Two-Vehicle Accident Claims The Life Of 11-Year-Old Burnsville Girl

A tragic accident near Burnsville Saturday night has claimed the life of an 11-year-old girl and has left her grandfather and her 7-year-old brother hospitalized.

Jamie Stanford Mask, 11, of Burnsville, was pronounced dead at about 8:14 p.m. Saturday at Iuka Hospital following an auto accident near Burnsville, Mississippi Highway Patrol Staff Sgt. Alan Liles reported.

The child's grandfather, 72-year-old Alfred Russo, suffered closed head injuries and fractured ribs in the accident and remains in critical condition. One of her brothers, Perry Mask, Jr., 7, suffered a compound fracture to his right leg. Both Russo and Mask remained in Tupelo at the Northeast Mississippi Medical Center at press time.

Sgt. Liles said the accident occurred at approximately 6:14 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 12. Apparently Alfred Russo, of Burnsville was driving a 1986 Ford Tempo in which his grandchildren were passengers. He was attempting a left hand turn from the eastbound lane of Hwy. 72 on to Hwy. 172 (old Hwy.

72) and pulled into the path of an oncoming 1996 Chrysler, driven by Alan Hutcheson of Iuka, according to the patrolman. It was raining heavily during the time of the accident which may have affected the drivers visibility, Sgt. Liles stated.

Russo's vehicle was hit on the passenger side at the place where Jamie Mask was sitting. She, as well as all other passengers in the vehicle, were wearing their seat belts at the time of the accident, Liles reported.

The driver and passengers in the Chrysler received only minor injuries, Liles said. Alan Hutcheson and his wife, Sharron, both suffered seat belt and air bag burns. Pam Sanders, another passenger, suffered lacerations to the face.

Other passengers in the Russo vehicle, Samantha Mask, 9, and Gary Mask, 7, a twin of Perry Mask, Jr., were treated and released from Iuka Hospital, according to Liles.

Russo and his grandchildren had been on their way to Mass Saturday evening at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Iuka, Sister Dolores Partsch confirmed.

Sgt. Liles said he would like

to thank the Burnsville Volunteer Fire Department, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and all of the other individuals who assisted at the scene of the accident.

Jamie Lee Stanford Mask was a sixth grader at Burnsville Elementary School and attended St. Mary's Catholic Church.

Services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 15, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel in Iuka with Father Tom Burns officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include her mother and stepfather, Ramona and John Gray of Burnsville; her father, Perry Mask of Iuka; her grandparents, Alfred Russo of Burnsville, Wayne Mask of Corinth and Martha Mask of Burnsville; two sisters, Tiffany Stanford and Samantha Mask, both of Burnsville; two brothers, Perry Mask, Jr. and Gary Mask, both of Burnsville; one stepsister, Ashley Gray of Burnsville; two uncles, David Russo of Iuka and Richard Russo of Burnsville; and two aunts, Rebecca Chappel of Iuka and Rhonda Russo of Corinth.

She was preceded in death by her grandmother, Kay Russo.

Pallbearers were Terry Rorie, Ricky Emerson, Ricky Barnett, Jamie Epperson, Shane Amerson and Nicky McRae.

Honorary pallbearers were Tim Rhodes, Mike Haynie, Melissa Kay and Courtney Wilson.

A new software corporation is in the process of finalizing their lease negotiations with the state of Mississippi for 25,000 sq. ft. of space in Building 1000 at Tri-State Commerce Park (former Yellow Creek/NASA site), near Iuka.

North American Software Associates, Ltd., a newly organized information technology corporation, plans to kickoff operations at the Yellow Creek location in the early part of 1999.

According to the North American Software Vice President, Ted Roberts, the company plans to put together teams who will address the Y2K issues for state and private organizations. Also they will work in the application and development of software and will be moving into Internet activities as well, the company official explained.

Roberts said they plan to begin bringing people on board after the holidays—about the second week in January. Initially 10 to 20 information system professionals will be hired.

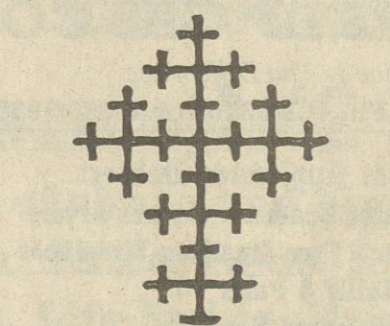

Home Economics Tips

Picking Pans Can Be Perplexing

If Peter Piper would have picked pans instead of pickled peppers, the poor guy would have been exhausted! Because when it comes to pans - especially bakeware - there exists a plethora of styles, choices and preferences. There's the 13x9-2 inch shiny or

silver aluminum with or without noon-stick finish, or the 13x9x2 inch without non-stick finish but dark gray or black. There's also 13x9x2 inch in glass, plastic, insulated and disposable aluminum. Then you've got a whole host of varieties in 8-inch and 9-inch square pans, and 9-inch

and 10-inch round pans. The choices continue to mount for specialty items such as cookie sheets, muffin pans, spring-form pans and tube pans.

Now let's peak inside home cupboards: You'll find the 8 1/2 inch stoneware cake pan that was inherited from Grandma who brought it to America on the boat from Ukrania; or the enameled rectangle pan that is decorated with strawberries to match the kitchen wallpaper, or the favorite aluminum pie plate that is dented from its camping vacation.

The next time you or a customer has a problem with a baked good recipe not coming out right, try looking at the bakeware.

The dimensions on what might seem like the same pan, a 13x9x2 inch baking pan, for instance, may differ according to style or manufacturer, the actual inside dimensions can vary from 1/8" to 1/2" which can affect the baking time and appearance of recipes, especially baked desserts. Observe the pans in a kitchen or home store - look at the various 13x9x2 inch pans. Some have slanted sides, others are more shallow and may come in a variety of surfaces, non-stick dark to shiny metal.

The size, metal gauge, or even choice between metal or glass can

also cause bake times and temperatures to vary. And all of these factors can affect and even run havoc on your tried and true recipes. Although most recipes will provide a range for appropriate baking times, most consumers are in a hurry when they bake, and they usually do not adjust accordingly for their bakeware. For instance, many

consumers bake dessert bars in glass bakeware. Glass dishes tend to have more rounded corners that can create a "frame" around the outside. And since glass doesn't cool very fast, the bars will continue to bake and brown a little even when removed from the oven.

Fruit Tree Replanting

If you're thinking of replacing that dead or dying fruit tree, this is a good time. This is particularly true in the case of fruit trees lost to disease or insect pests. Since planting space may sometimes be a premium in the home orchard, fruit growers frequently want to know "Can I replant in the same spot where I removed the dead tree? If I do, am I likely to run into the same problem?" this is not advisable because over a period of time pest populations around the root system tend to build to high levels. In many cases, the tree to be replaced may not show obvious above ground symptoms of root rot or soil-borne insect pests, so it's natural to wonder if there is any real danger in replanting in the same spot. Orchardists also want to know "How long after I remove the old fruit tree should I want to avoid problems?" The answer to this question can only be answered once it's known which of the soil disease and insect problems are involved. A disease common on peach roots has been found in the soil thirty-five years after tree removal. Soil chemicals available to home orchardists are of limited value for use in treating the old site for this disease and other pests. So, as a general rule moving to a fresh planting site is easier than waiting out pests and a lot safer than taking a chance. Home orchardists with limited planting space may not have much room to work with, but as another general rule, a distance of ten feet or more from the old planting site is preferred (remember roots of the previous tree can occupy a large area of soil). It's also important to follow other recommended planting

guidelines to increase chances of long term survival of the new tree. Contact us at the County Extension Office if you have questions about planting guidelines for home fruit orchards.

Soil Sampling

Don't forget that this is the time to soil sample for lawns, gardens, and agricultural crops. Results will be received with sufficient time to add lime, if necessary. Phosphorus and potash can also be applied. Call or come by the Extension Office for instructions and soil sample boxes.

Now is also the time for soybean producers to take nematode samples. Soybean fields need to be monitored periodically to make sure that your crop or variety rotation system is working properly. We have information and materials needed to take a proper soil sample to be tested for nematodes.

Whole Cottonseed As Feed For Cattle

The nutritional value of whole cottonseed make it a very popular feedstuff for beef cattle. Price and availability are the major factors involved in using this feed. It is higher in TDN, fiber, and fat than corn, soybean meal or cottonseed meal.

High fat is good within limits. Excess fat can cause diarrhea and reduce overall feed digestion. For this reason it is best to restrict consumption to 1 pound of seed per 200 pounds of body weight. Cottonseed also has a high moisture content which can cause a seed quality problem. It is best

not to offer this feed as free-choice but rather hand feed daily. Handling and storing can be a problem because cottonseed does not flow well out of a grain bin. The best way is to use a clean, dry commodity shed. Gossypol poisoning is an occasional problem with young ruminant

animals whose stomachs are fully developed and is a common problem with non-ruminant animals and should not be fed in this manner. For more information on the value of cottonseed as feed, please call our office.

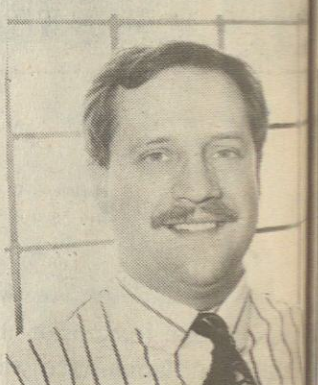
Nearsightedness

With nearsightedness there is always some blur at distance and there is always some near point that will be clear. If a person is nearsighted, the near point of clear vision can be as close as two or three inches from the eye. It usually begins to develop during the teenage years.

General nearsightedness (myopia) gets worse during its early stages and progresses rapidly during adolescence. In the early adult years it stabilizes and then decreases, increasing again in old age. Often people are unaware that their distance vision is becoming blurry because of the gradual onset of myopia. Regular checkups help.

Simple myopia usually does not cause discomfort since the eyes do not have to adapt as they do with farsightedness. The image of an object falls in front of the retina and is therefore out of focus. Either eyeglasses or contact lenses will correct this condition. "Mimic" lenses are used which are thicker on the edge than in the middle. It moves the image backward, focusing on the retina, resulting in clear vision.

Your Dental Health



Stains that occur on the outside surface of the tooth are called EXTRINSIC stains. These stains are commonly caused by plaque buildup, tobacco, coffee and certain foods. These stains can be removed most effectively by a professional dental cleaning and polishing. Also, to remove extrinsic stains you should brush your teeth at least twice a day, especially after meals; use toothpaste specially designed to remove extrinsic stains; have teeth brighter between dental appointments and avoid tobacco and foods or drinks known to stain teeth.

Stains beneath the surface of the teeth or that form inside the tooth and can't be removed by brushing or professional cleaning are called INTRINSIC stains. Intrinsic stains are commonly caused by defects within the tooth, trauma to the tooth, old fillings, or the use of certain antibiotics during tooth development. These stains can only be removed by professional bleaching or concealed by veneers over the affected teeth. Both extrinsic stains can still be removed and discolored teeth after bleaching or application of veneers. Toothpaste specially designed to remove extrinsic stains can help teeth brighter between dental appointments.

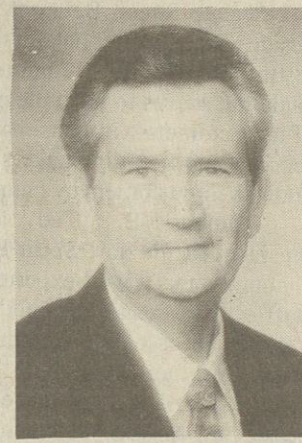

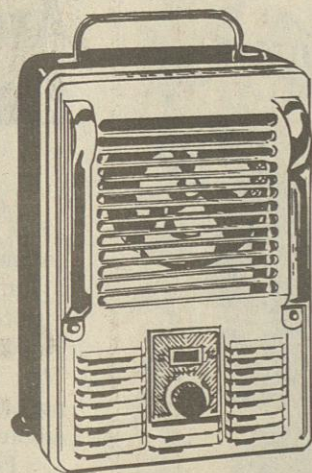

North Miss. Health Services Donates 60 Computers To Area School....

Most children cringe at the thought of hand-me-downs, but not those who are getting the latest ones from North Mississippi Health Services, Iuka Hospital's parent corporation.

Tishomingo County Schools are the recipient of 60 used computers donated by Iuka Hospital and its parent company North Mississippi Health Services. These computers have been delivered and refurbished for use in the local schools. Most of the computers have gone to Tishomingo County High School where they are attached to the school network and being used by both students and teachers. Each school will receive some of these computers.

"Given the number and variety of specialized computer

applications we run throughout our health care system, after about three years a computer becomes outdated to the point that it can no longer support the technology we need to use," Tommy Bozeman, NMHS vice president and chief information officer, explained. "As part of our long-range technology plan, NMHS will replace one-third of its computers each year. The computers we no longer use will be donated first to schools in communities where NMHS has hospitals, then to other schools as computers become available."

Mr. George Hand, Interim Administrator for Iuka Hospital, who was instrumental in securing the equipment for the local schools, says, "computer donation is a win-win situation for all

parties. While the computers can no longer accommodate applications for health care, they can provide Internet access and serve as an excellent classroom tool." This is but one example of Iuka Hospital's commitment to serve the local community.

In January the company paid a 50% stock dividend in the form of a three-for-two stock split, and in March, the company boosted the cash dividend from fourteen and two thirds cents (\$.1467) per share to seventeen and a half cents (\$.1750).

At September 30, 1998, earnings per share were up 9.03% from the same period in 1997. The company's stated goal is to pay out approximately one third of earnings in the form of dividends.

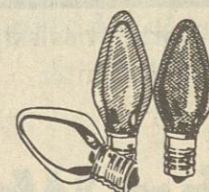

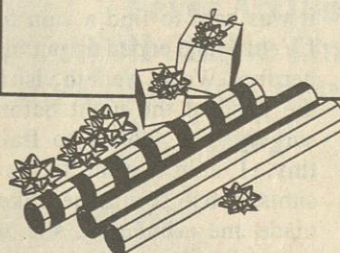

My Friends, My Heros, Bill and Judy Moore

A star led Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. The shepherds nearby were also drawn to the city by a star as they were told of the event by an angel. Three wise men came from afar led by the light in the sky. All were witness to a miracle. That miracle was the birth of our Savior. The gift the child gave mankind cannot be equaled for it is truly the ultimate gift of life ever after.

All these events are celebrated at Christmas. Gifts of silver and gold we give to one another are still reminiscent of the gifts the wise men brought to the child. As they were witness to the greatest of all miracles, we too can look around today and see miracles given by the touch of the Master. In many cases, he gives the gift of life itself. I smile as I am reminded daily of the power of prayer. We are all here because HE has a plan for us. Let me share with you a couple who proves that God is watching!

On my daily rounds I often stop by MOORES JEWELRY to check in with Mr. Bill and Mrs. Judy. Unlike Buster Tucker, I don't need my watch set every day (whether it needs it or not) as an excuse to stop in and say "hi". I just drop by with a "hello" and a smile and always get one back from Mrs. Judy and Mr. Bill. I am usually greeted by both! I have known the Moores since I was a small child. Our families were in the JAYCEES and we all went to Iuka Baptist Church together. I guess you could say that they were not just Mom and Dad's friends but were both special to our whole family.

Bill and Judy go all the way back to when they were a couple in high school. Back then, high school sweethearts really meant something. Going steady was a real commitment and wearing a class ring was a symbol of something special. It would be a symbol for something more for Bill and Judy, it would come to symbolize a living as well as the commitment of their life together.

Judy Marlin was a beautiful young woman who had moved to Iuka when her father became County Agent. Bill says he really first noticed her one weekend at a gospel concert of the Blackwood Brothers in Jaybird Park in Iuka. Bill laughed, "I saw her there dressed in white with dark hair and a pretty smile so I had no choice but to talk to her!"



That was pretty much it, Bill was hooked from that day at age fifteen. She was going to be more than a part of his plans, and Bill was in hers. They were going to be each others life and love from that time on. They were ambitious and wanted to start their own jewelry business together after high school.

In those carefree days of the fifties, poodle skirts and saddle shoes were in as were slicked down hair and Rock-n-Roll was the rage. That's why when the Iuka High School Band, with Judy as a majorette, went to the Tupelo Fair to perform, everyone stayed after to hear the featured singer of the show...ELVIS!

While most of the kids tried to get through the crowd, some Iuka girls got on the front. Better than that, two kids got backstage. Judy and her brother, Jimmy Marlin, knew someone in the highway patrol who slipped them back to Elvis' dressing room. They met Elvis' parents, Vernon and Gladys, while they waited for the newest singing sensation. "They were nice people," Mrs. Judy recalled. "I was real nervous. Then he came in and I got to meet him! Jimmy even got a picture with him! When I asked why she didn't have her picture made with the handsome young singer, she laughed. 'I didn't want to get Bill mad, see all the boyfriends were jealous of Elvis.' This was universal for most guys

anywhere in 1956, at least where Elvis was concerned! Judy added, "I knew Bill would likely break up with me if he saw any good looking boy with his arm around me, especially Elvis! 'Smart woman I married, HUH?'" Mr. Bill chimed in as he listened to our conversation.

They were wed in 1959. In that same year, Bill opened up a small watch repair shop with a small amount of jewelry. He and Judy built up the store as a retail jewelry store so that by the time their first son, Ken, arrived in 1962, the store was getting on its feet. Their tenth anniversary of marriage was celebrated with an anniversary of the business and the birth of second son, Phillip.

As long as I can remember, we have depended on the Moores for our jewelry needs. I can remember buying a locket for a certain little red-haired girl who was my date for the sixth grade prom. I also got a watch for graduation engraved, "FROM MOM AND DAD, MAY 22, 1983". I still wear that gold watch that keeps perfect time after 15 years but I can always take it or my talking watch in if I need a battery changed or a new band.

As the years slipped by, we grew close to the Moores. Our families went to ball games and we all ate out or shared a meal among several families. Ken and Phillip both went into the jewelry business after high school and college. Both boys grew up in the business and fell into it naturally.

In 1992 Judy began having health trouble. This led to the discovery of an aneurysm on the brain. The prognosis was bleak yet she and Bill struggled through tests and weeks of specialists and hospital stays until it was necessary in January of 1993 to operate. Though both were scared they remained strong for each other. Mrs. Judy was so weak by this time that it was hard to find a vein for the I.V. tube and ended up putting it in her foot. We all went to visit her in the hospital the night before the surgery. She looked so frail and tiny. I didn't want to be pessimistic but seeing her like that made me wonder if she would make it. Her optimism proved contagious. I went home and prayed that night as hard as I think I ever have. She was on the hearts and minds of many others who were in sincere prayer for Mrs. Judy.

After several weeks, she made it through and slowly worked to gain enough strength to go home. Mr. Bill never left her side and, like a passage of Thereau, faithfully stood by her through the "moments of quiet desperation." Later, she also underwent back surgery with the same determination as she had courageously shown before. It took long months of continued work to get back to her old self. After other setbacks, Judy managed to take on everything with faith in God and Bill's love and support as well as that of her family and friends.

I remember seeing her afterward at a gathering. She looked so pretty with a smile that beamed, then again it may not have been as big as the one Bill has. Whenever he looks at Judy, he looks up as if to say to the Lord, "Thank You, Sir!"

After nearly forty years of business, Moores Jewelry is still a fixture on Front Street. Phillip and wife, Paula, work with Bill and Judy whom they have made grandparents with Marley, age four and Jacob "Jake" age 2. They are big Shania Twain fans. When they get in the van, both yell, "Don't be Stupid" Moma! (That is the title of a song of hers and they both know it by heart!) Jake even has his own bull, Jerico,

and hopes to be a farmer someday, before he's an old man of 11 or 12 at the latest, he seems to think! Marley hasn't decided yet but I think she's going to be a country singer. LOOK OUT SHANIA!

Ken is now in real estate in Nashville and still works in the jewelry market part time. The Moores are still active in church and now that they can, take some time to travel and just enjoy life together. They still enjoy their gospel concerts and getting together with friends. I like to drop in every so often and just check in. To see them smiling behind that counter, you would never know how they struggled through life's obstacles and joys faithfully together. Simply, GOD ANSWERS PRAYER!

When I see Bill and Judy together wherever, I know I am looking at a miracle. In this season where we celebrate the ultimate Miracle of Christ's birth, let us remember that we are surrounded by miracles and blessings every day whether we see them or not. The Moores are a special couple who exemplify this fact everyday, especially at Christmas. To you, Mr. Bill and Mrs. Judy, have yourselves a merry little Christmas! Seasons greetings to a wonderful couple. You are both my "HEROES!"

During this Christmas season, keep your faith! Maybe YOUR miracle is just a prayer away!

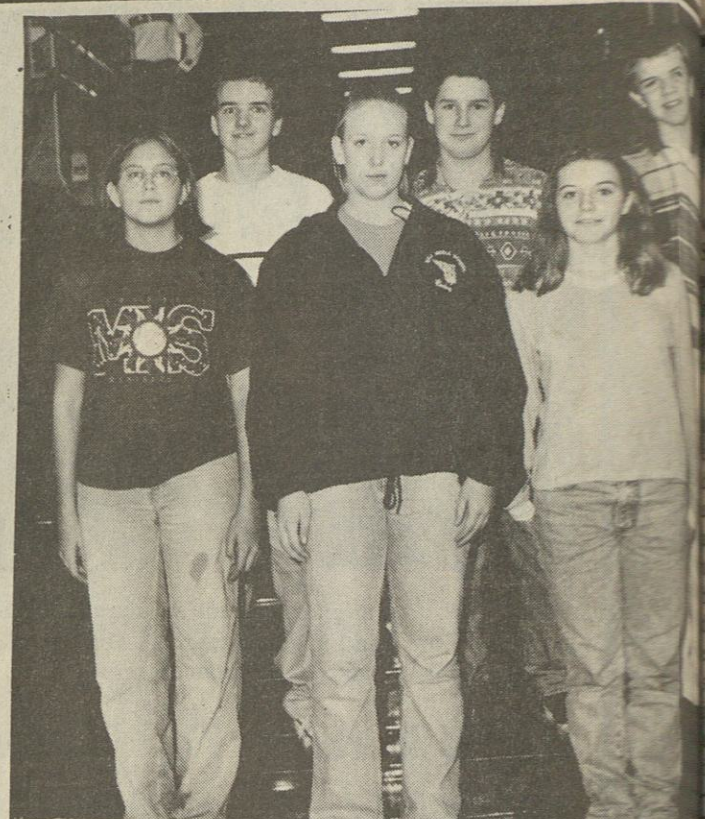
Benefit Fish Fry For Sherry Freno

Letter To The Editor

We recently submitted a news release to all of the area newspapers. The purpose of this release was to let the public know that we, the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, have been successfully working to obtain grant money that will benefit our students, staff members, and schools. Two of the area newspapers printed the article with the information we submitted. The staff writer for the Tishomingo County News felt compelled to have more information, specifically about the most recent grant for Burnsville School. On Tuesday, December 15th, she came to the central office seeking this information. To comply with her request for additional information, a school district central office employee permitted the staff writer to have a copy of the Burnsville School Grant.

When schools, school districts, or other public entities write grants, they have to build within the grant a strong case that the needs of the school or entity match the provisions of the grant. Realizing that this scenario left Burnsville School vulnerable to criticism, the central office staff member asked the staff writer to please not write anything derogatory. The staff writer agreed.

In the Thursday, December 10th, edition of the Tishomingo County News, the article was published. We, the Tishomingo County School District, and especially the employees of Burnsville School, were disappointed and hurt by this article. We feel that the staff writer failed to honor her commitment to us. We regret that the positive, hopeful information that we wanted our public to have access to was transformed into a negative, discouraging message that used brief excerpts from the grant to unfairly describe Burnsville School.

Therefore, we, in behalf of

Burnsville School, would like to take this opportunity to respond by presenting some important facts.

Burnsville School is a good school. It's graduates (before and after consolidation) have used the knowledge and experiences that they gained at Burnsville School as a solid foundation on which to build impressive educational and career accomplishments.

The current Burnsville School's faculty is a caring, competent group of professionals who are striving diligently to effectively serve their students. In fact, the faculty's desire to grow individually and collectively was one of the two main reasons Burnsville School was selected for this grant. The other reason was

demographically related to the percentage of students receiving free and/or reduced lunches.

All schools work by having people (administrators, teachers, etc.) serve other people (students, parents, etc.). Since people are not perfect, no school is perfect. Therefore, the most important room in any school is the room for improvement. Like all schools, this room exists at Burnsville School. The most disappointing fact is that last week's article completely overlooked the fact that the Burnsville School faculty, staff, and community have been and are working diligently to provide quality educational services for the students in Burnsville School.

These commendable efforts are reaping positive results. For instance, this fall's standardized test results show that Burnsville School has many reasons to be proud. In the grades tested (1 through 8) Burnsville School's reading, math, and language scores were higher than last year in five grades. In math, Burnsville School students outperformed the National Average in seven out of eight grades. In reading, Burnsville School students outperformed the

National Average in six out of eight grades. In language, Burnsville School students outperformed the National Average in five out of eight grades. In all grades tested, the

students in Burnsville gained 14 percentile points in reading, 24 in math, and 49 in language. All stakeholders of Burnsville School are to be commended for these impressive achievements!

We would like to thank the Tishomingo County News for being so supportive of our schools. Every week our schools and/or our school district receives positive press from the Tishomingo County News. We appreciate this and for the interest of the students of Tishomingo County we want to maintain our harmonious relationship with the Tishomingo County News. We just feel that this particular article, painted an unfair and negative portrait of Burnsville School.

Northeast Community College Announces President's Retirement

Northeast Community College today announced plans to begin the search for a new president to replace Joe M. Childers, who announced to the board in July that he would retire effective June 30, 1999.

On November 10, at their regular meeting, board members hired the search firm of the Association of Community College Trustees, based in Washington, DC, to conduct a nationwide search to find candidates to succeed Childers.

Childers announced to board members at their meeting in July that his eleven-year tenure as president of the college would culminate in June, giving them nearly one year to secure a suitable replacement.

"We haven't announced Joe's retirement sooner because we thought it would be inappropriate to make such an announcement a year in advance," said Northeast chairman of the board, Thomas Keenum. "With only six months of tenure left, it is time to take the first steps in securing an appropriate successor."

"Joe has been an exemplary president committed to the advancement of this institution, setting a fine example and a precedent that will be hard to match. Throughout his career his emphasis has been on Northeast students, faculty and services to

the community."

"I have always considered Northeast to be the crown jewel of Northeast Mississippi," Childers, an alumnus of Northeast, said. "I spent thirty-three of my forty-one year educational career here and will miss my colleagues, the students and the institution greatly."

Childers was appointed president September 8, 1987. Prior to his presidency he served as Dean of the College, Director of Buildings and Grounds and classroom instructor. His Northeast career began in 1966.

The Childers recently purchased a home in Booneville and are in the process of making minor renovations to the property. Childers indicated that he has received several offers of future business endeavors, but he has made no definite commitments following his retirement from Northeast.

"My priorities are to ensure Northeast Community College finding a qualified successor and to promote as smooth a transition as possible for the new administration. Beyond that, I would like to express my appreciation to the Northeast administration, faculty, staff and students for their support and friendship throughout my tenure," Childers said.
