Officials with the City of Iuka are proposing that additional area to the south of the existing city limits be added to the city.

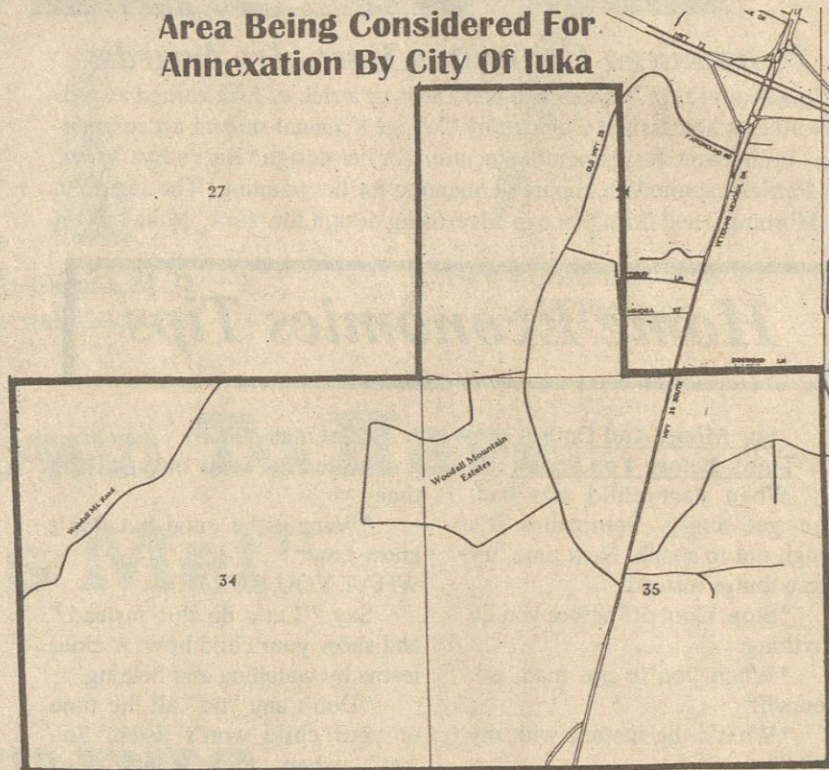
According to Iuka City Clerk Benny Gray, a hearing designed to get input from those affected by the annexation is planned for 6 p.m. Monday, May 22, at Iuka City Hall.

The area included in the proposed annexation would add approximately 2½ square miles of area and would encompass roughly between 600 and 1,000 people, officials estimate.

"Anyone who is a citizen of Iuka, and anyone who will be affected by the proposed annexation is encouraged to be at this hearing on May 22," Gray stressed. "This will be a time when any questions they might have about the proposal can be answered. If they support the idea or if they do not, we would like to have their input."

If the area is annexed, citizens in that area would gain such benefits as more comprehensive police and fire protection, water bills would be cut in half, maintenance of sewage service, etc., ac-

cording to the officials. One misconception about being added to the city is that sales taxes would go up. This is not true, according to Iuka Alderman Buddy James who explained that more money out of the existing 7 percent sales

tax would be kept in our area, rather than going to the state. No additional sales taxes would be added.

The last annexation to the city took place in 1989.

The members of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, along with officers with the Mississippi Highway Patrol, MHP Criminal Investigation Bureau, the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, Tennessee Valley Authority and the Coast Guard joined together Saturday night, May 6, in a saturation operation in northern Tishomingo County which landed 24 in jail.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, this sweep by officials was made in response to numerous complaints to his office about illegal alcohol and drug use, improper or no tags on resident's vehicles, and other potential illegal activities taking place in the northern part of the county.

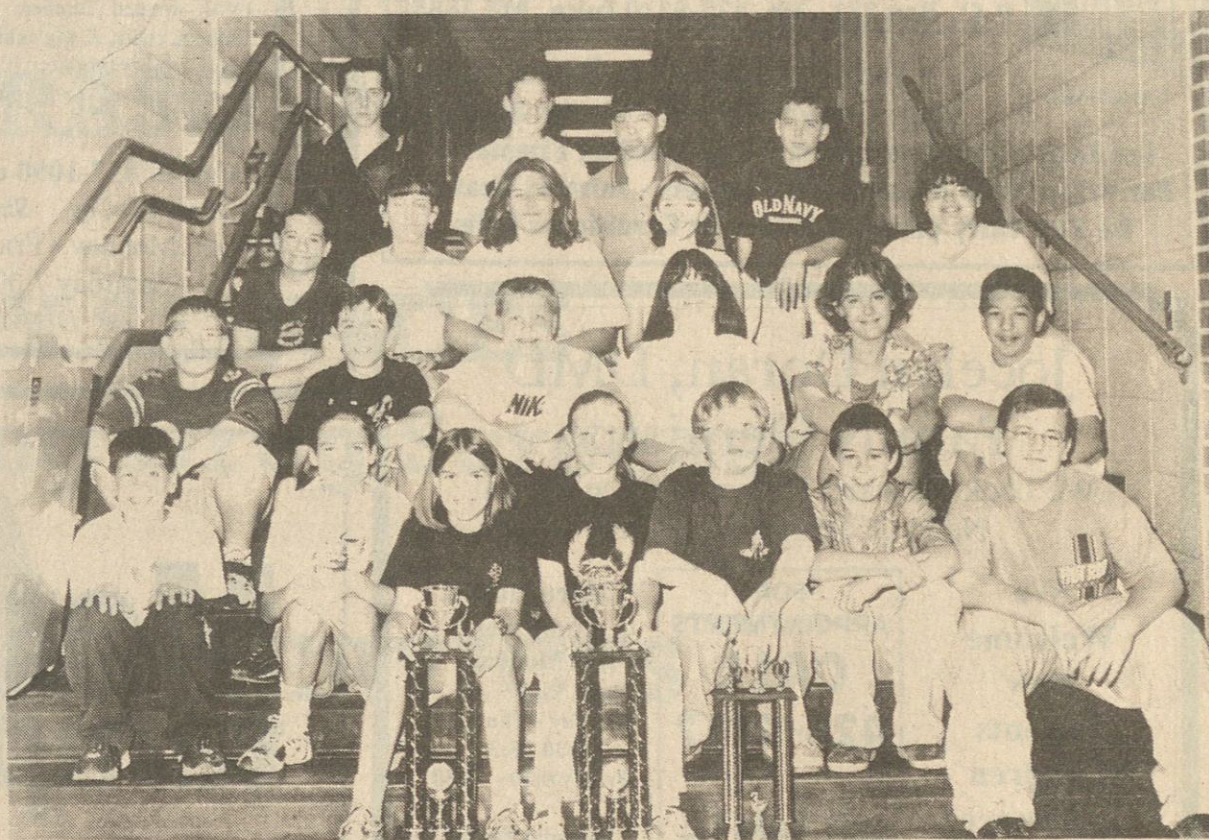
Of the 24 arrested, there were several DUIs, public drunkenness, citations for possession of beer and possession of marijuana.

Sheriff Smith said this sat-

ration effort is part of ongoing operations his department and these other agencies plan to continue in Tishomingo County.

Smith confirmed that other saturations will be undertaken into the summer throughout the county.

These operations are designed to protect the rights of the law abiding residents of Tishomingo County and to see that illegal activity in the county is brought under control.

When your child acts bad, you get angry. Sometimes it's tough not to spank. Next time, try these things instead.

*Stop. Cool off before you do anything.

*When you're not mad, ask yourself:

*What's the matter, with my child?

*Is she tired, sick, or worried about something?

*Can she do what I want?

*Did I do something?

*Am I still mad?

*Watch what you say. Mean words hurt a lot.

*Teach your child how to do what's right.

*Don't show him that hitting is okay.

*Help him feel good about himself. Use praise.

*Be patient. It takes a while for kids to catch on because they're so little.

*Learn about children and how they grow. Talk to other moms and dads or join a parent group.

*Take some time for yourself! You'll feel better, and wind up being a better mom or dad to your kid.

BECAUSE 1-3 YEAR OLDS:

*Want to do it all by themselves

*Hate being away from mom and dad

*Get mad quickly

*Need to keep busy all the time

*Want to be good but don't know how

WHAT YOU CAN DO:

Say, "Let's do this instead," and show your child how. A child learns by watching and helping.

*Don't say "no" all the time or your child won't listen. Say "no" when they could hurt

themselves or someone else.

*Help them tell you why they are upset. Use words; talk about feelings.

*Let your child know you mean what you say. Kids need to be told over and over.

*Spend as much time as you can with your child.

BECAUSE 3 YEAR OLDS:

*Want to know "why", and enjoy talking

*Like to make believe

*Learn by doing, try to please

BECAUSE 4 YEAR OLDS:

*Want to do it all by themselves

*Like to be the boss

*Fight back when angry or upset

*Know what they want to do and find it hard to stop or be taken away

BECAUSE 5 YEAR OLDS:

*Do things for themselves

*Know how to tell you what they want to do

*Still find it hard to remember

what to do every time
WHAT YOU CAN DO:

*Spend lots of time with your child

*Plan what you're going to do together

*Keep it simple. Remember how hard it is to follow too many rules.

*Listen to what your child is saying. He might be afraid or feel like he's being pushed.

*Talk about being sad, angry, scared.

*Tell him when he pleases you - that'll make him feel great!

*Be nice to your child. If she thinks she's bad, she may act bad just to prove it.

Teach your child what's right. Remember: don't show him that hitting is okay. Everybody has bad days, even your kid! It's all part of growing up.

Preventive Collars For Dogs

The preventive collar dogs kills ticks for 3 months. The collar also aids protection from tick-borne disease and prevents attachment of ticks. The preventive collar detects existing ticks within 48 hours. Over 95% of attached ticks detached after 24 hours. The collar prevents 95% of new ticks from feeding.

The collar must be tightly enough to contact and so that dog cannot remove it. Activity against ticks within 24 hours and contact as long as the collar is (up to 90 days.) Ticks present in the dog's environment may reappear on the dog not attach and will be killed less than 24 hours. Re-collar when effective diminishes. The effectiveness of the collar is not diminished by normal wetting such as rainfall; however, it is suggested that the collar be removed before bathing. Active ingredient is an insecticide. Therefore other means for controlling fleas.

How is Glaucoma Diagnosed

Glaucoma is an eye disease characterized by a higher than normal fluid pressure inside the eye. By far the most common type is called chronic simple glaucoma, which the pressure increases slowly, the beginning stages without symptoms, and the progressive damage slow and gradual. Glaucoma cannot be prevented or cured, but diagnosed early, it is generally easy to control so that no further damage is caused. Any damage already done cannot be repaired, the sooner the disease is diagnosed and treatment begun, the sooner the effect will be curbed.

If a person has glaucoma it can be determined in the course of a routine eye examination. Intraocular pressure is measured with an instrument called tonometer. If the pressure reading is within the normal range, it is safe to let a year elapse before testing again. If the pressure is above or at the upper limit of normal, more sophisticated testing may have to be done.

Iuka Dixie Youth Baseball
Complex

To Whom it may concern:

Baseball has always been one of America's favorite past times, most especially, in small towns such as Iuka, where there aren't a lot of recreational activities for our youth. Since the establishment of our town in 1873, baseball has been an integral part of our community. With the growth of our community, the baseball fields we are currently playing on have become insufficient. We have over 180 boys participating in our program of 4 age groups, which make up 15 teams, playing on 2 fields.

In the fall of 1999, the County Board of Supervisors, City Board of Aldermen, the Mayor of Iuka, and a group of devoted parents and Baseball Board of Directors, met and committed to building a new baseball complex to be located on Fair Grounds Road. The City of Iuka and local Board of Supervisors provided the initial funding for this construction project, which included moving tons of dirt, fencing and lighting; however, the league must continue to maintain the facilities to sustain the program. The new four-field complex will include an additional

age group not previously included under Dixie Youth, making baseball available to every boy from age four to age fifteen.

Many items are still needed to make our complex playable and worthy to host tournaments, which will boost the economy of our beautiful town. Grass and an irrigation system top the list of priorities, with a building to

include: the concession stand, equipment storage, press box overlooking each field and handicap-accessible restrooms running a close second in the list of priorities. Other items needed are: covered dugouts with concrete floors, slatted or paved walkways between fields, batting cages, and a sufficient public address system.

In an effort to improve our baseball program in Iuka, we need financial support from you, the backbone of our community. Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

CHIP (Children's Health Insurance Program) is a new federally mandated, state administered, separate insurance program through Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Mississippi. This program reaches out to children whose families have higher incomes (in Mississippi this is 200% of the Federal Poverty level) than those covered by Medicaid, but whose families may have access to but are unable to afford insurance coverage. It is estimated that 120,000 children in Mississippi are uninsured. Many of these will be eligible for health benefits through this program.

Medicaid and CHIP will cover such services for children as screenings, including vision and hearing exams; preventive health care, such as immunizations; inpatient and outpatient hospital care; lab services; prescription medicine; eyeglasses and hearing aids; and preventive dental care, including routine fillings. Inpatient and outpatient mental health and substance abuse services are also covered. There are no exclusions for pre-existing conditions.

How will a family know if they will receive Medicaid or

CHIP? Age, family size and income level will determine this. All children whose family income is through 200% of poverty level, who do not fall into any of the Medicaid eligible categories and who have not been covered by other health insurance in the previous six months of the date they apply may be eligible for CHIP. Eligibility is continuous for one year. At the end of that year, families must re-apply.

When application is made, you must have proof of the child's age (birth certificate, health or school records), their social security number, and proof of family income for one full month. There may be additional information required on a case of case basis.

There will be minimal co-payments for families between 150% and 200% of the federal poverty level. There is no cost sharing for immunizations or well-child care, preventive dental care, hearing or vision screening, eye glasses or hearing aids.

Application forms are available in a variety of places including the county offices of the Department of Human Services and most county health departments, community health centers, rural health clinics, Head Start centers, and some hospitals.

It is important that all of

Mississippi's children have access to health care. If you know someone who might be eligible for this program, encourage them to call the Department of Human Services office for more information.

The Town of Tishomingo routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and state laws. This table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 1999. As water travels over the land or underground, it can pick up substances or contaminants such as microbes, inorganic chemicals, and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, is reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk.

In this table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

We at Sardis extend a welcoming hand to all who wish to come together in the name of the Lord Jesus. We've been blessed with another week of life and the opportunity that goes with it of spreading God's word and enjoying good fellowship with one another.

Sunday's lesson was an the believer's relationship to society: As a Christian, you should bless the lives of those who are in daily contact with you. To do this you must think rationally of self. Solomon gave three warnings to the person who would seek self promotion: 1 - "Put not forth thyself in the presence of the king." 2 - "Stand not in the place of great men." 3 - "Better it is that it be said unto thee, come up hither; than that thou shouldst be put lower in the presence of the prince whom thine eyes have seen." (Proverbs 25:6,7). These warnings show when in the presence of people of higher rank, we should follow Jesus and not assume an attitude of self-importance.

It is better to prevent conflict than it is to win it. Many things cause conflict; misunderstandings are the chief problem. No one should be hasty in charging others of wrongdoing; when we talk to outsiders about a problem we may be having with an individual, they may cloud the issue with their

opinions and cause more problems. When we criticize an individual to others this causes a very negative situation which could be avoided simply by talking to the individual. Loving enemies is not the natural thing to do and is one of the greatest challenges of the godly life. But as a Christian, we must express love through acts of kindness, even if such behavior fails to win them over, we will be no poorer for having tried.

 9. Weep with those who weep.

11. Be angry about the right things.

12. Self-discipline is the key to all relationships.

FROM THE IUKA VIDETTE, January 1912

Eaves Dots - Mr. W.A. Morris quite sick. Mr. A.F. Bonds is clearing a big new ground on the farm he

bought recently. Mr. Eli McCulloch is preparing to build a new residence. Julius Robinson is building a large barn out of logs. The neighbors helped him two days. Mr. A.W. Davis is still running his saw mill near Harmony Church. Mr. C. Cummings has moved on the place bought from J.W. Johnson. Mr. Elijah Borden moved into the house vacated by him. One of our old citizens John B. Walker was buried Wednesday at Indian Creek.

Mr. W.S. Wright of Essary Springs, Tenn. was visiting his son O. A. Wright last week.

Mr. F.E. Resler, representing the Land and Industrial Department of the Southern and Mobile and Ohio Railway is conferring with George L. McMahers regarding Northern immigration and is anxious to get some German Colonists located in this section.

Bud Honeycutt of Burnsville was in town Monday paying taxes for some of his neighbors. Miss Rebecca Coman has gone in the country to teach the school from which Miss Naugle resigned. Miss Naugle received a call to a \$90 a month position in Texas.

Mrs. B.B. Medley of Route 4, Iuka, accompanied by her daughter

Mrs. J.D. Whitaker, called at the Vidette office Saturday.

Mrs. S.J. Marlar - died at her home near Kendrick, in Alcorn County, January 21, 1912, after a long illness. Mr. and Mrs. D.T. Barnes returned from attending her during the past two weeks, deceased being Mrs. Barnes' mother. Mrs. Marlar was very old. Had she lived till next June

she would have seen her 91st birthday. She was a devout member of the Christian Church and was laid to rest at the Babb graveyard on the 23rd, the funeral being conducted by Rev. Copeland. She leaves eight living children, five dead. Her husband died 36 years ago.

THE VIDETTE, January 1912:
Mr. J.A. Ramsey, better known as Uncle Josh Ramsey, died at his home 4 miles north of Iuka, in the 8th instant aged about 68 years. He volunteered at the beginning of the great war and served as a member of Co. E., 4th Alabama Cavalry, better known as Roddy's Regiment. After the war, he settled down as a farmer near where he died. He also ran a steam mill for many years. He was an enterprising and industrious man until his health broke down a few years ago. He then moved to Burnsville where he remained several years, his health constantly growing worse. Last year he spent in Iuka, hoping that the mineral waters would be beneficial but tuberculosis had developed in his lungs and human skill cannot cope with this dread disease. He realized that death was sure and was reconciled to meet it without fear. For two days he lay in a stupor from the disease and then passed quietly away. He leaves a widow and several children to mourn his loss. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

THE VIDETTE, April 4, 1912:
Messrs. E.L. and C.L. Bonds and families have moved to town and are occupying one of the Hyatt cottages. Mr. C.L. Bonds is traveling for the Buch-Gray Grocery Co., Memphis. We are glad to have them with us.

THE VIDETTE, January 17, 1895:
CIRCUIT COURT - The January term of Tishomingo County Circuit

Court met at the court house last Monday. Judge Cayce on the bench. The grand jury was charged and sworn in, of which J.W. Williams was made foreman. The circuit court proceedings thus far are as follows: State vs. C. Barnett for carrying pistol was found guilty, \$50 fine and 30 days imprisonment. Twenty-five dollars of fine and imprisonment suspended during good behavior. M.L. Harris vs. J.L. Short. Jury and verdict for defendant. The cases against G.L. Gardner for retailing were dismissed. State vs. James Broughton. Found guilty for carrying whiskey to public gathering. State vs. S.J. Mitchell and Button Thacker for petit larceny; jury and verdict not guilty. State vs. Dock Bullard, petit larceny, jury and verdict not guilty.

State vs. Al Robinson for carrying concealed weapon. Jury and verdict not guilty. State vs. William Belue. plea for carrying concealed weapon, and fined \$60. State vs. James Reynolds, retailing; fined the sum of \$25. State vs. George Dawson for retailing; fined \$50 and \$25 remitted during good behavior. State vs. Will Sproule for intoxication; fined \$25. D.O. Adams vs. Will Curtis, was compromised, each paying half the cost.

THE VIDETTE, January 31, 1895:

Mrs. Alice McGehee, wife of our late sheriff, accompanied by all the family, left Monday night for Texas. They will engage in farming, we understand, near Hillsboro, in Hill County. It devolves on Oscar, the oldest boy, to be the main support of the large family - a considerable task for one so young and unused to responsibility.

We will welcome Charlie. Hope to see you soon. Mr. Vernon Grimes made it back from Tucson, Arizona. Everyone was glad to see him again. His class mates who turned out to see him included Pauline B. Waddle, Gladys P. Hinton, Mattie Fay M. Howie, Illa Trim, Irene B. Nunley and Olen. They sure had fun. The rest of us included Irene B. George from over Booneville, Ms., Glen Smith, Roxie Yow, Roy Johnson, Edith Bullard, Ella Mary Helton, Imogene McCoy, Maxine Stahl, Weldon and Bethany Claunch, Pearl McAnally, and me (Jewell Choate). We had 18 present. Edith B. read a beautiful reading and we shared several lively jokes. We had some of Ms. Illa's famous tea cakes. Also, Ms. Edith served us some delicious pound cake. We all just had all around good time. Hope all can be present next time. We missed you. Take Care, Jewell M. Choate

IMS Students Participate In Duke University Talent Identification Program

A group of students from Iuka Middle School are participants in a special program sponsored by Duke University designed to identify the brightest young people and nurture their talents during the remainder of their years in secondary school.

The students at IMS chosen to participate in the Talent Identification Program (or TIP) include Lucinda Anglin, Whitney Bowling, Emma Clark, Nikita Corsbie, Casey Crum, Misty Hinton, Mary Beth Nunley, Casey Phillips and Reanna Welch.

In order to qualify to be a participant in TIP, the students must be in the seventh grade and

must have scored at the 95th percentile or above on the national norms of the Iowa Test of Basic Skills on one or more of a mathematics sub-test, a verbal sub-test or on the total composite score.

According to the program coordinators, the objectives of the program are to identify the very bright among our youngsters at an early age; to facilitate the education of these students; to follow and nurture their talent through the critical middle and high school years; and to develop an effective research effort to help understand the nature of academically talented adolescents.

Additionally, the aim of TIP is to assist youths who have excellent mathematical, verbal or general intellectual ability by providing them with information about their ability and about educational options that may be beneficial to them.

As part of the program, the students must take the American College Test (ACT). The IMS student participants took this test in December with the results being returned to Iuka Middle School, as well as Duke University.

State winners will be announced by Duke.

on large limbs and trunks, "rub off" water-sprouts during the spring and summer. (6) Avoid excessive nitrogen fertilization at any point in the season, since this promotes succulent growth highly susceptible to fire blight infection. (7) Ideally, fire blight pruning should be carried out as a summer activity during drier periods when bacterial spread is less likely to occur as a result of pruning. (8) Spray application of bactericides to fire blight infected trees serves little value at this time of year. This practice is most effective during the dormant season and later in the season at blossom time. For additional information on fire blight and other fruit diseases, drop by the County Extension Office.

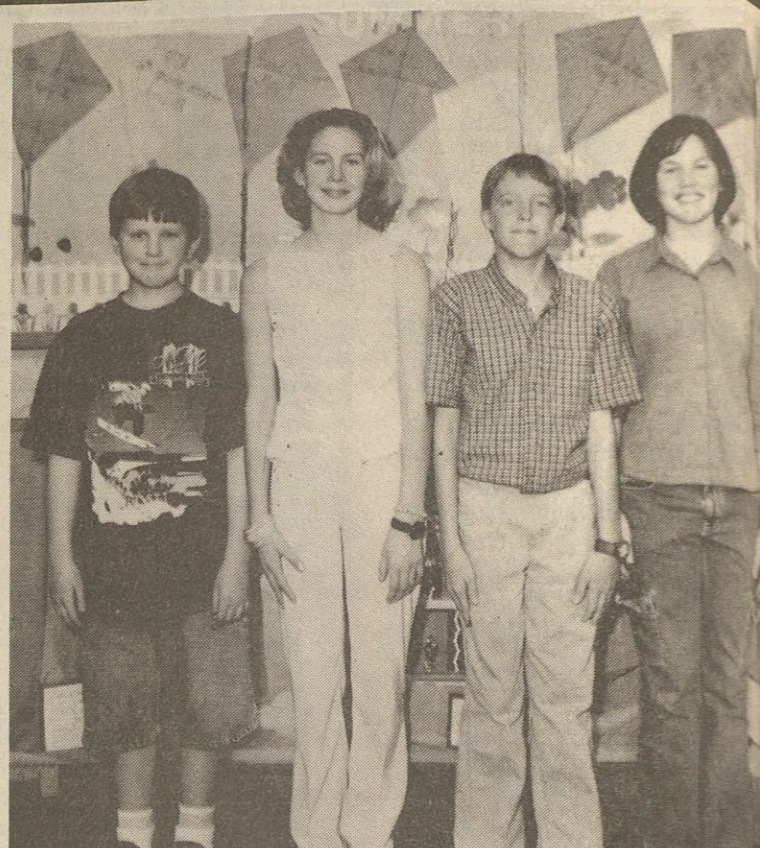
A meeting at Little Flock Primitive Baptist Church will be May 12 and 13. Guest speaker will be Elder Gene Thomas.

County Agents Notes

Fire Blight Is Bad This Year

Lately, I've notice many Bradford pears throughout the county have symptoms of fire blight. Apples, pears, flowering crabapple, and other common landscape plants such as flowering quince, hawthorn, and pyracantha are susceptible to fire blight. Crowns of diseased trees have a "scorched" appearance. Tree mortality as a result of fire blight

isn't common. For badly diseased plants, the following practices could help reduce the impact of this troublesome disease. (1) While it's not a good idea to prune fire blight diseased branches or twigs after active growth has started, it can be done, provided EXTREME sanitation is practiced. (2) Pruning tools MUST BE DISINFECTED between each cut. Tools should be dipped in or

swabbed with a denatured 75% methyl alcohol solution. A 75% solution can be prepared by mixing three volumes of denatured alcohol with one volume of water. A 10% bleach solution (nine volumes of liquid bleach to one volume of water) can also be used. This preparation is the most effective but is corrosive to most pruning tools. If it is used, the tools should be thoroughly rinsed, dried, and oiled following completion of pruning. (3) All pruning should be made several inches below the point of visible infection. (4) DO NOT prune during periods of rainy weather. (5) To prevent cankers

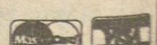
