First Grand Jury Indictments Released

The first indictments from the September session of the shomingo County grand jury, eld Sept. 27, 28 and 29, have en released by Tishomingo ounty Sheriff David Smith.

According to Tishomingo ounty Circuit Clerk Donna Dill, e indictments will be announced is the persons being indicted are served with their warrants and are brought into custody by the sheriff's Department.

The grand jury returned ndictments on the following:

Gregory Kline Harris was ndicted on the charge of felony phone harassment and had a 25,000 bond set. Smith noted, lowever, that Harris, who is being held at the Tishomingo County tail, will be denied bond because of other charges brought against him while out on a felony bond.

Dale Farris, indicted on the charge of statutory rape, had a \$25,000 bond set.

Michelle Byrom was ndicted on the charge of capital nurder. No bond was set.

Edward Byrom Jr. was ndicted on the charge of capital urder. No bond was set. Joey Dale Gillis was indicted

on the charge of capital murder. No bond was set.

Johnny Odon Whitfield was indicted on two separate charges of possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and one charge of possession of cocaine. Bond was set at \$10,000 each for the first two charges and \$5,000 for the third charge.

The names of others indicted by the grand jury will be released as they are served.

An indictment is the legal process of bringing charges against a suspect after a jury-in this case the grand jury-finds there is sufficient evidence against them to proceed to trial in circuit

Suspects indicted will be arraigned on Nov. 4 by Court Administrator Mack Miller. At the arraignment, Miller will advise the suspects of their formal charges. They will then have to hire an attorney (or if they cannot afford to hire an attorney, one will be appointed for them). The next session of circuit court will be in January of 2000. The indicted suspects have the option of pleading on the official plea day, Jan. 5, or proceeding to trial.

Voters will have the opportunity to make their final choices for their favorite candidates in this year's general election to be held Tuesday, Nov. 2.

Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk Donna Dill said polls will be open throughout the county from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. for voting on Tuesday.

Listed on the ballot will be state, district and county offices. Voters will have the option to vote for Independent candidates in some races, for the first time. This is because those qualifying as Independents go directly to the general election ballot and do not participate in party primary elections.

While some candidates are unopposed, others will have one or more opponents from different political parties.

Initiative No. 9-Term Limits In addition to voting for candidates, voters will be asked to vote on Initiative Measure No. 9 concerning term limits for legislators

A ruling by U.S. District Judge William Barbour, Jr. brought the term limits initiative to the November ballot.

A vote of "YES" to the initiative means you think that members of the Mississippi Legislature (both Representatives and Senators) should be limited to two (2) consecutive terms in office. A vote of "NO" means you do not wish a limit to be placed on the number of consecutive terms a member of the Mississippi Legislature (both Representatives and Senators) can serve.

Even if this initiative passes, a person could be elected to a third term provided that term is at least four years after the end of the second term they served. In other words, if they skip a term, they



According to Officer Trimm, st often, the Tishomingo cunty unit trains in Alcorn cunty at the Corinth Firing lange with members of the Alcom County Sheriff's Department's and Corinth Police Department's K-9 Units.

Also training there are Alom County's K-9 Officer Dale Mullen and his 21/2-year-old Rotweiler, Jake; and Corinth PD's K-9 officer, Daryl Hopkins and his 2-year-old German Shepherd, Barron, and Booneville's K-9 Officer Rodney Wood and his 4rear-old Czechoslovakian Shepherd, Caesar.

Other counties included in the Mid-South Task Force are Tupelo, Pontotoc County, Lee County, Union County, McNairy County (Tenn.) and Hardin County (Tenn.).

Trimm said that as part of the training exercises, the K-9 Officers take their dogs to search local schools and participate in I-CAP narcotics intervention on area highways. He explained that the K-9s are trained to detect subprotection.

Drug dog Kietchi is relatively new to the Tishomingo County SO, joining the Department only about a year and a half ago. Since that time, he has worked exclusively with Officer Trimm.

The team has been instrumental in numerous narcotics arrests in the county. They often attend community events and visit schools encouraging those present to remain drug-free.

Brought from Frankfort, Germany by his trainer, Russell Gaines of Starkville, Kietchi was initially trained for four weeks using a foreign language, Trimm explained. He stated that this is a common method used for K-9s to ensure that the dog obeys only his handler. Dogs are chosen for the program based on their enthusiasm for learning, according to the officer.

Although most K-9s, including Kietchi, are generally affectionate, non-violent dogs, they will attack if they feel their handler is being threatened. For that reason, do not approach any K-9 without the handler's consent, Officer Trimm warned.



What's That Big Green Box?

Transformers aren't just on poles anymore. The large green boxes you see near buildings and in new housing developments are called pad-mounted transformers. They contain electrical equipment that serves as the distribution point for underground electrical lines.

Double Vision

Double vision can occur from a number of causes and is very disturbing. It can happen when you are overtired, after taking medication, or after too much alcohol. It can even happen without apparent cause when fatigue or over-drinking is not involved. Whatever the cause may be, it indicates that the two eyes are not pointing in the same direction. This occurs when something interferes with the brain's ability to control and coordinate the eye muscles.

A more serious matter is double vision which appears suddenly and continues to be present even after the brain is in complete control. The probable cause could then be a small stroke, hemorrhage, or pressure on the brain from another source. An examination at this time becomes very important because in most instances, proper treatment will restore normal vision. If the process of recovering normal vision is slow, temporary aids such as special glasses will keep the double vision under control.



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

Kill A Bug This Fall -Get Your Flu Shot

Belmont Family Medical Clinic wants area residents to take their best shot against the flu by getting an \$8 flu shot.

"Influenza is a viral infection that can lead to a much more serious illness like pneumonia or bronchitis," said Stephen Senter, M.D., a family practice physician

with Belmont Family Medical Clinic. "Almost everyone 65 and older should get a flu shot. It's also important for those with lung disease or other chronic conditions, and for those who spend a lot of time around sick or elderly people."

The flu vaccine cannot give you the flu - you might get a sore arm from the shot or a mild reaction, but not the flu. "While the flu shot cannot totally prevent you from getting the flu, it will keep you from getting as sick as you would have without the shot," Dr. Senter said. "By protecting yourself, you avoid catching the flu and spreading it to family and friends."

Flu immunizations are one of the most cost-effective preventive steps you can take to improve your "Annual shots are health. recommended because the influenza viruses change," he said. "Your body takes about two weeks after the vaccination to develop antibodies, and the antibodies last about six months. One shot will take you through one flu season."

The flu shot will not be given to pregnant women or to anyone allergic to eggs



After the first year of the War the Confederate government of Tishomingo County was in shambles. It was the first county in MS in which the Confederacy had to suspend the collection of taxes. Barnes narrated Mrs. numerous family histories and their plight during the War. One example was the fascinating accounts of the Jesse Biggs and Daniel Dexter families since many of our chapter are descendants including Mrs. Barnes.

Jesse Biggs and Daniel Dexter owned large grist mills and gins on Indian Creek. Every few days the Union soldiers would come and take charge of the mills for two or three weeks. Often when customers came to the mills, not knowing the Union soldiers had control, the soldiers would take the people's corn for

themselves. Many times Mrs. Biggs and Mrs. Dexter begged the soldiers for bran to make a course bread for their children. Soldiers would shoot their fat hogs; just cut out the hams and leave the rest. Once just as Mrs. Dexter got

dinner cooked soldiers came and took every bite from the table. Mr. Dexter put his money in a large iron pot and sank it in the creek so the soldiers couldn't find it. The army thought Dexter was aiding the Confederacy and threatened to hang him too.

The soldiers came to the Biggs place; stole the sweet potatoes and caught all the ducks. One man sitting on the back of their wagon laughed at Mrs. Biggs trying to save the last duck and said, "You're having a hard time trying to save that duck." She picked up a hand full of sand and threw it in his eyes. Mrs. Biggs said, "You'll have a hard time getting out of your eyes too."

Anthony T. Scruggs, the last Confederate veteran in Iuka, died November 18, 1933. He was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery. Mr. Scruggs was a private with the 17th MS Infantry. The last Confederate veteran

of Tishomingo County, John Fuson Grimes, died near Holcut in February 1940, at age 93. He was too young to enlist at the beginning of the war but served the last two years with Roddy under Forrest.

Many Confederate prisoners of war died in Federal prisons and are buried there. Mrs. Barnes counted 1,665 from MS regiments and there were many more who joined other regiments from AL, TN and other places. There were 50 who were buried in Federal prisons from the 2nd MS alone. Records show hundreds listed as unknown.

The Northern 8th Wisconsin Eagles purchased a giant bald eagle for \$2.50 for their mascot and named it Old Abe in honor of President Lincoln. He seemed to enjoy being in battles. The eagle put on quite a show during the

Battle of Corinth. Confederate generals ordered their soldiers to capture or shoot Old Abe. Once or twice he lost some feathers but Old Abe always managed to escape. He seemed upset at the sight of a Confederate uniform. If there was a Johnny Reb working his way through the Union lines, he would begin to scream. James McGinnis, a 19 year old boy from Wisconsin, carried Old Abe until May 1862 when he died at Iuka.

After the war was over, the weary and half starved soldiers

found some military orders very irritating. For example, the "Button Order" prevailed the entire South. It prohibited a person Confederate wearing from buttons. If they didn't have plain buttons, the olds ones could be covered with cloth. Many soldiers, ignorant that such an order existed, were detained; had their buttons sheared off with a saber or were marched to the Provost's office to answer for their crime.

There are probably many letters still in trunks and attics that need to be documented to preserve our history. Originals or photocopies should be submitted to the MS State Dept. of Archives. This is a wonderful way to help preserve our history and confirm other facts about the War Between the States.



Waste Pesticide Program **Scheduled For November 4**

Farmers and others in Tishomingo County who have waste pesticides on hand are urged to take part in a waste pesticide disposal program November 4 at the North Mississippi Research and Extension Center in Verona.

The one-time program offers farmers, chemical dealers, and others a no-cost, environmentally safe way to dispose of these products through a licensed contractor, according to Danny Owen County Agent Tishomingo who is coordinating the program locally.

To take part, anyone with waste pesticides must bring them directly to the collection site from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The program will be held on November 4 only and will not be repeated, Owen said.

Owen said there is no charge to take part in the program, but participants are responsible for safely transporting waste pesticides to the collection site. Empty, rinsed plastic pesticide containers also will be accepted, but no other waste products are eligible for the program.

A licensed hazardous waste contractor at the collection site will collect, analyze, and dispose of the products out of state according to environmental laws.

Waste pesticides include leftover, cancelled, suspended, or otherwise unusable pesticide include products. Pesticides insecticides, herbicides, fungicides, and plant growth regulators.

FSA Farm News

20th Sign-Up Period

January 18 - February 11, 2000 The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is a voluntary program that offers annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term resource-conserving covers on eligible land.

Annual rental payments are made based on the agriculture rental value of the land and costshare assistance is provided in an amount equal to not more than 50 percent of the participant's cost in establishing approved practices.

The duration of contracts is from 10 to 15 years.

Sign-up 20 of the CRP will be held for a 4-week period beginning January 18 and ending February 11, 2000. This is the fourth general CRP sign-up since enactment of the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996.

To be eligible to be placed in CRP, land must be:

1. Cropland that has been planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity 2 of the 5 crop years from 1995 to 1999 that is also physically and legally capable of being planted in a normal manner to an agricultural commodity; or

2. Certain marginal pastureland enrolled in the Water Bank Program.

In addition to basic cropland

1. Be considered highly erodible land according to the conservation compliance provision or, if a portion of a field, have weighted average Erosion Index of 8 or higher.

2. Be considered a cropped wetland;

3. Be subject to scour erosion; 4. Be located in a national or State CRP conservation priority area; or,

5. Be cropland associated with non-cropped wetlands.

Under Sign-up 20, all eligible offers will continue to be evaluated and ranked using Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) based on the environmental benefits expected to accrue if the land is enrolled in the CRP.

The Sign-up 20 EBI is very similar to the EBI for Sign-up 18, except that the Federal or statelisted threatened and endangered species subfactor of the wildlife

habitat component has been strengthened and clarified. the tpoint category was eliminated. In some states water quality area designations have been modified, and a few additional state conservation priority areas may have been approved.

Use of the EBI ensures that only the most environmentally sensitive lands are selected and that all offers are considered fairly and equitably.

Data are collected for each of

leaching;

• On-farm benefits of reduced erosion;

• Enduring benefits;

• Air quality benefits from reduced wind erosion;

• Benefits of enrollment in conservation priority areas where enrollment would contribute to the improvement of identified adverse water quality, wildlife habitat, or air quality; and • Cost.

Maximum CRP payments will be determined based on the average of the past 3 years of local dryland cash or cash-rent equivalent rental rates adjusted for site-specific, soil-based productivity factors. CRP payments can include an additional amount, not to exceed \$5 an acre a year, as an incentive to perform certain maintenance obligations.

The maximum CRP payment rate for each offer is calculated in advance of enrollment. Producers may offer land at that rate to increase the likelihood that their offer will be acceptable.

A producer must have owned or operated the land for at least 12 months prior to close of the signup period, unless:

• The new owner acquired the land as a result of death of the previous owner;

• The only ownership change occurred due to foreclosure where the owner exercised a timely right or redemption in accordance with State law; or

• The circumstances of the acquisition provide adequate

assurance the Farm Service Agency that the new owner did not acquire the land for the purpose of placing it in the CRP. Producers should contact their local USDA Service Center for more information.

during that period at the local offices of the USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA). These are usually listed in local telephone directories under "United States Government, U.S. Department of Agriculture."

Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made after Sign-up 20 is concluded. The CRP is a highly competitive program. Landowners who have met previous EBI thresholds are not guaranteed a contract under this sign-up.

NOTE: The sign-up period does not apply to participation in certain high-priority environmental practices such as filter strips, riparian buffers, etc.

The demand to enroll land in the CRP is much greater than the amount that can be accepted (CRP enrollment authority is 36.4 million acres and there are over 350 million acres of U.S. cropland).

To be more competitive, consider only offering the most environmentally sensitive land, enhancing covers for the benefit of wildlife, and accepting a lower payment rate than the maximum amount FSA is willing to offer.

The Other Side Of The Coin Continued....

In writing most of this article in honor of our children and in memory of our deceased one (Anna Jean), we were at this point in time still living south of Iuka, which is now known as Woodall Mountain Road. We had many friends, many good times & bad times. We had pulled our 3 ones through a difficult time of whooping cough, although I doubt there is a case that isn't difficult. The two older kids were recovering pretty good, but little Jean's legs looked like spindles. She had to learn to walk again. By now it was accepted by all family and friends as well, that she was a delicate sickly child although we never openly discussed or limited her capabilities to whatever she set her mind to do. We had them a big white sand pile fixed where she spent many happy hours recooperating. At that time we didn't have TV's, so we found other means of entertainment for our children. She like to go with her dad every day or so to pick up our milk & butter from a neighbor. This particular day her dad was running late to go to Reynolds to work so he would get in the car to hurry with the chore but she (Jean) left her sand pile to rush to get in the car. Since he couldn't see her on the side she decided to go around to driver's side so her dad would see her, but as luck would have it, the car hit her from behind, knocked her down and we heard her screaming. We hurriedly carried her up to Dr. Bostick's & Mollie South. They assured us she was okay, but knowing her condition we decided we had better carry her on to Booneville to her beloved Dr. Anderson. He took the best of care for her this time and many more to come. We carried her on a pillow and help from a neighbor (also cousin) Vita Rae Parsons. We nursed her back to health again. At that time, Aunt Ethel & Sis were on their way to get Sis married, but she and all the family now had a bond that would last to her last day on earth The other two kids were nearing (4) and (6) and the older one Barbara Sue would begin her first year at Pleasant Ridge School. A wonderful lovable teacher Mrs. Amill (Moore) Walker taught her. She learned real fast continuing to sing. She and her sister now could sing good duets with little sister joining in. People were amazed at their talent God had given them. A lay-off came at Reynolds as defense was beginning to slow down. That was okay. Wilson was a good mechanic, so he would go to work for Mr. P.L. Sweeney whom he liked & idolized and we O-7-14-21-28-pd became life long friends with the Sweeney's.

After about a year, our kids were now 3 1/2, 5 1/2, & 7 1/2. We would be expecting our 4th and

only son in April 1945. World War II was now winding down. My one and only brother would be returning home from 4 years of war. There was a wonderful time of rejoicing among friends and relatives. I had one visit with him when my third child was 6 weeks old and now I would have new welcome his baby to homecoming. I had been very close to my only brother and older sister. It would be a big load lifted from me.

Jean was now growing and thriving even though her illness was ever present to keep us concerned. My brother would be a big help to me. Wilson now was recalled to Reynolds, but it wouldn't last. The war was now over and as he was on defense work program. He was layed off for good. In the mean time, we had found us a house up on Hwy. 25 which we like so much and only a short distance from where I lived when I first moved to Iuka. We soon gained new and old friends and adjusted quite well. We found a new church (New Prospect) and our children would now attend Midway School. We were also a short distance from the bus line. We could now visit North Crossroads for extra transportation.

Sis had now returned home

musical & singing families. We had a real good group from Iuka area who were making personal appearances & they asked if we would consider our two older ones joining the group. Mr. M.H. Castleberry, his son, Troy, who played the mandolin, Ms. Peggy Bullard, and we said why not since Troy and Omega were close friends. So by (7) and (9), our children were making personal appearances. They were now on

their way to a singing career. Jean was now doing real well with her singing and won the community with her special loving way. People liked to give her money and she had her own collection jar. By the time she was (5), her illness had progressed, and she was having to stay in Booneville quite a bit.

As my mother was and had been working out of town quite a while, my precious sister would take on the job of keeping both her children & mine when I had to stay away a lot, but she had wonderful in-laws and my kids dearly loved staying in their home. My brother & wife, Clarene, had settled in Booneville which would be their home. Clarene was a teacher while my brother was gone to war, so they would have a future in Booneville. After trying out on big farm, my brother decided it best to open his own business doing what he had gone to school many years to do, McCoy Garage, a big white block building on Hwy. 45 North. He would eventually go into dealership & Clarene would stop teaching to help him for quite some time but my brother would work all day & when need be, he could carry me home to Iuka at night with my child. Wilson had so many buddies to work with to name a few, Sid & V.C. Ramsey, Gene Foote, Jimmy Ramsey, Didler & Jack Thorne, who he idolized as he was also kin to them. He boarded with Mr. Smokey Underwood for quite a while. Many others I'm sure. He would have great tales to tell when he got home.

great in school and in spite of her illness, Jean had started & keeping her work up. She was also climbing in her singing and made her debut when she was 5 1/2 years old. The doctors now thought she would not live past 9 years of age. They knew she had a new kidney disease but didn't know for sure what. My brother & my family wanted us to change doctors because they thought this doctor might know more. I was leary but went along only to almost lose our child. He unknowingly gave her the wrong medicine and she was having convulsions. We flew (in the car) with her to Booneville. We called everyone possible for prayer. God and our wonderful Dr. Anderson together saved her life. She came home after quite a while & studied her school work & music right on.

Wilson drove his truck & began to slowly go big time. He was now also driving with Carlton Tucker on big trips & driving for Jack Thorne, Pinkie Pruitt & gaining a name for himself. His first trucking & good friend, Mr. Sid Ramsey, asked him if he would like to try out for 18wheeler & a big company. He agreed & got the job for Hayes Freight Line which would take him many miles, many years & many states. He won many certificates for his excellent record which called for many qualifications. He was now big time and doing good. For lack of transportation, we missed a lot of church which made me very unhappy as I've said before, I was raised by a very strict mother, sister & brother, who I still thank God for and I missed that part of my life. I had been listening to a preacher on the radio and I was much impressed by hearing him. I remarked if I ever had the chance, I would love to go hear him. To my surprise and probably an answer to prayer, he announced he would be in Iuka at a certain church at a certain time, so I wanted to go. I was in Iuka on Saturday and I asked my cousin Ruth Gortney Pannell if she knew the place. She did and they were attending. She said they

would come for me and I would go. I did and I loved it. I found many wonderful people I learned to love including the Pannells, Marie (Pannell) Yarbrough who 1 had grown up with, the Hubbards (John & Montez) who were some of our first neighbors when Mama and I first moved to luka, the wonderful Helton family who were so good to me and at a time in my life when I needed help. When Wilson was on the road with his truck, I went on to go many years and met many wonderful people. Mrs. Mabel Cummings, who told me she was related to me, still being young and not taking it too serious. I found our many years later she was indeed very much so. She told me many wonderful things about my dad, who was a devout United Methodist. I made a remark to Mattie years later, I wish Ms. Mable had lived long enough for me to tell her I had found out my own grandpa (Jim Lobb) McCoy's brother Lewis had married Amanda Robinson & my dad had been a frequent visitor with the Robinson's as he was family (small world isn't it?) I had attended school with many Robinson kids, not knowing they were my own kin. Mattie remarked I didn't have to tell her she already knew.

My mom was now coming home more often and I was glad. She would soon be retiring but when she was home, she suggested I get out & work some for a change of pace which I was glad to do. I worked up town some at Elmore's five & Dime, also for Olen Beard & Gene Reynolds. I enjoyed it very much and made many new friends including Francene Whitworth & Betty Jean Hardwick who I worked with. I'll always remember Mama Beard's cobbler pies.

employees will be putting on the roof and that additional help would make the job go faster; however, he said he had been reluctant to ask the Board about hiring additional people because he "didn't want to stir up a controversy." Mullins said that there had been "some controversy over this [hiring of maintenance] in the past." Board member Gary White of Burnsville suggested hiring contract labor as needed to help with projects. The Board decided to look at both options before the next meeting.

*Mullins explained that the backflow preventors, which he had wrongly believed had to be installed by the end of September, actually do not have to be installed until the end of October. He said his request to the Board in September to suspend the purchasing laws was not necessary so he had gone ahead and gotten two quotes for the systems. Two Memphis, Tenn. companies were called, according to Mullins, with GNC Supply being chosen with a price of \$4,286 for the preventor and enclosure. These backflow preventors will have to be placed at each school. Board member White asked how much the installation, to be done by Charles Bonds, would be. Kirkpatrick said he could not give him an exact figure. Mullins explained that the school had been pleased with Bond's work in the past and while there may have been someone who would have installed the units for a lesser amount, his work was high quality. He said Bonds was also a certified inspector for these backflow preventors. White reminded the Board that he knew of a person who was also certified in inspecting the units who he believed would do the inspections for about half the amount.

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





Wicker Votes To Give Local Schools More Authority

This week the U.S. House of Representatives will consider legislation to remove restrictions on the use of federal education dollars and give local school officials more authority over how those funds are spent. I support the bill which allows schools greater flexibility in exchange for student meeting higher performance goals.

The Academic Achievement for All Act, also called the Straight A's Act, continues our education reform efforts focused on shifting power out of Washington and into the hands of parents, teachers, and local leaders.

The bill would give states and local school officials the chance to redirect federal education funds from ineffective programs into initiatives which work in their school districts. Instead of the usual limitations on the use of funds and burdensome paperwork requirements, the Straight A's Act frees teachers and administrators to develop their own programs to


meet the needs of their students.

In return for this new flexibility, school districts would be required to set academic

performance goals and to meet those objectives over a five-year period. Under current law, states receive federal dollars each year regardless of whether their students' academic performance improves. Under the Straight A's Act, states must produce higher academic standards or lose the freedom this program offers.

The achievement gaps in our schools are closing today because of the innovation by teachers and administrators at the state and local levels, not from federal programs coming out of Washington.

I believe education policy would be more effective if more of the decision-making authority is taken from the faceless bureaucracy in Washington and given to the school administrators and teachers who know their students' names and their educational needs. Passage of the Straight A's Act is another positive step in that process.
