Teen-ager Charged In Coleman Park Burglaries

A 13-year-old Collierville, Tenn. resident has been arrested and charged with breaking in to a cabin and buildings in the Coleman Park area.
According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, the teen-ager, who had been staying in a cabin on the weekends, was arrested at approximately 12 p.m. on March 31 for the break-ins.
On March 31 at approximately 1:15 a.m., the teen broke into Bonds Corner Store #2 again at about 11 p.m. on that same day, he broke into the same store, he took money and also used the store's phone to call someone in his hometown of Collierville.

When officers pressed redial on the store's phone, it connected them to the people the boy had contacted. They then told authorities who he was, Smith said.

The juvenile was also charged in three break-ins at the residence of Frank Robbins, County Road 323, where he took money and tools.
Additionally, he was charged with another count of burglary for breaking into Johnny Robinson's Mini Storage at Coleman Park on March 31.

Smith said all of the items taken were found in the teen's possession and were returned. The teen was released into the custody of his parents, but will go to court for the burglary charges in May, Smith said.

"Despite the long hours of work in and out of the office, Margaret June continued her community involvement, especially emphasizing her church work. She never made a distinction between black and white in her professional and personal life. She once said, 'I believe any child is a work of God and every child has a stomach to be fed, a heart that needs love and a soul to be saved for the Lord. It is our duty as Christians and as Americans to tend to all their needs in every way.'"

She was very devoted to her family. From the time her son Jon was big enough to travel, they were almost inseparable. Her husband was pianist for the Iuka Rotary Club for many years. Her husband and Jon were big fans of Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant. When Jon was about 8 years old and a big boy for his age, the following was overhead, one Rotarian to another: "I can just hear the announcer at an Alabama football game in the future." "At right tackle is Jon Riley, and at right guard is his mother."

She encouraged his interest in Civil War re-enacting and went with him as he participated in the Battle Re-enactment's all over the Eastern United States. The highlight of these travels was when they went to Gettysburg, Pa. where Jon participated in the filming of the movie

"Gettysburg."

When Jon went off to college, she and her husband Brad enjoyed trips to Branson, Mo., and Gatlinburg, Tenn., Gatlinburg being their favorite place to visit.

The community, county and state will miss this remarkable woman who dedicated her life to improving the lives of others.

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Thursday, April 1, at the Iuka Baptist Church with the Rev. Jim Manley and the Rev. Ron Plymel officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include her husband, Brad Riley of Iuka; one son, Jon Riley of Iuka; three step daughters, Regina Benedict of Springfield, Ill. and Elaine Riley and Stacy Riley, both of Memphis; one stepson, Alan Riley of Memphis.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Carlton and Clara Woodley.

Pallbearers were James H. Bishop, Douglas Cutshall, James Grisham, Tom Minga, Alvis Murrah and David Thorne.

Honorary pallbearers were the remaining deacons of the Iuka Baptist Church.

Golden Man Charged Abusing 3-Year-Old Boy

A Golden man was arrested on charges of sexually and physically abusing a 3-year-old boy.

Mark A. Anderson, 35 of 600 Doc Ashley Road (located about 4 miles south of Belmont), Golden, was charged Friday, April 2, with sexual battery and child abuse, according to Itawamba County Sheriff Leon Hayes.

An investigation into the matter began when the child was brought into Gilmore Clinic in Fulton, Miss. Clinic staff were told that the child had been injured by jumping on and off a bed. According to Hayes, doctors at the clinic recognized the signs of physical and sexual abuse and alerted authorities.

The child was taken to Le Bonheur Children's Medical Center in Memphis where he was listed in stable condition in the hospital's intensive care unit. Hayes said the child is being

treated for kidney failure and the results of physical and sexual abuse.

Hayes said the boy will most likely be placed in the custody of the Itawamba Department of Human Services after his release from the hospital.

The child abuse investigation by the Itawamba authorities also led to the discovery of two ounces of highly pure crystal methamphetamines at Anderson's home, Sheriff Hayes said.

Mark Anderson and another suspect, Jessica Lewis, 19, also of 600 Doc Ashley Road, Golden, were charged with possession of crystal methamphetamine with intent to distribute.

The drugs were estimated to have a street value of approximately \$6,000, Hayes confirmed.

Anderson remained in custody at press time under a \$500,000 bond. Lewis was released on \$100,000 bond.

Funeral Services Held For Mr. E.C. Holtsford

Funeral services for Eugene Clifford Holtsford, 85, were held Friday, April 2, at 1 p.m. at Cutshall Funeral Home. Lance Foster, minister of the Iuka Church of Christ officiated. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Serving as pallbearers were Coy Dailey, Tom Davenport, Sam Hampton, Neal Harwell, Bill Mathis, and David Nichols.

Mr. Holtsford was a retired newspaper man, former owner of *The Vidette-Belmont-Tri-County News*. He died on Wednesday, March 31, 1999 at Magnolia Regional Health Center.

A native of Lawrence County, Tenn., he and his family came to Iuka in 1951 from Florence, Ala. where he was a Linotype operator for the *Florence Times/Tri-Cities Daily*. Prior to that he was employed by the *Daily News Journal* in Murfreesboro, Tenn. He began his career in the newspaper business in Lawrenceburg, Tenn. at the *Lawrence County Democrat Union*.

In 1960 he established WVOM-AM, 1270 the first radio station in Tishomingo County.

After selling the newspaper and radio station in Iuka in the late 60s, he purchased what is now WADI FM 95.3 in Corinth and operated it until 1978. In addition, Mr. Holtsford, always with his wife as his partner, owned Goat Island Marina, the Iuka Tire Store and the Shoe Shop.

He was a member of the Iuka



Church of Christ.

Mr. Holtsford was a veteran of World War II serving in the Seabees, a division of the U.S. Navy.

He was the recipient of the Conservation Communications Award from the Mississippi Wildlife Federation and the National Wildlife Association. He served on the governor's staff as an honorary colonel for Paul B. Johnson, Ross Barnett, J.P. Coleman and John Bell Williams.

He is survived by his wife of 58 years, Lillie Christine Holtsford of Iuka; three daughters, Judy Green of Ocala, Fla., V. Anne Holtsford of Madison, and Bennie H. McBride of Iuka; a brother, Troy Holtsford of Corinth; three grandchildren, Beth Coleman Brock of Memphis, Tenn., David Coleman, Jr., of Ocala, Fla., and Lily McBride of Iuka; and one great-grandson, Tucker W. Brock of Memphis.

Home Economics Tips

Asthma & Allergy Strategies Reducing Allergens In Living Areas

When a family member has asthma or allergies, keeping the common living areas free of allergens presents some special challenges. Carpets and upholstered furniture are breeding grounds for allergens and hard surfaces are dust catchers. Routine cleaning, using the following tips will help keep allergies and asthma under control.

Because small children crawl and play on the floor, it's here that allergen control begins. If possible, minimize the amount of carpet in living areas. Vinyl or wood flooring and area rugs are better choices than wall-to-wall carpeting. Mats or small area rugs placed in front of all entryways will protect the flooring; collect dirt, dust, pollen and other allergens brought in from the outside; and help prevent them from spreading to other areas. Regularly shake these rugs outdoors, away from open windows. Launder them weekly to remove dust/dust mites, animal dander, pollen and mold spores.

Carpets, pillows, draperies, and upholstered furniture should be thoroughly vacuumed at least once a week - more often during allergy season or if there are pets in the household. Vacuum against the carpet's nap, going over each area at least six to eight times.

It's best to have someone other than the allergic person do the vacuuming. Since vacuuming will stir up some dust, anyone allergic to the allergens in dust should avoid the newly vacuumed area for 30 minutes. If the allergy sufferer must do the vacuuming, a disposable dust mask will help reduce the breathing in of airborne allergens. Eye protectors, such as swimming goggles, will help those with eye allergies.

Consider purchasing a vacuum with special allergen-control features. These new models look and work on differently than any other canister or upright. However, they use either a HEPA (High Efficiency Particulate Air) filter in addition to

regular bags or dust bins, or special multi-layered bags that retain allergens. They may also have exhaust filters. If a new vacuum is not in the budget, existing cleaners can be upgraded with multi-layer bags and exhaust filters. HEPA filters may also be available for central vacuum systems. Check with the system's manufacturer.

If a carpet is wet-cleaned, be sure it dries completely within 24 hours. Otherwise, it can become an indoor allergen source. Damp carpets are breeding grounds for molds, yeasts and bacteria, which produce odors and airborne allergens. A "musty," "moldy," "mildewy" odor is a definite indication that this type of problem is occurring. It's best to use a professional carpet cleaner who is trained and certified and uses quality equipment. However, if the wet cleaning is a do-it-yourself project, be sure the purchased or rented equipment can effectively remove excess water and, carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions.

Clean vinyl or ceramic tile floors weekly, using a floor cleaner or a nonabrasive, all-purpose cleaner. To avoid a cloudy floor, rinse it well after

each cleaning or use a no-rinse product. Wood floors should be vacuumed first to remove the surface dirt, then cleaned with a wood floor cleaner. Spills should be wiped up, using a clean, damp paper towel, sponge or cloth, as soon as they occur. If using a water cleaning solution, wipe up any excess liquid. Water left standing on wood can seep through any nicks and scratches in the finish. This may cause the floor to warp and discolor.

Cataracts Linked To Smoking

Smoking at least one pack of cigarettes a day increases the risk of developing cataracts (the leading cause of blindness), by as much as two to threefold according to a study done by Harvard Medical School. The data suggests that smoking accounts for 200,000 of the 1 million cataract operations performed annually in the U.S.A. The bottom line is that it appears that cataracts can be added to the list of adverse health effects of cigarette smoking.

Surgical removal of cataracts - cloudy areas in the crystalline lens of the eye - is the most common procedure that Medicare covers. By age 75, nearly half of all adults have this problem.

The mechanism by which smoking causes cataracts is still a mystery. While it is possible that exposure to smoky air is involved, a more favored theory is that chemicals in cigarette smoke diminish blood levels of nutrients that guard against damage by oxygen-hungry substances called free radicals.

Solving the "Sensitive Teeth" Problem

Sensitivity can be caused by a number of different situations, such as eating ice cream, drinking hot coffee or brushing your teeth. It may also mean that you have hypersensitive (excessively sensitive) teeth. We can help determine the cause and rule out any underlying dental problems such as a cavity, tooth grinding, a degenerating nerve, a fractured tooth or toothbrush abrasion.

Hypersensitivity is common and usually results when the dentin, the tooth layer under enamel, is exposed. Microscopic tubules found in dentin are then open to such irritations as heat, cold or acidic foods. Overzealous brushing or constant tooth grinding thins the enamel and may be responsible for the excess sensitivity.

Hypersensitivity usually decreases or disappears later in life as the tubules narrow. Desensitizing toothpastes contain compounds such as strontium chloride which seals the dentin tubules or potassium chloride, which appears to block the transmission of pain through the nerves. These toothpastes are usually used for a limited time and generally require a number of applications before they are effective. Ask our office about their use.

The dentin tubules can also be covered by sealants (plastic materials that are painted onto the tooth surface) and resins (tooth-colored restorative materials). Fluoride treatments can also reduce or eliminate sensitivity. We would be happy to discuss options available to help you reduce tooth sensitivity.

Poisonous Plants (Continued)

- Oleander
- Peach (pits), Peony, Periwinkle, Philodendron, Pimpernet, Poinciana, Poison Ivy, Poison Oak, Pokeweed, Poppy, Potato, Precatory Bean, Common Privet
- Rhododendron, Rhubarb, Rosary Pea, Rubber Plant
- Scotch Broom, Chink Cabbage, Snowdrops, Snow on the Mountain, Staggerweed, Star of Bethlehem, Sweetpea
- Tansy Mustard, Tobacco, Tomato, Tulip, Tung Tree, Virginia Creeper, Water Hemlock, Weeping Fib, Wild Cali, Wisteria Yews (ex. Japanese Yew, English Yew, Western Yew, American Yew)

• Garden Poisons: An important non-plant in the garden can be insecticides, fertilizers and slug repellents. It's best to avoid putting slug repellents in the yard especially in pelleted form. If you need to use slug baits, try a powdered form that's less likely to be ingested by a pet. When applying fertilizers, water them well, so the chemical sinks into the soil instead of staying on the surface. And it's a good idea to keep your pet out of an area that's been recently treated with an insecticide or liquid fertilizer. Wait until the area dries before letting your pet into the yard.

• If you see any signs of salivation, incoordination, muscle tremor, vomiting or diarrhea, your pet may have eaten a poisonous plant or ingested a harmful chemical. If you suspect that's the case, take your animal to your veterinarian immediately. If possible, take the plant or chemical with you to help your vet identify the exact cause of the problem.

• Garden Plants: Some pet owners find that it's a constant battle to keep the pets from bedding down or digging in the flower beds. Not to mention, many plants will eventually die if your dog routinely urinates on them, because of this, a lot of homeowners erect fences. Another trick is to place a piece of treated lattice over your flower bed. The flowers will grow through it and your animals won't be able to dig in the soil below. Others plant barrier hedges, using spiny plants like Prickly Pear, Yucca, Tea Olive, Barberry, Cunninghamia, Mahonia (commonly called Oregon Holly-Grape), Shrub Roses and Pyracantha.

• There are some plants you could use-in-your garden that are very hardy and virtually indestructible. Try ground covers like Liriope (commonly called Lilyturf), Mondo Grass, Creeping Juniper or Pachysandra. Avoid shallow-rooted ground covers like Ajuga (commonly called Bugleflower) or shrubs like Cotoneaster.

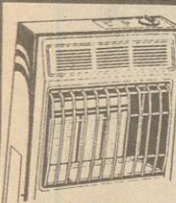

The Bandstand

The original bandstand at Mineral Springs Park was probably built sometime after the Civil War. Concerts were given during the spring and summer months on Friday and Saturday nights. The old structure stood on the same location as the current bandstand.

It is said that a number of political speakings took place on the bandstand stage including speeches by local Governors John M. Stone and Robert Lowery as well as later figures such as Theodore G. Bilbo and Gov. Fielding Wright.

One of the best recollections of the "Good Old Days" in the bandstands hey day was given by Mr. C.B. Reid in 1986. Mr. Reid was a trumpet soloist for the professional players who performed on the bandstand in the early part of the century. Mr. Reid said his best memory of the park while playing in the band was the evening he met his future wife. He said he saw her out of the corner of his eye. While playing, he kept his

eye on the lovely visitor who had come to the resort area with family on a vacation. He couldn't wait for a break to introduce himself. That break marked the beginning of a long and wonderful marriage. Mr. Reid played with the band for a number of years.

Other names of band members that come to mind from this era were Mose Luker, Mike Scruggs and a Mr. Foote. Though there were others, their names have faded with the music in time yet we can imagine their sweet melodies.

The Iuka High School band would perform a number of concerts through the years. Mrs. Zelma Allen recalls, "I can still remember when Betty Jourdan (Brown) was the drum major. She would lead the marching band from the school to the bandstand to put on a good show!" Some Gospel singings and country acts are said to have played in the park from time to time.

Due to deterioration and vandalism, the old bandstand was torn down in the late 1950's. For over twenty years the lot was

vacant. In a joint effort, State Senator Cecil Summers and Representative Richard O. Clark raised \$50,000 for the new bandstand and a tennis court projects in the late 1970's. The funds were allocated through the Mississippi State Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

A number of community volunteers helped with the bandstand project. It was dedicated in 1980. The multi-purpose stage is still used for numerous functions today. It is also a reminder of yesteryears when people waltzed to the music of the springs or danced to the melody of "The Tishomingo Blues" and maybe, like Mr. and Mrs. C.B. Reid, fell in love.

It is written that "Music quenches the thirst of happiness". One could come to this hallowed ground in years past and have their thirst satisfied both in body and in spirit.

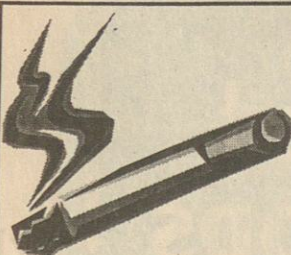

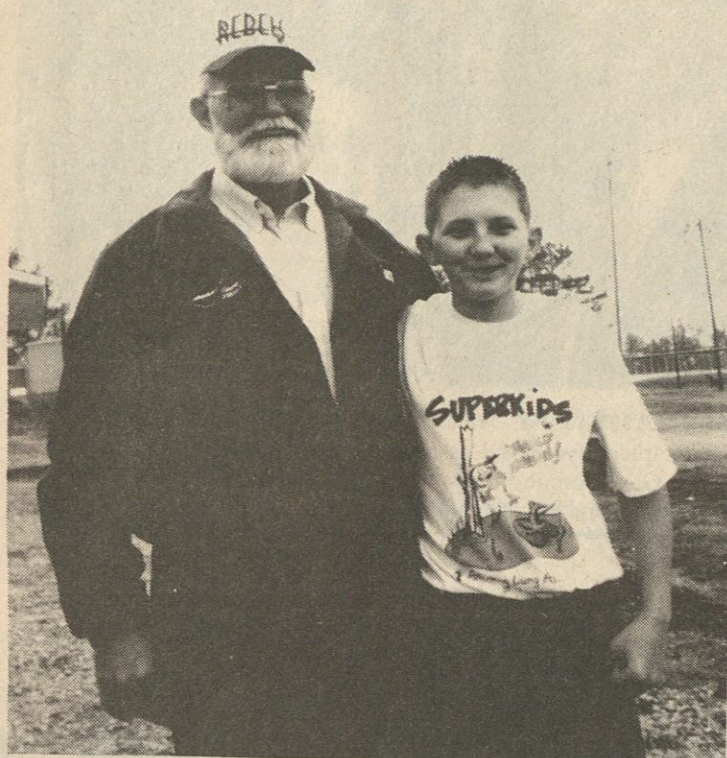

Mr. Hancock and his family are slated to be on hand for the ribbon cutting, along with a host of city, county and Red Cross officials. Joining these luminaries will be many Red Cross volunteers, class instructors, and many other Red Cross supporters who are committed to "Building for your Red Cross future."

"Our goal is \$200,000.00," said Leslie Posey, Executive Director of the Northeast Mississippi Chapter of the American Red Cross. "We are so fortunate to have so many excellent volunteers who have helped us grow over the past few years. But, really, we have simply outgrown our space at the Create building. We just need more space to be ready for the future. I feel that with the leadership of people like General Sam Fleming, we will reach our goal quickly."

Dr. Jeff Houin, chairman of the Capital Campaign Public Relations Committee feels that the media is so important to helping the Red Cross achieve its goal. "People probably don't realize how important the Red Cross is until they need help," Houin said. "Our Red Cross has always been there for our community. Now we need our community's support to prepare for the future." James Murphy Thomas said it best back in 1936 when speaking of the famous Tupelo Tornado: "Whenever a donation is asked for Red Cross, give and you will know that you are giving to the greatest organization (other than the church) in America. You've got to hand it to them - no red tape, no delay. They are on the job. I never appreciated the Red Cross as much as I should but believe me I have found them out."

American Red Cross of Northeast Mississippi

American Red Cross of Northeast Mississippi perceives itself as a service delivery unit dedicated to making services available to all citizens of Lee, Itawamba, Prentiss and Pontotoc county and other areas touching us but not covered by another Red Cross Chapter. By federal mandate, we must aid victims of disaster and provide emergency communication between servicemen of this area and their families.

Aid to victims of disaster

begins with disaster preparedness. We offer assistance to citizens through detailed brochures, how to develop a family plan in the event of a disaster and facts regarding specific types of disaster.

In the event of a major disaster, we stand ready to provide temporary housing, food, and medical emergency care. A medical emergency could be the loss of ones prescription eye glasses or dentures due to a disaster. Assistance can be provided to replace household belongings, clothes, etc. Shelters will be staffed by trained Red Cross volunteers. If there is a need, following a disaster for mental health counseling, this will be offered by trained Red Cross volunteers.

This chapter regularly offers classes to train volunteers in shelter management, damage assessment, Mass care (feeding), health services, etc. We recruit volunteers on an on-going basis to be trained.

A disaster may be a one-family house fire. We are able to give some financial assistance to persons who request it. (They must present a fire report). Average financial assistance per family at this time is \$250.00. Vouchers are given to be used for emergency supplies such as food, clothing, personal care items, etc. We look forward to reaching a financial position that will enable us to give a larger amount and to more people. Due to a lack of funds, we are unable to widely market this service. We would like to make fore assistance available to every person who suffers such a loss.

The American Red Cross plan is for each chapter to respond to local emergencies and provide whatever is needed to ensure victims of disaster safety from harm, shelter, and food. When local resources are depleted (money, manpower, equipment) help will be provided from the

state level and the national level until this area is back on its feet.

American Red Cross is the only source that the United States Armed Forces relies upon to validate information regarding illness, death, births or other emergencies. At times we may make arrangements to get a service person home for an emergency illness. At other times we may just inform of a birth. We can arrange loans through the

Armed Forces. The Red Cross does not loan money - we do the paperwork and phone calls to make it happen for our service person.

American Red Cross offers courses in First Aid and CPR, Swimming, Life Guarding, HIV/Aids prevention, Blood Borne Pathogens and Babysitting. We charge a small fee for First Aid & CPR to cover the cost of books, manikins, replaceable lungs, and cleaning supplies. The small amount of profit we make goes into our general fund. To help offset office operating expenses and the fire assistance program. We compete with Emergency Medical services for First Aid and CPR courses. They offer it free to the public, but are subsidized by the city and county with tax funds. We are able to compete because of the quality and comprehensive course that we teach.

We are currently in a "building" mode as regards to our board, staff and service delivery. We recently lost two board members, who were part of the Executive Committee, to United Way positions. We are seeking qualified persons to fill vacancies. We hired a new Executive Director on January 15, 1996. She is daily gaining strength and the Board is very pleased with her. We hired a part-time employee, who started on April 1, 1996. She is working out well.

We are currently updating our Disaster Plan. Review and update of the plan is ongoing. We look and coordinate with Civil Defense and 911 Services. When a disaster strikes, we will respond. Our goal is to alleviate suffering of the victim as quickly and effectively as possible.

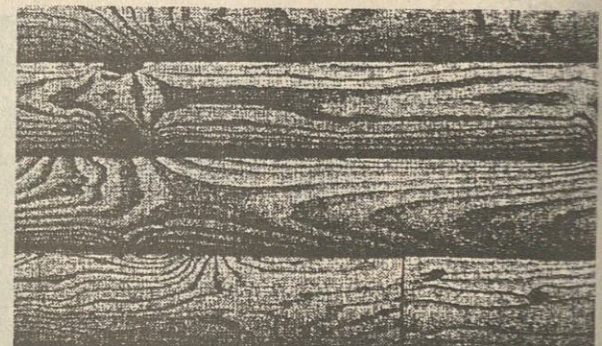

During power outages, here are some suggestions to assist TCEPA employees in restoring your service:

- 1) Before calling TCEPA, check your fuse or breaker box for blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers. If you don't see any, ask your neighbors if they have lost their power, too.
- 2) When you call to report an outage, be prepared to provide the name on your account, your 911 address (house and road number), and your telephone number.
- 3) In an outage during extreme cold or hot weather, turn off all major electric appliances, and heat or air conditioning. Leave a single light switch turned on so you will know when the problem is solved. Five to ten minutes after power has been restored, you may begin turning on electrical appliances and heating or cooling as necessary.
- 4) Put up a 911 address sign to help us locate you.
- 5) Turn on an outside light after power has been restored so that repair crews will know that their work has been successful.

The civilian labor force for Tishomingo County numbered 9,270, 80 less than January and 40 less than February of last year. Approximately 8,380 Tishomingo County residents held jobs while 890 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 2,850 and nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,380.

Verse 3: Grace by with you, mercy and peace, from God the Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father. In truth and love. The only time this expression is used. It emphasizes that Jesus is not the Father, but the Son of the Father. John 1:14, 18, 3:16. The incarnation is the very foundation of Christianity.

Central Truth for this lesson: Willingly submit to scriptural practices.

Bro. John sang: The Old Rugged Cross, then took his message from Mark 15: 12-26. Jesus condemned. The chief Priests held a consultation with the elders, scribes, and the whole council. They bound Jesus and carried Him to Pilate,

Pilate knew Jesus was innocent but he feared the people. A murderer called Barabas was released. They gave him his freedom instead of Jesus. By this you can see how far these people would go to get rid of Jesus. Pilate asked them what they wanted him to do to Jesus, and all they would say was, "Crucify Him". And it was so.

Sunday night we sure had a good lesson in Revelation. We went through the first resurrection and some of the millennium. We will go into the second resurrection and the final judgment of the wicked dead. There won't be any of God's people there, just the unsaved. Revelations 20:6. Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power. Amen! But they shall be Priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with Him a thousand years. Be sure you are saved.

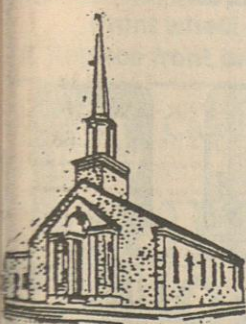

Gallant Civil War Soldiers Fell At Iuka

Of the 263 Confederates buried in a trench at Shady Grove Cemetery and others buried in shallow graves where they fell, there are a few who have been identified from microfilm, published books and correspondence from relatives. A few Union soldiers are listed.

The following are from microfilm: Capt. Coleman, Co. B 40th Miss. Regt., killed; Sergt. Daniel Gibson, Co. E 17th Ark. Inf. A talk with a relative says he was from Cincinnati, Washington Co., Ark. His brother, of Co. B., brought home his left revolver after Daniel was killed at Iuka; Pvt. S.L. Connally, Co. E 17th

Regt. Ark. Inf., killed; Capt. Green, 3rd Cav. Regt., killed. As he rose he said "steady boys, steady", he was decapitated by a cannon ball; Lieut. Hannah Odell and Ingraham, 3rd Texas Cav. Regt., killed. Lieut. Ingraham rose to stop one man from retreating and was cut down by grape shot; Lieut. B.B. Coffee, 1st Texas Legion, killed; Lieut. Wynn, 1st Texas Legion, mortally wounded. He was the first man to place his hand upon a Federal cannon and just as he did he fell mortally wounded; Pvt. Hiram Harlow, Co. E. 14th Ark., 2nd Brig. First Division, Army of the West, killed; 1st Sergt. Thos. McMasters, Co. H. 14th Ark., 2nd Brig., 1st Div. Army of the West, killed; 3rd La. Inf. shows nine killed.

The book **Rosecrans Meets Price** by Dr. Ben Earl Kitchens lists: W.P. Crawley, Co. C 3rd Texas Cav. Regt.

"He carried a belt of gold around his waist beneath his clothes. Only about four or five of his friends knew this." W.P. Bowers, Co. C 3rd Texas Cav. Regt.; Carter Caldwell, Co. C. 3rd Texas Cav. Regt.; Colonel Stanton, Confederate; Acting 2nd Lieut. Bauer, commander of line of caisson of the 11th Ohio, killed.

The Life of Johnny Reb by Bell Irvin Wiley: Pvt. Smith, father of Jud and Cary Smith, learned that they had been killed at Malvern Hill and joined Price's army at Iuka, following the example of Jud when he learned of Cary's death, keeping on going into the enemy line instead of falling back. They were Mississippians.

Letter correspondence list: William Woodall Barnes, of Attala Co., Miss., shot in the leg and died shortly afterward. Confederate - Bible record and microfilm in La. State University collection. Not found in National archives; William DeFore killed in skirmish at Iuka. Date unknown; Edgar Bloomfield Oates, age 19 years, died of pneumonia in Iuka, 9th Texas Regt.; Samuel Wiley Oates, age 19 yrs. died from a wound, Regt. unlisted; Jonathan T. Woody, Battle of Iuka, died Oct. 1, 1862,

dysentery, 37th Ala.; Jesse Mays, Co. K 40th Inf., Attala Co., Miss. killed; Hans Nilson (known as Johannes Nilson Okland in Norway) served in Union Service, Pvt. Co. E 15th Regt. of Wis. died in hospital Aug. 31, 1862, in Iuka, from typhoid fever. Buried in National Cemetery, Corinth, Miss.; James McGinnis, 19 yrs. a farmer from Burnside, Eau Claire Co., Wis., carried Old Abe, the War Eagle, until May 1862 when he died of disease at Iuka, Miss.; James M. Cowan, 4th Ark. Inf., wounded in Battle of Iuka. His brother, Jasper N. Cowan left to nurse him and both never heard of any more. Jasper's war record says "captured and escaped." A letter from Robert H. Cowan says he was killed in Battle of Iuka; Wm. A. Stewart, Pvt. Co. G. 38th Regt. Ill. Inf. died in Iuka, Aug. 22, 1862 of typhoid fever. Born June 13, 1835, Monroe Co., West Va., enlisted June 1, 1862, left sick at Jacinto, Aug. 14, 1862, died in hospital in Iuka.

Fairfax Washington, 19 years old, Ordn. Sergt. 38th Miss., died at Iuka, Oct. 2, 1862, after leg amputation from wound in battle of Iuka, Sept. 19, 1862. He was a 1st cousin three times removed of President George Washington.

David C. Russell, 4th Sergt. Co. E. Wirt Adams Cav. Regt., killed in skirmish line, from Lowndes Co., Miss.; James H. Yeager, Pvt. Co. E. Wirt Adams Cav., killed in line at Iuka, Sept. 19, 1862, from Starkville, Miss. "Last time I saw Jim he was still in his saddle and blood spurting from stub of leg."; William George Wells, born Sept. 10, 1829, died Oct. 21, 1862, legs shot off at Battle of Iuka, Co. A. 37th Miss. Inf. Wife Rebecca Ann stayed with him at hospital two weeks before death. Enlisted at Columbus, Miss. May 1, 1862; Jacob Wells, brother of William George

Wells, born Aug. 30, 1836, Co. A. 37th Miss. Inf., wounded and died Oct. 10, 1862 in Iuka; Joseph S. Wells, brother of Wm. George and Jacob, born Feb. 4, 1844, wounded at Iuka, Co. A. 37th Miss., stayed with Jacob until he died. Joseph recovered and went home.

An uncle of the late Supreme Court Justice Virgil Griffin was killed in the Battle of Iuka, September 19, 1862. He was accompanied by his body servant who procured a wagon and mule, wrapped his body in wet sawdust and drove the long tiresome journey to South Mississippi where the body was buried in the family cemetery in Smith County.

Brig. General Henry Little died instantly when a minnie ball pierced his forehead. He fell from his horse into the arms of Sergt. T.J. Collum, Co. A 3rd Texas. General Price ordered Collum to take his body from the field and stay with it until General Price could join him. That night General Little was buried by dimly burning lanterns in the yard of Mr. Coman, across Highway 72 from the old courthouse in Iuka. He was reinterred by his family at Green

Mount Cemetery, Baltimore, Md.

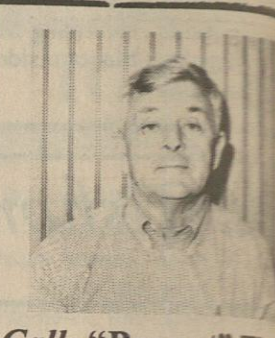

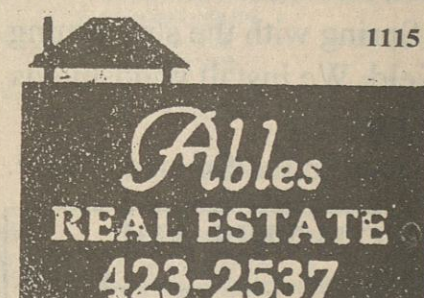
