Tishomingo County
authorities arrested a Tishomingo resident for growing marijuana behind his place of residence. Ronald McVay, 44, of 142 County Road 392, Tishomingo, was arrested around 3 p.m. Tuesday, May 4, on charges of manufacturing marijuana, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

"The officers could tell that some plants had been pulled up," Smith said. "We think these were probably some of the larger plants which had already been harvested."

In all, the deputies removed 13 plants, ranging in size from six inches to one foot in height.

McVay was released from jail on a \$50,000 bond.

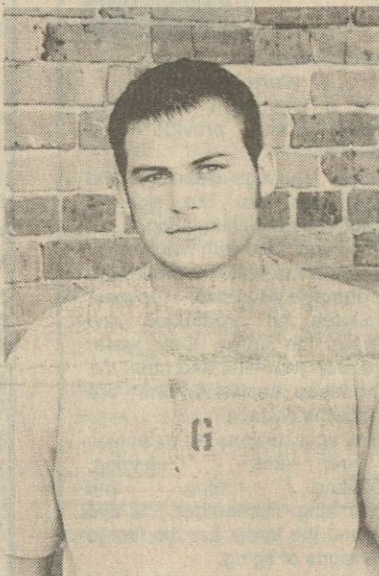

Booneville Resident Arrested On Drug Charges Near Tishomingo

A Booneville man was arrested on drug charges by Tishomingo County authorities Friday night near Tishomingo after a brief car chase.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, Ronald D. McVey, 29, of 1514 E. Church St., Booneville, was arrested and charged with possession of marijuana, more than a kilo (2.2 lbs.) with intent to distribute.

Smith said several deputies from the Sheriff's Department were in an area on Hwy. 30 near Tishomingo doing surveillance around 8 p.m. Friday, May 4, when they observed a vehicle travelling east squealing its tires

on the highway. When the car was blue-lighted, it sped off, according to the Sheriff. After a brief chase, Deputy Randy Butts saw the subject throw a bag from the car.

"When the subject stopped, Officer Butts picked up the bag of marijuana and McVey was arrested," Smith said.

Three others who were riding in the vehicle were charged with misdemeanors.

McVey remained in the Tishomingo County Jail at press time. Bond had been set at \$100,000.

Other officers assisting with the arrest were Ricky Inlow, Rodney Pannell, Donald Thomas and Donnie Edmondson.

School Board Discusses Pay, Summer School

Approval of district employees pay raises, summer school and concern over the Board's choice of out-of-district legal representation were some of the items addressed during Monday night's Tishomingo County School Board Meeting.

Much of Monday night's meeting was held in a closed-door executive session prior to the Board's vote on pay scales and pay raises to the school district's employees.

Upon emerging from the discussions, which lasted over an hour, Board President Danny Davis clarified for those attending that the executive session had been called to discuss "personnel matters."

The Board then voted to approve the State recommended certified teacher and assistant teacher pay scales for the coming school year. Also approved were 8 percent increases in salaries for bus drivers, cafeteria workers, child care assistants, clerical personnel, computer lab assistants, custodians and building level administrators. Additionally, those specified by name who also were approved for 8 percent raises were Betty Barnes, Buddy Hall, Richard Johnson, Sharon Ledbetter, Cindy Murrah, Nelda Pacetti and Bobbie White. Supplements for the district's employees for the 1999-2000 school year were also approved by the Board.

Summer school for the upcoming months was also a topic addressed by the Board. They voted to offer algebra I and English to students this summer at a cost of \$150 per student, per course for those who live in Tishomingo County and \$225 per student, per course for those who live outside the county. It was noted that these classes would need at least 24 students in each in order to make the summer session economically feasible.

Another item brought before the Board Monday night was the fact that the School District has been hiring its legal representation from outside the county. A spokesman representing some area attorneys, Steve Jackson, briefly related to the Board the advantages of hiring local representation. He said there were 10 attorneys within the county and each of them would be very qualified to handle any legal matters the Board might encounter. He also emphasized that it would be to the Board's advantage to keep their tax dollars within the county. Previously the Board hired Tupelo attorney Jamie Barnett as its legal council. None of the Board Members, nor the Superintendent, openly commented at the conclusion of Jackson's remarks.

Mississippi's Rural Rabies Vaccination Campaign

The Mississippi Rural Rabies vaccination campaign will be held Saturday, May 15, in Tishomingo County.

A licensed Veterinarian will administer rabies vaccines to dogs and cats for county residents from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. at the North Crossroads Fire Department and from 3 to 4 p.m. in the Berea Community at J.D. Salvage Grocery.

Cost of the vaccines is \$5 per dog or cat. For safety, all animals must be on a leash or in a pet carrier.

The rural rabies campaign is a cooperative program of the Mississippi Board of Animal Health, Mississippi State Department of Health and the Mississippi Veterinary Medical Association, Inc.

Elderly In Tishomingo Co. To Benefit From New Computer

Elderly or disabled individuals throughout the county will soon be able to take advantage of a free service which will call them on a daily basis to make sure they are all right, thanks to a new computer program being installed by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

The program, "Are You O.K.?", is a telephone reassurance program for low to moderate income homebound individuals which will provide a daily telephone call made by a computer to the homes of those who sign up for the program.

The program is being purchased, in part, with a \$3,000 grant awarded to the Sheriff's Department by the Department of Public Safety's Division of Public Safety Planning—Mississippi Leadership Council on Aging.

Tishomingo County, according to the 1996 Census, is home to 3,949 residents who are 60 years of age and older. Tishomingo County Deputy Russ Robinson, who wrote the grant for the Sheriff's Department, explained that Tishomingo County is only the fourth department in the state to offer this valuable new service to its elderly residents.

"Sheriff Smith has a great concern for the county's elderly population and that is why we applied for this grant," Robinson said.

Robinson said the program should arrive at the Sheriff's Department by next week and they hope to have it fully operational within the next month.

"We urge all the elderly to sign up for this service which will not cost them anything," Robinson said. "We will hold public meetings in the near future where we will explain how it works and sign-up those interested in being called."

The computerized telephone system will make calls to participants at the same time each day, seven days a week, 365 days a year, with each person choosing the time he or she wishes to be called.

If the phone is answered, the

computer assumes there is no problem; however, if the phone is not answered, a deputy is dispatched to the person's home to check on them. In the case of a busy signal, the program attempts to call two more times. If there is no success, the computer puts out an "alert" report. At this point, a neighbor who has previously agreed to assist in the case of an emergency, or a deputy is asked to go and check out a possible emergency. The system is able to

key kids. These are young people whose parents are at work when they get home from school. The system can be programmed to call the homes of these kids in the afternoons, to check if everything is all right.

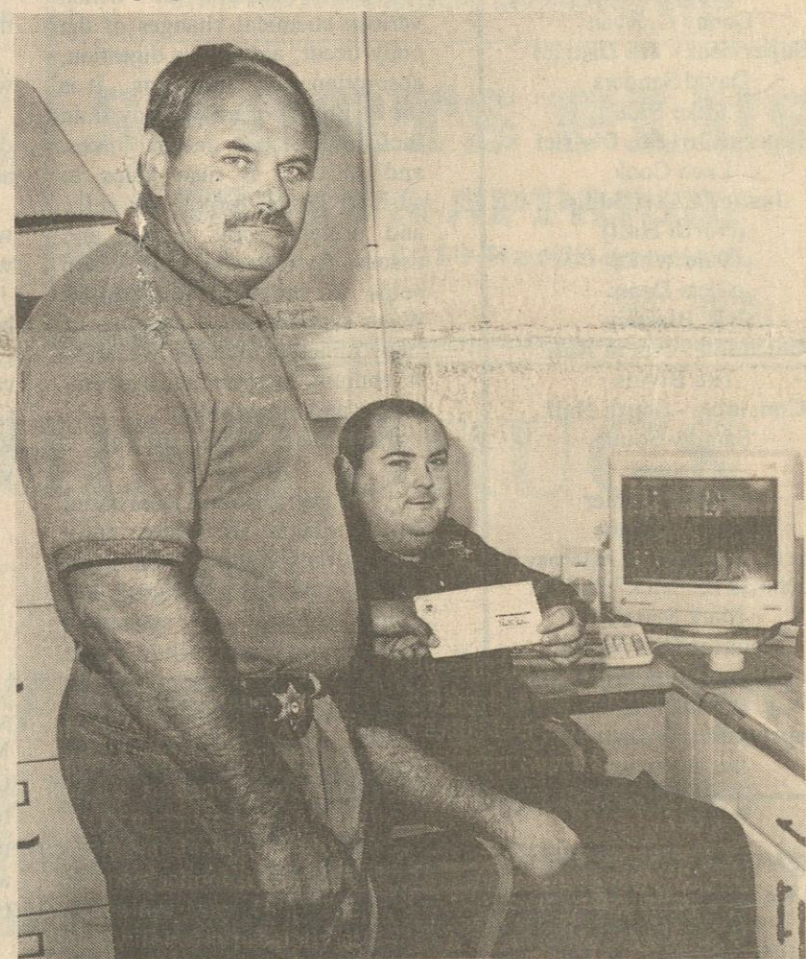
Robinson said this grant will be on-going for programs which will benefit the elderly. In the future, other equipment and updated programs could be purchased, as well as seminars organized and brochures printed dealing with issues that affect the elderly.

Smith reported that the Sheriff's Department is presently working on other grants which will benefit area

Sheriff David Smith said he believes this program will help those elderly persons in the county who wish to maintain or improve their level of independence and feel secure.

Novelist Thomas Hal Phillips To Speak At Iuka Library Luncheon

If you are interested in great writing, whether it's in novels, on television or in the movies, you won't want to miss the Friends of the Iuka Library lunch on Tuesday, May 18. The scheduled speaker is Thomas Hal Phillips.

"I'm going to discuss the programs that appear, in general, on TV," Hal tells us, "and then I'm going to discuss the difference between a novel and a screenplay." In our region, Thomas Hal Phillips is a singular voice, able to speak with authority on these subjects. His writing has brought him international acclaim both as novelist and screenwriter. Hal's rare talent has taken him from the cottonfields of his birth on a farm near Kossuth, Mississippi to win high acclaim for his distinguished writing: the Rosenwald Award, Saxton Award, two Guggenheim Awards, an O. Henry Award and a Fulbright Scholarship, to mention but a few. After serving in the Navy during WWII and participating in the invasions of Anzio, Elba and Southern France, Hal returned to Europe to study at the Sorbonne in Paris and at the University of Bordeaux.

Fulfilling the dreams of his childhood, Hal has produced a wealth of sensitive and insightful

writing that brightens his short stories, fills the pages of his novels and illuminates the screens for countless motion pictures. By 1956 he had five published novels - *The Bitterweed Path*, *The Golden Lie*, *Search for a Hero*, *Kangaroo Hollow* and *The Loved and the Unloved*. In 1952 *Time Magazine* described him as one of two writers most likely to succeed Wolfe, Faulkner and Fitzgerald. Since that time he has focused on writing and consulting for the motion picture industry, and is highly respected in Hollywood for his work as screenwriter and script editor on movies like *Nashville*, *Thieves Like Us*, *The Brain Machine*, *Ode to Billy Joe*, *Tarzan's Fight for Life* and *The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman*.

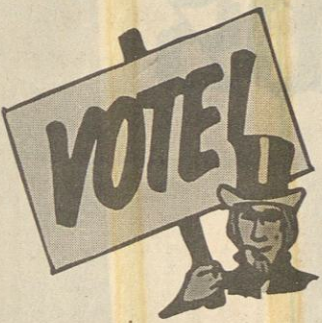

Home Economics Tips

Water: An Essential Nutrient

Although it is often overlooked, water is one of the most important nutrients. It is vital to health and is ranked second only to oxygen as essential for life. A person can live for a few weeks without food, but can only survive a few days without water. On average, an adult body weight is 55 to 75 percent water, which equals about ten to twelve gallons.

Water in Your Body

The primary role of water in the body is to transport nutrients to the body cells and carry waste product away. Water supplies the universal medium in which various chemical changes of the body occur, aiding in digestion, absorption, and circulation. It is the main part of every body fluid including blood, gastric juices, and saliva. It also helps to cushion joints, form body cells, and protect body organs and tissues. By softening stool, it also helps to prevent constipation. Water supplies small amounts of many minerals vital for life, such as sodium, potassium, calcium, copper and magnesium.

How Much Water Do You Need

The average adult loses about 2 1/2 quarts of water daily through perspiration, even when they are just sitting. During hot, humid weather or strenuous physical activity, fluid loss becomes much higher. Water replenishes the body's cooling system, enabling it to survive sweltering heat or elevated body temperatures due to exercise.

Sweating cools the body by evaporating water on the surface of the skin and dispersing excess heat.

Water is also removed during bodily functions including urination, bowel movements, and breathing. To avoid dehydration and to keep your body working normally, it is imperative to replace lost fluids. This is imperative

because unlike other nutrients, the human body does not store an extra supply of water that can be used when there is a time of need.

Most people need eight to twelve cups of water daily. This includes water that is found in milk, juices, and some solid fluids. Milk is about 87% water; meat ranges from 40 to 75% water; and vegetables are as much as 95% water. Even foods normally considered "dry" such as cereal and bread contain about 8 to 3% water.

To Increase Your Water Intake and Prevent Dehydration

1. Take water breaks during the day instead of coffee breaks.
2. Complement food with water, milk, or juice.
3. Drink water before, during, and after any physical activity, especially in hot weather.
4. Consume 4 to 8 ounces of water every 15 to 20 minutes while you exercise.
5. Travel with a supply of bottled water.
6. Decrease your intake of caffeine and alcoholic beverages. Caffeine and alcohol act as diuretics, causing the body to lose water through increased urination.

Beginning June 1, MDOT Will No Longer Tolerate Political Advertising on Highway Rights of Way

During its regular semimonthly meeting, the Mississippi Transportation Commission voted unanimously to begin strictly enforcing regulations pertaining to political advertising on state maintained rights of way.

The three-member elected Transportation Commission is comprised of commissioners Zack Stewart, northern district; Dick Hall, central district; and Wayne Brown, southern district.

"Individuals with political signs posted on Mississippi Department of Transportation (MDOT) rights of way will be given until June 1, 1999, to remove them," Hall said. "After that time, MDOT forces will begin removing political advertisements on a regular basis."

The commissioners asked that MDOT's maintenance forces hold the salvageable signs for a reasonable period of time before disposing of them. Sign owners may retrieve the signs from local MDOT maintenance shops

without penalty.

Often political advertisements are erected on wire stands, which could become a safety hazard when mowing.

In addition, most political advertisements are now constructed using non-biodegradable materials. These materials, when left on state maintained rights of way, become an additional tax burden to the people of Mississippi who must pay to have them removed.

Eyes Working As a Team

The ability of both eyes to aim simultaneously at the same object should be automatic and smooth. Both eyes must work as a team or double vision and a variety of other problems might be present. Each eye has six extraocular muscles and they all must be functioning as a team or improper alignment and impaired depth perception results.

Double vision (diplopia) from faulty alignment is very uncomfortable and the brain tends to suppress one image to restore visual comfort. Sometimes an extra muscular effort is required to maintain alignment and this frequently causes headache and fatigue.

Remedies include correcting any refractive error and the use of visual re-education techniques. Prisms are sometimes used to correct eye coordination. They change the direction of the light rather than the focusing. The image then falls on corresponding parts of the backs of both eyes. This compensates for any misalignment. As a result, the eyes will see as if they are both pointing in the same direction.

Smile Enhancement

There are many types of cosmetic procedures depending on the desired outcome. Bleaching, bonding, veneers and enamel shaping are available and generally painless.

Bleaching brightens discolored teeth. It can be performed on all types of teeth in certain types of discoloration is more difficult to remove. In addition, some patients' teeth whiten more than others. There are two types of bleaching procedures: those done completely in the dental office (chairside bleaching), or those dispensed by the dentist to be used at home (nightguard bleaching). The advantages of bleaching are that it's economical and does not require tooth removal.

Bonding is a procedure in which tooth-colored materials are applied to the enamel. Bonding covers discolorations, repairs chips and cracks, and fills in gaps. Bonding is often completed in one visit and does not require the use of anesthesia or drilling. Periodically, bonding may need to be replaced.

Veneers are thin pre-shaped shells made of tooth-colored materials that are designed to cover the front side of teeth. They are affixed directly to the tooth usually without the need for an anesthetic. Veneers can chip or peel if not cared for properly, so good oral hygiene is important. Once teeth are veneered they need to be periodically re-veneered.

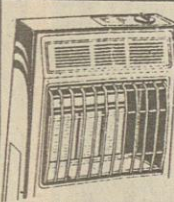

Bless You and Keep You." Dr. Ray Harris will be the accompanist.

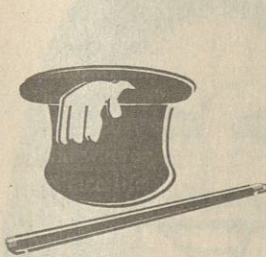

April 19th, your Mississippi area code may be changing to 662.

Northern Mississippi needs phone numbers. Numbers for the kids, numbers for the office, numbers for pagers, faxes, and cell phones. And don't forget about computer modems. Each one needs a number, and there are only so many to go around. It's just a mathematical fact. So to open up a few million more, northern Mississippi is getting a new area code: 662. If your area code is currently 601 and your phone number begins with any of the prefixes below, 662 will be your new area code.

On April 19, 1999, a portion of Mississippi will be assigned the new 662 area code. Then, through April 30, 2000, you can dial 601 or 662 to make long distance calls to or within northern Mississippi. After this transition period is over, only the new 662 area code can be used to complete calls to and within the 662 area. Local calling rates will not be affected.

Please make a note of 662 and begin preparing for the change. You may need to reprogram telecommunications equipment like speed dialers, fax machines, PBXs - virtually anything that dials numbers automatically (consult your vendor if you're not sure). And if you live in northern Mississippi, be sure to let friends and loved ones know that your area code is changing.

Chief Tishomingo A Series Of Articles By Christian Evans

TISHOMINGO, the name means "Warrior Chief" in the Chickasaw tongue. Though this aptly describes the wise old leader in battle, he was without a doubt a man whose only wish was for peace among his and all other people. He was admired and respected among leaders of the whites as he was among Native Americans.

It is believed Tishomingo was born near the Carrollville community near present day Baldwin, Mississippi in 1737. He was barely old enough to earn the title of "Chieftain" by fighting in the French and Indian War. Though barely a teenager, it is believed that Tishomingo quickly learned the art of warfare. His bravery was noted by fellow warrior "Mad Anthony" Wayne.

When the Redcoats broke the treaties with the Chickasaws and other southern tribes in the years leading up to the American Revolution, the Chickasaws allied with the "Yankee Rebels". Tishomingo, now a leader in the warrior ranks, was recognized for his skill and wisdom in diplomacy as well as war. He was known for his wisdom and logic by leaders such as General George Washington in whose army Tishomingo had one time served as a full fledged general. He later visited Washington when the General became president while in office in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Before the Revolutionary War, Tishomingo stood up to the renegade Tecumseh who attempted to launch an Indian war against the colonist. Tishomingo warned his people against the plan of Tecumseh fearing disaster. The Chickasaws were the only southern tribe who refused to support the war on Tishomingo's objections. This wise move avoided disaster for the peaceful Chickasaw people and won favor for the aging chief with the leaders of the new emerging nation. Tishomingo was an Indian leader who showed his authority throughout the closing decades of the eighteenth-century and continued his friendship by supporting the peaceful coexistence between the new nations into the early Eighteenth.

The old warrior came to the aid of the Yankees against invading British forces in the War of 1812. When Andrew Jackson led his men through this area in 1814 on the way to The Battle of New Orleans, Tishomingo was considered a General by Jackson and his forces as they were led through the Chickasaw Territory of North Mississippi. (Years earlier, Tishomingo had made a treaty with the United States Government opening up the Natchez Trace, at that time, little more than a footpath through the

wilderness, hardly even a road.)

-After the war, Tishomingo was given an annuity of \$150 a year by the president for his service and cooperation. This was quite a sum in those days. Tishomingo was quite wealthy. He owned quite a large farm near Carrollton and had a sizable slave holding. The old chief governed over a quarter of the Chickasaw nation in this era. He presided over the agreement to secede land to the federal government acting on behalf of his people in the Treaty of Pontotoc in 1832.

In 1831-32, a criminal trespass case against two liquor peddlers whose wares were seized and the trespassers banned from the territory ended when the 95 year old chief was thrown in jail pending the outcome of the trial. He

was not held long and was soon released when the trial ended.

In 1836, Tishomingo sold his farm for an agreed upon sum of \$2,400 but was cheated out of the fully agreed price. The case was largely overlooked by the legal system as the great chief was about to be removed from his homeland on the Trail of Tears. It is said that the chief cursed the land saying that, "The white man shall shed his blood with his brothers on this land in a short time to come." Twenty four years later, the Battle of Brices Crossroads in the Civil War was fought near Tishomingo Creek on the farm land once cursed by the chief who foresaw the event. Legend? Coincidence? That is for the individual to decide!

In 1837, Tishomingo turned one hundred twenty years old herself, prepared a feast in honor of the chief. It is said that Tishomingo's daughter married Tom Bigbee and lived in the Cotton Gin Port area. It is also written that Tishomingo's wife was buried on the farm at Carrollton before the sad leader left on the Trail of Tears in 1838.

Tishomingo's mother (whose name was said to have been "Itawamba") died on the migration near Little Rock, Arkansas. This is where Chickasaw history indicated she was buried. Some accounts put Tishomingo as dying of small pox in the same location of his mother. More research with the elder historians of the Chickasaw Nation in Oklahoma claim that Tishomingo survived to travel into present day Oklahoma (near Fort Coffee) Mr. Cecil Sumners, who thoroughly researched this material in his book on the great chief, supports this belief. Upon studying the evidence presented by Mr. Sumners, I must agree with his findings. It is said that the Oklahoma

Chickasaw Nation use the book "Chief Tishomingo" written in 1976 by Mr. Cecil Sumners, to be the most authoritative text on their people and their beloved Chickasaw Chief.

Another account appeared in a letter to the editor of "The Vidette" in 1969. The letter was written by Mr. W.R. Akers and reads: "Maybe this will clear up the date and place of death of Chief Tishomingo." Akers quoted a passage from "The Five Civilized Tribes" by Grant Foreman, page 103, "Chief Tishomingo lived several years after the removal of the tribe and died May 5, 1841 (Arkansas Gazette, May 26, 1841, reporting the death at Eagleton of Chief Tishomingo."

The article quotes from the Arkansas Gazette, "May 6, 1841 Captain Tishomingo (though we know was a General in army records), a veteran warrior of the Chickasaws, departed this life on the 5th. Although little known beyond the limits of his own nation, yet he was a man who has seen wars and fought battles stood high among his people as a brave and good man...His last words were, "When I am gone, beat the drum and fire the gun."

Eagleton, one part of the Arkansas Territory now in Oklahoma, was the final resting place of the chieftain. This should clear up some controversy between Oklahoma and Arkansas laying claim to a final resting place of the chieftain. This should clear up some controversy between Oklahoma and Arkansas laying claim to a final resting place. A letter in the Commercial Appeal dated 1898, the commander of the Fort

where the chieftain died recalled the tribe asking for gunpowder to fulfill the chief's request. Unaware of the great chief's service to the United States, the commander failed to realize that Tishomingo was entitled to full military honors. It was only later that a daughter brought in a piece of parchment to show the commander. "OH MY GOD! HAD I KNOWN THIS I'D HAVE CALLED UP THE ENTIRE REGIMENT!" He exclaimed. The paper was the official enlistment of Tishomingo naming him to the rank of General signed by General Washington himself.

Regardless of the final tributes, the great chief heard the drums and guns, sending his spirit to the lands beyond. It is clear that the old chief left his mark in war and peace. He will always be remembered for the places that still bear his name.

I think the name "Warrior Chief" is sometimes misleading for I feel that the land that joins Itawamba, Prentiss, Alcorn Counties in Mississippi, Hardin County Tennessee, Colbert County Alabama and draws life from the Tennessee River, Bear Creek and the healing waters of the mineral springs is a peaceful place anyone can be proud to call "HOME".

Beginning Note: Due to the favorable response of the recent article on Chief Iuka, I decided to share some facts on the great Chief Tishomingo. I hope you all learn something and enjoy this piece as much as I did writing and researching it!

6-Year-Old Kossuth Student Killed At Railroad Crossing

A Kossuth High School sophomore was crossing a railroad intersection near his home Monday when he was struck by a train and killed.
Michael R. "Mikie" Robbins, 16, of County Road 711, was pronounced dead at the scene by Alcorn County Coroner Dan Leeth. According to Alcorn County Sheriff's Department Deputy Larry Lanford, the teenager was traveling west on County Road 715 just after 11 a.m. Monday toward Wenasoga when he was hit by the Norfolk Southern train at the railroad crossing. The impact was on the driver's side door of his 1990 automobile.

Upon impact, the train, which was travelling at an estimated speed of 47 or 48 mph, pushed the vehicle approximately one-half mile before it was able to stop, Lanford said.

Michael Ray "Mikie" Robbins II, died due to head and chest trauma. He played trumpet in Kossuth High School Marching Band for two years and was enrolled in Electronics at the Alcorn County Vo-Tech Center. 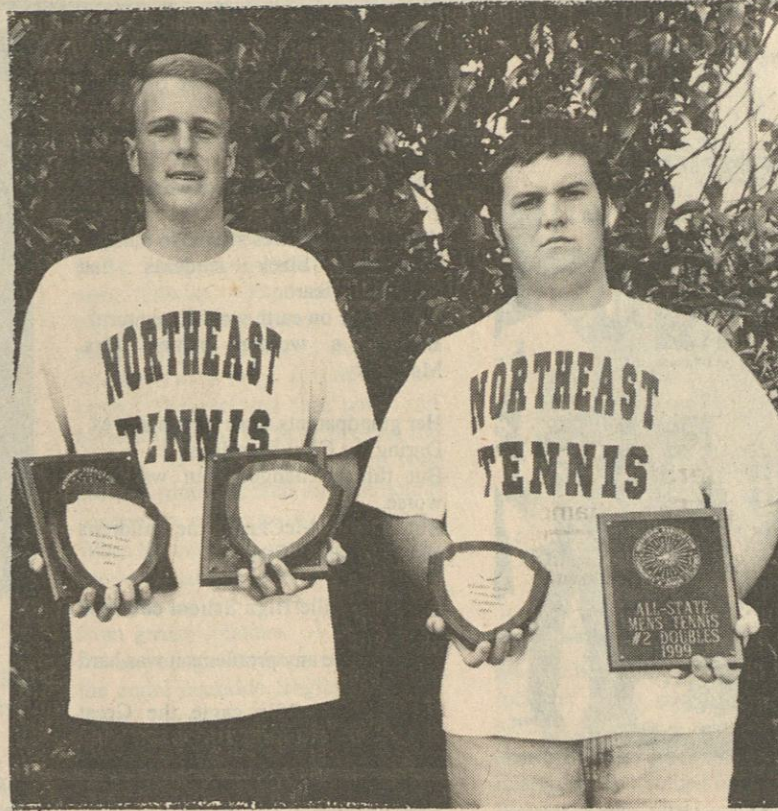

Coats & Marlar Claim Region 23 & State Juco Tennis Championships

Coach Jeff Clay's Northeast Mississippi Community College men's tennis team recently finished third in the Region 23/State Tournament held at Jones County Junior College in Ellisville. The Tiger men claimed three Region 23/State Championships on the weekend. Iuka's Chris Coats claimed the #6 Singles championship, Coats and Brad Marlar of Iuka teamed to win the #2 Doubles crown, and Belmont's Norman Epps took the #3 Singles title. The 3rd place team finish was the highest overall final ranking for the Tiger men in school history, tying the 1996 squad. The top two teams advanced to the National Tournament in Corpus Christi, Texas. Individual championship winners do not move on. Northeast's men have now finished in the top five in the year-ending tournament for four consecutive seasons.

Coats entered the tournament as the #2 seed and began his march to the title with a 6-3, 6-4 victory over Pearl River's Kevin Rhudy in the Quarterfinals. In the

Semifinals, Coats defeated Trey Crumpton of Jones by the score of 6-2, 6-1. In the championship match, Coats handled the #1 seed, Hind's Joey Tuccio 3-6, 6-0, 6-0. The loss was Tuccio's first of the season. Coats' only in-state loss of the year came during the Tigers' opening match of the year back in February to Tuccio in a close contest. Coats finished the year 12-2 in Singles play, with his other loss coming in a close match in April to Northwest Shoals, Alabama.

In #2 doubles action, Coats and Marlar opened the tournament with a 6-1, 6-1 whipping of Meridian. The Quarter finals saw the Iuka duo defeat the #3 seeded team for Copiah-Lincoln 4-6, 6-2, 6-2. Coats and Marlar faced the 2nd seeded tandem from Itawamba in the Semifinal round and claimed a 4-6, 6-4, 6-2 win. They won the title in the Finals over #1 Hinds by a 6-0, 6-0 count. Coats and Marlar finished the year 10-3 overall, avenging two tight regular season losses to Itawamba in the tournament.

Many lucky families were able, To put food on their table. But our country did survive, And once again the economy started to thrive.

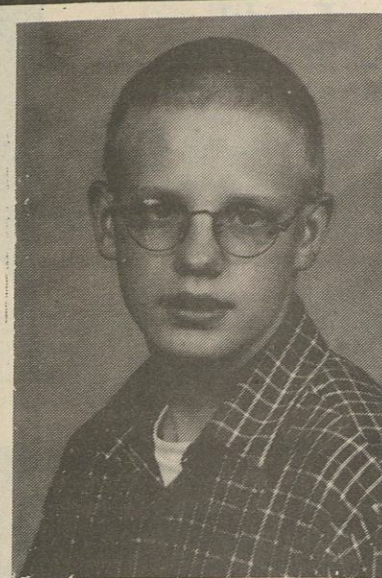
Then came a time of sadness, Which became a war of pure madness. As the Jews became endangered species, At the hands of Hitler's Nazi's.

TVA as our power supplier has and continues to implement a comprehensive Y2K review and remediation plan. Finally, TVA and Tishomingo County Electric Power Association are in the process of developing a contingency plan so that we can resume normal operations in the event of a system failure.

We believe our distribution facilities will be capable of operating without significant interruption caused by the transition into the next century.

Old Tishomingo Traces

My Home in Happy Hollow

A home is more than four walls and a roof. It is a place to which memory takes flight years after the parents have died and all the children have become grandpas and grandmas, where comradeship, loyalty and right from wrong. Home is a place where carefree days were spent surrounded by loved ones, and where young lives were prepared to face life with all its joys and sorrows.

When I think of home, my mind rushes back to the house where I was born and spent the first ten years of life. It was, by no means, a fine house. In fact, by today's standards, it was a very primitive building with its rust-spotted, tin roof and rough-hewn plank walls. With no insulation, it was hot in summer and cold in winter. In order to keep our feet warm on cold, winter nights, mother heated flat irons in the open fireplace, wrapped them in old newspapers and rags, and placed them at our feet. In the intense heat of summer, mother used wet towels made from coarse-woven feed sacks to put across our foreheads to keep us cool at night. Sometimes we would take our quilts outside and make pallets on the porch. But of all the places I have ever lived, our homeplace in Happy Hollow evokes the most vivid images of good times, of love and laughter shared with family, and ... in my mind, it is still HOME to me.

My father Olen Bullard bought the house in Happy Hollow from Oscar Lambert in 1936, a year before I was born. He borrowed \$600 from Aunt Bette Bullard to purchase the house, barn and eighty acres of farm and timber land.

The simple, weathered-gray, dog-trot structure stood proudly on top of a red clay hill overlooking a large valley dotted with oak, blackgum, maple and pine trees. Our next-door neighbors were the Ed Lambert family to the right and the Charlie McDuffy family to the left. Across the road and to the left about a quarter mile was the Jess McDuffy's later Luther Lambert's, and behind us were the Code Brown's and Alfred McDuffy's. If you turned left at Charley McDuffy's place which was just below our house, then turned right past Old Pleasant Hill Church, the road would take you to North Cross

Roads Community which was about three miles away. If you went straight at Charley's, past Barnes Chapel School and turn right at John Lambert's, you would come to the Doskey Community. Other neighbors in Happy Hollow were the families of John Cole, Arl White, Mrs. Lizzie Morris, Jim McDuffy, Bill McDuffy, Elmer McDuffy, George Lambert, and Rass Hicks. We lived about fifteen miles from Iuka. Our barn and pasture were across the road from the house. Cole's Mill Creek meandered between

our pasture and cultivated land. The corn and cotton fields and pea patch were on the bottom land hillside beyond the creek. The outer edge of the fields were surrounded by sedge grass and flaming red sumac bushes bordered by tall, fragrant pines. A small pond was located at the edge of the pasture just below the barn to the left. That was the favorite place for me and my niece Sue Gross, who was two years younger than me, to have picnics. She was the daughter of my sister Audrey who married in 1936 just before the family moved to Happy Hollow. Looking from the house, the pig pen was located to the right side of the barn. Beyond was a fenced-in, wooded area which was the hog lot. Each year my younger brothers Denzol, Wallace and Ronnie cleared the lot of tree sprouts which quickly emerged from the warming earth in the springtime, while my older brothers Orlan, Odie and Dennis plowed the fields. Since I was the baby of the family, my job was to carry water to my brothers when they were working in the fields.

My family made many improvements on the house and farm. Papa and the boys planted a hedge row across the edge of the yard to stop erosion of the red clay bank in front of the house. They whitewashed the weathered exterior of the house. Black locust trees were planted on the slope behind the back yard. Mother and my sister Florine cleared the yard of grass and weeds. They first scraped the grass off with hoes, then with a brush broom made from dogwood limbs, they swept the debris into neat piles which they burned. One summer just after Mother swept the yard, my nephew Jack Gross, who was my age, was visiting us. He took a stick and made an "X" on the clean ground. He said, "Mama Bullard, when I die I

want to be buried right here!" Jack, Sue and their younger brother Jerry visited us every summer, and loved the place as much as I did.

Inside the house a rock fireplace was located in the room to the left of the entrance and the front room, or parlor, was to the right. The kitchen was just behind the room with the fireplace. A door led from the kitchen to the back porch which joined the open hallway. Papa enclosed the hallway and back porch. The front porch was extended over the well so we didn't have to go outside to draw water. The enclosed back porch and back half of the hallway became the kitchen. A long table, covered with red and white checked oilcloth held a prominent position in the kitchen. When the oilcloth became too faded to use on the table, Mother hung it on the wall behind the stove to protect it from grease splatters. A long bench for us younger children to sit on ran the entire backside length of the big table. Ladder back, cane bottom chairs, which were brought from the sitting area in front of the fireplace,

were placed at the front side and ends of the table where Mother, Papa and the older children sat. A black cast-iron cook stove with white porcelain doors stood in one corner of the enclosed porch. A green wooden pie safe with screen-paneled doors was in another corner. A white cabinet with red decals of kitchen utensils on the doors, stood adjacent to the stove. A tilt-out flour bin was on the upper portion of the cabinet. A slatted door pulled down and covered cans labeled with Folger, Lipton, Arm and Hammer and Clabber Girl. The counter space on the lower part of the cabinet was made of white porcelain trimmed with a black stripe. Mother used this space to roll out dough when making biscuits for breakfast, or when she made dumplings for a fresh apple or blackberry cobbler which she cooked in a large, graniteware dish pan.

On entering the house you had to go through a large, dark hallway with no windows. It was kind of eerie to enter on a sunny day and become engulfed in total darkness except for the sunbeams shining through racks around the front door. Papa had built some shelves to the immediate right of the door, and Mother concealed them behind a flowered curtain. One day I was snooping around when I saw a "belt." The best I could tell, it was a pretty, shiny object, but when I reached for it, it slipped through my fingers. It was very cold and quite heavy for a leather belt so I decided to

ask Mother about it. I ran to her and told her about my discovery. She assured me there was no new belt but she would go and see what I was talking about. No belt could be found. Instead, there was a huge brown chicken snake wrapped around a boot on the floor. Mother told me to run. That wasn't necessary because I shot out of the house like a streak of lightning. Mother was right behind me, but she grabbed a hoe and quickly disposed of the intruder. My snooping around in those shelves was halted for quite sometime.

The room to the left of the hallway was our front room. Back then, in the 1940's, a front room or parlor was equivalent to a living room of today, but there were no sofas or love seats for country folk, just cane bottom chairs with broken canes that gouged one's backside. We also had an iron and a brass bed in our front room. When company came, the beds were used to sit on. The brass bed had bedposts with removable caps. It was such fun to take the caps off and drop metal objects in and hear them go clankety-clank to the bottom of the post. Mother, Papa, Wallace and Ronnie slept in the front room. Orlan, Odie, and Dennis had the adjacent bedroom which had previously been the kitchen. Denzol slept on a cot in the hall. Florine and I slept in the bedroom to the left which had two beds, a dresser, a trunk and a what-not shelf.

We had a lot of company in those days. My maternal Grandmother Maggie Littlejohn and her older sister Aunt Julie Duncan came to see us quite often. It was always fun when they visited because Grandma

Littlejohn was young at heart, and Florine was always playing tricks on her. Grandma told stories about when she was a little girl, and we would talk for hours before we finally dozed off. Grandma always kept her slop jar under the bed because she was afraid to go outside after dark. One night she had diarrhea, and even though the pot had a lid on it, the foul odor permeated the still, night air. Aunt Julie scolded her severely for making such a stench in the house. She said, in a shrill voice, "My Stars, Maggie, you're going to give us all the cholera!" Flo and I still laugh about that incident.

I suppose no story describing a country home would be complete without mentioning the infamous outhouse. Ours was located out back just below the log smokehouse. It was a one-seater. Mother periodically made a trip down with a box of matches and Old Vidette newspapers. She rolled up the newspapers, set fire to them and burned spider webs from under the seat. I surely hated to hear Mother Nature's call because we had an old Tom Turkey who always scratched for food on the path that led to the little house. The old gobbler delighted in giving chase when I ran past him. The outhouse was a frightening experience. If the turkey didn't get me, then I would surely get bitten by a black widow spider lurking under the seat.

I loved our old house in Happy Hollow and it's wonderful to remember the good times through a child's eyes. But... Looking back now through my "grandmother's" eyes, I realize there really wasn't anything unique about that house. What made everything so special was MOTHER!

Mounds of crispy, browned biscuits baked in a "Warm Morning" stove... the touch of a Rubenesque body as it bends to kiss away tears... A gentle breath as it cools the sting of iodine on gravel-skinned knees... "Amazing Grace" sung to the rhythm of an iron as it glides over starched, white shirts... wrinkled hands cooling a fevered child's brow... a rocker creaking back and forth as a croupy child is lulled to sleep... Cracked

hands bleeding from hours of scrubbing faded overalls on a metal scrub board... turnip greens, pot "likker" and yellow cornbread served with fatback and an extra helping of love... words of love and thankfulness uttered to God as a child listens in silence... tears of joy when brave sons returned home from fierce wars overseas... These are some of the memories of Mother who made our Happy Hollow house a home. Now, she polishes the sun and moon and causes the stars to twinkle a little brighter as she keeps house in Heaven.

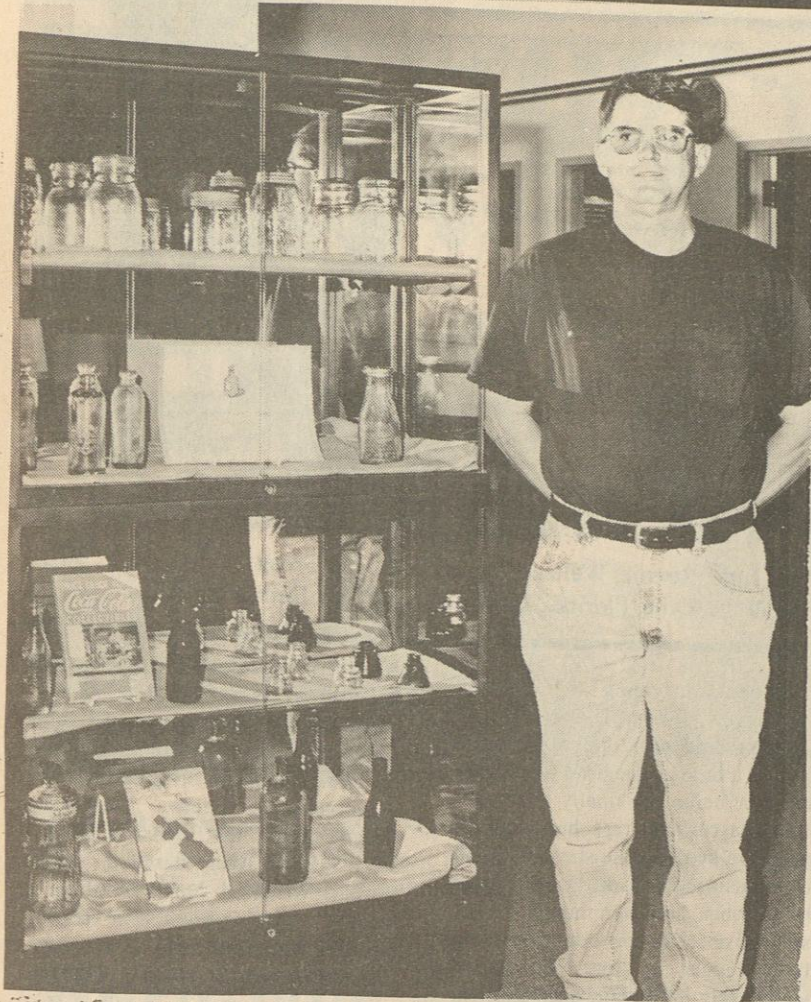

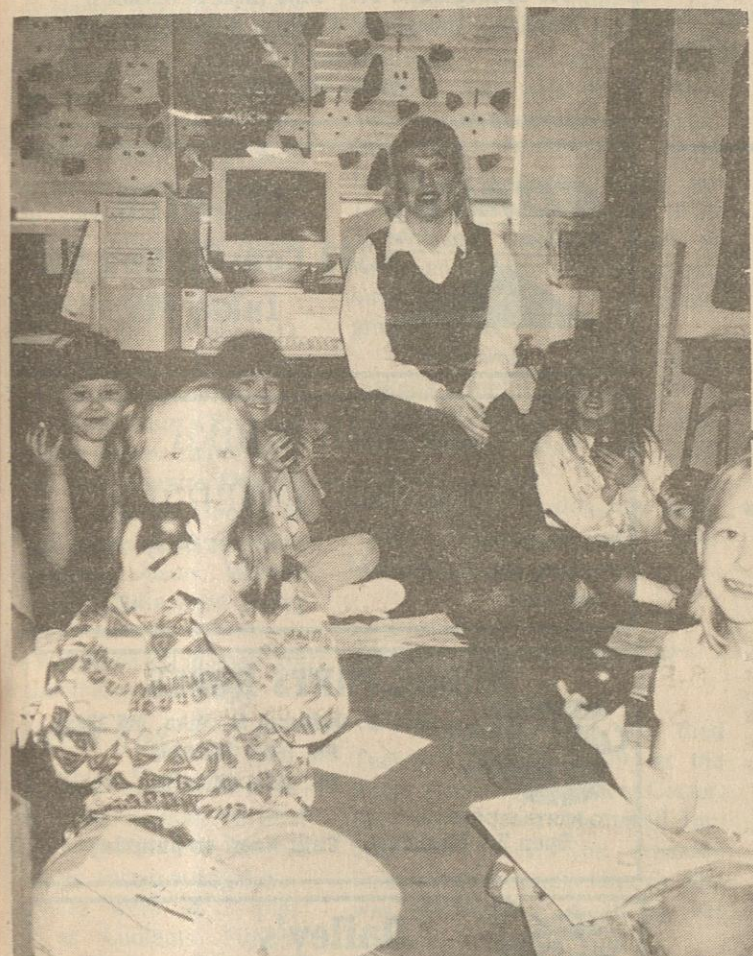

WILL THERE BE A 1000 YEARS OF EARTH? (Part 3)

In the previous two articles in this newspaper series attention has been called refutation of pre-millennialism and its alleged millennialism of Christ on earth for one thousand years-the kingdom argument, the salvation argument and an argument dealing with the last days and when they are.
