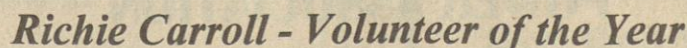
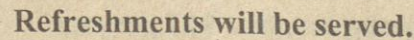

# Home Economics Tips

## AIR FILTERS AND CLEANERS

Perhaps you or a family member suffers from seasonal allergies, and you've heard that an air cleaner can keep pollen out of the house. Or, you may want to reduce cooking and smoke odors at home or in the office. How do you decide if you need an air cleaner? And if you do need one, which one is right for your

situation?

Your first line of defense is to replace indoor air by fresh, outside air on a regular basis. You can open doors and windows and add exhaust fans. You also should minimize sources of contamination inside your home. For example, good housekeeping can help control dust and dust mite

problems.

Common airborne particles range in size from .001 to 100 microns. A micron is about one-twenty-five thousandth of an inch. To get an idea of size, a hair from your head is about 250 microns in diameter. Your body can filter larger contaminants above 10 microns in size. A regular furnace filter removes some other contaminants. Problems can occur when smaller particles are present or when someone is unusually sensitive to a particular contaminant. Smaller airborne particles like tobacco smoke and fine household dust can enter the deeper parts of the lungs. Air cleaners remove some but not all particles from the air.

Air cleaners can be divided into two basic groups: portable or table-top models, and those you install with or in place of an existing furnace and air conditioner filter.

## PORTABLE AIR CLEANERS

Portable air cleaners are made to clean air in smaller areas, not the whole house. Air cleaners usually use filters, electrical attraction, or ozone to remove small particles from the air.

Filters trap particles. The finer the filter, the smaller the particles it traps. HEPA (high efficiency particulate arresting) filters are the best. They can capture up to 99 percent of particles down to 0.3 microns in size. But gas molecules, which include radon, tobacco smoke, etc., are extremely small and can still pass through a HEPA filter. An activated carbon or charcoal filter usually is added to trap gas molecules.

Pleated (also called "media") filters use materials like the HEPA filters, but they capture fewer particles because they are less tightly packed. They are 40 to 95 percent effective and remove most household dust.

Electrical attraction is used in electronic cleaners. This type of cleaner uses electrostatic precipitation, static charge, or particle ionization to remove particles drawn in by a fan through a foam pre-filter. Larger particles are trapped at this point. Particles are then charged by a high-voltage wire and captured in the precipitating fell. A carbon filter removes odors and a post-filter removes other particles.

When a pre-filter is used, the electrostatic precipitator can remove mold, bacteria, tobacco smoke, and most household dust. Regular maintenance is a must.

An electret cleaner uses polyester cellulose fibers with a static charge to trap particles in addition to the foam pre-filter and carbon filter.

A negative ionizer also uses a foam pre-filter and carbon filter. It is unique because it has charged wires, which create ions. The fan blows these charged particles into the room and they collect on walls and room surfaces. The fan and pre-filter should reduce soiling and staining from the particles.

Ozone generation is a type of air cleaner that uses a high-voltage

electrical charge to change oxygen to ozone. High concentrations of ozone can destroy gas molecules and some microorganisms, such as mold spores. This is not the filter of choice. Ozone can have adverse health effects.

**Performance Standards:** There are no universal standards, but you can ask about a unit's clean air delivery rate, which is abbreviated "CADR". This tells you the cubic feet the unit delivers each minute. Usually the CADR will show specifications for removing dust, pollen, and smoke. When two units have the same CADR, the one with the lower total air flow will be more efficient.

**Maintenance:** You may have to change or clean filters. With the electrostatic precipitator, you'll need to wash the electronic cell every two to three months.

**Summary:** If natural ventilation and exhaust fans do not take care of the problem, you may need an air cleaner. you need to decide whether you have problems in a room or small space or if you have air quality problems throughout the house. When the problems are throughout the house, in-duct filters are an alternative. Otherwise a portable cleaner may be a better choice.

When considering air cleaners, compare the clean air delivery standard (CADR) and needed maintenance.

## Conservation Corner

Over 75% of Mississippians are bird feeders and observers. For these birdwatchers, this means preparing for winter feeding. During winter months our short supply of natural food sources can be supplemented with artificial feeding. This type of feeding will provide birdwatchers a convenient way to view a variety of species. Here are some tips on attracting winter birds.

The first step is preparing winter feeders. Feeders should be cleaned thoroughly. For starters, there are 3 basic types of feeders designed to offer a variety of foods: a hanging type feeder; a ground or tray feeder; and a suet feeder.

The hanging type feeder should be placed away from one's home in an area that will provide clear viewing. The most common type of seed used with hanging feeders is sunflower. The ground or tray feeder should be placed near plant cover. The most common seed associated with the tray feeder is cracked corn; however, other seed mixtures work well. Suet feeders are a favorite of woodpeckers, chickadees, titmice and nuthatches.

The second step in preparing your bird feeder is selecting the seed. Seeds such as sunflower, safflower, millet and thistle seeds are fool-proof. Store seed in a

clean, dry area to prevent mold and mildew. Covered containers such as metal trash cans are excellent storage facilities for birdseed.

The next step is providing water for the birds. Water is important since all birds need water both for drinking and bathing. The best type of birdbaths available are the synthetic plastic baths. Synthetic plastics, such as polypropylene, have rough surfaces and will tolerate all extremities in temperatures. In extremely cold temperatures, you will need to keep water open at your birdbath. This can be done by either adding warm water as needed or by using an electric water heater.

A good feeding plan should include all three types of feeders. Different types of feeders appeal to different species of birds. To attract the birds and keep them coming back, you should clean your feeders and birdbaths regularly and dispose of any old or moldy food. Those of you who have a feeding plan may want to add additional feeders to enhance your existing area for birding.

If you are just beginning in the birding "business", you may want to purchase a field guide to the birds in your area. There are many quality guides on the market, so pick the one that best fits your need.

The final step is easy. Fill your feeders, sit back and enjoy.

### Baby's Vision Progress

Your baby's vision progress develops in a certain sequence. The time these events occur is not as important as the order in which they occur because one event builds upon another. If an infant is not performing a particular task at the time that most others are, it is absolutely no reason for concern. Some babies will be ahead in some areas and behind in others. Here are some probable steps.

At birth - The eyes move independently in a jerky manner. These movements only cover about 45 degrees and tracking is only done with large objects.

At one month - The baby's head lifts momentarily and the eyes can fix on objects - but the baby uses alternate eyes.

At two months - Binoocular vision has developed but the baby only occasionally fixes on an object - usually his/her hand.

At three months - Small objects can occasionally be followed up to 180 degrees with binoocular vision. The baby starts to hit at objects.

**To Have Or Not To Have**  
Should I let my cat or dog have a litter before having spayed?

There are no medical or psychological advantages allowing your female pet to have a litter before she is spayed. There are, however, several reasons not to wait.

Breeding your pet allows it to become pregnant puts that animal through all the medical risks of pregnancy. While healthy pets come through pregnancy in good condition there is still the risk of complications, uterine infections (which can be fatal), damage to the reproductive system during delivery, and more. Just as human pregnancy has its risks so does pregnancy in cats and dogs.

Both cats and dogs come into heat within the first year of life - but they are not fully grown at this time. Pregnancy in a young animal that has not reached her size and maturity is even more risky than pregnancy in an adult animal. You would be in a sense, allowing a young teenager to become pregnant. In addition, young animals may lack the maternal instinct to care for the litter, both during and after pregnancy. The myth that all female animals are natural mothers is, unfortunately, just that - a myth.

Your pet runs a much smaller risk if she is spayed before she ever goes into heat. Spaying a female dog before her first heat also drastically reduces her chances of developing mammary cancer.

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## BE PREPARED FOR AN ICE STORM

*Snow, sleet and freezing temperatures can strike anytime during the winter months. That's why it is best to be prepared in case of an ice storm. Keep the following items together so they'll be at your fingertips if the lights go out:*

- A battery-operated radio.** When outages occur or emergencies arise, local radio stations will keep you informed with timely updates.
- Flashlights, extra batteries, large candles, matches.** Make sure there's a flashlight on every floor of the house and one for every family member. If you use candles for light, be sure to keep them away from small children and from flammable objects.
- Bottled water, non-perishable food items.** Keep plenty of bottled water on hand in case of an emergency. (Count on one gallon per person per day.) Remember family members with special needs, such as baby formula.
- Emergency numbers.** Keep the numbers for emergency personnel, including your electric cooperative, posted near the telephone or another handy place. Before you call to report an outage, make sure you haven't blown a fuse or tripped a circuit. Also look outside to see if your neighbors' lights are off. Be prepared to tell if you heard any unusual sounds or can see downed lines in the neighborhood.
- Remember, telephones with answering machines rely on electricity to operate.** Use a phone connected directly to the phone jack.

## Iuka Area Host Families Needed Now

Foreign high school students are scheduled to arrive very soon for academic semester and year program homestays, and the sponsoring organization needs a few more local host families.

According to Pacific Intercultural Exchange (P.I.E.) Executive Director, John Doty, the students are all between the ages of 15 and 18 years, are English-speaking, have their own spending money, carry accident and health insurance, and are anxious to share their cultural experience with their new American families. P.I.E. currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length from a semester to a full academic year, where the students attend local high schools.

P.I.E. area representatives match students with host families by finding common interests and lifestyles through an informal in-home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match. As there are no "typical" host families, P.I.E. can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it be a single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large family.

Families who host for P.I.E. are also eligible to claim a \$50.00 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, P.I.E. has students from Spain, Germany, Latvia, the Former Soviet Union, Venezuela, Argentina, Brazil, Mexico,

Mongolia, Italy, Paraguay, Australia, Sweden, Yugoslavia, China, Belgium, Vietnam and many other countries. P.I.E. has also been invited to participate in a special government-funded program to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet Union to the United States. P.I.E. is a non-profit educational organization that has sponsored more than 18,000 students from 40 countries since its founding in 1975. The organization is designated by the United States Department of State and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET), certifying that the organization complies with the standards set forth in CSIET's Standards for International Educational Travel Programs.

Doty encourages families to contact the program immediately, as it will allow the proper time for the students and hosts to get to know one another before they actually meet for the first time.

Iuka area families interested in learning more about student exchange or arranging for a meeting with a community representative may call P.I.E., toll-free, at 1-800-631-1818. The agency also has travel/study program opportunities available for American high school students as well as possibilities for community volunteers to assist and work with area host families, students and schools.

## Tall Tale Tour

It's said that rodeo had its beginning in West Texas, a place where the land wasn't the only thing, "larger than life". America has always been a land of BIG legends about famous and sometimes fictional characters who performed amazing feats. They were credited with carving out our country's natural wonders. Paul Bunyan and "Babe" his big blue ox, were said to have carved out the Grand Canyon just by dragging his axe. From the earliest days on the open range cowboys told tall tales around the campfire. Stories about men and women who helped settle the frontier, which became more and more exaggerated with each telling. Pecos Bill became the hero of many a cowboy's tale, as he went from being abandoned in the Pecos river, raised by coyotes, to being the "Rip-snortinest cowboy who ever rode, North, South, East or West of the Rio Grandel". So great a cowboy was Pecos Bill that the first rodeo was held in the town of Pecos, Texas.

Some things are still "larger than life," like this year's Lone Star Rodeo Tall Tale Tour coming to the Crossroads Arena in Corinth, Mississippi on January 19th & 20th. Performances will begin at 7:30 p.m. nightly.

Events in the rodeo include

bareback bronc riding, calf roping, cowgirl's break-away ropings, steer wrestling, cowgirls', barrel racing, team roping, and brahma bull riding. The featured performers include "Rockin" Robbie Hodges with his comedy antics and the ten time specialty act of the year the One Arm Bandit Co. Lynn Payne will keep all entertained. "This is a sanctioned pro rodeo championship points event," Fowlkes said. "We are excited because the newly crowned champions will be attending this rodeo."

Special Attractions include free pony rides from 6-7:00, an Easter egg hunt-like Gold Rush, and Mutton busting for kids under 50 pounds. disease. The center gives people with diabetes the next best thing to a cure-which is control.

But diabetes care is expensive. "Diabetes is a long-term disease. Throughout the patient's lifetime, the disease requires proper diet, medications, blood tests and all the necessary supplies that go along with that," Dr. Martin said. "These are simply unaffordable for people with no insurance, and still burdensome for those who have insurance."

Founded in 1993, the center is an excellent resource for people recently diagnosed with diabetes, as well as those who have had diabetes for some time and are having trouble with blood sugar control. Some people need help with a specific skill, such as proper foot care, meal planning and how to handle sick days. The center also benefits patients who are hospitalized for illness or surgery.

Financial reimbursement for these services is grim. "Medicare pays very little toward the cost of diabetes treatment, and Medicaid pays even less," Dr. Martin said. "Teaching people diabetes self-management skills is critical to successfully controlling this disease, but insurance doesn't cover it."

Services are provided not only in Tupelo, but also in satellite clinics throughout the region for patients who find it difficult to travel. The center also provides free diabetes education programs several times each month in area communities.

"In this day and age when

hospitals everywhere are cutting these types of community services, we are extremely fortunate to continue offering them," Dr. Martin said.

For those patients who are financially unable to control their disease, the NMMC Diabetes Assistance Fund provides supplies and self-management training. Administered by the Health Care Foundation of North Mississippi, the fund helps improve quality of life and decrease preventable hospital admissions.

The Foundation also pays for children ages 7-16 with diabetes to

attend a summer camp designed just for them at camp Hopewell near Oxford. Dr. Martin and other Diabetes Treatment Center staff members volunteer during the camp, which gives children with diabetes the opportunity for

horseback riding, swimming, canoeing and hiking in a medically-supervised setting. A record 36 children attended 2000 Diabetes Summer Camp thanks to \$10,440 from the Health Care Foundation of North Mississippi. The funding is made possible through donations to the Diabetes Summer Camp Fund.

The Diabetes Treatment Center is located on the first floor of NMMC's East Tower and is open from 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. For more information, call (662) 791-2500 or 1-800-THE DESK (1-800-843-3375).

119; Education, 110; and Nursing, 33.

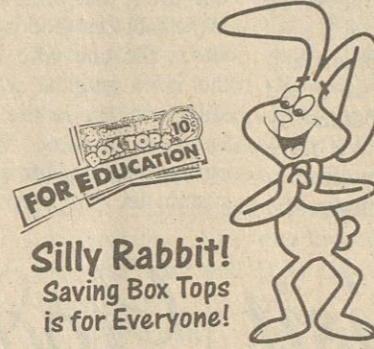

## NMHS Initiates New Telephone Translation Services To Help Remove Language Barriers...

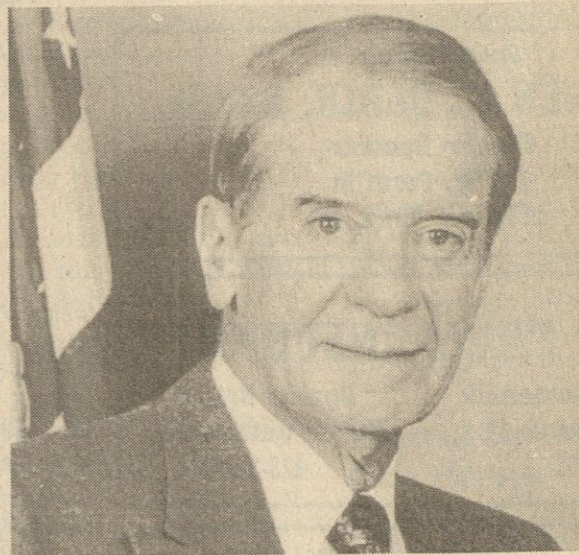
North Mississippi Health Services is upgrading its telephone interpretation service to improve communication with the region's growing non-English speaking patients.

NMHS has been providing interpreters along with a telephone interpretation service for several years. The new, upgraded system features dual handset telephones that allow both the health care provider and the patient to be on the phone at the same time with the interpreter.

Currently, language interpreters are needed several times each week to assist patients and health care providers. NMHS maintains an interpreter list of community residents willing to volunteer their time and expertise to help.

"Spanish is still the most common language served, but lately we have had an increased demand for Vietnamese and

many. The past teaches that victory comes only through obedience and peace comes through dependence upon God. (II Chronicles 15:2, 5; 14:6, 7, 11)

Courage comes from hearing the Lord and responding to His Word. We can find courage to go into any battle through the assurance and

approval of the Lord. When we are strong in the Lord, He gives us more courage.

When we are faced with overwhelming situations, the one thing that brings assurance is the fact that God is in control. He is the one who commands the wind and the waves to be still, and He is the One who knows us by name. We can cast our burdens on Him and He will sustain us. He prepares us for

adversity even before it arrives and He shields us so we are not destroyed because of loss or disappointment. Nothing is allowed to touch our lives without His expressed approval. If tragedy comes, we can be assured that God has a purpose and a plan in mind for its happening. Many times He uses adversity to draw us closer to Him and to teach us more about His faithfulness.

Many find it hard to trust God because of scars from deep sorrow or emotional pain. He understands our feelings of abandonment or abuse. God is patient and loving and is a master at putting broken pieces back together again. He will do this because He is sovereign and because His love is everlasting.

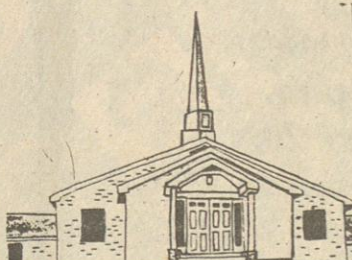

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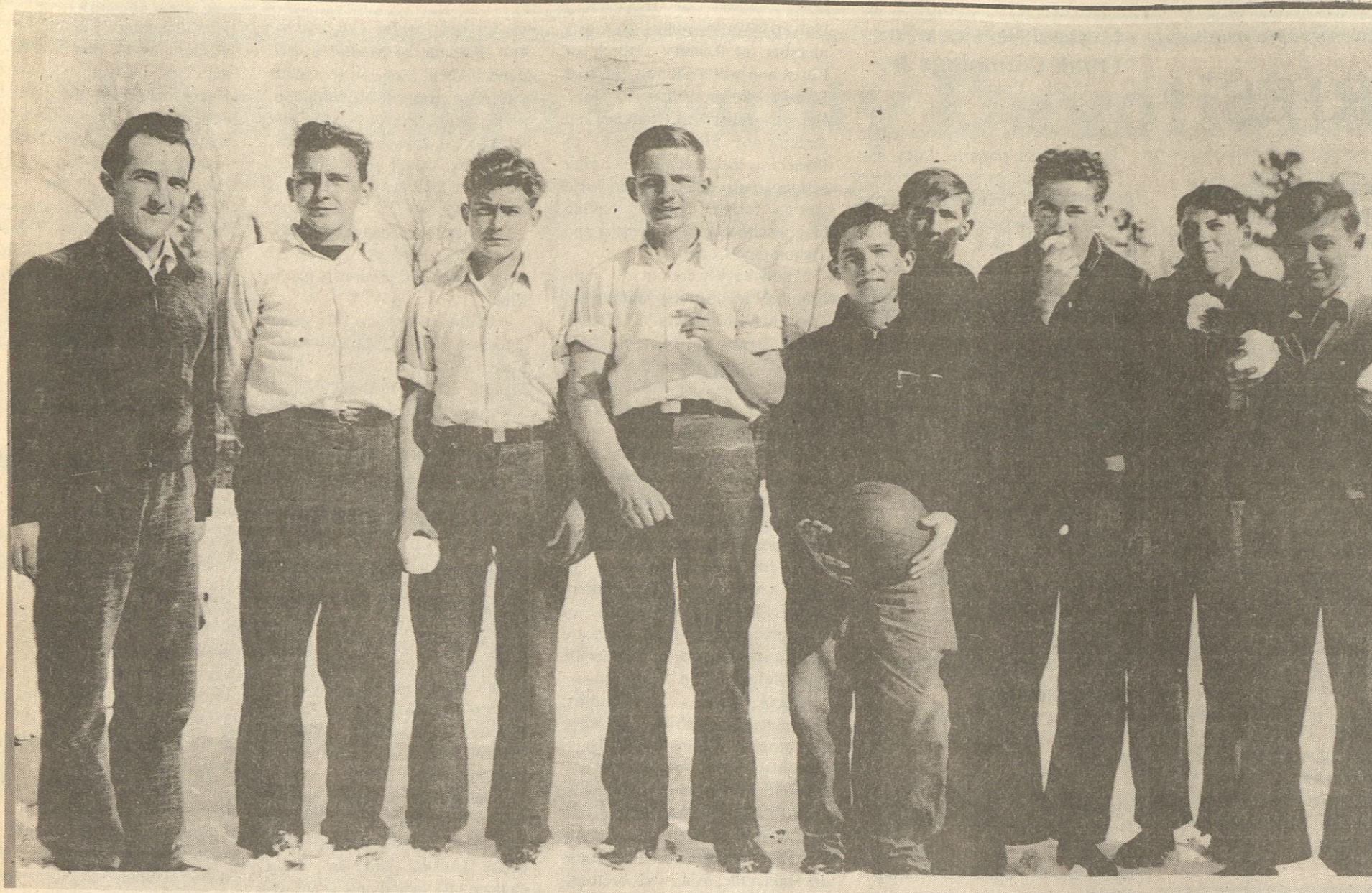

## Variegated Plants Shine In Gardens

This is the time of the year when variegated plants really start to shine in the landscape. Some gardeners consider plants with leaf variegation gaudy or unattractive, but even the much maligned golden Euonymus, when placed against dark evergreens, is like a lantern in the forest. I believe the Euonymus may be a forgotten plant for the Southern landscape.

Winter is a good time to evaluate your landscape. Does it have enough evergreens and are there variegated plants showing winter color? I am often asked what to use for color in the shade, most often in reference to bedding plants. In a shade garden, the easiest way to add definition, color and character is by including variegated shrubs.

One of my favorite shrubs is

the Aucuba, which looks tropical but is actually from the Himalayas. It has the common name Spotted Laurel and most definitely cannot tolerate direct sun, so plant it in partial shade to shade. The prettiest Aucubas are grown once you've made adequate soil preparation.

Aucuba's bold, brightly variegated foliage make them wonderful as accents. Plant in groups around fatsia for a tropical look. Fuchsia-colored Impatiens look nice in front of the more brightly variegated forms. Picturata, Sulphur, Serratifolia and Variegata are the most popular varieties.

Another great variegated shrub for the shady area is the hydrangea, although most often the green forms are chosen.

Hydrangeas not only give color

from their flowers, but some have silver and white foliage.

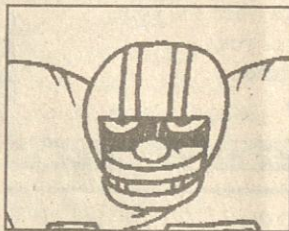
In the more sunny areas of the landscape, conifers like the Chamaecyparis Crippsii or Golden Thread are good choices for variegation. I have been watching these for five years now in Mississippi and keep expecting to see them burn out or develop some other problem. The only problem I have seen is that I do not have any in my landscape yet.

For the tropical-style summer garden, try the variegated shell ginger, caladium, hosta and the new ctenanthe to add brightness to the yard.

Ctenanthe is one of the best-kept secrets. It is often sold so generically that it is called simply variegated plant. During the summer, I grow them under high filtered light in pine trees and they grow and get more beautiful with each passing week. This plant is tropical, so you will need to bring it in during the winter.

Some plants not only give variegation but bright colors as well. For color and variegation as bold as Carnival time in Rio, try coleus like Solar Sunrise and Solar Eclipse. At the Fall Flower and Garden Fest in Crystal Springs, gardeners have been rediscovering variegated cannas like the Tropicana, or Phasion, and the Bengal Tiger.

Most likely there is a variegated form available of whatever plant you feel passionate about. While they are good for collectors, they also can really enhance your landscape.

Hall has led his teams to numerous division, North half, and State championships. From 1991 to 1998, Hall won a Class 4A

State title at Louisville ('91) and three Class 3A State Championships at Amory ('94, '95, '98). In 1994 and 1995 Hall's Panthers recorded perfect 15-0 records.

Following the 1995 season the Panthers were ranked number one in Mississippi and 16th nationally in the final rankings. Hall was selected both the CLARION-

LEDGER State Coach of the Year and the Mississippi Association of Coaches State Coach of the Year. In 1998, Hall served as head coach of the Mississippi team in the Mississippi-Alabama Classic.

Most recently, Hall directed the Wayne County team to a Class 5A tri-Championship and second round of the playoffs. His career record stands at 211-52.

Hall's success, attributed entirely on the high school level, leaves him confident he can make a smooth transition to the community/junior college level.

"I don't think it's going to be that big of an adjustment," Hall explained.

"You are still dealing with young men. They are just a different level of player and playing at a higher level."

"The biggest difference is that we'll have the athletes all the time and of a recruiting, but it's still going to be a challenge. I've observed league closely from the over the past two years and that has helped me be prepared for this opportunity."

According to Northeast president Dr. Charles W. O'Connell, Hall's hiring is simply a step in the school's commitment to raise the level of competitiveness of all its teams.

"I think that Coach Hall is going to us a winning record, complete confidence in him, deliver a competitive Tiger Chance added."

"We are glad that he has agreed to join us and look forward to the season and the successful year for Northeast."

A 1974 graduate of Ballinger High School, Hall attended Itawamba Junior College, attended Northeast Mississippi Junior College, and obtained Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education from University of Mississippi in Hattiesburg. He has also done graduate work at Mississippi State University.

Hall and his wife Jan have three children: son, Will, 20; and one daughter, Julianne, 15.

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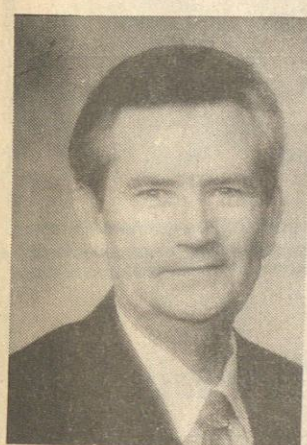

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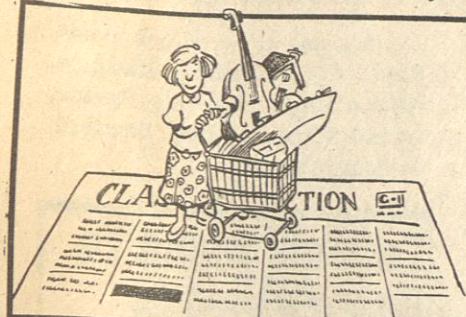

## School Nurse Response Helps Identify Heart Problem

Shortly after school started in 1998, 13-year-old Latoya Satterwhite walked upstairs at Tupelo Middle School to her classroom and sat in her desk. Suddenly, she felt dizzy and faint, started shaking and grew pale.

Puzzled by the symptoms, her teacher took the eighth-grader to the school nurse, Cindy Holcomb, RN, whose services are provided by NMHS free of charge to the school system. "Latoya's heart rate was 160, which is about twice the normal rate for a child her age," Holcomb said. "She told me that it felt like her heart was running away."

The episode happened just weeks into Holcomb's first year as a school nurse. "I had just recently transferred from North Mississippi Medical Center's Heart Institute, so I was very alert to the heart and these symptoms," Holcomb said. "I didn't want to pass this off as anxiety." Holcomb called Satterwhite's mother, Teresa Norwood, who in turn called her daughter's pediatrician.

"During that summer, Latoya had told me a few times that her heart hurt and felt like it was racing, but I told her it was probably just indigestion and left it at that," her mother said. "When I saw how pale she was that day and the nurse told me about her heart rate, I was scared to death."

After an examination, stress test and electrocardiogram (EKG), the pediatrician referred her to pediatric cardiologist Stuart Birnbaum, M.D., with Le Bonheur Children's Medical Center in Memphis.

Satterwhite saw Dr. Birnbaum the following week during his pediatric cardiology satellite clinic at NMMC's Heart Institute.

To help the specialists track her heart's activity, Satterwhite wore a heart monitor for two months. "One night while Latoya was lying in bed, her heart rate jumped to around 250," her mother said. "Dr. Birnbaum saw her the next day at his clinic in Tupelo. He explained that Latoya's heart is fine when she's active, but when she gets still, her heart keeps pumping fast. He told me that it would only get worse, not better, and we decided to go ahead with surgery to correct the problem."

Satterwhite underwent a seven-hour heart surgery Feb. 12, 1999, at Le Bonheur and today is doing exceptionally well. "Every time she had a physical exam to play basketball, nothing was happening with her heart, so everything checked out fine," her mother said. "If it hadn't been for Mrs. Holcomb being at school when this happened, it might have taken much longer for us to realize that something was wrong with Latoya's heart. It also makes me more comfortable to know that if anything happens while Latoya is at school, the school nurse knows how to handle the situation and can communicate with her physician. She can get Latoya the proper attention, because one minute could mean my child's life."

### Commissioner Bo Robinson Brings A Little Warmth To Cold Hard Reality...

Commissioner Bo Robinson in an effort to relieve some of the burden of a harsh winter and deregulated gas prices that confront consumers, announced today that the Public Service Commission has entered an order requesting that all gas companies under the jurisdiction of the Commission refrain from disconnecting any customer who is making a good faith effort to pay their utility bills.

Robinson stated that neither the Mississippi Public Service Commission nor your local gas utility have any control over the price of natural gas. Natural gas

prices were deregulated by an act of Congress in 1992. Your local gas utility is not a producer of gas and merely buys natural gas on your behalf. It is not profiting from these price increases. The PSC does not allow your local utilities to "mark up" or profit in any way from the sale of the gas itself. Your local gas utility merely delivers the product to your home. The utility's delivery fees are regulated by the PSC and have not increased in any significant way.

Commissioner Robinson recognizes the extreme hardship placed on families during this time of high prices and cold weather; and therefore, has signed this order today.

"If you believe that you will be unable to pay your bill in full by the date due, please contact your local gas utility as soon as possible to arrange a payment plan," stated Robinson.

Yes, men go to heaven because of what God does in them, not what they do for Him. Hallelujah!

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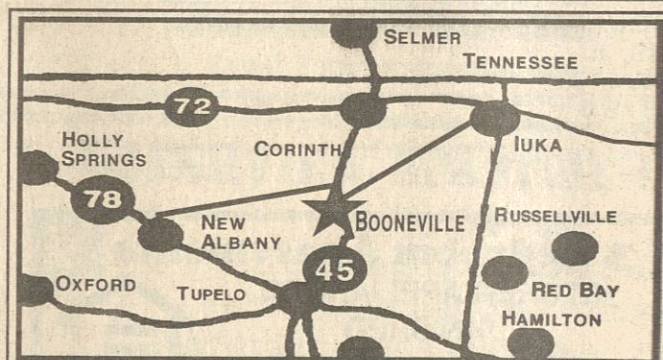
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
