Iuka Man Killed In Christmas Eve Hunting Accident

The Christmas holidays were saddened for the friends and family of an Iuka man who was killed Christmas Eve, Friday, Dec. 24, from a single gunshot wound while deer hunting in Tennessee.

Mark Biggs, 40, was accidentally shot by his 19-year-old stepson, Bradley Guthrie, who mistakenly thought Biggs was a deer.

According to Hardin County Tennessee Sheriff's Dept. Detective Wayne Coots, the shooting occurred at approximately 9 a.m. deep in a wooded and heavily brush-covered section of PCA (Packaging Corp. of America) lands near the paper mill in Hardin County.

The detective explained that Guthrie and a friend, 19-year-old Brian Robinson of Iuka, said they had let Biggs out of their vehicle in one section of the woods and then they traveled to a different area to hunt. Apparently, one of the young men, Robinson, had gone ahead—up a trail—and was making sounds with antlers, trying to attract deer.

"Biggs had made his way to the section of woods where the two boys were hunting—maybe he had heard the sound of the antlers," Coots said. "Guthrie apparently saw something moving in the heavy brush, some 35 yards away, thought he had seen a deer and shot."

The bullet from a German-made 7mm Mauser entered the victim's left shoulder at an angle and penetrated the chest cavity, Coots explained. "No exit wound was found upon initial examination, indicating that the projectile probably remained in his body."

Following an investigation at the scene, Biggs' body was sent to Memphis to undergo an autopsy. The results were not available at press time.

The 19-year-olds, Guthrie and Robinson, were both wearing the regulation florescent orange on their clothing, as required by law, even though the victim was not, the officer said.

The detective said that the investigation into the incident is ongoing at the present time.

Mark Edward Biggs, born Dec. 27, 1958, was 40 when he died in Hardin County, Tenn. as a result of a gunshot wound. He was a graduate of Iuka High School and Northeast Mississippi Community College. He was an employee of the Baldwin Power House in Baldwin, Ill., and a former electrician for the Tennessee Valley Authority. He was a member of the IBEW Local Union.

Mark was an avid deer hunter, a devoted family man and a hard worker. He had many friends and will be greatly missed by those who loved him.

Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 29, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Bro. Clayton Littlejohn, Bro. Ed Kennedy and Bro. Phil Dawson officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Angie Biggs of Iuka; his parents, Charles and Ruth Biggs of Iuka; two step-sons, Bradley Joseph Guthrie and Barron Allen Guthrie, both of Iuka; one niece, Brooke Gentsch of Iuka; one nephew, Thomas A. (Tag) Gentsch of Iuka.

He was preceded in death by a sister, Jan Biggs Gentsch.

Two Suspects Arrested For Recent Iuka Convenience Store Robbery And House Fire

Two Iuka men have been arrested and charged and more arrests are expected in connection with the Dec. 18 robbery of Uncle Joe's Shell Station in Iuka and the burning of a house just off Hwy. 25, across from Iuka Hospital.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Investigator Bobby Flynt, an anonymous phone call to him Wednesday morning, Dec. 22, led to the arrest of Preston E. Nunley, 25, of 17-C, Riverside Apts., Iuka, on charges of armed robbery, arson and burglary.

Also arrested was David Peek Jr., 19, of 411 Fifth St., Iuka, on charges of accessory after the fact of armed robbery and arson. The arrests took place at approximately 11:30 a.m. Wednesday, Flynt confirmed.

Flynt said Nunley admitted committing the crimes and stated that he had planned to commit more the following night had it not been for being stopped for questioning by Iuka Police Department Officers Jimmy McVay and Bob McCarley.

The suspect apparently admitted committing the robbery

using a 7.65 French Pistolette, an antique gun he said he had purchased from someone for approximately \$100. The gun had an estimated value of \$4,000. The amount of money taken in the robbery was \$118.

At press time, both suspects remained in jail. Bond for Nunley was set at \$100,000. Bond for Peek, who was on probation for an earlier felony conviction, was set at \$200,000.

Flynt said two more suspects are expected to be arrested on accessory after the fact charges.

Assisting in the arrests of the suspects, in addition to Flynt and Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, were Iuka Assist. Police Chief Randy Stringer and State Fire Arson Investigator Ralph Montgomery.

About 35 years ago, the "house on the hill" right behind Sardis Church off Highway 72 was indeed a very special place. All the time spent there was special for me. But, as a child, Christmas was especially wonderful. It was wonderful because my dad, Charles Delbert Norris, and my mom, Betty Cummings Norris, made it that way and wanted it to be that way. And...they did it in so many ways in that lovely old house.

When you first walked through the old screen door on the front porch you were greeted with a wonderful country setting! In the middle of the room was the main source of heat for the family, a pot-belly stove. You could burn wood or coal, but whatever you burned, I remember it would get so hot. The whole family would gather around it on cold winter nights. We would talk and sing and have the best time ever. You could hold your bed linens up to the heat, wrap up in it and go to bed. It had the makings of such a restful night's sleep in one of several feather beds in the house. And when you hit one of those feather beds, you literally sank into it as it folded around you. It seemed you could sleep forever.

But it was hard for me to sleep at Christmastime no matter how

snug and cozy the bed! Mom and dad made Christmas so exciting. To begin with, we would have a real Christmas tree. I suppose artificial trees were not as common back then. Real trees were all we ever had in our living room - right in front of the main window not far from the pot-belly stove. We would decorate and then decorate some more. We loved those old-fashioned silver ice sickles that you could buy in the box at the five and dime. I remember spreading the strands ever so generously around the tree and then adding the multi-colored shiny balls. As I haven't seen the ice sickles in years, I don't guess

they sell them much anymore. Our Christmas tree was truly old fashioned, but totally decorated to the hilt with love.

Mom and dad always told us about Santa Claus and that if we would go to bed early enough, he would have more time to bring his goodies. I remember one Christmas Eve night, Steve and Wayne, my brothers, and I all trotted off to bed to the bedroom just adjacent to the living room. But, what mom and dad must have forgotten was that there were tiny cracks between the boards in the door. What a sight it must have been to see all three of us lined up against that door and watching as

mom and dad played Santa themselves! They pulled out two "sting-ray" bikes for Steve and Wayne! I remember seeing them fill our stockings with candy and oranges. I was a bit confused because I never did actually see Santa come through the door! But by the next morning - none of that seemed to matter.

With all the excitement of Christmas with the presents, candy and food, we were taught to never ever lose sight of the real meaning of the season - the birth of Jesus Christ. I always knew that was what it was all about - mom and dad made sure of that. This time of year brought excitement because the Savior had come! It was a time of celebration. At Sardis Baptist Church, we even played out the Christmas story from Luke 2 when the baby Jesus was born. There weren't any fancy props or costumes, just us as children acting out what we knew Christmas was all about. I am so thankful, so very thankful, because Christmas time is really my best memory from the "house on the hill." It's the memory that has changed my life the most - that of being taught the real meaning of Christmas - that of knowing that a Savior had come.

There were many Christmases to remember just as there are many more memories to recall!

What Causes Bad Breath?

There's no single answer, but gum disease - preventable by brushing, flossing and regular dental visits - is a primary culprit because bacteria can gather in pockets that form around teeth, releasing unpleasant odors. Even before serious gum disease sets in, poor oral hygiene can contribute to this social embarrassment.

Onions, garlic and similar foods can also cause bad breath by releasing oils into the bloodstream, which travel to the lungs and are exhaled. Also, a kind of denture can trap food and plaque, leading to odors. Brushing your dentures daily and soaking them every night in a cleaning solution helps to avoid these problems. In addition, some illnesses, including diabetes, tuberculosis and kidney and liver disorders, may also lead to bad breath. We can determine whether the problem is of dental origin and, if not, we will direct you to a physician for further evaluation and treatment. Antifreeze Can Kill

As cold weather approaches, antifreeze is found around more and more homes. This substance can be fatal to pets and children if accidentally ingested. Even a small amount can kill or cause serious illness.

The problem is that ethylene glycol, and main ingredient of antifreeze, smells and tastes sweet, so animals and even small children may drink it.

If you drain the old antifreeze out of your car or truck, you should not leave it sitting open for even a few minutes. Any antifreeze that has spilled on the driveway or street should be thoroughly washed away, leaving no puddle for children or pets to get into.

All antifreeze should be stored well out of the reach of children and pets.

Signs of antifreeze intoxication may develop within one hour after ingestion. The animal becomes depressed, reluctant to move and weak. It may show signs of vomiting, loss of appetite, excitement and convulsions. Insoluble crystals form in the tubules of the kidneys, causing kidney failure with resulting uremia and death.

Successful treatment for poisoning of this type is difficult. It depends on early diagnosis so that treatment can begin at once. If you suspect that your pet has ingested some antifreeze, even a small amount, contact your veterinarian immediately.

Home Economics Tips

During The Holidays Eat Right When Eating Out

Americans are not only becoming more health conscious and changing what they eat at home, they are changing what they eat away from home. Following a heart-healthy eating plan while dining out is getting easier. Many restaurants have menu items that are lower in saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium and calories. Here are some tips for dining out.

- Choose restaurants that offer heart-healthy menu choices. Find out by reviewing the menu ahead of time or calling in advance. Many ethnic restaurants offer these choices. Don't be afraid to make special requests. Not only is it your right as a customer, restaurants are becoming more accustomed to their customers asking for special diet

consideration.

- Control serving sizes by asking for a small serving, sharing a dish with a companion, taking the extra home or by asking the waiter to remove your plate with food remaining. You don't have to belong to the "clean your plate" club.

- Ask how food is prepared. Request that gravy, butter, rich sauces and salad dressing be left off or served on the side. Ask that salt not be added on cooking.
- Ask to substitute a salad or baked potato for chips, fries or other extras - or ask that the extras be left off your plate.

Sometimes too many things happen at once, and what you hoped would be a fun time can be pure misery - with no relief in sight. That's the time to throw out the schedule, ask a friend to come

over, or call someone who can help.

Refine The Art Of Gift-Giving

Sometimes the best gifts for any holiday are those that cost essentially nothing.

For both adults and children, consider giving coupon books with gifts of time such as babysitting, cleaning a room without being asked, time to read in peace or read a book together, uninterrupted play time or a walk alone with someone special.

Involve the children in the art of giving for love and appreciation of a family member or friend. Try to help the child so a gift doesn't have to be bought. Handmade gifts such as a photo collage, a handwritten poem, a special picture, painted rocks, Popsicle-stick coasters, or a special photo in a construction-paper standup frame always make the recipient feel special. That is a lesson that will remain with children forever.

For the gifts you do buy, consider things which encourage broad gender roles, build bridges between different cultures and races, and which encourage people to work cooperatively and kindly with each other.

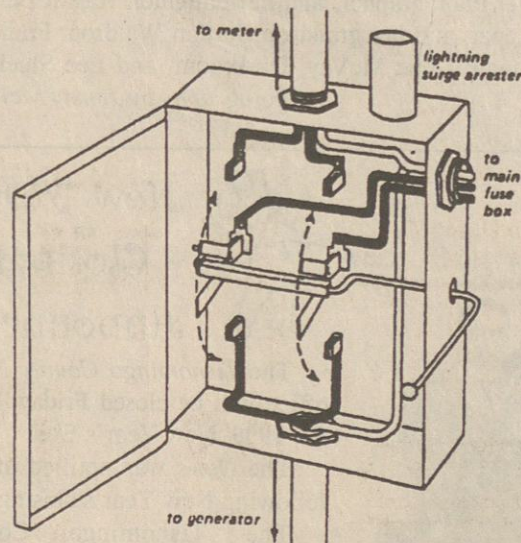

Your Infant's Eyes

Even though an infant uses only one eye at a time, it has been shown that its visual system is quite complete, including capabilities for full 3-dimensional vision. The seeing space of an infant is just a few feet, with most of the seeing being done with one eye at a time. At about a month he's able to direct both eyes at the same near object. He also moves his whole head to change what he is seeing, not just the eye position. By three months the eyes are working as a team to see at all distances. By a year the team has a well developed relationship and one eye should not be drifting off by itself. If one of the child's eyes wanders when he is tired or if it is constantly turned, see your doctor - don't wait. If you hold a light about three feet from the child's eyes, you should be able to see the reflection of that light centered in the same position in each eye. Treatment of a crossed eye cannot be ignored or delayed. Failure of the two eyes to work together at an early age, will result in abnormal development.

Think Safety! Prevent a tragedy; use generators safely.

Tishomingo Co. Authorities Find Crystal Meth Lab In Belmont Two Suspects Arrested And Jailed

Two men accused of running a crystal methamphetamine lab in Belmont remained jailed Wednesday on \$150,000 bond each after Tishomingo County authorities arrested them last week.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, Marlon Carlton, 39 of County Road 44 (Red Bud Road), Belmont was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance and manufacturing crystal methamphetamine (lab).

Another suspect, Alan Shackle, 46, who was apparently living at the same address, but whose actual home address is unknown, was also arrested. Shackle was charged with possession of a controlled substance, manufacturing crystal methamphetamine (lab) and felon in possession of a firearm. A female subject at the residence, Nicole Ponder, had not been taken into custody, nor had she been charged at press time.

Sheriff Smith explained that these arrests are part of an ongoing investigation which began with the arrests of others on similar charges earlier in the year.

"We have been gathering information in this case for approximately 9 months," Smith said. "It is directly with drug busts made in the Belmont and Burnsville County areas in April and after."

The Sheriff explained that when officers arrived at the Carlton residence on Dec. 19, Shackle was attempting to exit through a back window. Carlton ran into the kitchen area, where he was apprehended by officers. The suspects were apparently aware of the officers' raid because of surveillance cameras set up in the driveway and other areas on the property.

The lab, set up at Carlton's residence, reportedly had all of the items necessary to make large quantities of crystal meth including items such as red phosphorus, iodine crystals, a portable cooker, all of the necessary glassware, funnels and other items. Also found were significant amounts of liquid and solid methamphetamine, the Sheriff confirmed.

"In addition to the solid meth, we found 4 or 5 ozs. of liquid meth ready to be crystallized," Smith said.

Following the raid, the lab was turned over to the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics. Clean-up of the site, with its dangerous and often volatile ingredients, was turned over to the Haz-Mat (hazardous materials) Team, Smith confirmed.

If convicted, the suspects' property, house, surveillance equipment, guns and other items may be confiscated, according to the Sheriff.

the new millennium will actually start on Jan. 1, 2001.

Many people have made elaborate plans to enter the new year just in case the Y2K computer bug causes shutdowns of power facilities, traffic lights, water systems, etc. While most of us just have faith that it won't be a big deal—that every possible step has been taken to ensure a smooth step from 1999 to 2000.

Others throughout the world believe the year signifies the end of time—the second coming of Jesus, as prophesied in the Bible. All I know about that is that the Bible tells us that no one knows the day, nor the hour when the Lord will return. Still, it never hurts to be ready.

Christmas Eve Fire Destroys Home Of Burnsville Family

Tommy and Joann Marlar and son, Johnny Tucker, had only been in bed at their residence at 323 Eastport St. in Burnsville a short time Christmas Eve night when Tucker smelled smoke in the bedroom where he was sleeping.

According to Burnsville Police Chief James Trimm, the family was able to escape the quickly spreading flames; however, their mobile home and all their belongings were destroyed. The family's dog was also lost in the fire, a family member confirmed.

The fire started around 11 p.m. Friday night, Dec. 24, Chief Trimm said. Burnsville Volunteer Fire Department responded within five minutes after receiving the call, but the fire had already spread throughout the trailer, with flames coming out of the roof.

Tucker and Chief Trimm were able to hook a chain to the cars at the residence and pull them away from the flaming structure. However, all other belongings, including all the family's Christmas packages,

were lost in the fire.

Trimm said the exact cause of the fire is not known, but it is suspected that it began with an electric wall heater.

The police officer stated that the Burnsville Fire Department should be commended for the job they did in keeping the fire contained in the area, preventing it from doing further damage to surrounding property and structures.

IF YOU HAVE MOVED, ACQUIRED MORE LAND, BUILT A NEW HOUSE, BECAME 65 OR BECAME DISABLED IN 1999, you will need to fill out a new homestead. All deeds must be recorded by December 31, 1999. If the status of your property has not changed you do not have to fill out a new homestead.

If you are 65 you will need to bring proof of age. If you are disabled you will need pro of disability. If you are filing a new homestead, please bring a copy of your deed, tag number and social security number.

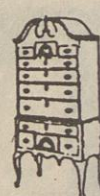

NEMCC's Radiologic Tech Has 100% Passage Rate On Board Exam

Northeast Mississippi Community College has received notification that the 1999 graduating class in the radiologic technology curriculum had a 100 percent passage rate on the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT). Students graduating from the three-year old program have all passed the examination on the first write, making the overall passage rate 100 percent. The exam is administered to students who have completed no less than a two-year accredited program in radiography. Individuals that pass the exam are titled Radiologic Technologists (R.T.) and are licensed to work anywhere in the country. At Northeast radiography students must complete two years of classes and clinical rotations. Clinical rotations for the two years include

over 1000 actual hours in the hospital working with patients doing radiologic exams. Currently the program affiliates with Magnolia Hospital in Corinth, Tishomingo County Hospital in Ripley, Baptist Memorial in Booneville and Union County (New Albany), and ECM Hospital in Florence, Alabama. New R.T.'s and graduates of the Northeast program are (front row) Mary Timms of Belmont; Kelly Smith, Baldwin; Michelle Sims, Corinth; Patricia Pruitt, Baldwin; Amber Nelms, Corinth; Andrea Harris, Rienzi; Lashaunda Eckford, Corinth; and (back row) Diana Storment, Iuka; John Milstead, Aberdeen; Alan Johnson, New Albany; Carl Simms, program director; Rick Robertson, clinical coordinator of the program; and Northeast president Charles W. Chance, Ph.D. Northeast's radiologic

program is designed to train qualified students to perform diagnostic radiographs (x-rays) in hospitals or other clinical settings. Graduates are eligible to take the national exam offered by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists and receive their credentials as registered Radiologic Technologists (R.T.) Areas of testing include radiation protection, equipment operation and maintenance, image production and evaluation, radiographic procedures, and patient care. The 1999 class is the third to graduate from the Northeast program. According to program director Carl Simms, the first two classes had 100 percent passage rates on the national registry and 100 percent job placement. Haunting History Of "Taps"

Music is an integral part of the military; it wakes you up in the morning, and it signals "lights out" at night. The story that follows is extracted from Doug Storer's Encyclopedia of Amazing but True Facts, published by Signet.

It all began in 1862, during the Civil War, when a Union Army officer, Captain Robert Ellicombe, was with his men near Harrison's Landing, Va. The Confederate Army was on the other side of this narrow strip of land. During the night, Ellicombe heard the moan of a soldier who lay mortally wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a union or Confederate soldier, the captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention.

Crawling on his belly through the gunfire, the captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment. When the captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead. The captain lit a lantern. Suddenly, he caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son!

The boy had been studying

music in the South when war broke out. Without telling his father, he had enlisted in the

Confederate Army.

The following morning, the heartbroken father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite his enemy status. His request was partially granted. The captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. That request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate.

Out of respect for his father, they did say that they could give him one musician. The captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted.

The music was the haunting melody Americans now know as "Taps" used at all military funerals. - HUB, U.S. Army Reserve Personnel Center.

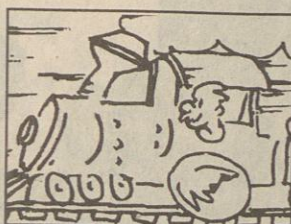

Tornado Awareness Initiative Launched In November

November kicked off Mississippi's first-ever Tornado Awareness Month, an initiative officials said is an effort to increase individual and family preparedness in the state.

"The tornado initiative's aim is to reduce the number of deaths and injuries Mississippians sustain during period of severe weather," said Jim Maher, director of the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency that is marshalling the efforts of state and local emergency management agencies.

"What it's all about is trying to increase awareness that severe weather kills, and that the best defense is being prepared by knowing what to do and when to do something when disaster threatens," he said. "It's about saving lives."

One Mississippian was killed this spring when a tornado ripped through western Jones County. Although the state hasn't seen as much devastation from tornadoes as neighboring states in the past two years, Mississippi remains as one of the top states for tornado-related deaths in the nation.

Averaging eight deaths per year from tornadoes, Mississippi finds itself nestled in the most

active region of the country for severe weather. From 1950-1999, the state averaged 26 tornadoes per year, or a total of 1,302 tornadoes - 74 of which were killer tornadoes. Since 1950, there have been 389 deaths reported from the storms.

November marks Mississippi's second peak tornado season.

Because of this, MEMA, local emergency management and civil defense offices, schools and the National Weather Service have once again joined forces in an effort to educate the public about the effects of severe weather.

As part of the initiative, materials were supplied to local governments and schools ranging from planning guides to classroom teaching aids. Included in this year's kickoff was the placement of NOAA Weather Radios in schools and other public facilities. The project was funded partially through a hazard mitigation grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

"If people know when and how to react to a storm, and if they have the ability to hear a warning, then lives can be saved," Maher said.

MS Highway Patrol Continues Effort To Get Drunk Drivers

Mississippi Highway Patrol continued its increased effort to get drunk drivers off state roads and highways in November. Troopers made 715 DUI arrests during the month. In the first eleven months of 1999 there have been 9,040 arrests statewide.

Commissioner Jim Ingram credits this effort with a major decrease in the number of traffic fatalities in Mississippi this year. The commissioner said, "For every drunk driver we can get off the highways, that is one less potential wreck.....one less potential fatality. Maybe even two or three potential fatalities."

Through November 30 traffic fatalities on road and highways patrolled by the MHP are down by almost 15%. Records show that 423 people have been killed in crashes during that period this year, compared with 482 during the same period last year. Deputy

Director of the MHP, Lt. Colonel Marvin Curtis Jr., said, "The decrease is good to see, but the total is still far too high. With the increase in traffic on our roads we have got to convince people to slow down, to drive more courteously and especially, don't drink and drive."

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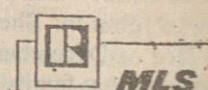

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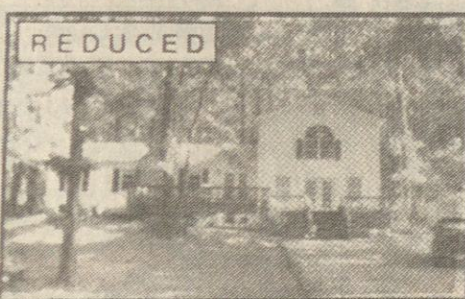

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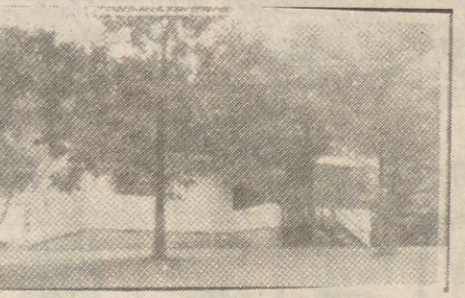

If they ask me to do this, make your ties good and cut good scantlings and if such was to be put on your grandpa, he will be hones and treat you exactly right. I think there are better times close to hand. It is due time for them, but I hope our people will never drift back into unreasonableness again, as they did during that great, blessed, unrighteous war.

Well, we hear our neighbors talking a great deal about wanting a consolidated school and every time I hear one of them say he wants it to come, it makes me love him that much

better. Neighbors, lets have a consolidated school. I haven't a child to send, I wish I had for I do love children and will give 100 dollars to the cause and if there is any other good thing I can do, I will do so. You know good schools and good examples and right expressions are the real things to make good women and men, and I see as fine and noble material in this county as ever lived.
