Tishomingo County Jury Finds Lee County Man Guilty Of Capital Murder

A Tishomingo County jury, made up of 11 women and one man, found a Lee county man guilty of capital murder Thursday, Sept. 21, and recommended that he be given life in prison without parole.

After hearing testimony for two days, the jury took just over three hours to find Jessie Johnson, 22, of Fulton guilty of capital murder for his role in the kidnapping and violent murder of Marcus Gentry, 22, also of Fulton, in December of 1998.

In the sentencing phase of the trial, the jury had the option of choosing life in prison without the possibility of parole or death by lethal injection. On Friday, Sept. 22, the jurors deliberated about an hour and 25 minutes before recommending life in prison for the defendant.

Johnson's trial was moved to Tishomingo County due to pre-trial publicity in Lee county.

The victim in the case was murdered by the defendant,

according to court testimony by the use of a 28-ounce carpenter's framing hammer—also referred to as a claw hammer. The testimony revealed that the victim suffered between 16 and 23 blunt force trauma injuries mainly to the head and face, with up to 50 blows to the victim's body, including numerous defensive wounds.

A co-defendant in the murder case, Dale Bishop, 26, of Guntown was also convicted of capital murder in an earlier trial in Lee County and was sentenced to death and is now on Mississippi's Death Row awaiting execution. Another man, Charles Rakestraw, 28, also of Guntown, is presently serving 10 years after pleading guilty to accessory after the fact. A fourth man, Ricky Myhand, 23, cooperated with officials and led them to the victim's body. He witnessed the incident; however, took no part in the beating, according to court testimony. He was not tried in the case.

Four Of Five Suspects Charged In Moss Murder Case Remain In Jail

Four of the five suspects who were arrested and charged in connection with the Labor Day murder of Corinth resident Angel Moss, 26, remain in jail, while one has been released on bond.

Alcorn County Sheriff Jimmy Taylor stated that three of the suspects, including Reggie Moss, charged with murder; Regan Moss and Renita McCormick, both charged with accessory, remained in the Alcorn County Jail.

McCormick's bond had been reduced to \$15,000, Regan Moss was under a \$25,000 bond and Reggie Moss was being held without bond.

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith confirmed that Cranston Switcher, charged with accessory to the fact of murder, remained in the Tishomingo County Jail. He is being held

without bond, at this time.

The fifth suspect in the case, Christy Moss, charged with accessory, was released soon after being arrested on a \$15,000 bond.

The authorities working on this case indicated that the charges remained the same at this time; however, as the investigation continues, it is possible that some of the suspects could face other charges.

Angel Moss' body was discovered on Sept. 4—Labor Day—burned up in a vehicle in a remote area of Tishomingo County off of Highway 350, near the Alcorn County line.

The Sheriffs of both counties confirmed that the suspects will have a hearing in less than two weeks. The investigation of the crime is being spearheaded by the Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigation Bureau.

Tishomingo County Gets ARC Grant For Work At Crow's Neck

The Appalachian Regional Commission has approved a grant of \$190,153 to aid in construction of an access road into the Crow's Neck Environmental Education Center in Tishomingo County, federal lawmakers said Monday.

U.S. Rep. Roger F. Wicker and Sens. Thad Cochran and Trent Lott said the funding will go to the Board of Supervisors for a 1.1 mile road to improve safety and access to the non-profit environmental facility. The Crow's Neck Center is a major nature and environmental tourist attraction and has been visited by over 50,000 students and adults since being established in 1993.

The new road will enable the curriculum to be expanded at the Center, creating 15 new jobs, the lawmakers said. Total cost of the project is \$356,000 with \$165,847 coming from the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

Warrant Round-Up A Success, Get Ready For Another

The cell walls of the Tishomingo County Jail have been bulging with prisoners lately, thanks to crime solving efforts of the Sheriff's Department and police departments throughout the county, and a recent warrant round-up initiated by Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

"We had a successful round-up on our outstanding warrants, but we still have many more in our files," Smith said.

The authorities will be attempting to serve these remaining warrants within the next few weeks, according to Smith.

Sheriff Smith said that if you know you have an outstanding warrant, you need to go to the Tishomingo Justice Court office in the Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka and take care of it so you will not be picked up.

Belmont Police Dept. Teams Up With Tish. Co. Sheriff's Dept. & Others To Stop Interstate Check-Forge

Suspects Linked To Six States & Close To \$1 Million Worth Of Stolen Checks

Thanks to an investigation by the Belmont Police Department, with assistance from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, Franklin County Ala. authorities, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and U.S. Immigration, six Hispanic suspects have been arrested in connection with a major check-forging ring which has been traced to crimes in six states.

Investigation Of Burglary In Belmont

According to Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno, he and Belmont PD Investigator Sammy South were investigating a break-in at Whitfield Furniture, Inc. where several of the companies checks had been stolen. Reno stated that after the checks had been stolen in Belmont, they were forged and then cashed at local banks. The officers took copies of photos from the banks' surveillance cameras and began their investigation.

A major turning point in the case came when the officers got a lead which took them to Russellville, Ala.

Reno explained that on the night of the burglary at Whitfield Furniture, Belmont PD had stopped a vehicle with a Franklin County Alabama tag and the driver gave the officer a North Carolina drivers license. Reno and South discovered that in a similar crime had occurred about two weeks earlier and a subject with a Franklin County Alabama tag and North Carolina drivers license had also been stopped there on the night of the burglary.

Trail Leads Investigators To Alabama

With this information, the officers contacted Franklin County Sheriff's Dept. Investigator Chris Hargett. Reno stated that he and

South traveled to that county where, with assistance of Hargett, they began riding around looking for the vehicle with the tag number they had stopped the night of the burglary.

After approximately one hour, while driving through a trailer court in Russellville inhabited by mostly Hispanics, the officers found the vehicle displaying the tag they were searching for. The officers took the surveillance camera photos and questioned the female who was in the trailer where the vehicle was parked. She identified one of the subjects as her husband.

Reno explained that at this point, Investigator Chris Hargett called the District Attorney for his jurisdiction, John Palotti.

Palotti, who is fluent in Spanish, got a consent to search the residence from the Hispanic woman. This search turned up over \$6,000 in cash and another important piece of evidence—a notebook where someone had written the signature numerous times of the person who signs the checks at Whitfield Furniture.

The officers knew from this piece of evidence that someone at that residence was attempting to duplicate the signature in order to sign and then cash the checks taken from that company.

Arrests Made, Other Local & Federal Agencies Enter Investigation

The couple at that residence was arrested. At this point, Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith and F.B.I. agents Quaka and Beauwinkle entered the investigation.

Sheriff Smith and Belmont PD Investigator South traveled back to Alabama the following day and found two more suspects connected with the Tishomingo County crime. They also recovered an additional \$1,600.

According to Sheriff Smith, he and the others working with the case found that the suspects, who

were using false identification and were in the country illegally. They contacted agents with the U.S. Immigration office. With the assistance of Immigration's Officer Gary Evans, Smith and South returned a third time to Franklin County where two more suspects were taken into custody and \$2,800 was recovered.

Amount Of Forged Checks

Chief Reno stated that in the Belmont area, approximately \$4,000 worth of the forged checks were passed. Sheriff Smith indicated that about \$43,000 worth of checks were passed in the county, as a whole.

Continuing investigations into this group has led the authorities to the states of Tennessee, Missouri, North Carolina, Michigan, Florida and Georgia, in addition to Mississippi and Alabama.

The officials estimate that in these states, close to \$1 million worth of forged checks have been passed. Sheriff Smith confirmed that more arrests in the case are possible.

Who To Contact

Chief Reno and Sheriff Smith would like to urge any area businesses or banks to contact the U.S. Immigration office in Memphis at (901) 766-2909 if they have any questions about immigration numbers on the identification cards of Hispanic customers. Also, if you believe you have information which would be helpful to this investigation, you may contact the Belmont PD or Tishomingo Co. Sheriff's Dept.

Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno would like to extend a personal thank you to all the agencies involved in this investigation. According to Chief Reno, all the officers put in a lot of man hours.

Reno stated that the F.B.I. is now heading up the investigation, with the assistance of his department and the Sheriff and his department.

One Arrested On Drug Charges Following Traffic Accident Sunday Near Burnsville

A Burnsville resident was arrested Sunday on drug charges following a traffic accident on U.S. Hwy. 72 near the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway bridge.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, the suspect, Richie W. Booker, 32, who resides in Burnsville, was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance, DUI—other substance, with other charges pending.

Sheriff Smith stated that Tishomingo County Deputy Mike Dodson ran upon an accident Sunday afternoon on Hwy. 72, near the Tenn-Tom Waterway, where Booker, who had been

driving a 1987 GMC pickup truck apparently ran into another vehicle driven by Gary Beals of Burnsville.

In his investigation of the accident, Deputy Dodson was informed by witnesses that, following the accident, Booker had taken something from his pocket and dropped it onto the ground. The witnesses had described the items in detail to the officer.

When the officer began looking, he found that the suspect had dropped several illegal drugs including what is believed to be more than an 8-ball of cocaine, a bottle of controlled substances including hydrocodone and

Valium and a misdemeanor amount of marijuana. Also, found was drug paraphernalia.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol was also called to the scene with Patrolman Wayne Burns (F-36) responding. Smith explained that anytime an accident occurs where a felony arrest is made, the Criminal Investigation Bureau is called in to help in the investigation. Also, since drugs were found, the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics was informed.

The Sheriff said forfeiture papers have been filed for Booker's vehicle.

Booker has been released on \$10,000 bond, according to Smith.

Shooting In Burnsville Leaves One Injured, Lands One In Jail

A Burnsville man remains in jail after shooting and slightly injuring another Burnsville man Thursday in a local convenience store.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, Roger Walker, 44, of Burnsville walked into 72 Express in Burnsville Thursday and shot Tony Blakney, 29, of Burnsville in the chest with a snub-nosed .38 special handgun. After hitting Blakney with the first shot, Walker continued to fire four

more times as the victim ducked and ran from him through the store and parking lot.

Blakney was taken to Iuka Hospital and, from there, airlifted to the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo following the shooting. Reports indicated that the bullet, which entered Blakney's body in the upper left part of his chest, lodged in an area under his arm.

Blakney was not severely injured as a result of the gunshot wound, according to the report, and he was released from the

medical facility within hours of the shooting.

At press time, Walker was being charged with attempted murder and seven counts of aggravated assault. The assault charges were added as the result of the seven individuals who were in the store at the time of the shooting.

Bond for Walker has been set at \$250,000.

The exact motive for the shooting is not known, according to Sheriff Smith.

Home Economics Tips

A High Priority On Vacuuming

Vacuuming may seem like a dull, repetitive task but it provides important health benefits. Keeping carpets and floors clean without spreading dust back into the air is one way to protect the indoor air quality.

Hallways, stairs, entryways and similarly heavy trafficked areas should be vacuumed often. Minimally, this means twice a week to remove soil while it's loose, before it gets ground into the carpet.

For best results, inspect the vacuum periodically to be sure it's functioning properly. Hoses and attachments should be free of obstructions. Brushes should be

clean. If worn, replace them. Belts should be working properly. Keep a spare on hand for quick replacement. It's important to change the vacuum bag when its become more than half full. As the bag becomes full, soil removal efficiency is reduced. Follow the vacuum manufacturer's instructions as to the type of bag and the changing procedure.

Tips For Storing Summer Clothes

When it comes time for summer clothes to take a storage vacation, a trip to the laundry and the dry cleaners is in order. Many beverages and foods leave yellow stains behind as they age; thus, garments should be freshly

cleaned before storage. In addition, these food and beverage stains could attract insects that may damage the fabric while feeding on the stain.

Store clothes in a clean, dry place away from sunlight or

artificial light, which can cause some dyes to fade. Do not use plastic bags. They prevent air circulation, which allows moisture to collect and mildew to form. Garments that are hung should be placed on padded hangers. Knits, however, should be folded; hanging may cause the fabric to stretch out of shape.

Clean Laundry Appliances

Since the main purpose of washers and dryers is to get clothes clean, one seldom thinks of these appliances as needing cleaning, too. But common sense dictates that if the appliance is clean, clothes will be cleaner, too.

It's a good idea to periodically wipe the washer tub and dryer drum with a non-abrasive household cleaner. Rinse thoroughly after wiping, using clear water, rinse the washer's soap, bleach, and fabric softener dispensers and wipe clean. Using warm, soapy water and a soft cloth, wipe the outside of the

cabinets and control panels. Pay special attention to the areas in and around the washer lid and dryer door. Doing this will help prevent transferring soil to cleaned clothes.

Lint buildup on the dryer screen can lengthen drying time, so clean it after every load. Fabric softener sheets may leave a waxy coating on the screen. If this occurs, wash the screen in warm, soapy water and dry it completely. For safe and efficient drying, have a qualified service technician clean the dryer's interior, lint screen and exhaust duct every eighteen months.

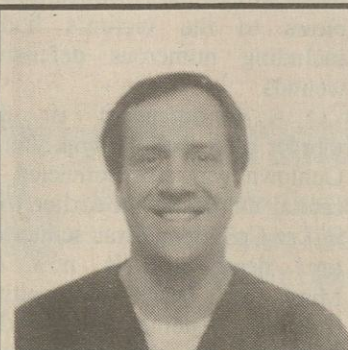

Polycarbonate Lens Protection

A great boon to sports enthusiasts (and other eyeglass wearers, especially the young, rough-and-tumble set) are the polycarbonate materials. Back in the 50's and 60's, most lenses were made of glass. Then plastic became popular because it was lighter. However, polycarbonate is even lighter than plastic. As a matter of fact, it is 50% lighter than plastic and 20% thinner for the same correction. This means more comfort and style. In addition, it's a better ultraviolet (UV) protector and provides much greater impact resistance. For this reason, it is the preferred lens for people who engage in athletics. Polycarbonate frames are also preferred if you regularly participate in sports that involve a projectile, such as racquetball, baseball or tennis, ask your optometrist about polycarbonate lenses and frames. Polycarbonate lenses come in clear or any of the multitude of tints available. They're worth the investment.



What Causes Bad Breath?

There's no single answer, but gum disease - preventable by brushing, flossing and regular dental visits - is a primary culprit, because bacteria can gather in pockets that form around the teeth, releasing unpleasant odors. Even before serious gum disease sets in, poor oral hygiene can contribute to this social embarrassment.

Onions, garlic and similar foods can also cause bad breath by releasing oils into the bloodstream, which travel to the lungs and are exhaled. Also any kind of denture can trap food and plaque, leading to odors. Brushing your dentures daily and soaking them every night in a cleaning solution helps to avoid these problems. In addition, some illnesses, including diabetes, tuberculosis and kidney and liver disorders, may also lead to bad breath. (In Memory Of Cinder Stockwell) Common Types Of Cancer In Pets Part 3

Feline 'Complex' * The leukemia virus is contagious among cats and occasionally cause cancer. There is no proof it is contagious to humans. While a great deal of research is ongoing, no consistent effective treatment is presently available for positive cats.

Testicles * Testicular tumors are rare in cats, common in dogs especially those with retained testicles. Most of these cancers are curable with surgery.

Abdominal Tumors Tumors inside the abdomen are common. It is difficult to make an early diagnosis. Weight loss and abdominal enlargement are common signs of these tumors.

Bone * Bone tumors most commonly seen in breed dogs and rarely in cats. The leg bones, near joints, are the most common. Persistent lameness, swelling of the leg is an early sign of disease.

Many of the above signs also seen with noncancerous conditions but still warrant prompt attention by a veterinarian to determine cause. Cancer is frequently treatable, and early diagnosis will aid your veterinarian in delivering the best possible outcome.

How is it treated? * Cancer requires individualized care. Your veterinarian may use surgery, chemotherapy, radiation, cryosurgery, (freezing), hyperthermia (heating) or immunotherapy to effectively treat cancer. Combination therapy is commonly employed.

What is the success rate? This depends strongly on the type and extent of the cancer as well as the aggressiveness of the therapy. Some cancers are cured and almost all patients can be helped to some degree. Your veterinarian will be better able to control and cure your pet's cancer if detected early.

The event was very successful and enjoyed by all.



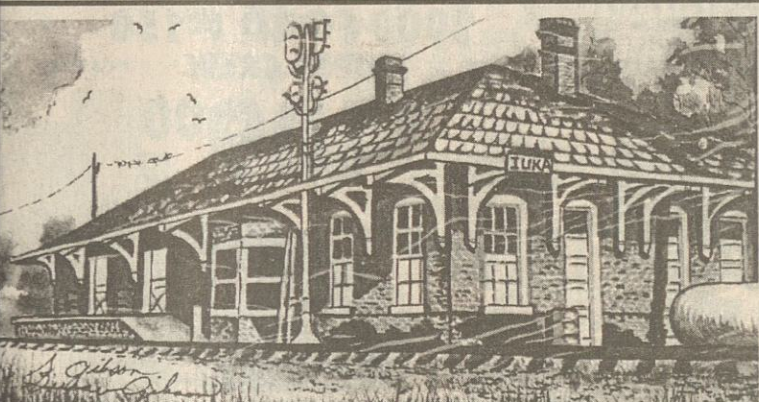
Circuit Clerk's Office To Have Extended Hours For Voter Registration

NMHS, MSDH Hepatitis Vaccine Program Now Includes Tishomingo County School District's Sixth Graders

Hepatitis B vaccines will be given to approximately 250 sixth grade students in the Tishomingo County School District through the collaborative efforts of North Mississippi Health Services and the District II Office of the Mississippi State Department of Health.

"The Hepatitis B vaccine is the best way to protect against Hepatitis B, which is carried in the blood and body fluids of an infected person," said Jeff Barber, Dr. P.H., NMHS president and chief executive officer. "Hepatitis B virus can be transmitted through regular household contact with a chronically infected person or through occupational exposure. However, the source of infection is unknown for approximately one-third of persons who have acute Hepatitis B."

The free immunizations will be made available to sixth grade students at Iuka Middle School, Belmont School, Tishomingo Middle School and Burnsville School. Before the vaccination is administered, parents or legal guardians will be asked to review an informational packet and sign a consent form.

John Mullins, superintendent of education with the Tishomingo County School District, has high praise for his district's involvement in the program. "We appreciate North Mississippi Health Services and the Mississippi Department of Health working with our school district to provide this service," he said. "Other counties have had a good public response from the program, and we hope our community will join us in this effort to protect our children from the risk of Hepatitis B."

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians and the American Medical Association recommend this vaccine for adolescents 11-12 years of age.

The Hepatitis B vaccine is administered in three doses, with

the first dose in the series scheduled for Sept. 27-Oct. 18 at designated schools. The second dose will be given Nov. 1-29, and the final dose is planned for April 4-24, 2001.

"Hepatitis B is one of the safest vaccines. Getting the disease is much more likely to cause serious illness than getting the vaccine," said Dana Hartley, R.N., district chief nurse, District II, Mississippi State Department of Health.

After receiving the vaccine, student may experience soreness where the injection was given and mild to moderate fever. Acetaminophen or ibuprofen may be used to reduce fever and pain. Serious allergic reactions to the

vaccine are rare, but should be treated by a physician immediately.

Parents are welcome to be present when their child is immunized. In the event that a child is absent on the day immunizations are given, the vaccines will be available at the Tishomingo County Health Department in Iuka.

The state immunization registry will maintain an immunization record on all children receiving vaccines. The record will be forwarded to the children's parents upon completion of the vaccine series.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services reports that Hepatitis B affects more than 150,000 people nationally and causes approximately 4,500 deaths each year.

Each student who participates in the program will receive gifts donated by local businesses at the time of each injection.

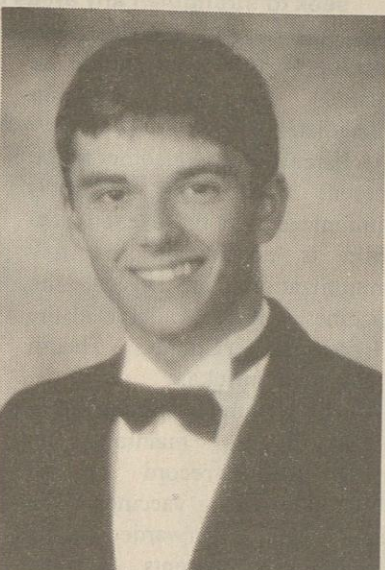

Old Tishomingo Traces

The Vidette, May 1, 1941:
Writes Home While Riding In The Air
(The following letter was received by Mrs. W.S. Brown from her son):
Enroute from New York to Chicago
April 18, 1941

Dear Mother:
It has been about sixteen years since I boarded the old open plane in Florence to fly to Corinth with Roscoe Turner. What a contrast this modern skyline offers to the crude ship I was on at that time.

This plane seats twenty-one passengers with the utmost comfort. We left New York at 5:00 p.m. and our first stop will be Chicago at 9:00 p.m. We fly normally at about 200 miles per hour. After a few minutes in Chicago, we take off again for Kansas City. The schedule calls for a 12:20 a.m. arrival in Kansas City. In other words, the fourteen hundred miles it took me three days to drive will be covered in a little over seven hours in the air.

Just now we are heading directly into the sun. It is a beautiful sight. Below are some mountain ranges which I judge from the map is the Nittany mountain group.

Included in the passengers is a very pretty curly headed baby boy, about 15 months of age.

When I rose high above the great city of New York and looked down at the millions of people leaving their work and crowding the streets, I thought of the flight with Roscoe Turner and the people of Iuka rushing out that day to see us fly over. It makes me think how different that part of this flight would turn out to be as compared with going over Iuka. In New York was just one of the hundreds of planes which are always in the air above that great city.

Dinner is now being served. It looks very good and I am hungry. It will be my first meal so high above the earth's surface.

account of the difference in atmospheric pressure, it is not advisable to use a fountain pen. The ink will flow too freely up here.

A very charming and pretty hostess served dinner just now. We had lobster, green beans, lettuce and tomato salad, fresh fruit, rolls, ice cream cake and coffee.

Some of the passengers are sleeping, some are reading and a few are still eating.

The pilot reports that we are now flying 170 miles per hour against a strong headwind. We are 3500 feet above the earth. It is yet light outside, but gradually becoming darker. It is 7:15 p.m. Eastern time.

The baby is fussing a little as he eats his dinner. The view of New York was interesting, but the great open spaces with the greens, browns and other spring colors present a more beautiful sight from up here.

The great ship is bumping a little just now, but not enough to cause discomfort. I'm anxious to see some of the cities at night.

We are now in some rough weather. It has been storming to the north for quite a few miles. We now seem to be in the middle of a pretty rough storm and it looks like the "skipper" is going up a littler closer to the stars.

We are now high above the clouds and in the most beautiful part of the atmospheres. Below are white clouds resembling giant pillows of many sizes. Lights below the clouds break through at times indicating a city or a group of small villages.

From up here it is easy to see why a "black-out" is so important in cities subjected to bombing. The smallest light can readily be detected for many miles even through the clouds.

It is 8:12 p.m. and we have just passed the most beautiful sight of the trip. We are just outside of Cleveland, Ohio. The thousands and more

thousands of many colored lights presented a sight too wonderful to describe. It was like a giant cloak of diamonds and precious stones spread out below. Each light stood out as another jewel. It's worth the trip to see it.

I'll be in Kansas City Saturday and Sunday. I'll leave Sunday night for Oklahoma City, Amarillo and Albuquerque. Love, Will.

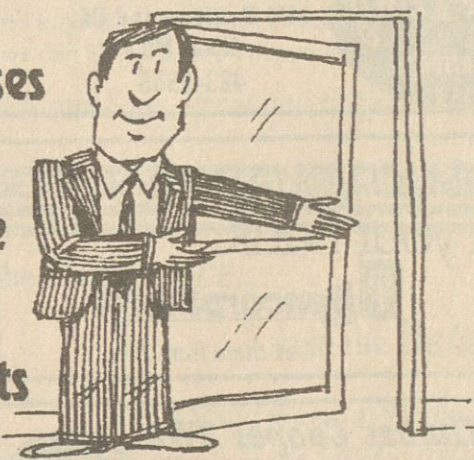

VERSE OF THE WEEK:
