When officers pressed redial on the store's phone, it connected them to the people the boy had contacted. They then told authorities who he was, Smith said

The juvenile was also charged in three break-ins at the residence of Frank Robbins, County Road 323, where he took money and tools.

Additionally, he was charged with another count of burglary for breaking into Johnny Robinson's Mini Storage at Celeman Park on March 31.

Smith said all of the items taken were found in the teen's possession and were returned. The teen was released into the custody of his parents, but will go to court for the burglary charges in May, Smith said.

Golden Man Charg Abusing 3-Year-Olu

A Golden man was arrested on charges of sexually and physically abusing a 3-year-old boy

Mark A. Anderson, 35 of 600 Doc Ashley Road (located about 4 miles south of Belmont), Golden, was charged Friday, April 2, with sexual battery and child abuse, according to Itawamba County Sheriff Leon Hayes.

An investigation into the matter began when the child was brought into Gilmore Clinic in Fulton, Miss. Clinic staff were told that the child had been injured by jumping on and off a bed. According to Hayes, doctors at the clinic recognized the signs of physical and sexual abuse and alerted authorities.

The child was taken to Le Bonheur Children's Medical Center in Memphis where he was listed in stable condition in the hospital's intensive care unit. Hayes said the child is being

treated for kidney failure and the results of physical and sexual abuse.

Hayes said the boy will most likely be placed in the custody of the Itawamba Department of Human Services after his release from the hospital.

The abuse child investigation by the Itawamba authorities also led to the discovery of two ounces of highly pure crystal methamphetamines at Anderson's home, Sheriff Hayes said.

Mark Anderson and another suspect, Jessica Lewis, 19, also of 600 Doc Ashley Road, Golden, were charged with possession of crystal methamphetamine with intent to distribute.

The drugs were estimated to have a street value of approximately \$6,000, Hayes confirmed.

Anderson remained in custody at press time under a \$500,000 bond. Lewis was released on \$100,000 bond.

A native of Lawrence County, Tenn., he and his family came to Iuka in 1951 from Florence, Ala. where he was a Linotype operator for the Florence Times/Tri-Cities Daily. Prior to that he was employed by the Daily News Journal in Murfreesboro, Tenn. He began his career in the newspaper business in Lawrenceburg, Tenn. at the Lawrence County Democrat Union.

In 1960 he established WVOM-AM, 1270 the first radio station in Tishomingo County.

After selling the newspaper and radio station in Iuka in the late 60s, he purchased what is now WADI FM 95.3 in Corinth and operated it until 1978. In addition, Mr. Holtsford, always with his wife as his partner, owned Goat Island Marina, the Iuka Tire Store and the Shoe Shop.

He was a member of the luka

Church of Christ.

Mr. Holtsford was a veteran of World War II serving in the Seabees, a division of the U.S. Navy.

He was the recipient of the **Conservation** Communications Award from the Mississippi Wildlife Federation and the National Wildlife Association. He served on the governor's staff as an honorary colonel for Paul B. Johnson, Ross Barnett, J.P. Coleman and John Bell Williams.

He is survived by his wife of 58 years, Lillie Christine Holtsford of Iuka; three daughters, Judy Green of Ocala, Fla., V Anne Holtsford of Madison, and Bennie H. McBride of Iuka; a brother, Troy Holtsford of Corinth; three grandchildren, Beth Coleman Brock of Memphis, Tenn., David Coleman, Jr., of Ocala, Fla., and Lily McBride of Iuka; and one great-grandson, Tucker W. Brock of Memphis.

Home Economics Tips

Asthma & Allergy Strategies **Reducing Allergens In Living** Areas

When a family member has asthma or allergies, keeping the common living areas free of allergens presents some special challenges. Carpets and upholstered furniture are breeding grounds for allergens and hard surfaces are dust catchers Routine cleaning, using the following tips will help keep allergies and asthma under control.

Because small children crawl and play on the floor, it's here that allergen control begins. If possible, minimize the amount of carpet in living areas. Vinyl or wood flooring and area rugs are better choices than wall-to-wall carpeting. Mats or small area rugs placed in front of all entryways will protect the flooring; collect dirt, dust, pollen and other allergens brought in from the outside; and help prevent them from spreading to other areas. Regularly shake these rugs outdoors, away from open windows. Launder them weekly to remove dust/dust mites, animal dander, pollen and mold spores.

Carpets, pillows, draperies, and upholstered furniture should be thoroughly vacuumed at least once a week - more often during allergy season or if there are pets in the household. Vacuum against the carpet's nap, going over each area at least six to eight times. It's best to have someone other than the allergic person do the vacuuming. Since vacuuming will stir up some dust, anyone allergic to the allergens in dust should avoid the newly vacuumed area for 30 minutes. If the allergy sufferer must do the vacuuming, a disposable dust mask will help reduce the breathing in of airborne allergens. Eye protectors, such as swimming goggles, will help those with eve allergies.

regular bags or dust bins, or special multi-layered bags that retain allergens. They may also have exhaust filters. If a new vacuum is not in the budget. existing cleaners can be upgraded with multi-layer bags and exhaust filters. HEPA filters may also be available for central vacuum systems. Check with the system' manufacturer.

If a carpet is wet-cleaned, be sure it dries completely within 24 hours. Otherwise, it can become an indoor allergen source. Damp carpets are breeding grounds for molds, yeasts and bacteria, which produce odors and airborne allergens. A "musty," "moldy," "mildewy" odor is a definite indication that this type of problem is occurring. It's best to use a professional carpet cleaner who is trained and certified and uses quality equipment. However, if the wet cleaning is a do-ityourself project, be sure the purchased or rented equipment can effectively remove excess water and, carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions.

Clean vinyl or ceramic tile floors weekly, using a floor cleaner or a nonabrasive, allpurpose cleaner. To avoid a cloudy floor, rinse it well after

each cleaning or use a no-rinse product. Wood floors should be vacuumed first to remove the surface dirt, then cleaned with a wood floor cleaner. Spills should be wiped up, using a clean, damp paper towel, sponge or cloth, as soon as they occur. If using a water cleaning solution, wipe up any excess liquid. Water left standing on wood can seep through any nicks and scratches in the finish. This may cause the floor to warp and discolor.



• Peach (pits), Peony Periwinkle, Philodendron, Pimpernet, Poinciana, Poison Ivy, Poison Oak, Pokeweed, Poppy, Potato, Precatory Bean, Common Privet Rhododendron, Rhubarb, Rosary Pea, Rubber Plant Scotch Broom, Chunk Cabbage, Snowdrops, Snow the Mountain, on Staggerweed, Star Bethlehem, Sweetpea Tansy Mustard, Tobacco. Yew) • Garden Poisons: An important non-plant in the garden can be insecticides, fertilizers and slug repellents. It's best to avoid putting slug repellents in the yard especially in pelleted form. If you need to use slug baits, try a powdered form that's less likely to be ingested by a pet. When applying fertilizers, water them well, so the chemical sinks into the soil instead of staying on the surface. And it's a good idea to keep your pet out of an area that's been recently treated with an insecticide or liquid fertilizer. Wait until the area dries before letting your pet into the yard. • If you see any signs of salivation, incoordination, muscle tremor, vomiting or diarrhea, your pet may have eaten a poisonous plant or ingested a harmful chemical. If you suspect that's the case, take your animal to your veterinarian immediately. If possible, take the plant or chemical with you to help your vet identify the exact cause of the problem. • Garden Plants: Some pet owners find that it's a constant battle to keep the pets from bedding down or digging in the flower beds. Not to mention, many plants will eventually die if your dog routinely urinates on them. because of this, a lot of homeowners erect fences. Another trick is to place a piece of treated lattice over your flower bed. The flowers will grow through it and your animals won't be able to dig in the soil below. Others plant barrier hedges, using spiny plants like Prickly Pear, Yucca, Tea Olive, Barberry, Cunninghamia, Mahonia (commonly called Oregon Holly-Grape), Shrub Roses and Pyracantha. · There are some plants you could use-in-your garden that are very hardy and virtually indestructible. Try ground covers like Liriope (commonly called Lilyturf), Mondo Grass, Creeping Juniper or Pachysandra. Avoid shallow-rooted ground covers like Ajuga (commonly called Bugleflower) or shrubs like Cotoneaster.

cataracts (the leading cause of blindness), by as much as two to threefold according to a study done by Harvard Medical School. The data suggests that smoking accounts for 200,000 of the 1 million cataract operations performed annually in the U.S.A. The bottom line is that it appears that cataracts can be added to the list of adverse health effects of cigarette smoking.

Surgical removal of cataracts - cloudy areas in the crystalline lense of the eye is the most common procedure that Medicare covers. By age 75, nearly half of all adults have this problem.

The mechanism by which smoking causes cataracts is still a mystery. While it is possible that exposure to smoky air is involved, a more favored theory is that chemicals in cigarette smoke diminish blood levels of nutrients that guard against damage by oxygen-hungry substances called free radicals.

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Solving the "Sensitive Teeth" Problem

Sensitivity can be caused by a number of different situations, such as eating ice cream, drinking hot coffee or brushing your teeth. It may also mean that you have hypersensitive (excessively sensitive) teeth. We can help determine the cause and rule out any underlying dental problems such as a cavity, tooth grinding, a degenerating nerve, a fractured tooth or toothbrush abrasion.

Hypersensitivity is common and usually results when the dentin, the tooth layer under enamel, is exposed. Microscopic tubules found in dentin are then open to such irritations as heat, cold or acidic foods. Overzealous brushing or constant tooth grinding thins the enamel and may be responsible for the excess sensitivity.

Hypersensitivity usually decreases or disappears later in life as the tubles narrow. Desensitizing toothpastes contain compounds such as strontium chloride which seals the dentin tubules or potassium chloride, which appears to block the transmission of pain through the nerves. These toothpastes are usually used for a limited time and generally require a number of applications before they are effective. Ask our office about their use.

The dentin tubules can also be covered by sealants (plastic materials that are painted onto the tooth surface) and resins (toothcolored restorative materials). The Bandstand

The original bandstand at Mineral Springs Park was probably built sometime after the Civil War. Concerts were given during the spring and summer months on Friday and Saturday nights. The old structure stood on the same location as the current bandstand.

It is said that a number of political speakings took place on the bandstand stage including speeches by local Governors John M. Stone and Robert Lowery as well as later figures such as Theodore G. Bilbo and Gov. Fielding Wright.

One of the best recollections of the "Good Old Days" in the bandstands hey day was given by Mr. C.B. Reid in 1986. Mr. Reid was a trumpet soloist for the professional players who performed on the bandstand in the early part of the century. Mr. Reid said his best memory of the park while playing in the band was the evening he met his future wife. He said he saw her out of the corner of his eye. While playing, he kept his

Mr. Hancock and his family are slated to be on hand for the ribbon cutting, along with a host of city, county and Red Cross officials. Joining these luminaries will be many Red Cross volunteers, class instructors, and many other Red Cross supporters who are committed to "Building for your Red Cross future."

"Our goal is \$200,000.00," said Leslie Posey, Executive Director of the Northeast Mississippi Chapter of the American Red Cross. "We are so fortunate to have so many excellent volunteers who have helped us grow over the past few years. But, really, we have simply out grown our space at the Create building. We just need more space to be ready for the future. I feel that with the leadership of people like General Sam Fleming, we will reach our goal quickly.'

Dr. Jeff Houin, chairman of the Capital Campaign Public Relations Committee feels that the media is so important to helping the Red Cross achieve its goal. "People probably don't realize how important the Red Cross is until they need help," Houin said. "Our Red Cross has always been there for our community. Now we need our community's support to prepare for the future." James Murphy Thomas said it best back in 1936 when speaking of the famous Tupelo Tornado: "Whenever a donation is asked for Red Cross, give and you will know that you are giving to the greatest organization (other than the church) in America. You've

begins with disaster preparedness. We offer assistance to citizens through detailed brochures, how to develop a family plan in the event of a disaster and facts regarding specific types of disaster

In the event of a major disaster, we stand ready to provide temporary housing, food, and medical emergency care. A medical emergency could be the loss of ones prescription eye glasses or dentures due to a disaster. Assistance can be provided to replace household belongings, clothes, etc. Shelters will be staffed by trained Red Cross volunteers. If there is a need, following a disaster for mental health counseling, this will be offered by trained Red Cross volunteers.

This chapter regularly offers classes to train volunteers in shelter management, damage assessment, Mass care (feeding), health services, etc. We recruit volunteers on an on-going basis to be trained.

A disaster may be a onefamily house fire. We are able to give some financial assistance to persons who request it. (They must present a fire report). Average financial assistance per family at this time is \$250.00. Vouchers are given to be used for emergency supplies such as food, clothing, personal care items, etc. We look forward to reaching a financial position that will enable us to give a larger amount and to more people. Due to a lack of funds, we are unable to widely market this service. We would like to male fore assistance available to every person who suffers such a loss.

The American Red Cross plan is for each chapter to respond to local emergencies and provide whatever is needed to ensure victims of disaster safety from harm, shelter, and food. When local resources are depleted (money, manpower, equipment) help will be provided from the

state level and the national level until this area is back on its feet.

American Red Cross is the only source that the United States

Armed Forces. The Red Cross does not loan money - we do the paperwork and phone calls to make it happen for our service person.

American Red Cross offers courses in First Aid and CPR, Swimming, Life Guarding, HIV/ Aids prevention, Blood Borne Pathogens and Babysitting. We charge a small fee for First Aid & CPR to cover the cost of books, manikins, replaceable lungs, and cleaning supplies. The small amount of profit we make goes into our general fund. To help offset office operating expenses and the fire assistance program. We compete with Emergency Medical services for First Aid and CPR courses. They offer it free to the public, but are subsidized by the city and county with tax funds. We are able to compete because of the quality and comprehensive course that we teach.

We are currently in a "building" mode as regards to our board, staff and service delivery. We recently lost two board members, who were part of the Executive Committee, to United Way positions. We are seeking qualified persons to fill vacancies. We hired a new Executive Director on January 15,1996. She is daily gaining strength and the Board is very pleased with her. We hired a part-time employee, who started on April 1, 1996. She is working out well.

We are currently updating our Disaster Plan. Review and update of the plan is ongoing. We look and coordinate with Civil Defense and 911 Services. When a disaster strikes, we will respond. Our goal is to alleviate suffering of the victim as quickly and effectively as possible.

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

Unemployment In County Drops In February....

According to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo county dropped to 9.6 percent in February. This compares to 11.1 percent in January and 12.7 percent in February, 1998.

The civilian labor force for Tishomingo County numbered 9,270, 80 less than January and 40 less than February of last year. Approximately 8,380 Tishomingo County residents held jobs while 890 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 2,850 and nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,380.
