Petition Being Circulated Concerning Treatment of County Inmates In Jail

A group of Tishomingo County residents have started a petition they hope to present to local officials next week concerning the treatment of county inmates at the jail.

While many of the complaints stem from a lockdown issued after the escape of a prisoner from the jail last week, petition organizer Robert Hudson said one complaint in particular has been jail policy for a long time.

"One of the main things we are concerned about is that the prisoners are not given but two meals a day," Hudson stated. "I have checked with Alcorn County, Prentiss County and Lee County and they all provide their prisoners with three meals a day. Tishomingo County is the only county anywhere around which does not."

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith stated that the number of meals inmates receive each day is determined by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. But he wanted to point out that prisoners are not supposed to be living under resort conditions while incarcerated.

"This is not a Holiday Inn," Smith said. "It is a jail facility. We give the prisoners what we can to make their lives not miserable, but it is not suppose to be a pleasant place."

Other allegations concerning the treatment of prisoners include the search and seizure of personal property. confinement to holding cells and the revoking of certain privileges including tobacco and TV. It was also alleged that inmates were not allowed to bathe and at least one prisoner was not allowed clothing and remained only in his underwear for three days.

Smith said three of the prisoners involved in the lockdown have been charged with aiding and abetting the prisoner who escaped from the facility last week. They are Brian Mock, 26, Danny Earnest, 24, and Donald Bullock, 24. He said that after the escape, officers searched the cells in order to eliminate any contraband which inmates might be hiding. During this search, many items were seized and thrown away; however, he stressed that this did not include money

Smith said this was necessary because the area where the inmate escaped was in the day area. Until repairs were made to this area, it was not possible to allow inmates in there, he said. Also, inmates have now been allowed to come out into and remain in the day area from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m.

Smith did state that TV and tobacco privileges continue to be suspended at this time.

Smith said that it is untrue that inmates are not allowed to bathe and that an inmate was not given clothing.

"We issue orange jumpsuits to all prisoners," Smith said.

Hudson said that the petitions, which are being circulated throughout the county, had over 160 signatures on them, as of last Tuesday. He expects to present them to the Board of Supervisors and the Sheriff sometime next week.

"We just want to express our opinions to the officials and we hope that others will call them, even if they don't sign a petition, and let them know how they feel," Hudson said. "We hope that by pointing out these things, something will be done about them."

Williams, who is approximately 10 weeks pregnant, was transported to Magnolia Hospital in Corinth and then on to the trauma unit at The Med in Memphis following the accident. A family member confirmed that she sustained extensive damage to the hip and pelvic area, including a dislocated hip and four fractures. At press time, Williams was awaiting surgery. Doctors informed family members that the fetus was not harmed during the accident.

Two suspects have been \$14,70 rrested by the Tishomingo \$13,91 County Sheriff's Department in connection with burglaries of at \$10,50 east three county residences.

concerning a public hearing held last week to discuss sewer expansion. Any questions or comments about this meeting should be addressed to the City or the U.S.D.A. Rural Development office in Booneville. This hearing was held as the result

of complaints concerning the city's recent increase in the sewer rates for residents of Iuka.

City of Iuka Public Hearing Held Regarding Sewer Expansion

A public hearing was held at the Iuka City Hall on Tuesday, October 6 for the purpose of providing information and soliciting comments from the public concerning the proposed sewer expansion project for the City of Iuka. This project was temporarily suspended by Mayor David Nichols pending a detailed review by the city. This public hearing was a part of that review. Some of the questions asked and the answers provided at the meeting are as follows:

1. What are the major areas to be served by the new sewer project?

Areas to be served will be Constitution Drive, Eastport Road, North Pearl Street, Snowdown Road, and Pleasant Hill Road. Other areas within town will benefit as the result of the construction of larger lines which will replace older, smaller lines. This project will complete the city's long-term plan of providing sewer service to all major areas.

2. What is the cost of the proposed project and how will it be paid for?

City engineers have estimated the cost of this project to be \$2,300,000. Actual cost of the project will be known after bids have been received. The city has obtained grants of \$1,300,000 and a loan of \$1,000.000.

3. Why is this project needed?

The city has a legal and moral obligation to provide its citizens with central sanitary sewer. Citizens have the right to request this service and the city must provide it within a reasonable time-frame. Federal and state health regulations are increasingly forcing city residents to abandon septic tanks and connect to central sewer. As the population grows and becomes clustered much closer together, septic tanks are not an acceptable means of sewer disposal.

4. Is the city required to construct this project at this time?

5. Why not wait until the city is forced to provide this service?

The city has been awarded 1.3 million dollars in grants for this project at no cost to the residents of our town. If the city were to be placed under an administrative order at a later date, this free money would not be available. Also, the rate of interest of 4.5% on the loan which the city has been provided would most certainly be higher.

6. Who determined the rate structure needed to pay for this project?

The new rates were determined by USDA Rural Development which will provide funding for the project. Any new rates must be approved by Rural Development.

7. Is the city required to adopt these new rates?

No. The city is required to adopt rates that will generate sufficient revenues to service the loan as a condition of funding.

8. How do city officials feel about the new rates?

City officials hate them; however, it appears that this is the fairest way to spread the cost of these improvements.

9. Can the city adopt a flat rate instead of a graduated rate which is tied to water consumption?

Yes. The city can adopt a flat rate as long as it generates the necessary revenue which will amortize the loan.

10. What would be the new flat rate if adopted?

The new flat rate would be about \$14.00 per month.

11. Isn't a flat rate in which everyone pays the same a fairer system that a graduated rate which is based on consumption?

The new rates were designed to protect residents who have the least ability to pay: the elderly and persons on fixed incomes. These residents will see their sewer bill rise only 75 cents per month. Normal sewer bills for the elderly will not exceed \$7.50.

12. How will the new rates affect the average customer?

80% of customers will pay a sewer bill of less than \$10.50 per month with the elderly paying only

\$20.00 regardless of usage.

13. Has the city attempted to negotiate a cap on rates with USDA Rural Development?

Yes. The city has requested that the maximum sewer bill not exceed \$20.00 regardless of usage. Although Rural Development has agreed to somewhat lower rates, a cap on rates has not been approved.

14. Could the city construct this project using city crews and equipment at a cost which would result in a smaller rate increase?

No. The city utilities department primarily a maintenance department and lacks sufficient manpower and equipment for large construction projects. If the city hired additional personnel and purchased needed equipment, the cost would be too great to realize any benefit.

15. Will any of the revenues generated by this rate increase be used for any purpose other than to pay for this construction project?

No. The revenues generated from this rate increase will be used only to construct this project and for no other purpose.

16. If the city decides to cancel this project, what will happen to sewer rates?

Sewer rates will be lowered to the old rates.

17. Will any of the rate increase be used by the city to purchase the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association?

No. The purchase of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association will not increase water or sewer rates

18. Could the city raise property taxes to help pay for the cost of this project?

No. It is not legal to raise property taxes for this purpose. Also, the city could not raise enough revenue from a property tax increase due to other restrictions.

19. What is the over-all financial and operating condition of the city's water and sewer department?

The financial condition of the water and sewer department is excellent with adequate cash reserves. The physical condition of the water system is very good due to capital improvements of the last few years. The physical condition of the sewer system is good for most areas but less-than-adequate in a few areas.

20. When will the city make a final decision regarding this project? A final decision is expected by

November 1.

<u>Take Steps To Ensure</u> <u>Children's Safety</u>

Children are natural explorers. They use their five senses and natural curiosity to explore and learn. They depend on us to prepare their environment to be as safe as possible.

• Keep small objects such as coins, buttons, straight pins and marbles out of reach.

• Avoid foods such as popcorn, peanuts, small hard candies, lollipops and whole hot dogs.

• Stay with small children when they are in the bath or in the wading pool. Children can drown in a small amount of water. They also can turn on the hot water and cause burns.

• Keep plastic bags out of reach; balloons are unsafe also.

• Make sure the toys chosen are age appropriate. Make sure toys for infants and toddlers do not have small parts that can be swallowed. Toys should not have sharp edges. Keep toys clean. Toys for infants should be twice the size of the mouth.

Make sure tables and furniture have rounded or blunt edges.
Household cleaners and laundry to recognize Officer Ugg as a warning for poison.

• Young children like to explore, and one thing they seem to like to play with are drapery and mini blind cords. Reduce the risk of choking by cutting the cord in half.

Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service and the Mississippi Regional Poison Control Center recommended several safer houseplants to use where children and pets are present. Among those are airplane plants, violets and Boston ferns.
Remember young children learn by exploring, and they depend on us to make their environment safe and secure.



Progressives give near, intermediate and distance vision and everything in between. For most people, near vision is at 16 inches, intermediate vision is about 22 inches and distance vision is 2 feet and beyond.

The most common multifocal is the flat top bifocal. It is an excellent all purpose lens. The "executive" is a name given to another commonly used bifocal. It is ideal for doing prolonged near work such as reading or accounting, but is not a good choice for everyday wear. Going up and down steps and negotiating curbs may be difficult while wearing an executive. Whenever there is a shift from one focal length to another, there is also the potential for momentary disorientation.

program identifies properties worthy of preservation for their historic, architectural, or cultural significance. Its primary purpose is to help communities protect significant properties from the effects of federal government activities.


Additionally, owners of some properties that are listed on







Local Students To Attend Annual MSU Fair Celebrating 'Magic' of Wood Products

More than 7,000 third- and fourth-graders from around the state—including two groups from Tishomingo County—are expected this month for Mississippi State's awardwinning Wood Magic Science Fair.

Sponsored Oct. 23-30 by the University's Forest Products Laboratory and Forest and Wildlife Research Center, the hands-on educational program introduces students to a range of activities relating to trees and the environment.

Now in its third year— and twice selected to receive the Mississippi Public Education Forum's Award for Excellence— Wood Magic features dozens of exhibits. Approximately 30 corporations and associations are co-sponsors.

For students, there are opportunities to guess the strength of wood and listen to music produced by wooden instruments. They also may observe a working sawmill, furniture-testing equipment and paper and plywood production techniques.

Teachers receive teaching guides and experiment samples to help illustrate principles about forests and forest-related industries.

In the Daily Corinthian of April 17, 1996, Vicki Roach in her Family Branches article mentions a ledger found in the Alcorn County Courthouse with entries in the names of Richard Burress and Wright Bonds. July 31, 1830 is the first entry, and there are several references to Leighton and LaGrange, Alabama. There was a question about who did the ledger belong to - Richard Burress or Wright Bonds. Prior to moving to Tishomingo Co., Wright Bonds lived in Lawrence and Franklin Cos., Alabama. On May 7, 1838 he was listed as a Justic of the Peace for Franklin Co., Ala., LaGrange Beat. Natchez Trace Traveler, Vol. 11, No. 2, May 1991, p. 59. Also, from the entries in the above outstanding notes on his estate, we can see that he had a store in Alabama. I think it is safe to assume that the ledger found in Alcorn County belonged to Wright Bonds. Both Wright, Sr. and Wright, Jr. were prominent in the county administration of Old Tishomingo County so it was very possible that one of the ledgers would be in the Alcorn Courthouse.

In accordance with Miss. Code Ann. Section 7-3-39, the Secretary of State's Office publishes the full text of all proposed amendments to the Mississippi Constitution. The following two measures will appear on the November 3 general election ballot. The reader should note that changes to the text of existing constitutional language proposed in Amendment No. 1 are underlined. Amendment No. 2, if passed, would add a new section to the Mississippi Constitution. *Amendment No. 1, House Concurrent Resolution No. 61

A concurrent resoltuion proposing an amendment to section 273, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to provide that only a person who is a resident of this state may circulate an initiative petition or obtain signatures on an initiative petition; and for related purposes.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Mississippi, that the following amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 is proposed to the qualified electors of the state: Amend Section 273., Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows

"Section 273. (1) Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by the Legislature or by initiative of the people.

(2) Whenever two-thirds (2/3) of each house of the Legislature, which two-thirds (2/3) shall consist of not less than a majority of the members elected to each house, shall deem any change, alteration or amendment necessary to this Constituion, such proposed amendment, change or alteration shall be read and passed by two-thirds (2/3) vote of each house, as herein provided; public notice shall then be given by the Secretary of State at least thirty (30) days preceding an election, at which the qualified electors shall vote directly for or against such change, alteration or amendment, and amendment shall be submitted at one (1) time, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately; and, not withstanding the division of the Constitution into sections, the Legislature may provide in its resolution for one or more amendments pertaining and relating to the same subject or subject matter, and may provide for one or more amendments to an article of the Constitution pertaining and relating to the same subject or subject matter, which may be included in and voted on as one (1) amendment; and if it shall appear that a majority of the qualified electors voting directly for or against the same shall have voted for the proposed change, alteration or amendment, then it shall be inserted as a part of the Constitution by proclamation of the Secretary of State certifying that it received the majority vote required by the Constitution; and the resolution may fix the date and direct the calling of elections for the purposes hereof. (3) The people reserve unto themselves the power to propose and enact constitutional amendments by initiative. An initiative to amend the Constitution may be proposed by a petition signed over a twelve-month period by qualified electors equal in number to at least twelve percent (12%) of the votes for all candidates for Governor in the last gubernatorial election. The signatures of the qualified electors from any congressional district shall not exceed one-fifth (1/5) of the total number of signatures required to qualify an initiative petition for placement upon the ballot. If an initiative petition contains signatures from a single congressional district which exceed one-fifth (1/5) of the total number of required signatures, the excess number of signatures from that congressional district shall not be considered by the Secretary of State in determining whether the petition qualifies for placement on the ballot. (4) The sponsor of an initiative shall identify in the text of the initiative the amount and source of revenue required to implement the initiative. If the initiative requires a reduction in any source of government revenue, or a reallocation of funding from currently funded programs, the sponsor shall identify in the text of the initiative the program or programs whose funding must be reduced or eliminated to implement the initiative. Compliance with this requirement shall not be a violation of the subject matter requirements of this section of the Constitution.

The sufficiency of petitions shall be decided in the first instance by the Secretary of State, subject to review by the Supreme Court of the state, which shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over all such cases.

(10) An initiative approved by the electors shall take effect thirty (30) days from the date of the official declaration of the vote by the Secretary of State, unless the measure provides otherwise.

(11) If any amendment to the Constitution proposed by initiative petition is rejected by a majority of the qualified electors voting thereon, no initiative petition proposing the same, or substantially the same, amendment shall be submitted to the electors for at least two (2) years after the date of the election on such amendement.

(12) The Legislature shall provide by law the manner in which initiative petitions shall be circulated, presented and certified. To prevent signature fraud and to maintain the integrity of the initiative process the state has a compelling interest in insuring that no person shall circulate an initiative petition or obtain signatures on an nitiative petition unless the person is a resident of this state at the time of circulation. For the purposes of this subsection the term "resident" means a person who is domiciled in Mississippi as evidenced by an intent to maintain a principal dwelling place in Mississippi indefinitely and to return to Mississippi if temporarily absent, coupled with an act or acts consistent with that intent. Every person who circulates an initiative petition shall print and sign his name on each page of an initiative petition, or on a separate page attached to each page, certifying that he was a resident of this state at the time of circulating the petition. The Secretary of State shall refuse to accept for filing any page of an initiataive petition upon which the signatures appearing thereon were obtained by a person who was not a resident of this state at the time of circulating the petition, and an initiative measure shall not be placed on the ballot if the Secretary of State determines that without such signatures the petition clearly bears an insufficient number of signatures. The provisions of this subsection (12) shall be applicable to all initiative measures that have not been placed on the ballot at the time this proposed amendment is ratified by the electorate.

(13) The Legislature may enact laws to carry out the provisions of this section but shall in no way restrict or impair the provisions of this section or the powers herein reserved to the people." Be it further resolved, That this proposed amendment shall be submitted by the Secretary of State to the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November 1998, as provided by Section 273 of the Constitution and by general law. Be it further resolved, That the explanation of this proposed amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment provides that only a person who is a resident of this state may circulate an initiative petition or obtain signatures on a initiative petition for the purpose of proposing an amendment to the Mississippi Constitution.

Be it further resolved, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi shall submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

Amendment No. 2, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 513

A concurrent resolution proposing to amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 by adding a new section establishing victims' rights; and for related purposes.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Mississippi, that the following amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 is proposed to the qualified electors of the state

Amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 by adding a new section to read as follows

Section 26A. (1) Victims of crime, as defined by law, shall have the right to be treated with fairness, dignity and respect throughout the criminal justic process; and to be informed, to be present and to be heard, when authorized by law, during public hearings

(2) Nothing in this section shall provide grounds for the accused or convicted offender to obtain any form of relief nor shall this section impair the constitutional rights of the accused. Nothing in this section or any enabling statute shall be construed as creating a cause of action for damages against the state or any of its agencies, officials, employees or political subdivisions.

(3) The Legislature shall have the authority to enact substantive and procedural laws to define, implement, preserve and protect the rights guaranteed to victims by this section

Be it further resolved, That this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November 1998, as provided by Section 273 of the Constitution and by law.

Be it further resolved, That the explanation of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This amendment gives victims of crimes the right to be informed, to be present and to be heard during the criminal process of the person accused of the crime, when authorized by law."

(7) If the Legislature amends an initiative, the amended version and the original initiative shall be submitted to the electors. An initiative or legislative alternative must receive a majority of the votes thereon and not less than forty percent (40%) of the total votes cast at the election at which the measure was submitted to be approved. If conflicting initiatives or legislative alternatives are approved at the same election, the initiative or legislative alternative receiving the highest number of affirmative votes shall prevail

(8) If an initiative measure proposed to the Legislature has been rejected by the Legislature and an alternative measure is passed by the Legislature in lieu thereof, the ballot titles of both such measures shall be so printed on the official ballots that a voter can express separately two (2) preferences: First, by voting for the approval of either measure or against both measures, and, secondly, by voting for one measure or the other measure. If the majority of those voting on the first issue is against both measures, then both measures fail, but in that case the votes on the second issue nevertheless shall be carefully counted and made public. 


