

The turbines were transported out by Tishomingo Railmad, Inc. to the Norfolk Southern Tracks in Iuka.

This first load consisted of six cars loaded with 2,000 tons of turbines owned and rebuilt by Enron Capital and Trade Resources Inc. of Houston, Texas. The rebuilding of the turbines was actually done by H &

M Industrial Services on behalf of Enron The engineer on the train

was Bruce Crawford, a part-owner of Tishomingo Rail. Bruce said that "it felt good to successfully pull that heavy load over this rail. line for the first time. We hope and expect many more."

Kelly McKenzie, an executive with Enron, said this: "It was a big relief to him to get that expensive cargo to the wye in Iuka, but a bigger relief to see it disappear around the curve on the Norfolk Southern headed for Monroe, Ga.

Dr. Bob Robinson with the Tishomingo County Development Foundation said that he was "proud of Enron, Tishomingo Rail, H&M and Power Systems for successfully completing this first job, and expects many more to originate from the turbine building at Tri-State Commerce Park and more over this same rail line to some location in this great United States of America."

## **County Woman Arrester Multiple Charges Of Arson**

A North Crossroads woman has been arrested in connection with a series of structure fires near her home.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, the suspect, Lillie Joyce Brown Lambert, 58, of 8 County Rd. 352, Iuka, was arrested Saturday, Dec. 11, at her home after a witness apparently saw her coming out of a house near her home which was set fire.

At press time, Lambert is being held at the Tishomingo County Jail after being charged with 16 counts of arson, four counts of breaking and entering and one charge of petty larceny.

The investigation into a series of burnings by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, Tishomingo County Fire Investigators, the State Fire Marshals office and the Mississippi Highway Patrol's Criminal

Investigation Bureau has been going on since early November after the first of the fires.

Since the first structure was burned, the total has risen to 16, counting the last fire on Saturday. Another structure burned on Thursday, according to Smith.

The fires all took place in an area around Lambert's place of residence, just off Hwy. 25, not far from the Mississippi/Tennessee State Line.

According to Smith, the structures burned were cabins and mobile homes which were used mainly by the owners in the summer months. None of the structures burned had someone living in them at the time of the fires, Smith confirmed.

Lambert has been a suspect in the burnings since the beginning of the investigation and had been questioned by members of the Sheriff's Department and other agencies since that time.

The break officials had been waiting for in the investigation came Saturday with the witnesses' report. Sheriff Smith and others went immediately to Lambert's home following the report and was able to gather evidence which will be used in their case against her

Smith said that the fires were started in a variety of ways at the different cabins and other structures. The fire Saturday is believed to have been started with gasoline

Other charges against Lambert are possible upon further investigation, Smith added.

Smith said he would like to let the North Crossroads Volunteer Fire Department and the other fire departments which have responded to the fires know how much they are appreciated for their efforts at the scenes of the fires.

Terri Massey, a certified Iuka family nurse practitioner, has joined the staff of Iuka Hospital's Emergency Department to enhance patient services during weekday hours.

Because she has completed advanced education and clinical training, Massey can perform many responsibilities beyond the scope of a registered nurse. Nurse practitioners in Mississippi can order x-rays and lab tests, refer patients to specialists, discuss treatment plans and prescribe most medications. She will treat patients of all ages according to protocols developed by local physicians Margaret Glynn, M.D., and Douglas Palenschat, M.D., and approved by the State Department of Nursing.

While physicians will still be called in for trauma and true emergencies, Terri will treat minor cases and can refer to physicians Massey, who retired to Iuka two whenever necessary," explained years ago, and a 13-year-old Dan Perryman, administrator of daughter, Katie.

Hospital. "Nurse practitioners have special training in physical assessment, evaluating and diagnosing illness, and recording in-depth patient medical histories." Physicians will continue to staff the emergency department weeknights and weekends.

A Greenville native, Massey earned an associate's degree in nursing from Mississippi Delta Community College and a bachelor's degree from Delta State University. She earned her master's degree in nursing from Mississippi University for Women and became certified as a family nurse practitioner in 1994.

popular foods and ways to make them safe.

To update recipes for homemade mayonnaise, Caesar salad (made with a raw egg dressing), salad dressings and uncooked egg-rich sauces, use pasteurized eggs or egg substitutes.

Due to consumer demand, they are appearing more often in grocery stores now. You can now find refrigerated, frozen and dried pasteurized egg products or egg substitutes. The products are eggs which have been removed from the shells and commercially heated to destroy bacteria but are not cooked. (This process cannot be done at home.)

These products are safe to use in recipes that call for raw or lightly cooked eggs. Try them to see if they work to your satisfaction.

Egg mixtures are safe if they reach 160 degrees F. Recipes, such as eggnog. Can be made safe if the raw eggs are heated with liquid or another ingredient contained in the recipe. Use a thermometer to check the temperature of egg mixtures.

Some egg-rich desserts, such as chiffon pies, are made with raw beaten egg whites. These cannot be guaranteed safe. Either

substitute whipped cream or use pasteurized dried egg whites available in cake decorating departments.

To make lemon icebox pie safely, heat the lemon juice with the raw egg yolks in a pan on the stove, stirring constantly, until the mixture reaches 160 degrees F. Then combine it with the sweetened condensed milk and pour filling into baked (or cookie) pie crust.

All meringue-topped pies should be baked at 350 degrees F for at least 15 minutes.

Dry meringue shells are safe as are divinity candy and 7-minute frosting, made by combining hot sugar syrup with beaten egg whites.


For other recipes, like ice

cream and soft custard, you can use fresh eggs if you start with a cooked base. For ice cream recipes that do not call for cooking the base, use pasteurized egg products.

Finally, the holidays are also a traditional time for many to make cookies with the kids. Remember that raw cookie dough which, contains raw eggs, should not be eaten. If that is a hard tradition to break at your house, let the kids sample the dough before adding the eggs.

Reactions can range from mild to severe. Applying hot pepper sauce to the leaves and stems of plants will deter most animals from nibble an plants. Another alternative is to locate plants out dive

pets reach or territory. Holiday greens are not very toxic to animals, but the volatile oils in saps can can skin irritation (conta Dermatitis), eye inflammati (Conjunctivitis), or Gastr irritation.

Many common decoration such as candles, ornament icicles and Styrofoam and considered nontoxic but cause problems by irritating obstructing the digestive respiatory tracts. Angel has has low toxicity but may cause irritation to eyes, skin, and the digestive tract. You veterinarian can provide medications to soothe these irritations. ## First Ranking For Environmental Quality Incentives Program Draws Near

The deadline for the first ranking period draws near for the USDA Environmental Quality Incentives Program. All 2000 Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) applications received by January 28, 2000 will be evaluated and ranked for funding. Applications are now being accepted at all local USDA Service Center Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) offices.

Obligation of EQIP funding depends on landowners coming into the USDA offices to sign up, which begins the evaluation and ranking process.

The continuous sign-up period for applications began October 1, 1999. All applications received through January 28 will be evaluated and ranked to determine which applications will be funded.

Landowners filing applications after January 28 will be ranked at a later date if funding is available. As in the past it is likely this first ranking will obligate all the funds. Landowners are encouraged to apply by January 28 to increase their chances of receiving funding in 2000.



## What To Do!

During power outages, here are some suggestions to assist TCEPA employees in restoring your service:

1) Before calling TCEPA, check your fuse or breaker box for blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers. If you don't see any, ask your neighbors if they have lost their power, too.

2) When you call to report an outage, be prepared to provide the name on your account, your 911 address (house and road number), and your telephone number.

3) In an outage during extreme cold or hot weather, turn off all major electric appliances, and heat or air conditioning. Leave a single light switch turned on so you will know when the problem is solved. Five to ten minutes after power has been restored, you may begin turning on electrical appliances and heating or calling as necessary.

4) Turn on an outside light after power has been restored so that repair crews will know that their work has been successful.

## Why Two Eyes?

Because the eyes are about two and one-half inches apart, each retina receives a slightly different image. Deep within the brain there are special cells which match the offset images from the two eyes to give us the sense of depth. The nearer an object is, the more the eyes have to turn inward to keep it centered. The amount of turning is signaled to the brain for evaluation. If the six muscles controlling each eye cannot point the two eyes at the same spot within a very narrow range, the stereoscopic vision will be lost or diminished. With only one eye, true depth perception is impossible.

Two eyes also give us a wider field of vision. In some lower animals, the vision area is even wider so the animal can protect himself more easily. But in these situations, the focus is nonspecific, like trying to thread a needle with your peripheral Your eyes are vision. marvelous instruments, designed with an intricacy that is astounding. Protect them with caution, care, and examinations.



have received a \$200,000 grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation to implement this program in Mississippi schools. They will fund a four-year program to train 1,225 Mississippi teachers and allow at least 70,000 students to participate in this program.

The Lions Quest program is designed to teach students, K-12, peaceful conflict resolution skills, avoidance of drug and alcohol

abuse, character building, positive coping with peer pressure, life skills, making positive decisions, setting and achieving personal goals, personal responsibility, and many other skills to help students face the myriad of problems they encounter in today's society.

We are all aware of the negative actions of many students in schools across our nation. The days of a "simple fist fight" have been replaced with shootings. We must all join together to help our youth deal with problems in a positive manner.

In order to learn more about this program, Superintendent of Education, John Mullins, will be in attendance at this meeting. The Tishomingo County School District has not yet endorsed this program. After further review, the superintendent and school board will decide to include or exclude this program in our schools. Everyone with interest in the young people of our area is urged to attend the upcoming meeting December 21. We hope to see many concerned parents at this meeting.



Glickman Announces Sign-Up For \$1.2 Billion Crop Disaster Program

Agricultural Secretart Dan Glickman announced that farmers who have suffered severe crop losses due to national disasters can begin to sign-up for cash grants starting December 13. To be eligible, farmers must have lost at least 35 percent of their 1999 crops because of natural disasters. The deadline to file applications is February 25, 2000.

"While the economy is general is doing very well, American farmers are still feeling the pressure of low prices, and, in many cases, the effects of natural disasters," said Glickman. "This assistance will help farmers hit by disaster survive until conditions improve."

The fiscal year 2000 agriculture appropriations act provided \$1.2 billion for the Crop Disaster Program. Eligible farmers will receive an advance payment equal to 35 percent of their projected total payment as soon as their application is approved. Participants will receive their

## Mississippi Duck Season Reopens

Mississippi's second duck season will open Dec. 11th and extend through Dec. 22, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

The final waterfowl hunting period for ducks opens Dec. 26 and continues through Jan. 30.

The daily limit of ducks is six with no more than four mallards (no more than two females), one

black duck, two wood ducks, one pintail, one 'canvasback, two redheads, three scaup, and three mottled ducks.

The possession limit is twice the daily limit.

The daily limit of mergansers is five, only one of which may be a hooded mergaser. the possession limit is twice the daily limit.

Waterfowl shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Some public hunting areas may have more restrictive hours. Check the regulations of the area you plan to hunt before going afield.

Officials remind hunters that non-toxic shot is required for hunting waterfowl in all areas of Mississippi. Shooters may not have lead shot in possession while hunting.

In addition to a valid state hunting license, all waterfowl hunters 16 years of age and older are required to purchase state and federal duck stamps. Both must be signed in ink across the face before going hunting.

Also, waterfowl hunters must have their shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells.







An individual in the community became aware of the situation and asked that a notice be placed in the newspaper.


A spokesperson for the DHS said they only take the applications each year and pass them on to those willing to help. In past years, churches and other





Christ was a Man of sorrows. Grief and sorrow have always been with us. One sorrow does not make a man or woman a person of sorrows. One experience of grief does not make an individual acquainted with grief. Christ's life was one of constant, painful endurance. He was not a weakling. 



## Local Pediatrician **Offers Holiday Safety Tips For Children**

To keep your family safe and well this holiday season, Margaret Glynn, M.D., a pediatrician with Iuka Hospital, offers these tips based on American Academy of Pediatrics' recommendations.

#### Winter Wonderland

"Make sure your child's gloves and shoes stay dry," Dr. Glynn said. "If either becomes wet, change your child into a dry pair." While this area doesn't often have a "White Christmas," some years the holiday is accompanied by ice. "If the weather does permit sledding or playing in the ice, look for shallow slopes that are free of obstacles, such as trees and fences. A crowded slope spells trouble," she said. "Most ice-related injuries involve twist, sprains, and strains. Prevent injuries by providing your child with competent instruction, proper equipment and appropriate supervision.'

Install smoke detectors on each level of your home, especially outside each bedroom. Dr. Glynn recommends using a sturdy fireplace screen to prevent sparks from igniting newspapers, carpet, curtains and upholstery. Only use the fireplace when

you're home and awake, and extinguish it when you go out or at bedtime. make sure all electrical cords are in good condition and replace any that are frayed. Never run cords under carpet. **Party Properly** 

Remember to clean up after a holiday party to keep a small child from finding and choking on leftover food or ingesting alcohol or tobacco. Remember that the homes your family visits may not be childproofed, and check it out carefully for any child safety hazards. "When you attend parties without your children, be sure the baby-sitter knows where you can be reached, as well as emergency phone numbers and how to contact the poison control center," she said.

**Food Safety** 

Fully cook meats and poultry, and thoroughly wash raw vegetables and fruits to avoid harmful bacteria that are often present in raw foods. "Wash your hands frequently, and make sure your children do the same. Never put a spoon used to taste food back into food without washing it," Dr.

#### **Toy Safety**

Follow recommended age ranges on toy packages. "Toys that are too advanced could be a safety hazard for your younger children. Check the size of the toy and make sure that there are no parts that could be swallowed," Dr. Glynn said. "Inspect the toy for sharp edges, loose strings, and any parts that could pinch or get caught on the child. It's a good idea to remove drawstrings from all hooded clothing because strings can get caught on objects and choke a child." Make sure stuffed animals and cloth dolls have sturdy seams and securely attached eyes and noses.
