

The Corinth Police Department received a call just after 2 Wednesday morning reporting that the alarm at Lakehill Motors had been activated. While at the scene, officers, who had been joined at the scene by one of the store's owners, heard a motorcycle crank up. The vehicle then took off down Salem Road, the officers reported.

Witnesses in the area told the policemen that another vehicle, a maroon Honda automobile, occupied by two white males, had accompanied the motorcycle.

Alcorn County Sheriff's Department deputies were able to stop the Honda, which was occupied by Smart and Taylor. The third suspect on the motorcycle, Letson, got away.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, his department received information about the whereabouts of the stolen motorcycle and around 4 p.m. Tuesday, officers retrieved the bike from a heavily wooded area in the Paden community. At press time, the suspect had still not been caught; however, both Smith and Pannell were confident that he would be very soon.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department returned the stolen dirtbike to Lakehill Motors' owners late Tuesday afternoon.

Burnsville Native And Spouse Killed In One-Vehicle Accident

A one-vehicle wreck Friday night, Dec. 29, in Corinth claimed the life of a Burnsville native and

According to reports from the Corinth Police Department, the victims, James Wade Stricklen, 32, and his wife, Kathy Jayne Manning Stricklen, 38, residents of Corinth, were traveling west on Hwy. 2 in their 2000 model Chevrolet Silverado pickup around 8:30 p.m. when the accident occurred.

The reports stated that it appeared that when the driver of the vehicle, Kathy Stricklen, came to the intersection of Hwy. 145 N., near the North Corinth Baptist Church, she failed to stop and lost control of the truck. Both victims were ejected from the vehicle, police reports stated.

Kathy Stricklen was pronounced dead at the scene. Wade Stricklen was taken to Magnolia injuries suffered in the wreck.

North Crossroads Man Dies After Being Struck By Car

A North Crossroads man who was crossing the highway from getting his mail Thursday afternoon was struck and killed by

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Jerry Boyd (F-35), the victim, James Steven Pardue, 51, of 18 County Road 334, Iuka, was pronounced dead at the scene Thursday by deputy coroner Tom Richardson after he was struck by a car on Hwy. 25 N., 7.8 miles north of Iuka, near the entrance to Shelton Trucking.

Boyd explained that Pardue, who lived just off of Hwy. 25 on a county road, had gotten out of his fiancés car on the east side of Hwy. 25 and had crossed the roadway to the west side where his mailbox was located. Apparently

he had taken his mail out of the box, turned and stepped out into the path of a 1991 Lincoln Town Car being driven by Suni Susann Strickland, 45, of N. Adams Street, Iuka, who was traveling south on Hwy. 25.

Pardue sustained multiple, severe injuries in the crash which led to his death, Boyd explained. The accident occurred at approximately 4 p.m. Boyd stated that Strickland was coming home from work at the time of the

MDOT Employee Arrested On Assault Charges

An off-duty Mississippi Department of Transportation employee has been arrested on assault charges after firing shots in a residence after a dispute over a music compact disc.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Chief Deputy Rodney Pannell, he and Deputies Scott Hyde and David Gist responded to a 9-1-1 call on County Road 196 at around 10 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 30, where it was reported that shots had been fired. The call came in from George Noonan Walls.

Pannell explained that when they arrived at the residence, Phillip Harris, 46, was present and had apparently been in a dispute with Walls. Apparently, Harris had come to the residence demanding that the people there return a music CD to him. When the residents denied having the CD, Harris allegedly became enraged, pulling his service weapon, a Glock handgun issued to him by the state, and shooting through the floor of the dwelling.

Pannell stated that when he entered the home, accompanied by the other officers, he began to pat down Harris for weapons.

When asked if he had a gun, Pannell said Harris pulled the gun out and began turning toward the

Upon seeing the weapon, Deputy Hyde quickly grabbed the suspect and Deputy Gist removed the weapon from his hand,

according to Pannell. Harris was brought to the Tishomingo County Jail where he was charged with three counts of aggravated assault, three counts of simple assault on a police officer, one count of discharge of a firearm in an occupied dwelling and one count of public drunk. The charges of simple assault on a police officer were issued, rather than aggravated assault, only because he did not actually shoot the officers, according to reports.

Harris remains in custody at Magnolia Hospital in Corinth where he was transported Sunday after complaining of chest pains. Pannell said the suspect is under guard there while he undergoes

The case has been turned over to the Mississippi Highway Patrol Criminal Investigation MHP-CIB Officer Mickey Baker began his investigation soon after the arrest, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith.

Harris was a sergeant with the MDOT, working at the truck weigh station, located on Hwy. 72, just east of luka.

With the increase in twoincome and single-parent families, kids are taking more responsibility at home and influencing purchase that were previously considered adult territory. preferences in cookware, cleaning supplies and laundry equipment become important when the tasks at hand are at least partially their responsibility. Nutrition And Dental Health: A Lifelong Link Evidence continues to mount

on the close link between dental health and good nutrition. A balanced diet builds strong jaw bones, decay-resistant teeth and healthy gums.

Tooth decay is the major cause of tooth loss in children. Plaque is a sticky film of bacteria that constantly forms on teeth. If a susceptible tooth is attacked by plaque when sugars or starches are eaten, a cavity may develop.

An improper diet can contribute to tooth decay in many ways. Foods such as breath mints and hard candy stay in the mouth for some time, leading to an extended acid attack on the teeth. Chewy, sticky foods, such as raisins, dried fruits and cereals. also prolong the acid attack.

The time of day you eat is also important. If you must eat sugary foods, it's better to eat them with meals. It's also better to eat carbohydrates with other foods rather than alone. Research shows that foods such as cheese eaten with a meal can help counter the effects of the acids produced by the bacteria in plaque; it might even be best to eat cheese at the end of your meal. Be careful about those bedtime snacks - they can stay on the teeth throughout the night.

Periodontal (gum) disease, an infection caused by plaque, is a major cause of tooth loss in adults. Many researchers now believe that gum disease may progress faster and be more severe in a diet deficient in necessary nutrients Studies show that malnutrition has a role in the ability to fight infection. Vitamin deficiencies that have been specifically linked to gum disease are vitamins A. B12, K, Thiamin and Niacin Gum disease affects 75% of all adults at some time in their lives.

Tannic acid, found in food and drinks such as cocoa, rhubarb, tea, coffee and beer, has shown evidence of being a plaque preventative. When combined with sugar, as in chocolate, tanning may reduce the bacteria known to cause gum disease.

What Is A Sty?

The most common eyelid inflammation is a sty. It is an inflammation of the follicle of an eyelash or an oil gland. A follicle is a developmental crypt from which a hair develops and which acts as an anchor to support the base of the hair. The oil gland is a normal component of the skin 100 which helps to lubricate and gginb nourish. Both are capable of the the acting like receptacles for all kinds of skin debris which include dirt, dead skin cells and cosmetic products.

The cause is usually staph infection. Since staph germs are normal inhabitants of the skin it is very easy for a concentration of these bacteria to take over a natura incubation area like a hai follicle or an oil gland. Th initial symptom is tendernes of the eyelid. The eyeli usually swells and a reddi lump forms over the affects area. The treatment is he compresses and antibiotics, although punctur and drainage of the lesion i often necessary. When this occurs, further treatment wit topical antibiotics may b indicated.



Recipe of the Week

Ham and Biscuits

There are rules for making truly exceptional country ham biscuits. In fact, the folks in the Martha White Kitchen have spent a good amount of time researching and debating the issue. They suggest that the finest country ham biscuits come in two distinct styles.

One is a flaky, thin, crisp biscuit that splits easily, but doesn't crumble as you bite into the chewy cured ham. The ingredients are the same, but the proportions are varied slightly. To make a thin, crisp biscuit, the shortening that is cut into the self-rising flour must be left in larger pea-sized pieces and dough rolled out thinner.

Another popular biscuit for country ham is what some call "bride's" or "angel" biscuits. These biscuits have a softer crumb and crust. And this time, the self-rising flour is combined with a little yeast for flavoring to lighten the dough.

The origin of the yeast biscuit is unknown but seems to have surfaced in Southern cookbooks and in newspaper food sections during the 1950's. Alice Jarman, the founder of the Martha White Kitchen, developed a version for

the company that was publicized across the South called "Riz" Biscuits. These biscuits became preferred carries for country ham because of their light texture and good keeping qualities.

Riz Biscuits

1 pkg. active dry yeast 1/4 cup warm water (105 to 115°F) 2 1/2 cups Martha White®

self-Rising Flour 3 tablespoon sugar 1/3 cup shortening 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons

minutes or until biscuits and golden brown. Brush hot biscuit with melted butter. 32 biscuits.

Body Fat: To Pinch Or Not To Pinch?

If you're worried about outting on a little extra padding his holiday season, maybe you should reconsider your definition of "fat."

The truth is that fat, like beauty, may rest in the eye of the The determination beholder. actually lies in the way body mass The federal is measured. government's standard is body mass index (BMI), which has become a popular way to judge han obesity. BMI is determined by an equation using a person's weight and height, similar to the old insurance charts. A BMI score of around 19-24 denotes a healthy weight range. A score between 25-29 (considered overweight) or higher than 30 (considered obese) places the person at higher risk for heart disease, diabetes and other medical conditions.

"The problem is that BMI calculation doesn't differentiate between fat and muscle. Body mass index measurements are targeted toward the 'average'-size person, so they are not very accurate for athletes or anyone

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ugh inch who lifts weights or exercise a lot," explains Emily C. Gates, an exercise physiologist and facility supervisor of Iuka Hospital Wellness Center, the newest addition to North Mississippi Wellness Health Services' Centers. "Because muscle weighs more than fat, the body mass index for athletes is often skewed."

Another disadvantage is that the same equation is used for males and females, so there is no allowance made for gender differences, Gates said.

NMHS Wellness Centers perform body mass index calculations at health fairs and similar settings because it's quick, easy and offers most people some idea of their ideal weight. but for true fitness evaluations, a skinfold test is performed using calipers to measure the amount of excess fat at strategic locations. For men, measurements are taken at the chest, abdomen and thigh. For women, measurements are taken at the back of the arm, waist

"BMI doesn't take into

account the percentage of a person's body that is comprised of unhealthy fat as compared to lean body mass," she said. "Because a skin fold test measures both factors, we can better determine how much a person should weigh in comparison to how much they actually weigh."

came to the Tishomingo County driver's license office, located in the Rescue Squad building in Iuka, and presented to the personnel there what he claimed was his birth certificate and social security card. When Mississippi Department of Transportation Officer Loretta Marsh entered the social security number in her computer, she discovered that the number belonged to a person who had been dead for 10 years, according to the Sheriff.

Marsh then immediately contacted the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office. Sheriff Smith said his office then called in Misover's license by using another's sissippi Highway Patrol Criminal

Investigation Bureau Officer Rick Marlar, who, with the assistance of Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department interpreter Walter Vaughn, began questioning the Hispanic man about the documents. Better Late Than Never To Get Flu Shot

Mississippi's flu season peaks in mid-January, but influenza vaccine is now widely available and can still save lives if administered to high risk persons

"With flu vaccine arriving late, some Mississippians have had trouble getting the flu shot," said State Health Officer Dr. Ed Thompson. "Now marks the beginning of the flu season, and those at high risk for complications from influenza should get a shot if they have not done so. We can now offer vaccine to persons not at high risk, and we encourage anyone who wants to avoid getting the flu to get a flu shot."

The Department of Health has now received almost all the vaccine it ordered and has distributed the vaccine to Health Department clinics statewide. The Department charges a \$6 administration fee for flu shots.

Influenza activity in the United States is increasing. Only one case of influenza has been confirmed by culture in Mississippi, but the Department of Health is beginning to get increased reports of flu-like illness from the Gulf Coast area. The Centers of Disease Control

and Prevention (CDC) noted six states are reporting regional influenza activity: Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, and Tennessee; Texas reported the highest influenza

CDC estimates that about five million doses of flu vaccine are still available. The vaccine can protect healthy adults who wish to

noted that Thompson Mississippi's flu season usually runs through April. The flu shot offers protection 10 to 14 days after vaccination. In an average flu season, 20,000 Americans die and 110,000 are hospitalized because of complications of influenza illness.

Anyone 65 years of age or older, residents of nursing homes, adults and children six months of age or older with diabetes, immune system problems, or chronic lung disease are considered high risk for complications and should be vaccinated against the flu. Women who will be in the second or third trimester of pregnancy during the influenza season (November through April) should be vaccinated against the flu.

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

MULTIPLAN - the acronym for MDOT's 30-year plan combines both urban and statewide plans. Mississippi's four urbanized areas are the Gulf Regional Area, the Hattiesburg Area, and the Jackson Area, plus the DeSoto County portion of the Memphis, Tenn., Area.

In a nutshell, MULTIPLAN, which stands for the Mississippi Unified Long-Transportation Infrastructure Plan, will provide Mississippi transportation officials with a vision of our state's transportation future.

According to Ray Balentine, MDOT's state planning engineer, in addition to being unified geographically, MULTIPLAN will also address the long-term needs of all transportation modes highways, water, rail, air, and

"A planning effort of this magnitude would be impossible in many states," Balentine said. "We can do it because of the superb relationships between MDOT and Metropolitan Planning

Organizations in Mississippi's urbanized areas.'

The MULTIPLAN effort is divided into two phases. Phase One, the strategic plan, is expected to be complete in late 2001. Phase Two, the detailed needs analysis, will be completed as Census 2000 data becomes available.

"The long-range plan is our guiding principle and is refined continuously," Hugh Long, MDOT executive director said in a recent interview. "Continuous planning refines the forecasts of the long-range vision to more specific regional and corridor needs and finally to construction and maintenance projects.'

Container Gardening Brightens Up Winter

Many Mississippi gardeners big on container gardening uring the spring, summer and en fall, but once cold weather ts, the pots start to look kind of ents ismal. Take heart gardeners, we hed till can brighten up those cold reary porches, patios and decks.

Our choices are better than ou think. We can choose from ansies like the new Delta Fire, abbage, kale, dianthus like the ew Purple Bouquet, snapdragons ke the trailing Lumenaire, bulbs d one of my favorites that sually start showing up in nuary, the primula.

Mississippi produce some of the highest quality, most beautiful primulas around. Unfortunately, most of them are shipped out of the state because we haven't quite created the demand. consumers simply don't know what to do with them yet.

Primula comes from the Latin word which means "firstling of spring." There are about 400 species of primulas, which are mostly alpine perennials with short rhizomes.

have planted several primulas in terra cotta bowls on my front porch the past few years. They usually bloom profusely

well into May when the heat takes them out. But when you think about those bright colors on the porch during the coldest months, then this plant is worth the annual purchase.

One thing that makes primulas all the more unique is that they really do not want full sun. They prefer morning sun and afternoon shade or high filtered light. We can use the other winter blooming plants in full sun.

Primulas come in a wide range of colors that are breathtakingly bold and bright and will provide an immediate impact. There are even some with twotoned colors. You can space three plants about five inches apart in a 15-inch terra cotta bowl to create a really colorful garden. Don't be afraid to stick in a couple of

daffodil bulbs, too! I am partial to the primulas known in the trade as the Primula acaulis hybrids. These have fairly short flower stalks, and colors that are so bold they almost look artificial. The Crayon, Lira and Quantum are the most popular in this group.

The next biggest group is known as the Primula obconica hybrids. These have taller flower stalks. The colors are very pretty and just not quite as bold. The Libra and Juno series are the most popular in these group.

Whether you choose primulas or some of the other plants I mentioned for winter color, choose a good, light, well-drained mix for your container. If the bargain bag is so heavy you can hardly pick it up, select a more expensive brand.

Plant at the same depth as the original pot. Look for plants with healthy foliage that fills up their container. Keep your plants moist and feed with a dilute watersoluble, 20-20-20 fertilizer that has minor-nutrients. Be sure to keep old flowers removed for a tidy appearance and increased flower productivity.

Container gardening in the winter is as fun as in the spring and summer. In fact, it may give you more satisfaction, especially
