Home Economics Tips

Are You Ready For That Thanksgiving Turkey?

There are many points to consider when purchasing your Thanksgiving turkey. If choosing a whole turkey, allow about one pound per person. This will still allow for a moderate amount of leftovers. However, if you want to have a lot of leftover turkey, allow up to 1-1/2 pounds per person. Before purchasing your turkey, be sure your roasting pan, oven and refrigerator can accommodate its size. Some cooks have found it easier to purchase two smaller turkeys rather than one larger turkey. The smaller turkeys take less time to roast and they tend to stay moister.

After purchasing your perfect turkey, you need to take the proper steps for storage. Turkeys need to be kept at a temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below. A whole, frozen turkey, kept at zero degrees Fahrenheit in its original packaging, may be kept for up to one year. A properly thawed turkey may be refrigerated in its original packaging, may be kept for up to one year. A properly thawed turkey may be refrigerated from 1 to 5 days if kept in its original packing. Fresh turkeys may only last one to two days in a refrigerator at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below.

Several days may be required for proper thawing of your turkeys, depending on its size. Never thaw your turkey at room temperature! Thawing in the refrigerator is the most recommended method. Microwave ovens do not heat evenly and tend to heat quicker along the bone. When using the refrigerator method, allow five your recipe. The turkey may cool to room temperature, but do not let it sit out for longer than one hour.

If you choose to stuff your turkey, do not insert the stuffing until you are ready to roast it. If you pre-stuff your turkey, you run the risk of food poisoning. Stuffing is easily contaminated, especially if it is left inside the turkey. Allow a half-cup of stuffing per pound of turkey. Do not pack the stuffing inside the turkey because it will expand as it cooks. If you want extra stuffing, cook it separately. Stuffing cooks unevenly, so a stuffed turkey needs to cook longer than an unstuffed turkey.

Always check the temperature of the turkey before deciding that it is done. The turkey must reach a minimum of 180 degrees Fahrenheit in the thigh, the stuffing should reach 165 degrees Fahrenheit and the breast should reach 170 degrees Fahrenheit. If pricked, the juices from the turkey should be slightly pink or clear. The following table shows the approximate roasting times for a turkey in a 325 degree Fahrenheit

Once your roasting is complete, do not let the turkey sit on the kitchen counter or dining room table all afternoon! Uneaten turkey needs to be refrigerated within two hours after cooking. Debone the turkey and refrigerate in shallow containers. Another point to remember is that the turkey and leftover dressing should not be stored together. Any refrigerated turkey and/or dressing should be used within three days after cooking or frozen for later use. Leftovers should be reheated thoroughly to a temperature of 165 degrees Fahrenheit or until hot and steaming.


According to director Bill Stone of Booneville, "Our Town" is an exciting theatrical experience - it stands in the distinguished company of the great plays of all time.

Once your turkey has been properly thawed, you may begin to prepare it for roasting. Preheat your oven to the temperature specified by your recipe making sure that the temperature is no lower than 325 degrees Fahrenheit. Be sure to remove the giblets from the inside of your turkey. After removing the giblets, rinse the whole turkey under cool running water. Rub your hands over the turkey to help remove any bacteria or lumps of fat. Pat the turkey dry and season according to

Make-Up And Contacts

When a woman switches from glasses to contacts it's natural for her to begin using more eye make-up. That's perfectly all right if its done carefully and properly.

Put the lenses on before applying make-up. Use water soluble products, and avoid getting any on the contacts. Be careful with mascara which contains tiny hair-like fibers. Soft lenses can actually be pierced by these particles and are generally vulnerable to any make-up. Any make-up, however, has the potential for irritating the eye and contaminating the lens.

Aerosol sprays of any type are a disaster for soft lenses and also bad with hard ones. If you do use a spray, close your eyes during use and move to another area or room when done. Make sure there is not make-up on your fingers when you handle the lenses. This also applies to soaps which contain lotions, creams, or perfumes. Use a mild soap and some common sense to eliminate problems.

Understanding Your Vet

When you're in your veterinarian's office, do you ever get the feeling he or she is speaking a foreign language? Your vet is probably trying very hard to make himself understood, but technical words for diseases and body parts still creep in. This column will explain terms that you're likely to hear from your veterinarian and help you better understand the health of your pets.

Anemia: A loss of red cells in the blood. This can be caused by injury, poor diet or severe parasite infestations, among other things.

Ascites: Excess fluid that has collected outside the blood circulatory system. If occurs in the abdominal cavity and is often seen with heart disease. Compare Edema.

Edema: Excess fluid that has collected outside the blood circulatory system and causes swelling, especially in the legs and lower abdomen. It is often seen with heart failure or anemia. Pulmonary edema (excess fluid in the lungs) occurs with forms of heart failure.

Kidneys: A pair of organs in the abdominal cavity that filter the blood, excrete byproducts from the body and conserve water.

Urolithiasis: A condition in which substances in the urine build up to form a stone or stones in the urinary tract, usually in the bladder or a kidney.

What's That Big Green Box?

Transformers aren't just on poles anymore. The large green boxes you see near buildings and in new housing developments are called pad-mounted transformers. They contain electrical equipment that serves as the distribution point for underground electrical lines.



This type of transformer poses little danger, but even a slight risk isn't worth taking. Never dig near these transformers and never plant or build anything within 10 feet of them. Also, teach children not to play on or near the transformers. Remember to always think safety around electrical equipment!

Local Physician Receives AAFP Degree Of Fellow At Annual Scientific Assembly

original research and serving as a teacher in family medicine.

Todays family physicians are medical specialists trained to care for patients of all ages and both genders. The AAFP represents more than 88,000 family physicians, family practice residents and medical students. The AAFP was instrumental in establishing the specialty of family practice in 1969. It was also the first medical specialty organization to require its members to earn 150 hours of approved continuing education every three years.


Breast Self-Exam Certification Course To Be Offered At NMMC

Studies in Isaiah 53



Unemployment In County Drops In Sept.

According to Jimmy Rowland, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, unemployment in Tishomingo County dropped to 7.6 percent in mid-September. This compares to 8.4 percent in August and 10.6 percent in September, 1998.

The civilian labor Force for the county numbered 8,570, 50 less than August and 510 less than September of last year. Approximately 7,920 Tishomingo county residents held jobs while 650 were out of work.

Manufacturing jobs in the county numbered 2,600 and nonmanufacturing jobs numbered 3.390.

In addition to never drinking alcoholic beverages before or during the operation of a motor vehicle, I urge all motorists to report suspected impaired driving to the nearest local law enforcement agency or to the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol. For those who have cellular phones, the patrol my be reached at *47. This action could save the life of an impaired driver or others on the roadway."

Ron Sennett, executive director, Mississippi Division of Public Safety Planning, offered the following suggestions for the upcoming holidays:

If a holiday party involves alcoholic beverages, designate one of more persons who will not be

drinking these beverages to drive others home.

Make every possible effort not to permit a relative or friend to drive after drinking an alcoholic beverage.

Never ride with a person who has been or is consuming an alcoholic beverage.

Drive defensively by being prepared for what other drivers might do.

Be sure that all adults in your vehicle are using safety belts and that all children ride in the back seat buckled into age-appropriate protective devices such as child safety seats.

Don't leave holiday presents in your vehicle where they can be seen by those who might be interested in stealing them.

"Driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs is a serious offense," Sennett said. "In addition to causing a crash that could lead to death or serious injuries, those who may consider

driving while impaired should be aware that he or she could face hefty fines, time in jail and possible the cancellation of motor vehicle insurance or a substantial increase in insurance premiums.

"Don't let the holidays be marred by a tragedy that could have been prevented," he said. "Include safety in your holiday plans."






