## Suspects Sought In Burnsville School Bus And Laundromat Fires

Suspects are being sought by authorities for fires started Wednesday, Aug. 11, on a parked school bus and at the Laundromat in Burnsville.

According to Burnsville Fire Chief Donnel Wayne Timbes, two calls came in at approximately 9:00 Wednesday night reporting fires at Burnsville School and the Burnsville Laundromat. Firemen responding to the school found the inside of a parked school bus on fire.

Other firemen responding to the Laundromat call found that someone had apparently started a fire in a container inside the building. Timbes said the Laundromat fire was small and easily extinguished. He said an aerosol can was found at the sight. Authorities believe the contents of the can may have been used to start the fire.

The school bus fire, which appeared to have been started in a garbage can in the front of the vehicle parked in the bus lot next to the school's old gym, caused considerable damage, authorities said.

Tishomingo County Fire Investigator Jimmy Hughes said this fire also seemed to have been started by an aerosol accelerant. He said several thousand dollars worth of damage was done to the interior of the bus.

Timbes said three aerosol cans were found at the scenes of the fires. A school official also found a box of matches on the school grounds.

Authorities said they have gathered evidence which they believe will lead them to those setting the fires; however, no arrests had been made at press time.

## Native AT&T Executive Retires After 28 Years Of Bell System Services

Earl Mitchell, a native of Iuka, retired from AT&T after 28 years of Bell System services. Earl began his Bell System career in the Management Development Program with South Central Bell in Nashville in 1971 after receiving his degree in Economics from Berea College in Berea, Kentucky. Pioneering the way for other blacks in management, Earl held several positions of increasing responsibility in Memphis, Nashville, Murfreesboro, TN, and Birmingham prior to the break up of the Bell System. He subsequently was reassigned to AT&T and built a network of AT&T Phone Center Stores in the southeastern U.S. Transferring to Atlanta, he managed the AT&T Phone Centers in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

Earl and his family subsequently moved to New Jersey, where Earl Organized the AT&T Service Agency Network, a network of 700 locations throughout the United States established to serve the residential customers.

Upon completion of the MBA in Global Business at Pennsylvania State University in the AT&T Executive Education program, Earl went to Germany and was Managing Director of AT&T Deutschland with

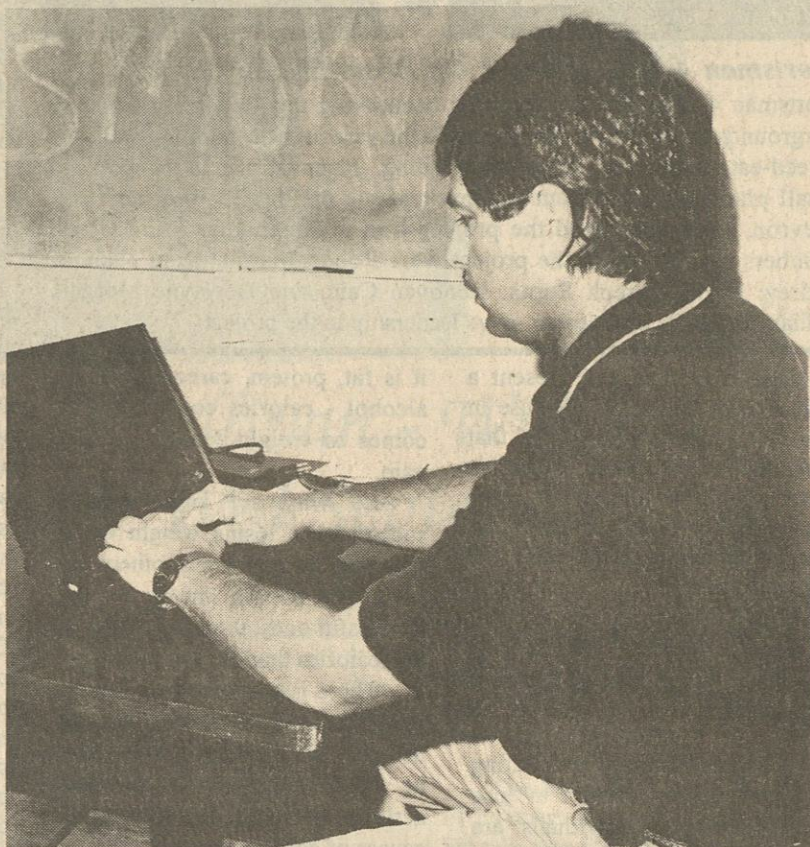


responsibility for Consumer Products operations in Western Europe. Returning to the U.S., Earl was the International Operations Manager for AT&T Consumer Products.

At the time of his retirement, Earl was the Global Account Manager for AT&T Network Services in Germantown, TN.

Earl is the son of the late Jordan (Notch) and Elizabeth Mitchell. Earl graduated from Easom High School in Corinth. Earl also served in the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers, during the Vietnam War and attained the rank of 1st Lieutenant.

Having worked throughout the United States and the world, Earl is planning to return to Iuka to enjoy his retirement.



## Sheriff's Dept. Receives Grant For Purchase Of State-Of-The-Art Surveillance System

A computer-operated surveillance system has recently been added to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department's equipment thanks to a grant awarded by the United States Army.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, he applied for a grant offered through the Army's Technology Transfer Program in June and was recently notified that they had received it. Purchased through the grant, at no cost to the county, was a 390 MHz IBM ThinkPad laptop computer with a Pentium II processor and various accessories including "Small Look" software and a digital camera.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Investigator Bobby Flynt said the equipment will be used for security and surveillance,

including gathering evidence for drug cases.

The camera, included with the system is probably no more than 2 inches in diameter, and can capture still shots and real time video. Up to six images per second can be captured, Flynt explained. Also the equipment can be programmed to cut itself on at particular times and can make pictures in total darkness. The images are then stored in the computer for future use.

Smith said more than \$16,000 worth of state-of-the-art equipment was added to the Sheriff's Department without costing the county anything through this grant.

The Army awarded grants for this purpose only to law enforcement and other government agencies, Smith said.

## Two Races Included In Next Tuesday's Run-Off Election

Only those voting for South Half Constable and/or District 19 State Representative will be going to the polls Tuesday, Aug. 24 for the Democratic primary run-off election.

In the race for constable of the south half, two newcomers running for the office will face off—Larry Eaton, who received just over 41 percent of the votes in the first primary, and Sammy South, who received almost 43 percent of the votes in the first primary. The winner will fill the position previously held by Brian Southward who chose not to run for re-election.

Precincts voting in the South Constable race are: West Iuka, Spring Hill, Tishomingo, West Tishomingo, Paden, Dennis, North Belmont, Belmont, East Belmont, Golden, and Cotton Springs.

In the race for District 19 State Representative, incumbent Jamie Franks will face opponent

Donnie Epps. While Epps had enough votes in Tishomingo County to secure his spot on the November ballot (just over 60 percent), it was not enough when the votes from the rest of Dist. 19 were taken into account. Dist. 19 includes portions of Tishomingo, Itawamba and Lee counties.

Tishomingo County precincts voting for District 19 Representative are: West Iuka, Tishomingo, West Tishomingo, Dennis, North Belmont, Paden, Belmont, East Belmont, Golden, Cotton Springs, and part of Burnsville.

There were no run-offs necessary for any other races in the county, nor were there any needed for state races.

Polls will be open Tuesday from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. The Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office will be open each weekday from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. and also on Saturday, Aug. 21, from 8 a.m. until noon for absentee voting.

## Incumbents Re-Elected To TCEPA Board In Close Election

Large Turnout Of Members For Election Saturday

Two opposing candidates gave two present board members of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association some stiff competition in Saturday's election, but the incumbents retained their positions.

In the first district race, incumbent Shelby C. Daniel received a total of 372 votes to win over opponent Jimmy Marlin, who received 335 votes—a margin of 37 votes.

Daniel received the following votes in each individual voting location: Midway—21, Tishomingo—66, Iuka—212, Belmont—22, and Burnsville—51. Marlin received the following: Midway—21, Tishomingo—22, Iuka—160, Belmont—34 and Burnsville—98.

In the second district race, incumbent Lucien Epperson kept his seat on the board by winning over newcomer Nickey Cummings by the narrow margin of 33 votes. Epperson finished the race with 368 votes to Cummings' 335 votes. Following are each candidate's votes in each voting location throughout the county: Epperson: Midway—16,

Tishomingo—62, Iuka—161, Belmont 23 and Burnsville—106. Cummings: Midway—24, Tishomingo—26, Iuka—146, Belmont—26 and Burnsville—113.

Two other candidates were elected to the board without opposition. They were third district—Toney Mobley and area-at-large—Justin W. Belue. Mobley will fill the position previously held by Charles Bonds who did not seek re-election. Belue, an incumbent, will resume his position on the board.

TCEPA Executive Director Robert Grisham said that this year's voter turnout for the TCEPA election was exceptional. He said he believed so many came out to vote because of the interest created by the candidates themselves.

"I had several people tell me specific candidates had asked for their vote in this election," Grisham said. "I think that this campaigning by the candidates led to the large turnout."

Members of the TCEPA Board of Directors are elected by the Association's members for a term of three years, according to Grisham.

## Highway 25 Improvements To Be Completed By Bonds Co. Inc.

Northern District Transportation Commissioner Zack Stewart announced Wed., Aug. 4, that a contract was awarded for improvements to Highway 25 in Tishomingo County.

Bonds Co. Inc., of Burnsville, Miss., was awarded the contract with the low bid of \$1,110,716.43.

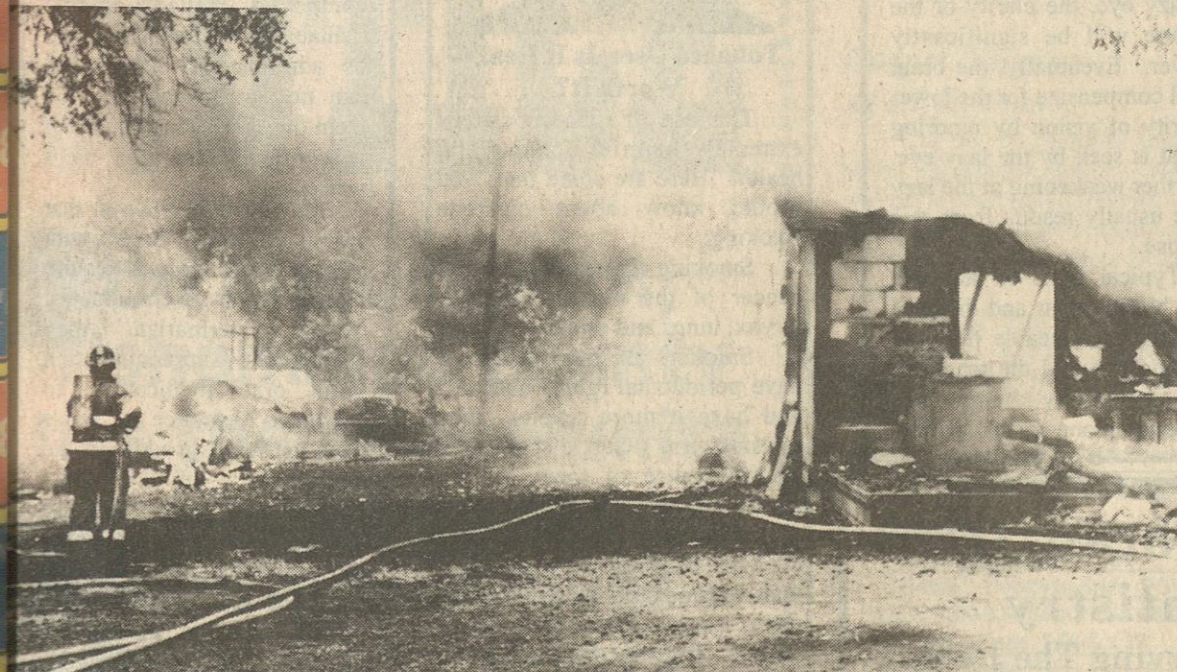
The contract provides for overlaying approximately 8.5 miles of Highway 25 between

Belmont and Tishomingo.

According to the commissioner, the highway will remain open but motorists might encounter lane closures as they enter the work zone.

The estimated contract completion date for the project is May 2000.

The Mississippi Department of Transportation urges motorists to observe all construction advisory signs and drive with caution.



## Fire Destroys Home Near Burnsville

A fire Tuesday, Aug. 10, at a residence on Grissom Chapel Road, off Hwy. 365 near Burnsville, burned down a home, trailer and several vehicles.

Tishomingo County Fire Investigator Jimmy Hughes said the fire, at the home of Victor Waldrep, County Rd. 298, apparently started from an electrical system overload at the deep freeze. Waldrep, his son-in-

law and grandson were home when the fire started, but escaped without injury.

According to North Crossroads Fire Chief George Harrison, the fire completely destroyed Waldrep's home, an outside trailer which was used for storage and three cars.

With the recent dry conditions, firemen had to be especially careful to keep a wooded area behind the residence

and a sage grass field to one side of the residence from catching fire, Harrison said. Firefighters had the fire extinguished in approximately two to three hours.

The North Crossroads Volunteer Fire Dept. was assisted at the scene by Iuka, Burnsville and Farmington Fire Departments, as well as representatives from the Mississippi Forestry Commission.

## Home Economics Tips

### More Power, Fewer Injuries

Each year thousands of Americans are injured or killed by their home's electrical system. What can you do to make sure yours is as safe as it can be? Extension Home Economists and the National Electrical Safety Foundation (NESF) offer these tips:

- Are light bulbs the appropriate size and type for the lamp or fixture they're in? A bulb of too high wattage or the wrong type may lead to fire through overheating.
- Are electric cords out from beneath furniture, rugs or

carpeting? Furniture resting on cords can damage them. Electric cords which run under carpeting can overheat and cause a fire.

- Are cords attached to the walls, baseboards, etc., with nails or staples? Nails or staples can damage cords, presenting fire and shock hazards.
- Are there outlets or switches which are unusually warm or hot to the touch? These conditions may indicate that an unsafe wiring condition exists.
- If fuses are used, are they the correct size for the circuit? Replacing a correct size fuse with

a larger size fuse can present a serious fire hazard. If the fuse in the box is rated higher than that intended for the circuit, excessive current will be allowed to flow and possibly overload the outlet and house wiring to the point that a fire can begin.

## Weight Loss Takes More Than Cutting Fat

There is only one way to lose weight and that is for the body to use up more calories than you take in. Too many calories or too little activity or both are the main causes of gaining weight.

Cutting calorie intake is one way to shed extra pounds. But increasing the number of calories your body burns is another way. This can be done by increasing physical activity. Exercise burns calories and helps to make you

more fit.

## Mange

Despite the fact that it is a very common problem, mange is probably one of the most studied, yet least understood skin infections that occur in animals. The more we learn about mange, the more complex these frustrating infections seem to be.

Mange is a parasitic mite that infects the skin of animals and occasionally in humans. It occurs in a variety of forms. Dogs are most frequently affected, especially puppies. Asymmetrical hair loss and itching are characteristic. Serious bacterial skin infections are common in advanced cases.

The most common form of mange, the one most people are familiar with, is Demodectic Mange, also called Demodicosis, and is caused by the mite Demodex folliculorum.

While the thought of "mangy" dogs brings to mind the stray mutt that has never had a square meal, the occurrence of mange is much higher in purebred dogs than crossbreeds. This has led researchers to conclude that there is significant genetic predisposition in certain breeds to develop mange. Dobermans, boxers, and Chinese shar-peis are examples. Despite common beliefs, demodectic mange is not readily transmitted by direct contact.

There are many reasons dogs and cats lose hair. Mange is only one of them. The diagnosis of mange requires a careful examination of the skin and an attempt to identify the microscopic mites.

Treatment can be a challenge in some dogs affected by mange. Initial treatments usually involve application of a biweekly (every 14 days) dips with a compound called amitraz (Mitaban). Treatments should be administered until mites can no longer be recovered from the skin. Then treatment is continued for two more weeks.

But it's not always that easy. Some dogs with refractory mange will require treatments for several months. Your veterinarian may recommend supplementation with oral medication to facilitate clearance of mites from the skin. In addition, the occurrence of bacterial dermatitis may require administration of an antibiotic.

On the other hand, as many as 50% of the puppies with mange will completely eliminate their infections by the time they are one year old, whether or not they receive any treatment at all.

The prognosis for recovery is excellent, even in severe cases, but time, patience, and effort are necessary ingredients.

Her grandparents are Bill and Marvel Fuson of Dickson, Tennessee and John R. and Betty Sullivan of Nashville, Tennessee.

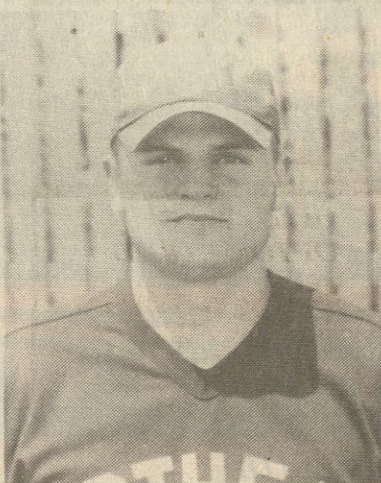
Jeffery is the son of Shirley Williams of Iuka, Mississippi and the late Billy Williams of

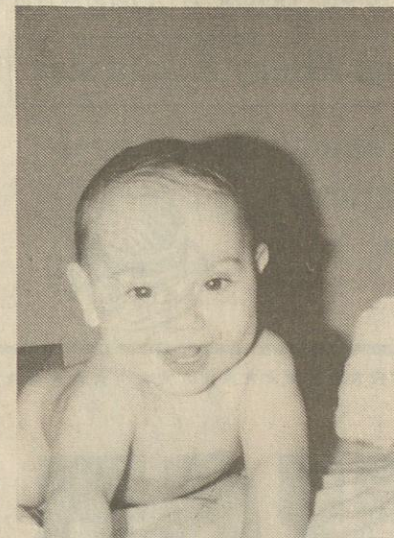

## Conservation Corner

Conservation easements are the newest tools available for private property owners to reserve property for a specific conservation purpose. Easements enable a property owner to protect habitats on their property while, at the same time, take advantage of substantial tax benefits.

To fully understand conservation easements, one needs to consider the rights that

come with owning property. When one places a conservation easement on a piece of property, the owner may give up some rights (e.g., the right to develop the property, etc.). Hunting, fishing and timber management can still be conducted. Restrictions on the use of the property are detailed in the easement, which is perpetual in length. The easement is a legal instrument that is recorded in a

particular county.

On August 5, 1997, President Clinton signed into law a modified version of The American Farm and Ranch Protection Act, which provided an exclusion from the federal estate tax for property subject to a permanent conservation easement. The Act allows a 40 percent estate tax exemption for land committed to conservation. It sets a \$500,000 cap on tax benefits.

The measure applies only to land within 25 miles of a federally designated metropolitan statistical area as defined by the Office of Management and Budget (i.e., Biloxi, Gulfport, Hattiesburg, Jackson, Memphis, Tennessee, including parts of DeSoto County and Pascagoula), national park (i.e., Gulf Islands Battlefield or Vicksburg National Cemetery), wilderness area or within 10 miles of an urban forest as defined by the USDA Forest Service (e.g., Gulfport, Jackson, Meridian, etc.).

The property must be owned by the decedent or a member of the decedent's family at all times during the 3-year period ending on the decedent's death. The property can be owned by a partnership, corporation or trust if at least 30 percent of the entity is owned (directly or indirectly) by the decedent.

When one places a conservation easement on a piece of property, the owner can be assured that the property will remain in a natural state forever. The property owner is rewarded by the fact that the easement will promote his or her conservation ethic while receiving immediate tax benefits. Conservation easements are increasingly being recognized as a desirable tool for property owners interested in protecting their property. Through the efforts of property owners we can be assured that our cherished natural resources will be passed on.

As in any conservation program, it is best to seek the advice of fish and wildlife and tax professionals with experience in the development of conservation easements.

James L. Cummins, Jr. is Executive Director of the Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Foundation in Stoneville, Mississippi. Known as "Wildlife Mississippi," the Foundation is a non-profit, conservation organization founded to conserve,

restore and enhance fish, wildlife and plant resources throughout Mississippi.



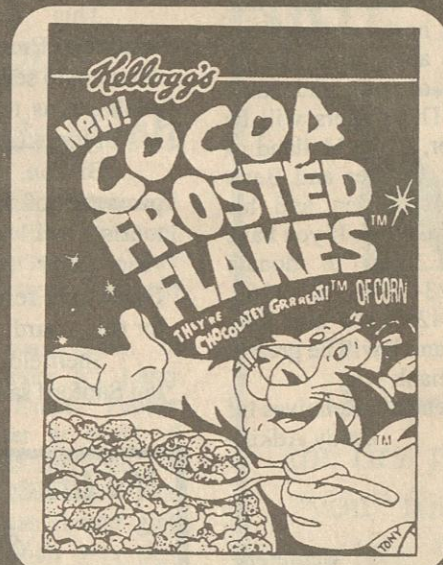

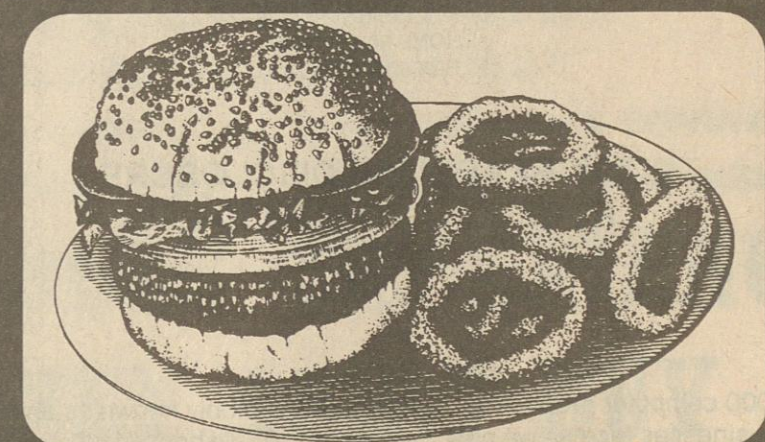

## Y2K READINESS DISCLOSURE PURSUANT TO PUBLIC LAW 105-271

The year 2000 computer problem, or Y2K as it is commonly known, is an issue that almost all businesses face as we near the Year 2000. Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is no exception. We are preparing for Y2K by taking a positive approach to analyzing, modifying, and testing critical computer applications and devices that are controlled by computer chips or processors that may be affected.

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has developed a plan to address this problem. We have conducted an inventory of automated systems, including computer hardware, computer software, communication systems, embedded chips and key service vendors. The critical components identified through this process either have been or will be remediated in time for the new millennium. In addition, we have also requested certification of readiness from our vendors to determine the status of critical systems and we are requiring that current and future purchases be compliant. TVA as our power supplier has and continues to implement a comprehensive Y2K review and remediation plan. Finally, TVA and Tishomingo County Electric Power Association are in the process of developing a contingency plan so that we can resume normal operations in the event of a system failure.

We believe our distribution facilities will be capable of operating without significant interruption caused by the transition into the next century.

# Year 2000 Report Third in a Series

*This is the third in a series of reports designed to keep you informed of the progress we are making toward our goal of eliminating the Y2K threat at this institution. Please continue to follow our progress in order to determine the bank's degree of readiness and the safeguards that will protect your funds as we approach midnight, December 31, 1999.*

**Q:** You mentioned that The Peoples Bank & Trust Company is serviced by M&I Data Services in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Are there any other major providers of data services to The Peoples Bank & Trust Company?

**A:** Yes. Our credit card activities are posted by Total Systems Services, Inc. of Columbus, Georgia and our merchant processing business is handled by First Tennessee Bank, N. A. of Memphis.

**Q:** Are they Y2K compliant?

**A:** Both organizations' processing systems have been certified to be Y2K compliant.

**Q:** Could a Year 2000 problem affect my FDIC insurance coverage?

**A:** No. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insures deposits of banks and savings associations up to \$100,000 per FDIC category. No depositor has ever lost a penny of FDIC insured funds due to the failure of an insured bank or savings association. Of course, The Peoples

Bank & Trust Company is fully insured up to \$100,000 per FDIC category.

**Q:** Can The Peoples Bank & Trust Company assure me that accounts in this bank are safe from the Y2K millennium bug?

**A:** We can assure you that funds on deposit with the bank are protected against any negative effects from the Y2K millennium bug. The greater concern is for funds removed from the bank by individuals who do not have a tried and tested method for protecting those funds.

**Q:** Do you mean that there are situations where unsuspecting individuals might lose funds removed from the bank?

**A:** Absolutely! Already scams have surfaced that are designed to take monies that are today on deposit in the bank and convert those funds to the control of scam artists.

**Q:** Can you describe some of those scams for us?

**A:** Yes, and they vary. In one, a smooth-talking con artist will call claiming to be from the government, or an employee of the bank, and state that all depositors must transfer their accounts to a specially created account until the bank can fix its Y2K problems. The criminal, of course, has control of the account to which the funds would be transferred. In Arizona, state banking regulators reported that an elderly woman was encouraged by a member of her church to withdraw her money from a bank to survive a Y2K doomsday scenario. The idea was that the member would help her "manage" it after it was withdrawn.

**Q:** What is your advice to us as customers who need to be wary of such schemes?

**A:** If you get any unsolicited call in which a stranger asks for your personal financial information (i.e. account number, deposit balance, social security number, etc.), hang up. Notify The Peoples Bank & Trust Company, if you are our customer, as soon as possible. Don't reveal information to anyone unless you initiate the contact.

**Q:** Any other advice?

**A:** Yes. Be wary of people posing as bank officials, police officers or other government agents who ask you to assist in an investigation or audit of your bank. Studies In Isaiah 53  
The work of Christ is regarded by Scripture as obedience. He was obedient even to the death of the cross. The Lord did not come to be ministered to but to minister and give His life a ransom for many. Many of the puritans made a distinction between passive and active obedience. Should the life that Jesus Christ lived by termed active obedience and His suffering and death be termed passive obedience? The Lord Jesus Christ was actively obedient. He never did anything contrary to the will of God the Father (Ps. 40:8; Heb. 10:7). The Lord's vicarious obedience demands not only the full discharge of the law's precepts but the infliction of penalty for all infractions and shortcomings. A twofold demand of the law is taken into account to speak of the active and passive obedience of Christ. The term passive cannot indicate that anything Christ did was passive. Any such concept would contradict the very notion of obedience. He was supremely active, not passive, in His sufferings. Obedience is not artificial or abstract. His obedience extended from His incarnation to His vicarious death on the cross. The Lord Jesus Christ was active in all His life, sufferings, and death. How about you?

August 23, 1935 - August 7, 1997

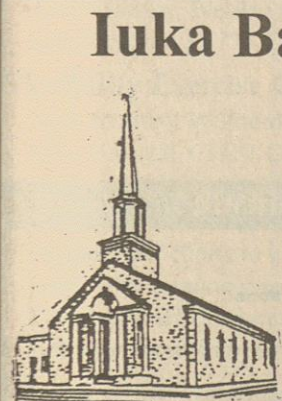

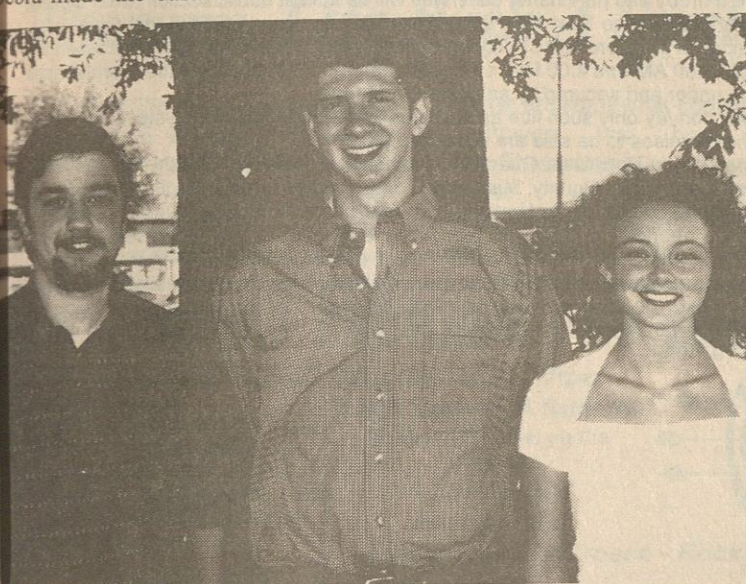




### Woodcarving On Display At Iuka Library

### Mississippi Department of Education

The State Department of Education and Tishomingo County's Div. of Aging and Adult Services, ADC MS Division for Progress, DCH, HS Tishomingo Co. Special Municipal Separate School District and CCC announced, recently, the United State Department of Agriculture income guidelines for free and reduced price meals served under the School Lunch, School Breakfast, After School Snack program, Food Distribution and Child and Adult Care Food programs.

Families with children in any of these facilities who are unable to pay the full price of the meals are encouraged to apply for benefits.

Applications and instructions for applying for meal benefits will be sent home with each student during registration or on the first day of attendance. To apply for the meal benefits, each household should fill out the application and return it to the school or center. Additional copies of the application are available at the administrative office of each facility.

For the school/center officials to determine eligibility, the household must report income information or provide a food stamp or TANF Temporary Assistance to Needy Families) or FDIPIR Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations) case number. If the child receives TANF payments or is a member of a food stamp household, or a member of a FDIPIR household, the parent or guardian has to provide only the name of the

child, food stamp or TANF or FDIPIR case number, and sign the application. Adults in adult care centers who are members of food stamp households or who are SSI or medicaid participants are automatically eligible to receive free meal benefits after a completed application has been approved.

Other applicants must report household income identified by source, such as earnings, welfare and alimony received by each household member. In order for income

applicants to be approved, the household must provide the following on the application: the names of all household members; each household member's monthly income identified by source; the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct; and the social security number of an adult who signs the application or an indication that this adult household member does not have a social security number. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. The information provided may be verified at any time during the year by school/center or program officials.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school/center. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price or free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown in the income scales. Households may

apply for benefits at any time during the year as circumstances change.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for meal benefits for them, the household should contact the school/center for more information.

Each school/center has a copy of the approved free and reduced meal policy. The policy indicates who is responsible for determining eligibility. The determining official is, in most instances, the principal, the food service administrator, or the center director. Each school/school district/center has an individual named as the hearing official. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the hearing official. The school/center office or the superintendent's office can provide you the name, address, and phone number of the hearing official.

WHEREAS, a Petition for the establishment and incorporation of a fire protection grading district designated as the Indian Creek Fire Protection Grading District, Inc. was filed with the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and order accepting same was entered on July 6, 1999; and

WHEREAS, a hearing on the question of the public convenience and necessity was set therein to be held on August 2, 1999; and

WHEREAS, notice of said hearing was published in the July 8, 15, and 22, 1999, issues of the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper having a general circulation in Tishomingo County, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, said time and place of said public hearing having come and there having been no protests or objections filed thereat, and the Board having examined the above-mentioned proceedings, do find that they are all in compliance with the requirements of Section 19-5-215, et seq., of the Mississippi Code of 1972, and that it is order for the Board to proceed in accordance with the above-mentioned statutory authority.

THEREFORE, the following Resolution was introduced in and its adoption moved by Supervisor Ryan, same being seconded by Supervisor South, and having received the affirmative vote of all supervisors present, it was ordered adopted and entered on the Minutes as follows:

Resolution adjudicating that the personal convenience and necessity require the creation of the Indian Creek Fire Protection Grading District, Inc. and that the creation thereof is economically sound and desirable.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the public convenience and necessity requires the creation of the Indian Creek Fire Protection Grading District, Inc. and it is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Supervisors to incorporate same as provided by law.

Section 2. That the creation of the Indian Creek Fire Protection Grading District, Inc. is economically sound and is desirable.

Section 3. That the Board of Supervisors intends creating said District, and hereby sets the date of the 30th day of August, 1999, as the date upon which said District will be officially created.

Section 4. The official name of the District shall be the Indian Creek Fire Protection Grading District, Inc.

Section 5. The territorial limits of said District shall be and the same are hereby designated as follows:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of the South half of Section 32, Township 7 South, Range 10 East, Tishomingo County, Mississippi; thence run South along the East section line to the Southwest corner of Section 5; thence run West along the North section line of Section 7 to the East bank of the Tenn-Tom Waterway; thence run South along the East bank of the Tenn-Tom Waterway to the West line of Section 11, Township 7 South, Range 9 East; thence run South along the West section line to the Southwest corner of Section 14; thence run East along the South boundary line to the Southeast corner of Section 14, Township 7 South, Range 10 East; thence run South along East section line to the Northeast corner of Section 14; thence run West along the North Section line of Section 14 to the Northwest corner of the Northeast Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 14, thence run North along the half section line of Section 11, Township 7 South, Range 10 East to the North section line of Section 11 thence run East along the North section line of Section 11 to the Southeast corner of the West half of the Southeast Quarter of Section 2; thence run North along the quarter section line to the Northeast corner of the West half of the Southeast Quarter of Section 2; thence run West along the half section line of Section 2 for a distance of 1,600 feet, more or less; thence run North along half section line for a distance of 1,400 feet, more or less, to a point; thence run West for a distance of 1,600 feet, more or less, to a point; thence run South for a distance of 1,450 feet, more or less, to a point; thence run West for a distance of 1,230 feet, more or less, to a point; thence run West for a distance of 1,100 feet, more or less, to a point; thence run North for a distance of 1,100 feet, more or less, to a point; thence run North for a distance of 3,100 feet, more or less, to the Northeast corner of the Southwest Quarter of Section 34, Township 7 South, Range 10 East; thence run along the half section line to the Northwest corner of the Southwest Quarter of Section 32, Township 7 South, Range 10 East, and the Point of Beginning.

Section 6. That this Resolution shall be published in a newspaper having a general circulation with the District once a week for at least three consecutive weeks, with the first publication thereof made not less than 21 days prior to the above date specified, the formation of said District, and the last such publication shall be made not more than 14 days prior to such date.

## Burnsville Youngster Greets Therapy, Life With A Smile

It's difficult to keep a straight face around 9-year-old BreAnna Powers. Although the Burnsville youngster faces physical challenges unimaginable to most of us, her enthusiasm and positive outlook are somewhat contagious. Powers was born with neurofibromatosis, a congenital disease characterized by development abnormalities of bone, muscle and internal organs.

The disease is also marked by numerous cafe' au lait (or dark) spots on the skin.

Her parents, Talmadge and Annette Powers, began taking their daughter for physical therapy sessions shortly after she turned one year old. They also help by stretching her arms and legs every day and following a home exercise regimen designed by Stephanie Magee, a physical therapist with Iuka Hospital.

"During the school year, Stephanie comes out to treat BreAnna at her school, Burnsville Elementary. In the summertime, we take Bre Anna to Iuka Hospital once a week for physical therapy," her father said.

Magee's main goals are to strengthen Powers' sitting balance, to strengthen her upper and lower extremities and to improve her leg movement and walking. "When we first started treating Bre Anna, she had to have assistance taking off and putting on her ankle braces. Now she can do this almost completely by herself," Magee said. "Her legs are getting much stronger and she walks much farther on her own now. She uses a reverse rolling walker to get around, and we are training her to use loft strand crutches that fit around her wrists to make her even more independent."

And Powers doesn't sit still for long. She participates in activities of Touched by An Angel, a nondenominational ministry for handicapped children based in Tupelo, and plays softball in a special league. She recently began hippotherapy, an innovative therapy approach using horseback riding as a complement to more conventional treatment, through North Mississippi Medical Center's Outpatient Rehabilitation Center in Tupelo. NMMC and Iuka Hospital are both affiliated with North Mississippi Health Services.

"Bre Anna looks forward to her physical therapy sessions every week," her father said. "She works hard for Stephanie, and we can definitely tell that Bre Anna's confidence level has risen since Stephanie began working with her."

Iuka Hospital offers a full range of physical therapy services for children and adults by physician referral. For more
