Qualifying Deadline Mar Those Who Wish To Run

Secretary of State Eric Clark reminds all potential candidates that Monday, March 1, at 5 p.m. is the deadline to qualify to run for office in 1999.

"All candidates must submit qualifying materials with the appropriate office [locally, the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's Office] by 5 p.m. on March 1," Clark said. "Our job is to help the parties be aware of the law, so that all candidates are treated fairly."

Party candidates for statewide, state district, or multicounty offices qualify with their representative state parties. Independent candidates for multicounty office qualify with the Secretary of State's Office.

Both Independent and party candidates for single county or county district office (such as Supervisor and Legislators representing all or part of a single county) qualify with their county

Circuit Clerk.

The Secretary of State's Office will be compiling a comprehensive list of candidates for public distribution as soon as possible after the deadline.

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Official sample ballots for primary and run-off elections are prepared by the parties. Any question regarding a candidate's qualifications for office are ruled by the party's state executive committee.

After the parties have determined their nominees, the State Board of Election Commissioners, comprised of the Governor, Secretary of State, and Attorney General, will set the official sample ballot for the Nov. 2 general election.

Independent candidates and nominees of political parties that do not conduct primaries will automatically appear on the general election ballot.

Will Play Eastside Friday Night, 6:30, in Lafayette County Gym in Oxford

After a decisive win over the Itawamba Indians on Friday night (47-21), the Lady Braves began North Half play at home on Monday evening with a thrilling game against the Oxford Lady Chargers.

The Lady Braves, #6 in the Daily Journal rankings, defeated the #2 ranked Lady Chargers who have won three consecutive State Championships.

Monday night's game against Oxford was described as "one of the best ever games played at TCHS". At the end of the first quarter, the Lady Braves were down 12-4. By the end of the second quarter, the Braves were still behind 21-16 and the third quarter ended with Tishomingo County again down

31-30. The fourth quarter saw a fight to the finish with Tishomingo County scoring 19 and Oxford 16 points with a final score TC 49 - Oxford 47.

In the fast-paced fourth quarter, Oxford's Beth Barnes made a 3-pointer to tie the game 47-47 with 44 seconds left on the clock.

Tishomingo County's Carol Anne Emmons counted with a hook shot and a free-throw to bring the Lady Braves up to 47-44.

Oxford's LaShonda Joy provided fireworks with a 3-pointer to again tie the game with only 10 seconds left. Lady Brave Brooke Gentsch then took control for a full-court-drive to the home goal. She laid the ball up for the winning goal.

Braves Coach Larry Johnson says he is really thrilled to be one of the 8 teams left on the road to state by breaking the 4A premier team of Oxford. Coach Johnson said the Lady Braves struggled some offensively but made up for it with great defensive play. He also commented on the clutch free-throw shooting by the entire team.

For the Lady Braves, Brooke Gentsch had 16 and Brigitte Parsons had 10. In double figures for Oxford Meg Banahan had 16 and Jasmyne Searcy had 11.

The Lady Braves encourage their fans to follow them to Lafayette County this Friday night where they will take on Cleveland Eastside at 6:30.

Tishomingo County School District's Student Transfer Policy and Procedures

Student transfer policy (adopted 4/25/95) - It is the desire of the School Board of the Tishomingo County School District to provide adequate staffs and facilities for all the students of this district. Therefore, school boundary lines set by the School Board shall be observed by everyone. Present exceptions are those students who were already attending a school out of the boundary lines during the 1994-95 school year. This policy also permits an exception for younger children in a family where an older brother or sister in grades one through eight is already attending an out of boundary school during the 1994-95 school year and the parents/guardians request a transfer for the younger child to attend this same school and/or boundary zone. No other exceptions will be made by the School Board except in very

unusual circumstances. II. Procedures for requesting a school transfer -

A. A parent/guardian of the child must complete a Request For School Transfer form completely and honestly. Incomplete and/or incorrect information will lead to denial of this request.

B. The Request for School Transfer form must be submitted by April 30 to the:

accepted after April 30. D. At the first regularly scheduled meeting in June (second Monday), after student registration numbers have been compiled, the Board of Education will review each written request for school transfer and will

approve or reject each request with a majority vote.

E. You will be promptly notified in writing of the Board's decision.

F. If your request is denied and you wish to appeal to the Board, you must contact the Office of the Superintendent of Education by 12:00 noon on Thursday prior to the fourth Monday in June.

G. Failure to contact the Office of the Superintendent by 12:00 noon Thursday prior to the fourth Monday in June will cause forfeiture of your opportunity to appeal.

H. Each party appearing before the Board to appeal will be allowed one spokesperson who will be granted five minutes to present his or her appeal.

I. No appeals before the Board will be heard after the fourth Monday in June.

What Is The Master Gardener **Program?**

The concept of the Master Gardener Program is basically to get in-depth information to individuals and at the same time recruit some volunteers for the Extension Service. What do you get? forty hours of quality classroom instruction in home horticulture will be taught. What do we get? When you complete the training program, you will be identified as a Master Gardener volunteer Intern. You will be required to teach or work forty hours near your locale under the guidance of County Extension Personnel. This could be helping with a worshop or just answering the telephone on horticulture questions. When this is completed, you will be certified by the Mississippi State University Extension Service as Master Gardeners. There will be a course taught in Lee County beginning March 11th and going for 10 weeks. If you are interested in attending please contact Nat Dean at 841-9000. Extension Office at 423-7016. **Forage Fertilization**

When fields dry and temperatures warm up, then it is time to fertilize and get some new growth from cool season grass crops. If you applied enough phosphate and potash at planting then you only need to add nitrogen. Winter annual grasses can use about one pound of actual nitrogen per acre for each day of grazing. Broadcast the nitrogen when the grass is grazed down.

There are several sources of available nitrogen and several methods of application. The solid 45 percent urea or the 34 percent ammonium nitrate granules may be better choices because they are designed to fall to the soil surface but liquids can be equally, effective. You can lose some of the liquid nitrogen but this may be more economical if you plan to include weed control chemicals such as 2,4-D. It could save an extra trip over the field and help clean up problem weeds such as yellow flowered buttercup.

Color Vision

There are only three types of color pigments in the retina of the human eye. They are blue, green and red. The eye is such a amazing instrument, that any color, shade, or hue can be seen by mixing these three colors. It seems that any and every sensation of color can be obtained by some combination of the three primary pigments.

The full range of color is not available to us over the entire field of our vision. Beyond about 30 degrees the colors red and green become indistinguishable. In the far periphery of the retina, only a few color receptor cones exist and all color sense is lost. Although peripheral vision can detect motion, it is incapable of picking up color. When a red object is slowly brought into the visual field from the periphery, the observer is first aware of a colorless object. As the red object advances in front, it appears pink or yellow and eventually red.

Our visual acuity is poorest in blue light because we have few blue receptors. In red or green light, visual sensitivity is more acute.

Old Tishomingo Traces By: June Bullard

THE VIDETTE July 4, 1929: June 18, 1929 Your Honor the Mayor Iuka, Miss. Dear Sir:

I am interested to learn if anyone in Iuka remembers the following incident. Some four or five years ago Mr. Thomas A. Edison told me that at one time he was taken off the train at Iuka suffering from a severe attack of typhoid fever. I think this happened in the early 1870's. He stated that he came very near dying and but for the kindly administrations of some good people in Iuka he would have died. He naturally had a kindly feeling in his heart for the town and its inhabitants. This was undoubtedly a milestone in the life of this great man, and it would seem that the world owes his subsequent work to the good people of your town. This instance seems to be of sufficient importance to justify its preservation as a part of history and that is why I am writing at this time







Anyone who is 60 or older, regardless of income, qualifies for the free service, which is partially sponsored by the federal Administration on Aging.

According to a spokesman for Legal Line, three attorneys and a legal assistant will take calls on any legal question. Medicare/ Medicaid questions, consumer issues, domestic relations issues, property questions and health care laws are some of the issues on which they have given legal advice

Since legal advice from an

attorney you hire may cost as much as \$125 per hour, this free service will be a huge benefit for the elderly who do not have the funds to hire an attorney, the spokesman said.

Legal Line can usually handle every legal problem over the phone; however, in some cases they may refer callers to a private attorney who can help them in their specific legal area.

When someone calls Legal Line, he or she will be asked some basic questions including age and statistical information. They will then be passed on to a legal consultant.



Bob and Chris McAlister

Eating at the Norma's Country Cupboard is an experience in Southern Culture. Their Wednesday night breakfast buffet brings out a family atmosphere where folks talk over their meal while a baby is being passed around. It was over these conversations that I was told of Mr. Bob McAlister of Tishomingo.

I was surprised to hear that a man, born and raised in Tishomingo County, had professionally photographed a great deal of twentieth century history over his thirty year career as a Navel Photographer. I was REALLY surprised to learn that McAlister was the official Summer White House Photographer at Newport News, Rhode Island for President John F. Kennedy from 1961-1963. I had to meet this man!

My father drove me way out in the country where Bob McAlister and his wife Chris have a beautiful home overlooking a tributary of Bay Springs Lake. It was a beautiful setting for our interview. There were several scrap books stacked on the kitchen table. As I flipped through them, we began to talk. I started with a little background on the man and

"We were instructed not to enter certain areas in early August of 1945," he says. Hiroshima was bombed August 6 and Nagasaki was bombed three days later on August ninth. "We flew reconnaissance missions photographing the destruction," McAlister recalls. "We had to fly through all that dirt and debris for several days, it made for a nasty, bumpy ride," Bob says. Fortunately, the maps were not needed. Japan surrendered on September 3, 1945. One of McAlister's friends from photography school was on board the Missouri photographing the surrender ceremony. "Here is a photo he sent me that he took." It shows Admiral Haulsy, General MacAurthur and the Japanese representatives signing. Now, Bob just wanted to get home to Tishomingo and marry his girl, Chris. They tied the knot on November 23, 1945.

The Mc Alisters struggled for the first couple of years. Bob worked for Reynolds Aluminum, farmed a bit and worked for sev-

pictures has President Kennedy with wife Jackie who was then noticeably expecting the arrival of their third child, a son they would name Patrick. There was a good friend of Bob McAlisters who had left his cameras on the flight and could not take pictures. He held young Patrick McAlister's hand as the president and first lady passed by. Bob McAlister snapped a picture that had his son, Patrick, President and Mrs. Kennedy and a yet unborn Kennedy child who would also be named Patrick. (Patrick Kennedy died in infancy.)

One of the most memorable events of those three summers was when the America's Cup Sailing Race was held off Newport News. Chief Bob got the call to accompany the president aboard the "Joseph F. Kennedy", named after the president's late brother who had died heroically during the second World War.

"You could see everything

from the deck of that ship," McAlister elaborated. He looked around for other pictures he took of that event then scratching his head, smiled and said, "I guess I have them put away, I had a lot of pictures but the Navy or National Archives kept most of it!"

"I was popular with the other boys in the press corps. They liked to hang out at the Chiefs Club and I could get them in," says McAlister, "See, I was the CHIEF!" McAlister blended in and made the most of every photo opportunity. He took his job seriously and from that, we have pages of pictures from his coverage of Camelot.

There were a number of pictures where Bob and the president were in the picture but McAlister says, he never really spoke with the president in anymore than friendly conversation. To McAlister, this was a job. He never saw it as a witness to history and a chronicler of history through his work. The black and white photos froze in time the images of those seemingly carefree summers while the Cold War, the Bay of Pigs, Cuban Missile Crisis, Civil Rights and other issues burned in the mind of President Kennedy.

Bob Kudsen, the regular White House Chief Photographer, came to visit McAlister a couple of days before McAlister's eighteenth wedding anniversary. While there, Khenutsen asked McAlister to ride along on a junket with the president to Fort Worth, Houston and Dallas. Chief McAlister declined wanting to spend the anniversary with his wife. Kudsen understood saying it was ok. "I'll find a re-

A little sign reads "Bob's Photo Shop" outside the little room attached to the house through an open breezeway. Here, Bob keeps on playing with his film and reproduces old photos. Some of them have been shared by friends but most all of them are from the Chief. He made me a copy of a few pictures I requested. One shot was of Bob and his old Bell and Howell Movie Cameras with McAlister in a sport coat, the tag clearly reads "WHITE HOUSE STAFF 1962." It is now tucked away on the first page of his scrapbook along with his first service I.D.

Another picture he gave me was an old original copy of an early Marilyn Monroe pin-up. (Now, it is one of my prized possessions!) Then, there is another picture of President and Mrs. Kennedy with Patrick McAlister on the sidewalk that was made by his Dad, "ON THE JOB" (I would say "It's a keeper!") There were others of Eisenhower and Admiral Carney, his buddies in photo and gunnery school and a few "trick shots". One of these features his beloved Chris as a tiny doll size sitting on a mug held by her "larger than life" hubby. A stroke held Bob McAlister down for a while but now the seventy-three year-old man enjoys every day back home in Tishomingo. Here, he takes pictures of birds, squirrels, the fish he and Chris catch and special events. He does it just for fun! In the little

sons and many friends who may or may not know all he has been a part of over his lifetime, Bob McAlister has made a difference in his community, his state and his nation as a quiet witness to twentieth century history. He has left a record of these times that were for him, all in a day's work.

"ASK NOT WHAT YOUR COUNTRY CAN DO FOR YOU, ASK WHAT YOU CAN DO FOR YOUR COUNTRY!" exclaimed President Kennedy in his inaugural address. He loved his job and did it without realizing the value of his work. My hero, Robert (Bob) McAlister, asked "How do I get to do that?", and he did get THERE, to serve his country and make his lifetime dreams come true.

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how he got into photography.

"Our place was a mile and a half from where we are now, only it is under Bay Springs now," laughed the seventy three year old man. Bob grew up in the Depression era. He had quit school along with his four brothers to work so the family could eat. When World War II broke out most young men waited for their number to come up in the draft. "I wasn't going to wait on the draft," said McAlister. He laughed, "I decided to beat them to the punch and enlist in the Navy." The young man was shipped to Pensacola Navel Air Station in Florida. Bob said, "I had never been out of Tishomingo County much less thought I would wind up in a place that nice."

Pensacola was the premier Navel photography school in 1943. While on the drill field, McAlister noticed the photographers making pictures and said to a buddy, "That sure looks like a good job, how do I get to do that?." He was assigned to a ground crew for maintaining air craft. Bob made friends easily. One of his buddies managed to get them on the list to finish out a four month class in photography school. This four month program not only required classes in photography but also trained the men as gunners for the planes they would be flying in.

"You couldn't just take pictures when you were up in the planes. If the enemy jumped you it was time to take a gun," notes the old Navel Gunner. He proudly turned to a photo in the scrap book, "I got my flight wings to be part of a B-29 crew in 1944. Here they are pinning them on me," he said proudly pointing to the photo. Next, McAlister was sent to Okinawa to begin arrial mapping of the Japanese mainland. It was quite a large undertaking that took many months. This was done in preparation for a planned invasion of the Japanese mainland by allied forces. "We almost had all the main islands mapped by pictures

eral months at the Ford Motor Plant in Michigan. He went in on a joint photography venture with Shorty DeMorse. Aside from class pictures and photographing sports events, there was not enough business to keep McAlister in the area. It would be tough anywhere in those days. That is why Bob reenlisted in the Navy. He nervously asked his wife what she thought about him going back in. She replied that they, "Had to make a living somehow" and that she supported his decision. Chris recalled how he told her about his plans. "He sat me down and asked if he could go back in the Navy and I said O.K., He was relieved and said "Good! I signed the papers yesterday and got up enough nerve to tell you today!"

With that, the young couple

was off on an adventure to see the world. McAlister had gone through advanced photography school and later would go through film college to learn Cinematography. Their first son, Lonnie, arrived four years later in 1951. He came just before leaving Pensacola. The McAlisters received a dream assignment when the photographer was assigned to Naples, Italy to serve under Admiral Robert E. Carney who was the ranking Navel Officer under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower who was the Supreme Allied commander during the occupation era in war torn Europe. McAlister has a number of pictures of Admiral Carney and many dignitaries such as Eisenhower.

The family moved to Italy from Pensacola when young son, Lonnie, was six months old. He was taken care of by their landlady who doubled as house keeper and enjoyed taking care of the McAlister son. All this help was only two dollars a week, the average pay for an Italian worker who was lucky to get that. After the war, the Italian people looked for any job that would pay a dollar or more a week. This worked out well when

to say the least!" recalls Chris. "That was likely one of my worst overseas assignments, mainly because of the heat."

Bob came back to Pensacola where he had received a two year assignment. While there, son Patrick was born in 1958. The photographer was now a chief petty officer. His luck held out as

he was assigned a new duty in the spring of 1961. Chief Bob McAlister was assigned to Newport News, Rhode Island as a member of the White House Staff. President Kennedy was sworn in January of 1961. McAlister was amazed to learn he was to be the official summer White House Photographer for the president. Hammersmith Farm was made the official summer White House for the Kennedy administration. "I thought I would need all new fancy uniforms for the job so I spent a fortune on them!" laughs the former Chief. It turned out that the Navy wanted McAlister to blend in so he ended up wasting his money on uniforms and had to get some blazers to fit in with the news reporters.

Armed with a sixteen millimeter Bell and Howell moving camera and a thirty-five millimeter for stills, McAlister blended in with the White house press corps. Under Chief White House Photographer, Bob Khenutsen, Chief McAlister covered the first family while in Newport. "I was called to cover the arrivals and departures at the nearby Navel Airfield where the "Caroline", a four motor propeller plane, would carry the first family. Later, the new Air Force One was used as the president's official air craft.

McAlister photographed the president on the runway with heads of state such as the Prime Minister of Pakistan, as well as other dignitaries. There were numerous photographs of the Kennedy's arriving or departing from Mass at the little Catholic Church where the couple had exchanged their vows. One of these

placement for you, there will be other times."

McAlister turns to a picture he took up close of the president smiling as he sat in an open black convertible. "When they told us the president had been shot, well, it was a shock," recalls McAlister. He looks at the pictures of the young man who lost his life that day in Dallas, pictures McAlister himself took. He then said, "I don't think things were ever the same with this country after November 22, 1963. I don't reckon they ever will be."

The chief stayed on at Newport News for another year. While there, an American submarine went down off Newport Sound. The submarine was searched for in over 8000 feet of water with a Navy diving bell. The bell recovered debris that was pulled to the surface and hauled aboard a navy frigate. Photos were taken of the metal as it lay on the deck. The photos were flown to Washington

where the wreckage was officially identified as that of the missing sub. The photo was carried on every major news channel that night. Bob McAlister made that shot.

In 1966, after a total of thirty years of service, Chief Petty Officer Robert "Bob" McAlister retired from the U.S. Navy. While in service, he had earned a G.E.D., two years of college credit and not only took advanced photography and film classes, he had taught them as an instructor at Pensacola. He ended where he started at Pensacola and planned to retire there.

It happened that a cousin of Bob's was an executive with Dixie Gas and Oil and got him a position with the company. This brought the McAlister family home to Tishomingo. As the Chief looks off the deck of his home to the water, it brings back many memories. He is less than a mile from his homeplace which lies under this peaceful reservoir. He retired with thirty years in the Navy and an additional twenty with Dixie Gas.

- 1) Before calling TCEPA, check your fuse or breaker box for blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers. If you don't see any, ask your neighbors if they have lost their power, too.
- 2) When you call to report an outage, be prepared to provide the name on your account, your 911 address (house and road number), and your telephone number.
- 3) In an outage during extreme cold or hot weather, turn off all major electric appliances, and heat or air conditioning. Leave a single light switch turned on so you will know when the problem is solved. Five to ten minutes after power has been restored, you may begin turning on electrical appliances and heating or cooling as necessary.
- 4) Put up a 911 address sign to help us locate you.
- 5) Turn on an outside light after power has been restored so that repair crews will know that their work has been successful.

He changed his looks and improved his grades by 75%. I, as a parent, took a deep breath. I realized that I may not lose my son to the undoing of the world.

Casey was God's definition of humble. There was a child who wrote me and said that everyone made fun of him. But Casey came up to him one day and asked how he was? That child was so taken by Casey's act of caring that he said he hoped he could be as good as Casey. If the love Casey carried in his heart could change one child, look at these students' request. How many of them could we save and maybe show them that all this effort they made to get the football field named for Casey is not in vain.

TCHS needs school spirit! You can make all the "Level 5 School" in the world on paper, but if the

students don't reflect it, you haven't accomplished anything. The football team had less that 25 members this year. The drive to be the best has to come from home to school. We, as parents should want our children to play ball, to be in the band, to do anything that will help them to learn to be better. Then you must support their every effort. Be a member of the Boosters Club, attend games, even the ones far away. You, as a parent, must learn to understand your child and his needs, not what

we think their needs are. I know what football did for my son and the great man it helped him to be in his sixteen years. Please, as a Tishomingo County School parent, I challenge each of you to help these students achieve their goal. the main themes of his sermon concerned the faithfulness of God and their need of being faithful to Him.



The objective of the central purchasing system is to provi reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that purchases are executed in according with state law.

Because of inherent limitations in any central purchasing system and inver control system, errors or irregularities may occur and not be detected. And projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk a procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

The results of our audit procedures disclosed an immaterial instance noncompliance with the aforementioned code sections. This instance noncompliance is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and was a considered in forming our opinion on compliance, which is expressed below

In our opinion, except for the noncompliance referred to above, Tishor County, Mississippi, complied, in all material respects, with state laws gove central purchasing, inventory and bid requirements.

The accompanying schedules of (1) purchases not made from the low bidder, (2) emergency purchases and (3) purchases made noncompetitively from sole source are presented in accordance with Section 31-7-115, Miss.
