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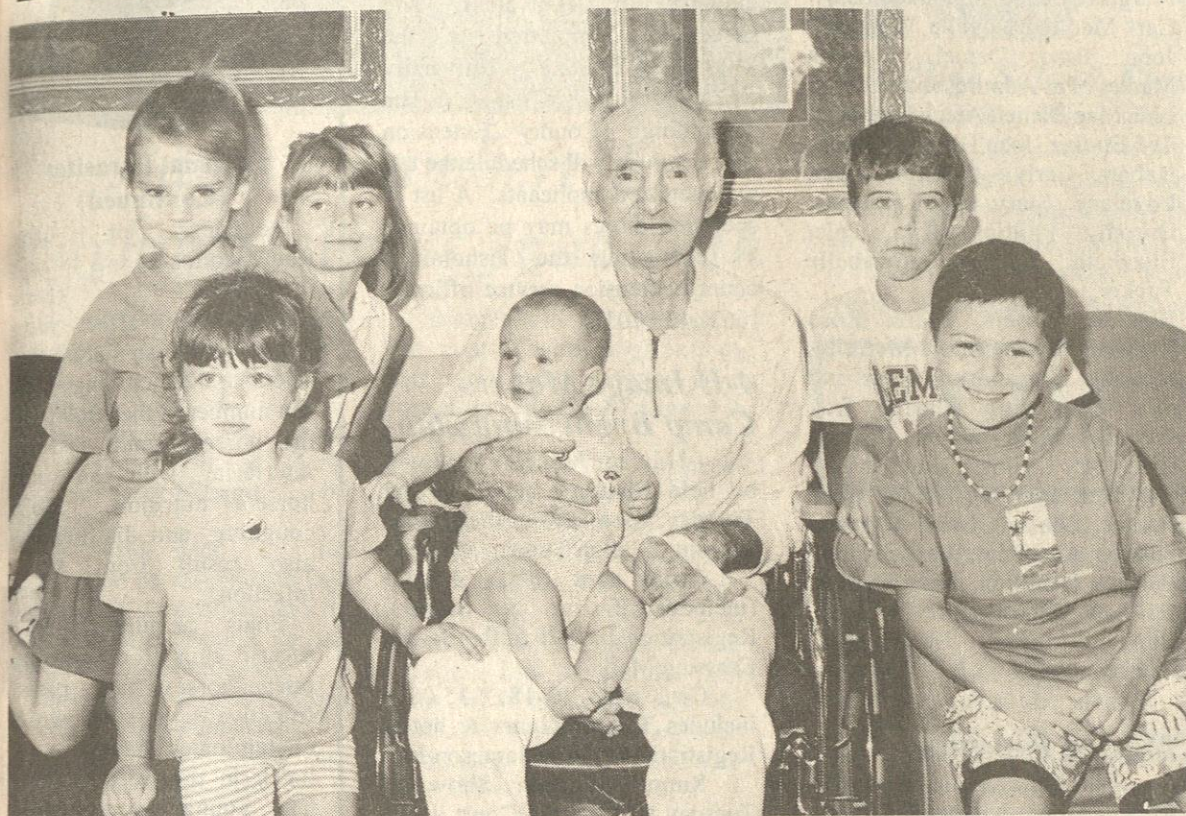

Happy Father's Day

Father's Day will be this Sunday, June 18. In the United States and Canada, Father's Day is always celebrated on the third Sunday in June. Sonora Louise Smart Dodd of Spokane, Wash., got the idea to set aside a special day to honor fathers in 1909, after listening to a sermon on Mother's Day. She wanted to honor her father, William Jackson Smart. Smart's wife died in 1898, and he raised their six children on his own. Dodd drew up a petition recommending adoption of a national father's day. The Spokane Ministerial Association and the local Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) supported it. Through Sonora Dodd's efforts, Spokane celebrated the first Father's Day on June 19, 1910. Over the years, many resolutions to make the day an official national holiday were introduced. Finally, in 1972, President Richard M. Nixon signed Father's Day into law.

First Week Of Circuit Court Results In Several Guilty Pleas

The first week of Circuit Court was held last week in Tishomingo County with Judge Frank A. Russell of the First Judicial District presiding.

Among those pleading guilty to charges and being sentenced were the following:

Joshua Walls pleaded guilty to burglary and larceny of a dwelling and was sentenced to 15 years, 10 of which were suspended, leaving five to serve. He will be placed on post-release supervision for five years following his release. Additionally, he was ordered to pay court costs. Joshua Walls also pleaded guilty to the charge of aggravated assault to which he was sentenced to 15 years, with 10 suspended. This sentence will run concurrent with his other sentence. Additionally, he was ordered to pay court costs, a bond fee and a \$1,000 fine.

David Brewer pleaded guilty

to DUI—3rd offense and was sentenced to five years, all of which were suspended. He was placed on three years probation. Additionally, he was ordered to pay court costs, a bond fee and a \$2,000 fine.

David Jerome Peek Jr., a.k.a. J.R., pleaded guilty to the charges of accessory after the fact of burglary and arson of a dwelling and armed robbery. He was sentenced to five years, with two years suspended, leaving three to serve. He was ordered to pay court costs. This sentence is to run concurrent with sentences in three additional cause numbers.

David J. Peek had his probation revoked, was sentenced to 15 years, all of which were suspended, and placed on five years supervised probation.

Loretta Ann Cox Martin pleaded guilty to uttering a forgery and was sentenced to 10 years, all of which were suspended, and was placed on five

years supervised probation. She was ordered to pay cost costs and bond fees. This sentence runs concurrent with with three other cause numbers.

Samuel W. Hutchens pleaded guilty to possession of a schedule II controlled substance, more than .1 gram, but less than 2 grams. He was sentenced to five years, was given credit for time served, with the balanced suspended. He was ordered to pay court costs, bond fees, a \$1,000 fine and \$25 restitution.

Anthony Tony Cameron pleaded guilty to charges of receiving or possession of stolen property and conspiracy to commit insurance fraud. His sentencing has been deferred until Sept. 15.

Computers And Personnel Among Topics Of Monday's Board Of Education Meeting

The purchase of new computers for schools in the county, the hiring and transferring of personnel at district schools and a gym floor at Belmont School were among the topics discussed at Monday night's Tishomingo County Board of Education meeting.

All members of the Tishomingo County School Board were present at the June 12th, 5:30 p.m. meeting, along with Superintendent John Mullins and Assistant Superintendents Stanley Magill and Terrell Kirkpatrick.

Computers

During the meeting, the Board voted to accept the lowest and best bid for the purchase of 200 new computers to replace those presently in the computer labs at Belmont, Burnsville, Iuka Elementary, Iuka Middle and Tishomingo Schools.

According to Mullins, this upgrade of the hardware in the district's computer labs will make it possible for new software to be installed which will target the areas of reading, math and language arts—fundamental areas students are tested in on standardized achievement tests.

The bid accepted by the Board was from Shotz Computers which submitted a bid of \$600 per computer—totaling \$120,000 for

the 200 computers the Board will purchase. According to Mullins, the computers will be have 433 MHz processors with 32 MB of RAM.

New software will also be purchased to be installed on these new computers, according to Mullins. The same software will be placed in each school so that students all over the district will be on equal footing.

The money for the purchase of the computers and software is coming from next year's school district budget, Mullins explained.

Personnel

In the area of personnel, the following were approved by the Board:

The hiring of Donna Medley—Special Ed., Tishomingo; Ciji Timbes Marlin—Special Ed., Burnsville; Keith Milligan—4th grade, IES; Julie Brooks—Art, Burnsville/Iuka Middle Schools; Christy Wafford—3rd grade, Burnsville; Christi Stevenson—emergency license, speech pathologist for TCHS, Iuka Headstart and IMS; Jennifer Williams—Sec./Bookkeeper, Belmont High; Shauna Collier—Clerical Assistant, Belmont High; and the resignation of Janette Carr—Admin. Secretary/Bookkeeper, Vo-Tech.

Also in the area of personnel, Mullins reported the follow-

ing administrative transfers:

Mike Haynie—from Burnsville to Belmont; Natalie Barker—from Burnsville to Belmont; Melissa Cain—from Burnsville to Iuka; Ginger Turner—from TCHS to Burnsville; Debbie Mann—from Belmont to Vo-Tech Center; and Margaret Underwood—from IMS to Tishomingo. Mullins explained that administrative transfers may be done by the superintendent without Board approval; however, if a person who is transferred wished, he or she could appeal the move to the Board.

Gym Floor

The Board agreed to advertise for bids for the installation of new rubberized flooring for Belmont High School's P.E. gym. Mullins estimated that the flooring will cost around \$25,000. Presently, the floor of the gym is concrete and has had a problem with moisture. The installation of the new flooring is being done as a safety precaution.

Next Year's Budget

In his report to the Board, the Superintendent said that June 29, at noon, will be the Board's annual luncheon meeting with the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. Later that evening, at 5 p.m., the public budget meeting will be held at the Central Office.

Create Common Ground Project Comes To Town of Tishomingo

The small town center at the school of Architecture and Mississippi State University, through the assistance of the create foundation, has selected the Town of Tishomingo to participate in the Create Common Ground II Program.

The Create Common Ground II Project will assist two communities in the Northeast Region of the State to identify issues which have shaped the built environment and have affected the development of those communities.

In addition to Tishomingo, New Albany is also participating in the second phase of this project that will explore different strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats to the community. During phase one, the communities of Aberdeen, Amory, Corinth, Fulton, and Okolona participated in the project.

The Focus of the study center upon three areas of specific

interest: connections within the community; downtown and mainstreet; and regional relations.

Tishomingo held a pre-workshop in March with twenty community citizens to discuss issues that Tishomingo is currently facing. MSU has already visited, photographed and assessed Tishomingo's strengths and weaknesses twice.

The next focus group meeting will be held on Monday, June 19, 2000, at 3:00 p.m. till 8:30 PM. Connections workshop will be from 3-6 p.m. and the downtown workshop will be from 6:30 p.m. till 8:30 p.m.

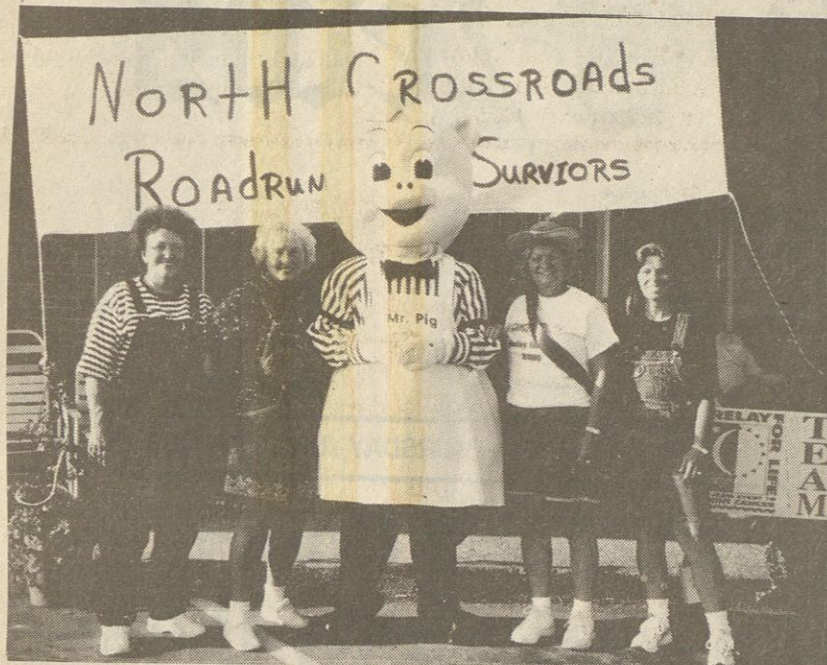

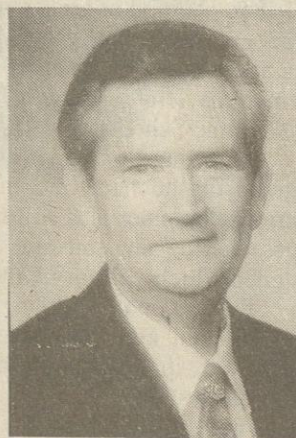


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Points Of Focus?

Astigmatism is an optical error that is caused by a variation in the shape of the cornea. Rays of light pass through the cornea on two planes - vertical and horizontal. The normal cornea is shaped like a perfect hemisphere, with the same degree of slope on each plane. This makes the rays of light come together at a single point on their way to the retina.

In the astigmatic eye one corneal plane is steeper than the other, so the rays of light do not come together at the same point, but are focused at two separate points.

The fact that there are two points of focus does not mean that astigmatic people see double. The effect is simply a blur, which is experienced both for distance and near vision. Astigmatism cannot be corrected with the near-focusing muscles, since the error is in the shape of the cornea, and the only possible solution is the use of corrective lenses.

Internal Parasites (Continued)

Ascarids, or Large Roundworms (Large Roundworms) affect young horses more than mature ones. The 6 to 12 inch long worms can number in the hundreds in the horse's small intestine, interfering with the young horse's nutrition. Colic, coughing, and diarrhea may also result from ascarid infection.

Foals acquire infective ascarid eggs from feces that other horses have passed. Infective eggs, swallowed in contaminated hay or water, hatch in the intestinal tract. The young worms burrow through the intestinal wall, taking about a week to make their way to the lungs. From there the young worms travel up the trachea to the mouth, to be swallowed a second time. They mature in the intestine in two to three months, then lay eggs that are passed in the feces to start the cycle anew.

Foals should be first treated at 8 weeks of age, then every 6 to 8 weeks later until they become yearlings, to adequately control ascarids.

Pinworms Though less dangerous than other internal parasites, pinworms are annoying to the horse because they cause severe anal itching. Adult worms crawl part way out of the anus to deposit their eggs on the adjacent surface. The eggs hatch outside of the horse's body and become infective in a few days, although they can survive unhatched for several months. The parasite is taken into the animal through contaminated water, grain, hay, or grass. Young worms mature in the large intestine in 3 to 4 months, then begin the cycle anew.

A characteristic of pinworm infection is rubbing of the tail and anal region-causing broken tail hairs and bare patches around the tail.

Pinworms usually can be treated successfully with the same drugs that are effective against strongyles and ascarids.

An Ounce Of Prevention... In breaking the life cycle of parasites is as important as administering dewormers. Manure should be removed daily in stalls and weekly in pastures, when possible. Pastures and paddocks should be well drained and not overpopulated. Fly control programs help with bot prevention and general well-being.

Wise horse owners will keep a close eye on their horses - watching for such telltale signs as loss of condition, dull coat, tail rubbing, and diarrhea or constipation.

Routine examination of fecal samples under a microscopic will enable the veterinarian to detect unapparent infections.

An effective parasites control program involves each and every animal on the farm. Ideally, intensive treatments should be scheduled at regular intervals from birth until death of the animal. Your veterinarian should be consulted to help you establish a program that will be practicable for your management conditions.

UDC Meeting

On March 21, 2000 the John Marshall Stone Chapter #394 of the United Daughters of the Confederacy met at the Iuka Library.

Mrs. Mary Ellen Ahlstrom, President, called the meeting to order at four o'clock. The Pledge of Allegiance, Ceremony, and the Lord's Prayer were said in unison. The Scripture and Prayer were led by Mrs. Vicky Durham. The roll call and minutes of the February meeting were read by Mrs. Jeanie McKee. The Treasurer, Mrs. Marquita Mathis gave her report.

Several names were discussed for possible membership for the chapter. Mrs. Ahlstrom suggested that each member invite a guest to our next meeting.

Mrs. Ahlstrom appointed a committee for the election of officers for the next two years: Mrs. Durham, Mrs. Mathis and Mrs. McKee. The committee will make their report at the next meeting.

It was noted that March 26th marked the 100th anniversary of the death of John Marshall Stone. He organized Company K, Iuka Rifles. On April 12, 1862 Stone was elected colonel of the 2nd MS Regiment. He was later elected governor of MS and held this office for many years. Governor Stone was an outstanding leader, and was much loved and appreciated by the people of MS.

Mrs. Mathis presented the program, "Life of a Soldier in the Area During the War." During the 1860's social events included things such as: dances, speakings,

town meetings, weddings, and religious services. Although many men were contented with this family-oriented lifestyle, most secretly saw the War as an opportunity for a short adventure. For most soldiers, this was their first time away from their families and communities.

During the War Between the States, the Northern and Southern troops often had many common bonds: the need for enough food, water and shelter; and dreaded loneliness; and always the fear of death.

The soldiers were provided with salt beef or pork which was fried or eaten raw and hardtack when supplies could be delivered. This diet caused many diseases. Often there was nothing to eat. Men even hunted and fished between battles. When fresh fruits such as berries, peaches and apples were in season, they were also eaten.

Lack of clean water was a major problem with so many men camped that were sick, wounded and dying.

Brenda G. Nichols of Iuka, MS, recently enrolled in the American Quarter Horse Association Horseback Riding Program. Is my water safe?

Last year, as in years past, your tap water met all U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state drinking water health standards. Local Water vigilantly safeguards its water supplies and once again we are very proud to report that our system has never violated a maximum contaminant level or any other water quality standard. This report is a snapshot of last year's water quality. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies.

Do I need to take special precautions?

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Our water is purchased from the City of Iuka which consists of three wells that draws groundwater from the Paleozoic Aquifer.

Currently, our source water assessment is being prepared by the Mississippi State Department of Health. When it is completed you will be notified and copies will be made available upon request.

Why are there contaminants in my drinking water?

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. control. The trigger is usually some type of physical injury - anything from a seemingly trivial bump, bruise, or cut to more serious damage from a crushing wound, a stab wound, frostbite, or a burn. RSD is defined as a state of constant burning and pain which is severe, incapacitating, and is aggravated by even a breeze or simple touch to the area involved. The pain is accompanied by swelling, inflammation, disturbance of the immune system function, movement disorder and emotional disturbance in the form of insomnia, depression, agitation and irritability.

It is a multi-symptom condition usually affecting one, two or sometimes all four extremities. It can also be in the face, head, shoulders, or back. It spreads in approximately 70% of the patients, from one part of the body to another regardless of where the original injury occurred; usually one leg to the other or one arm to the other. RSD is NOT a psychological disease but rather a very REAL and PAINFUL disorder. Its chief symptom is constant severe burning pain that is rated at a level higher than even Cancer pain. Imagine the pain of having a red-hot poker plunged into your arm or leg. Imagine the INTENSITY of that pain. Now imagine that pain there 24 hours a day, every single day and you get an idea of what someone with RSD has to deal with. RSD is a progressive condition and a very serious diagnosis. Although, there is no present cure, the combination of nerve blocks, physical therapy, and drug therapy often provides relief of its symptoms. Without treatment, RSD can lead to crippling disability.

Anyone can get RSD. There are now an estimated six to seven million men, women, and children across this country with this disease. What makes this disease even more difficult to deal with is the apparent lack of information available. This leads to the patient feeling very confused and alone. 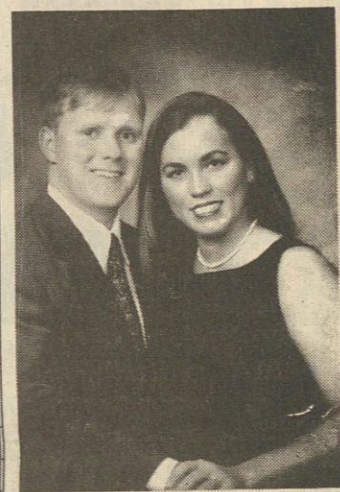

On March 24, 1999, my son was severely burned on his hand with sulfuric acid. He spent about 9 months in aggressive therapy and treatment at the burn center in Memphis, TN.

He has been diagnosed with the terrible disease R.S.D. that begins after a traumatic experience. There is very little known about the treatment of R.S.D. My son is in pain that no one can actually describe. This pain is with him 24 hours a day with, so far, no relief. Nerve blocks and drugs are the only known treatment of R.S.D. R.S.D. has no cure. This is something that R.S.D. patients will live with the rest of their lives. My family and I are trying to let people know what a terrible thing R.S.D. is and what we are all trying to learn to deal with.

expressed my feelings more if I had been the one doing the writing myself.

Iuka Hospital To Offer AARP's "55 Alive" Mature Driving Program

Iuka Hospital will offer 55 Alive, a classroom refresher for experienced motorists age 50 and older, June 29-30 from 1-5 p.m.

This AARP driving course will be held at Iuka Hospital's Education Center, 1777 Curtis Drive, and address the physical changes that affect a person's driving ability and behavior, and ways to compensate for those changes. Topics also include license renewal requirements, local driving problems and rules of the road. The registration fee is \$10, and participants must attend both days of the program.

The mature driving program is an opportunity to help older drivers learn how to handle ad-

verse driving conditions and traffic hazards, as well as the effects of aging and medications on driving. The course teaches the normal age-related changes that interfere with vision, hearing and physical strength that typically influence driving ability and attitudes, as well as the impact of medications and alcohol when driving.

Problems with vision (especially side vision), impaired hearing and slower reaction time often lead to the typical traffic violations committed by older drivers, including failure to yield the right-of-way, improper left turns, incorrect lane passing, and entering and leaving expressways. Course participants learn ways to prevent accidents, as well as proper use and maintenance of a vehicle. Certification may entitle a driver to a reduction in their automobile insurance, and no driv-

ing test is involved.

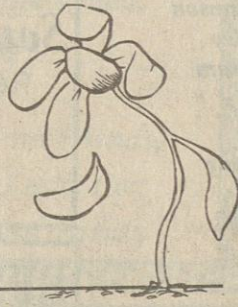



We at Sardis extend a welcoming hand to all who wish to come together in the name of the Lord Jesus. We've been blessed with another week of life and the opportunity that goes with it of spreading God's word and enjoying good fellowship with one another. Verse of the week: "The wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness" (Romans 1:18). Sunday's lesson is about promoting respect for the righteous God who judges sin. (Romans 1:18-25, 2:11, 12, 16).

We tend to focus on God's love or mercy instead of His wrath. This passage shows God's case against all ungodliness and unrighteousness and the world's greatest need is to get right with God. God's wrath does not rise from emotion but from decisive and thoughtful action. It stands against sin and evil, violence and injustice, immorality and corruption. God allows sinners to live as they choose and if they choose sin over Him they become enslaved by that sin and will be judged accordingly.

Proof of the need for Righteousness is in (Romans 1:18-23).
 1 - As sinners, people are the subjects of God's wrath (v. 18). Their appetite is for self alone and

want to live as they choose.

2 - People have rejected the truth that comes from their consciences about God (v. 19). God created every human being with a conscience but they take the truth that is within them and suppress it. When they reject the knowledge of God that is within them, His reveals His wrath.

3 - People have rejected the truth which comes from creation (v. 20).

4 - People do not honor God or thank Him (v. 21). We casually dismiss the ingratitude of children, or the younger generation, but God never does.

5 - People become full of pride and turn away from God (v. 22, 23). They think themselves to be wise, but in so doing they become fools. They make themselves the god of life and master of the world, they have tried to bring God down to their level instead of letting Him lift them up. Some examples of the disrespect shown, are our holiday celebrations: At Easter most people think it is about the Easter bunny. Thanksgiving is called turkey day. Halloween is where creepy things are celebrated. Christmas is where Christ has been replaced by a man called santa. The judgment of God is based on evidence. God treats everyone with fairness and bases

His Judgment on sin and He judges according to the gospel. Final judgment will be based upon what people have done with the gospel.

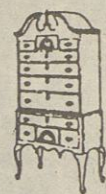

Home Economics Tips

ALL FIRED UP

Next time you fire up your grill, fire up your imagination and create some superb chicken kabobs. They're the ideal way to combine flavors, textures and colors for appetizers, finger foods or a main course.

If you've never cooked kabobs, now is the time to get out the skewers. If you don't have metal skewers, inexpensive bamboo ones are available in most grocery stores. Soak bamboo skewers in water for 30 minutes (before threading the ingredients) to prevent burning.

Begin with boneless, skinless chicken thighs or breasts cut to a uniform size. Marinate these chunks for at least 30 minutes in marinade such as 1/4 cup olive oil, 1 - tablespoon lemon juice and mixed herbs and spices. Always marinate in the refrigerator in a glass or non-metallic bowl or in a zip-top plastic bag. (If you want to use marinade for basting while cooking, set aside a portion of the marinade for that purpose or make a fresh batch. Do not reuse

marinade from uncooked chicken for basting.)

When threading the skewers, alternate the chicken with a variety of fresh, lightly oiled vegetables: zucchini, red, yellow and green peppers, cherry tomatoes, small onions (parboiled for 5 minutes), 1 - inch pieces of corn on the cob (without the husk), eggplant, small potatoes and yellow squash. Or try fresh pineapple chunks for an exotic touch.

Turn your skewers and baste them frequently. Cook 12 to 15 minutes. Serve on a bed of rice, couscous or salad greens.

Experiment with different marinades and vegetable combinations, or offer dipping sauces on the side. The more you try, the more you'll find that chicken kabobs are virtually always great off the grill!!!

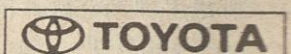

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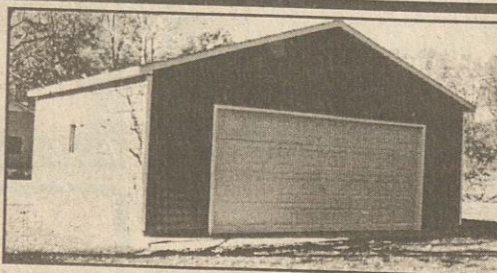
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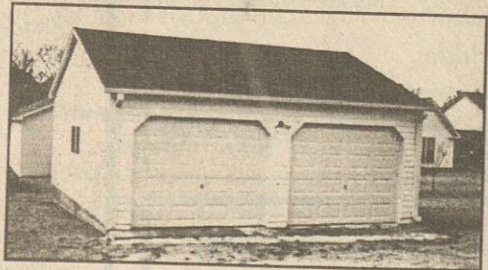

MOVING TO TISHOMINGO COUNTY
Late in the year 1939 at the age of 14, I came with my family to Tishomingo County. I lived in Monroe County near Amory. I attended Becker School. The reason for moving to Tishomingo County

was for my dad to take the job of principal at Central School. Mr. Chandler Oaks, the principal, had been elected county superintendent of education. He was leaving at mid-term and asked daddy to come take his job at Central. Mr. Oaks and daddy had been roommates at Mississippi Southern when they attended college there. At that time Southern was called Miss. State Teachers College.

It was quite a change for my four sisters, two brothers and me. Becker was a full four year high school with indoor plumbing and electricity. A teacher was always present on the playground with each group of children at lunch and recess break.

At Central we had an outdoor toilet, got water from a well and had two classes in each class room and at lunch and recess break, the children just went outside and did anything they wanted to. Some even played in the woods. They did have basket ball for the older children.

We thought we had come to a different country. The people were so different and talked different. For instance, we said, "carry" if you were going to move something from one place to another. People here said, "tote". Another thing I found different was the library. I wanted to know the history of this county. Nobody I talked to could tell me, so I went looking at the library. At that time the library was in a very small building in Jay Bird Park. The only thing I could find was a small pamphlet written by Mrs. McDonald. I later learned this

county has a rich and colorful history.

I did not like it at all when I first came here, but I met and married my husband here. We were married for 59 and 1/2 years. Now, I love this county and the people. It is home! I am so proud of our new library. In fact, I got my education at the library and am still learning from it. You can find out just about anything you want to know from our library.

My husband and I were married at old Tishomingo County Courthouse. At one time, it was called the marrying capitol of the country.

Imogene, thanks for sharing your memories with us. I, too, married in Iuka in 1957. We went up there on Saturday afternoon, not knowing the Courthouse was closed. We called the clerk and someone came over, unlocked the courthouse and sold us the license. Then, we went over to Rev. J. Hardy Holder's house and he married us. Wish it hadn't been so easy!

I would like to thank Maxine Wade for giving me a tape of Dutch Coleman singing and playing his guitar. It brought back memories of Happy Hollow and his unexpected visit to our house. I enjoyed it very much. Maxine, thank you for your thoughtfulness.

Last week, I received a call from a cousin Mike Robinson of North Crossroads. He is trying to find the history of Cole's Mill. As a little girl about 1945, I remember seeing a grinding wheel in the creek by Rabbit and Bertha Arnold's house. We were visiting Rabbit who was my dad's nephew and his daughter Bobbie, who is Mike's mother, showed me the wheel. If anyone knows anything about Cole's Mill, please call me at home or Mildred Curtis at the library. Mike, good luck on your search.

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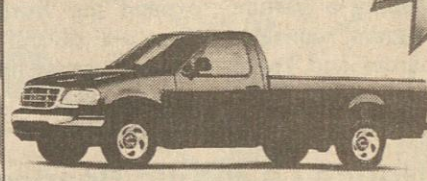
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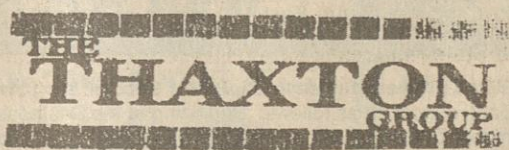


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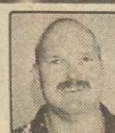

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LEGAL NOTICE
AMENDMENT MADE TO THE CITY OF IUKA ORDINANCE
SECTION 702

By action of the Board of Aldermen and Mayor of the City of Iuka on June 6, 2000 the following amendment was made to the Iuka Zoning Ordinance.

SECTION 702: PARKING AND STORAGE OF CERTAIN VEHICLES AND JUNK

702.01: Junk Vehicles -

Junk Vehicles are prohibited from being located within the city except within completely enclosed buildings or garage at vehicle salvage yards, vehicle repair shops and wrecker services complying with the term of this ordinance.

702.02: Screening of Junkyards -

Within 90 days from the effective date of the ordinance amendment, all existing junkyards, vehicle salvage yards, vehicle repair shops and wrecker services where junk or wrecked vehicles are stored shall be screened from view from adjacent properties by opaque fencing and landscaping. All new vehicle repair shops and wrecker services shall be provided with such screening prior to obtaining a certificate of occupancy.

702.03: Junk -

It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupant of any property within the city to utilize said property for the storage and accumulation of used, discarded or worn out materials or manufactured products, whether reusable or not, including but not limited to appliances, building materials, building rubbish, trash, waste products metal products, used or discarded tires and similar items.

702.04: Certificate of Occupancy -

Prior to a business opening, certificate should be obtained from city to assure that all requirements have been made.

The facility (200 employees) is used to produce composite foam structural components (thermal shield, center body, forward skirt, nose cone) for space launch vehicles (i.e., rockets) manufactured by U.S. aerospace firms. The production process involves heat forming polymethacrylimide ("Rohacell") foam, machining, layering with carbon fiber and adhesives, pressurization/heat curing, and trimming. The only material input purchased from abroad that would be admitted to the proposed subzone in foreign status (19 CFR 164.42 (a)) is polymethacrylimide foam - HTSUS#3921.19.00; duty rate; 6.5% (representing 8% of finished product value).

FTZ procedures would exempt Alliant from Customs duty payments on the foreign polymethacrylimide foam used in export production. On its domestic sales, the company would be able to choose the duty rate that applies to finished composite structures (duty free) for the foreign foam input noted above. The application indicates that subzone status would help improve the plant's international competitiveness.

In accordance with the Board's regulations, a member of the FTZ Staff has been designated examiner to investigate the application and report to the Board.

Developing A Management
Program For Horse Pastures

Pastures for horses should be more than mere exercise lots. High quality pasture can supply enough protein, vitamins, and minerals to meet the nutritional needs of most pleasure horses at relatively low cost. Although pastures furnish substantial amounts of energy, working horses will likely need additional energy supplementation. In addition, pasture will help to maintain healthy animals by furnishing the bulk needed in horse rations, as well as exercise areas, sunshine, and fresh air.

The pasture should be enclosed by a safe, strong fence. Fresh water and shade should also be provided. The pasture should be large enough to encourage normal animal activity and also be free from poisonous plants and obstructions such as holes or rocks which could cause injury.

When developing a pasture management program, consider the present resources and goals.

Determine the acres available for pasture and hay production and the number of animals that this acreage will currently support. Likewise the livestock numbers which either are or will be supported by this acreage should be determined based on intensity of forage/livestock management planned.

It will take from one to five or more acres of summer pasture per animal unit depending on pasture productivity and type of grazing management practiced. Approximately two tons of hay for winter feeding per animal unit are also required. If the land in its present state of productivity will adequately supply the forage for the desired number of livestock, then little beyond annual maintenance may be necessary in pasture or forage improvement. If the land available will not produce sufficient feed for the livestock numbers, or if the desire is to expand the livestock numbers, there are several alternatives to increase pasture productivity.

FSA Farm News

FARM STORAGE FACILITY LOAN PROGRAM

On May 9, 2000, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that USDA will begin making seven-year, low-cost loans to farmers to help build or upgrade commodity storage and handling facilities. The Farm Service Agency (FSA) will implement the program to provide seven-year financing for on-farm storage of wheat, rice, oats, soybeans, corn, grain sorghum, sunflower seed, canola, rapeseed, safflower, flaxseed, mustard seed, crambe, and barley.

Farmers may file loan applications starting on May 30, 2000. Farmers who bought or build facilities between February 2, 2000, and May 30, 2000, may apply for a loan and may be approved if they meet eligibility and loan security requirements.

On May 11, 2000, USDA published Interim regulations for this program in the Federal Register. A 30 day comment period is now in affect and ends June 12, 2000. A copy of these

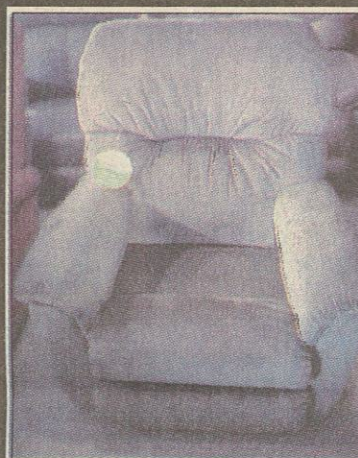

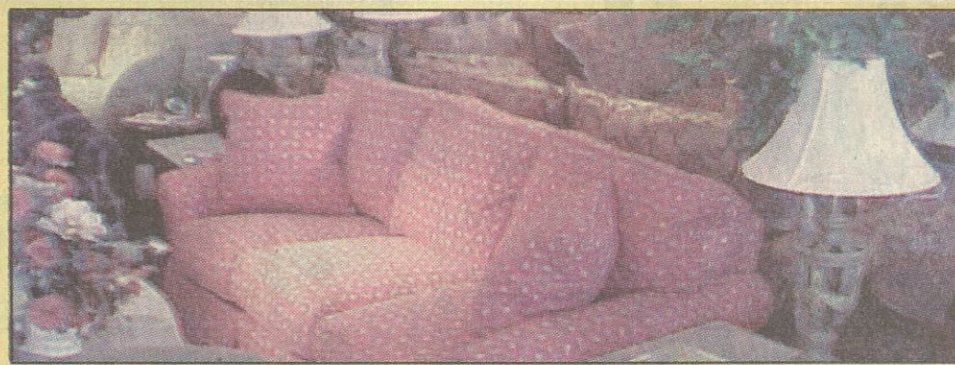

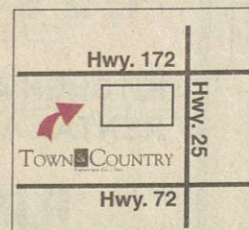
