Petition Being Circulated Concerning Treatment of County Inmates In Jail

A group of Tishomingo County residents have started a petition they hope to present to local officials next week concerning the treatment of county inmates at the jail.

While many of the complaints stem from a lock-down issued after the escape of a prisoner from the jail last week, petition organizer Robert Hudson said one complaint in particular has been jail policy for a long time.

"One of the main things we are concerned about is that the prisoners are not given but two meals a day," Hudson stated. "I have checked with Alcorn County, Prentiss County and Lee County and they all provide their prisoners with three meals a day. Tishomingo County is the only county anywhere around which does not."

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith stated that the number of meals inmates receive each day is determined by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. But he wanted to point out that prisoners are not supposed to be living under resort conditions while incarcerated.

"This is not a Holiday Inn," Smith said. "It is a jail facility. We give the prisoners what we can to make their lives not miserable, but it is not suppose to be a pleasant place."

Other allegations concerning the treatment of prisoners include the search and seizure of personal property, confinement to holding cells and the revoking of certain privileges including tobacco and TV. It was also alleged that inmates were not allowed to bathe and at least one prisoner was not allowed clothing and remained only in his underwear for three days.

Smith said three of the prisoners involved in the lock-down have been charged with aiding and abetting the prisoner who escaped from the facility last week. They are Brian Mock, 26, Danny Earnest, 24, and Donald Bullock, 24. He said that after the escape, officers searched the cells in order to eliminate any contraband which inmates might be hiding. During this search, many items were seized and thrown away; however, he stressed that this did not include money.

Concerning the lock-down,

Smith said this was necessary because the area where the inmate escaped was in the day area. Until repairs were made to this area, it was not possible to allow inmates in there, he said. Also, inmates have now been allowed to come out into and remain in the day area from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m.

Smith did state that TV and tobacco privileges continue to be suspended at this time.

Smith said that it is untrue that inmates are not allowed to bathe and that an inmate was not given clothing.

"We issue orange jumpsuits to all prisoners," Smith said.

Hudson said that the petitions, which are being circulated throughout the county, had over 160 signatures on them, as of last Tuesday. He expects to present them to the Board of Supervisors and the Sheriff sometime next week.

"We just want to express our opinions to the officials and we hope that others will call them, even if they don't sign a petition, and let them know how they feel," Hudson said. "We hope that by pointing out these things, something will be done about them."

City of Iuka Officials Attempt To Answer Questions About Increased Sewer Rates For Residents

The following is a set of questions and answers submitted to the News by the City of Iuka concerning a public hearing held last week to discuss sewer expansion. Any questions or comments about this meeting should be addressed to the City or the U.S.D.A. Rural Development office in Booneville.

This hearing was held as the result of complaints concerning the city's recent increase in the sewer rates for residents of Iuka.

City of Iuka Public Hearing Held Regarding Sewer Expansion

A public hearing was held at the Iuka City Hall on Tuesday, October 6 for the purpose of providing information and soliciting comments from the public concerning the proposed sewer expansion project for the City of Iuka. This project was temporarily suspended by Mayor David Nichols pending a detailed review by the city. This public hearing was a part of that review. Some of the questions asked and the answers provided at the meeting are as follows:

1. What are the major areas to be served by the new sewer project?

Areas to be served will be Constitution Drive, Eastport Road, North Pearl Street, Snowdown Road, and Pleasant Hill Road. Other areas within town will benefit as the result of the construction of larger lines which will replace older, smaller lines. This project will complete the city's long-term plan of providing sewer service to all major areas.

2. What is the cost of the proposed project and how will it be paid for?

City engineers have estimated the cost of this project to be \$2,300,000. Actual cost of the project will be known after bids have been received. The city has obtained grants of \$1,300,000 and a loan of \$1,000,000.

3. Why is this project needed?

The city has a legal and moral obligation to provide its citizens with central sanitary sewer. Citizens have the right to request this service and the city must provide it within a reasonable time-frame. Federal and state health regulations are increasingly forcing city residents to abandon septic tanks and connect to central sewer. As the population grows and becomes clustered much closer together, septic tanks are not an acceptable means of sewer disposal.

4. Is the city required to construct this project at this time?

No. The city is under no mandated requirement to begin this project immediately. However, many of the residents who are affected by this project have been in the corporate limits for many years and are growing somewhat impatient with the pace of obtaining service. These residents have the legal right to ask the court to require the city to provide them with sewer service.

5. Why not wait until the city is forced to provide this service?

The city has been awarded 1.3 million dollars in grants for this project at no cost to the residents of our town. If the city were to be placed under an administrative order at a later date, this free money would not be available. Also, the rate of interest of 4.5% on the loan which the city has been provided would most certainly be higher.

6. Who determined the rate structure needed to pay for this project?

The new rates were determined by USDA Rural Development which will provide funding for the project. Any new rates must be approved by Rural Development.

7. Is the city required to adopt these new rates?

No. The city is required to adopt rates that will generate sufficient revenues to service the loan as a condition of funding.

8. How do city officials feel about the new rates?

City officials hate them; however, it appears that this is the fairest way to spread the cost of these improvements.

9. Can the city adopt a flat rate instead of a graduated rate which is tied to water consumption?

Yes. The city can adopt a flat rate as long as it generates the necessary revenue which will amortize the loan.

10. What would be the new flat rate if adopted?

The new flat rate would be about \$14.00 per month.

11. Isn't a flat rate in which everyone pays the same a fairer system than a graduated rate which is based on consumption?

The new rates were designed to protect residents who have the least ability to pay: the elderly and persons on fixed incomes. These residents will see their sewer bill rise only 75 cents per month. Normal sewer bills for the elderly will not exceed \$7.50.

12. How will the new rates affect the average customer?

80% of customers will pay a sewer bill of less than \$10.50 per month with the elderly paying only

\$7.50. The city is requesting that USDA place a cap on bills which will mean no customer pays more than \$20.00 regardless of usage.

13. Has the city attempted to negotiate a cap on rates with USDA Rural Development?

Yes. The city has requested that the maximum sewer bill not exceed \$20.00 regardless of usage. Although Rural Development has agreed to somewhat lower rates, a cap on rates has not been approved.

14. Could the city construct this project using city crews and equipment at a cost which would result in a smaller rate increase?

No. The city utilities department is primarily a maintenance department and lacks sufficient manpower and equipment for large construction projects. If the city hired additional personnel and purchased needed equipment, the cost would be too great to realize any benefit.

15. Will any of the revenues generated by this rate increase be used for any purpose other than to pay for this construction project?

No. The revenues generated from this rate increase will be used only to construct this project and for no other purpose.

16. If the city decides to cancel this project, what will happen to sewer rates?

Sewer rates will be lowered to the old rates.

17. Will any of the rate increase be used by the city to purchase the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association?

No. The purchase of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association will not increase water or sewer rates.

18. Could the city raise property taxes to help pay for the cost of this project?

No. It is not legal to raise property taxes for this purpose. Also, the city could not raise enough revenue from a property tax increase due to other restrictions.

19. What is the over-all financial and operating condition of the city's water and sewer department?

The financial condition of the water and sewer department is excellent with adequate cash reserves. The physical condition of the water system is very good due to capital improvements of the last few years. The physical condition of the sewer system is good for most areas but less-than-adequate in a few areas.

20. When will the city make a final decision regarding this project?

A final decision is expected by November 1.

Iuka Woman Awaits Surgery After Automobile Accident In Corinth

An Iuka woman remained in serious condition in the trauma unit of The Med in Memphis at press time as the result of an automobile accident she was involved in Friday, Oct. 9.

According to Corinth Police Chief Fred Johnson, at about 2:14 p.m. Friday, Sherry Williams, 24, of Iuka, was travelling on Hwy. 72 in Corinth in her 1994 Jeep when she was struck on the far side of the the vehicle by a 1992 Honda Accord pulling out of Patrick's Home Center. The Accord was driven by Heather McCarter, 22, of Corinth.

Johnson said after looking at the evidence and hearing reports from witnesses they determined that Williams' vehicle apparently slipped about five times after

being struck by McCarter.

"We believe Williams was ejected from the vehicle on the fourth flip," Chief Johnson stated.

There were no other vehicles involved and Johnson said McCarter did not sustain any injuries, to his knowledge.

Williams, who is approximately 10 weeks pregnant, was transported to Magnolia Hospital in Corinth and then on to the trauma unit at The Med in Memphis following the accident. A family member confirmed that she sustained extensive damage to the hip and pelvic area, including a dislocated hip and four fractures. At press time, Williams was awaiting surgery. Doctors informed family members that the fetus was not harmed during the accident.

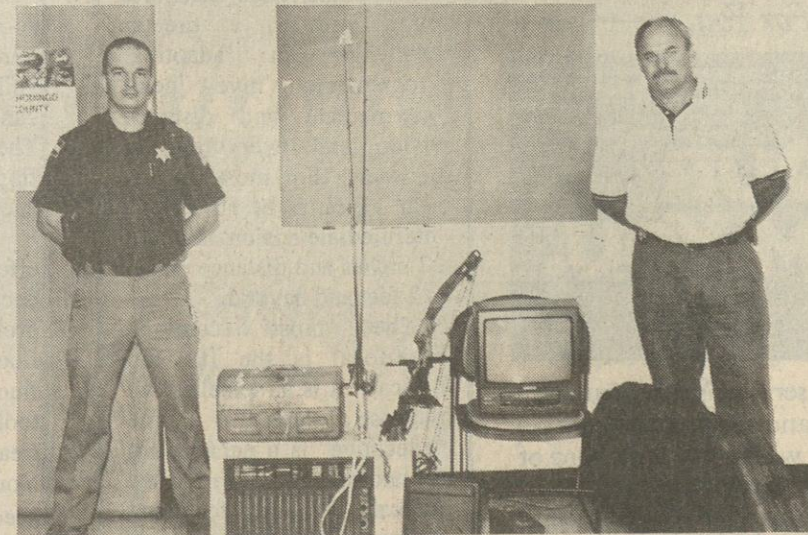
Tishomingo County Authorities Arrest Two In Area Burglaries

Two suspects have been arrested by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department in connection with burglaries of at least three county residences.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, Daniel J. Brown, 25, of 153 CR 304, Iuka, was arrested and charged Oct. 6 with grand larceny. Another suspect, Dennis Shadburn, 34, of CR 306, Burnsville, was arrested and charged Oct. 11 with accessory to burglary.

The Sheriff said his department received information connecting some stolen items with Brown, so they drew up a search warrant for Brown's home. The search produced several stolen items which had been taken from at least three separate residences—two in Iuka and one in the North Crossroads Area. Smith said that some items were found in a wooded area behind the



residence, and some were found within the residence. Brown was arrested at that time.

Other information led the authorities to Shadburn's residence where they found another stolen item. The suspect was not at home at that time, but was later arrested.

Among the items recovered

were air conditioners, televisions, fishing rods and tools.

The burglaries took place at different times—between a month and a half ago and very recently, Smith said.

Smith said the arrests were made by Chief Deputy Rodney Pannell and Investigator Steve Vatalaro.



Recipe of the Week

Chili Bean and Cornbread Bake

1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
2 (16 oz.) cans hot chili beans, drained
1 (14.5 oz.) can diced tomatoes
1 egg
2/3 cup milk

At one time, several mutual funds offered an up-front, commission-heavy contractual plan, structured for people who didn't have large sums but could make regular, small investments. Most of the total commission was paid the first year, and the remaining 10 or 15 years of the contract were virtually commission-free.

Very few people, if any, didn't complete their plan. They paid the price of a ticket and stayed for the whole show. The best part is, these small investors did exceptionally well.

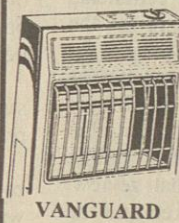

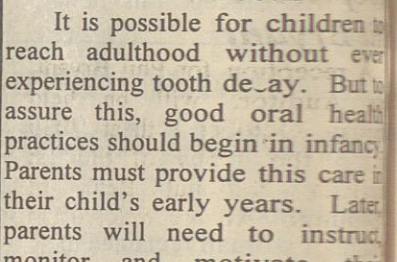


Bifocals and Multifocals

Multifocal lenses are designed in a variety of ways to better satisfy different needs. Bifocals allow near and distance vision but no intermediate vision. Trifocals allow near, intermediate and distance vision. Trifocals are fine for computer use and other intermediate range tasks, but often present a greater challenge in adapting. Progressives give near, intermediate and distance vision and everything in between. For most people, near vision is at 16 inches, intermediate vision is about 22 inches and distance vision is 2 feet and beyond.

The most common multifocal is the flat top bifocal. It is an excellent all purpose lens. The "executive" is a name given to another commonly used bifocal. It is ideal for doing prolonged near work such as reading or accounting, but is not a good choice for everyday wear. Going up and down steps and negotiating curbs may be difficult while wearing an executive. Whenever there is a shift from one focal length to another, there is also the potential for momentary disorientation.

Protecting Your Young Child's Teeth

It is possible for children to reach adulthood without ever experiencing tooth decay. But to assure this, good oral health practices should begin in infancy.

Parents must provide this care in their child's early years. Later, parents will need to instruct, monitor and motivate their children to maintain good oral health habits. Children learn healthy practices from their parents, so parents must be good role models. Attitudes and habits established at an early age are very important for good oral health throughout one's life.

A child's dental care actually begins before birth. A pregnant woman's diet provides the nutrients required for good development of the unborn child's teeth. After the baby is born, good oral hygiene for the newborn can be achieved by gently wiping their mouths and gums after every feeding, putting only water in their sleep time bottles, and massaging their gums to comfort the child when teething.

When a child is frequently given a bottle that contains liquids with sugar as a pacifier or at sleep times, baby bottle tooth decay can result. This serious condition can destroy the infant's teeth. Baby bottle tooth decay can be avoided by putting water in the bottle, or by using a recommended pacifier.

Brushing should begin as soon as the first tooth erupts. Parents should brush and floss a child's teeth daily until the child can be taught to do this alone. Then a child's brushing and flossing should be supervised and encouraged by parents.

Fluoride is one of the most effective ways of preventing tooth decay in children. Fluoride protection can be obtained from a fluoridated drinking water supply, fluoride tablets or drops, fluoride toothpastes and topical fluoride treatments given at our office.

Your child's particular fluoride needs should be discussed with us. A child's first dental visit should occur by the first birthday. Then visits should occur ideally every six months, or as recommended by the dentist.

Additionally, owners of some properties that are listed on

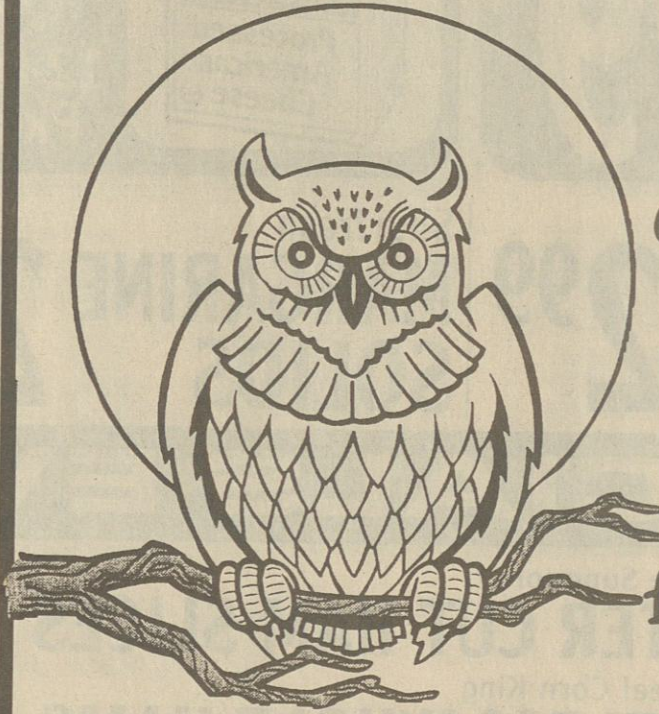
the National Register of Historic Places may become eligible for tax benefits or grant assistance.

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Letter To
The Editor

Dear Editor,
Recently the Redstone Federal Union board of directors voted to close, without giving advance notice, the credit union in Iuka after serving the community for 7 years. Apparently, it was not profitable enough and/or not enough people to keep it open.
Many members have signed a petition asking to keep the Iuka branch open but these requests have fallen on deaf ears and there has been little sympathy for how this may affect both members and employees.

As we approach the time that the Iuka credit union is scheduled to close, some questions come to mind. Were the employees given enough notice so that they could initiate cost saving procedures? Were there most cost saving procedures that they could have initiated, given time and resources? Are there more industries moving in to Iuka that could strengthen the branch? Are there cheaper buildings to rent that could further cut costs? Did the management authorize the local manager to advertise enough to bring in more revenue? Were there enough promotional ads compared to similar areas in Alabama? Would staying open 5 days a week instead of 3 actually create more business? Is law HR1151 that was just passed going to open membership enrollment to considerably more people? The answer to all the above questions is in favor of not giving up on Iuka and letting the credit union remain open.

Had the Iuka branch been given a year closing notice, the amount of revenue that needed to be generated, and the power to implement needed changes, there could still be an Iuka branch past December 31, 1998. Redstone Federal Credit Union's size and assets place it in the top 5% of the credit unions in the United States. It is also the largest credit union in Alabama, and can well afford to let the Iuka branch remain open for one more year to see if they can turn a profit, if that is the true reason for closing the Iuka branch. Let the Iuka management do things and negotiate a new rent or move to a smaller building downtown that is more convenient and advertise. Let the Iuka management know what profit margin is needed and see if they can make it. After all the local banks have not given up on Iuka.
The current board of directors for the Redstone Federal Credit Union should reconsider their decision to close the credit union on December 31, 1998. Reasons should be given for the closing and at least a year extension to remain open should be granted.

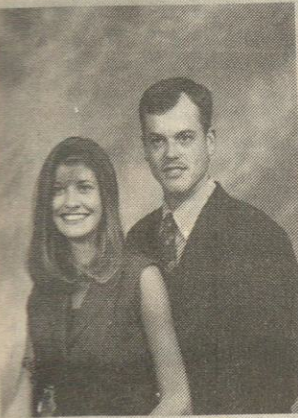

The person reporting gives the license tag number, a brief description of the vehicle, the location, and date and time. The Commissioner of Public Safety then sends a non-threatening letter to the person who owns the car from where the litter came and an auto litter bag. The *47 cellular phone call is free. If for any reason you cannot get through to the dispatcher or do not have a cellular phone then please call Keep Mississippi Beautiful/People Against Litter at #1-800-545-3764 and we will contact the commissioner.

In the Daily Corinthian of April
17, 1996, Vicki Roach in her Family
Branches article mentions a ledger
found in the Alcorn County
Courthouse with entries in the names
of Richard Burruss and Wright Bonds.
July 31, 1830 is the first entry, and
there are several references to
Leighton and LaGrange, Alabama.
There was a question about who did
the ledger belong to - Richard Burruss
or Wright Bonds. Prior to moving to
Tishomingo Co., Wright Bonds lived
in Lawrence and Franklin Cos.,
Alabama. On May 7, 1838 he was
listed as a Justice of the Peace for
Franklin Co., Ala., LaGrange Beat.
Natchez Trace Traveler, Vol. 11, No.
2, May 1991, p. 59. Also, from the
entries in the above outstanding notes
on his estate, we can see that he had
a store in Alabama. I think it is safe
to assume that the ledger found in
Alcorn County belonged to Wright
Bonds. Both Wright, Sr. and Wright,
Jr. were prominent in the county
administration of Old Tishomingo
County so it was very possible that
one of the ledgers would be in the
Alcorn Courthouse.

It is my thought that Richard
Burruss, was probably Wright Bonds
son-in-law. If anyone has any
information on this, I would be happy
to hear from them.

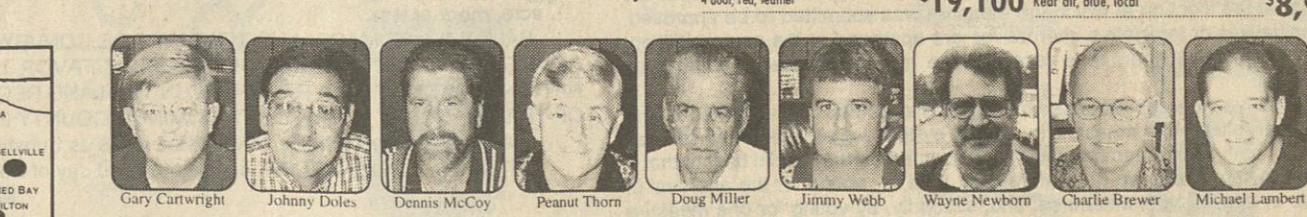
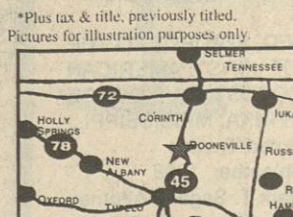

In accordance with Miss. Code Ann. Section 7-3-39, the Secretary of State's Office publishes the full text of all proposed amendments to the Mississippi Constitution. The following two measures will appear on the November 3 general election ballot. The reader should note that changes to the text of existing constitutional language proposed in Amendment No. 1 are underlined. Amendment No. 2, if passed, would add a new section to the Mississippi Constitution.

*Amendment No. 1, House Concurrent Resolution No. 61

A concurrent resolution proposing an amendment to section 273, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to provide that only a person who is a resident of this state may circulate an initiative petition or obtain signatures on an initiative petition; and for related purposes.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Mississippi, that the following amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 is proposed to the qualified electors of the state: Amend Section 273, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

"Section 273. (1) Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed by the Legislature or by initiative of the people.

(2) Whenever two-thirds (2/3) of each house of the Legislature, which two-thirds (2/3) shall consist of not less than a majority of the members elected to each house, shall deem any change, alteration or amendment necessary to this Constitution, such proposed amendment, change or alteration shall be read and passed by two-thirds (2/3) vote of each house, as herein provided; public notice shall then be given by the Secretary of State at least thirty (30) days preceding an election, at which the qualified electors shall vote directly for or against such change, alteration or amendment, and if more than one (1) amendment shall be submitted at one (1) time, they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately; and, notwithstanding the division of the Constitution into sections, the Legislature may provide in its resolution for one or more amendments pertaining and relating to the same subject or subject matter, and may provide for one or more amendments to an article of the Constitution pertaining and relating to the same subject or subject matter, which may be included in and voted on as one (1) amendment; and if it shall appear that a majority of the qualified electors voting directly for or against the same shall have voted for the proposed change, alteration or amendment, then it shall be inserted as a part of the Constitution by proclamation of the Secretary of State certifying that it received the majority vote required by the Constitution; and the resolution may fix the date and direct the calling of elections for the purposes hereof.

(3) The people reserve unto themselves the power to propose and enact constitutional amendments by initiative. An initiative to amend the Constitution may be proposed by a petition signed over a twelve-month period by qualified electors equal in number to at least twelve percent (12%) of the votes for all candidates for Governor in the last gubernatorial election. The signatures of the qualified electors from any congressional district shall not exceed one-fifth (1/5) of the total number of signatures required to qualify an initiative petition for placement upon the ballot. If an initiative petition contains signatures from a single congressional district which exceed one-fifth (1/5) of the total number of required signatures, the excess number of signatures from that congressional district shall not be considered by the Secretary of State in determining whether the petition qualifies for placement on the ballot.

(4) The sponsor of an initiative shall identify in the text of the initiative the amount and source of revenue required to implement the initiative. If the initiative requires a reduction in any source of government revenue, or a reallocation of funding from currently funded programs, the sponsor shall identify in the text of the initiative the program or programs whose funding must be reduced or eliminated to implement the initiative. Compliance with this requirement shall not be a violation of the subject matter requirements of this section of the Constitution.

(5) The initiative process shall not be used:

(a) For the proposal, modification or repeal of any portion of the Bill of Rights of this Constitution;

(b) To amend or repeal any law or any provision of the Constitution relating to the Mississippi Public Employees' Retirement System;

(c) To amend or repeal the constitutional guarantee that the right of any person to work shall not be denied or abridged on account of membership or nonmembership in any labor union or organization; or

(d) To modify the initiative process for proposing amendments to this Constitution.

(6) The Secretary of State shall file with the Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate the complete text of the certified initiative on the first day of the regular session. A constitutional initiative may be adopted by a majority vote of each house of the Legislature. If the initiative is adopted, amended or rejected by the Legislature; or if no action is taken within four (4) months of the date that the initiative is filed with the Legislature, the Secretary of State shall place the initiative on the ballot for the next statewide general election.

The chief legislative budget officer shall prepare a fiscal analysis of each initiative and each legislative alternative. A summary of each fiscal analysis shall appear on the ballot.

(7) If the Legislature amends an initiative, the amended version and the original initiative shall be submitted to the electors. An initiative or legislative alternative must receive a majority of the votes thereon and not less than forty percent (40%) of the total votes cast at the election at which the measure was submitted to be approved. If conflicting initiatives or legislative alternatives are approved at the same election, the initiative or legislative alternative receiving the highest number of affirmative votes shall prevail.

(8) If an initiative measure proposed to the Legislature has been rejected by the Legislature and an alternative measure is passed by the Legislature in lieu thereof, the ballot titles of both such measures shall be so printed on the official ballots that a voter can express separately two (2) preferences: First, by voting for the approval of either measure or against both measures, and, secondly, by voting for one measure or the other measure. If the majority of those voting on the first issue is against both measures, then both measures fail, but in that case the votes on the second issue nevertheless shall be carefully counted and made public. If a majority voting on the first issue is for the approval of either measure, then the measure receiving a majority of the votes on the second issue and also receiving not less than forty percent (40%) of the total votes cast at the election at which the measure was submitted for approval shall be law. Any person who votes for the ratification of either measure on the first issue must vote for one (1) of the measures on the second issue in order for the ballot to be valid. Any person who votes against both measures on the first issue may vote but shall not be required to vote for any of the measures on the second issue in order for the ballot to be valid. Substantially the following form shall be a compliance with this subsection:

(9) No more than five (5) initiative proposals shall be submitted to the voters on a single ballot, and the first five (5) initiative proposals submitted to the Secretary of State with sufficient petitions shall be the proposals which are submitted to the voters. The sufficiency of petitions shall be decided in the first instance by the Secretary of State, subject to review by the Supreme Court of the state, which shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over all such cases.

(10) An initiative approved by the electors shall take effect thirty (30) days from the date of the official declaration of the vote by the Secretary of State, unless the measure provides otherwise.

(11) If any amendment to the Constitution proposed by initiative petition is rejected by a majority of the qualified electors voting thereon, no initiative petition proposing the same, or substantially the same, amendment shall be submitted to the electors for at least two (2) years after the date of the election on such amendment.

(12) The Legislature shall provide by law the manner in which initiative petitions shall be circulated, presented and certified. To prevent signature fraud and to maintain the integrity of the initiative process the state has a compelling interest in insuring that no person shall circulate an initiative petition or obtain signatures on an initiative petition unless the person is a resident of this state at the time of circulation.

For the purposes of this subsection the term "resident" means a person who is domiciled in Mississippi as evidenced by an intent to maintain a principal dwelling place in Mississippi indefinitely and to return to Mississippi if temporarily absent, coupled with an act or acts consistent with that intent. Every person who circulates an initiative petition shall print and sign his name on each page of an initiative petition, or on a separate page attached to each page, certifying that he was a resident of this state at the time of circulating the petition. The Secretary of State shall refuse to accept for filing any page of an initiative petition upon which the signatures appearing thereon were obtained by a person who was not a resident of this state at the time of circulating the petition, and an initiative measure shall not be placed on the ballot if the Secretary of State determines that without such signatures the petition clearly bears an insufficient number of signatures. The provisions of this subsection (12) shall be applicable to all initiative measures that have not been placed on the ballot at the time this proposed amendment is ratified by the electorate.

(13) The Legislature may enact laws to carry out the provisions of this section but shall in no way restrict or impair the provisions of this section or the powers herein reserved to the people." Be it further resolved, That this proposed amendment shall be submitted by the Secretary of State to the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November 1998, as provided by Section 273 of the Constitution and by general law. Be it further resolved, That the explanation of this proposed amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This proposed constitutional amendment provides that only a person who is a resident of this state may circulate an initiative petition or obtain signatures on an initiative petition for the purpose of proposing an amendment to the Mississippi Constitution."

Be it further resolved, That the Attorney General of the State of Mississippi shall submit this resolution, immediately upon adoption by the Legislature, to the Attorney General of the United States or to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, in accordance with the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended and extended.

*Amendment No. 2, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 513

A concurrent resolution proposing to amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 by adding a new section establishing victims' rights; and for related purposes.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the state of Mississippi, that the following amendment to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 is proposed to the qualified electors of the state:

Amend the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 by adding a new section to read as follows:

Section 26A. (1) Victims of crime, as defined by law, shall have the right to be treated with fairness, dignity and respect throughout the criminal justice process; and to be informed, to be present and to be heard, when authorized by law, during public hearings.

(2) Nothing in this section shall provide grounds for the accused or convicted offender to obtain any form of relief nor shall this section impair the constitutional rights of the accused. Nothing in this section or any enabling statute shall be construed as creating a cause of action for damages against the state or any of its agencies, officials, employees or political subdivisions.

(3) The Legislature shall have the authority to enact substantive and procedural laws to define, implement, preserve and protect the rights guaranteed to victims by this section.

Be it further resolved, That this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November 1998, as provided by Section 273 of the Constitution and by law.

Be it further resolved, That the explanation of this proposed constitutional amendment for the ballot shall read as follows: "This amendment gives victims of crimes the right to be informed, to be present and to be heard during the criminal process of the person accused of the crime, when authorized by law."
