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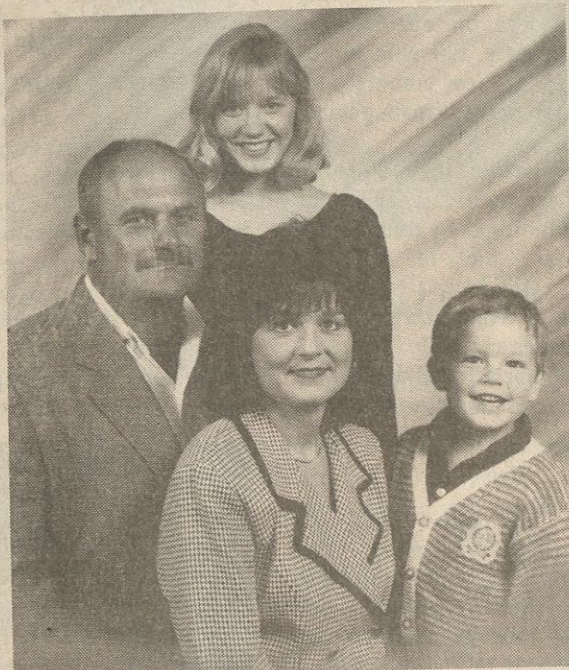

First Democratic and Republican Primaries Next Tuesday, August 3

The first primary of the 1999 election year will be Tuesday, Aug. 3.

When voters go to their polling places on that day, they will be asked if they wish to vote the Democratic or Republican ticket.

After this primary, the two candidates who get the most votes will move on to their party's run-off primary which will be held in three weeks on August 24. If a candidate receives 51 percent of the total votes cast, he or she will not be required to be in the run-off, but will go directly to the ballot for the Nov. 2 general election.

Candidates running as independents automatically go to the general election ballot where they will face the winners from the primary elections.

The Miracle Berry

Urinary Tract Relief - Just like their cousin the cranberry, blueberries contain compounds that can prevent urinary tract infections (UTIs), according to recent findings at the Rutgers Blueberry Cranberry Research Center in Chatsworth, NJ. Called

the condensed tannins, they can keep the bacteria responsible for it from attaching to the wall of your bladder, says Rutgers scientist Amy B. Howell, Ph.D. And yes, she eats blueberries. "In season, I eat a huge amount - maybe a pint a day."

Berry Good For Eyes? - In Japan, blueberries are known as "the vision fruit" - reputed to help relieve eyestrain - and blueberry sales there have quadrupled in the last two years, says John Sauve, executive director of the Wild Blueberry Association of North America. That's due in part to research in Europe indicating that European blueberries (blueberries) can improve night vision and help eyes adjust to bright lights.

At Tufts, Dr. Prior plans to study the ability of blueberries to prevent macular degeneration, a disease of the retina and the leading cause of blindness in people over age 65.

How To Buy 'Em - Fresh blueberries are available year-round but are least expensive from May through September, when the

supply comes from the US and Canada. Look for berries that are dark blue, with a frosty bloom. Store fresh blueberries in your refrigerator for up to two weeks, and wash them just before you use them; otherwise, they'll get mushy.

Loose-pack frozen blueberries are available year-round, and you can use them in any recipe that calls for fresh blueberries. Since they are prewashed, they can be used right from the package.

Sweet, Quick, Versatile - Blueberries are really the no-work fruit - they require no pitting, peeling, coring, or cutting. And they are outrageously healthy. Best of all, their taste is a treat. Go blue!

Wild Purple Smoothie When the weather is steamy, here's a treat that's cool and good for you -

1 1/4c. blueberries, fresh or frozen

1c. orange juice, chilled

2c. fat-free yogurt

1/4c. fat-free or 1% milk

Combine all ingredients in a blender. Blend until smooth. Pour into two large glasses. Serves 2.

Q. What Purpose Does Toothpaste Serve?

A. Toothpaste typically contains a detergent compound to penetrate and loosen deposits and stains on tooth surfaces so they can be more easily removed during tooth brushing. Toothpaste also contains cleaning and polishing agents to produce a smooth, shiny tooth surface that can inhibit the accumulation and retention of plaque. In addition, flavoring agents found in tooth paste can make the mouth and breath feel clean, and toothpastes containing fluoride can help strengthen the teeth's hard outer layer - the enamel - to help prevent cavity formation. Some toothpastes have tartar control properties to minimize tartar (mineralized plaque) buildup others have special tooth whitening properties. Some help reduce tooth sensitivity and still others have antimicrobial properties to help control the bacteria responsible for gum disease. Inform your dentist or hygienist of the tooth paste you use so they can evaluate its effectiveness or make recommendations for changes based on your dental health.

Will there be hunting a century from now? Probably. But hunting opportunities will likely decrease unless we maintain good private land conservation, restoration and enhancement programs like the Conservation and Wetland Reserve Programs and the Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program and good land acquisition programs through the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Forest Service.

James L. Cummins, Jr. is Executive Director of the Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Foundation in Stoneville, Mississippi. Known as "Wildlife Mississippi," the Foundation is a non-profit, conservation organization founded to conserve, restore and enhance fish, wildlife and plant resources throughout Mississippi.

The Arrival Of Spring

Unfortunately marks the beginning of tick problems for many dogs. Two common diseases are caused by ticks: the Lyme disease that dogs can get from ticks is the same one that can affect humans, though we cannot get it from our dogs, nor can they get it from us.

The disease is transmitted when a tick bites and injects bacteria into the dog. The bacteria finds its way to the joints and causes pain or lameness. It also can cause red spots on the skin that usually go away in about three weeks. Some dogs simply will not feel well and may develop a fever. The disease requires a veterinarian's help and treatment with antibiotics. Since Lyme disease is widespread, you should check with your veterinarian to see if it is prevalent in your area. If it is, your veterinarian may prescribe a vaccine to help protect your dog.

Tick paralysis is caused by the female tick of a certain tick species. The tick injects a toxin that makes the dog progressively weaker until he cannot move at all. Once the offending tick is removed, the problem clears up, but, consult your veterinarian because complications can occur.

In the tick infested areas use a good flea and tick control product to help keep ticks from biting your dog. If you find a tick on your dog and you choose to remove it, wear gloves. If the tick is carrying Lyme disease, avoid exposing any open wounds on your hand to the blood. Several methods work to remove attached ticks.

The safest and best method is to spray the tick with a flea/tick spray and let it die.

Or, you can cover the tick with petroleum jelly and wait. (When it cannot breathe, it lets go.)

Also, you can gently grab the tick close to the skin and pull slowly until the tick releases; however, this isn't the best option because the tick's head may remain in the skin and become infected.

Protecting The Force

You're two thousand miles away from home in a harsh, desert environment, preparing to face one of the toughest opposing forces the Department of Defense has to offer. One thing the soldiers of the 155th Brigade Combat Team (BCT) on a deployment to the National Training Center (NTC) at Ft. Irwin, Calif. won't have to worry about is the security of their people or equipment in the dustbowl. That's because they are under the 24-hour protection of Military Police (MP) from the 114th Military Police Company, based in Clinton, and Detachment 1, Headquarters Company, 155th Separate Armored Brigade, based in New Albany.

Upon arrival to Ft. Irwin, the MPs were tasked with protecting the BCT inside the dustbowl from any outside influences that might hinder their mission. This is being done by posting guards at every entrance and exit to the dustbowl, providing patrols throughout the billeting area and the motor pool, as well as reception and inspection of unexploded ammunition. The MPs accomplish this mission regardless of the conditions - in the heat, the driving rain and even in full chemical protective gear.

Though their working conditions are strenuous, these soldiers understand that it's all part of life in the most challenging training area in the world, and have kept their morale high, said

Capt. David Green of Crystal Springs, commander of the 114th and liaison officer to the BCT. "We're not approaching this as just a training exercise, because it isn't," Green said. "Anytime a force is deployed, you have to have force protection."

"We don't have to pretend this is real world. This IS real world," he said.

Green added that although his company is proficient with MP operations, there were areas of concentration they had to train on before departing for the desert.

"The mission of the MPs has always been to provide security for the combat forces, but before we came to the NTC we had to be proficient in certain areas that apply to this training," he said. Green listed the areas of concentration as rules of engagement as they apply to host nations and the United States Army, measures used to prevent fratricide, and how to receive, identify, and mark unexploded ammunition.

Maj. Jerry Boyd of Iuka, provost marshal for the BCT, said his staff spent months putting their security plan together, but it's the soldiers that are making it work.

"These soldiers have done an outstanding job of putting our plan into action," Boyd said. "They have handled themselves with the utmost professionalism and with a

great attitude."

Boyd said the MPs couldn't get too comfortable with their current mission, because once the BCT moves out to the desert training area, their mission will change drastically. "Once the BCT begins force-on-force training, our mission will change to area security," he said. "We will be responsible for keeping the main supply routes rolling, as well as working with protestors, demonstrators, riots, and dislocated civilians."

"We can't forget about the OPFOR (opposing force) out there either," Boyd added. "Once we encounter the OPFOR, I think the training will really start to take on realism."

Green agreed that the MPs mission during the "Magnolia Rotation" will be challenging, but they are prepared for the challenge.

"The OPFOR at the National Training Center is probably the best trained OPFOR in the world, and we know it's going to be tough to come into their own back yard," he said. "We'll never know how ready we are until we finally encounter the enemy, but we sure are anxious to find out."

The "Magnolia Rotation" is a 21-day exercise conducted in the harsh environment of California's Mojave Desert. The 155th BCT will conduct the most stringent force-on-force training that the U.S. Army has to offer - training that will help improve combat skills for more than 5,500 Army National Guard soldiers from Mississippi and 22 other states. The rotation concludes on July 31.

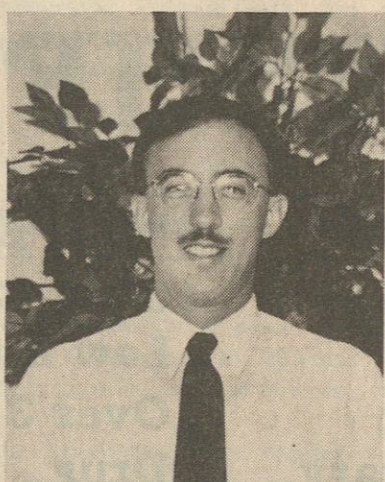
Included on the ballot will be a choice for Coroner. The Coroner is the individual who investigates and certifies deaths in this county which fall under his jurisdiction.

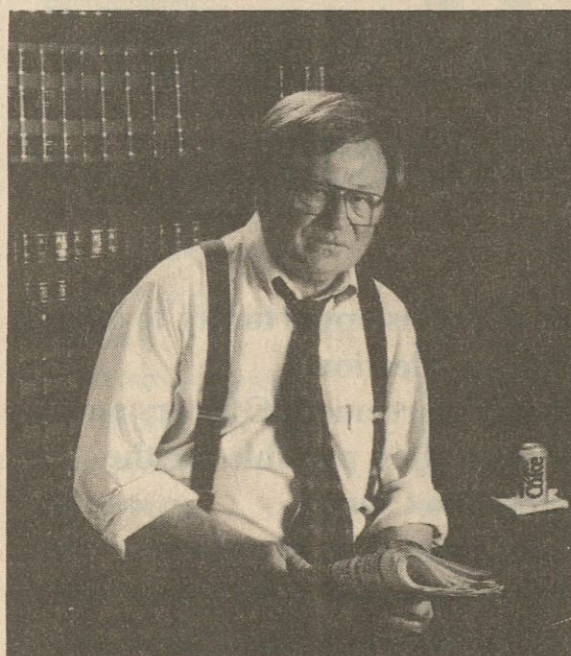

collection, establish industrial parks, oversee county law enforcement and provide for the general health and welfare of all county residents.

Beat supervisors may personally manage road crews, operate equipment, allocate certain funds and adopt their own policies, within limits. The salaries of Tishomingo County Supervisors are based on the county's assessed valuation. (That makes the salary in this county approximately \$29,000 per year.)

As you can see, the office of Supervisor is a very important and powerful one. Supervisors are the managers of county government—they make the rules and see that they are carried out. That is why it is essential for the voters to carefully consider the qualification of each candidate to make sure he has what it will take to handle ALL of these tasks. I feel certain that I will be able to fulfill these qualifications for the office of Supervisor. one of these great jobs or a share of the money, you probably need to move to another district. It appears to me that the high paying jobs and the fantastic money never get to District One; if they do, then why do our kids wind up leaving home after they graduate. We have the finest people in the world living right here in Northeast Mississippi and I feel they are entitled to the best also.

We all know how much money has been spent at the Old NASA Site. Ladies and Gentlemen, I would never vote to give your tax money to anyone for the privilege of working for them. I think we should give some incentives that might entice big industries to want to locate here. Why not give them free rent? The buildings are no good to us empty. And maybe we could throw in a tax break!

It is estimated that between state and federal spending that more than five billion dollars have been spent on that site. After doing some figuring, I can tell you that the Government could have given all 21,000 of you a check for \$200,000 and would still have saved money. It just doesn't make sense.

When the State turned over the deed to the NASA Site, they also wrote us a check for 10 million dollars to go with it. I have asked my opponent at the last four speakings to tell us where that money went, but I can't get an answer. If a man is going to represent you then he should know a little about what is going on in his workplace. That money didn't just disappear.

I mentioned a teacher's raise of 8% and I would also like to mention the issue of Nursing Home Beds. Both of these issues were brought up and voted on right before this upcoming election. The Governor called for a special session on July 22nd to try and get a tax cut. Why does it always have to be an election year before something is done to help you people?

I'll tell you right now that I am not a bashful person and I won't back down when I consider something to be right. And I won't worry about my job future when I consider a vote. If you send me to Jackson, I will represent the people of District One. It doesn't matter what I think of an issue. I have to be objective. I will be voting as your voice and believe me, you people need a voice in Jackson right now!

During the '99 Legislative Session my opponent voted for a lower pay raise for the teachers than the Senate had already passed. He and other members of the House stated that the State didn't have the money for the higher raise, but not too long after

that he voted for a 10 per cent cut in the Income Tax. Where was he going to get the money to pay for that? It appears to me that he contradicted his own vote.

I personally feel that our teachers need another raise to bring them on line with the other states. Our children are the future leaders of the State of Mississippi and they deserve the finest

education that we can give them.

It is true a bill was passed to get more nursing home beds but we need even more than were allotted because it's not only the elderly that occupy these beds. We also need to work on the Medicaid Program and try to get it to where it will pay for prescription drugs for the elderly because this is very costly to them. Most of our elderly people are living on fixed incomes and need every dollar that they can get.

A cut on your grocery tax is also being discussed among most everyone and it would be beneficial to all of you if we could get it passed. And we definitely need to change the tax laws concerning the buying and selling of automobiles. If you buy a new car or truck and then sell it 10 times over a ten-year period, the person who is buying it still has to pay taxes on it. If we could get this period reduced to five years, it would help us immensely. I, for one, also happen to feel that we need to get the Legislature involved in the Airport Projects in both Tishomingo and Alcorn County. These will definitely be a big factor in any industry wanting to locate in District One.

The main thing to remember while we ponder any of these cuts and/or projects, is that we have to keep our priorities in order and naturally one of those would be the elderly and the children when it comes to Health Care.

We're doing better with our Health Care Programs for the elderly and the poor children but we need to do more when it is feasible.

I'd like to touch on Welfare for just a minute. My opponent said it has been cut by 60%. That's good, but we also need to bear in mind that some families are not freeloaders and maybe really need to be on the program. Case workers should be made available to evaluate each case on its own merits. A recent study that was published in the "Mississippi Market Bulletin" showed that the number of people on welfare had begun dropping even before Welfare Reform was enacted in this state. It's time for some of our legislators to quit telling half-truths.

My opponent has stated that he helped to get 1.3 million dollars for job training in our area. This

would be great except for one thing; where do you go to work when there are no jobs in your area? One of my main goals is to go to Jackson and tell everyone who knows anyone, about the cities, the people and the fantastic job sites that District One has to offer. I want to see an industry move to this area and hire 1,000 or more people and pay \$15.00 an hour to start and I want to see it happen in the next four years, we've waited long enough!

Mr. Cummings has told you or will tell you about all the things he has done for the State of Mississippi. I checked the facts on my computer and found where he had authored or coauthored various bills from 1997 to 1999. There were 12 in all, and all but four died in committee. But my biggest concern is right here where you people live. I am running to represent District One in Alcorn and Tishomingo Counties. If any District ever needed help then it surely must be ours.

Mr. Cummings stated at the Alcorn-Central speaking that if he was re-elected that he wouldn't do anything differently than he did in his first 4 years. I personally haven't seen where he has made much of an impact in this District during his 4 year term. Do you people really want 4 more years of nothing or someone who will go to Jackson and try with all their heart to help you get the jobs and other necessities that this District so desperately needs?

Now I'm not a politician, I'm just one of you. And I happen to think that anyone who holds a public office should be held accountable for his actions. Report From Congress

Education Bill Will Aid Classroom Teachers, Have Local Focus

Education was high on the agenda in the House of Representatives last week with passage of the Teacher Empowerment Act (TEA). The bill emphasizes teacher quality and gives states and local school officials more power to decide how to use federal funds in pursuit of that goal.

The legislation would consolidate a number of federal teacher training and development programs and ensure that 95 percent of the program funds go directly to the local level. In exchange for increased accountability, school officials would have the flexibility to choose the initiatives which best meet their classroom needs.

Schools using TEA funds would still be required to issue periodic reports on teacher qualifications and student achievement. The difference is that the information will be made available to parents rather than Washington bureaucrats so parents can be better informed about the progress their local school districts are making.

Funding is included to hire new teachers to reduce class size, but schools are given the authority to develop their own size reduction plans. Unlike a similar proposal from the Clinton Administration, the legislation does not require the heavy hand of Washington in the process.

States and local school districts are also encouraged to explore new opportunities to

improve the level of instruction and keep high-quality teachers in the classroom. There are no mandates, but options could include signing bonuses, mentoring programs, alternative routes for teacher certification, and merit pay.

Teachers themselves would also have more involvement in their ongoing professional development activities. The bill would give teachers more flexibility in pursuing courses and instruction programs which will best equip them to challenge students to reach their fullest potential.

The Teacher Empowerment Act puts more control over public education in the hands of teachers, parents, and local school districts and offers educators new opportunities to help our children prepare for the 21st century.

Local Burglaries Solved By Iuka PD

Iuka Police Officers have solved the June/July burglaries of three local businesses and the suspects are awaiting extradition to Tishomingo County from Tennessee.

Two adult males, who were arrested in Middleton, Tenn., are being charged with break-ins at Nelson's Supermarket, Piggly Wiggly Supermarket and Wilson's Jeans, according to Iuka Police Chief Amos Bates.

Bates said the names of the suspects are not being released at

this time pending further investigation by authorities in the state of Tennessee.

Some of the items taken during the burglaries have been recovered; however, other items, such as money and cigarettes were not, Bates explained.

Chief Bates said Assistant Chief of Police Randy Stringer, Investigator Steve Vatalaro and Police Officer Anita Mitchell followed local leads which took them into Hardeman County Tennessee. There they worked with Tennessee authorities to

bring in the suspects.

Bates said the two suspects were arrested Wednesday, July 21, during a burglary in Middleton, Tenn. When Tennessee officials complete their investigation, the two will then be brought to Tishomingo County, he explained.

"We congratulate the Iuka Police Department upon working this case to its successful completion," Iuka Mayor David Nichols stated. "We appreciate their investigative work and professionalism."

Defense Bill Includes Funding For Alliant Techsystems Project

The House of Representatives has approved funding for an Iuka, Miss., company to help develop lightweight composite materials for the U.S. space program.

U.S. Rep. Roger F. Wicker said \$4.5 million will go to Alliant Techsystems to equip its Iuka facility for the work.

The funding was first approved by the House Appropriations Committee Friday, before moving to the House of Representatives.

Rep. Wicker, who serves on the House Appropriations Committee, said the money was included in the Fiscal Year 2000

Defense Appropriations Act as part of the Air Force's research development budget. The funds will enable Alliant to relocate equipment from its Utah plant to Iuka and modify it to make large composite parts.

"Further development of lightweight composite payload vehicles for U.S. satellites will be a great benefit to our space launch program," Rep. Wicker said. "It will reduce costs, increase payload capability and help us maintain our leadership position in space."

"I am pleased we are able to provide funds for Alliant Techsystems in Iuka to continue work on the project," Wicker said.

Authorities Say Charges Are Pending In One-Vehicle Accident

A one-vehicle accident Friday night in the Holt Spur Community landed the vehicle in a creek and could land the driver of the car in the Tishomingo County Jail.

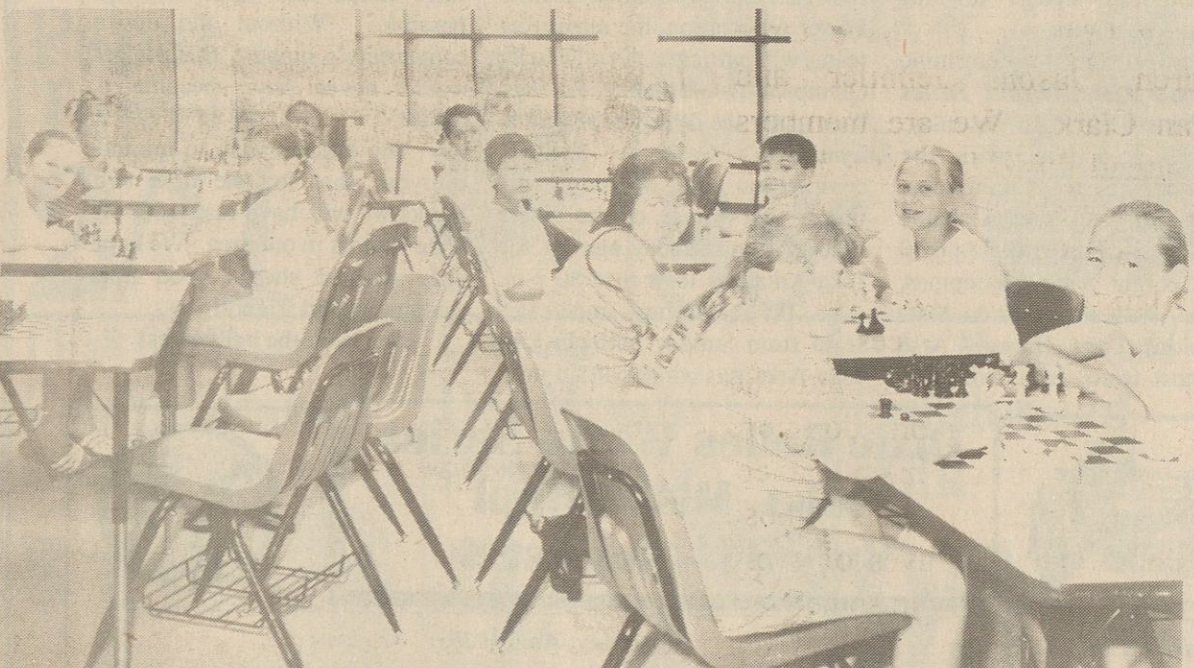

Wicker Wants Surplus Applied to Social Security Debt Reduction

In 1995, the skeptics had good reason to doubt that the new Congress could balance the federal budget. After all, our national leaders had engaged in deficit spending for decades and run up a \$4.9 trillion national debt in the process.

Later, when we reported the first balanced budget in 29 years, the critics said it "wasn't real" because Social Security surpluses were counted as part of the "unified budget."

Last week the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) projected a surplus of \$14 billion in Fiscal Year 1999 even without counting the additional Social Security balance. In other words, any way you look at it our federal government now has balanced our books and achieved a healthy surplus.

The CBO report is further evidence of how effective our actions have been in putting the federal government back on sound fiscal footing. American workers and businesses are also due credit for increasing our economic productivity. Our task now is to stay the course on these policies which have helped produce such great news.

Holding the line on spending presents an opportunity to pay down the public debt, protect Social Security, fund necessary federal programs, and provide tax relief to enable more Americans to share in this remarkable

turnaround.

The CBO estimates the government will run \$960 billion in non-Social Security surpluses over the next 10 years. The new figure is \$170 billion higher than CBO predicted just six months ago.

These budget figures are dramatically different from our expectations during my first year in Congress in 1995. While we were beginning work on a legislative agenda to change the way Washington does business, CBO was predicting huge deficits, not surpluses. In fact, President Clinton's budget requests included annual deficits well into the next century.

We should still take a cautious approach on spending because these long-term figures are only estimates, but they represent clear evidence of the continued success our policies have produced.

Largemouth Bass Virus Update

Largemouth bass virus (LMBV) has been found at various levels in largemouth bass collected from Sardis, Bay Springs, Columbus, and Enid Lakes, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks. The virus has been found only in largemouth bass.

Samples from seven other lakes across the state showed no LMBV, indicating that the virus is either absent or present at very low levels in these lakes.

LMBV was first

Mississippi after significant numbers of largemouth bass were found dead at Sardis Lake in September 1998. The only other fish kill known to be caused by LMBV occurred in 1995 at Santee Cooper Reservoir in South Carolina. The best available information indicates that largemouth bass carrying the virus are safe to handle and eat.

Fisheries biologists say that anglers should take the following measures to help prevent disease and reduce the likelihood of spreading LMBV:

- *Reduce stress on bass by handling them gently, using barbless hooks, and reducing the length of time they are held in live wells during tournaments or other outings.
- *Hold bass tournaments during cool weather.
- *Do not transfer fish from one body of water to another.
- *After dressing fish, don't discard the remains back into lakes or streams.
- *Wash and dry live wells between fishing trips.

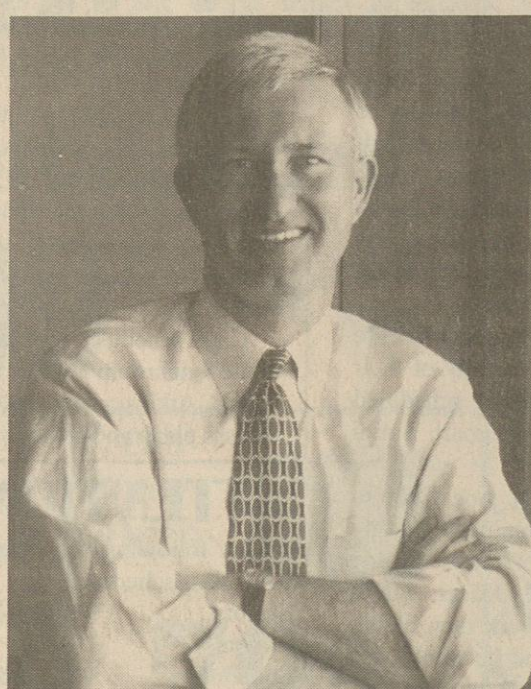
"Right now, the best thing anglers can do is to be aware of this potential problem and encourage others to use caution when handling and moving fish," Fisheries Biologist Bubba Hubbard of Mendenhall said.

"The only known fish kills from LMBV occurred in hot weather and in lakes receiving a lot of bass fishing. However, LMBV is a new phenomenon, and there is much to be learned about the disease," Hubbard said.

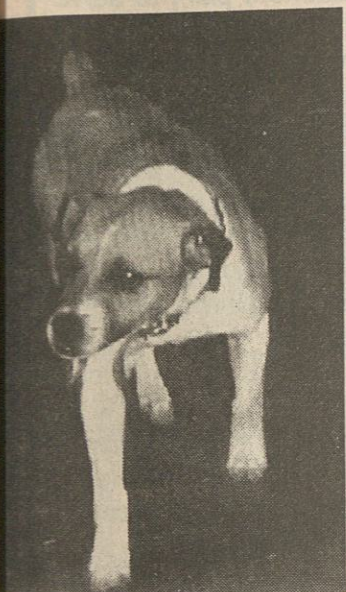

MS Summer Heat & The Elderly

As we are all aware, the scorching Mississippi summer heat can be a major problem for the elderly. "During hot weather the body normally perspires," said Eddie Anderson, Director, Division of Aging and Adult Services, Mississippi Department of Human Services. "The evaporating perspiration is a vital part of the body's cooling system. However, older adults perspire less as their sweat glands become less productive. This means that the body temperature of older adults can rise faster than those of younger persons, putting them at greater risk for heat-related illnesses."

Under normal conditions, once the temperature has reached 95 degrees the body begins to cool itself down by sweating and producing moisture that evaporates into the air. Whereas when the temperature stays at or above 95 degrees for several days at a time, perspiring may not be enough to cool your body down.

When your body gets too hot to function well you can suffer heat stress (hyperthermia). The Division of Aging and Adult Services warns that the two most common forms of hyperthermia in the elderly are heat exhaustion and

heat stroke. Heat stroke is a very serious medical emergency that requires attention and treatment by a doctor. The symptoms of heat stroke include: faintness, dizziness, staggering, headache, nausea, loss of consciousness, high blood temperature (104 degrees or higher), strong rapid pulse, and flushed skin. If these symptoms develop, call a doctor immediately. The suggested treatment while waiting for the doctor includes: moving to a cooler environment, removing all clothing, and reducing the body temperature by sponging with cool water.

Heat exhaustion also calls for prompt action. Everyone knows that the heat can make you tired, but not everyone knows why. The reason is that as you sweat your body loses not only water, but salt as well. The weakness that you feel is really your body's way of warning you to slow down and take it easy. IT IS A WARNING THAT YOU SHOULD HEED. Some of the symptoms of heat exhaustion include: thirst, giddiness, tiredness, loss of concentration, and, in extreme cases, delirium.

If you have medical problems—such as heart disease, respiratory ailments, poor circulation or diabetes - your body's system is less able to cope with the stress of prolonged heat, increasing your vulnerability to heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

During these sweltering days

of summer the Division of Aging and Adult Services advises you to take precautions and stay well.

Election Day: Some Frequently Asked Questions...

Secretary of State Eric Clark reminds candidates and campaigns to follow the law on election day.

"Our number one priority is keeping Mississippi's elections open, honest, and free from fraud," Clark said. "Every election year, our office receives hundreds of calls and questions. We hope to get the word out so folks will know the law."

Here are a few common election questions received at the Secretary of State's Office: **Prohibitions Against Campaigning At The Polls**

It is unlawful for any candidate for elective office or any representative of a candidate to post or distribute cards, posters, or other campaign literature within 150 feet of any entrance to a building in which an election is being conducted. It is also unlawful for a candidate or his representative to appear at any polling place armed or uniformed or to display any badge or credentials except as may be issued by the managers of a

precinct.

Wearing T-Shirts

Wearing of a T-shirt with a candidate's name and/or picture on it within 150 feet of any entrance to a building in which an election is being conducted constitutes the posting of campaign literature and is prohibited. Such T-shirts must be covered or removed before a voter comes within 150 feet of any entrance to a building in which an

election is being conducted. Use of Sample Ballots

It is permissible for an individual voter to bring a sample ballot into the polling place for the voter's own use as a reminder of the candidate(s) for whom he or she intends to vote. A voter, however, cannot be permitted to use the sample ballot as campaign literature in attempting to influence other voters within the polling place.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Development has been requested to administer an ARC grant for financial assistance from the Short-Coleman Park Water Association located in Tishomingo County, Mississippi. The specific elements of this proposed action includes the extension of the water system to give water service to 15 new users in the Pine Flat Community and renovation of its surface water treatment plant to serve the Yellow Creek Industrial Park. There is no feasible alternative to upgrading the current system and providing service to additional users.

Rural Development will administer the project for ARC. Rural Development has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that this project would not have a direct nor indirect impact on the identified 100-year floodplain areas or wetland areas within the water association's service area.

The proposed project conforms to state and local floodplain protection standards.

The Mississippi Department of Economic Development and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors are also providing financial assistance for this project.

Rural Development has further determined that this proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, Rural Development will not prepare an environmental impact statement for this proposed action.

Any written comments regarding this determination should be provided within fifteen (15) days of this publication to the Rural Development District Office, P. O. Box 237, Booneville, Mississippi 38829. Rural Development will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this 15-day period. Requests to receive a copy of or to review the Rural Development Environmental Assessment upon which this determination is based should be directed to the above address.

The year 2000 computer problem, or Y2K as it is commonly known, is an issue that almost all businesses face as we near the Year 2000. Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is no exception. We are preparing for Y2K by taking a positive approach to analyzing, modifying, and testing critical computer applications and devices that are controlled by computer chips or processors that may be affected.

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has developed a plan to address this problem. We have conducted an inventory of automated systems, including computer hardware, computer software, communication systems, embedded chips and key service vendors. The critical components identified through this process either have been or will be remediated in time for the new millennium. In addition, we have also requested certification of readiness from our vendors to determine the status of critical systems and we are requiring that current and future purchases be compliant. TVA as our power supplier has and continues to implement a comprehensive Y2K review and remediation plan. Finally, TVA and Tishomingo County Electric Power Association are in the process of developing a contingency plan so that we can resume normal operations in the event of a system failure.

We believe our distribution facilities will be capable of operating without significant interruption caused by the transition into the next century.

Studies In Isaiah 53

Isaiah 52:13-15 is the introduction to the HEART of the Bible. Isaiah 53 describes in vivid detail the sacrificial work of our Shepherd and Bishop of our souls, the Lord Jesus Christ.

In several passages in the Old Testament the MESSIAH is introduced with the word "Behold". This word calls attention to a very important concept. Each of the following references to The MESSIAH has a connection with one of the gospels.

(1) The MESSIAH is called the "Branch of the LORD" in Isaiah 42. In John's gospel Jesus Christ is presented as God (John 1:1).

(2) The MESSIAH is called the "Branch of David" in Jeremiah 23:5-6. In Matthew's gospel Jesus Christ is depicted as the Son of David according to the flesh (Matthew 1:1).

(3) The MESSIAH is called "my servant the BRANCH" in Zechariah 3:8. In Mark's gospel Jesus Christ is described as Servant.

(4) The MESSIAH is called "the man the BRANCH" in Zechariah 6:12. In Luke's gospel Jesus Christ is seen as the perfect Man.

When we reverse the order of these references we see Jesus Christ as the Man, the Servant, the Son of David, and the Son of God.

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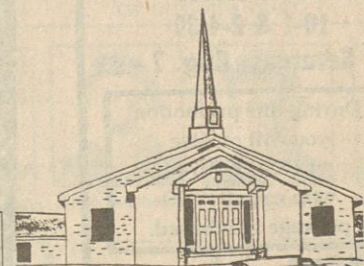

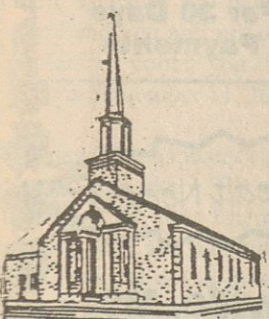

Controversy Over Minutes, Resignations, Hirings Among School Board Meeting Topics

How can an elected school board member get the minutes of the previous board meeting changed to reflect what he said at that meeting, and the response he got from other Board members and the Superintendent?

Tishomingo County Board of Education member Gary White attempted to get that question answered during Monday night's school board meeting.

Before the minutes of the Board's previous meeting were approved by the Board Monday—something that must be done at the beginning of every meeting—White asked that the minutes be corrected to state that at the previous meeting, on July 12, he had asked Superintendent John Mullins and Board President Danny Davis to put on the July 26 agenda his proposal that the public be given 15 minutes at the end of each school board meeting to ask questions or make suggestions or comments.

White stated that he understood from reading the law on this matter that an accurate record of what happened at the meetings should be kept and he would like this one statement added before the Board approved the minutes. He made the motion, as directed by Board attorney Jamie Barnett of Tupelo who was on hand for the meeting. The

motion did not pass because no other Board member would second it, leaving the minutes unchanged.

White's request to be put on this meeting's agenda to discuss the 15 minute public forum was denied by Superintendent Mullins and Board President Davis who must approve all items before they can be placed on the agenda.

In other business, the Board agreed to accept the resignation of four people from the school district and hired several others. Among the resignations were Tasha King and Travis Hendrix from Burnsville School, Amy Walker from Belmont School and Kathy Wallace from Tishomingo County High School.

Tina Joslin, previously a teacher at Tishomingo School, was moved into the position of elementary principal, K-4, at Belmont School. Several others were hired or approved for positions within the school district during Monday night's meeting.

Mullins asked the Board to have a special meeting next Monday, Aug. 2, at 5:30 p.m., to tie up any loose ends before the beginning of the school year. This includes the hiring of additional personnel. Mullins mentioned three specific open positions—an assistant football coach for TCHS, a special

education teacher and custodian for Burnsville.

During the meeting, the Board also

—voted to accept the transfer of four students either into or within the school district, with one request being turned down because it would involve an elementary student riding a shuttle bus—a practice which is not normally allowed, according to Mullins. Board member Charles South voted "no" on all the requests, stating that the Board had a policy not to accept transfers submitted after the April 30 deadline.

—voted to accept Mullins' proposal to give the district permission to transfer funds from account to account for the smooth, daily operation of the school district during the 1999-2000 school year.

Conservation Corner

During the final week of June, I was returning from a meeting of the Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks at J.P. Coleman State Park in Tishomingo County and stopped by my parents' farm in Webster County that evening.

As I walked down one of our woods roads to check the grass I had sprayed in our kobe lespedeza food plots the previous weekend, I saw a pair of quail. When I saw the pair, they ran in circles like their wing was broken and then ran back in the direction where they had been. Suddenly, about 15 chicks ran about before their parents began a continuous whistle to bring them back together. The adults must have thought I was a predator and were decoying me away from the chicks. Nature is smarter than we think, I thought.

With that, I thought it would be the perfect time to discuss the management of one the premiere game birds in Mississippi - the bobwhite quail. Many things can be done to improve its habitat.

Initially, one must evaluate the area for food, nesting cover, brood rearing habitat and escape cover. One must meet the habitat needs of quail during each season. Providing food plots is an excellent way to help quail survive the winter months; however, winter food is just one piece of the puzzle. If all the pieces are not present, one will not have consistent numbers of quail.

Strip disking provides a means for breaking up large areas into smaller areas, thus creating more edge. These disked strips also serve as fire breaks when prescribed burns are incorporated as well as providing dusting and scratching areas for bobwhites.

Areas can be developed into good quail habitat by leaving undisturbed strips of native vegetation approximately 30 feet wide. Maintenance on these strips would include disking or burning

one side of each strip every two years in late winter. Planting strips of lespedeza will also provide an excellent food source during the late winter and a place for chicks to find insects in early summer.

By leaving small strips of unharvested crops such as soybeans, wheat or corn, habitat will also be provided during the winter. Many fields have areas that are not used for crop production. Usually, these spots occur in field corners, around edges and in shaded areas. These spots can provide much of the quail's needs. A good rule of thumb is to keep strips at least 15 feet wide. Plantings in these areas that are good for quail include cow peas, wild reseeding soybean, partridge pea, kobe and shrub lespedeza.

Prescribed burning is an excellent management tool which is under-utilized. Burning stimulates the growth of important food plants and provides insects for broods. These burns should be done in a mosaic pattern and should be mapped out on a rotational basis every two to three years. Brush piles and plantings of shrubs located adjacent to food sources provide excellent escape cover.

Assistance In The Voting Booth....

Any voter who says he/she is blind, physically disabled, or cannot read or cannot write may receive assistance. No other reasons are valid.

In order to receive assistance, the voter must tell the managers he/she needs help to mark ballot, state one of the above reasons as to why help is needed, and pick someone to help him/her. The voter must tell the managers he/she needs help. The voter can have anyone help mark his/her ballot, except his/her employer or the employer's representative, or a representative of any union of which he/she is a member.

A request for help should be honored unless it obviously appears to be untrue.

When To Vote

The polls are open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. each election day. No "Cross-Over Voting"

A voter may vote in either party's primary, and cast a ballot for that party's nominees to the general election. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes in a primary, a run-off is held three weeks later between the top two vote-getters. A voter who votes in the primary election of one party may not "cross-over" to vote in the run-off election of another party.

Closing The Polls And Counting The Ballots

When the polls have been closed, the managers shall publicly open the boxes and immediately proceed to count the ballots. The managers must read aloud the names of the persons voted for, and those names shall be taken down and called by the designated managers.

During the counting of the ballots, all the proceedings must be in fair and full view of the voting public. However, there must not be unnecessary interference, delay, or encroachment upon the good order of the duties and proceedings of the managers of the election.

Candidates or their duly authorized representatives shall have the right to reasonably view and inspect the ballots as they are taken from the box and counted, and to reasonably view and

inspect tally sheets, papers, and other documents used in the election.

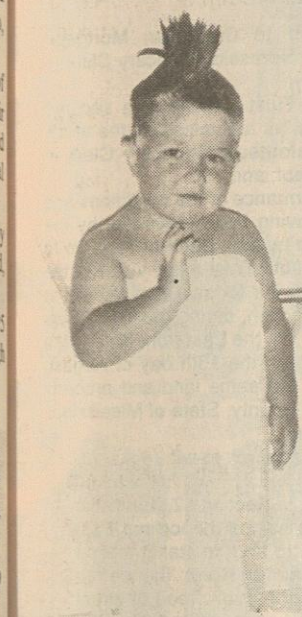
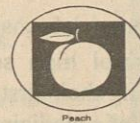

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Rural Health Project Underway at NEMCC

- Wearing lab coats, a group of Mississippi high school seniors are taking their first steps into the world of medicine. Heather Edmondson of Iuka is among the group that is learning more about health care professions and intensifying their knowledge of the body's biological structure, while participating in the first Rural Health Explorer Project in the state now underway at Northeast Mississippi Community College. Participants are spending five weeks on the Booneville

campus in a college-level laboratory and lecture instruction in anatomy and physiology. Scholars selected for the program are receiving tuition and housing at no cost. Five semester hours of college credit will be awarded for completion of the program. Northeast was in competition with other community colleges in the state for the project, but was the only project approved by the Rural

Health Commission of the State Board for Community and Junior Colleges. The project was designed to accept 30 students, two from each community college district.

Nursing Homes Turn Over Unclaimed Funds to State Treasury

State Treasurer Marshall Bennett today released the names of 198 Mississippi Medicaid recipients who have died in long term care facilities or nursing homes and have left money that has not been claimed by heirs. The monies have been turned over to the Unclaimed Property Department of the State Treasury.

According to Treasurer Bennett, Mississippi laws requires that his office publish this list of names with their last known addresses. If no heir claims the funds within ninety days after publication of the names, then \$250 or less of each account shall be turned over to the State Division of Medicaid. All funds of more than \$250 shall remain in the State Treasury under the Unclaimed Property law until such

time as they are claimed by the rightful heirs.

The State of Mississippi never assumes ownership of these funds, but acts as custodian until the rightful owner or heirs are found, Treasurer Bennett said. He urged

any heirs to contact his office in Jackson by calling (601) 359-3600. Mail inquiries may be addressed to Treasury Department, Unclaimed Property Division, P.O. Box 138, Jackson, MS 39205.
