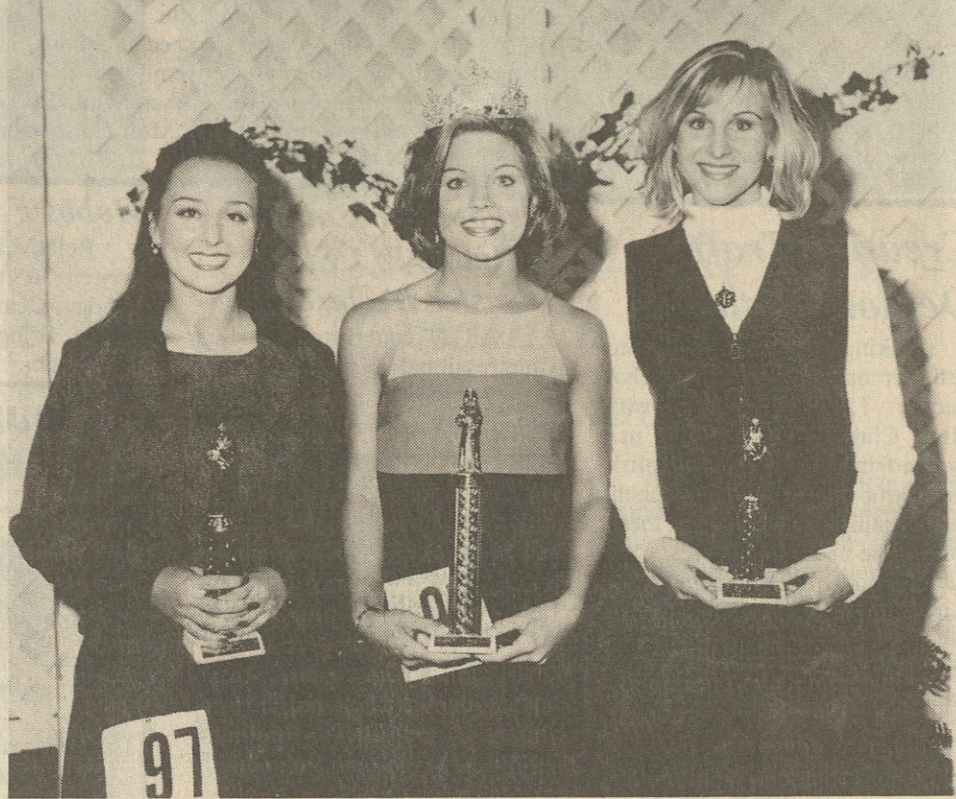
The Tishomingo County Fair got underway this week in Iuka.

### Local Authorities Search For Escaped Inmate

At press time, Sheriff David Smith confirmed that an inmate, which slipped out of the Tishomingo County Jail during the early morning hours Friday, remains at large.

Smith said that at about 4:30 a.m. Friday, Christian Martin, 28, apparently knocked out two 8-inch concrete blocks in the cell block day area and squeezed himself into the crawl space between the ceiling and the roof.

The inmate then crawled to the area where jailers enter to bring items to prisoners and waited, Smith said. When the jailer opened the door to the area, responding to a request from a

prisoner for medicine, Martin slipped from his hiding spot and out of the back door of the facility.

The Sheriff said he has some good leads as to the inmate's whereabouts and expects to have him back in custody very soon.

Martin was in custody awaiting trial on grand larceny charges. This was his second escape attempt this year. He had previously escaped from the jail in late February, but was recaptured.

Smith said the jail, which was built in 1974, needs many improvements. He said he wished the county had a new facility so that problems like this would be eliminated.

### Lt. Gov. Ronnie Musgrove To Speak In Burnsville Monday

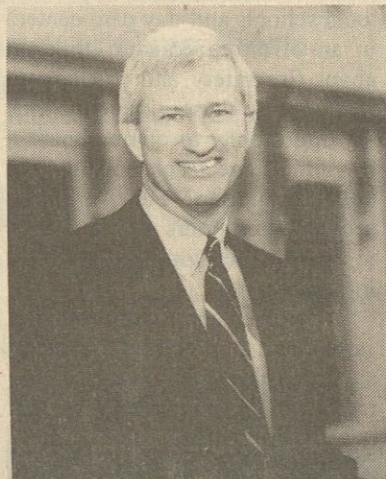

### County's Last Surviving World War I Veteran, Charlie Smith, Dies At Age 102

Charles Edmund "Charlie" Smith, who celebrated his 102nd birthday on September 19th, died Friday, October 2, 1998 at the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth following a short illness.

The last surviving Veteran of World War I in Tishomingo County, suffered a fall at his home in the Oldham Community last week and underwent surgery to repair a broken hip. He made it fine through the surgery, but Mr. Charlie, who had always been an independent man, taking care of himself and his beautiful garden and home, died peacefully and quietly as he had lived his long life. Family reported that it was as if he knew it was time to go Home, that his work on earth was done.

"Well done, thou good and faithful servant"

Charlie Smith was honored and recognized on many occasions for his service to his country, serving under Gen. John "Blackjack" Pershing on the "Border Patrol" and his service in World War I. But the modest man preferred to talk about his family, his friends, his garden and above all his love of his church and his God.

He was a life-long member of Snowdown United Methodist Church but for many years he had made his church home, Oldham Baptist Church which was just a short walk for Mr. Charlie. He was the first to arrive at church each Sunday morning, sweeping the walk, heating the building and greeting the people as they arrived. He taught Sunday School for many years, and was a knowledgeable teacher of the Bible.

Anyone who had the privilege of meeting this fine gentleman, went away in awe of his kindness

and the wonderful spirit of faith he projected. He was a good man and he lived a good life which began in 1896 in the old "section house" by the railroad track in the Oldham Community near Iuka. He was the son of the late James Thomas and Mary Ann Archer Smith. He was preceded in death by three sisters, Maud Smith Mars, Mary Lucille Smith Wadkins, and Annie Lee Smith Haines; and two brothers, Walter and Owen Smith.

Mr. Charlie worked many jobs over the years, but farming was his chosen profession. He farmed all his life, never using a tiller, only his bare hands. He once stated, "I live on work, I wouldn't be here if I didn't keep working." He advised people to "keep working and eat anything you like and plenty of it".

Funeral services for Charlie Smith were held at 2 p.m. Monday at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Travis Tramel and Rev. Chris Burrows officiating. Burial with military honors for the distinguished member of the American Legion was in Snowdown Cemetery.

He was survived by many nieces and nephews.

Pallbearers were Thomas Curry, John Curry, Steve Smith, Frank Smith, James Smith and Chad Marlar.

#### Wildlife

Spring and fall are prime seasons for finding birds, squirrels, or other wildlife. These are the times that mothers are teaching their young to fend for themselves, so young wildlife can be seen wandering from their nests. These young creatures can often appear lost or orphaned, but for the most part, their mothers are usually close by. If you want to help these animals, the best way is to remove any immediate danger and leave them alone.

If you don't notice any sign of a mother after several hours, if the animal doesn't move, if it's cold or covered with parasites, or in the case of fledglings, has no feathers, the young animal may need some human intervention to survive. If you can find the nest from which the animal might have fallen, the ideal thing to do is put it back. The idea that mothers will reject their young after human handling is a myth. If there is no apparent nest, you may need to bring the animal into your care.

A cardboard box lined with a towel is an excellent place to keep the animal while it's in your care. Keep the box in a dark, quiet place, away from other animals or pets. It's fine to show the creature to children, just emphasize the need for peace and quiet. Avoid handling the animal as much as possible to prevent the spread of any zoonotic (transferrable from animals to people) diseases and parasites. Do not feed any wild animal you are caring for unless instructed by a veterinarian or licensed wildlife rehabilitator. Each species has different feeding requirements, and some food like milk can make the animal ill.

The next step is to contact a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. If you don't know the listing, most veterinarians can tell you how to get in touch with one. The rehabilitator may ask you to bring the animal to them for nursing, but will most likely guide you in the care of the animal. They can also assist you in preparing the animal for its return to its natural habitat.

After nursing a wild creature back to health, many people hesitate to return it to its natural habitat. However, these animals do not survive well in captivity. Routine household noises cause high levels of stress, which doesn't make for a healthy environment for the animal. As a wild creature, it's also difficult to predict its temperament, even if it has been hand-raised. As wild creatures grow older, they may become unfriendly or even bite. Moreover, keeping a wild animal in your custody is usually illegal unless you have proper training and certification.

A SERVICE OF THE IUKA FIRE DEPARTMENT

This week, October 4-10, is National Fire Prevention Week. As always, this is a very busy time for the personnel at the Iuka Fire Department, but it is a time they look forward to every year.

During Fire Prevention Week, the Iuka Fire Department visits local schools and day care centers in an effort to educate children about fire safety and prevention. Not only do these visits give kids the opportunity to climb aboard a big, shiny fire truck and test the horn and siren, but they also provide firefighters with a chance to instill lifesaving information into young minds.

The firemen go over basic fire safety and prevention measures, such as planning an evacuation route for the home; stop, drop, and

roll if clothing is on fire; crawl low under smoke; never play with lighters and matches; and call 911 in an emergency. They also acquaint the children with a firefighter in full turnout gear and helmet so they will be familiar with the sight if they ever need to be rescued.

Adults need to learn fire safety as well. A very important part of this is installing smoke alarms in the home and keeping fresh batteries in them. Many people have escaped injury and death because of a warning issued by a smoke alarm. Checking fire extinguishers to ensure that they're charged, and devising and practicing an evacuation route are other ways to ensure a fire-safe home.

National Fire Prevention Week will be over in a few days, but fire safety must be practiced every day of the year to be effective. Take a few minutes this week to see if your home measures up to fire safety and prevention standards. If you find something lacking, it is well worth your time to attend to it. The time it takes is nothing compared to your peace of mind and your family's safety.

Happy crafting ladies what ever type of creative arts you do. Always remember just enjoy yourself. Make one for a gift and see what pleasure you get doing for others.

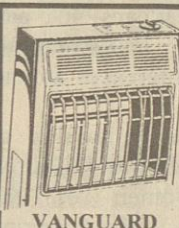

### Your Dental Health



### Looking After Baby's Teeth

Teeth are one part of the anatomy that many people take for granted. But some very special people - pregnant women - have two good reasons to be concerned with good oral health and dental hygiene.

Optimum oral hygiene habits - brushing, flossing, and dental visits - must be maintained throughout the pregnancy. Why? The hormonal changes of pregnancy may exaggerate the gum's response to formation of plaque on the teeth, causing unusually severe gingivitis or inflammation of the gums. Gingivitis is especially common during the second to eighth month of pregnancy and may cause red, puffy, or tender gums that tend to bleed when the teeth are brushed.

Some pregnant women avoid dental care during this special time of their lives. One reason may be their concern about the risk to the unborn baby from exposure to drugs and X-rays.

Most routine dental procedures can be done safely during the second three months, or second trimester, of pregnancy; however, routine x-rays should be postponed until after delivery.

During the first and third trimesters, emergency care and cleaning of the teeth are the only procedures that should be performed. The baby's organs are forming during the first trimester and, in the third trimester, the mother may experience increased discomfort and should not experience undue stress.

### X-Rays

Dental X-rays emit very minimal radiation to the patient. Still most dentists avoid taking routine X-rays during pregnancy, especially during the first trimester.

If a dental emergency arises during pregnancy, X-rays are needed to provide an accurate diagnosis and to plan proper treatment. With modern X-ray techniques, including the use of a lead apron for the patient, appropriate films can be taken.

### Prescription Medications

Many physicians believe that it is best that no drugs be taken during pregnancy, especially during the first trimester. However, it is frequently impossible to adhere to this rule. Fortunately, most of the commonly prescribed drugs in dentistry can be used with relative safety, including local anesthetics in the concentrations dentists use.

## Old Tishomingo Traces

By: June Bullard

Miscellaneous genealogical tidbits from old Videttes on microfilm at the Iuka Library:

Feb. 6, 1909 - Mr. L.P. Bonds, MBS officiated at the marriage of Mr. John Province and Miss Edna Parker.

Thursday, April 1, 1909, Elm, Miss. - A Sunday School was organized at Cross Roads Sunday, the 27th with C.D. Gardner, Supt., Prof. A. B. Adams, teacher 1st Bible Class; George L. McMasters, assistant; Mrs. Osia Kelley, teacher 2nd Bible Class, Julia Gardner, assistant; Will Gardner, teacher Primary Class; Estes Gardner, Leader in Music, W.L. McMasters, assistant; James Donahoe, Secretary and Treasurer. A nice crowd was out and great interest was taken.

April 15, 1909 - A saw mill and shingle machine was put in successful operation at Cole's Mill Friday. It is propelled by water power. Mr. Gunter is the operator of this mill.

Several parties from this section are gone to Paducah this week with rafts.

May 27, 1909, Eaves, Miss. - Rev. G.W. Gardner has resigned as pastor of New Salem. Bro. Gardner will preach at Bullard Cut-off School house the 2nd Sunday in June at 11 a.m. and at Short Creek School House at 3 p.m. the same day.

J.H. Scruggs of Iuka visited his parents Mr. and Mrs. P.T. Scruggs Sunday.

Mr. Andrew Johnson of near Tulu, Tenn. was visiting relatives at Short a few days ago.

June 3, 1909 - Mr. C.C. Johnson and family left Monday for Shawnee, OK where they will make their future home and where Mr. Johnson will engage in merchandising later on.

August 5, 1909 - Mrs. S.I. Bishop, wife of W.E. Bishop, and mother of J.A. and J.C. Bishop, after

many months of intense suffering died at her home in South Corinth Tuesday, July 27. Deceased was 57 years of age. Remains were interred at Henry Cemetery. Mrs. Bishop was a sister to Mrs. P.T. Scruggs who lives on Route 4, Iuka, and formerly resided near Cole's Mill in the 2nd District.

August 26, 1909 - Bitten by a cottonmouth. Mr. H.A. Underwood of Route 5 was in town last Tuesday limping slightly from a snake bite. While walking in the field last Sunday, he stepped over a pine pole on the bank of a ditch. His foot had just struck the ground when a cottonmouth moccasin struck, fastened his fangs to Mr. Underwood's ankle and was jerked into the ditch. Killing the snake, he went to the house, immersed his ankle in coal oil, and sat still for a couple of hours. Beyond a slight nausea, he suffered no further inconvenience.

THOMAS MARLAR - Died near Kendrick, Miss. August 15 at the home of his son J.H. Marlar. He was 92. Deceased and his brother George came to Tishomingo County from Indiana about 1836. He was a boy then in his teens. He married Mrs. Mary Runnels a few years later. She died about 25 years ago. His second marriage was to a widow Humphreys who was sent to the asylum this summer. He has five children who survive him, 3 dead. The burial took place at Shady Grove Church conducted by Bro. Fred Whittaker. Deceased has been a member of the Baptist Church about 35 years.

DEMPSEY HONEYCUTT, age 19, drowned in Yellow Creek near Burnsville yesterday while seining, stepping suddenly into a deep hole. Forrester Honeycutt and two little boys were with him but ten minutes or more elapsed before he could be

gotten out. Life was extinct and all efforts to resuscitate failed.

September 16, 1909 - Died; Mrs. Clifton Scruggs, formerly Miss Mary Phillips died three miles southwest of Iuka. She had been sick since spring. She leaves a 6 weeks old infant. Burial took place Sunday at Kirk's Cemetery.

September 23, 1909 - **Successful Applicants for License** - As a result of last Friday and Saturday examinations of applicants for public teachers' license, the following were successful:

First Grade - Mrs. Virgie McDougal, Mrs. Ora Grisham, Mrs. Mae Robinson, Mrs. Ruth Carmack, Mr. R.C. Grisham, Mr. W.L. McMasters, Mr. Samuel S. Littlejohn, Mr. Grady Oaks, Mr. H.C. Long, Mr. B.A. Brumley; Second Grade - Mr. John Floyd and Mr. C.C. Hampton.

The sudden death of Mr. Charles C. Castleberry occurred at New Albany Sept. 16, 1909 removes from the stage of action a man well known in Tishomingo County. He was born on the Castleberry place between Iuka and Eastport in 1840/41 and was therefore 68 or 69 at the time of his death. He enlisted in Roddy's Cavalry at beginning of war and was elected 1st sgt. After war engaged in the milling business and was then elected sheriff for two terms in 74 and 78. His wife died in 1877 and he never married again. He had two children, a boy and a girl. Boy died in childhood.

The girl was named Henrietta after her mother and was married to J.P. Houk 10 or 12 years ago. She lives in Aberdeen. The coffin arrived on the train at 1:17 p.m. and was carried to the Castleberry home. Rev. O.L. Savage conducted funeral. At grave a talk was made by G.P. Hammerly, who was a war comrade. Thus was laid to rest a man with a checkered career - a man who had his faults and his virtues. Let us remember his virtues.

January 13, 1910 - Mr. J.M. Price has his sawmill on the Lard Land sawing for Mr. G.W. Cresap.

Frank Bonds has rented the McMaster's farm at Cole's Mill and will move soon as his house is completed.

Mr. Depoyster is getting along

fine with his school at Cross Roads.

Mr. Geo L. McMaster's has sold his small farm near Cross Roads to Man Mosley for \$400.

Mr. G.W. Reese will soon have his new house completed.

January 20, 1910 - Max Counts formerly of Tishomingo Co. and having many relatives here died suddenly at his home in Corinth last Sunday of paralysis. The body was brought here on the train Monday, and carried from here to New Salem for burial. The deceased 50 years of age leaves a wife and two children.

March 24, 1910 - Mr. S.A. Kimberly completed the Scruggs Bridge last week. It is the best one that has been at this place in many years.

A powerful turbine water wheel is being installed at Cole's Mill.

Brother Whittaker filled his appointment at Cross Roads last Sunday.

W.L. McMasters received the appointment as Census Enumerator

for the 2nd District.

Several working in this section last week principally rail making for spring fencing.

Mr. Will Rodgers and family came through yesterday moving to Pittsburgh, Tenn. to do some hauling of the storm broken timber on the national park. Mr. Rodgers once lived in this section.

November 18, 1915 - Mr. Alvie Bullard of Short began his school at Cross Roads near Cole's Mill last week.

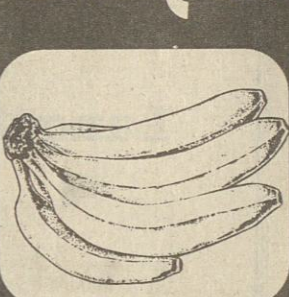

### Deadline Nears for Roth IRA Conversions

The introduction of Roth IRAs this year spurred a barrage of investor interest. One of the largest mutual fund companies experienced a 155 percent increase in new IRA business this year, more than half of which came from Roth IRAs. A leading brokerage firm whose IRA business was 300 percent higher in the first six weeks of 1998 than the same period in 1997 also attributed half of this increase to Roth IRAs. Money magazine even coined a new term -- Rothomania -- to describe the phenomenon.

The big attraction of Roth IRAs is that you can withdraw your money tax-free in the future -- a feature not offered by traditional IRAs. This has caused many investors to convert their regular IRAs to Roths. In fact, a large percentage of Roth IRA business has come in the form of IRA conversions.

If you're considering converting your traditional IRA to a Roth, be aware that you'll owe taxes. Any deductible contributions you made to your regular IRA, plus all earnings, are taxable.

There is one break, however: If you make your conversion by Dec. 31, 1998, you don't have to claim the taxable amount all at once. You can spread your tax liability over the next four years. If you convert after 1998, however, you will have to claim the full taxable amount as income in the year you make the conversion.

Should you convert your traditional IRA to a Roth? That depends. For one thing, you can't convert to a Roth IRA if your adjusted gross income exceeds \$100,000. This is the limit for both single filers and married couples filing jointly. A married person filing separately cannot convert.

If you're near retirement, the taxes you pay on conversion may outweigh the tax benefits you'd receive when you withdraw the money. But younger people with small IRA balances may be good candidates for conversion, especially if they convert by Dec. 31, 1998. Just be sure you have money outside your IRA to pay your tax liability.

## October Hunting Seasons Open

Now that October is here, more hunting seasons are getting underway, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

Beginning Oct. 10, the second mourning dove season opens in the north zone. It continues through Nov. 8. Tishomingo County is included in the north zone.

The daily bag limit on doves is 15, and the possession limit is 30. A possession limit is not permitted on the opening day of any season.

Oct 17 brings the close of the first dove season in the south zone. However, Oct. 17 also

brings about the opening of statewide season on rabbits. The daily limit is eight, and the possession limit is 16. The season closes Feb. 28.

Squirrel hunters will begin to see Oct. 17. That's the opening of the season in Zone 2. The season continues through Feb. 28.

Zone 2 squirrel hunting encompasses the areas between Highway 82 and Highway 84 and west of I-55.

The daily limit on squirrel is eight, and the possession limit is 16.

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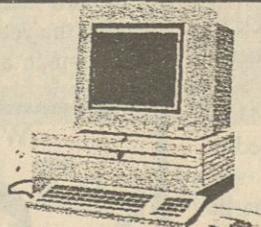
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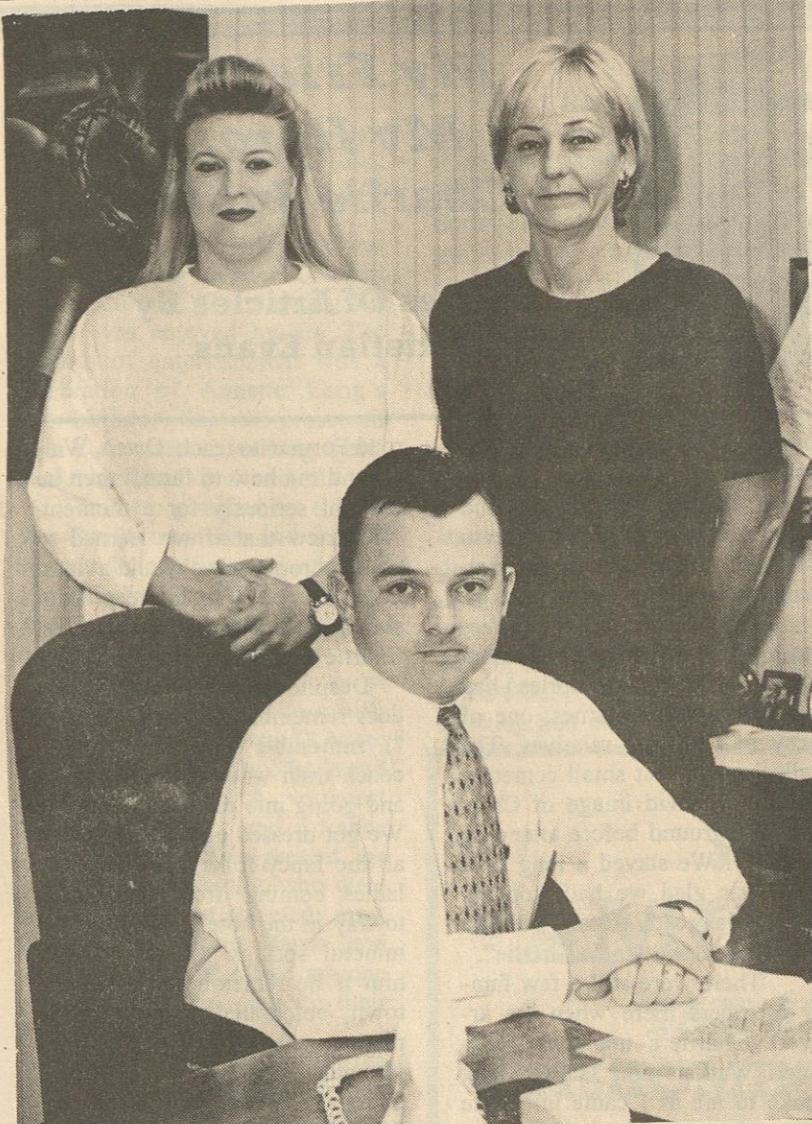

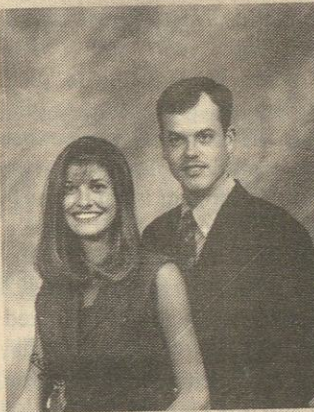

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## My Friend, My Hero, Charlie Smith

When we are young, we dream of living to be a hundred years old. Most of us could not imagine going from a mule drawn wagon to the space age in a single lifetime, that is unless you actually know someone who has. I was invited to a birthday celebration recently. It was a day in honor of Charles Smith, known affectionately as "Uncle Charlie" to his family on the occasion of his 102nd birthday. This man has been a farmer, soldier, cared for the sick and most importantly, has faithfully served his Lord throughout his lifetime.

Frank Smith, Charlie's nephew, called and invited me to the gathering of family and friends. He even offered to come by and pick me up. I gladly accepted. I met Charlie through Frank and his sister, Teresa Smith Bridges, eight years ago. I was ready when Frank came to pick me up. We had a little time to kill, allowing the crowd to clear so that Charlie would be able to visit with everyone before talking with me.

"Do you mind if we make a stop?" Frank asked. "No," I answered, "Where are we going?" Frank answered, "Well, I wanted to stop by Snowdown Methodist Church and show you some of the Smith and Mars family tree." A lot of this history I already knew from my close friendship with Irene Barnes, a relative of Charlie's. It was a beautiful sunny day with clear blue skies and we had plenty of time.

We pulled in to the church yard and parked under a shadetree. "How did Snowdown get its name?" I asked. Frank replied, "From my understanding, the day they started building this church in 1845, before starting to work, it began to snow. They took it as a sign of blessing for their efforts."

We walked just inside the chain link fence surrounding the cemetery. There was the weathered tombstone of James Thomas and Mary Ann "Mollie" Smith. "These folks were Charlie's father and mother," Frank said, "They called them 'Tomdaddy' and 'Grandma' Smith. I noticed their dates of birth and death. The father was born in 1860, a year before the Civil War began. He died in 1954 at age 94. 'Charlie's grandfather, Thomas Randolph Smith, had fought in the 4th Alabama Cavalry during the Civil War. He fought at Shiloh, Brice's Crossroads and in North Alabama where he was captured," Frank said proudly, "He was beaten when captured by the Yankees." If a Union officer who was a Mason had not seen Smith's Masonic Ring and stopped the soldiers, Thomas Randolph Smith would have been killed at that moment. "He gave the officer a Masonic handshake for stopping the Union pickets from beating him to death saving his life," Frank told.

Another interesting story told concerning Thomas Randolph Smith, or Paw Smith, as he was called, comes from his great-grandson, Tobuck King. Tobuck remembers Paw Smith letting all the children rub his neck, which had a mini ball in it from the Shiloh Battle. He said Paw Smith lived to be 96 years old and resided with his granddaughter, Blanche Bayliss Daugherty and her husband Charlie Daugherty.

As Frank went on as we walked through the cemetery, "Thomas Randolph's father, Hugh Smith, brought his family west when Thomas was just a baby," Frank said. According to family lore, somewhere in Georgia, the father crossed the Etowah River in a scouting party looking for a place to camp. It started to rain and the river rose. It was getting dark and Smith wanted desperately to get back across to his family. Bravely, he made a dash across the swollen river but was swept away in the raging current and drowned.

Hugh Smith left behind a widow, Elizabeth Edwards Smith with five children to raise. Among these was Thomas Randolph Smith. The family was later brought to Mississippi. Despite losing their father at a young age, all the Smith children were raised in a hardworking, loving Christian

home. This environment was passed on from generation to generation. This is why Charlie and the rest of his family continue to uphold Christian virtues and values humbly in their daily lives.

Frank showed me the graves and told me several stories about them. Several of these stories I had heard from Irene Barnes, one of many of Charlie's relatives. The walk through that small cemetery gave me a vivid image of Charlie's background before attending the party. We stayed a long time but I was glad we had stopped. Now, I was ready to talk with the man of the day, "Uncle Charlie."

There were still a few family members there when we arrived. Charlie's nephews, Raymond Watkins and James Mars, spoke to me as I came in. There were a few other great-nieces and great-nephews there at the time. Charlie was fooling with a troublesome lock on a door that needed to be fixed, the way he did

things, right then! James Mars, whom I had met just a week or so before, brought Charlie over and introduced us. It had been several years since I had seen him so he did not remember me off hand.

When they said, "He's the one who writes those articles in the paper you like, Uncle Charlie," a grin came to his face, then mine! As he shook my hand he said, "I read you every week," then he started mentioning specific pieces by name. I had been warned that if he saw my tape recorder, he may not want to talk. Well, I was just going to let him talk and try to remember all I could. I had talked with him a few years back when Frank and I visited him in his beloved garden. For a long time, I had wanted to finish that conversation. This was my chance.

Raymond, realizing the opportunity, sent Frank to the truck to get my recorder and convinced Charlie to sit down with me for a one on one "chat" about his life. We sat in a small area off the dining room. I set up the recorder as he began to talk. I asked him, "Mr. Smith," to which he held up his hand and said, "Just call me Charlie there son, Uncle Charlie if you want but you have to remember, I was an enlisted man so I don't feel right being called 'Sir' or 'Mr.'," he laughed, "That stuff is for 'big shots'." "O.K. 'Uncle Charlie', if you say so," I replied.

As fate would have it, I was having problems with my "brand new" recorder, later determining it was a microphone giving me problems. I just used the backup and all was well. I did not know it then but these problems led me to ask Charlie a few questions several times. He answered them with a little more detailed information each time. He did not seem to mind, he just sat there smiling as he reminisced. He started by saying, "I was born September the nineteenth of eighteen and ninety-six, a 'hunard-n-two' years ago today, so they tell me!" then laughed.

"I had two brothers and three sisters," he started, "there was Owen (Smith), Walter (Smith), Maudeline (Smith Mars), Mary Lucile (Smith Watkins) and Annie Lee (Smith Haines)." Then he laughed, Owen and Maudeline married a sister and brother in the Mars family, that is how we are all kin, just so you don't get confused!" (A 102 year old man telling ME not to get confused? I then knew THIS is going to be a great story!)

"Our father, Tom-daddy, was raised as a farmer but went to work on the railroad," he said, "That was a good living but he got kind of tired of it by the time us boys finished school." Charlie said he only went through the eighth grade. "Most of us country folks had no way into town or to board in town to continue our education. That costs money. Some of the more 'well to do' farmers sent their kids but we could not afford it." Most women of those days had little more than a basic education and were trained as housewives. The boys, according to their father, needed a trade. "When I was about fourteen, Tomdaddy quit his job as a rail-

road Forman to teach Owen, Walter and me how to farm," then he thought seriously for a moment, "He knew that if we learned to plant a crop that we would at least hopefully be able to keep from starving." For the next six years, Charlie was a full time farmer.

Despite the hard work, Charlie does remember many good times, "I remember catching a three coach train when I was 14 or 15 and going into town on Saturday. We got dressed up cause you saw all the fancy folks, especially the ladies, coming from everywhere to stay in the hotels and drink the mineral springs water." I asked him if he remembered when the town celebrated winning first place in the 1904 World's Fair. He said, "I sure do! I was eight I guess and we all went to the park for a big deal. Don't remember much about it but the old folks talked so much about it I can tell you more than I remember first hand, or at least I could years back."

There were other events in town Charlie vividly recalled, "I remember all kinds of political speakings at Jaybird and Mineral Springs Park. I remember hearing Bilbo (Gov. Theodore G. Bilbo) speaking at the courthouse," he says, "I also remember preachers holding tent revivals and the Sacred Heart Singings too, but that came a little later."

Charlie was a Methodist by faith and a lifelong member of Snowdown Methodist. He attended Oldham Baptist Church and taught Sunday School there off and on for many years, even passed his 100th birthday. "It was a lot easier to walk just a little piece down the road from here than to go out there to Snowdown, especially in bad weather or on foot!" He did recall going by wagon at one time, "If you had a wagon, it sure saved ware on your boots!" Charlie noted. Many older Oldham Baptist members recall that for decades, Charlie Smith would get up before daylight and

walk to the little church to light the coal-burning, potbelly stoves on cold winter mornings. This was so the building would be warm when the faithful arrived several hours later for services. Charlie was faithful to the Lord and as Charlie said, "I was blessed over and over again in my life."

Charlie was twenty when he decided to leave farming and try his luck as a soldier. "I had always had an interest in being in the army so the summer before I was twenty in 1916, I joined up," he starts telling of his military career. "I was trained in Missouri in field artillery school and sent to Lored, Texas for the rest of 1916," Charlie thought back, "When we were first out in the field, they had tracers on artillery shells. The Sergeant said to us on line one night, 'See that guy over there? His job is to hang a lantern on the shell when the gun goes off!' He laughed, 'I was smart enough to know he was foolin' but it scared some of them boys thinkin' that was gonna be their job and it was BAD DANGEROUS to hang a lantern on a shell!" he laughed. "We had a small artillery piece we could break down and carry on horseback. Texas and Mexico looked all the same to me, a lot of dust, horses and pack mules."

Charlie recalled the desert heat and started to scratch, "I can still feel that wool uniform in that heat and the sand would eat you alive," he said. Led by Gen. John "Blackjack" Pershing, the "Border Patrol" was formed in 1916 in an effort to catch Mexican Bandit Pancho Villa who had made daring raids into the United States, particularly in a massacre in Columbus, New Mexico where several Americans were killed. Other raids occurred, "Laredo was attacked before I came down there," Charlie said, "I don't think anybody got killed in that one." Charlie recalled mounting up, "It was a thrill getting on those horses and mules when you started out but you got over that when it got hot and you got blisters and saddle sores!" he laughed. "The Border

Patrol never caught Pancho Villa, did they?" I asked. Charlie laughed again, "I don't think anybody saw him, he was out there but we never really saw much more than what the Army wanted us to see, mules and dirt!" Then he added, "We did get to fire a few rounds, for practice. I don't think we hit anybody other than a cactus or two!"

While the patrol chased Villa, war broke out in Europe. "We stayed in Lorado while Wil-

son got us into the War in Europe. We stayed in Texas through most of seventeen (1917). Then I was attached to the Third Army and sent to Virginia for advanced artillery training. "They sent a bunch of college boys as reserve officers into officers school for military training," he says, "In 90 days, they would be officers."

By the time Charlie was shipped to France, he had earned the rank of Sergeant in the Army Artillery. "Had a shell burst that hurt my ear," he said, "That usually comes with working with artillery pieces for any length of time," he laughed, "The only ear plugs we had were our fingers and sometimes we didn't think to stick em' in, that was DEFINITELY a mistake!" (His hearing has weakened in his good ear over the years, what do you expect at 102?)

While in Tulle, France Sergeant Smith waited on orders to move into the German stronghold of Metz. The date was November 11, 1918, the day the war ended (the day we now celebrate as "Veteran's Day") and Charlie missed his last chance to fight the enemy face to face. Even if he could not fight them, he was about to see them . . . face to face.

Without the need for artillery men, Charlie was reassigned to guard prisoners of war in Germany. "They assigned twenty-four of us to guard forty-thousand Russian and German soldiers." That sounds like a lot until you remember that the prisoners were behind barb wire fences and the guards were armed, "We told them it was gonna be our way," he said matter of factly, "They took an oath of allegiance to us and if they broke it in ANY way, we would take em' out and shoot em'!"

"One Sunday there were six of us setting around, didn't have nothing else to do," Charlie smiled at me and asked, "You ever played any setback?" "No," I answered, "but I have heard of it." "Well," he said, "It's a card game and I had a deck stored away so we got em' out and played." Charlie explained, "Well, we didn't play for much, just a nickel or a dime or so. It was every man for himself and the first one to go up to seven won the pot". Then he put his hand on his left side and said, "I got to feeling bad, I mean HURTIN! right here," he showed me, "over my left kidney and I said, 'I finally said, 'Boys, I got to quit! I am a hurtin'! He suffered through out the night. The next morning, he was worse. Charlie continued by saying, "We asked a captured Russian Doctor what he thought it was. He yelled back 'influenza!' I

hollered back, 'I ain't got no more influenza than a cat has! I am hurtin' on my left side!' Charlie shook his head and said, "They sent me to a nearby (army) hospital and sent an eye doctor out to see me." They said they were going to have to send me to another hospital, a German Red Cross Hospital!"

Charlie winced in pain as he relived the agony of what happened next. He said, "They loaded me up in an ambulance, it was a wagon kind of thing with steel wheels on it. We went over cobblestones on those steel wheels for six or seven miles! Oh, what punishment I went through!" Charlie says with a grimace on his face. "Well, it was my appendix that was causing the problem," he said, "They took it out and I spent four weeks recovering before they assigned me back to duty."

Charlie feared being left behind when his unit moved out, "I wasn't well enough to go back to the line but I convinced the doctor I was, there was no way I was going to let them leave me!" During the war, the camp was used to house British prisoners of war who were released before Charlie was assigned there. Now, he got back just in time to see the Russian prisoners released to go home. This meant his tour was up and soon he would be heading back to the states. He went from 75 MM to 155 MM guns when back in Virginia. He was on a seven year enlistment. He got out in four and

was subject to recall, "but they never called me."

Charlie had hoped for a career in the military but his time in Europe had changed his views on warfare. In later years, someone asked in church one Sunday what the cause of all war was. Charlie stood up and answered with one word then sat down. The word . . . "GREED". I asked him to elaborate on that statement. The old soldier said, "Rich folk, powerful people start wars over wealth, power, land, it's all GREED." Then he said in a quivering voice, "And it's all paid with the blood of young men, no more than boys!" It was after seeing warfare and then watching the military decline rapidly as equipment was destroyed and the service turned into a circus. Charlie decided not to reenlist and left the service at the end of his hitch. "It was pitiful what the government, congress and all did to the mightiest Army in the world. I couldn't stand it! I knew big mistakes were gonna happen!" Charlie was proved right as Hitler rose to power and then our eyes finally opened wide after

December 7, 1941. This, just like Charlie had predicted twenty one years earlier.

"That was all of my military career," he said shaking his head, "Of all I did in those years, I never will forget that ambulance ride on those steel wheels over those cobblestone streets," he says. After four years of service, Sergeant Charlie Smith was now in the reserves. He headed back home and began working in the Allen gravel pit near his home at Oldham (named for a man associated with another gravel pit). He worked there until a flooding of the creek in the gravel quarry. The Depression closed the gravel pit. "I went back to farming," he said, "Then came World War II."

Charlie was too old to fight but he wanted to do his part. He went to work for the Fisher Aircraft Plant (where Kimberly Clark is today) in Memphis. "We made parts for B-25's and sent them out to Kansas City to be assembled," he recalled. "They had a couple of machine guns sitting out there on the work floor as samples of what we were making parts for," then he laughed and said jokingly, "they never let us play with them though!"

He worked for Fisher from 1942 until the Germans surrendered in 1945. "After I was laid off, I came back and went to farming again," he said. "I guess Tomdaddy knew what he was doing cause I have farmed most of my life I guess, got a garden coming in a week or so," he chuckled. (Pretty good for anyone 22, much less 102!)

He spoke of working briefly for Reynold's Aluminum in Florence, Alabama for a time. He spent time taking care of family through the years. We talked more about church and how things had

changed. Charlie Smith's mind was sharp that day. He even talked about the problems of the presidency. "Things didn't happen like that in my day, or they kept hushed if it did! I know he would not be in office back in my day!"

We finished talking and I took the recorder off. I began to unpack and put up my equipment. Charlie Smith stood and shook my hand. I thanked him for talking with me. He said, "Don't elaborate, just like it is! Don't blow me up any!" He looked at me and asked, "How old are you?" "Thirty-three," I answered. "Are you married?" "No," I answered. He put his hand on my arm and said, "I never did either but fellows like you need to find somebody, take my advice as you'll see!" Then he grinned and

left the room.

I watched him open his presents. A rain gauge, a thermometer, some bananas and some puting mix to which he asked, "Where are the nilla wafers?" Charlie was ready for banana puting! The amazing thing was that he was gonna make it himself. I watched him go through the sack and noticed a plaque behind him on the wall that read, "Charlie Smith, Last WWI Veteran of Tishomingo County with Gre Thanks!" Teresa showed me a flow over the U.S. Capitol in honor on his 100th birthday and a faded photo of Charlie in uniform at Lorado on a mule dated 1917. All this and he was still trying to fix the sticking lock on the door as Frank and I left.

That night, I dreamed of Lorado, the train into Luka, the steel wheels over cobblestones and gardens full of vegetables. It was a few days later that I learned that Charlie had a fall. He had broken his hip and on October 1st, went to surgery. Irene called me the next morning and told me he had made it. I was gone out that evening and when I got home, I found a note from Frank in the door. It read, "Chris, Charlie passed away this afternoon, I thought you would like to know."

As I listened to the tape, a bad and flawed as it was, I was sad but grateful I had had this opportunity. I think Frank put the best in a few lines ending his note as he wrote with heartfelt emotion "Charlie just got most of the vegetables in from his garden. His harvest is over, his work is done. Now, he can rest in the arms of Jesus." As the flag is folded, and Charlie is laid to rest beside friends and loved ones in the soil near where he grew countless crops, we will remember the seeds of wisdom he planted and gather the memories of him as our best vest. His work is over and with great thanks we give Charlie Smith, OUR HERO, not only to the ages but to the loving arms of THE MASTER, who has called HIS humble servant home.

### Cochran Announces House-Senate Agreement On Funding....

Agreement has been reached on the Agriculture Appropriations Conference Report containing \$55.7 billion in funding for programs and activities of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and related agencies for fiscal year 1999, Senator Thad Cochran (R-MS) announced today.

"This bill provides funds for U.S. agriculture, rural development, conservation, and nutrition programs," said Cochran, who authored the legislation. "Of special benefit to our State are the funds for rural development programs, including \$700 million for loans and grants for water and sewer facilities, and \$4.3 billion for rural housing program loans."

"In addition, the bill includes \$4.2 billion in emergency appropriations to assist farmers and ranchers who have suffered losses due to recent weather problems, crop diseases and the economic crisis," Cochran said.

The bill also contains \$1.3 billion in funding for agriculture

research, some of which will be conducted by federal laboratories and universities in Mississippi. "These research funds will ensure that American agriculture continues to produce a safe and affordable supply of food and fiber," Cochran said.

Other funds included in this bill will be used to carry out the activities of the Food and Drug Administration and the Commodity Futures Trading Commission.

After approval of the Conference Report by the Senate, the final bill will be sent to the President for his signature.

One of the trips Mr. Johnson spoke of was their search in a cotton patch in TN. The first thing they found was a coat in many pieces with 22 buttons. They dug a little deeper and found bones and 8 underwear buttons. Mr. Johnson and his friend buried the remains in a place where the forgotten soldier wouldn't be disturbed again.

Mr. Johnson showed the difference between Union and Confederate spurs, and he explained how a Confederate cannon ball has a wooden peg to contain the powder. The Union used brass or other materials. Even after all these years, the powder enclosed can still explode and is dangerous if tampered with.

Mr. Johnson's family tree can be traced to the War Between the States. His grandfather told Mr. Johnson that his grandfather was in the MS militia. His great-grandfather's brother left Ms and joined the AL cavalry. Most of Mr. Johnson's ancestors were Confederates except for one who fought for the Union. The Union soldier is buried near his home where he attends church.

The UDC was honored to have Mr. Leon Johnson and his daughter, Mrs. Lula Mae (Shorty) Bonds as guest speakers. Mr.

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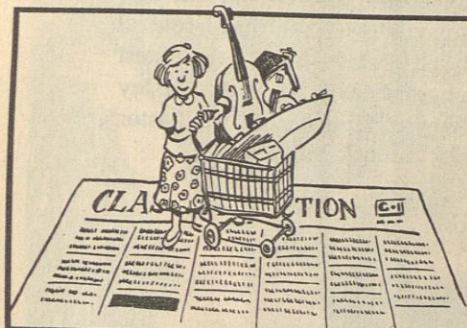

### FSA Farm News

By Phillip A. Horn

"The Farm Service Agency (FSA) has loan funds to help socially disadvantaged beginning farmers, including minorities, buy land for farming or to operate farms in Tishomingo County, Mississippi," David Warrington, state Executive Director said.

Under the program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged are Women, Hispanics, Native Americans, African American, Asians and Pacific Islands.

"FSA tries to find beginning farmers who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FSA farm ownership loan. The

agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market." Harold Mills, Agriculture Credit Manager, said.

FSA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the beginning farmer get started.

"People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the FSA county office in their area," David Warrington, State Executive Director said.

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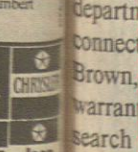
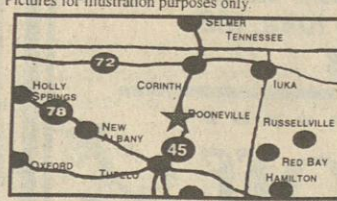
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
