Filling the position as principal of Iuka Elementary following the retirement of Charles Evans, is Nancy B. Parker of Cherokee, Ala.





### Warrant Round-Up By Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department

If you have an outstanding warrant in Tishomingo County, you better take care of it or be prepared to be locked up.

This is the message being sent out by Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Sheriff Smith stated that his department has many warrants on file at this time which need to be taken care of. He said that if you are aware that a warrant has been issued against you or you owe an old fine, or did not show up for your assigned court date, you need to take care of it before August 18 or be prepared to be picked up by authorities.

In addition to warrants

issued by the county, Smith said his department will work with the city police departments throughout the county to assist them in rounding up those they have warrants on, as well.

"The best thing to do, if you know you have a warrant issued against you is to go to the courthouse to the Justice Court office or to the Sheriff's office and take care of it," Sheriff Smith said.

"We will have our deputies out in full-force, and will be working hand-in-hand with our local police departments and constables, to bring in the individuals we have warrants on," Smith said.

## Conservation Corner

The Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Foundation has voiced support for the efforts of U.S. Senators Thad Cochran and Trent Lott that resulted in funding of 100,000 acres for the Wetland Reserve Program (WRP) and funding for the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP).


The combined efforts of Senators Cochran and Lott that "rescued" both the Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) and the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) drew praise from the Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

According to Peyton Self, President of the conservation organization, "Senator Cochran's and Senator Lott's efforts have rescued the nation's two largest fish and wildlife incentive

programs from being zeroed-out in the appropriations process. We are very blessed to have Senator Cochran and Senator Lott in Washington to provide the leadership to make sure we have sound conservation programs. They are to be strongly commended for their efforts to fund these two conservation programs."

Cochran and Lott teamed together and authored an amendment to the Agriculture Appropriations Bill that provided funding for an additional 100,000 acres of WRP and funding for WHIP.

WRP is one of the landmark environmental steps in the 1990 Farm Bill. It is a voluntary program that offers incentives to landowners to restore bottomland

hardwoods and shallow water areas for wildlife. Mississippi, which ranks second in the nation in WRP enrollment, has restored over 89,000 acres since 1990.

WHIP is a voluntary program which was authorized in the 1996 Farm Bill and was authored by Senator Cochran. WHIP will help provide cover, nesting and brood rearing habitat for species like wild turkey and quail. The program can also improve aquatic habitats and establish much needed early water for waterfowl and shorebirds. WHIP can also create small openings in forest stands. Mississippi ranks second in the nation in WHIP enrollment. This funding for WHIP will develop habitat on over 650,000 acres.

Upon the passing of the amended Bill, Senator Cochran said, "These conservation funds provide technical assistance and cost-sharing for programs which help landowners protect our valuable natural resources. I am particularly pleased that the Senate approved additional acreage enrollments in the Wetlands Reserve Program and funds for the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program."

According to Senator Lott, "I am pleased to join Senator Cochran in supporting the WHIP and WRP portion of the Agriculture Appropriations Bill. These cost-effective programs are important in preserving Mississippi's wildlife resources."

## Home Economics Tips

### DISHWASHER DUTY

Sometimes - and usually when you least expect it - items come out of the dishwasher looking a little different. And, we don't mean clean! We may have a solution. All you need to know is the answer to this question:

### WHAT ITEMS ARE SAFE TO WASH IN THE DISHWASHER?

Check the manufacturer's instructions. Almost all items are marked "dishwasher safe" if they can be safely washed in your dishwasher.

Utensils

For silverware and other

utensils, never mix metals. Position items in the silverware basket so stainless, silver plate or sterling don't touch. Electrolytic action between silver plate and stainless still can cause pitting of the metal - and this damage is permanent.

### WHAT ABOUT PLASTIC CONTAINERS?

Plastic items marked "dishwasher safe" fare best in the upper racks of your dishwasher. Keep plastic items away from the heating element under the bottom rack.

### ...POTS AND PANS?

Aluminum items can darken due to minerals in the water and alkalinity of the detergent. Cast iron utensils will lose their "seasoned" finish and rusting can result. Pewter or pewter-like

materials may streak, discolor or pit.

### FREEZER


A full upright or chest freezer will keep everything frozen for about two days. A half-full freezer will keep food frozen one day.

Keep the door shut as much as possible to help the food last longer. If power will be off for an extended period, take food to a friend's freezer, locate a commercial freezer or use dry ice. **REFRIGERATOR-FREEZER**

The refrigerator section will keep food cold for four to six hours depending on the kitchen temperature.

A full-well functioning freezer unit should keep food frozen for two days. A half-full freezer unit should keep things frozen about a day.

Block ice can keep food on the refrigerator shelves cooler. Dry ice can be added to the freezer unit. Follow handling instructions carefully. You shouldn't touch dry ice or breathe the fumes.

### Periodic Eye Exam

Many people incorrectly assume that 20/20 vision means a clean bill of health for your eyes and indicates perfect vision. What 20/20 means is that a person can see at 20 feet what is normally seen at that distance. It does not mean that a person's eyes function efficiently at other distances or in other ways.

You can assure early detection and proper treatment of eye problems by scheduling periodic examinations with a doctor of optometry.

An examination of the exterior and interior of the eyes is performed to look for signs of specific conditions or diseases. A series of tests can be administered to determine your visual acuity, detect vision problems, assess eye coordination, eye muscle control, and check your perception and field of vision. In addition, for adults over thirty-five, a test for glaucoma is a precautionary measure.



### Solving the "Sensitive Teeth" Problem

Sensitivity can be caused by a number of different things, such as eating ice cream, drinking hot coffee or brushing your teeth too hard. It may also mean that you have hypersensitive (excessively sensitive) teeth. We can determine the cause and any underlying dental problems, such as a cavity, tooth grinding, degenerating nerve, a fractured tooth or toothbrush abrasion.

Hypersensitivity is common and usually results when the dentin, the tooth layer beneath the enamel, is exposed. Microscopic tubules found in dentin are open to such irritations as cold or acidic foods. Overbrushing or constant grinding thins the enamel and is responsible for the sensitivity.


Hypersensitivity decreases or disappears in life as the tubules are sealed. Desensitizing toothpastes contain compounds such as strontium chloride which seals the tubules or potassium nitrate which appears to block transmission of pain through nerves. These toothpastes usually used for a limited time generally require a number of applications before they are effective. Ask our office for their use.

The dentin tubules can be covered by sealants (materials that are painted on tooth surface) and resins (colored restorative materials). Fluoride treatments can reduce or eliminate sensitivity.

## Remembering Mr. and Mrs. Evans

My hometown is Iuka. I've lived in Tupelo for ten years so the lines have clouded between home and hometown. I do keep up with Iuka and Tishomingo County by reading my parents' copy of the Vidette. It is almost a religious experience to sit up until I have read all of the copies that they have saved for me. I have noticed that the longer that I am away, the fewer people and events that I am familiar with. I have to admit that it is a very strange feeling when your school is no longer in existence, your parents no longer live in your childhood home, the highway goes through what used to be the back roads and most of your favorite teachers have retired. The latter is what has prompted me to write. I read that Wanda and Charles Evans are retiring.

I was not a student of Mrs. Evans but I have known her most of my life. I was in the band with her son Chris and have spent many cold or hot nights with the family cheering on the Chieftains. The Evans's were consummate band boosters. They sold drinks, made cupcakes, Rice Krispy treats and battled the crowds at many athletic events. The tireless dedication that Mrs. Evans showed helped the band that Chris was a member of to buy new uniforms. Unfortunately, it took a few years after Chris had graduated to buy them. Uniforms are expensive and it took a lot of those Rice Krispy treats! I was a senior in 1985, the year that we wore those new uniforms for the first time. They were the first new uniforms that the band had gotten in many years. I would like to thank Mrs. Evans for the pride that I felt the first time I wore one of those uniforms. I know a lot of effort went into the purchase of them. Others deserve a lot of credit as well, but they're not retiring!

The experience that I have had with Mr. Evans is really what I want to share. I was never in the office for being in trouble, any of the trouble I made was taken care of in the classroom. I have been reminded of this over the years by Mr. Evans' laughter as he has said, "Anna, still talking as usual, I

see." It has always made me feel good to know that a man who has seen hundreds of young people in every stage of development and growth remembers me, even if it is for my big mouth. At least that is why I think he remembers.

When I was a student at Iuka Elementary, some hundred or more years ago, it was common for me to stay at home for ten or fifteen minutes alone before the bus came. Back then, I was safe and my parents knew that I would only be alone for a short period of time. Every morning my father said, "Don't miss the bus and don't forget to turn everything off." Well, as was always the case, I wandered off. I don't remember if it was a mental or a physical wandering. This particular morning, I didn't get back to where I was supposed to be until after the bus was gone. I knew that my parents would kill me and I would rather do almost anything than to admit to my father that I had not gone to school. I guess I did do almost anything! I called Mr. Evans at school. I told Mrs. Carpenter, who was the school secretary, who I was and that I needed Mr. Evans. She let me talk to him. I know now what a big deal it must have been for her to let me talk to him. Unbeknownst to me, principals are busy people with more to do than talk to distraught students. As a teacher myself, I also know that talking to distraught students is their most important job. Mr. Evans showed me that all those years ago. He spoke to me, calmed me down and sent Joe Patrick, the custodian, to come get me. I wasn't absent that day after all. And unless my mother has betrayed me, this is the first my father has heard of it. Thanks Mr. Evans, you stopped my sixth grade world from coming to an end!

My name is Anna White and it is with pride that I tell this embarrassing story. You see, not only did Mr. Evans keep me safe he also employed the best teachers in the world! Without going to Iuka Elementary and having Charles Evans for a principal, my life would have forever missed Mrs. Katie Mae Grisham with her

black lace up shoes and Mrs. Bobbie Finch and "Hot Pink!" As I have mentioned, I am a teacher. I teach the first grade and every time that I see a student learn to read I am reminded that Mrs. Grisham taught my daddy to read and my mama to multiply. She was also my fifth grade teacher and without Mr. Evans being at Iuka, I might not have been able to share this legacy with my parents. The day that Mr. Evans' son Chris wrote an article about Mrs. Finch, I chastised him for giving away her rabbit with a log secret. You see, we were told that she would take that preposition "rule" to her grave. I learned that she had given Chris permission, which helped a little, even though I still feel like he betrayed a sacred oath! Had Mr. Evans not employed Mrs. Finch I might never have been able to learn that over and under are both prepositions because a rabbit can go over and under a log.

When my students are rowdy, I often wonder, "Now which ones of his fingers did he hold up to call order?" The time that there was a solar eclipse is one of the times that I remember his using that signal. We had all been warned repeatedly not to look directly into the sun. We were reminded to settle down often and in my mind I often see Charles Evans holding his fist in some form of a signal over head, reminding all of us to try to hold some semblance of order. Because no other group of students will see this signal, my heart is a little darker, just as the sky was that day when the moon crossed the sun.

Because Alzheimer's is a fatal disease, Dr. Powers will also discuss compassionate end-of-life care. To register, call 1-800-THE DESK (1-800-843-3375).

The free community program is part of the NMMC Behavioral Health Center's annual Alzheimer's Awareness Conference, which will be held Sept. 28-29 at the Ramada Inn Convention Center. The conference is geared toward health care professionals, family caregivers and others who help those with Alzheimer's and other dementia. Continuing education units are being awarded in many disciplines.

Topics include recognizing the difference between dementia, depression, and delirium; depression and grief in the elderly; managing problem behaviors;

### Tishomingo County Soil & Water Conservation District News

#### Attractive Financial Incentives Available For Conservation Program

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) continuous sign-up option offers landowners an attractive financial option to implement certain high priority conservation practices on eligible land. Practices eligible for the program in Tishomingo County are riparian buffers strips, filter strips, and grassed waterways. Several key provisions of the CRP continuous sign-up are:

1. An up front one-time CRP signing incentive payment of \$100.00 to \$150.00 per acre depending on the length of the contract.
2. An annual per acre rental payment between \$45.00 and \$50.00 per acre depending on the soil type. Landowner can choose a contract length of not less than

ten (10) years and not more than fifteen (15) years.

3. A practice incentive payment of 40% of the eligible installation costs. This incentive is made in addition to the 50% share payment made to the producer to install the practice.

4. Marginal pastureland or cropland farmed two out of the last five years is eligible for the program.

5. Eligible land must be adjacent to a creek or stream with definable banks. The maximum width that can be enrolled in CRP is 180' for riparian buffers strips for pastureland or cropland and 120' for filter strips on cropland.

## NMMC Purchases New Lithotripsy Equipment, Offers Full-Time Services In-House

New lithotripsy equipment at North Mississippi Medical Center means immediate relief for many who suffer from kidney stones.

NMMC urologists are now using the LithoTron, the latest in lithotripsy equipment. Unlike conventional treatment, LithoTron patients need not be immersed in water. Patients require little anesthesia and receive fast treatment in a quiet, non-claustrophobic setting. Lithotripsy procedures are now offered daily inside NMMC's Outpatient Center rather than two to three days a week in a mobile unit. With this addition, NMMC is the only hospital in this region with full-time lithotripsy services, which makes this service more accessible and convenient for

kidney stone patients.

Kidney stones usually form in the center of a kidney, where urine collects before flowing into the ureter, a tube that leads to the bladder. Stones are created when calcium, uric acid and other substances form crystals that clump together. Usually, they pass from the body and go unnoticed, but larger stones can cause excruciating pain and block the urine flow. Stones can range from speck sized to the size of a walnut. They can be hard and crumbly, smooth or rough, and can be found in the kidney, ureter and bladder.

"In lithotripsy, high pressure shock waves pass through the body. When the wave encounters the stone, the pressure causes the

stone to be stressed, fractured and eventually disintegrated," explained K. Bond, M.D., a board-certified urologist with Urology, P.A. A three-dimensional x-ray helps focus the waves precisely on the stone. Once the stone is reduced in size, it can be eliminated naturally through urination.

## Migratory Bird Seasons Set

Hunting dates for mourning doves were set Tuesday at a meeting in Jackson of the Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

This first season in the North will open Sept. 2 and closes Sept. 23. The second season opens Oct. 7 and extends through Oct. 29, and the third season opens Nov. 23 and closes Jan. 6.

Shooting hours for dove are half hour before sunrise until sunset. The daily bag limit is 15, the possession limit is 30. A season limit is not permitted the opening day of any season.

Doves are migratory birds and are protected by state and federal laws. Hunters must have a hunting license, signed and their person before going out. In addition, shooters must have their shotguns plugged and capable of holding more than three shells.

Teal season will open Sept. 9 and extend through Sept. 24. The daily bag limit is four, and the possession limit is eight.

Hunters can take to the

marshes for Canada goose for the season beginning Sept. 1 and extending through Sept. 15. The daily bag limit is five, and the possession limit is 10.

Woodcock season opens Dec. 18 and extends through Jan. 31. The daily bag limit is three, and the possession limit is six.

Snipe season opens Nov. 14 and closes Feb. 28. The daily bag limit is eight, and the possession limit is 16.

Fall hunting for moorhens, gallinules, and rails opens Oct. 12 and extends through Dec. 20. The daily bag limit for moorhens, gallinules, and king and clapper rails is 15, and the possession limit is 30 singly or in aggregate.

The daily bag limit for sora and Virginia rails is 25, and the possession limit is 25 singly or in aggregate.

Officials remind hunters that non-toxic shot is required for hunting waterfowl in all areas of Mississippi. Shooters may not have lead shot in possession while hunting.
