Three Suspects Arrested In Check Forgeries

Tishomingo County authorities have arrested three suspects in conjunction with the cashing of two stolen Social Security checks at a bank in Tishomingo.

Christopher Dilworth, 21 of 1610 Dilworth Rd., Iuka, Robert Shawn Bowman, 19, of 1571 Hwy. 25, Tishomingo and Debra Swindle, 43, of 89 CR 261, Iuka, all were arrested January 4 by officers from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department who were acting on information they received from Iuka City Police Officers Anita Mitchell and Mike Parsons.

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith explained that Christopher Dilworth apparently kept two Social Security checks sent to his deceased grandmother instead of returning them to the government. He then gave the checks, which totaled \$736, to Robert Shawn Bowman.

Smith said Bowman, in turn, took the two checks to his mother, Debra Swindle, who allegedly forged the deceased woman's name on the back of each. It appears that Bowman then took the checks to the Tishomingo

branch of the Bank of Mississippi where he also signed the check backs using an alias.

Dilworth has been charged with accessory before the fact to forgery—two counts, accessory before the fact to uttering a forgery—two counts and conspiracy to commit a crime, according to the Sheriff.

Bowman and Swindle have both been charged with forgery—two counts, uttering a forgery—two counts and conspiracy to commit a crime, Smith said.

When authorities went to Iuka's old VFW building where Dilworth has a car washing business to arrest him, they found 10 new automobile batteries which had been stolen from Iuka Wal-Mart, Smith confirmed.

At press time, Swindle had been released on \$50,000 bond. Both Dilworth and Bowman remained in jail, each having a \$50,000 bond set.

Officers involved in the arrests were Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Rodney Pannell, Deputy Bob McCarley and Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigation Bureau Officer Ricky Marlar.

State Unemployment Rates Lower In November

A strong performance by the retail trade industry pushed Mississippi's overall unemployment rate down to 4.1 percent during November, the Mississippi Employment Security Commission (MESC) announced recently.

Tishomingo County ranked 67th out of the state's 82 counties in unemployment with a rate of 7.6 percent.

The state's 4.1 percent rate matched the U.S. unemployment rate of 4.1 percent for November. The state's unemployment rate has not been this low since last December.

Most counties saw their unemployment rates drop during November as Lafayette County

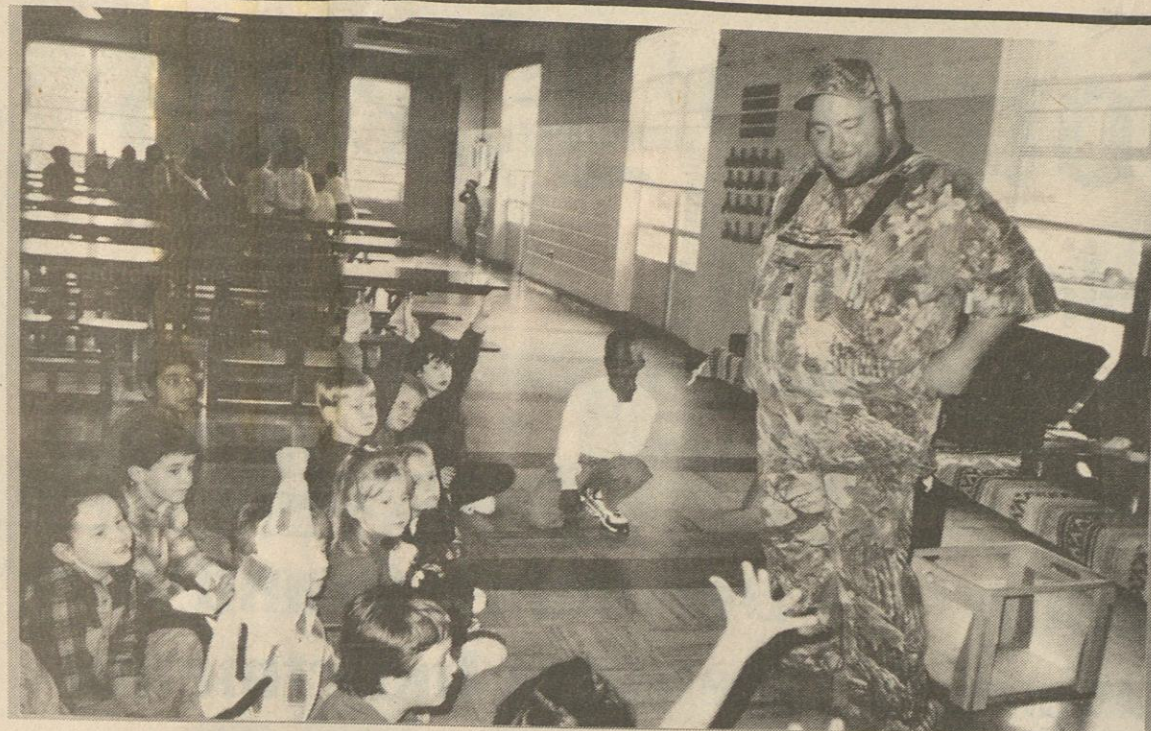

Fraudulent Telemarketers Are Criminals Don't Fall For A Telephone Line

Don't Fall For A Charity Con - Be An Informed Donor:

- Older consumers report that, on average, they get more than 6 calls or letters seeking charitable donations every week. That's more than 300 calls or letters every year.
- More than 2/3 of older consumers are NOT confident that unknown callers "really represent the organization they say they do."
- More than half of older consumers (57%) NEVER ask a caller how the donation will be spent.
- Almost 2/3 of older consumers say they know where to go to get more information about a charity. Unfortunately, most people who say they know where to go would go to the charity itself. If the charity is not legitimate the information is unreliable. Don't take their word, call your state Attorney General or Secretary of State.
- Before You Give, Get More Information:**
 - Ask the charity's full name, address, and telephone number.
 - Ask how much of your donation goes to the program the request

describes, and how much goes to administrative costs.

- Call your state Attorney General or Secretary of State's office to see if the charity is registered. Depending on your state, charities must file financial or other disclosure statements; get copies and review them.

Be Sure You Know Who Is Calling

- If a fundraiser calls, call the charity directly, and ask if it is really sponsoring a fundraising drive. Beware of similar sounding names; don't assume you know this group because the name or symbols seem familiar.

Beware Of Calls From Phony "Charities"

Solicitations by fake charities increase around the holidays and

after disasters, with an emotional pitch designed to tug at your heartstrings.

Protect Your Charitable Dollars

- Pay with a check made out to the charity, not the fundraiser.
- Don't give at the door to a courier or messenger, or by leaving a check under the doormat. Send it directly to the charity.
- Keep records of your donations and pledges, and check your records if someone says you made

a pledge you don't recall.

Know the difference between tax deductible and tax exempt. Donations to tax-exempt organizations are NOT necessarily tax-deductible for you, if your donation is tax-deductible, get a receipt.

Know Your Rights

- If a fundraiser tries to bully you, hang up and report them to authorities.

- You do NOT need to pay for merchandise or gifts you did not order.

- Beware of promises of prizes and sweepstakes; you do NOT have to donate in order to be able to win.

Don't be intimidated by a fraudulent demand-for-payment letter threatening action by a credit bureau - a legitimate organization will send a polite reminder notice. To Learn About Charity Fraud Or If You Suspect Fraud:

- Call the Attorney General or Secretary of State for your state. Telephone numbers will be listed in the government pages of the phone book.

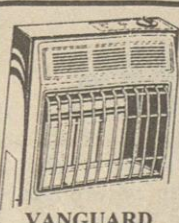

Give Up The Grind - Tooth, That Is

It is estimated that up to 95 percent of people experience bruxism - tooth grinding - at some time in their lives. Bruxism is caused primarily by stress and can even strain relationships by causing a lot of nighttime noise.

Most people clench or grind their teeth in their sleep with increasing frequency and intensity during particularly stressful times. If you wake up in the morning with stiff and painful jaw muscles, you may well have been clenching during the night. This habit can not only cause aching muscles, but can wear down your teeth and damage dental work.

Possible treatments for bruxism include wearing a hard, plastic bite splint on the upper teeth, taking anti-anxiety medication or changing your lifestyle to lessen stress. The "cure" for tooth grinding can be affected by the patient's motivation, but many cases of bruxism can be kept under control with a bite splint or medication.

Visual Development

A child's developing vision needs stimulation. Therefore, it is important to provide the child with interesting things to view that will draw his attention outside his immediate range. By restricting his vision area there is no incentive for him to attempt visual expansion. Leaving a child too often for long hours in a playpen pretty much limits his vision to a few feet. This discourages visual development. Indoors, a child's vision is limited to four walls and objects where there is little visual challenge because of their familiarity. Outdoors, vision develops in a better and more natural way by being exercised and stretched.

The other critical factor in good vision development is nutrition. During the important pre-school growth period the eyes and the brain, which make up less than 2% of the body weight, use 25% of the available nourishment. A diet plentiful in vegetables, fresh fruits and B vitamins is good for developing vision. Excess refined carbohydrates and sugar in the child's diet are seen to be associated with nearsightedness.

What Does Neutering Have to do with Health?

Besides helping to control the canine overpopulation problem, neutering also contributes to better health for individual dogs. For example, mammary tumors are very common in older, intact (unneutered) female dogs. However, spaying before the first estrus, or heat cycle, has been proven to greatly reduce the risk of female dogs developing mammary cancer.

In the case of male dogs those that are not castrated have a high incidence of developing prostate problems later in life. These problems can interfere with basic functions such as urinating and defecating. Infections of the prostate that occur frequently in unneutered male dogs can even be life-threatening. Castrating male dogs decreases the risk of developing such prostate diseases. It also decreases their chances of developing other common hormone-driven health problems such as testicular tumors and tumors of the perianal glands (structures found near the rectum).

For dogs of either sex neutering will also decrease roaming tendencies, which in turn reduce a dog's risk of traumatic injuries from fighting with other dogs or traffic accidents. It also reduces the chances of dogs contracting sexually transmitted canine diseases such as Brucellosis (a bacterial infection), or Transmissible Venereal Tumors (TVTs). Neutering can even make dogs more pleasant living companions. Spayed female dogs won't have messy heat cycles or attract large numbers of male dogs. Castrated male dogs won't try to mark their house with urine to define their territory. Some people even report that neutering their dogs make the dogs more people-oriented.

Carol Akers Burton at Hernando Elementary School Receives National Board Certification

The National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) announced that 924 teachers from 37 states and abroad earned National Certification during 1997-1998. These teachers were selected from 912 teachers who were previously awarded National Certification, bring the total number of teachers who have received this prestigious certification to 1,836 from 45 states and the District of Columbia. Carol Akers Burton, a grade teacher at Hernando Elementary School was recently notified she had been awarded National Board Certification.

"The year long journey to achieve National Board



Certification revolved around self-revelation and reflection. Throughout the process, I learned more about myself and my strengths as a professional and an individual. Without a strong support group of colleagues, friends, and family, this achievement would not have been possible," stated Carol Akers Burton, recipient and teacher at Hernando Elementary School. Ms. Burton is a graduate of Luka High School and the University of Mississippi where she received her Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education.

Certification, receive an additional \$6,000 annually to supplement their salary. In order to apply for National Board Certification, teachers must pay a \$2,000 certification fee that is reimbursed at the end of the program, if the teacher completes the program, regardless of whether a teacher receives National Board Certification.

In addition to the knowledge that is gained through obtaining National Board Certification, teachers also receive a monetary incentive for their accomplishment. In order to encourage educators across the country to seek National Board Certification, states are providing monetary incentives for teachers. In the State of Mississippi, where the National Board Certification process has been in place for two years, teachers who pass the process and receive National Board Certification, receive an additional \$6,000 annually to supplement their salary. In order to apply for National Board Certification, teachers must pay a

\$2,000 certification fee that is reimbursed at the end of the program, if the teacher completes the program, regardless of whether a teacher receives National Board Certification.

School districts across the country are stepping up their efforts to recruit teachers to meet the present teacher shortage and to prepare for the forecasted critical

teacher shortage that school districts will be facing in the next few years. Presently, the State of Mississippi has approximately 16.3% of educators who are eligible for retirement. As a result, school district and the State of Mississippi are working together to retain teachers who are presently teaching in school district by offering monetary incentives to ensure competitive pay. The State of Mississippi Legislature is preparing to request additional funding for teacher's salary to assist in recruiting individuals into the teaching profession and to retain those educators presently teaching. My Friends, My Heroes, Rev. & Mrs. Tate Presley

Tate & Vetress Presley

"Never do today what you can put off until tomorrow" is an unspoken motto I tend to unwillingly live by. I put off little things, like laundry until it is a big thing at the last minute. Sunday nights after 11:00 are pretty hectic at our house when I have procrastinated in doing my article due Monday morning. Sometimes, that deadline passes with edits and rewrites still pending. We all put off doing things or making decisions for days, weeks even years.

"I know all about putting off a decision," said Rev. Tate Presley. "I fought my calling to preach for ten years." He said as his wife Vetress invited me to have a warm cup of homemade potato soup and talk about their life with each other and serving the Lord.

Tate Presley was born in Tishomingo County in 1916. He came to Tishomingo in the mid 1930's with the Citizens Conservation Corps, popularly known as the "C.C.C. Camps". "I had been a farmer, worked on the railroad and had done other jobs but that was back during the Depression when work was scarce," he noted. While at the Tishomingo camp, he met Vetress Belue, a local girl from Eden. The couple married in July of 1939.

Tate always made a crop and continued to farm, even this year he made a sizable garden. "We had no choice but to farm and take any job that came up," said Rev. Presley. The couple have two children, Hugh Van Presley and Charlotte Presley Swimmer. Tate has attended church all of his life. Vetress joined the church at the tender age of thirteen. Her husband was not moved to join for many years. Though actively involved in the church, Tate fought

the alter call until he was thirty-three years old. He was baptized as a member. Tate knew that God was STILL dealing with him. For ten years, Tate put off answering the call to preach. There were a number of ways that he was spoken to in those years.

"I was plowing out here behind the house when I finally gave in and surrendered the Lord's will," he recalled, "I don't know why I fought it for so long. If God wants something He's gonna get it!" At that time, Tate was working for Mr. Leon Phillips at Phillip's Hardware. Rev. Presley was ordained in 1959. He served as pastor at a number of local Baptist churches such as the New Salem Baptist Church and at New Prospect Baptist. He also pastored at church in Alcorn county through his ministry.

Forty-three years old is kind of late to decide to go off to seminary. "Better late than never!" Rev. Presley laughed. Mrs. Vetress said, "Tate went to school full time at Clark College for a year. I worked part time and we made ends meet until Tate finished." He returned to a full time job at the hardware store and would have several churches to lead for the next thirty years.

The Presleys recall a number of moving stories of how God used them to reach others. "I had one old man at New Salem who was over 80 years old when he accepted the Lord," he said. "That man stood up for my father when he married my mother," Mrs. Presley said. "He put it off as long as he could stand it," Tate said, "He didn't live much longer after that but I know he went to be with the Lord when he left here."

Another memorable event like this came when Brother Tate was at New Prospect. He recalls, "We took charge of ministering at the county home when the call came out that a pastor was needed." There was an elderly woman named Sibbie Harp there that the Presleys knew for a number of years. The old woman had never married and had never accepted the Lord. For several years, Rev. Presley witnessed to her and prayed that she would come to know the Lord. Brother Presley's prayer was answered when Miss Harp finally accepted Christ. On her deathbed, her niece called

Rev. Presley to be with her aunt in her final hours. Tate came and held prayer for the woman. Hours later, she passed away with peace in her heart.

A boy lay in the county hospital. His neck was broken in a car accident. He was paralyzed. Rev. Presley witnessed to the boy who would not say a word, never acknowledging Brother Tate's prayers and attempts to council the young man. The preacher thought it would be a good idea to bring a motion before the Men's Brotherhood meeting at New Prospect to pitch in and raise a few dollars to buy the boy a radio to listen to in the hospital. Tate got the radio at cost through the hardware store. The boy never even said thank you.

One day when Tate came to visit, the boy had been released. He always wondered about the young man and continued to keep him in his prayers and think of him. Fifteen years later, a woman came to Rev. Presley at a dinner

meeting. She asked Rev. Presley if he remembered the boy and described him. Presley immediately recognized the man's name. She said she had been in a service at a small Baptist church in Alabama the day they rolled this man to the alter. He accepted the Lord in the service that day and asked to be baptized. There was no way they could get him in the baptistry with the wheelchair. The hall was too narrow and there were steps into the water. The man was determined and an answer was found. He was taken to the river and was rolled into the water, wheelchair and all!

Afterward, he found out that this lady was from Tishomingo County. The man asked if she knew Rev. Tate Presley. She told him she did and that he lived just up the road from her sister. He sent the following message by the woman wanting Brother Presley to know, "The seeds you planted in dry barren soil all those years ago finally bloomed in my heart, thank you!"

Under Brother Presley's leadership, the Lord called three men to His ministry. One of these men is Brother C. I. Puckett. Brother Puckett, who is now retired but continues to work with the senior ministries at Iuka Baptist Church, was the minister of music many years ago in a church Rev. Presley pastored. "C. I. just stopped singing in the invitation," Bro. Presley recalls, "He closed his Hymnal and put his hand on my shoulder telling me he was ready to surrender to the Lord's will," Tate recalled that moment with a smile and wiped a tear away as he said quietly, "AMEN!"

Brother Puckett has fond memories of this event and another special day in his life. He said, "Brother Presley let me preach my first service in that little church. My daughter, Debbie, came down the aisle and was saved that night. Brother Presley baptized her a short time later. Yes, I know that Bro. Tate Presley was called by God. He has sure been a blessing to me!"

Mrs. Vetress has been involved with the Women's Missions for nearly fifty years. She is now director of the W.M.U. at

Iuka Baptist where she has served for several years. Brother Tate, upon retirement, came with his wife to Iuka Baptist Church where they have been involved in numerous church activities over the years. Once a month, every third Monday, the W.M.U. sponsors a prayer luncheon with great food, wonderful speakers and warm

Christian fellowship. Here, I have come to know both Reverend and Mrs. Presley as warm caring Christian people. They truly take each day, one day at a time and do as the Lord guides them.

Bro. Jim Manley, pastor of Iuka Baptist Church has a special place in his heart for "Bro. Tate and Mrs. Vetress." He says, "Bro. Tate is a man who supports the church through many kind deeds. His greatest contribution is the fact that he sincerely prays for the church and all of us on the church staff. He is there with advice and kind words of encouragement. We are proud to have this family as part of our church family."

This has been especially true in recent years after Tate suffered a stroke. "He was out walking when it began," says Mrs. Presley, "I called Charlotte after her father was late getting back from his walk. She walked back with him as he began to noticeably drag his foot. His right hand was a bit numb but his blood pressure was fine." The family consulted with Dr. Ben Kitchens who set them up an appointment the next day with a specialist. By that time, Tate was having difficulty walking and his speech was slurred. A battery of tests confirmed five blood clots in Reverend Presley's arteries of the brain and neck. He underwent surgery immediately. "I just put it in the Lord's hands and just trusted he would pull me through," Rev. Presley said smiling, "and HE has done it! Not me, HIM!"

After surgery, Tate was given six weeks of rehab. He was up walking a hundred feet just a couple of days after surgery. "My right hand was drawn up," he said balling the hand into a fist. He then laid it flat and brushed his other hand over it several times from palm to finger tips working the hand. "I did this over and over again trying to regain strength and movement," he stated. He also underwent extensive speech therapy for many months.

There were countless hours of quiet determination that Bro. Presley put into recovery from the stroke. Benny McClung recalls how he would see Bro. Presley out walking around the lake at Woodall Mountain Estates before the stroke. McClung relates the testimony the old preacher has been through example: "He was out there every day. After I heard about his stroke I figured, 'That was it!' for old Mr. Presley. Then it wasn't but a few weeks after he got home from the hospital that I saw him out walking in the yard."

If ever someone has inspired me with faith and determination, it would have to be Bro. Tate Presley!"

Whether it is ninety-five degrees or twenty-five, Brother Presley walks. He works his tiller, lawn mowers and works hard in that garden. My mother admires the beautiful flowers that the Presleys grow in their garden. "There is a variety of various breathtaking flowers there. The flowers around the home and in their garden just make me happy!" she exclaims.

"Last Friday my wife and I passed by the Presley home," says DeWitt Bean, "and there was

Brother Tate out in the rain just getting his walking in!" Bean said he has seen Bro. Presley out in the garden and or walking most any season of the year. DeWitt went on to note, "That old gentleman knows what he is doing, rain or shine, he is an inspiration to anybody who sees him just easing along his way!"

As I entered the house that day, Brother Presley met me at the door with a firm handshake from that once debilitated hand. He had walked two and a half miles that cold January evening. "I usually try to walk five but today was just too cold!" he said. (That blustery day was tough for me walking too and I am fifty years younger than Rev. Presley!) We sat around the kitchen table with a cup of potato soup followed by a cup of coffee. Mr. Presley talked in a clear distinct voice. The couple sat together in that warm little home reminiscing over their life together. They had been blessed with many gifts from the Lord. Still, when I asked if there were any regrets, Bro. Presley spoke right up saying, "Just one, for me anyway, I just wish I had surrendered my life to the Lord before I did and the same goes with fighting the call to preach."

Both the Presley children are active in their church work. Hugh Van Presley has spent six summers in domestic and foreign mission work. He plans to continue this work as God leads him. Hugh Van serves as a Deacon at Iuka Baptist and serves in the Church Brotherhood and in a number of other capacities. Charlotte Presley Swimmer and husband Charles are also active in Iuka Baptist Church. For several years, the couple has worked with the three and four year olds after the children's sermon is given in the Sunday morning worship service. The Presleys have four grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

"We all put off doing something in life," says Mrs. Presley. Her husband laughs, "I think God calls everyone to do something in life. Farmers, preachers (then looking at me and smiling) Chris, I'm looking at a man I am sure he has called to be a writer." It is true that we are all here for a

reason. Brother Tate and Vetress Presley are fine examples of how anyone can be called and used by God at any age, anytime!

He went on to say that he had learned a valuable lesson from his life experience that "God doesn't put more on any of us than we can bare." He also believes that "We must do our part and God is gonna sure bless you ten times over!" he says. Rev. Presley went on to say, "That is why I just turned it over to him when I had the stroke. I wasn't gonna fight His will. I had to save my strength and ask the Lord for His to give me the help to fight back . . . and HE DID! That's why I made it . . . simply with HIM walking every step with me!"

As I started to leave, the Reverend made one final point to give us advice, not only to procrastinate but to everyone who has put off making a decision or doing something they knew they should go on and do. Emergency Appeal For Blood Donors

Shelves at the blood center remain empty while hospital blood orders keep stacking up. The ice storm, the holiday season and a lack of blood drives have left the blood center without the blood needed to fill outstanding hospital orders. "Our daily blood donations do not meet daily patient blood needs," said Kendal Summers, blood center spokesperson. "First the ice cancelled blood drives and then experienced historically low blood collections. Meeting patient needs during this eventually depleted our reserves. Early January blood collections continue to fall short of

meeting daily patient blood needs."

With hospital orders piling up, Summers said the little blood that is available is quickly rationed among those needing it most. With most regions of the country suffering blood shortages, United Blood Services has few options available.

"Our first plan is to make this emergency appeal for blood donations," continued Summers. "If we do not collect 700 units over the next week, we could face

more difficult choices. If blood donations do not increase elective surgeries may have to be

postponed or delayed."

Blood donors are needed in the Tupelo and Florence, Alabama blood centers as well as at

upcoming blood drives. The blood center is also appealing to companies, churches and civic groups to pledge to send 10 employees or members to donate at the blood center this week. United Blood Services, on the North Mississippi Medical Center Campus at 4326 S. Eason Boulevard will be accepting donations during the following days and hours: Monday, Tuesday & Thursday: 11:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. and Wednesday and Friday: 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.

Blood drives will be held in these locations: Wednesday, January 13th at Belmont Homes from 7:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. and Friday, January 15th at Iuka Walmart from 3:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

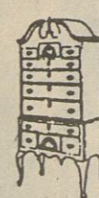

Happy New Year! I hope everyone enjoyed the holidays as much as I did. I received a letter from Mrs. Virginia (Alexander) Gentile of Baton Rouge, La. but due to the holiday rush of mail, it wasn't received in time for the Christmas issue of the paper. Following is her letter:

"I am writing in response to an article that was reprinted in a recent issue of Old Tishomingo Traces. It was written by Mrs. Sturlon (Faudie Tigner) Alexander in January 1934 to note the anniversary of Dr. Alfred Franklin Whitehurst' untimely death (on December 19, 1933). She was 21 years old at the time of the article and I was 21 months. To be so young, she wrote with incredible insight and wisdom. I heard her tell many times how much she respected and appreciated Dr. Whitehurst. She described him as respectful, kind, empathetic and spiritual.

He died at my mother's bedside having just completed an operation on her. He was cleaning his instruments and sharing his faith with her just before he laid his head on her bed (and died). My mother admired him so much that she named her second born child after him - Franklin (Buck) Alexander.

I was overcome with emotion when I read the article. As many of you may not be aware, my mother chose Christmas Day to join her wonderful doctor. If you keep hogs in Iuka, be sure you comply with and ordinance on the statute book which requires sixteen feet square and that kept clean, for each hog. Do not put them off in the remotest part of your premises at the door of that residence just across the street, but near your own family, and hear the complaint.

Do not throw away tin cans until you have opened both ends or leave open anything else that will hold water. Salt or coal oil at frequent intervals, all water barrels or tanks that are not properly screened, thereby aiding us in our fight against that on

Northeast Mississippi Community College Looks Toward the Twenty-First Century

Northeast Mississippi Community College's Board of Trustees has adopted a ten-year master plan for the school's expansion from 1999 to 2009 that "will catapult Northeast into the twenty-first century," according to Joe M. Childers, president of the college.

Staub, Robison, and Williams Architects of Tupelo presented the plans at the November board meeting.

"We already have a very attractive, safe and well-planned campus," Childers said. "We are fortunate that most of our existing facilities have already been modernized with new roofs, new mechanical systems and technological renovations."

Dr. Johnny Allen, dean of instruction at Northeast and campus expansion coordinator added that there will be major changes in the campus during the next 10 years. Five new buildings are planned; two will be razed along with several older buildings not currently functional; parking lots will be added, and traffic will be rerouted in several areas. "These new additions will make it possible to increase both the faculty and student body," Allen said.

"The plan will also allow us to capitalize on a solid infrastructure."

"We expect an increase in student population of at least 1000 during the next ten years and to accommodate them, we must expand. Our students and faculty deserve to work and study in modern, attractive surroundings."

According to Allen, students today "demand certain things from their colleges; quality faculty, program selections, technology, and safe, modern surroundings."

"Northeast already leads in these areas. Our proposed design will simply push us further ahead of other colleges."

"This plan may sound like a dream - but it is a dream that can come true!"

Northeast recently acquired 7.7 acres adjacent to the east side of the campus (former location of Brown Show Company). A 160,000 square foot coliseum and performing arts center will be constructed on that site. Forty thousand square feet of the facility will house the Division of Fine Arts. A 2,000-seat performing arts theater is included in the design. The 7000-seat coliseum area will also house dressing rooms for athletic teams and concessions. Additional parking will also be added.

When vacated by the Fine Arts Division, Hines Hall will become a part of the math/science

complex. McCoy Hall, the college's mathematics/science facility completed in 1993, is already "bursting at the seams," Allen said, "so this extra space is already needed."

Bonner Arnold Coliseum will be utilized for activities now held in the Burgess Activity Center. Burgess will be removed and, in this location, a new 50,000-square foot Business/Business Technology Facility will be constructed. Gordon Hall, the current home of the business division will be utilized for expanded technology programs.

According to Allen, a new administration building is planned for construction on the site of the current Tiger Den, a small restaurant operated by the college. Stringer Hall, which currently houses administrative offices, will become a part of the Library complex, which is "always in need of more space," Allen added. A court yard with an enclosed walkway is planned for connecting Eula Dees Library and Stringer Hall.

Estes Hall, which currently houses a variety of student affairs offices, will be razed. Student affairs will be housed in a new facility to be adjoined to the east end of the Frank Haney Union. This new building will allow for

expansion of the current cafeteria services as well.

A sports complex is planned for construction at the north end of Thomas D. Keenum Stadium. Included in the 34,000 square foot structure will be dressing quarters for both Northeast teams and visitors, dormitory rooms for athletes, a fitness/conditioning center for athletes, a student lounge and classrooms. The "Tiger Clubhouse" will house a small cafeteria and gift shop.

"This is a facility that we have been needing for quite sometime," Allen added.

Construction will begin in December on a 37,000 square foot allied health complex. The building will house the Division of Associate Degree Nursing and the Dental Hygiene Technology program and will connect Wright Hall and Hargett Hall, two existing facilities. Financing will come from \$2 million generated from a bond issue to be repaid over 10 years from existing county improvement appropriations. The remainder will come from reserve funds already on hand.

"Our state is currently in a financial position to make an investment that will produce positive outcomes well into the next century," Allen said. He added that the total cost of the 10-year project is between \$30-\$35 million.

Tishomingo County School Board appointed Terry King as TCHS principal.

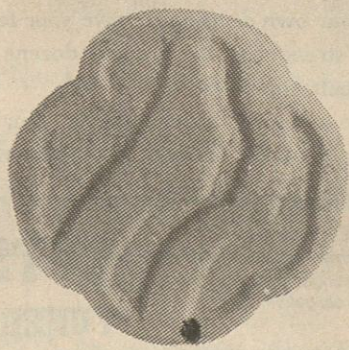
July

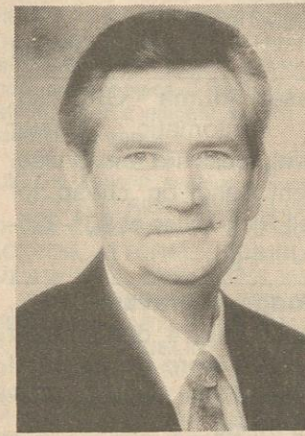

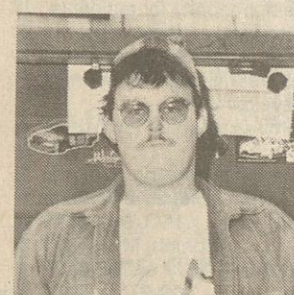

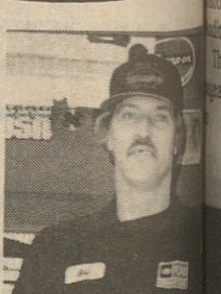
