47th Annual Tishomingo County Fair Begins Next Week - Oct. 5 - 9

The Tishomingo County Fair will begin next week with its usual variety of activities for young and old alike.

Beginning on Monday, Oct. 4, fair exhibits can be checked in. Adult, youth and 4-H exhibits may be checked in between 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. Educational and commercial booths may be set up between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

The action begins on Tuesday, Oct. 5, when the carnival opens. Also on that night, the King and Queen Contests for ages 2-21 will be held. Entry fee is \$5 per contestant. To register, call 423-7016.

Between the hours of 1 and 3 p.m. Wednesday, health screenings will be held as a part of Senior Citizens Day. On Wednesday Morning, 4-H and adult exhibits and booths will be judged. Baked goods and fresh produce will be checked in from 8-9:30 a.m.

The 4-H Pet Show will begin Wednesday at 5:30 p.m. Amateur Night will be held from 7 p.m. until 9 p.m. Wednesday is dollar night—admission to the fair will only cost you a buck.

On Thursday, Oct. 7, livestock judging will be held—judging of penned animals will begin at 3 p.m., the youth livestock show will begin at 4 p.m. and the youth livestock judging clinic will begin at 5 p.m.

A gospel singing will begin in the inside arena at 7 p.m. Groups scheduled to perform include The Harmonizers of Iuka, New Creation of Burnsville, The Milligans of Iuka and Three-For-One of Belmont.

Also, Thursday night is arm-band night on the midway—ride all rides, as many times as you like, for \$10.

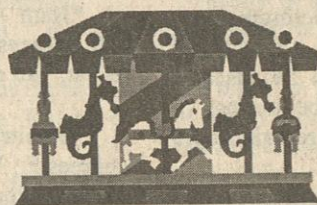
The Tiny Tot Show begins at 6 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 8. Infants ages 0 to 23 months may participate. Registration fee is \$5 for each contestant. Call 423-7016 to register. The 4-H Show Choir will be performing prior to this—beginning at 5 p.m.

In the outside arena beginning at 8 p.m. will be the J-Bar-B Rodeo.

On Saturday night, Oct. 9, the final night of the J-Bar-B Rodeo will get underway beginning at 8 p.m. Prior to the rodeo, the annual Junior Auxiliary "Cow Patty Contest" will be held at 6 p.m. Exhibits can be checked out at 8 p.m.

Each night of the fair, a \$25 gate prize will be given away, sponsored by area merchants.

Admission for Tuesday and Thursday nights will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 12 and under. Wednesday night, admission is \$1. Friday and Saturday nights, admission will be \$5 for adults and \$2 for children 12 and under. Parking, as always, is free.



Two-Vehicle Accident Sends Three To The Hospital

An accident involving a gravel truck and a car on Hwy. 25 Tuesday afternoon resulted in injuries to the driver and passengers of the car.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Reed Harrington (F-11), the driver of the car, Elaine Smith, 64, and passengers Mildred Hollander, 62, and a 1-year-old infant, Ethan Sparks, all of Tishomingo, were traveling north on Hwy. 25 in a four-door Mercury when they attempted to turn into a private driveway and were hit from behind by a Mack gravel truck.

Driving the truck, belonging to Johnson Trucking, was Erwin Walker, 36, of Iuka. The patrolman said apparently the truck was not able to stop in time to avoid hitting the car, which had stopped in front of it to turn off.

The infant was in the back seat, strapped into a child restraint. Patrolman Harrington said the back portion of the car was mashed up to near the front seat. One small area was not compacted as heavily and this is

where the infant was seated.

"It was truly a miracle that the child came away from the wreck almost completely unscathed," Harrington stated. "The car seat is probably what saved his life."

All three of the car's passengers were taken to Iuka Hospital following the accident. The driver of the car, Smith, sustained the most serious injuries, according to reports. Hollander and the infant had only minor injuries. The truck driver and his wife, who was a passenger, were not injured.

The accident happened in Cripple Dear Bottom, between Midway and Tishomingo at 2:23 p.m. The gravel truck was not loaded at the time of the incident.

Officer Harrington said everyone involved was wearing seat belts.

Harrington said he was assisted at the wreck scene by Mississippi Highway Patrolmen Criss Turnipseed (F-13) and Harrison Cook (F-21), and Tishomingo County Deputy Bob McCarley (T-5).

Sentences Handed Down In Sept. Session Of Circuit Court

The September session of Circuit Court in Tishomingo County ended with eight people being sentenced and many more cases being continued until the next session of circuit court, scheduled for January.

Plea day was held on Sept. 1, the week prior to this court session. Only two defendants entered guilty pleas to felony charges at that time. They were Donald O'Neal Kuykendall and Laurie H. Brook Kuykendall.

Both pleaded guilty to possession of a controlled substance, amphetamine, of more than .10 grams, but less than 2 grams.

Donald Kuykendall was sentenced to three years, all suspended, with two years probation. He was ordered to pay court costs of \$248, plus a \$100 bond fee.

Laurie Kuykendall was sentenced to three years probation and was ordered to pay court costs of \$248 and a fine of \$500. She was sentenced under section 99-15-26 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, Annotated, which states that if the defendant fulfills the requirements of the probation, the conviction will not show up on her record in the future as a felony charge.

Tishomingo Area Churches Blood Drive Thursday, October 14, 1999, Helping Keep Safe Blood Supply

More often than not, United Blood Services has been forced to import blood into our communities. According to the National Blood Data Resource Center 1998 report, blood donations have dropped about 6% since 1994, however, transfusion rates have increased 3% during the same three year period. Younger Americans are not as strongly motivated to donate as their parents and grandparents, some of whom got in the habit of donating during war time. Most presume that if we need blood it will be

there for us. When there is not enough of it, surgeons cannot perform transplants and joint replacements, birth moms are at high risk if they need a Cesarean section, and those getting many forms of cancer treatment or treatment for injuries risk death. Need varies. It can take just six units of blood to survive heart surgery, while a car crash victim may need 50. We need healthy donors constantly replenishing the blood supply.

Churches in the Tishomingo area are setting an excellent

Funeral Services Held For Rev. Eugene Tennison

Beloved teacher, counselor, pastor, and friend, Bro. Eugene Tennison passed from this life September 23, 1999 after a long illness. He was 73.

The county mourns the death of this kind, gentle man who spent his life in service to God and mankind, touching almost every family in Tishomingo County in one way or another.

As a young man, Bro. Gene served in the army in World War II, graduated from Mississippi State University, Vanderbilt University, and Southern Baptist Seminary.

He served as pastor of Tishomingo Baptist Church from November 1, 1956 while in Seminary and after graduation until his resignation September 28, 1960 to accept a call as pastor in Fayette, AL. He returned to Tishomingo Baptist Church in 1963 and remained as pastor until he retired on December 31, 1978. He served as music director at Tishomingo Baptist for several years and his beautiful voice brought comfort and joy to many throughout the years.

Bro. Tennison will always be remembered and respected by the many students he touched as a dedicated school teacher and principal.

He began his teaching career at Okolona and Amory, MS after graduation at MSU. After being called to the ministry, he served as principal at Iuka High School, Iuka Elementary, and also at



Tishomingo Elementary.

Bro. Tennison also touched many families through his job as counselor at Timber Hills Mental Health Center from January 1, 1979 until March 1986.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Saturday at the Tishomingo Baptist Church with Rev. Jim Pinkerton officiating. Burial was in Forked Oak Cemetery. McMillan Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include one sister, Margie Harper of the Burton Community; one brother, Curtis Tennison of the Burton Community; one niece, Carolyn Ashmore of the Burton Community; one great niece, Vicki Lambert; and one great nephew, Larry Ashmore.

Fate Of Little League Baseball Complex Still Uncertain

The courtroom of the Tishomingo County Courthouse served as the arena Monday night for the latest bout between county officials and little league supporters over the proposed location of the boy's Iuka Dixie Youth League Baseball Complex.

People attending the meeting spilled over into the hallway of the courthouse from the filled courtroom, listening as supporters from both sides voiced their opinions.

While Tishomingo County Supervisors, prior to the meeting, had presented the IDYL Board members with a somewhat revised plan for locating the complex, supporters of the little league project argued that preparing that site will still be cost prohibitive—costing an estimated \$60,000 for dirtwork.

After several exchanges between supporters and county officials, one crowd member made a motion that the Iuka Dixie Youth League Board Members accept the offer of the City of Iuka to contribute \$100,000 toward the construction of the little league complex and then proceed with negoti-

ations with the Board of Supervisors over the location at a later time.

"The way things are going, we could argue all night and still not get anything resolved," the speaker asserted. "Why not just vote to accept the City's money and let the Board work with the Supervisors on the details."

The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

A spokesman for the IDYL said they hope to work this out with the Supervisors as soon as possible and come up with a viable plan that will make this complex work for everyone.

The Supervisors stated that they have made their offer to the IDYL with the best interests of everyone in the county in mind—including the children that would be using the complex. They said they feel that they have been generous by offering to give the organization the land and hope that they will be able to build the complex there.

No other decisions concerning the complex had been finalized at press time.

To All Tax Payers And Citizens Of Tishomingo County:

There has been a lot said, and a lot printed, concerning the proposed little league complex. A lot of what has been printed and said paints a picture of Tishomingo County Supervisors that is very disturbing. We, as a county board of supervisors, feel it is time to let all taxpayers and citizens know exactly what the facts are, as far as we are involved.

1. The Mayor of Iuka and the little league board of directors asked the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors to provide county property for a boys baseball complex.

2. The league board of directors asked the Board for two previous locations, but were not satisfied with either location after the Board of Supervisors gave their approval. The Board of Supervisors, after much thought and consideration, agreed to provide a piece of property, which was agreed to by the little league board of directors and the mayor for the project.

3. The little league board

and Mayor later decided this was not the piece of property they wanted either.

4. The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, which must represent all tax payers in the county, has been accused of not cooperating with the City of Iuka or the little league on a project which, in reality, we have cooperated fully.

5. We, as a Board of Supervisors, have tried to work with the city, the Dixie Youth Little League and all involved with this project, and we will continue to do so.

6. While we have considered reasonable alternatives to this project, we stand firmly committed to protecting the interest of the entire county. The Board of Supervisors must at all times be sensitive to the needs of the entire county and we will work toward providing what is best for all of Tishomingo County.

Notice To Parents

On Thursday, September 30, students in the Tishomingo County School District will carry report cards for the first six weeks home to their parents. Parents are encouraged to take time to read grades on the report card and notice the absences reported.

Absenteeism at school equals failure. Nothing can take the place of the learning that occurs within the classroom itself - the activities, the discussions, the student questions and concerns and how each teacher addresses these. A student is often frustrated upon return to class because of lessons missed. Students need to be present at school on a daily basis. Regular attendance lays the groundwork for their future - the learning that takes place, as well as the attendance habits formed.

Absenteeism has been proven to be the number one reason for failure among high school students and the number one concern of employers across the nation. Ways of addressing the dwindling attendance of students include more parental involvement and addressing the excessive hours spent at after school jobs. Students, in general, do not fail if absences are cut to a minimum and there is active parental involvement.

For parents whose children neglect to inform them of the dates that report cards are given out, grade reports will be sent home on November 11, Jan. 6, Feb. 17, April 6, and in May after graduation.

We invite parents to visit the local schools on Monday, October 4, from 12:00 p.m. till 7:00 p.m. to discuss progress made by their children. Times at some schools have been sent home for parent/teacher conferences; however, at other schools parents are invited to come at any time that is convenient to them. Parents should consult with their local school for the proper procedure to follow.

Taking Your Food's Temperature Why Use A Meat Thermometer?

A meat thermometer takes the guess work out of cooking. It can help you: *Prevent food-borne illness, *Prevent overcooking and *Hold foods at a safe temperature.

How To Use A Thermometer

*A regular, ovenproof thermometer should be inserted into food at the beginning of cooking time and remain there throughout cooking.

*Instant-read thermometers are not designed to stay in the food during cooking. Instead, pull the meat or poultry out of the oven far enough to insert the thermometer - the temperature should register in about 15 seconds.

*With either method, make sure the thermometer is inserted into the thickest part of the food but not touching the bone or cooking container.

Retinal Detachment

Retinal detachment will affect one out of every 10,000 people each year in the United States. It is a serious eye problem that may occur at any age, although usually it occurs in middle-aged or older individuals. It is more likely to develop in people who are nearsighted or in those whose relatives have had retinal detachments. A hard, solid blow to the eye may cause the retina to detach, as well. More rarely, this condition is a hereditary disease and may even occur in infants and children. If not treated early, retinal detachment may lead to impairment or loss of vision.

The retina is a thin, transparent tissue of light-sensitive nerve fibers and cells. It covers the inside wall of the eye and functions like the film in a camera: light passes through the lens of the eye and is focused onto the retina. The light sensitive retinal fibers are responsible for "taking the picture" and transmitting the light image via the optic nerve to the brain.

Training Your Pet

It's never too early or too late to begin training your pet to be a well-behaved animal. It does require a great deal of patience, and realize that the behavior will not happen overnight.

Some breeds are easier to train than others, but all can be taught simple, essential behavior before they are a year old. Commands like "stay," "down," and "come" are important in a well-behaved pet. When you are training your pet, get down to your pet's level. When you stand above them, you are in a more threatening position.

Kneeling down to their level makes the dog more relaxed and ready to work with you. Always train on a collar and leash. This is your way to guide the dog into the desired behavior. Choke collars are available, but many dogs do not understand why they are being choked when the owners jerk on the leash. A collar and leash gives you the same control as a choke collar and encourages the owner to demonstrate what the desired behavior is. "Show and tell" is the best way to train a dog. For example, when teaching a dog to sit on command, pick up on the leash with one hand while adding pressure to the dog's haunches with the other saying "Sit." You are showing the dog what to do, and telling him what command goes with it. Always praise the dog when he does the desired behavior, even when he is being guided.

Puppies can be trained much the same way, once you get their attention. Puppies will do anything for food. It's a good way to hold their attention, and a tasty reward for a job well-done is deserved. Even though you are using food, don't forget to verbally praise your puppy for proper behavior.

Repetition is essential for both puppies and dogs. Show them over and over what you want from them. Do not overload them with too much information at once. It will confuse them and set back your process. Work on a new behavior, such as sitting for a week. During that time don't introduce new material. Once they have mastered the behavior, move on to the next one while maintaining the previously learned behavior. Most trainers say the best results come when owners "think like a dog!"

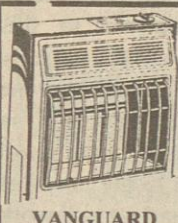

Y2K READINESS DISCLOSURE PURSUANT TO PUBLIC LAW 105-271

The year 2000 computer problem, or Y2K as it is commonly known, is an issue that almost all businesses face as we near the Year 2000. Tishomingo County Electric Power Association is no exception. We are preparing for Y2K by taking a positive approach to analyzing, modifying, and testing critical computer applications and devices that are controlled by computer chips or processors that may be affected.

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has developed a plan to address this problem. We have conducted an inventory of automated systems, including computer hardware, computer software, communication systems, embedded chips and key service vendors. The critical components identified through this process either have been or will be remediated in time for the new millennium. In addition, we have also requested certification of readiness from our vendors to determine the status of critical systems and we are requiring that current and future purchases be compliant. TVA as our power supplier has and continues to implement a comprehensive Y2K review and remediation plan. Finally, TVA and Tishomingo County Electric Power Association are in the process of developing a contingency plan so that we can resume normal operations in the event of a system failure.

We believe our distribution facilities will be capable of operating without significant interruption caused by the transition into the next century.

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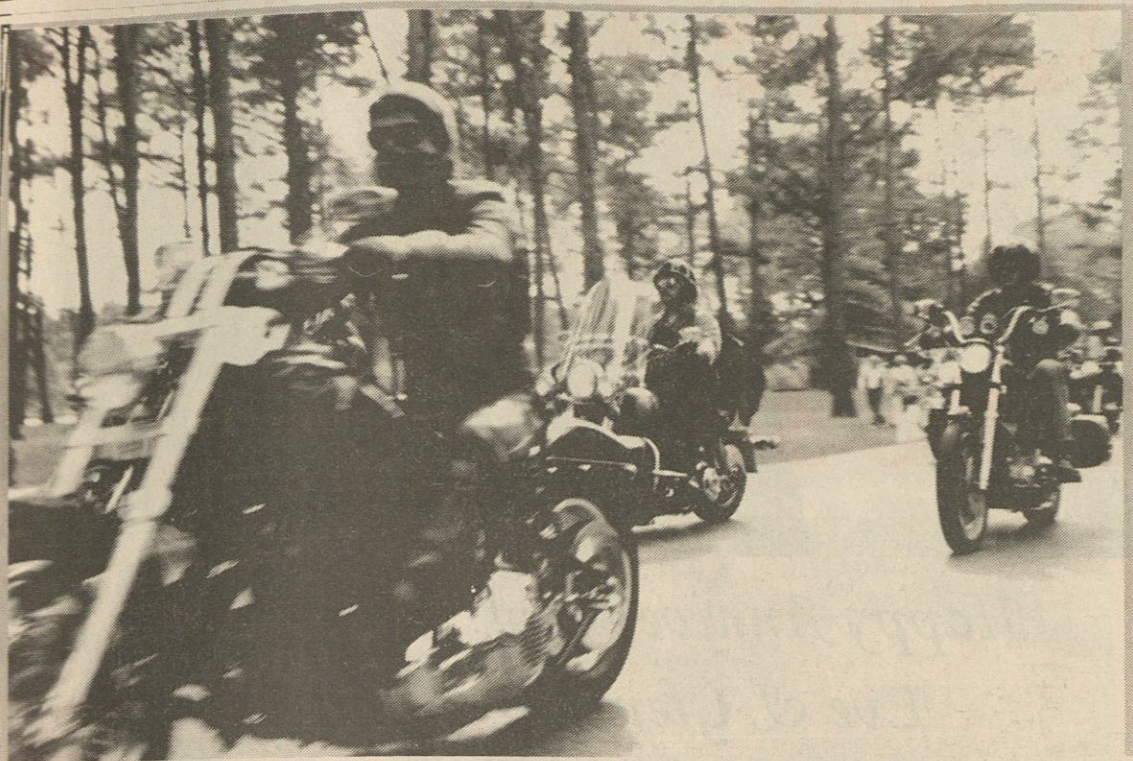
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Sixth Annual Trail of Tears Motorcycle Ride Draws Record Number of Participants

The roar of motorcycle engines replaced the ancient sounds of Native American footfalls along the Alabama section of the Trail of Tears Saturday, Sept. 18, as motorcyclists from throughout the country joined in a ride to Waterloo in remembrance of those forced to migrate to the West in 1838.

According to a spokesperson for Florence/Lauderdale Tourism, approximately 30,000 motorcycles participated in this year's commemorative ride. Alabama Highway Patrol Officers in helicopters flying over the route said the procession stretched

over 30 miles during the last trek of the journey. Organizers were expecting over 20,000 motorcycles to participate. Last year, about 15,000 rode into the small Alabama town of 300. This year, that number doubled. The spokesperson said that every motel/hotel room in Colbert and Lauderdale counties was filled during the weekend event which also included a Native American Pow-Wow, a free concert and other events. The event had a \$3 million economic impact on the North Alabama area, the spokesman estimated.

The commemorative ride was originally organized by a group of motor-

cyclists over six years ago to raise awareness about the thousands of Native Americans who were forced by the U.S. Government in 1838 to leave their homes in the East and be relocated to reservations in Oklahoma. The Trail of Tears Corridor of North Alabama follows the J.C.S. Hood Route of that removal where over 1,000 Native Americans were marched overland from Ross' Landing in Chattanooga, Tenn. to Waterloo, Ala. where they were placed on boats and transported west. The route closely follows US Highway 72. The ride is held annually during the third weekend in September.

Year 2000 Report

Fourth in a Series

This is the fourth in a series of reports designed to keep you informed of the progress we are making toward our goal of eliminating the Y2K threat at this institution. Please continue to follow our progress in order to determine the bank's degree of readiness and the safeguards that will protect your funds as we approach midnight, December 31, 1999.

Q: In a previous question you indicated that your automatic teller machine (William Teller ATM) application services were provided by M&I Data Services and I noticed that they are, for the most part, Diebold machines. Are your ATM operating systems now Y2K compliant?

A: All 32 ATM machines across our system have now been upgraded and are Y2K compliant.

Q: The Y2K problem started to surface in 1997 or, at least more people started to pay attention about that time. You have had loans, bonds and deposit instruments for several years that mature beyond December 31, 1999. How have you done the accounting for those instruments in the interim?

A: As you were told in a previous communication, Peoples' loan and deposit processor is M&I Data Services in Brown Deer, Wisconsin. The M&I loan system began to experience problems with Year 2000 maturities in the late 1980's. At that

time the loan system code was modified to handle maturities in the future; however, it was not necessary to revamp the entire code to accommodate this problem, only "fix" what was broken at that time. The deposit system would have experienced the same problem but was "fixed" in the early 1990s. M&I began their Year 2000 project for full remediation of their systems in 1995 and, as previously reported, that work for all systems applications has now been finished.

Q: Will my automatic payments and deposits work after the Year 2000 and, if so, will there be any interruption in the process?

A: Such payments and deposits are handled through an automated clearinghouse (ACH) system. Our ACH system is currently Year 2000 compliant. The Federal Reserve, who clears all of the ACH transactions for the nation, will be ready for the Year 2000. However, there could be problems outside the control of our bank and the Federal Reserve. For example, if you work for a company and it does not address its internal Year 2000 issues with its payroll processing system, you could still experience a delay or interruption of your payroll deposit.

Q: Does the bank have a plan if things beyond its control go wrong as we enter the new millennium?

A: Extensive expanded date and future date testing of all internal systems and their interdependencies will assure that we are Y2K compliant as January 1, 2000 approaches. However, our planning process does include the possibility that external factors

may interrupt our service. To demonstrate our degree of readiness in the unlikely scenario where external factors interfere, we will be prepared to operate from at least one location in each market with generators and we will have a supply of fuel on hand. Heaters using alternative fuels will be available, port-a-johns will be on standby to be delivered immediately upon request and staff members will be informed as to where they are to work in order to assure that we meet our customers' needs. If the schools are closed, babysitting service will be provided to our employees by those employees who cannot serve in their normal capacities, and much other detailed preparation is being made. Of course, generator backup was installed in our Technology Center when it was built in 1994. This backup system has been tested several times during ice storms and other interruptions of power, so we know that the system is in place and working.

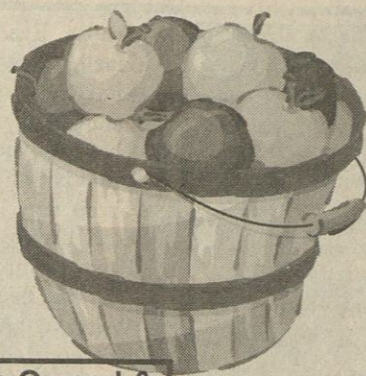

First of all, the County has to apply for a grant in order to even begin thinking about an agri-center. The County applied for a grant in 1995, per Danny Owens, and was denied. Also, per Danny Owens, they do not know when they will be able to apply again, and when they do, there is no guarantee that they will be approved, therefore, chance of getting an agri-center in Tishomingo County within the next 10 - 15 years is SLIM TO NONE.

However, the chance of our youth boys getting a baseball complex in the next 8 months is 100%, provided the County is willing to give up about 100 ft. of property located across from the fairgrounds. An idea was presented at this meeting that would not only provide a baseball complex, but also numerous PARKING for the fair and even room for a future agri-center. But, the idea was passed off, because it MIGHT interrupt future planning. The entire issue per the Board of Supervisors and Danny Owens has been PARKING for the fair which only occurs one week of each year. There have been problems with fair parking for as long as the fair has been coming here. Have the supervisors done anything to improve parking? NO. The girls softball complex created over 1 1/2 acres of additional parking which is used during the fair. The boys complex will also create additional parking, but for some reason the supervisors and Danny Owens do not want to see it that way. I don't think the real issue here is parking, and for all of you who have friends or relatives with children who play ball now or will in the future, you need to get interested in this situation. Our children are our future!!

If the \$100,000 is not enough money to build the complex at the site donated by the supervisors, do not whine about it. Wait until enough funds are available then build the complex. I do not appreciate the fair or an agri-center being slurred as it seems in reading in last weeks paper. The fair may be a one-week-a-year event but we are fortunate even to have a fair. The agricenters being built in the surrounding counties are from money from state grants with matching funds from the county. All of the money spent to construct the agricenters originate from tax dollars, but the agricenters are for

the enjoyment and benefit for the citizens in the county. The counties without existing facilities received the money first. We hope we will get an agricenter soon. Why build a ball complex on that particular spot for 300 children when an agricenter will be for those 300, plus the other hundreds of children and the thousands of adults in the county?

Rodeos, horse shows, truck and tractor pulls, and concerts draw thousands of spectators at \$8.00 per ticket and up, compared to the youth baseball drawing only the parents and grandparents of the children playing at \$3.00 admission.

I hope the above letter will help those of you undecided on this issue see where the priorities lie. Please call your local supervisors and fair board member in support of the agricenter and fair and tell them to stick with their first offer.

for Burnsville Elementary: Jerry Watson for the position of custodian and Donna K. Moyers as a special education assistant. Also, several more substitute teachers were approved by the Board.

Brought up for discussion again was the proposal of purchasing two books for each sub-

ject—one to be placed in the classroom and one for the student to keep in home. Second District Board Member Gary White had raised the issue of the extra set of books in previous meetings and asked Mullins to check with some schools who have begun using this system to find out how it was working and also the costs. White said in the elementary grades especially, many children's backpacks are extremely heavy, which could possibly lead to health related problems. He also said this would eliminate the excuse of not having the book they need to do homework because it was left at school. Mullins said that most schools implementing this practice do so because of security reasons—it eliminates the need for backpacks which might be used to conceal contraband such as sticks, knives or guns, which at this point, has not been a major factor in the district. He said if the extra textbooks were purchased for

grades 5-12, all at once, it would cost the district about \$150,000. White suggested purchasing only the book for the subject being adopted each year and maybe starting out with the lower grades—particularly 3rd-5th grades.

- *Approval of a long range plan for spending an extra MAEP money
- *The second meeting each month, beginning in October, will be held at a school campus in the district.

water, sailed through the air and as it went across the boat to the other side, it slapped Tom up beside his head. The fish landed with a splash in the water and disappeared from sight.

I really panicked this time. Surely it couldn't stay on the hook after hitting the water with such force! I gave my pole another powerful tug and swung back toward the boat once again, hoping to successfully land the fish in the boat. Again, I didn't know my own strength, and that fish came flying back through the air across the boat.

Poor Tom. Still somewhat stunned from the first assault, and not expecting to be attacked a second time, he was fair game for another round. That fish grazed his head again and landed back in the water from whence it had started.

Well, the shock of slapping Tom twice had dampened my enthusiasm somewhat for saving that fish - but to my surprise when I slowly pulled my line out of the water again, the fish was still on the hook. It was a catfish and not a very large one at that. Since it was the only one we caught that afternoon, we later threw it back in the lake.

Nothing but Tom's pride was really injured from my antics that day. So, I suppose there's a simplistic moral to my fish story. Sometimes it's best when the "big" ones do get away.

sentenced to felony charges during the two weeks of circuit court, Sept. 6 - 17, were as follows:

Scharla Maxwell Huff pleaded guilty to robbery. She was sentenced to 15 years, all of which were suspended, and was put on five years probation. Also, she was ordered to pay \$81 in restitution, \$1,000 in fines, \$248 in court costs and a \$200 bond fee.

Debra Darlynn Swindle pleaded guilty to count one and count two of uttering a forgery. She was sentenced to 10 years on the first count and 10 years on the second count, all of which were suspended. She was given five years probation. In addition, she was ordered to pay \$728 restitution to the U.S. Treasury (to be paid jointly with a co-defendant, Robert Shaun Bowman), a \$500 fine, \$248 in court costs and a \$200 bond fee. Charges in count two run concurrent with those in count one.

Robert Shaun Bowman pleaded guilty to count one and count two of uttering a forgery. He was sentenced to five years probation under section 99-15-26 of the Mississippi Code of 1972. Annotated, which states that if the defendant successfully completes the probation, the conviction will

not appear on his record as a felony. Additionally, he was ordered to pay \$728 restitution to the U.S. Treasury (to be paid jointly with co-defendant, Debra Darlynn Swindle). He also was ordered to pay a \$748 fine and court costs.

Anthony O. Wadkins pleaded guilty to D.U.I.—3. He was sentenced to five years with four years suspended, leaving one to serve with the Mississippi Department of Corrections. After completing this sentence, he will be placed on four years probation. Additionally, he must pay a fine of \$2,000, with \$1,000 suspended, and court costs of \$271. This sentence will run concurrent with another sentence he has already received.

Robert "Cooney" "Junior" Voyles pleaded guilty to grand

larceny. He was sentenced to five years, three of which were suspended, leaving two to serve with the Mississippi Department of Corrections. Following completion of this sentence, Voyles will be placed on two years probation. He was ordered to pay restitution of \$1,000, court costs of \$248 and a bond fee of \$1,000. All monies must be paid before he complete his probation. This sentence will run concurrent with another charge to which Voyles pleaded guilty during this session of court—a felon in possession of a firearm. For this charge, the judge sentenced him to three years, two of which were suspended. He was ordered to pay \$248 in court costs and a \$1,000 bond fee. This sentence will run concurrent with the first

sentence.

B. Steven Smith was sentenced for violation of probation. He was given five years, four of which were suspended, leaving one to serve with the Mississippi Department of Corrections. He then must complete four years of probation. He was ordered to pay \$1,724 restitution, \$48 in court costs, a \$250 fine and a \$100 bond fee.

Judges for this term of circuit court in Tishomingo County were Frank Russell and Thomas J. Gardner, III.
