## Corinth Woman Found Burned In Her Vehicle In Remote Area Of Tishomingo County Monday

**Five Arrested And Charged In Connection With The Murder, Including Two Former Burnsville Area Residents**

The odor of smoke still lingers in the air early Monday, even after the charred remains of a young Corinth woman and the 1994 Jeep Cherokee Laredo she was found had been removed by investigators from the remote area northwestern Tishomingo County.

Smoke is what led authorities to the victim on Monday. A motorist traveling on County Road 350 reported seeing smoke coming from a location just off County Road 390 in an area known as Chambers' Creek bottom.

When firefighters arrived, they discovered the vehicle, on a narrow field road off the county road, in a cut-over area where grass had grown up. When a Tishomingo County deputy arrived at the scene to try to determine who the vehicle belonged to, he discovered the woman's body inside, lying in the back seat, between the front and back seats.

The victim has been identified to be Angel Moss, 26, of Corinth, although forensic specialists will have to verify this since the body was so badly charred.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, when the deputy reported what he found, they began looking for the owner of the vehicle and located it to a Corinth man, the victim's fiancée's father. The fiancée had allowed Angel Moss to use the vehicle. She was last seen in the vehicle in Corinth on Monday night.

**Corinth Crime Scene**  
Sheriff Smith said after finding the vehicle, which was located less than a mile from the Corinth County line and the

Hardin County, Tenn. line, he contacted the authorities from both counties.

Also, members of the Mississippi Highway Patrol—Criminal Investigation Bureau (MHP-CIB), who are heading up the investigation, and the Mississippi Crime Lab were contacted to assist in the investigation.

The investigation led the authorities to a Corinth residence—the home of Angel Moss' ex-husband, Reginald "Reggie" Moss, who lived at 1511 Washington Street, Corinth. Evidence there, according to the authorities, led to the arrest of five suspects in Angel Moss' murder. Ironically, this residence is located next door to Corinth city Chief of Police Fred Johnson.

**Suspects Arrested**  
In less than 24 hours after the incident, the authorities arrested Reggie Moss, 33, and charged him with Angel Moss' murder.

Also arrested on charges of accessory to the fact were his brother, Regan Louis Moss, 30, and his wife, Belinda Christine Moss, 26, of 530 CR 306, Corinth; and also Cranston L. Switcher, Jr., 36, of 1207 Tate St., Corinth, and his girlfriend, Renita Montgomery McCormick, 31, of 1511 Washington St., Corinth.

The Moss brothers were formerly of the Burnsville area.

Sheriff Taylor stated that the suspects are initially being charged in Alcorn County. Four of the five, including the one charged with murder, were in the Alcorn County jail, and one was in the Tishomingo County jail. No initial hearing had been held for any of the suspects at press time.

### How Did The Victim Die?

The authorities stated that the cause of death will have to be verified by the autopsy results, however they believe that the victim was probably stabbed at the Washington St. residence and then taken to the remote area where the vehicle was set on fire. They speculate that gasoline was used to start the fire which spread to the wooded area surrounding the vehicle.

### Investigation Of Incident

While the authorities are not ready to disclose a motive in the case, Police Chief Johnson said he was aware that Angel Moss and Reggie Moss, who had been divorced since 1998, had had domestic disputes in the past, with each taking papers out on the other.

Apparently, Reggie Moss had custody of the couple's two young children. Sheriff Jimmy Taylor said that the two children were asleep at the home at the time of the assault on their mother.

### Investigation Team

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith said that he appreciated the great team effort made by all those involved in the investigation of this incident. Smith stated that the reason the arrests were made so quickly after the crime is because of the cooperation, dedication and teamwork of the five agencies involved.

## Labor Day Water Accident Leads To Death Of Tishomingo County Teen-Ager

An 11th grader at Tishomingo County High School died in a Tupelo Hospital Monday following a tragic water accident Sunday that occurred in the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, near the Burnsville Boat Ramp.

Brandon Daniel Childs, 17, died Sept. 4 at the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo.

According to reports given to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, the teen-ager had gone fishing with a friend near the spill-way on the Burnsville side of the Tenn-Tom. It is believed that while fishing from the bank, either his hat blew off into the water and he went in to retrieve it, or he accidentally fell into the water. Once in the water, he was unable to swim back to the shore, according to the reports.

The young man went under the water. Several boaters and individuals in the area began looking for him.

After 911 was called by someone on the scene, Burnsville Police Chief James Trimm, members of the Burnsville Fire Department EMRs, Iuka Ambulance service, and members of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department arrived. A boater, Scott Russell of Ashland,

Miss., located Childs and he was removed from the water where, immediately, Chief Trimm and some members of the EMRs performed CPR on him until the ambulance arrived. Sheriff Smith said it is estimated that the young man was under the water for 8 or 9 minutes.

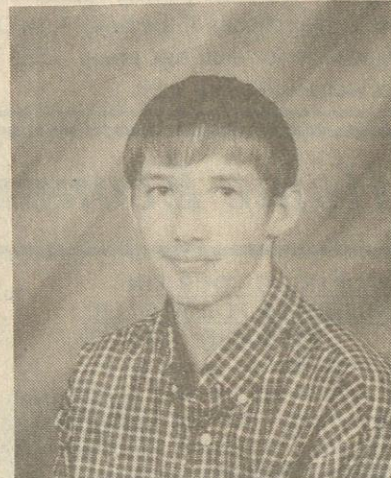
Childs was transported to the Iuka Hospital and then airlifted to NMMC. There, he was placed on a respirator, but died Monday evening.

It was noted by a family member that Brandon was the third to die while still a student at Tishomingo County High School.

Brandon Daniel Childs, 17, of Iuka, was born on Oct. 17, 1982 in Proviso Township (Chicago), Ill. He attended Alcorn Central before coming to Tishomingo County High School. He enjoyed many hobbies and sports, especially basketball; bowling, card collecting and most of all, fishing.

He is survived by his father, Bill Harrison Childs of Iuka; his mother, Betty Lange of Washburn, N.D.; two brothers, Brent Harrison Childs and Bronson Marshall Childs, both of Iuka; his grandparents, Homer and Lois Childs Fry of Corinth, and Maizie Lange of Baldwin, N.D.; two double-first cousins, Kristopher Carl Lange of Corinth

and Kimberly Lange Roberts of Maben.

He was preceded in death by his grandfathers, R.H. "Tony" Childs and Leonard M. Lange.

Services were at 4 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 6, 2000, at Iuka Church of Christ with Jerry Childs and Lance Foster officiating. Burial was in Burnsville Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Pallbearers were Steve Roberts, Jackie Beals, Jesse Lambert, Robin Lambert, James Lovelace and Jimmy Lovelace.

Honorary pallbearers were his fellow classmates and faculty at Tishomingo County High School.

## Free/Reduced Lunch Program Available For Area Students

The Mississippi Department of Education and Tishomingo, Div. of Aging & Adult Services, ADC MS Action for Progress Head Start, Tishomingo Co. Special Municipal Separate School District & CCC announced recently that the United States Department of Agriculture provides for free and reduced price meals served under the School Lunch, School Breakfast, After School Snack Program, Food Distribution, and Child and Adult Care Food Programs.

Families with children in any of these facilities who are unable to pay the full price of the meals are encouraged to apply for benefits.

Applications and instructions for applying for meal benefits are sent home with each student during registration or on the first day of attendance. To apply for the meal benefits, each household

should fill out the application and return it to the school or center or sponsor. Additional copies of the application are available at the administrative office of each facility.

Some applicants will need to report household income identified by source, such as earnings, welfare and alimony received by each household member.

In order for income applicants to be approved, the households must provide the following on the application: the names of all household members, each household member's monthly income identified by source; the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct; and the social security number of an adult who signs the application or an indication that this adult household member does not have a social security number.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data. The information provided may be verified at any time during the year by the school/center or program officials.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school/center. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price or free meals. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the year as circumstances change.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for meal benefits.

## Home Economics Tips

### PREPARING YOUR AIR CONDITIONER FOR WINTER STORAGE

Ah, fall...back-to-school, football season and, whether you like it or not, put-your-window-air-conditioner-away-for-the-winter season. To help your room air conditioner last through this and many more seasons to come, it is recommended that you give your unit a thorough checkup at least once a year. And now is as good a time as any to do it. According to the home economists, annual maintenance of a room air conditioner consists of:

1. Inspecting and cleaning the coils and condensate water passages.
2. Checking the fan and oiling the fan motor.
3. Cleaning the front panel and filter.

If you're a do-it-yourselfer familiar with electrical appliances, you can probably do all three of these yourself. The unit's use a care guide can lead the way. If you're unsure, try tackling just #3 (we've given you the directions below) and let a service company recommended by your dealer handle the other two.

Before you start, though, remember to follow these common precautions to avoid personal injury or produce damage.

\*Be sure to unplug the power cord from the receptacle before cleaning unit.

\*Handle the air conditioner with care. The metal fins on the coils are sharp.

\*Do not use cleaning fluids,

solvents, abrasive cleaners or strong detergents to clean the unit.

Now, stop sitting there and get to it!

**Cleaning Your Air Conditioner**  
NOTE: These cleaning instructions are for room air conditioners. Models may differ slightly.

1. Unplug power cord.
2. Remove the front panel from unit for cleaning. Press down at top of front panel to release it from top of cabinet.
3. Pull top of front panel toward you.
4. Lift up and away from bottom spring clips.
5. Remove filter from front panel by removing elastic band, which holds it in place.
6. Clean filter by using a vacuum cleaner or, if very dirty, wash filter with warm water and mild detergent. Air-dry thoroughly before replacing. Do not use a hot air dryer on filter.
7. Clean front panel with a soft cloth with warm water and mild detergent. Rinse and dry.
8. Replace filter and hold it in place with elastic band.
9. Wipe control panel clean with a soft, dry cloth.
10. Replace front panel. Locate bottom of panel on the springs clips. Press down on top edge of front toward unit to secure upper tabs.
11. Reconnect power supply for continued use, or store for the off-season.

opportunity to learn. My children understand the importance of conservation, preservation and enhancement. Perhaps even more importantly during this day and age, they learn firearm safety and develop respect for their weapons. I consider these indispensable values that young people cannot learn in any other forum."

The Hunting Heritage Protection Act, which was recently introduced in Congress, was co-authored by Congressman Pickering. It recognizes our nation's rich and valuable hunting heritage and aims to pass that legacy on to future generations by protecting and preserving the rights of those individuals interested in hunting.

Those individuals who share this interest number over 14 million. Most of these 14 million Americans are also avid conservationists who, like me, care deeply about our natural resources and how to protect, restore and enhance them. Since the time of President Theodore Roosevelt, the father of the conservation movement, anglers and hunters have been the

foremost supporters of practicing sound fish and wildlife management.

Upon introducing the bill, Congressman Pickering concluded his testimony by stating, "It is crucial that the tradition of hunting is protected and that the valuable contributions that hunters have made to conservation be recognized and rewarded. The Hunting Heritage Protection Act does just that. The bill formalizes a policy by which the Federal government will support, promote and enhance recreational hunting opportunities, as permitted under State and Federal law."

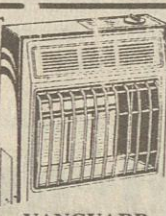

### Caring For Plastic Lenses

Eyeglasses can, as the name suggests, have glass lenses. More often, however, the lenses will be made of special high-quality, optical plastic. Plastic lenses are light-weight and practical, but they do require some extra care. Here are some tips for taking care of your plastic lenses:

- All dust or grit should be washed or blown from the lenses, NOT WIPED, while they are dry. Apply warm water and soap or detergent to remove oils.
- After cleaning, dry lenses with a tissue or cloth that is free from gritty particles.
- Never use silicone tissues on plastic lenses. Plastic lenses do not require excessive care, but you do have to be mindful of protecting them. Since they are softer than glass, they are less resistant to scratches. Always keep them stored in a protective case to avoid rubbing the front surface of the lenses.

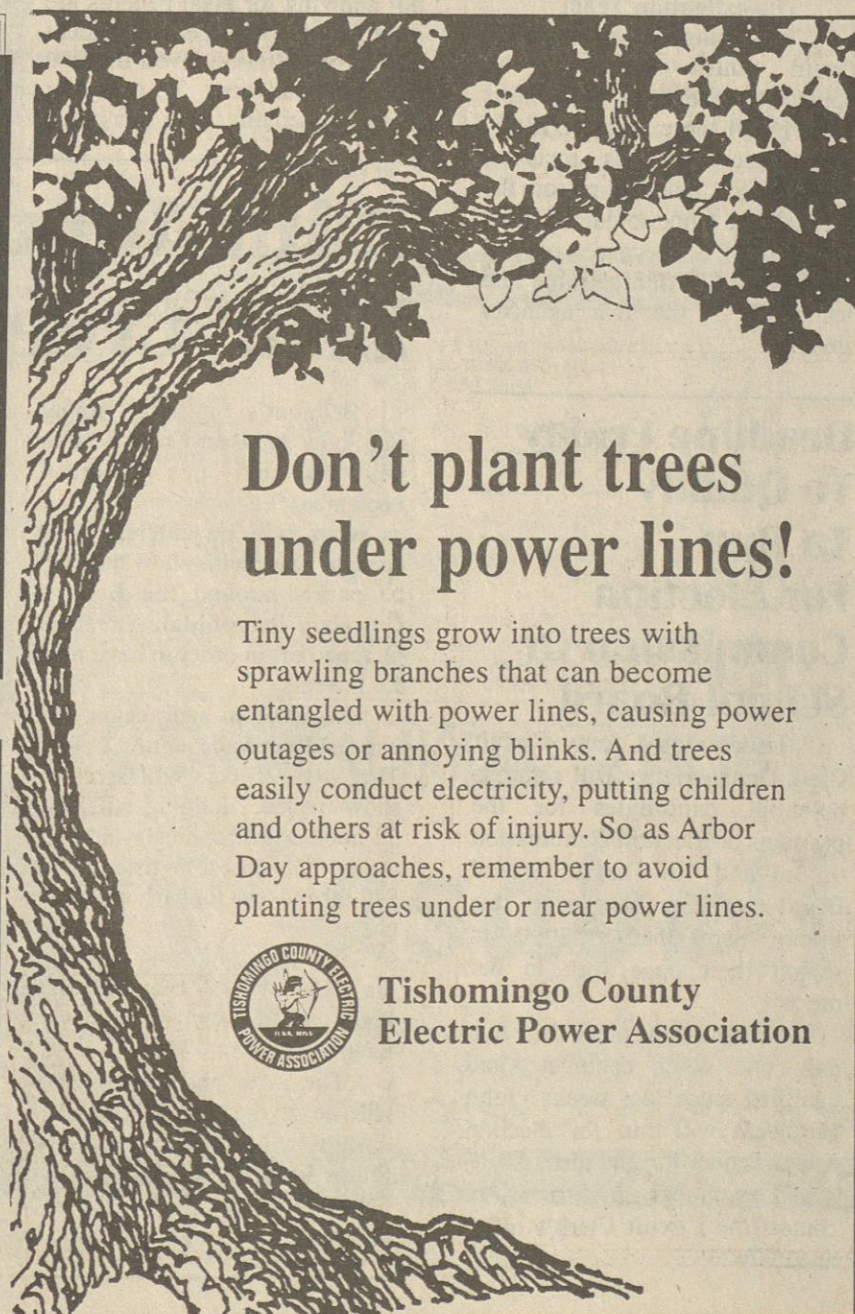

## Outstanding College Scholar Chosen To Attend First Lott Leadership Class At Ole Miss

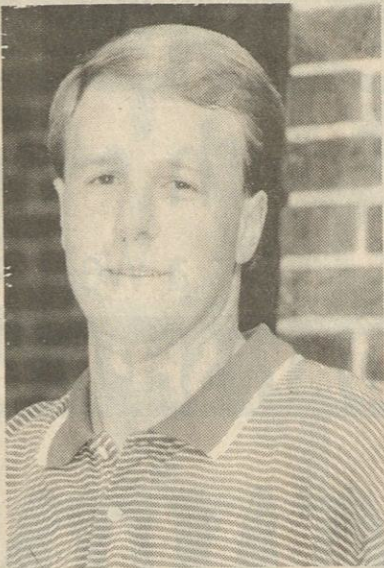

## Home Economics Tips

### MORE POWER, FEWER INJURIES

Each year thousands of Americans are injured or killed by their home's electrical system. What can you do to make sure yours is as safe as it can be? The National Electrical Safety Foundation (NESF) offers these tips:

\*Are light bulbs the appropriate size and type for the lamp or fixture they're in? A bulb of too high wattage or the wrong type may lead to fire through overheating.

\*Are electric cords out from beneath furniture, rugs or carpeting? Furniture resting on cords can damage them. Electric cords which run under carpeting can overheat and cause a fire.

\*Are cords attached to the wall, baseboards, etc., with nails or staples? Nails or staples can damage cords, presenting fire and shock hazards.

\*Are there outlets or switches which are usually warm or hot to the touch? These conditions may indicate that an unsafe wiring condition exists.

\*If fuses are used, are they the correct size for the circuit? Replacing a correct size fuse with a larger size fuse can present a serious fire hazard. If the fuse in the box is rated higher than that intended for the circuit, excessive current will be allowed to flow and possibly overload the outlet and house wiring to the point that a fire can begin.

### Farmers Take Hit With Clinton Veto Of Death Tax Legislation

The Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation called President Clinton's veto of legislation that would have repealed the estate tax a real blow to the hard working men and women on America's farms, especially in light of the already serious financial problems facing the agricultural industry.

"It is really sad to think the families of farmers and ranchers are the victims of this shortsighted decision by the Clinton administration," Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation President David Waide said in discussing last Thursday's veto. "The logic that this legislation would only benefit an elite few is totally flawed. Our farmers and ranchers have worked all their lives to build and operate their successful farms and ranches, investing time and

dollars into something that wasn't always a guaranteed profit producer. Now, they are being classified as elitist, which is absurd." The farm leader stressed that farmers already carry enough of a tax load from government and to further tax their heirs is unjust. The existing estate tax laws, which have resulted in family members having to sell pieces of family farms and ranches to pay for their inheritance, have been the focus of Farm Bureau for a number of years.

"Over the past few years, with weather and market related problems, the nation's farm economy has been at its lowest point in decades. By vetoing this legislation that would have provided some relief, it is like pouring salt on a wound," Waide stated. "We are not happy with this and I assure you we will work tirelessly to have the veto overridden. Agriculture remains the backbone of this nation's economy and something must be done to help shore up, not undercut, our industry as we try to weather the adversities facing us."

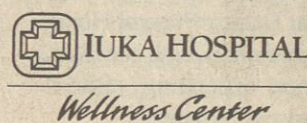

### NMMC Offers New Treatment Option For Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm As Alternative To Major Surgery...

New technology at North Mississippi Medical Center is helping physicians treat patients with abdominal aortic aneurysm from the inside without open abdominal surgery.

An abdominal aortic aneurysm is a weak area in the wall of the main artery in the abdomen. While an aneurysm can occur in any blood vessel, the most common place is, the abdomen just below the arteries that provide blood to the kidneys. Aneurysms can balloon out and eventually burst, which proves immediately fatal in four out of five cases.

"An abdominal aortic aneurysm is caused when a blood vessel becomes damaged and weak because of atherosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries," explained Phil Mathis, M.D., a board-certified surgeon with Surgery Associates, P.A. "The pressure of blood flowing through the weakened section of the artery causes the artery to balloon, which can lead to rupture and death."

Until now, the only way to repair an aneurysm had been for the surgeon to make a large incision in the abdomen, open the aneurysm and sew a graft in place. This open procedure usually requires a six-to-eight-day hospital stay and four to six weeks recovery.

NMMC is one of the few facilities nationwide whose physicians are trained to perform the new procedure, and Dr. Mathis was the first to do so in Tupelo. The new grafts provide an

alternate path for blood flow, relieving the pressure that causes the aneurysm. "In this procedure, two small incisions are made, a catheter is inserted into the femoral artery in the patient's upper thigh, and a graft made of polyester cloth is guided through the aorta to the aneurysm," Dr. Mathis said. "Because the procedure uses an x-ray imaging technique to guide the catheter, the surgery team includes an interventionalist - either a radiologist or a cardiologist."

Once in place, the graft expands to fit within the diameter of the aorta, and the catheter is removed. "This procedure appears to be a very promising

alternative to open aneurysm repair," said J.W. "Buddy" Williamson, M.D., a board-certified surgeon with Surgery Clinic of Tupelo. "Trials show this procedure to be as effective as open surgery, and to significantly reduce the patient's hospital stay and recovery time." Patients who undergo this procedure are hospitalized from 24-72 hours and can resume normal activities within about two weeks.

The device's design allows physicians to customize the graft to fit each patient, and the length and diameter of an implanted graft can also be extended - so that the graft is easily adapted to changes in an aneurysm's size and shape over time. Dr. Mathis says that although patients will be evaluated

for the grafts, not all patients can be treated this way. Even when a patient appears to be a candidate for the new procedure, the surgical team must be prepared to do the open surgery should the need arise.

"Traditional surgery completely replaces the diseased portion of the blood vessel. This new procedure takes that portion of the blood vessel out of circulation but doesn't remove it completely," Dr. Williamson explained. "Until the long-term effects of these grafts can be proven, these patients will be closely monitored by periodic CT scans to ensure that the graft is still in place."

Experts estimate that approximately 1.5 million Americans have an abdominal aortic aneurysm, but only about 200,000 are actually diagnosed each year. In most cases, a person with an abdominal aortic aneurysm has no symptoms. Warning signs can include abdominal or back pain, and the signs of rupture are extreme pain in the lower abdomen and back. "During a routine physical exam, a physician may hear a 'blowing' murmur or a 'whooshing' sound over the aorta, or he may even feel the aneurysm," Dr. Mathis said. "Our goal is to discover and repair the aneurysm before it ruptures and becomes life threatening."
