

Housing Grants Awarded To luka and Tishomingo

The City of Iuka and the Town of Tishomingo were two of 45 government and community development organizations in Mississippi who are taking advantage of \$14.3 million in grants to provide affordable housing to low income

The money for these grants was approved through the HOME Investment Partnerships Program to help recipients to provide decent and affordable housing to Mississippians.

HOME money can be directed toward a wide variety of housing development activities. These include homeowner rehabilitation, new construction/ substantial rehabilitation, tenantbased rental assistance and homebuyer assistance.

Both Iuka and Tishomingo were awarded grants for new construction and substantial rehabilitation in the amount of \$415,000 each. The City of Iuka plans to construct a 24-unit apartment building on West Quitman Street for low-income families. The town of Tishomingo will be building approximately 24 elderly housing

The HOME program is funded through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and is administered by the Mississippi Department of Economic and Development's Community Community Services Division.

"The HOME program is essential to our state's economic welfare because it assists our most commodity—our citizens," Jimmy Heidel, executive director of the MDECD

The number of government community-based organizations benefiting from this program increased substantially from last year. In FY98, 37 organizations received approximately \$12.8 million for housing improvements compared to 45 organizations and \$14.3 million in FY99.

This year, the money awarded by HUD and distributed by the MDECD will benefit over 2,000 Mississippians in 593 housing units around the state.

The hiring of a new head football coach for Tishomingo County High School and the posting of two full-time administrative positions within the school district were among the topics addressed by the Tishomingo County Board of Education at their meeting Monday night.

Spectators filled up the boardroom at the Tishomingo County School District Office as the Board voted to approve various items on the agenda upon recommendation of Superintendent John Mullins

including the hiring of Bobby Brister of Winona as TCHS head football coach.

Brister will fill the vacancy left by earlier Board choice Charlie Dampeer who decided to return to his position at Kossuth rather than take the position in Tishomingo County.

The Board agreed to hire Brister as a coach and teacher for a salary of \$45,000 a year. According Brister's résumé, he has over 15 years of coaching experience, with six years as a head football coach. In addition to

coaching at Winona for the past five years, he was head football coach at East Webster High School in Maben for one year. He was an assistant coach for three years at Houston High School, for five years at Starkville High School and for two years at

Nettleton High School. Brister is a 1983 graduate of Mississippi State University with a major in physical education and a minor in science. He has teaching certifications in general science, physical education and driver's education. He and his wife, who is also a teacher, have two children.

In other personnel matters, the Superintendent asked the

board to approve the posting of a vacancy for the position of principal of Iuka Middle School. Earlier in the meeting the Board agreed to accept the resignation of current IMS principal Ben McClung and also of his wife, Dianne, who is a fifth grade teacher at IMS.

Mullins also asked the board to approve the posting of a fulltime position for assistant principal at Burnsville School. During this school year, two parttime assistant principals worked at the school. Mullins said that since the school is growing, he believed it would be better if there were one

> assistant principal who could take on full-time duties.

Mullins mentioned summer programs which will be offered-90 students are needed to

in a summer enrichment program and students who are weak in reading and math skills will be recommended for a summer betterment program.

The Board went into closeddoor executive session twice during the meeting: Near the beginning of the meeting to hear discussion concerning TCHS cheerleader selection, and at the end of the meeting to examine a formal written complaint about two members of the staff at TCHS. The reason for going into executive sessions was because it dealt with personnel matters, Mullins said.



Home Economics Tips

Cleaning A Refrigerator

A clean refrigerator keeps your food cooler and safer for your consumption.

The best time to clean the refrigerator is before you go food shopping. If your refrigerator is a self-defrosting model then you will not need to defrost your refrigerator but you will still need to clean the inside regularly.

If your refrigerator is not a self-defrosting model then you should defrost it when the frost on the outside walls is 1/4 inch thick (about as thick as a thin slice of

To clean the refrigerator, take all the food out of the refrigerator. Throw away the leftovers and things that will not be used. Take the shelves and drawers out and wash them with warm soapy water. Rinse them with clear water and dry.

To defrost, turn the refrigerator control know to "off" or "defrost." Remove all the frozen food and ice trays from the refrigerator. Wrap them tightly in newspaper or paper bags to keep the food frozen. Then place the wrapped food in a cardboard box or an ice chest.

Clean the drip pan and be sure it is ready to catch the melting ice. Pans and trays can be placed on the top shelf to catch melting ice as well. Place a pan of hot water inside the freezer

section. This will make the ice melt faster. DON'T USE ICE TRAYS FOR THIS. Change the water as it cools. Allow the ice to

After the ice melts, make a cleaning solution with warm water and baking soda. Use 1/2 cup of baking soda in a dishpan full of water. DON'T USE SOAP.

Dip a sponge or cloth in the soda mixture and then squeeze out completely. Wash the inside of the refrigerator/freezer - top, walls, bottom and any shelves you couldn't get out.

Rinse the interior again with a cloth or sponge wrung out of warm clean water.

Wash the inside of the door and the soft strip (gasket) around the door. Rinse with clean water and wipe dry.

Discard all the melted ice. Wash the inside of the freezing compartment with clean water. Use soda in the water. Rinse and

Return clean racks and drawers to the refrigerator.

Wipe off all cans and bottles of food with a clean dry cloth and return the food to the refrigerator.

Turn the control knob to a medium setting and replace the frozen food in the freezer section. Refill the ice travs with cold water and put them back into the freezer.

After the interior of the refrigerator is clean and the food has been replaced in the unit, wash the outside of the refrigerator with warm sudsy water. Rinse it with clean water. Then dry it with a clean soft cloth.

are susceptible to fire blight. Crowns of diseased trees have a "scorched" appearance. Tree mortality as a result of fire blight isn't common. For badly diseased plants, the following practices could help reduce the impact of this troublesome disease. (1) While it's not a good idea to prune fire blight diseased branches or twigs after active growth has started, it can be done, provided EXTREME sanitation is practiced. (2) Pruning tools MUST BE DISINFECTED between each cut. Tools should be dipped in or swabbed with a denatured 75% methyl alcohol solution. A 75% solution can be prepared by mixing three volumes of denatured alcohol with one volume of water. A 10% bleach

is the most effective but is corrosive to most pruning tools. If it is used, the tools should be thoroughly rinsed, dried, and oiled following completion of pruning. (3) All pruning should be made several inches below the point of visible infection. (4) DO NOT prune during periods of rainy weather. (5) To prevent cankers on large limbs and trunks, "rub off" water-sprouts during the spring and summer. (6) Avoid excessive nitrogen fertilization at any point in the season, since this promotes succulent growth highly susceptible to fire blight infection. (7) Ideally, fire blight pruning should be carried out as a summer activity during drier periods when bacterial spread is less likely to occur as a result of pruning. (8) Spray application of bactericides to fire blight infected trees serves little value at this time of year. This practice is most effective during the dormant season as later in the season at blossom time. For additional information on fire blight and other fruit diseases, drop by the County Extension Office.

Spots Before Your Eyes

QUESTION: Recently I started seeing dark spots and thread-like strands before my eyes. What causes this? Is it serious?

ANSWER: What you are seeing are spots and floaters. They are usually harmless but sometimes they signal serious eye problem in need of prompt attention. These include such visionthreatening conditions as retinal detachment, or other retinal disorders, cataracts, diabetes, or high blood You should, pressure. therefore, make appointment with your optometrist for a thorough eye examination covering eye health as well as your vision. Be sure to mention the dark spots and strands you are seeing.

More than likely you are seeing harmless particles of protein or other natural materials floating in the fluid inside your eyes. However, you need a professional diagnosis. Even if your optometrist diagnoses the spots as harmless, have them re-evaluated annually or more often if you notice a change.

Mrs. Kathy Byram gave an informative report on "How Eight Glasses of Water A Day Keeps Fat Away". Water suppresses the appetite and helps the body metabolize stored fat. If you don't drink enough water, your kidneys can't function properly, and part of their load will be placed on the liver. The best treatment for fluid retention is drinking plenty of water as diuretics offer only a temporary solution. Drinking lots of water

solution. Drinking lots of water will also help relieve constipation. The average person should drink eight 8-ounce glasses of water every day, or about two quarts. An overweight person needs one additional glass for every 25 pounds of excess weight. The amount of water you drink should be increased if you exercise briskly or if the weather is hot and dry. Cold water is absorbed into the system quicker than warm water.

Shirley gave an interesting program on "Exercise for Your Health". Fitness means having your body ready for the physical demands of daily life. If you have a fit body, you can sleep better, improve your mental outlook, and control your cholesterol, high blood pressure, weight, and diabetes better. The three major fitness goals are flexibility, strength, and endurance. You should not exercise when the weather is extremely hot or cold, drink at least eight ounces of noncaffeinated fluids for each hour of exercise, and do not exercise for thirty minutes after eating a meal. When exercising outdoors, it is best to have a partner, to avoid heavy traffic areas but also to avoid isolated and poorly-lit areas, and to carry identification. You need to always have a warm-up period before starting your exercise and then a cool-down period at the end.



To qualify the students must be in the seventh grade and must have scored at the 97th percentile or above on the national norms of the Iowa Test of Basic Skills on one or more of a mathematics subtest, a verbal subtest, or the total composite score. The objectives of the program are to identify the very bright among our youngsters at an early age; to facilitate the education of these students; to follow and nurture their talent through the critical middle and high school years; and to develop an effective research effort to help understand the nature of academically talented adolescents. The aim of TIP is to assist youths who have excellent mathematical, verbal, or general intellectual ability by providing them with information about their ability and about educational options that may be beneficial to them. These students must take the American College Test (ACT). Our students took the ACT in December. The results of the AT were received by Iuka Middle School and by Duke University. 




TCHS Holds Spring Sports Banquet

have a quality program which benefits the lifesaving research of children's catastrophic diseases at St. Jude Hospital.





Child Find Publicity Campaign And District Confidentiality Letter

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act and EHA-B. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect any such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without informed consent.

Please contact Betty Barnes, Child Find Person for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, if you know of any children who may have a disability by calling 423-3206 or writing her at the following Tishomingo County Schools, 1620 Paul Edmondson Drive, Iuka, MS 38852.

The Child Find Person implements child identification. location and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Person works with the local Head Starts, Human Services, Health and Mental Health Agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Person to insure that the Referral-to-Placement Procedures are followed. She works with







most friendly people I had ever met. Later, I began to meet a lot of other people. Uncle John and Aunt Ethel had lots of company and had famous rocking chairs on their big front porch for visitors to sit in. Berlin and Sis Curtis told me I must go to Aunt Beck and Uncle Bud Milligans because Aunt Beck would let you eat out of a bowl (the most practical way to eat.) Well, we thought we were so smart and we did go visit and had wonderful times. Uncle Bud played his fiddle and Wilson picked the guitar, and we had music and fun. I wanted to help Aunt Beck make the beds but she had an easy way. Instead of taking the quilts off, she would just pull them up. Aunt Beck was the smart one. We had many good times with the Milligans. Everyone went to Patrick to singings. We all went to the Community Church at Cross Roads.

We visited Aunt Pen Bullard. She was Wilson's grandmother's sister and I found the Bullards to be fine people. By now we were acquainted with Mr. Olen and Mrs. Irene. We would spend the day and have such fun with all their children, Audrey, Orlan, Odie, Dennis and some I can't remember but more Bullards to love and visit. June appeared after they moved to Happy

I met Aunt Georgia Ann and Uncle Mann Mosley, and Liller and Hilda and their families - a fun loving family. After we moved into our own little house or maybe before, we met another set of Milligans - Evie, Sis, Arrie, Dick, Dude, Ruby and Billie, all good, friendly folk, still know a few of them, Billie Katherine and Dot and their families. When they moved away, Ella and Burt Davis moved into their house. Ella was Uncle John's niece. They just sort of took me in. I'll always have loving memories of all them. There was a lot of young people my age, Lillian Robinson, Grute and Christine Arnold, Euna Mae and Howard Biggs. Since quilting was very popular then, as well as now, the women folk taught Euna Mae and me how to quilt. I now prefer for someone else to do that.

W.T. Dexter and Sis were soon good friends so I learned all the Dexters. One of them Junior married my cousin Helen Coker. Also Phil and Eva Curtis and lovely daughter. Mrs. Carrie Marlar was famous for her chicken and dumplins. Ella said for us to go one Sunday. I said we can't intrude. Ella said, Oh, no, Carrie always cooks for everybody." I was learning fast that there were other good people beside the Holcut folks. Carrie's sons Varnell and J.C. Marlar were frequent guests at Uncle John and Aunt Ethel's home.

I can't name all the nice people I met but they were many. The Walkers, Uncle Buster and Aunt Jane, Boyd, Howard and families. Mr. Andrew and Mentha Bullard were the greatest.

I will have more about her in another article but time went merrily on its way. It was soon time for school to begin. We had been married a little over a year and had a baby girl. I knew I couldn't go to school then. I was now 17 and would have been a senior. My good friend June Bronson Pruitt came to see me. We were so sad. We cried but she told me to hand in and I would go back to school some time. I really meant to and I did get to later. But, June tried to comfort me and rocked my baby Barbara Sue in Aunt Ethel's famous rocker.

We had a wonderful time with our new baby. She belonged to all of us - Aunt Ethel, Uncle John and all the family. She was named after Barbara Stanwyck, the famous movie star. It wasn't long until Barbaras were springing up all over the country. Barbara Stanwyck was a favorite of many young people at that time. My mom asked me if I was sure I wanted to and could take care of my baby and I assured her I could and I don't believe any grandmother could have loved her better than Aunt Ethel did. I met many more Curtis relatives.

Lil, Carrol and Tip Davis. They were fun loving and frequent visitors. Aunt Fan Tigner was known for her famous tea cakes. Mack passed away and Jack married Irene "Sis" White. Well, I had another new friend till she passed away. "I miss you, Sis and Tip", and so many more that have gone on. Wilson's family were great friends of Eldridge and Sarah Young and Billy. We also went to church with them. There was Uncle Marshall and Aunt Minnie Curtis and William when he was home from school. My children learned to sing by the time and before they could talk. We went to see Aunt Minnie before she passed away and she asked Sue if she could still sing, "Rubber Dolly." Well, I'm skipping but I wanted my mom to meet Mrs. Minnie Arnold and went to visit. She told so many funny things, actually facts. My mom laughed all the way home. Mrs. Minnie was one funny lady. Phil Curtis was also known to have his fun. One evening according to Uncle John, Phil had a drink before he got home from work. Eva told him to go get the cow. She had to milk. Knowing Eva would be mad he just went on across the creek and spent the night with his dad. On the way home next morning, Uncle John saw him coming and he called out and asked him if he was going after the cow. He replied that he was. One more about Phil. He told Eva he heard some one crying and he better go down to Roy and Lucy Dexters. He was afraid they were having a fight. He hurried down and soon came back and sat down. Eva asked Phil to please tell her what was wrong. He said Roy was singing "Maple on the Hill" Wilson worked for Mr. Odis Cutshall at saw mill. He said they kept themselves entertained telling each other jokes. The Curtises and Bullards were known to have their fun. We lived there about two and a half years. Mr. Odis moved his mill to Alabama. I wanted to move back south of Iuka. I missed my mom a lot and all my friends around Iuka. We moved on the Woodall Mountain Road - the Whitehurst place. I was

happy there and soon expecting my second baby. I needed to be near my mom. We had a good little church to attend Overton Chapel. It later burned and was renamed Bethel which still remains. My new baby was born on September 1. We named her Martha Lou to rhyme with Barbara Sue. She also was my pride and joy. I vowed I

would teach them music and song, my first love, and that I did. By the time they were 3 and 1 and a half, they were singing together. Mr. Odis decided to move his mill to Kentucky. It was decided we better move back north to be near the Curtises, as Wilson would be working in Kentucky. I will continue later with more tid-bits and happenings at Bullard Cut-Off School.

Space in each class is limited and reservations are taken on a first-come, first-pay basis. Tuition for the lessons is \$35 per student


