Tishomingo Man Killed In Two-Vehicle Accident Near Midway

A Tishomingo man died Monday as a result of injuries he sustained in a two-vehicle accident near Midway.

Jerry W. Epps, 49, was a passenger in a 1985 Ford which was hit from the rear by a service truck. The driver of the Ford car, which was traveling north on Hwy. 25 near the Midway Truck Stop, was Michael Strickland, 20, of Tishomingo.

According to witnesses, Epps had to be cut from the car by the Jaws of Life. He suffered severe head injuries and was airlifted to North Mississippi Medical Center where he died from the injuries he sustained. Strickland was transported to Iuka Hospital, where he was treated and released, according to reports.

One witness stated that it appeared that Strickland may have been going to turn to get gas at the station when he slowed or stopped his vehicle. The witness said the driver, who was probably two or three vehicle-lengths behind Strickland, slammed on this brakes, but was unable to stop before hitting the car in the rear.

According to reports, the driver of the truck, who was from

Alabama and whose name was unavailable at press time, was not injured in the accident.

Assisting at the scene of the accident were members of the Tishom-

ingo County Sheriff's Department, Mississippi Highway Patrol and Midway Volunteer Fire Department.

Jerry Ward Epps, 49, died Monday, Feb. 21, 2000, at North Mississippi Medical Center as the result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident. He was a member of Liberty Church of Christ.

Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 23, at Liberty Church of Christ in Dennis with Tim Spivy and Jeff Martin officiating. Burial was in Joel Cemetery in Dennis. Deaton Funeral Home of Belmont was in

charge of arrangements.

Survivors include three sisters, Willard Strickland and Helen Siebert and her husband, Marvin, all of Tishomingo, and Martha Young of Red Bay, Ala.; three nieces, Debbie Lipford of Garland, Texas, Marsha Lynn Mienzi of South Carolina and Paula Smith of Russellville, Ala.; three nephews, John B. Strickland Jr. of Tishomingo and Jackson, Larry Strickland of Tishomingo and Richard Young of

Jacksonville, Fla.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Ancel and Katie Epps and two brothers, Marvin Leroy Epps and A.E. Epps Jr.

community and North Mississippi Health Services.



Remember

"My name is Ashley. My Mommy had me when she was 16. She and my Daddy live in an apartment above my Granny's garage. I spend a lot of time with my Granny because my Mommy goes to school during the daytime and works at a restaurant in the evenings. My Daddy is mostly gone too. He helps build houses. Lately, he and Mommy have been fighting a lot because he stays gone with his friends when he is not at work. Mommy says he needs to be here with us. My Granny says it's because he is still a teenager and doesn't know how to be a Daddy. Mommy fusses at me a lot too. I know she loves me, I guess she is just tired and sad."

This story is fictitious, but represents the all-too-frequent teen pregnancy scenario. During the month of February,

"Remember Me" Dolls are created and placed in public places to focus attention on the issues resulting from teenage pregnancy. In Mississippi, one in five babies is born to a teenage mother. Eighty percent of these teen mothers are unwed. Fifty percent of them will go on welfare within one year, almost 80% will be on welfare within 5 years of the child's birth.

Very few events in a young person's life could be more life changing than becoming a parent. Eighty percent of teenage mothers, having a child before age 17, never complete high school. Dreams are shattered and odds become stacked against future success. "A bad choice truly does limit future options."

Why has teenage pregnancy become such a national problem? There are a number

contributing reasons. Sex is used to sell everything from toothpaste and blue jeans to automobiles and vacations. Movies, television, music, and magazines are full of messages and advertisements extoling the wonders and excitement of "safe sex", but almost never show the lives shattered by disease, pregnancy, or abortion. Teens are being told that "everyone is doing it". Parents wait for schools, church vouth groups, or someone else more comfortable with the topic to discuss sex issues with their kids. Many adults have thrown their hands up and argue "kids are going to have sex anyway; you're not going to change that.'

More and more teens, however, are choosing abstinence until marriage. many are very outspoken about their choice, and sincere in their convictions. When teens are given good, healthful information, they tend to make good, healthy choices. When surveyed, over 85% of adolescents

and teens responded that they wanted to hear information about teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases from their parents. We don't assume that children will learn to read or develop good manners on their own. We see that they are counseled and prepared for college and careers, but what about their sexual behavior? We must not assume that they will make healthy choices if we don't communicate our values and expectations with them or equip them with information to resist the messages and pressures they will encounter.

There are many resources available for helpful information for parents, schools, youth leaders, and pastors. We must join together as a community to make a difference in teen pregnancy.



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

Monitor blood pressure and cholesterol levels to keep your heart happy. Johnson suggests visiting your physician for regular check-ups.



Sheriff's Dept. Sponsors Triad Program To Help Older Residents Protect Themselves From Crime

A new program being implemented by Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith hopes to teach local elderly residents how to keep from being a victim of crime.

The program, Triad, will teach older residents how to recognize scams and scam artists, how to stay safe at home and while traveling and help them compile a file with important information to have on hand in case of an emergency

Sheriff Smith has designated Sheriff's Department employees Donnie BoBo and Walter Vaughn as coordinators of the program. They recently attended a three-day seminar in Jackson which trained them for the program.

"What we hope to do is to arm our elderly residents with information to help them recognize crimes in which the elderly are often targeted," BoBo said. "Things such as mail fraud, telephone scams, door-to-door scams, and so forth."

BoBo said that a series of meetings in the towns throughout the county will be held, beginning in the near future, for the elderly to address these, as well as other issues of safety concerning older adults.

BoBo stated that another part of the program will be to help older individuals compile what is

termed a "Life File." In this file, a list of important information, such as a list of medications currently being taken by the individual, insurance information, known allergies, phone numbers of emergency contact persons, etc. will be recorded. This information will then be placed in a folder which has a magnet on back so it can be attached to the resident's refrigerator so that if there is ever an emergency, medical emergency personnel will be able to locate it quickly.

Money for this program comes from a grant applied for

and received by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department from the Mississippi Council on Aging. This grant in the amount of \$5,000, can be renewed annually for the continuation of the project. BoBo said that eventually, they hope to have residents' input into how this grant money will be utilized.

Another program the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department already has in place through a Triad grant of \$3,000 received last year, is the "Are You O.K?" daily call-up program for the elderly and disabled of the county.

Dates and times of monthly meetings for Triad will be announced as soon as they are available, according to BoBo.

> ISDA Celebrating 50 Years Of Housing Opportunities For Rural Mississippi Life in rural Mississippi was

mificantly improved fifty years when Congress passed the fousing act of 1949 to provide esperately needed housing in America. Before the Act was government efforts to diress rural housing were limited helping to construct model mmunities for families with low buy comes through various federal gel mencies. The Housing Act of US 1949 replaced this fragmented or moroach with a more holistic one, recognizing for the first time the need for rural housing nationwide. The Act created two programs of major importance for rural America: the Section 502 direct housing loan program and the Section 504 housing repair loan and grant program. Those were initially programs administered by the United States Department of Agriculture's Farm Security Administration, then by its successor, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), and now

> by USDA Rural Development. Since its inception, the Section 502 direct home loan program has helped 1.9 million rural Americans to become homeowners. Since 1949, the Section 504 house repair loan and rant program has helped more han 300,000 families fix leaking nofs, install plumbing, remove ical and fire hazards, force walls, make their homes efficient, and add features ommodate disabilities.

ys made on time. ey Davis, another former yee of FmHA who retired in also shared his memories of ousing programs when the y had a unique approach to might be termed

"homeowner education." Davis recounted that at one time USDA had employees known as "Home Management Supervisors." Their role was to routinely visit the housing borrowers who, at that time, were all farmers, too. They assisted the homemaker in estimating how much fruits and vegetables should be canned to provide for the family over the winter and how many chickens, cows, and pigs should be raised to feed the family. They also instructed the homeowners in how to use many of the new features in their homes, such as the indoor plumbing facilities in the kitchen and bathrooms. Mr. Davis recalled a borrower in Prentiss County who received a loan to repair the family home, including building new kitchen cabinets. When Davis returned to the farm shortly after the renovations were completed, he found that the kitchen cabinets had been removed and the old free-standing cupboards returned to the kitchen. When questioned about this, the homeowner replied, "We're used

to our cupboards." Another retiree, John Arthur, who served in various FmHA positions, including Director, recalled the mid-1960's, when the agency started making housing loans on nonfarm tracts. Up until that point, housing loans were made only on farms. The idea of financing homes on lots instead of on farm acreage caused quite a stir. "Mr. Fatheree (State Director at the time) came back from a meeting in Washington and called all the program directors in and asked, 'What do you all think about making loans on a one-acre piece of land?""

Marguerite Rutledge, who served as clerk in the Lawrence Farmers Administration office from 1950 until 1977, remembered that in the earliest years of the housing program the construction costs for the wood-framed houses ran from \$2200 to \$6000. Rutledge

recalled two families who needed larger homes to accommodate their large households. Each needed \$14,500 to build those homes. "We almost wore out those files sending them to the District Supervisor, then to Jackson (to the State Office), and then to Washington to get those big loan approved," said Rutledge.

According to Mrs. Rutledge, the first housing loan recipient in Lawrence County was to a black family in 1950. The David Robinson family received a \$2200 loan to construct the new home for Mr. and Mrs. Robinson and their five children. Because the lumber in their old house was to be used in the new construction, the family lived in a corncrib while construction was completed. Family members constructed the home, which was a common practice in those days.

In the 50 years since they were enacted, these programs have greatly improved the quality of the Nation's housing stock. William Simpson, Mississippi State Director for USDA Rural Development, said, "In rural Mississippi one need only drive a few miles to witness the impact USDA's housing programs have made on the State. By bringing affordable homes to rural Mississippi these programs have helped realize the Act's vision of "a decent home and a suitable living environment for every American family." By enhancing community livability, creating jobs, and adding to local tax bases, the Section 502 and 504 programs are still helping rural Mississippi communities attain the resources they need to grow and prosper."

Rural Water Systems Fail To File Financial Report

Forty-four rural water associations that serve more than 15,000 customers still have not complied with a new law that requires financial viability reporting.

Under this law, Mississippi State Department of Health bears responsibility for making sure all rural water systems report their financial condition by July 1 of each year to the State Auditor's Office. Despite the law and a written reminder from The Health Department, 44 of the 721 nonprofit rural water associations have failed to file this financial account. That could create legal problems for those associations.

The Mississippi Legislature in its 1998 Regular Session enacted Section 79-11-394, Mississippi Code of 1972, which requires all non-profit, non-share rural water systems to report their financial condition by July 1 of each year. The law, effective July 1, 1998, also requires that the report be filed with the State Auditor's Office, that customers be notified the report is available to them, and that the report also be filed in the nearest public library. Copies of the financial documents can also be obtained from the State

'Failing to file the report has serious consequences," said Rick Herrington, director Environmental health for The Health Department.

"Rural water systems which do not file the financial report with the State Auditor's Office and do not notify their customers of the availability of the report cannot take any action as an association," Herrington said. "Any action taken by the association would be and is invalid."

"A strong correlation exists between the financial health of a public water supply and its ability to consistently deliver safe and adequate drinking water to its customers," he explained. "The Department of Health, as the principal regulatory agency of state government with supervisory authority over the state's drinking water supplies, is always concerned about anything which might negatively impact a water association's capacity to serve its


