### One Hospitalized Following Train - Vehicle Collision Sunday

An Iuka man was taken by ambulance to Iuka Hospital Sunday after the vehicle he was driving was struck by a train.

According to Tishomingo County Deputy David Gist, the victim, Julius Guyton Smith, 20, 223 County Road 247, Iuka, was traveling south on County Road 247 (Gravel Pit Rd.) Sunday, July 9, just after 11 a.m. when he came to a rolling stop at the railroad crossing. Gist said reports from the victim's engineer indicated that as the train started across the tracks, Smith saw the oncoming train and apparently froze while still sitting on the tracks.

The Norfolk-Southern train, which was traveling west, struck the 1996 Buick, sending it approximately 60 feet down the tracks, according to the officer.

Deputy Gist said the car rolled over several times and ended upside down in a ditch. Smith, who apparently was not wearing his seatbelt, was thrown from the vehicle, landing approximately 25 feet away.

Gist stated that the incident was reported at approximately 11:33 a.m.

Smith was transported by ambulance to Iuka Hospital. While the full extent of his injuries were not known at press time, a spokesman indicated that he was

to be released from the hospital Tuesday.

Responding to the accident, along with Deputy Gist and Iuka Hospital Ambulance Service, was Chief Deputy Rodney Pannell and members of the Iuka Fire Department.

### C.E.P.A. Taking Nominations For Board of Directors

In accordance with the Bylaws of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association, nominations for positions on the Board of Directors are now being accepted. There will be five positions open for election. The director is to be elected for a three (3) year term for each of the following supervisors' districts: 1st district, 2nd district, 4th district, 5th district and an area-at-large position.

Members of the Association may make nominations by either of the following methods:

1. By petition bearing the signature of at least fifteen (15) members. Petitions must be received by the Secretary of the Board of Directors at least seven (7) days prior to the day of the Annual Meeting. Petitions may be presented for qualification at the Main Office of the Association during regular business hours, Monday thru Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

2. From the floor of the Annual Meeting to be held August 12, 2000. The By-laws require that five (5) percent of the membership be physically present in order that nominations may be made from the floor.

Nominees must be residents of the supervisors' districts which they will represent. Any member, regardless of place of residence, may be nominated for the area-at-large position; provided, that the nominees for the at-large position may not be residents of the 4th or 5th supervisors' districts. These districts presently have a resident serving an at-large position.

### School Board Increases Budget by Over \$2 Million - Taxes Will Go Up

Board Voted Monday To Accept New Budget Proposal

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles on county budgets. Look for more on the School Board budget in next week's edition.)

While everyone agrees that education is important, the latest budget increase by the Tishomingo County Board of Education has many area residents—especially local small-business owners—wondering if some of the fat from the budget could have been trimmed in order to prevent the tax increase the budget will cause.

After an overall increase of over \$1 million to the school district's budget last year, the Board voted unanimously Monday night to add more than \$2.5 million to the budget for the next fiscal year.

The new projected budget for the Tishomingo County School District—for fiscal year 2000-2001—has total projected expenditures of \$19,594,046 and total projected revenues of \$18,266,606. Of that amount, approximately 25 percent—or \$4,584,447—will come from local tax money, according to a handout presented to those attending a budget proposal meeting held June 29 by members of the school

board, financial director Bobbie White and Superintendent John Mullins.

While the handout outlined many worthwhile projects in progress in the district and also several other projects and hiring of personnel, several area businessmen commented that maybe the board needs to tighten its belt, or hold off on certain projects until other state and/or federal money is freed up.

"I think all the local business owners will agree that we have an abundance of taxes already levied," one business owner stated. "And while we are pro-education, we just feel that maybe the Board should be more efficient in the management of the operating funds they have and make do until other funding is available."

"As a business owner, you are always needing to make improvements, but you have to learn to live within your means—I would think that when you are spending taxpayers' money, you would need to be even more sensitive to your spending."

According to Tishomingo County Board of Supervisor's President Danny Ryan, the in-

crease proposed by the School District can be made without having to have any approval by his board.

"Under the current laws, the School Board can increase their yearly budget up to 4 percent without having to have it approved or voted on by the public," Ryan said.

Presently, of Tishomingo County's 71 mills of ad valorem taxes (taxes from land, car tags, etc.), the school district is receiving 39 mills. In other words, about 56 percent of all local tax money is used by the school district.

Under the new proposed school district budget, an increase of approximately 2 mills will go into effect. This means that 73 mills will have to be levied, with 41.6 of those going to the school district.

In the past, Ryan explained that the Board of Supervisors has been able to absorb the increases in the school district's budget without going up on taxes; however, with this maximum increase this year, there is no way that this can be done.

### Sheriff David Smith Warns Tishomingo County Residents About Recent Scams

Tishomingo County residents are being warned about some recent scams which have been reported to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith said that several calls had been made to his office concerning one telephone scam being done recently. Apparently, the person being called was told that they had just been chosen as the winner of a new car and that they should send \$200 for their plane ticket and then they would be flown to California where they will be awarded their car by a famous TV personality.

Another phone scam which the Sheriff warns about is a phone campaign soliciting donations for the National Highway Patrol Association.

"There is no such organization," Smith said. "If any organization calls asking you to send donations, get as much information from the person calling as you can—ask them to send you information in the mail. Before you send any money, you can call us and we'll check it out and make sure it is legitimate."

In addition to phone scams,

some scams are attempted by people who come to your home. The Sheriff explained that a few months ago he received reports that some individuals were going around to houses, targeting mostly the elderly, and telling them they needed to measure their houses for the Social Security Administration.

"Usually they worked in pairs. One would get the resident to hold one end of the tape measure for them while the other would go through the resident's house looking for money and valuables," Smith explained.

Just in the last week, Sheriff Smith indicated that some calls came in from some residents of elderly apartments in the county reporting that an individual came to their door asking to use their bathroom and phone. After the individual left, the residents realized that the subject had gone through their medicine cabinets looking for any prescriptions they might have had.

"The best thing to remember is 'do not let anyone you do not know come into your home,'" Smith warned. "Also, if a deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

In an attempt to prevent crimes such as this from striking county residents, Sheriff Smith has initiated a program which educates the public about potential scams and other crimes aimed at the public, especially the elderly.

"We just recently held a meeting at the courthouse for those aged 55 and older warning about crimes such as scams—how to recognize them and prevent being a victim," Smith said. "This program, sponsored by the Tishomingo County Triad, was attended by over 40 county residents. They were given tips on crime prevention—with one of the many things being how to avoid being scammed."

Smith explained that another meeting for residents is being scheduled for July 25. While the meeting will be aimed at those age 55 and older, anyone who would like crime prevention tips may attend, Smith said.

"It is our goal, with programs such as this, to have residents who are educated to the tactics used by scam artists and other criminals," Smith said. "If you know what to look for, it is very unlikely that you will be fooled by these individuals."

A time capsule is going to be buried in Mineral Springs Park on Heritage Day September 23rd, 2000. The capsule will be opened in the year 2050 AD. In the capsule there will be placed various documents and publications concerning what is happening in Iuka today.

At a later date, soon after Heritage Day, a video tape of that day and of our town will be buried also.

One of the publications put into the capsule will be a copy of a magazine now being put together. The magazine will have a lot of the history of the "American Native Indians" who lived here at one time and are a great part of our heritage.

This publication will also contain ads that are being sold by Iuka Civitan Club. By selling these ads the magazine and other needs can be financed.

You can have a healthy smile that will last a lifetime with proper care. This means thorough daily brushing, cleaning between teeth and regular checkups to avoid tooth decay and periodontal diseases. Most people know that tooth decay can result in tooth loss if not treated. **But for adults, it is gum diseases that are a major cause of tooth loss.**

"Periodontal" comes from two Greek words that mean "around the tooth." Healthy gum tissue and bone form the supporting foundation of each tooth. Periodontal diseases or what many people call "pyrea" are caused by bacterial infections that attack gums, ligaments and bone. Although the body has some natural defenses that resist bacterial attacks, these may not fully protect gum and bone tissues from inflammation and infection.

There are several kinds of periodontal disease. Often painless, these diseases may develop slowly or progress quite rapidly and they can occur at any age. Unless you have regular dental checkups, including a periodontal exam, you may not be aware you have a problem until your gums and bone have been seriously compromised.

If you notice any of the following signs, see your dentist immediately:

- \*gums that bleed easily;
- \*red, swollen or tender gums;
- \*gums that have pulled away from the teeth
- \*pus between the teeth and gums when the gums are pressed;
- \*persistent bad breath or bad taste;
- \*permanent teeth that are loose or separating;
- \*any change in the way your teeth fit together when you bite;
- \*any changes in the fit of partial dentures.

It is possible to have periodontal disease and not have warning signs. That is why regular dental checkups and periodontal examinations are important.

Some factors can increase your risk of developing periodontal disease such as smoking, chewing tobacco, clenching or grinding your teeth. Poor diet may cause the disease to progress more rapidly or increase the severity of the condition. Pregnancy or use of oral contraceptives increase hormone levels which can cause gum tissue to be more sensitive to the toxins in plaque and accelerate growth of some bacteria. The gums are more likely to become red, tender and swollen and bleed easily.

Some conditions such as diabetes can lower resistance to infection making periodontal disease more severe.

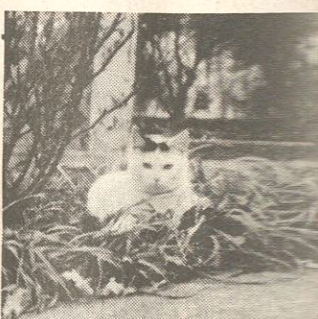

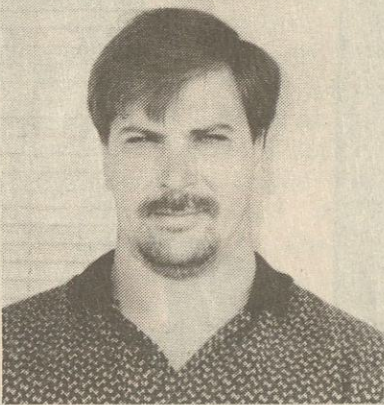
## Thompson-Davis To Wed July 22nd

Sue King, Class of '58, lived down the street from us at the time. She taught me to predict my love life by stepping on trashed Lucky Strike packs. (When you counted number 21 with the official "stomp," the next boy you'd see would be your true love.) We must have counted thousands, trying to make it come out right.

By the time we'd reached our senior year, we were bonding in other ways with classmates. We fought over square class rings vs. round class rings and were refused

a class trip to Florida.

During play practice one night, I was one of the pack who helped egg-on the movers of Ellet Junior Allen's Renault Dauphine. They put the car on the porch of Howard Memorial Auditorium.

Sounds dull by today's standards, but it wasn't. We had the grandest old two-story brick school building, plus Eastport, Mill Creek, Indian Creek, Bear Creek, the gravel pit and a jillion places for fishing, exploring, swimming and water skiing; the chalk mine, the fire tower, the summer portable skating rink, stealing watermelons.

Oops, a food word.

Back to reality and Plan B:

Pack the fat clothes. I can't wait to see everybody.

## New Fetal Surgical Procedure Gives Hope To Tishomingo County Couple

### Nashville Doctors Perform Surgery On Unborn Infant

The life of Tishomingo couple Shannon and Heather Edmondson was changed forever recently, when what seemed like a hopeless situation was altered thanks to a new surgical procedure.

Like any couple, Shannon and Heather were ecstatic when learning that they were going to have a baby. During the fourth month of pregnancy, a second routine ultrasound was done on Heather. Obstetricians from Jackson, Miss. reviewed the x-rays and reported that the baby was a girl and that she suffered from hydrocephalus—an abnormal amount of fluid around the brain—and Spina Bifida—an open area in the spine. The doctors said the defects were severe and advised the couple to abort the pregnancy before the 22nd week.

What had been a happy occasion for the couple and their families had suddenly turned into a nightmare. After learning of their baby's condition, Shannon began searching the Internet for any information he could find about Spina Bifida. Miraculously, that same week, People Magazine published an article about an innovative new fetal surgery being done to close the opening in the baby's back prior to birth. This surgery was being done at Vanderbilt Hospital in Nashville, Tenn. by Dr. Joseph Brunner and Dr. Noel Tulipan.

Without a lot of expectations, Shannon e-mailed

Dr. Brunner for information about the surgery while Heather made calls to their clinic.

On that Friday night, at 10 p.m., Dr. Brunner called Shannon and Heather's home and talked with them at length about the fetal surgery. He explained that it was not a cure for Spina Bifida, but it does allow closure of the baby's back prior to birth. It also helps keep the baby from having to have a shunt placed in their head to drain off excess fluid. An appointment was made to see him the following week.

After having physical tests, meeting with psychiatrists and an ethics board, the decision was made to proceed with the surgery.

It was a very emotional time for Shannon and Heather. Having this surgery in hopes of helping their baby could ultimately cause them to loose her all together. Even though the tests done at Nashville showed that the baby's condition was not as severe as first reported by the doctors in Jackson, there was always a chance of causing a miscarriage.

On May 31, Heather's surgery was performed at Vanderbilt. It lasted 21 hours and 10 minutes, during which time an incision was made in the bottom of her abdomen, her uterus was gently removed, the fluid around the baby was suctioned out and placed in a warming vat. A three inch incision was made in the uterus. The lesion on the infant's back was found and closed with thread the size of a hair and a

microscope was used. minutes. At this time, abnormalities were noted. Amniotic fluid was placed in the uterus and the uterine incision was closed.

Heather was discharged from the hospital four days later and returned home. She has a small catheter in her back which gives her medication every four hours to help with contractions. She takes a pain killer to help her sleep faster because she will be premature. Heather also has a monitor for one hour each morning and night that shows any contractions she may have.

Heather has been able to go back to work at Tishomingo Medical Center in Tupelo where she is a teacher at Middle School.

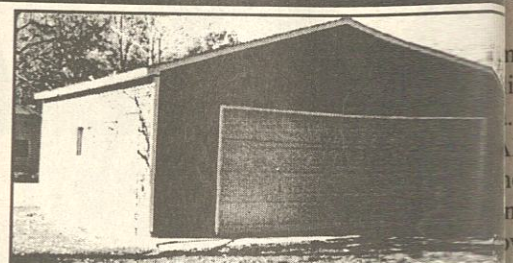

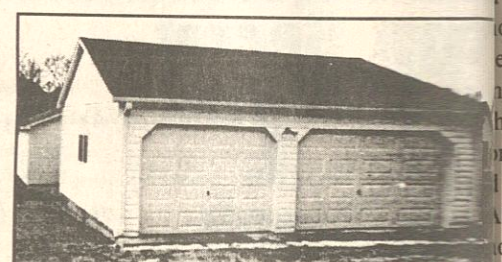

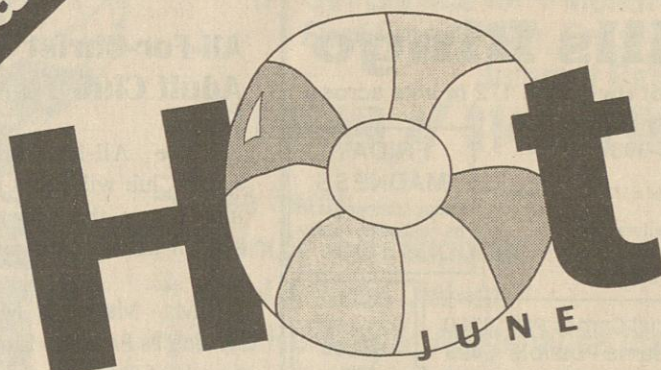

## Local Soldier As Member of "Blackhorse Regiment"

Another hazy morning dawns on the high desert as an American armor brigade warily rolls its tanks into the hostile Mojave. Soldiers anxiously scan the horizon for a sign of their enemy - the notorious "Blackhorse Regiment," renowned for being tenacious and unbeatable.

As the brigade makes its way uneasily across the desolate desert floor, the son of the luka couple waits calmly in ambush, confident he can take on the best America's Army has to offer.

While most soldiers rarely make it into a high-intensity conflict, Army Pvt. Jason A. Whitaker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy G. Whitaker, 108 County Road 248, Iuka, goes into battle 10 to 12 times a year as a member of the opposing force at the National Training Center here.

Whitaker is a member of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, nicknamed the Blackhorses. He and his colleagues make up the enemy force faced by units from throughout the Army in one of the biggest, most realistic war games in the world.

"I'm an armor crew member and I'm currently a driver on a Sheridan tank as part of the opposing force here," explained Whitaker.

To train America's Army for future conflicts, the National Training Center here undergoes a monthly transformation into the fictitious country of Mojavia. Whitaker becomes a Krasnovian soldier in the 60th Guards Motorized Rifle Division that has invaded the small desert nation. It's the opposing force's job to provide a hostile, highly trained force capable of combating more than 70,000 active-duty, National Guard and Reserve soldiers who go through the training rotations each year.

To provide a realistic training environment, Blackhorse soldiers wear a special desert camouflage uniform and operate Sheridan tanks and armored personnel carriers modified to look like Soviet-made equipment. Civilian protesters, terrorists and guerilla

forces round out the war game scenario and provide an extra sense of realism for soldiers testing their mettle against the rugged desert terrain.

"This assignment is unique for me because the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment was my father's first duty station as well as mine,"

Whitaker said. "I enjoyed being in Fulda, Germany when my father was a first sergeant with the 11th Armored Cavalry regiment."

The soldiers of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment carry on a proud history that includes meritorious service in the Vietnam War and the last mounted cavalry charge while pursuing Francisco "Pancho" Villa in Mexico in 1916.

Being a part of one of the most storied Army units in

existence is just one of the advantages Whitaker has being stationed in the Southern California desert. The opportunity to take on the Army's best combat units year round makes him one of the most highly-trained, battle-savvy soldiers in the world.

"Being stationed here has enhanced my abilities tracked vehicle driver, and improved my advanced land navigation skills," Whitaker said.

As long as the Army's war against Krasnovians in the desert of Mojavia rages on, soldiers like Whitaker will make sure that before U.S. troops face a real enemy, they've already faced their toughest opponent - the Blackhorse.

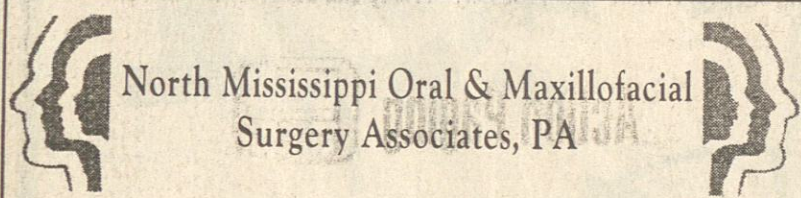

farm equipment next to cemetery. To the right of the equipment is a small rise and the graves are at the top. Luallan and Sarah Patrick are buried there, and also a son and several others. Frank Henry lives at the next house on right. He owns the land all around the graves. His land is the land that Luallan owned and he is a descendent from Sarah, Luallan's second wife. My line is from 1st wife Demsey Abney who died June 1843 in Tishomingo County. The markers are as follows:

Luallan Patrick, June 15, 1800 to August 25, 1872 Sarah wife of Luallan Patrick August 16, 1884 to April 11, 1909 (Something is wrong with these dates. It shows Sarah being born 12 years after Luallan died. jb)

Wanda goes on to say that Lewellyn Patrick was my great-great grandfather. The birth date and spelling of his name on marker are wrong. He was born March 4, 1796 in Edgefield, S.C. His daughter Elender Susanna married Vincent Allan Tharp Smith and had my grandmother Fannie Patrick Smith who married Josiah Young Brackeen.

From the Vidette, August 9, 1894:

Married near Mt. Patrick School House, on last Sunday, Miss Mamie Davis to Mr. Charlie Akers. The ceremony was performed by Supervisor Lemuel P. Bonds. The marriage was somewhat unexpected and jumped up on short notice. The Vidette wishes them much happiness.

August 30, 1894:

General J.Z. George joined his wife this week at the Bishop Inn and is spending a few days at the Springs drinking mineral water.

October 11, 1894:

Mr. John Hudson, who lives 7 1/2 miles north of Iuka has a very painful hand which has swollen to enormous size. He stuck a splinter in it several days ago and it became so serious that he had it operated on last Tuesday by Dr. J.F. Alexander.

Mr. Wesley Busby who lives 10 miles north of Iuka was in town last week and had Drs. Carmack and Alexander operate upon a very painful cancerous tumor which was formed on the back of his neck.

While people joke about sin by saying things like, "The devil made me do it," it is really our choice whether we want to be like Jesus or His opposite. The truth about sin is that its wages are death. One of the ways God has revealed Himself is in our consciences which is woven into the very fabric of our creation, and the Bible says that He has written His law upon our hearts.

We had several visitors Sunday and we enjoyed studying God's word. We hope to see everyone next week.

We continue to pray for our nation, state, community and church. There has been sadness in our community, the Kenaum family and the Malone family have recently lost a loved one and need our prayers.

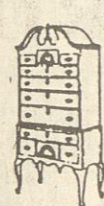

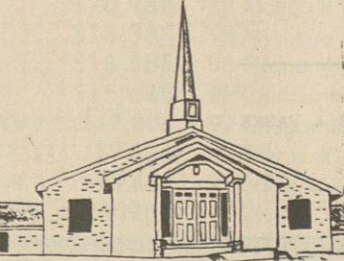

# Conservation Corner

Mississippi's Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks, the Commission that sets our hunting and fishing seasons, oversees our state lakes, wildlife management areas and parks and constructs boat ramps for public use to name a few, is getting a new commissioner.

Reggie Barnes, 47, of Webb, is the superintendent of the West Tallahatchie School District, which is a position he has held for the past six years. Barnes is also a graduate of, and former Dean at

Delta State University.

Barnes is the first appointee by Governor Ronnie Musgrove to the Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks. Other commissioners include Ed Roberts of Oxford (representing the 1st Congressional District), Billy Powell of Brandon (representing the 3rd Congressional District ), Bill Pittman of Columbia (representing the 4th Congressional District) and Chip McArthur of Hattiesburg

(representing the 5th Congressional District).

Barnes faces confirmation by the Mississippi Senate, but will serve until its next session.

Barnes brings much experience and interest in fish and wildlife resources to the Commission. Like myself, he is an avid deer hunter. He also enjoys rabbit hunting and fishes when he has time, which is something I can relate to! According to Barnes, "People who don't hunt and fish simply do not realize how outstanding

Mississippi's fish and wildlife resources are."

One very beneficial attribute that Barnes brings to the

Commission is his background in education. In the early 1930's, the old Mississippi Game and Fish Commission considered education essential to their goal to recover our wildlife populations.

Seventy years later, public education continues to be a vital role in the agency's mission. Mississippi's Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks oversees several programs, including Hunter Education, Boating Education, Project Wild

and one of the finest museums in the country, the Mississippi Museum of natural Science, all with a mission of public education.

Although the times have changed and Mississippi's landscape looks much different, public education is much more needed. Barnes's experience with young people, who are the future leaders in our state, will aid the Commission greatly in recruiting more interest in hunting, fishing

and wildlife viewing. Hunt education, the need to improve environment, especially restore our native habitats, and recruit our youth will place a greater demand on the talents of this new Commissioner.

DOVE FIELD: Dove hunting allowed only on Saturdays at designated field(s). Remainder of area open daily throughout season.

WATERFOWL: All man-made impoundment areas, where waterfowl hunting is allowed, will be open on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays from one-half hour before sunrise until 12:00 noon. No waterfowl hunting allowed from river mile marker 360.8 south to Aberdeen Lock and Dam. The remainder of Canal Section WMA may be hunted each day from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

PERMITS: All visitors must obtain a daily use permit from one of the self-service permit stations. This permit must be legibly filled out by each user and kept on the person of the visitor while on the area. Before leaving the area, visitors must complete the reverse side of the permit and deposit it in the drop box at one of the permit stations. Permits are invalid if not properly dated or if date has been changed.

GUNS: Centerfire rifles, shotguns with slugs, primitive weapons and centerfire handguns may be used during deer gun seasons only. When hunting deer with a handgun, no other gun may be in possession. Magnifying scopes (greater than 1X) are not allowed for deer hunting in the primitive weapon areas. Maximum legal weapons for small game are shotguns using #4 shot or smaller and rifles no larger than .22 caliber rimfire magnum.

DOGS: No dogs for deer hunting.

HOGS: Persons hunting hogs during gun seasons for deer must wear, in full view, a minimum of 500 square inches of continuous, unbroken hunter orange.

VEHICLES: Vehicles allowed only on roads shown on map unless closed by gates, cables or signs. Do not block any gate or road entrance.

CAMPING: No camping allowed.

HORSES: Horseback riding is prohibited on the area except on hard surface roads from March 1 to August 31. No hunting from horses.

CAPTURE and removal of live animals from the area is prohibited.

HANDICAPPED ACCESS: The designated area for special access is all land from Hwy. 6 south to Hwy. 278 between Town Creek and the old Tombigbee River included in the Canal Section WMA. Persons eligible to hunt on Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks handicapped access hunting areas are those who meet criteria specified in Public Notice 3518. Call or write the Holcut Office for permit and additional information.

FIRES: No fires allowed on the area.

TITLE 36-CFR REGULATIONS, a summary of Federal regulations that apply to Corps of Engineers property, will be enforced on Canal Section WMA. A copy of these regulations is available from the Holcut Office upon request.

CLOSED AREAS: Only primitive weapons may be used for deer hunting on those areas between the old Tombigbee River and the Tenn-Tom Waterway: (1) from Walker's Levee Road south to old Hwy. 78, (2) from the Ironwood Bluff Road south to the intersection of the old Tombigbee River and Tenn-Tom Waterway and (3) from Hwy. 45/25 south to the southern end of the Hickleson Lake Cut-off (river mile marker 351.7). Archery hunting only for deer from river mile marker 360.8 south to Hwy. 45/25 at Aberdeen. No deer hunting from Tenn-Tom Waterway Levee. Deer may be hunted between the Tenn-Tom Waterway and the waterway levee with archery equipment only.

NIGHT HUNTING: Night hunting only for raccoon, opossum and bobcat. Hours are one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise.

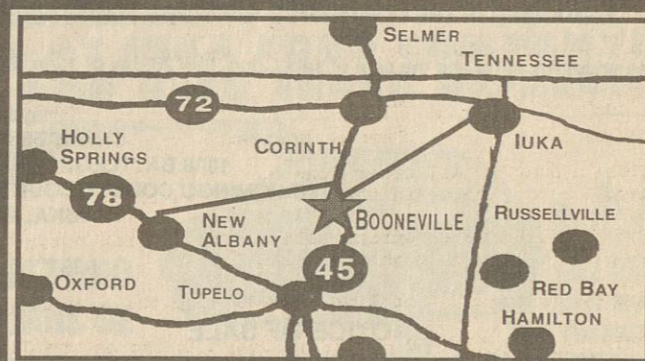

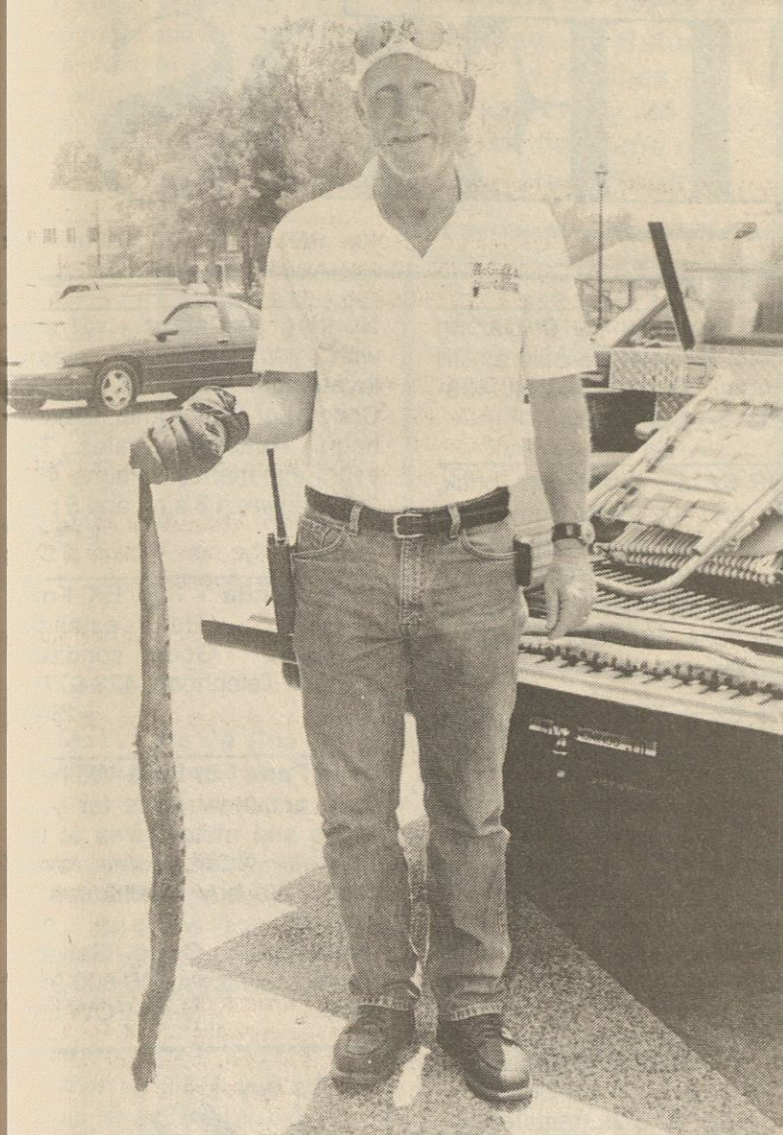

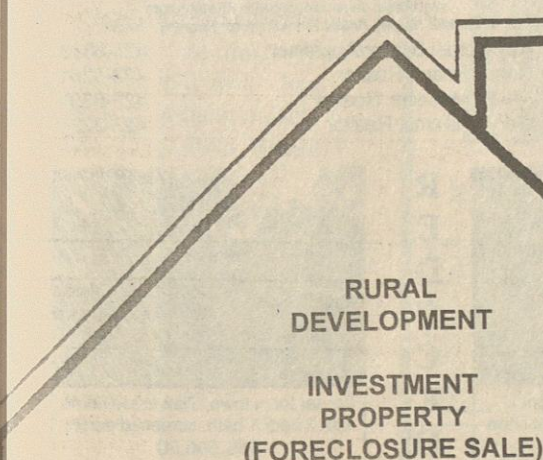
**Clipping**  
Pasture often can be expanded and production potential increased with only brush and weed control. In many areas brush and weeds have encroached into pasture land, and "bush-hogging" or clipping may be the first step in pasture improvement. This is also a good time to eradicate such vigorous weeds as - Canada thistle, tall ironweed and multiflora rose. A combination of clipping and herbicide treatment may be needed to control such species.

**Rotational Grazing**  
Rotational grazing of pastures is necessary for maintaining stands of the productive forage species. Rotational grazing results in improved utilization of what is

grown, by reducing selective grazing, animal tramping and waste.

Rotational grazing simply involves dividing the pasture into several areas; usually three to six are sufficient. Graze each area to no closer than two inches, then rotate the livestock to the next area. A recovery period of 30-35 days is desirable before the field is again grazed. Intensive or rotational grazing systems are based on short grazing intervals of part of a day or up to 3-4 days per paddock or grazing area.

During periods of heavy growth some areas may be harvested and the forage stored or stockpiled for winter use or for supplemental feed during the later part of summer.

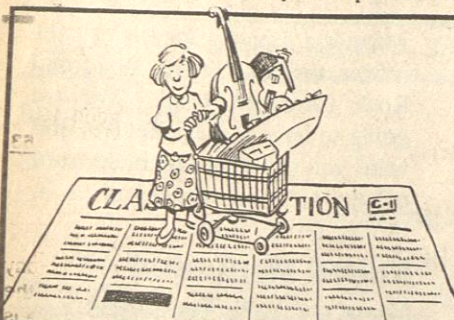

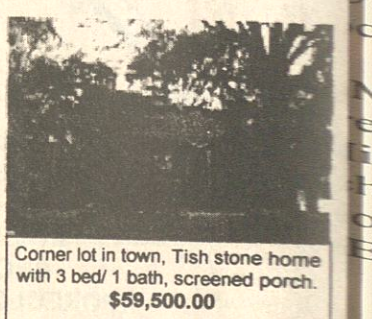

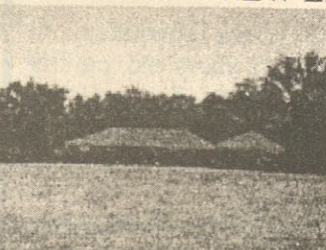
