### Iuka Teen Dies Following Shallow Water Dive

A 19-year-old Iuka resident died from severe head injuries Saturday, Sept. 11, after he dove into shallow water near Yellow Creek Port.

According to Msgr. Royce Howie of the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, Enforcement Division, Jonathan E. Allred was spending the afternoon with some friends Saturday in the Yellow Creek area near Iuka when he decided to dive into the water to cool off. Witnesses reported that Allred dove off a ledge which protruded 4- or 5-ft. from a rock wall, located just south of Yellow Creek Port.

"When he did not come back to the surface in a reasonable time, one of the people on the bank went in after him," Howie stated. "He had apparently hit his head on a rock in the water."

Howie said since the summer has been so dry, water levels throughout the area are extremely low. In a normal year, with normal rainfall, the rocks would not have been such a danger. In the area where Allred dove, Howie said the deepest water was only between 5- and 6-ft. deep.

Allred sustained serious injuries to the top of his head Howie stated. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Howie would like to ask everyone who plans to go swimming in any of the area waters to pay close attention to the water level before diving. He said the water is at the lowest level that he had ever remembered.

Jonathan Edward Allred, 19, died Saturday, Sept. 11, 1999. He had been a student at Tishomingo County High School last year. He had been employed at Corinthian Furniture. According to his mother, Jonathan was an avid sportsman. He especially enjoyed

bow hunting.

Services will be at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Ludlams Funeral Home Chapel. Burial was in Patrick Cemetery.

### Elderly Belmont Resident Killed In Auto Accident

A one-vehicle accident Wednesday afternoon claimed the life of an elderly Belmont woman.

Erma Lee Ivy, 87, of County Road 864, Belmont, died after the 1990 Ford Ranger pickup she was a passenger in ran off the road and hit a tree, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Investigator Bobby Flynt. The car was driven by her brother, James H. Pharr, 84, County Road 5, Belmont.

Flynt said the accident occurred at approximately 2:16 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 8, on County Road 864 (better known as Red Bud Road).

Flynt explained that the siblings had been to a senior citizens function and were returning home when Pharr apparently went to sleep, ran off the road and into a tree.

Both victims were transported to Red Bay (Ala.) Hospital. Ivy died from injuries sustained in the wreck, according to reports.

Neither of the two were wearing seatbelts at the time of the accident, Flynt confirmed.

Erma Lee Ivy died Wednesday, Sept. 8, at North Mississippi Medical Center. She was a native of Tishomingo County, a retail worker and a member of Chapel Hill Church of

God of Prophecy.

Services were at 1 p.m. Friday, Sept. 10, at Old Bethel Methodist Church with the Rev. James Gray, the Rev. Billy West, the Rev. Frank Smith and the Rev. W.E. Johnson officiating. Burial was in Old Bethel Cemetery. Deaton Funeral Home of Belmont was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include four daughters, Marie Harwood and her husband, James, of Lakeland; Tenn., Betty Johnson and her husband, W.E., of Belmont, Betryce Cleveland and her husband Doyle, of Winthrop Harbor, Ill., and Jane Shaw and her husband, Duane, of Oxford; one son, Ellis Ivy, and his wife, Ella of Rossville, Ga.; one sister, Lula Tanner of Belmont; three brothers, Holland Pharr of Belmont, Samuel Pharr of Cleveland, Tenn., Ezekiel Pharr of Virginia; 11 grandchildren; 18 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her husband Austin Ivy, in 1984, and a son, Larry Paul Ivy, in 1949.

Pallbearers were Phil Robbins, Stuart Ivy, Rick Johnson, Jeff Cleveland, Steven Cleveland and David Eben.

Alan Rouse and Terry Stanley were honorary pallbearers.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department officers have seized a number of guns found in the possession of a Burnsville man who is a convicted felon.

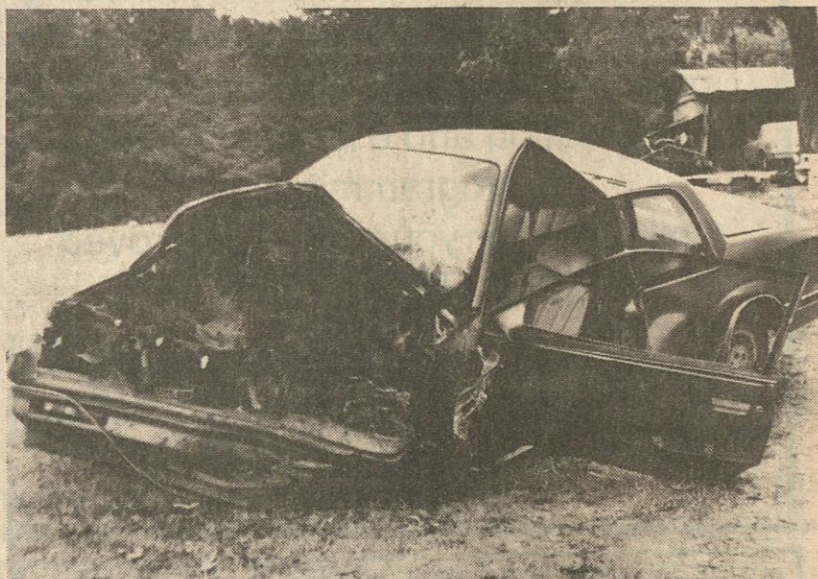
According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, 13 guns were seized from Jeffrey P. Lovelace, 29, of 737 County Rd. 982, Burnsville.

It is illegal for a person who has been convicted of a felony to possess firearms of any type. Officers saw Lovelace riding around

in his pickup truck with a gun in the back window, Smith explained. The officers then obtained a search warrant for Lovelace's home where they found the additional weapons.

Smith said Lovelace, who was charged with "a felon in possession of firearms" is out on \$5,000 bond.

### Two-Vehicle Wreck Near Paden Leaves Three Injured

One motorist was severely injured and two others sustained less serious injuries in a two-vehicle accident Saturday night on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Bridge near Paden.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Jerry Boyd, Randy D. Mock, 33, of Tishomingo had severe injuries following the 8:30 p.m. accident including head injuries and multiple fractures. Motorists Junior W. Inman, 57, of Golden had a broken leg and his wife, Regina, 44, suffered minor injuries, as a result of the crash.

Boyd explained that Junior Inman was driving eastbound on the Hwy. 30 Tenn-Tom bridge near Paden in his 1991 Pontiac when Mock, who was traveling west on the bridge in his 1986 Buick, veered into the Inman's path, crashing into

their vehicle's front left side and forcing their vehicle up against the side of the bridge.

Boyd explained that the reason Mock veered into the westbound lane is not known at this time. He said Mock was unconscious following the accident and therefore unable to give any details.

All three victims were taken to Iuka Hospital. Mock was airlifted to the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo. No report of his condition was available at press time.

None of the victims were wearing seatbelts at the time of the crash, Boyd said.

Boyd said he would like to thank the Sheriff's Department and the Fire Department for their response and assistance at the accident scene.

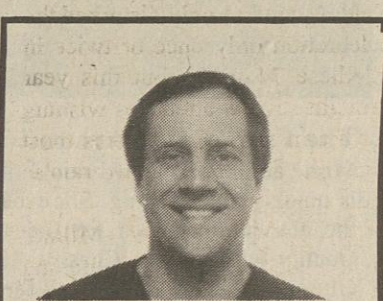

## New Technology Aids in Treating Cavities

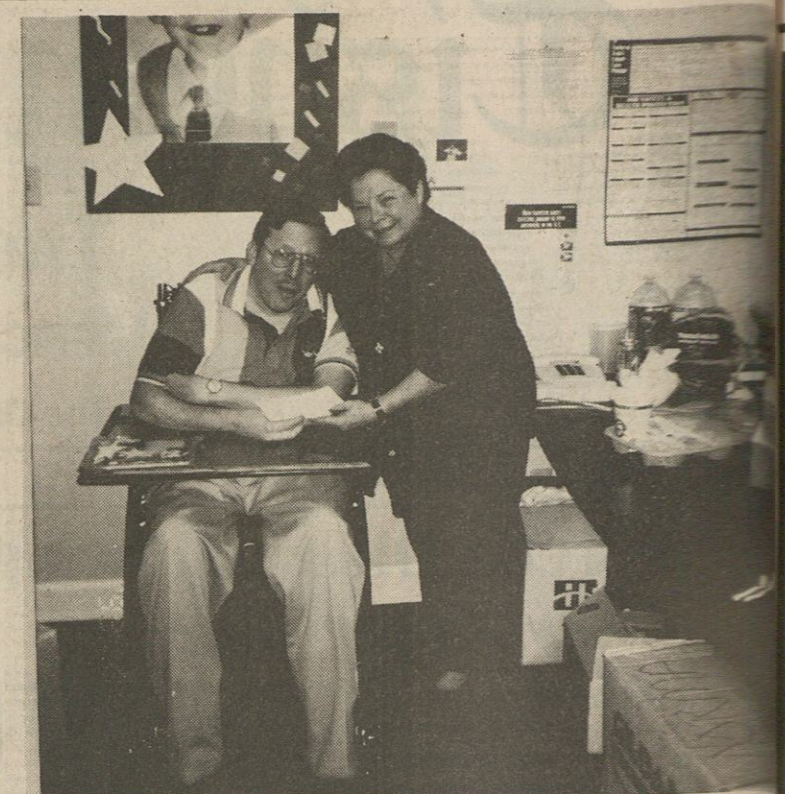
A new dental technology helps diagnose and treat tooth decay at an early stage. The technology uses equipment called air-abrasive technology to "blast away" some areas of the tooth surface without using the dental drill.

Air abrasive technology uses minute alumina particles that are almost invisible to the naked eye and carried to the tooth by a stream of air. These particles spray away areas of the tooth with no drilling sound, vibrations or need for anesthesia. Because the technology is a conservative means of removing portions of the tooth, it allows early diagnosis. The dentist can use short blasts from the device to better view the suspicious looking darkened areas. The pits and fissures of the back teeth (chewing surfaces) are areas where decay are often seen.

Air abrasive technology can also be used to remove stains and organic debris before the application of sealants (protective plastic coatings) on the teeth and can also remove areas of early decay for replacement with resin fillings.

Air abrasion, however, is not well-suited for removing all decay. Moist or soft dentin (the layer of tooth that is exposed when gums recede) cannot effectively be removed with air abrasion. This technology was recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration and is not yet widely available in dental offices.

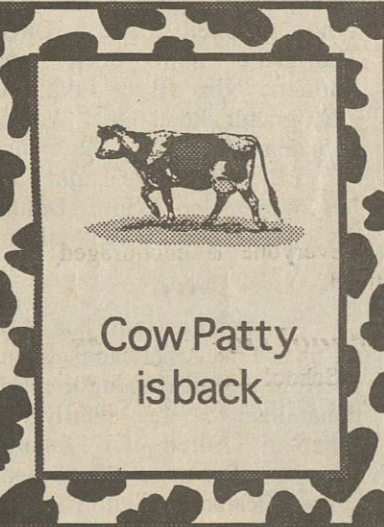

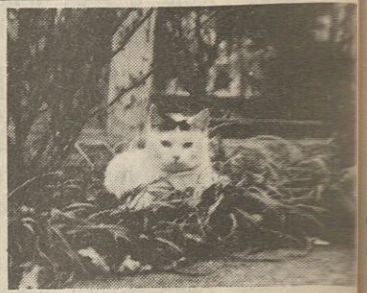


## Presbyopia

Presbyopia is not a disease, but a common vision condition that affects nearly everyone as they age. It is the gradual and normal decline in the eyes' focusing ability. This decline begins early in life, and between age 40 and 45, it generally reaches a point where vision at the usual reading distance starts to become blurry and difficult.

Although presbyopia seems to develop suddenly, it actually does not. When the amount of focusing loss reaches a certain point, further changes are more noticeable and seem more rapid.

Doctors of optometry treat presbyopia with one or more of the following types of corrective lenses: reading glasses, with one prescription for reading distance; regular bifocals with prescriptions for near (reading) and distance viewing; bifocals that are gradually progressive between near and far distances; or trifocals with near (reading), intermediate (arm's length) and far distance corrections.



## People With Allergies To Pets

You couldn't resist that furry face and those big brown eyes. But when you got home you were broken out in a rash or couldn't breathe! If that's been your experience, you aren't alone. Many people develop allergies as they grow older. Adults who had dogs and cats as children find themselves unable to be around pets without having an allergic reaction. Does this mean you have to get rid of your pet? No, not necessarily.

The first thing to do is go to a physician and find out what is causing the allergies. Make sure the pet is the actual source of the problem. If the pet is the cause of your allergic reaction, many doctors will recommend that you get rid of the family pet. However, this can be difficult if the pet has been with the family for awhile. If your symptoms are mild, you may be able to keep your pet with the help of antihistamines. Allergy shots are also available, but must be prescribed by a doctor and customized to your particular allergies.

Immunotherapy injections for humans is a procedure that tries to decrease the sensitivity to an allergen. Results from this procedure have been only slightly helpful in the past, but are now becoming more effective, especially when dealing with cat allergies. It is commonly thought that allergens (the reaction-causing substance) is in the hair that is shed by pets. Actually, the dog allergens are found in dander (the dry scales that are released from the skin). Cat allergens are found in the animal's saliva and released into the air when the cat licks itself. Pet grooming products are available to remove allergens from your pet as well as carpets and fabrics. They come in the form of shampoos and sprays. Installing special air filters will help remove allergens from the air.

Keep pets outdoors or at least out of the allergic person's bedroom. Pets should be kept from pillows, bedding or anything that comes in contact with your face. Avoiding or minimizing contact with the pet might ease the intensity of the reaction. After handling or petting an animal, it's always a good idea to wash your hands thoroughly.

Mrs. Sabrina Welch gave an informative report on "Child CPR". Never shake your child when you think he/she may not be breathing but instead call them by name and see if they will respond.

Look and listen for five seconds to make sure the child is not breathing before you start CPR. Check a child's pulse under the arm. An adult's mouth is big enough to cover both the child's mouth and nose. Use two fingers for compressions on a child. The most important thing is don't panic.

Eva Mae gave an interesting program on "Safe Food Handling". Do your grocery shopping last and then go straight home to put food in the refrigerator. Place packages of raw meat on a plate

before placing in the refrigerator so they won't leak on other food. Wash kitchen towels and cloths often and replace sponges every few weeks as bacteria can live in these. Thaw food in the microwave or refrigerator and not on the kitchen counter to prevent bacteria from growing. Cook food thoroughly, red meat to 160 degrees and poultry to 180 degrees, to kill bacteria. Never leave perishable food out of the refrigerator for over two hours. It is best to throw food away that you think you have kept too long. A freezer will keep food frozen for about two days without any power.

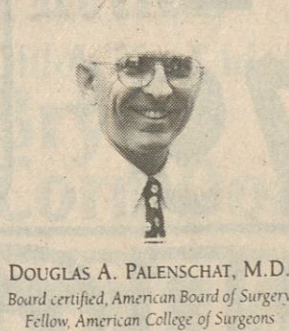

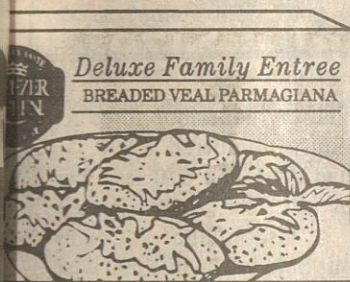

## County Agents Notes

### Trees & Weather-Related Stress

The effect of hot, dry weather has shown up on many landscape trees. Dogwoods, ornamental, species of pear, maples, oaks, and other popular urban landscape trees have been especially susceptible to this summer's hot, dry weather.

Most weather-stressed plants typically exhibit marginal leaf scorch and "flagging foliage." These symptoms are signals the plant isn't receiving an adequate amount of moisture. Scorch appears along leaf edges and occurs when water is lost from leaves more rapidly than it can be replaced from the soil. As a result of moisture stress, the leaves become dry and scorched. Scorch is more likely to occur when hot, dry winds accompany drought periods.

Defoliation sometimes accompanies drought stress. Shallow-rooted trees are especially sensitive to hot, dry weather. For example, dogwoods in home landscapes, and in woodland settings, typically show severe marginal leaf scorch and foliar wilt. Frequently, drought-affected dogwoods have upper branches with light to deep red leaves. Young trees transplanted within the past few years are also vulnerable to environmental stress and should be watered the equivalent of a one inch rain per week. As a general rule, water each week it does not rain. Water deeply to encourage deeper root penetration. Don't wet the foliage, and water in the afternoon or early morning to give the surface of the soil time to dry before nightfall. Also, mulch around trees to conserve soil moisture and prevent injury to the bark from lawn mowers or string trimmers.

Trees which have had roots cut or otherwise damaged from

new home construction, driveway construction, removal or addition of soil to a tree's root system (only a few inches of soil addition or removal often causes severe root injury), soil compaction which prevents water movement into the tree's root zone, and other factors are often responsible for root damage. Such trees with damaged roots fall into a category which places them especially at risk to weather stress, since damaged roots aren't capable of picking up adequate amounts of soil moisture needed to satisfy the tree's water needs. So, it's a good idea to keep an eye on "at-risk" trees which may have suffered recent root damage.

What type of symptoms should you look for? Trees with injured roots often exhibit larger areas of brown, dying foliage — typically on one side of the tree (often the side where the root injury occurred). This type symptom is an indication of more significant injury, and in many instances, the tree will continue to decline and die unless the early symptoms are noticed and prompt action is taken to relieve the stress. Unfortunately, the early warnings are often overlooked, and when the damage is noticed, it's often too late to start a program of remedial action in an attempt to save the tree.

What type of remedial steps should be taken? Often tree watering and fertilization are the best course of action, but each tree situation needs to be evaluated, so contact the County Extension Office at 423-7016 for information guides on tree fertilization and watering practices. Don't delay — the life you save could be your tree's. Remember, trees in the landscape mean added property value, so keep an eye on your investment.

### Unemployment Drops In County

According to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to 6.7 percent in mid-July. This compares to 8.0 percent in June and 11.4 percent in July, 1998.

The civilian labor force for the county numbered 8,890, 10 less than June and 570 less than July of last year. Approximately 8,290 Tishomingo County residents held jobs while 600 were unemployed.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 2,810 and nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3,370.

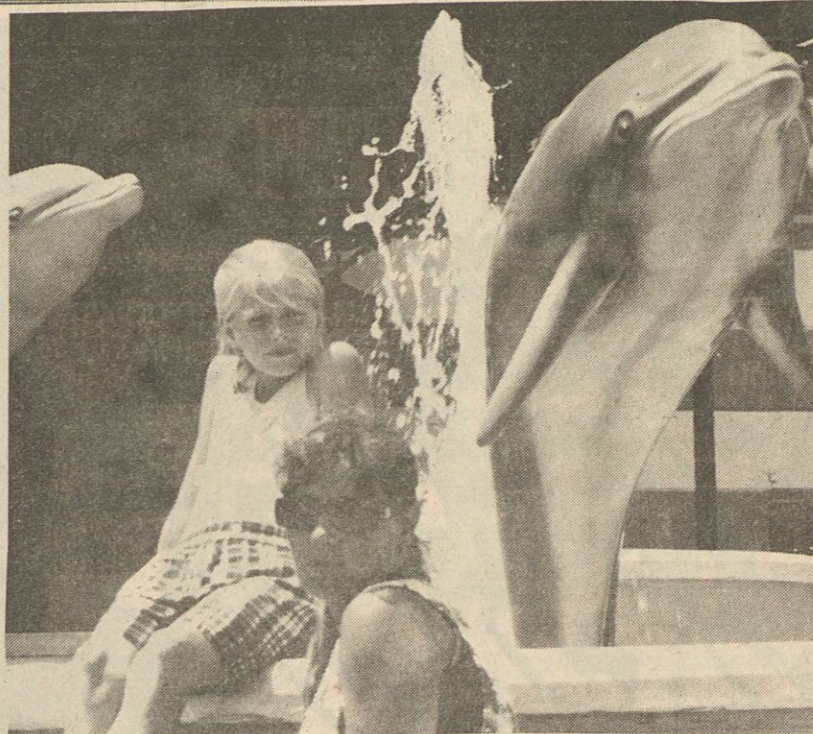

In addition, we have also requested certification of readiness from our vendors to determine the status of critical systems and we are requiring that current and future purchases be compliant. TVA as our power supplier has and continues to implement a comprehensive Y2K review and remediation plan. Finally, TVA and Tishomingo County Electric Power Association are in the process of developing a contingency plan so that we can resume normal operations in the event of a system failure.

We believe our distribution facilities will be capable of operating without significant interruption caused by the transition into the next century.

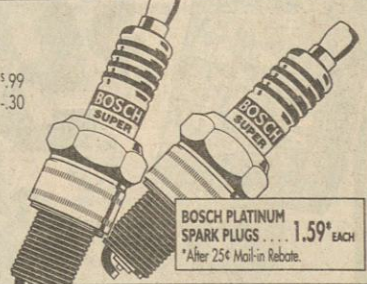

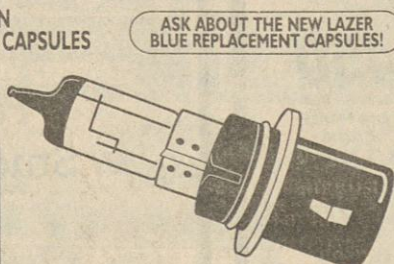

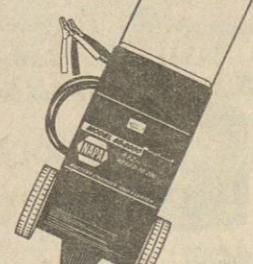

## Middle School Football Fields, Resignations, Hirings and Student Transfers Among Topics Discussed In Monday's School Board Meeting

In another attempt to persuade the Tishomingo County School Board that the football fields at Iuka Middle School and Burnsville Middle School do not need to be abandoned, a Burnsville parent offered the assistance of volunteers to help with renovations, if the Board would give their approval and some assistance along the way.

In other action, the Board approved the following: the resignation of five school district personnel and the hiring of replacements for their positions, the transfer of four students, 13 field trips for school's within the district and seven fundraisers for different student organizations.

The Board also accepted a \$20,436 bid for metal roof panels for a Vo-Tech classroom.

In the matter of the football fields, the parent argued that since the fields at the middle schools are being used for the middle school teams to practice on, as well as the youth league teams, and also for P.E. by the school's students, it is essential to make the needed improvements to them. He argued that in their present state, they are not only unsafe, but also becoming eyesores to the campuses because of the lack of upkeep. He asked that the Board give their okay for volunteers to step in and begin removing the bleachers at Burnsville's field, as well as other grounds-keeping tasks.

Second district school board member Gary White told the other members of the Board he didn't think they should turn down the

offer of volunteers. He said he realized that this would be an expensive project since the fields had not been properly maintained, but that he felt a long term plan should be put into place where the Board would agree to bring the fields up to par over the next few years.

School District Superintendent John Mullins stated that since the facilities at Tishomingo County High School were available to the district, he saw no reason to "duplicate facilities." He said he was trying to prioritize spending of the district's money and that he

believed that money could be spent better on other things, such as classroom construction.

The parent argued that by making the middle school students play at the high school field, they were taking away the student's identity as members of their particular communities. He explained that more students had the opportunity to play football at the junior high level and that presently, Burnsville had 50 players more than at TCHS. He said that since the fields are used for so many things, the investment of the District would not be wasted. He also stated that along the way, there were going to be scheduling conflicts with so many teams using the one field and that it would be the younger teams which would suffer.

While no official votes were taken on the matter-including White's proposal-the Board did agree to accept the help of volunteers.

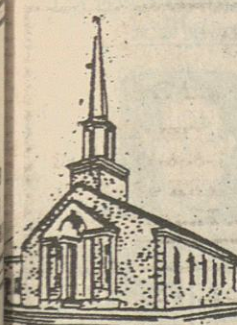

### Iuka Soldiers Train At Elite Facility

Hot by day and cold by night, its terrain is desolate, sandy and mountainous. It is the National Training Center (NTC) in the Mojave Desert at Fort Irwin, Calif. where soldiers of Charlie Company, 1st Battalion, 198th Armor from Iuka, are participating in the best force-on-force training the U.S. Army has to offer. The NTC is the Army's top combat training facility worldwide.

Charlie Co., nicknamed "Cobra," is part of the 155th Separate Armored Brigade of the Mississippi Army National Guard. The brigade has combined with Guardsmen from 22 other states to form a combat force called the 155th Brigade Combat Team (BCT). The BCT is conducting a three-week training exercise at the NTC called the "Magnolia Thunder" rotation.

The NTC is unique, in that it provides a special training scenario to add realism to the

exercise. The fictitious country of Mojavia is at odds with neighboring Krasnovia and Parumphia. Krasnovia is the major threat, with Parumphia a potential enemy. Charlie Co.'s mission is to support the 155th BCT in its efforts to protect Mojavia from invading Krasnovians.

Charlie Co.'s primary task was to breach obstacles to allow friendly forces to make contact with the enemy, according to the company commander, Capt. Craig Bishop from Iuka. Their secondary mission was flank security. While performing their mission, Charlie Co. had several battles with the OPFOR (opposing force) using special equipment to determine kills. The battles are essentially games of laser tag on a grand scale.

The battles help units such as Charlie Co. enhance their warfighting skills. After each skirmish, the Guardsmen conduct an after action review to discuss what was done right and what areas need improvement. According to tank crewman, Spec.

Kacey Reed from Iuka, the NTC facilitators - called OCs (observer controllers) - are impressed with the Guard's performance.

"We've been told by every OC that we're several steps ahead of our active duty counterparts in our troop leading procedures and tactical maneuvers," said Reed. "I

believe the reason for that is because the Guard is so close knit. We've been working together for so long that we function well together. We gel together; this is our niche."

Charlie Co. normally trains at Camp Shelby, Miss., but according to Reed, the NTC offers the space they need to effectively train for combat. "Shelby is great for company-sized maneuvers, but here, we can train with the whole battalion."

Bishop stresses the value of their NTC training saying, "If this experience saves the life of one soldier in a real-world crisis, it's worth it. Realistically, it's going to help more than one soldier, it's going to help us all."

The Magnolia Thunder rotation is the largest reserve training exercise ever conducted at the NTC.

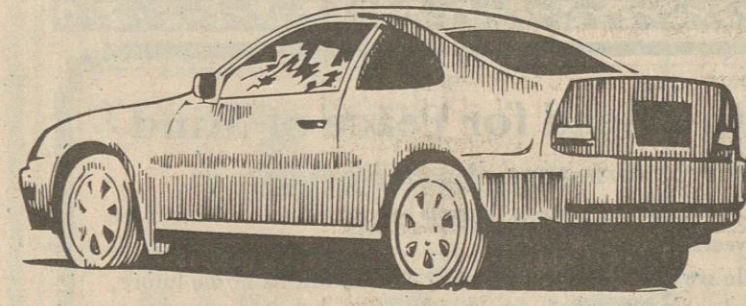

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

The following is a letter I sent last week to the state Insurance Commissioner about my two-year effort to get a fire hydrant installed in my neighborhood in Iuka. After reading my letter, I hope others who have these same concerns will write to the Commissioner and to their homeowners insurance companies asking that fire protections service in Iuka be upgraded. The rating we have now with the state is very much below a standard we as taxpayers should be willing to accept. My letter to Commissioner George Dale is as follows:

Dear Mr. Dale,

I am writing to you as a last resort in getting assistance with having a fire hydrant installed in my neighborhood in Iuka.

For more than two years I have been asking the city to install a fire hydrant in our community. Three homes and several businesses would be served by a hydrant in our neighborhood. Though I have talked with Alderman George Long and Alderwoman Beth Davis, the answer has always been "no."

The reason I first started asking for the hydrant is that a worker at the Iuka Fire Department told me two years ago that there was not a sufficient water supply to my neighborhood to fight a house fire.

I am even more concerned about the safety of my home since a brush fire burned within a hundred yards of my house last week.

The fire department needed two pumper trucks to put out that fire, which was pretty small

compared with what it would have been if it had been my home or one of my neighbors. Even with the effort and skill of the firefighters, there would not have been enough water to save a house.

I called your office which is also responsible for fire safety and rating fire departments in the state. Iuka has a fire rating of 7, based on your rating system where a 1 is best and a 10 is worst.

I also checked and found that Iuka has received a number of Community Development Block Grants from the state Department of Economic and Community Development to work on different parts of the town's infrastructure.

None of those funds have been used to upgrade the city's firefighting system. And yet the city finds \$2 million to clear out Indian Creek for flood control.

I also checked to see if the mayor and other prominent people in our community were adequately protected with fire hydrants near their homes, and found that OF

### COURSE THEY ARE.

If the city can find the money to finance projects like this one, as well as projects to attract new business, then there should be as much effort put into making sure that long-time city residents receive a very basic city service - adequate fire protection.

In addition to your responsibility for fire protection services statewide, I am also writing to you as insurance commissioner, since my

homeowner's insurance rates are largely affected by the city's fire rating code. What can I do to help get our city to work on improving its fire protection rating?

Also, anything you can do to influence a more fair response to those of us in the community who do not have power and position in having our fire protection needs addressed would be very much appreciated.

I am also sending a copy of this letter to my homeowner's insurance carrier so that they can add their voice to my request for a readily accessible fire hydrant. It is a matter I think should be

addressed right away considering the recent fire incident in my neighborhood.

Thank you for your assistance and attention to this request.

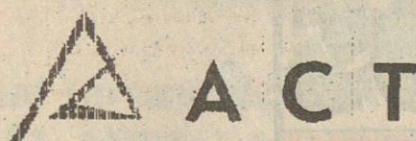

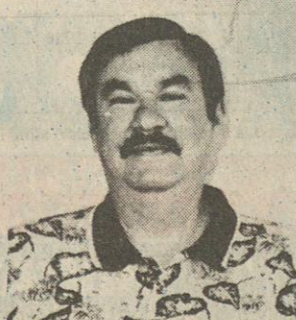

Builds Lunch Car Here

Messrs John and Elmore Sanders have on exhibition and using a car from which will be sold hamburgers, lunches, etc., that is a surprise to those who see it. Being built on wheels and with an engine in it, can be carried from place to place. It is shaped and all just like a passenger car for a railroad even has a pilot at the front to prevent as nearly as possible accidents. It has seats so several can sit while waiting. It is about 30 feet long, 10 feet wide, 12 feet high with several windows on sides and ends and doors at each end and it is ceiled also. All in all a real credit to the builders. Quite a deal of time has been spent in getting this car and has cost considerable money. You should see it and know what can be built in your own town by your own people.

Happy Hollow News

Dear Vidette:  
If you will allow a little 6th grade school girl a little space, I will write a few lines for the first time for publication.

News is very scarce in the hollow. Grannie McDuffy (Mrs. Frank) has been very sick for some time, but able to be up some now. We are on the 5th month of school now. It will soon be out and I will be sorry for I like my school days best of all. We kids have just finished our 4th test. Some failed, but the writer made good in everything. You've got to know your grade if you pass under our teacher.

On February 10, the Barnes Chapel ball players left for Cross Roads school to play an old fashioned town ball game; after a delightful trip through and woods, over the hills and thru the plains leaving, running and throwing rocks, rolling them down the steep mountain sides, we came to the top of the big hill where by looking south you could see the village of Burnsville and looking north, you could see to and beyond the Tennessee River. It was a most beautiful scene. On reaching our place

of destiny, our spectators were anxiously waiting for us.

After a short time everything had been arranged and we were ready to begin to play the game. Such running, such knocking, such squalling, you never heard the like out of the by-standing crowd. After about two hours of hard playing, we defeated them 40 to 25 in favor of Barnes Chapel School. We returned home with a heart full of glee because we all were as happy as school kids could be. I am known as Dimple the 6th.

The Vidette, April 19, 1928

Iuka's First Ice Plant In Operation  
Iuka's newest enterprise, the Hughes Ice Plant, which has been under construction for the past sixty days, is now in operation and running full blast. Many of Iuka curious who never watched the operation of a modern ice plant, stood a diligent watch over the procedure and a

goodly number were on hand to witness the first ice pulled from the cans on Monday morning. Anxious customers were awaiting the FIRST ICE MADE IN IUKA and trucks were backed up to the platform and carried away the first 2000 pounds manufactured. The first morning business of the new concern was unusually good despite the cold weather at the time.

Mr. J.C. Jourdan was the purchaser of the first 300 lb. block. Mr. Jourdan had made arrangements with the management before hand to have a large fish frozen in the center of the block of ice. This block was placed on the sidewalk in front of Jourdan Hardware Co., all day Monday and Tuesday to attract the attention of the curious. The Clarence Saunders meat market was the second customer when they hauled away 1500 lbs. to supply their refrigerators. The nickel and dime customers were close behind to get their share of the FIRST ICE MANUFACTURED IN IUKA.

Mr. Hughes has installed in our midst a very modern and up-to-date ice plant, something which has been

needed here for several years. He has taken every precaution and installed equipment sufficient to supply our every demand the year round. His plant is open twenty-four hours a day and all curious and interested are invited to visit the plant at any time. Any one who has never seen the manufacture of ice in a modern plant will be pleasantly surprised when the simple procedure is explained to them. The Iuka city water has stood the very highest test of purity and we are fortunate in having ice for our home use manufactured in Iuka where the inspection of the public is invited.

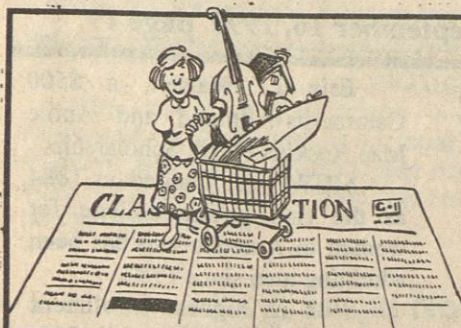

### Conservation Corner

Just as food plots are important to deer, they are also valuable to other species. Food plots are important to wintering waterfowl as nutritional needs increase during the winter months. During this time, waterfowl rely on invertebrates for protein and acorns and moist-soil seeds for energy. Food plots can help to supplement energy needs. Corn is an excellent source of energy which can be important in years of poor acorn crops. Almost any grain can be grown for waterfowl. Some of the most commonly grown crops are corn, browntop and Japanese millet.

For quail, fall and winter are the two critical seasons. In fall, quail move frequently. If food is near, most birds will remain in the area. During winter, food is critical for survival. Food plots for quail should be 1/8 to 1/4 acre in size and should be located near thick wooded areas, tall grassy fields and brushpiles. Crops such as corn and soybeans provide waste grain as long as they aren't covered by plowing or disking after harvesting. A portion of a field adjacent to cover should remain undisked throughout the winter. Plantings for quail include partridge pea, Florida beggarweed, kobe lespedeza, hairy vetch, browntop millet, bicolor lespedeza and wild reseeded soybeans.

Wild turkeys eat a variety of plant and animal materials. Young turkey poults require large quantities of insects and other animal matter to get protein for rapid growth. As turkeys mature, plant materials become the primary food source. Mature turkeys prefer acorns. In years of low mast crops, food plots should

be made available during the fall, winter and spring to fulfill the needs of the young poults, as well

as mature birds.

Food plots for wild turkeys should be located near prime turkey habitat. Large tracts of mature bottomland and upland hardwoods or pine-hardwood mixtures, interspersed with open areas, are preferred habitat. These open areas are excellent sites for food plots. Recommended plantings include ryegrass, ladino clover, crimson clover, bahiagrass and wheat. Many plots intended for deer will also provide forage areas for turkeys.

When planting food plots, crops should be planted according to rates and seeding times. Preparing seedbeds properly will

increase germination and yield a more productive food plot.

Try different varieties to find which plantings work the best in a given area. When planting large food plots, try combination plantings or try half cool-season and half warm-season plantings.

### Cleaning House

\*Be realistic. Don't expect to get everything under control in a day. Instead, set aside an hour once a week or every two weeks to tackle one closet or cabinet. You'll

dread it less, and probably get more done in the long run.

\*Unruly closets are typically caused by keeping things long past their usefulness. So as you pull things out of the closet, take a real look at them. How long has it been since you used the item? If it's been six months or a year, you'll probably never need it again. Throw it out or give it away.

\*If an item has sentimental value - your child's first bat and ball or your grandmother's

wedding dress - by all means, keep it. The best bet, though, is to store it in a dry basement or attic where it will be less in the way. Remember, you'll eventually have to clean out those places as well. Don't get caught in the clutter shuffle trap.

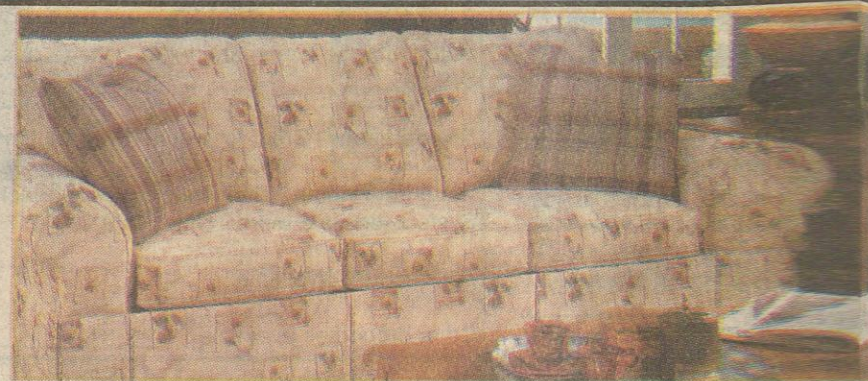

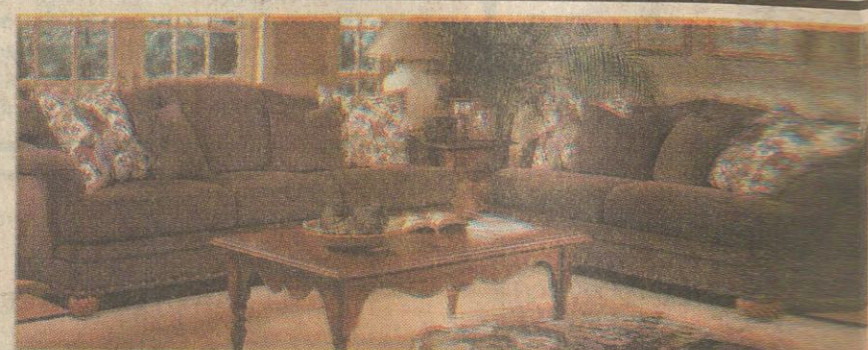

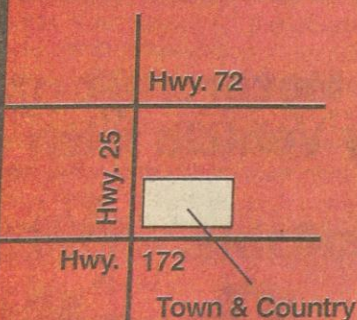
