Tishomingo Co. Authorities Uncover Crystal Meth Lab and Stolen Auto Operations Near Belmont

Surveillance and the sharing of information by North Mississippi narcotics groups led Tishomingo County authorities Thursday to the uncovering of a crystal methamphetamine lab, a stolen vehicle operation and the confiscation of about \$38,000 worth of illegal drugs near Belmont.

Suspects Arrested And Charged

Five suspects were arrested in connection with the illegal operations. Those arrested and their charges were:

Joseph R. Moore, 32, of Lee County, charged with possession of paraphernalia used to manufacture crystal meth, possession of crystal meth, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, resisting arrest, manufacture of crystal meth, possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute, possession of a vehicle with altered VIN number and possession of whiskey.

Peggy Timmons, 27, of Belmont, is charged with switched tag, possession of a vehicle with an altered VIN number, possession of a controlled substance—crystal meth, possession of paraphernalia, possession of crystal meth with intent to distribute and conspiracy to commit a crime.

Gaylyn Owen, 29, of Shannon is charged with providing false information, possession of paraphernalia, possession of marijuana, manufacture of crystal meth, possession of crystal meth with intent to distribute, conspiracy to commit a crime and possession of marijuana. She also has an outstanding warrant in Yalobusha County.

Karen A. Johnson, 26, of Smithville is charged with possession of crystal meth in a motor vehicle, conspiracy to manufacture crystal meth, possession of paraphernalia, possession of stolen vehicle, possession of crystal meth and conspiracy to commit a crime.

Mike L. Holcomb, 42, of Belmont, is charged with possession of crystal meth with intent to distribute, DUI—other substance, no driver's license, resisting arrest, possession of a vehicle with altered VIN, possession of marijuana—over an ounce, possession of paraphernalia, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and possession of whiskey.

Moore was being held in the Tishomingo County Jail on a \$1,000,000 bond. Yalobusha County also has a hold placed on him for charges in that county.

Holcomb is being held on a \$500,000 bond.

Timmons, Owen and Johnson are all in custody on a \$250,000 bond each.

Events Leading To Arrests

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith said information about the transport of illegal drugs obtained by the Sheriff's Department led deputies to a location near Belmont where they pulled over two vehicles, a 1988-1995 GMC Custom Southern Comfort pickup truck and a 1988 Chevy pickup truck, on County Road 16.

In the GMC was Gaylyn Owen and Peggy Timmons. In the Chevy was Karen Johnson and her young daughter.

While Tishomingo County Deputies James Trimm and Rodney Pannell, along with Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno, were searching the vehicles, an RV came through and refused to stop for the officers, Smith said.

Two of the officers pursued the RV. A passenger in the RV, Joseph R. Moore, 32, left the vehicle and fled into the woods, chased by the deputies and Tishomingo County drug dog Keitchi.

"The dog caught the suspect and kept him at bay until the deputies arrived," Smith explained. "He was found with more than an ounce of crystal meth and \$10,200 cash on him when he was arrested."

Upon searching the RV, the officers found guns including a 9 mm rifle, a Ruger 9 mm pistol, and a Mack 10 - 9 mm pistol, Smith said.

After this arrest, and also the arrest of another suspect, Mike L. Holcomb who had been driving the RV, the officers went to Holcomb's residence on County Road 16 (Feed Mill Road, 3 miles northwest of Belmont city limits). There they found an ounce and a half of crystal meth, money and 11 more guns.

In a shop next to the house, deputies discovered residue and all the additives used to make crystal meth, as well as some of the drug itself, according to the Sheriff.

"All the signs that crystal meth was being manufactured there were present," Smith said. "We have called in hazardous waste removal experts to do a cleanup."

Smith estimated that the street value of the crystal meth that they confiscated would be about \$38,000. This figure could be more if some other substances found at the scene also turn out to be crystal meth.

Chop Shop Operations Discovered

While at Holcomb's, the deputies also discovered several vehicles which had vehicle identification numbers (VINS) that did not match the make and model of the vehicle, indicating that they had been tampered with. This indicated to the authorities that there was a chop shop operation going on as well.

Smith said a total of \$12,000 in cash, Holcomb's house and

shop, and numerous vehicles were all seized following the arrests.

This totals about \$500,000 worth of cash and property that was seized, according to the Sheriff's estimation.

Additionally, Smith said one more arrest has been made (name being withheld) and at least two more arrests are expected as a direct result of information obtained from Thursday's arrests.

"This would have to rank number one in all of our drug arrests this year," Smith said. "These were major dealers. They have been sought by numerous counties and states for several years."

Other agencies involved in the case, including cleanup of the crystal meth lab, were the Department of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms; Mississippi Highway Patrol CIB; Tennessee Investigation Bureau and the Drug Enforcement Agency.

Belmont School GEMS Students Place In National Writing Contest

Gifted teacher Cathy Eaton at Belmont School was recently notified that some of her students have been chosen as finalists in a national writing contest sponsored by *Storyworks Magazine*.

Eaton explained that last September, all of her gifted students, second through sixth grades, entered a character sketch contest for *Storyworks Magazine*, published by Scholastic, Inc. in New York. Their task was to create a special character to be used by famous children's author David Adler in his upcoming story for *Storyworks*.

Eaton said there would be one overall winner, 25 finalists and 75 runners-up in the contest. One of her students, sixth grader Bart Chumbley, was notified that he was one out of only four of the 25 finalists who would also be published in *Storyworks*, complete with his school's name and an illustration of his character by the magazine staff.

Two other students, fourth grader Courtney Smith and fifth

grader John Sparks, were also notified that they were runners-up in the contest.

"This is very exciting for us since there were 7,000 entries in the contest and three of the winners were from Belmont School," Eaton said. "I am so proud of all my students."

Storyworks is used nationwide by reading and English teachers for instructional purposes, Eaton said. The heading on the Finalist Page of the magazine reads, "We loved so many of your entries to this year's contest. We thought all of them would make great stories. Choose one of these and write a story of your own!" Eaton said now any other student anywhere in the United States who sees the magazine might be writing a story for their teacher using Bart Chumbley's character sketch.

"Of course, I want to congratulate all of my GEMS students for entering the contest and working so hard to do their best," Eaton said. "When one of us wins, we are all winners."

Two Iuka Residents Arrested On Drug Charges Monday

Tishomingo County Authorities have arrested two Iuka residents after illegal drugs were found at their home.

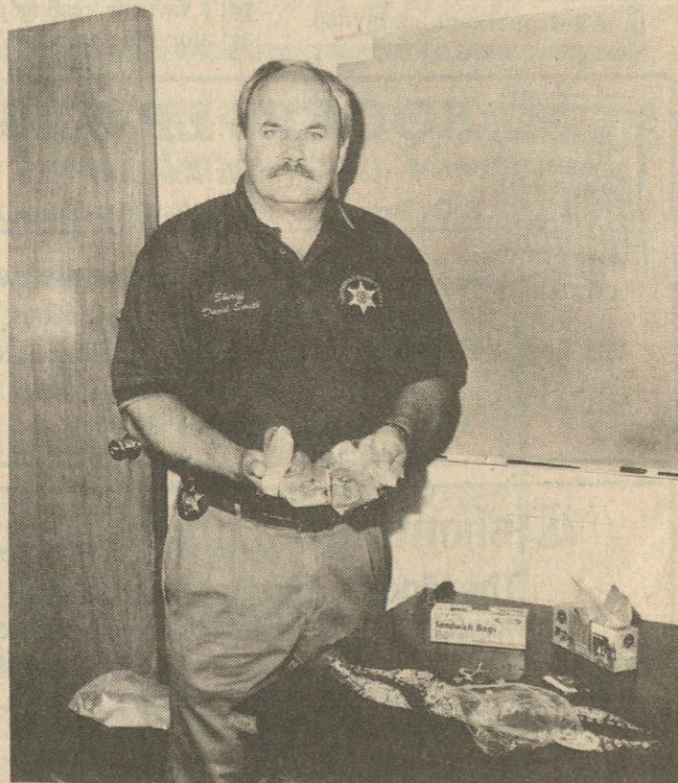
Arrested were Kim Puckett, 26, and Kevin Ham, 27, of 172 E. Iuka. According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, information received by the Sheriff's Department led to a search warrant being executed at the couple's residence. Found at the home were approximately three ounces of marijuana and paraphernalia including scales, rolling papers and baggies.

The subjects have been charged with possession of marijuana—more than an ounce, with intent. Tishomingo County drug dog Keitchi helped locate the marijuana.

Both Puckett and Ham were in jail at press time. Puckett was being held on a \$5,000 bond. Ham was denied bond because of a hold placed on him by authorities in New Jersey.

Sheriff Smith said he would like to thank Iuka Police Officers Anita Mitchell

and Jimmy McVay for their assistance at the scene.

I.E.S. Fourth Graders Conduct Trial

On Tuesday, March 2, fourth graders from Iuka Elementary School traveled to the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse, in order to conduct a mock trial. The trial was a culmination activity for their MS History class taught by Mrs. Becky McNeely.

The students had been reading *ROLL OF THUNDER, HEAR MY CRY* by Mississippi author Mildred D. Taylor. The setting for Taylor's novel is Mississippi in 1933. It is basically a story of how a young girl learns about the inherent prejudice of whites against blacks in the South

during the difficult times of the depression. The books are centered around an inspiring black family, full of strength and love. The novel ends with the near-lynching of T.J. Avery, a neighbor who is framed by some older, white boys.

After reading all but the last two chapters, Mrs. McNeely assigned roles for the mock trial of T.J. played by Chad Borden. Lawyers Jessica Carter and Jake Segars prepared their defense with local lawyer, Mark Segars. Nick Phillips assisted lawyers for the prosecution, Jenni Nichols and

Jonathan Murrah. As the trial neared, witnesses and courtroom officials studied court protocol and the events of the crime.

Mrs. Beth Davis, acting as the judge, led the students and visitors through the trial proceedings. Jury foreman, Mrs. Lori Wahlstrom read the verdict after the jury of selected students deliberated.

The exercise provided students with hand-on court protocol and encouraged them to read other novels by this outstanding author.

Home Economics Tips

Carpet Care Vacuuming Prolongs Carpet Life

The single most important factor in prolonging the life of a carpet is frequent vacuuming. How often a carpet is vacuumed depends on several factors.

Areas receiving little traffic may need vacuuming once a week, while heavily trafficked areas may require daily vacuuming. A thorough vacuuming of all carpeted areas may be necessary about once a month (more often if someone in the family has asthma or allergies).

For most carpet cleaning including wall-to-wall carpet and area rugs, a vacuum cleaner with a rotating (agitator) brush is most effective. For best results, choose the correct carpet pile setting. Also periodically check the brushes and belts to be sure they are working properly. Replace the dirt bag or empty the dirt canister as often as necessary.

Carpeted stairs require strong suction and a cleaning tool attachment. The upholstery nozzle, a brush attachment or a hand-held vacuum with a rotating brush works well.

If there are pets in the household, it increases the need for regular vacuuming. Animals have oil in their hair that causes it to cling when deposited on carpet and upholstery. The longer it remains, the more it will penetrate into the carpet. Daily vacuuming may be necessary to remove hair from traffic areas or from the pet's favorite resting place. An agitator type vacuum cleaner is

best to brush the hair out of the carpet pile.

For a more thorough, once-a-month vacuuming, move all the furniture out of the way. Put the vacuum cleaner suction on "high". Light vacuuming means three or four strokes with the cleaner; thorough vacuuming like this requires seven strokes or more. To avoid light and dark tracks, make each final cleaning stroke in the same direction across the carpet.

When the inevitable stains occur, choose a cleaning product formulated for carpets. To use the product, read and follow the label directions.

Anti-Reflective (AR) Lens

Anti-reflective coatings can virtually eliminate annoying glare caused by the sun and office lighting, or from oncoming headlights when driving at night. Though it sounds contradictory, AR coating on lenses reduce glare by allowing more light to pass through the lens and reach the eye.

Most uncoated lenses permit about 92% of available light to reach the eye, while many AR coated lenses allow 99% of light to pass through. With anti-reflective coatings, annoying reflections virtually disappear. There is an improvement in vision for most wearers, particularly at night.

People with thick lenses do well with an anti-reflective coating. It improves the cosmetics of the lenses as well as the ability to improve vision. Since their effectiveness is sharply reduced when the lenses become dirty, cleaning becomes more important. The anti-reflective coating is probably one of the best features available for lenses today.

Help for Sensitive Teeth

Are you one of the nearly 40 million Americans who suffer from sensitive teeth? Technically called "dentin hyper-sensitivity," this intermittent sensation affects people when they eat, drink or touch their teeth. At least one in seven adults suffers from this painful sensation, primarily in response to hot or cold foods. But today dentistry can offer several effective treatments.

Dental sensitivity is caused by either enamel loss or exposure of the tooth root surface. Enamel loss can be caused by wear on the chewing surfaces of the teeth, abrasion from improper toothbrushing, erosion, exposure of the teeth to acidic foods or stomach regurgitation, or tooth grinding.

Exposure of the tooth root surface may result from recession of the gums due to aging, or chronic gum disease, a poorly positioned tooth, periodontal surgery, or incorrect toothbrushing habits.

There are effective treatments for tooth sensitivity. Initially, treatment involves ruling out other possible dental problems and using over-the-counter desensitizing toothpaste for two to six weeks. If further treatment is necessary, we may choose to apply topical fluoride or a potassium oxalate treatment or have you apply a fluoride gel at home.

Another effective technique is bonding, which involves applying a tooth-colored plastic or porcelain material to the tooth surface to seal the exposed dentin or root surface. If you have sensitive teeth, give our office a call to discuss your options.

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Kennel Cough

• Technically called infectious tracheobronchitis, "kennel cough" is the most common respiratory infection affecting dogs. Usually caused by one or more viruses acting alone or in combination with certain bacteria, virtually all dogs are susceptible regardless of age. The greatest risk of exposure to infection comes at times when a susceptible dog is housed with or has direct contact with several other dogs.

• Boarding kennels, pet stores and shelters, because of the high concentration of dogs, are the most likely source of infection; hence the term "kennel" cough.

• The signs of infection typically develop 5 to 7 days after exposure to a boarding facility or infected dogs. A dry cough is the first sign of trouble. The cough quickly becomes persistent. Owners frequently complain that their dog is coughing so much they can't keep them up at night.

• Characteristic of the cough is a high-pitched "honk" sound that accompanies each cough. Most dogs will wretch at the end of the coughing fit and some will expel white phlegm. Despite the persistent coughing, dogs usually remain relatively healthy, active, and have a good appetite.

• Treatment is usually very effective. Cough suppressants and antibiotics to prevent complicating infections are usually prescribed. Within a few days, the signs should subside. If, after 2 weeks of treatment, the dog is still coughing, the dog should be re-examined.

• If your dog is subject to exposure to other dogs, must be boarded in a kennel, the so-called kennel cough vaccination is indicated. Vaccines against kennel cough are available as either a shot or as a topical liquid administered directly into the nostrils. The topical route of administration is considered to offer superior protection.

• For dogs that are subject to being boarded, kennel vaccination is indicated. You know ahead of time if your dog will need to be boarded, a booster vaccination, administered topically, should be administered about one week prior to actually entering the kennel.

• The viruses that cause kennel cough are highly contagious to other dogs, but are not capable of being transmitted to humans. One can become infected with one of the bacteria associated with "kennel cough", however, infections are rare and vaccination of cats is not recommended.

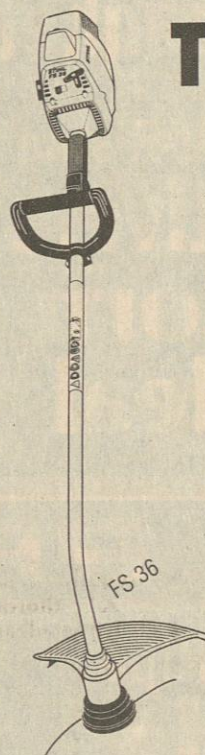
The festival is co-sponsored by the Ala-Sippi Dulcimer Society and Tishomingo State Park.

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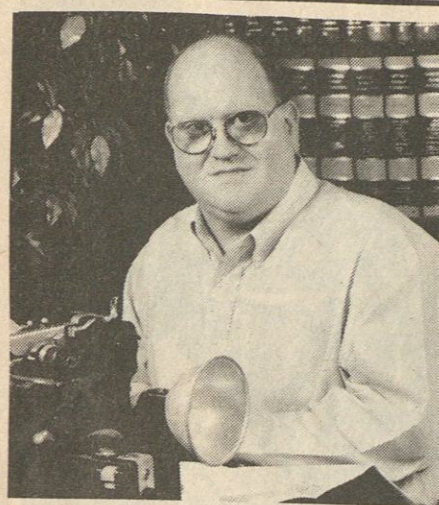
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My Friend, My Hero, Hollis Long

A Series Of

"Is that in the key of A?" J.R. Long asked his brother as he plucked the strings on a gourd mandolin. "YES, like this," Hollis Long demonstrated as he plucked some strings on his dulcimer. The Long brothers have been playing music since childhood. This particular morning, the two brothers sat in Hollis's living room discussing old times and enjoying playing music, like they did growing up.

Hollis smiled as they began a familiar tune and J.R. played harmony. The tune was "Turkey In the Straw" and the two men were literally picking and grinning, just like they did in their youth. Hollis Long remembers growing up wanting to play music like it was yesterday. "We didn't have T.V. back then, couldn't afford to run a radio so the families tended to do more around the front porch in the evenings, like play instruments and sing 'Gospel' and 'Hillbilly' music."

"I started playing when I was about twelve," Hollis recalled. He had an ear for music and quite handily picked up a guitar. His brother Julian, soon followed suit. These were the hard days of the depression. The Long Brothers graciously "sang for their supper" at community functions and especially at church gatherings. "We would go wherever we were asked to go, usually we were paid in what we could eat," Hollis laughed.

The boys would continue playing together until they finished high school and went their separate ways. Even then, they would gather at the Long homeplace every so often and play and sing on the porch as they did while growing up. There were five boys, Charles Eulos, Hollis, Julian (J.R.), Herman, and Theron. Things were changing. In 1941, Hollis, a house painter and carpenter, married Nevil Senter from Fulton. The couple was married in September of 1941. Their first Christmas together held a shadow of war and with war, possible separation. In December of 1942, Hollis had been called into the draft. He had signed a waiver saying that he would not oppose the draft on grounds he was a married man, if called. Just a few days before Christmas, Long said goodbye to his wife and family. The young man was headed for Europe.

Being a strong Christian, Long knew that his fate was in God's hands. He did not ask for any branch of service in particular when called up but was fortunate to score high on testing and was sent for ordnance training in the Air Force. This prepared him for the job of arming aircraft with bombs and ammunition. Once in Scotland, Hollis was assigned to the 339th Bomber/Fighter Group, servicing a P-51 Mustang Fighter Wing. Two months after he arrived in Scotland, Long learned he had become a father. Nevil had given birth to a daughter, Martha. Hollis knew it would be a while before this was over. The sooner it was over, the sooner he would see his daughter.

Even in wartime, Long enjoyed

playing music. He joined a "Big Band" sounding group and played guitar in the rhythm section. He worked on "the line", where the planes were serviced, at the airdrome by day and in the evening played with the group. "Sometimes we drove 75 miles at night each way to play," Mr. Long recalled. He showed me a picture of the group. He spoke fondly of his wartime extracurricular activities saying, "Seventy-five miles on bad roads is a long way under blackout conditions. We may play until two in the morning and I would get back just in time to take a shower, grab a bite to eat and get to work on the line. I was tired but I did my job and sure had a lot of fun!"

Some of the places the band played were nationally and internationally recognized. One photograph shows the band at the Stage Door Canteen in London, where Long says the Band performed several times. On this stage, the greats of the era, such as Glen Miller, Benny Goodman and many others entertained troops. Long laughs, "We were not that good but the people danced and had a good time, that was all that mattered!"

He was near the bases for the B-17 and later B-24s. These were the type planes, like the Memphis Belle, that made bombing runs into the heart of Germany. The Mustang fighters Long serviced, were escorts to the bombers for part of the flight. The missions were vital and so were the jobs of every man in the air and on the ground. If the cannons ammunition was not loaded correctly, it could easily jam under fire. In a dog fight over hostile territory, this could make for fatal consequences. Hollis stated, "We all knew that our jobs were important, whether on the line or entertaining the troops for morale purposes."

The war in Europe ended in May of 1945. Long barely made it home before his daughter, whom he now saw for the first time, turned two (she was 22 1/2 months old!). He had missed three Christmases with his family but the Christmas of 1945 was extra special. Hollis was reunited with his family and all the Long brothers who had served their country were home.

Hollis Long resumed his duties as a painter and worked other jobs as they came along. He was Postmaster of Golden for a time in 1952 (The old Golden Post Office sign was replaced while he was Postmaster. He kept the old one which proudly hangs at the entrance to his woodworking shop today.) Hollis took an active role in the Golden First Baptist Church. Since 1932, Hollis Long has been an active member of this church. "Before my father died, he asked me to help keep the little church going as best I could for as long as I could," Hollis said with a smile. Brushing back a tear but still grinning he spoke softly, "I promised Daddy and I have

kept that promise as best I could."

In the fall of 1950, a Boy Scout Troop was being organized in the town of Golden. "I was asked to go to

the meeting at the High School and heard Mr. Richard Milam speak," says Long of his introduction to the Boy Scouts. He was a natural at this new task. Though his troop was small, he worked diligently with every boy. As they grew in scouting, so did Hollis Long.

In those early years, Cecil Brown was at Tishomingo as Scout Master, Bill Brinkley had the Luka Troop. These men became close friends through their scouting experience. "Cecil and I went through Wood Badge training together in Middle Tennessee in 1955," the scoutmaster said pulling out another picture. "He couldn't really afford to go," laughed Mrs. Nevil Long, "but he went ANYWAY!" "I only had one pair of pants and two shirts of uniform for the entire week so I had to go out and buy me some more scout clothes when I got there," Hollis said.

The week of training proved grueling. Today, the Wood Badge candidates go into training over several weekends. This way, they are able to restock needed supplies and do other things before returning to camp the next weekend. "We were stuck there for the whole hot week with only what we brought!" Long exclaimed. If a flag was made, the only cloth was a shirt or handkerchief. The men had to use whatever was in the isolated woods. If they wanted extra food, they foraged for it. Shelter? they made huts and lean-tos out of sticks and vines. It was a difficult week but they learned skills in both outdoorsmanship and leadership they brought back to their boys at home.

Long was one of the first five men to receive Woodbadge training from the Yocona Area Council. In 1964, he was presented the highest award a scout can receive, The Silver Beaver Award. Long served as a leader for troops representing the Yocona Council at the Scout retreat at Philmont, New Mexico in 1970. He also led a group of young men to Valley Forge, Pennsylvania in 1957. Since 1950, countless boys have attended camp with Long from the Golden area from Troop 72. "I have had lots of boys, sixteen Eagle scouts, and most of them have done well with only a few disappointments," Long noted, "I am PROUD of all the boys I have had the honor of working with!"

One of these Eagle Scouts was his own son, Craig Long. Craig, like Martha, and his father's interest in music and his heritage. Long spoke of how he and his son shared many interests, "We have done a lot of arrowhead hunting and other activities that came out of our Cherokee/Native American heritage (Hollis's Great-Grandmother was a full blooded Cherokee) and our Southern heritage combined," Hollis had not had much time for music and folk arts since the war. In 1970, he began to travel a bit and saw a dulcimer. This is a folk instrument with strings tuned to make the cords

sound like the tune of a bagpipe. It is THE ONLY truly American folk instrument that started in the

colonies. Hollis said he liked the look and the sound of the stringed laptop Dulcimer. "It is not like the hammer dulcimer mentioned in the Bible, that became the Harpsichord, and later gave way to the piano," Mr. Long explained. He came home and decided to make one for himself after seeing one in the Smokey Mountains.

Long became a master of the instrument, both in playing and making them! "We made cornshuck dolls and native American Crafts for Craft fairs in the early 1970's. He took his first Dulcimer along and just set it on the table for show. Hollis told of selling his first dulcimer, "I had it on the table and a man asked me what I would take for it. I told him it was not for sale then got to thinking after I had made this one and knew where and what to do, I might could make a better one, so I sold it... for forty dollars!"

He made a few after that before keeping one for himself. This one is around twenty years old. Hollis Long has played this particular instrument at countless events including playing at the World's Fair Exposition in Knoxville, TN in 1982. He is proud that he has been able to preserve this type of art and music. Long is a humble man who says there are better players. He is a member of the Florence Alabama Dulcimer Club and is part of the Dulcimer Day Celebration at Tishomingo State Park. This event is being held THIS WEEKEND April 17th. The festival highlights the unique sound of this instrument as well as the beautiful craftsmanship involved in these striking works of art.

It was Christmas Eve of 1984. I remember hearing my father coming in excitedly whispering to my mother. Later that night, when we opened our presents, My brother and I were shocked to find that Dad had taken some cherry wood from a tree he had cut down in our back yard, to Mr. Hollis Long to make us a dulcimer and a banjo. I got the dulcimer. The dulcimer was easy to pick up and play. I was so proud, not only because of where the wood came from and that my parents gave it to me for Christmas, but also because I had known Mr. Long through scouting and the Long family all my life. It was one of the most memorable Christmas presents I ever received. It was number 150 of the dulcimers Mr. Long has made. Now, that figure is over 540. He has made 37 banjos too. John's was "number 5".

On my twenty-seventh birthday, I commissioned Mr. Long to make me a mandolin from the same cherry wood that had produced our other instruments. He told me that the flat bottom mandolin had gone off with men to fight in World War I and was a very traditional piece. I was so proud of it when it finally came. This

was a present to myself that I am glad I had made. The number on this mandolin? "Hollis Long, Mandolin #1".

Mr. Long teaches Dulcimer skills at a folk school held every year at Campbell's Folk School in Brasstown, North Carolina. He has produced over 540 dulcimers so far. Mr. Long makes roughly twenty-five instruments a year now. Some are highly detailed with designs such as Chieftain or Braves head carved into

them to humming birds, like are carved in the face of my dulcimer. He has sold dulcimers to people in all fifty states and has filled orders for the folk instruments from as far away as Australia and Germany.

He also makes authentic dancing rattles from turtle shells, limber-jack toys, stools and other crafts. Mrs. Long is a master of corn-silk dolls, an art that has almost vanished but can be seen at its best when the Longs show their crafts at a festival or other similar event. The Longs have led a simple life. He has never owned a new car. The house was cozy, just like home should be. In his small shop were three sanders, forms of cardboard Long had made dulcimer patterns for, and various varnishes and accessories. He held up a power drill and grinned saying, "No telling how many of these I have worn out over the years!" (At this rate, Hollis Long could make about 1000 dulcimers by the time he is 95!)

"I am afraid, sometimes, that I will be remembered more for the Dulcimers than for doing what I could for my God," Long said as we sat at his table. I reminded him that most of the music played on his instruments are old hymns and Gospel songs. Many a song of praise has been lifted to the Master from the work of your hands, Mr. Long. I am sure He is pleased!

Hollis Long is still an active member of the Golden First Baptist Church. He is still active in the Boy Scouts of America, a group he has served for nearly fifty years. He is a member of several local and national historic folklore preservation societies and was honored when one of his dulcimers was permanently displayed at the Campbell's Folk School, where he has attended and taught classes for over twenty-five years. Hollis Long was also voted The Belmont Journal Man of the year in 1985 and has been honored for numerous community efforts.

The Long children have followed the hard work and example of their parents. Martha Long, a music major who went into Elementary Education, now lives with her husband Gary Deaton and their children in Charlotte, North Carolina. Craig Long and wife Martha Carter Long, live next door, up the street from his parents with their two children in Golden.

With a smile on his face, Mr. Hollis said, "I was brought up at a simpler time and have tried to keep with that. I have made enough money to live on and my wife and I have enjoyed our life together. If there are any roads I have missed, it sure isn't because I didn't bother to look for them!" We got up from the table and I chatted with Mrs. Long as the two brothers picked up their instruments again to play for a while. They covered a few gospel songs, an old Hank Williams tune and a few Blue Grass licks before J.R. and I left. "Don't be a stranger and don't forget Dulcimer Day on the Seventeenth!" he said waving goodbye. I looked at the gray haired man with a gray mustache over his ever present smile and thought of how many lives he has touched with his testimony, his heartfelt concern for his fellow man and his music. Mr. Long may not be as rich as some in earthly treasures

yet he is and always has been faithful to his family, community and especially to his Lord. God blesses each of us with talents. There may not be a lot of gold in Golden but the

community is rich to have a man who shares his talents with all who hear the music from his heart.

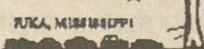

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Iuka Hospital Mammography Program Accredited By National Radiology Group

Women who choose Iuka Hospital for their mammograms can rest assured knowing that one of the nation's toughest surveying groups just gave Iuka Hospital its stamp of approval.

Iuka Hospital's radiology department was recently notified of approval by the American College of Radiology's Mammography Accreditation Program. The accreditation indicates the Iuka Hospital's mammography facility has met all necessary requirements, which include a stringent review by a panel of breast cancer-detection experts.

The reviewers evaluate the staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs. The quality of the image and the amount of radiation are measured and must meet rigid standards. The accreditation program assures that only qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that only equipment specifically designed for mammography be used. The goal is to ensure that women receive the best mammographic examination with the lowest possible risk.

Iuka Hospital's advanced mammography system provides high image quality for easier diagnosis of breast disease. "Most breast cancer mammograms are negative, when they aren't, early detection makes all the difference," Elmer Hunt, Iuka Hospital radiology supervisor,

said.

According to Dorsey Parker, a radiologic technologist who

performs mammograms, the woman's breast is compressed while exposing it to a small dose of radiation. A film under the breast captures the resulting image. Each breast is routinely examined for two angles, above the breast and from the side toward the center. After the radiologist reviews the mammogram, additional views may be obtained, if necessary.

A screening mammogram is used to detect breast cancer, and usually the test detects cancer long before it can be found by physician examination or other diagnostic methods.

Diagnostic mammograms can rule out or confirm the presence of breast disease or abnormalities, which may include cancer. Appointments for screening and diagnostic mammograms are scheduled by the woman's physician.

Mammogram results are read by a radiologist, a physician who specializes in interpreting x-ray, ultrasound and other types of imaging studies. Appointments for all mammography services are scheduled in advance by calling (601) 423-4502 or 1-800-843-3375.

While there is no known way to prevent breast cancer, the best strategy is to reduce risk factors whenever possible and follow

guidelines for early detection. The American Cancer Society recommends monthly breast self-examination for women age 20 and older. Women should also have a clinical breast exam by a health professional every three years for ages 20 - 39 and annually over age 40. Women age 40 and older should also have a screening mammogram every year.

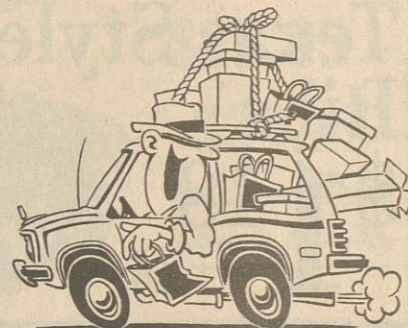
During power outages, here are some suggestions to assist TCEPA employees in restoring your service:

- 1) Before calling TCEPA, check your fuse or breaker box for blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers. If you don't see any, ask your neighbors if they have lost their power, too.
- 2) When you call to report an outage, be prepared to provide the name on your account, your 911 address (house and road number), and your telephone number.
- 3) In an outage during extreme cold or hot weather, turn off all major electric appliances, and heat or air conditioning. Leave a single light switch turned on so you will know when the problem is solved. Five to ten minutes after power has been restored, you may begin turning on electrical appliances and heating or cooling as necessary.
- 4) Put up a 911 address sign to help us locate you.
- 5) Turn on an outside light after power has been restored so that repair crews will know that their work has been successful.



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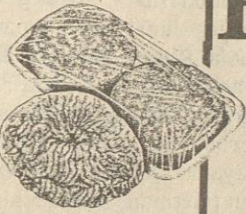

County Agents Notes

Can Fire Ants Eat Grits And Die?

This is just not true. Those who believe this think that the ant eats the grit particle, the particle swells, causing the ant to swell and burst. The only problem with this reasoning is that fire ants do not eat solid food. Solid food is collected by the ants, returned to the colony and placed in small indentations on the abdomen of the larva (immature ant). In response to food, the larva secretes enzymes that digest and reduce the food to a liquid that can be sucked up by worker ants and distributed to other colony members. For more information on the best available control of fire ants call the Extension Office at 423-7016.

Termite Control

Homeowners may see swarms of termites this time of the year. Some might call these flying ants but there are several ways to tell the difference between ants and termites. Contact our office for an information sheet concerning this. If you see a swarm of termites outside a building, it is not an indication of termites inside the building, but if the swarm is inside the building then you have a problem.

The removal of chlordane from the market in 1988 severely limited the homeowner's ability to control termites without the help of a professional. Pest control professionals have the equipment,

the chemicals, and the expertise necessary for good control. Chemicals registered for termite control are Dursban TC, Demon TC, Prevail, Tribute, Dragnet, Torpedo and Biflex. Only pest control professionals have access to these chemicals. One chemical, Dursban, is available to the homeowner but at a weaker concentration than Dursban TC. Dursban is sold under different trade names but two of these are Ortho Chlor and ChlorGard. Above all, read label directions carefully, especially when working in a poorly ventilated area.

Warm Season Forages

Bermudagrass and other warm season grasses are coming out of winter dormancy. If you need good growth from these forages then you need to fertilize according to a soil test. If a soil test is not available then 500 lbs. of 13-13-13 and a ton of lime will probably help these pastures and hay fields. Soil sample boxes and forage information sheets are available at the Extension Office 423-7016.

Old Tishomingo Traces

A few days ago I received a call from Inez Sprouse Patterson of Byron, Georgia who is related to me through our Scruggs line. I have known Inez since the 1960's when we bowled in the same league at Plaza Lanes in Corinth. In our recent conversation, I asked Inez if she remembered my great-aunt Josie Bonds Sprouse who was her aunt by marriage to Tom Sprouse. She said that she had many fond memories of Aunt Josie and Uncle Tom.

I asked Inez if she would mind writing her memories about them and sending them to me. Josie was my grandmother Mary (Bonds) Bullard's youngest sister. They were the daughters of Lemuel and Sarah (Scruggs) Bonds. Inez didn't know that her Aunt Josie was also her "cousin". I never knew my grandmother or Aunt Josie, so I am truly grateful to Inez for sharing the following reminiscences:

Special Relatives - Gone But Not Forgotten

My dear Aunt Josie and Uncle Tom P. Sprouse lived near Doskey, MS in Tishomingo County. Uncle Tom was a brother of my grandfather Hosea Sprouse, a veterinarian at Corinth. When I was a child we, mother, daddy, brother and I spent many happy days with them. They lived in a three-room "L" shaped house, the front room, as they called

it, served as a living room and bedroom. They had two full beds and several cane bottom chairs around a large open fireplace that heated this room. The back side of the house had a porch where wood was stacked for use in the fireplace. Uncle Tom was an average-size man but heavy around the waist which made it hard for him to get up and down. He would poke the fire and say, "I'll get a back stick in a few minutes to keep the fire going." Aunt Jo would jump up and go to the porch and get it. He would wink at daddy, laugh and say, "It works every time!" Aunt Jo was very petite and loved to wait on him. He would say, "I've got to put my socks on," and she would get down on her knees and put them on for him.

The next room had no heat, and I mean NO heat. There was always two full beds and if extra company came, she put up another. It was a very, very cold room in the wintertime. Aunt Jo made quilts out of old pants and coats, etc. and tied them with a needle and thread. Part of this room was made out of logs and the cracks were not completely closed. In cold weather she would put at least five quilts on these beds. If it snowed in the night, Aunt Jo got up early the next morning and took the top quilt off carefully and out to the porch to shake snow off. We'd be covered up in snow.

The kitchen was off the back

bedroom in another large room. Aunt Jo's wood stove had a warmer on top for left over food. Also had a reservoir to heat water. She would take ashes

out of the stove often to put on her flowers to keep ants away. Aunt Jo wore her thin hair in twist on the back of her head, and wore a sweater and an apron most of the time. She made biscuits every morning and always had a piece of dough about the size of her fist left. She lay it aside until after breakfast. She cooked oatmeal, eggs, and had butter and jelly. She would add extra oatmeal to the two cups left each morning. After breakfast, before she washed the dishes she would roll out the dough left from biscuits and make a pie shell, but leftover oatmeal in a bowl with a dab of butter, dash of salt, 1/2 cup sugar, a little milk and a few drops of vanilla. Boy, was that a good pie! She never threw anything away.

Aunt Jo and Uncle Tom slept in the front room. she sat on left side of fireplace and he sat on right side. Both had a window to watch the road. The telephone hung on wall by Aunt Jo. they were on a party line and answered to rings like two short and one long. Aunt Joe knew it wasn't her ring but could not help listening in. That would have been o.k. but if the caller asked the called person a question and she didn't know the answer, Aunt Joe would tell her and it would make them so mad. They would tell her to hang up so the transmission would be better. She would just laugh and hang up. Traffic wasn't heavy out there so when a car passed that Aunt Jo could not figure out, she would ring Central (telephone office) and say, "A car passed that I didn't know, Miss Maundy, call me when they pass you and tell me who it was." The telephone office lady would

call her back. She loved that phone.

Aunt Jo loved baked sweet potatoes. At night before she and Uncle Tom went to bed (about dark), she would wash and dry a pan of sweet potatoes, put out red hot coals from fireplace on the hearth and put potatoes in an iron dutch oven, cover the lid with the coals and go to bed. After mid-night they would ease out of bed, sit by the fire and eat those buttered sweet potatoes. They were really just two shadows in front of the fire. No lamps were lit. We slept in their room at times and loved to watch them. Aunt Jo used that iron pot for cakes, also, which she called pone cake and smeared homemade jelly and butter on while it was hot. She would go out in the springtime and dig red sassafras roots to make tea for a spring tonic. Also, she knew where a wild green grape vine was and would pick them to make country cobbler (pie). She wasn't a fancy cook but could compete with the best on simple

dishes.

Their neighbor died and had two young daughters named Dorothy Mae and Nell Marlar. They lived with Aunt Jo and Uncle Tom several years. They treated them as their own. Lots of company to them as they had no children. It seemed to me they lived in

a happy world, loved company and life. When Uncle Tom was fighting a fire that got out of hand causing a heart attack, it really shattered Aunt Jo's world. She couldn't live that far out, so she moved into Burnsville. She never seemed the same after he was gone. They were a sweet and happy couple.

(Note: Tom P. Sprouse born March 17, 1874 and died April 2, 1945. Josie Bonds Sprouse born September 17, 1875 and died December 25, 1968. They are both buried at New Salem Cemetery in Tishomingo Co.)

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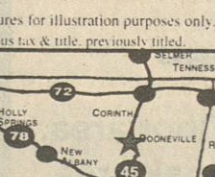
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
