"I really didn't know to expect, but it has been ng well, so far," Jason



A Message From The Board of Supervisors

To the Citizens of Tishomingo County:

A few months ago, we wrote to you explaining our efforts to utilize county office space in the most efficient way while accommodating the needs of the different departments. Since we wrote that letter, the sheriff has requested that we look at the possibility of building a new jail. We have met with two different architects and obtained estimates on the costs of doing this. According to the information we have received, a new jail meeting the specifications the sheriff has requested would cost in excess of \$3.5 million. As an alternative, we have considered remodeling and expanding the existing facility. We will continue to consider this matter, but we would like to invite your input on this proposed project. Such an undertaking would have to be

was quite sufficient, and that is what we have implemented.

We continue to receive comments and complaints about the level of funding of the sheriff's department. For the current fiscal year, the sheriff requested \$822,686 and we set his budget at \$699,536. By way of comparison, Tishomingo County has a population of approximately 18,000. Alcorn County, with a population of about 32,000 has allotted \$900,000 for it's sheriff's department budget, and Itawamba County with approximately 20,000 residents has a sheriff's budget of \$649,444.

As part of our yearly process at setting the budget, we customarily have to pare down the requests of different departments in order to stay within what we think are acceptable limits. It is a difficult task and one we take seriously. We feel that we have acted responsibly in setting the sheriff's budget. We will continue to work with Mr. Smith in whatever way we can to ensure that law and order are not hurt in any way.

Special Election On Future Of Mississippi Flag Set For April 17

Voters throughout Mississippi will go to the polls on April 17 to decide if we will keep our current Mississippi flag design or adopt a new by a design, proposed committee headed up by former Mississippi Governor William Winter.

According to Tishomingo County Circuit Court Clerk Donna Dill, the ballot will have colored pictures of the current flag and the proposed new design. Voters will pick the one they wish to adopt as the official state flag.

In a recent telephone poll of 886 voters conducted between Jan. 25 and Feb. 2 by Jackson's Clarion-Ledger, 55 percent of voters said they would vote to keep the original 1894 state flag with its

Confederate battle emblem. The poll indicated that 34 percent would vote to adopt the new design, which would replace the Confederate emblem with a circular pattern of 20 stars on a field of blue. The 20 stars represent the fact that Mississippi was the 20th state to enter the union.

Among those who said they would vote to keep the current flag, most cited history and heritage as the main reason. Other reason included seeing no reason to change, seeing the old flag as harmless and disliking the proposed new flag design.

Among those who said they favor the new flag, most stated that it was because it represented images of slavery and the KKK and was offensive to them.

Kristina Hemlinger Completes Basic Training...

Marine Corps Pfc. Kristina M. Hemlinger, daughter of Lisa L. and Michael L. Hemlinger of Iuka, Miss., recently completed basic training at Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, S.C. and was promoted to her current rank.

Hemlinger successfully completed 12 weeks of training designed to challenge new Marine recruits both physically and mentally.

Hemlinger and fellow recruits began their training at 5 a.m., by running three miles and performing calisthenics. In addition to the physical conditioning program, Hemlinger spent numerous hours in classroom and field assignments which included learning first aid, uniform regulations, combat water survival, marksmanship, handto-hand combat and assorted weapons training. They performed close order drill and operated as a small infantry unit during field training.

Hemlinger and other recruits also received instruction on the Marine Corps' core values - honor, courage and commitment, what the words mean in guiding personal and professional conduct.

Hemlinger and fellow recruits ended the training phase with The Crucible, a 54hour team effort, problem solving evolution which culminated with an emotional ceremony in which the recruits were presented the Marine Corps Emblem, and were addressed as "Marines" for the first time since boot camp began.

Hemlinger is a 2000 graduate of Tishomingo County High School of Iuka, Miss.

Religion and 'Good Government'

The French philosopher Alexis deTocqueville once wrote about America: "In France, I always saw the spirit of freedom and the spirit of religion marching in opposite directions, but in America I found they were intimately united and that they reigned in common over the same country." How far we have come. In recent years, liberals have alienated millions of Americans through an effort to purge religion from almost every aspect of American public life. However, our new President sees America's religious heritage as one of our nation's strengths, eager and ready to be enlisted in the fights against, poverty, illiteracy, drug addiction and others. Like many of us, he knows that government can never be a substitute for the very Judeo-Christian values from which American Democracy itself was derived.

This week President George W. Bush announced the creation of the Office of Community and Faith-Based Initiatives. He also signed an executive order instructing five cabinet agencies to create their own formal stand-alone Centers for Faith-Based and Community Initiatives to conduct an audit of how government currently interacts with nonprofit and faith-based groups. It is a bold effort to remove existing barriers to cooperation between the federal government and religious or private organizations.

It is also a move that is sure to garner criticism from the political left. But, so what, they tried their big-government way, and look where we are today. Almost 40 years after President Lyndon Johnson declared the federal government's "war on poverty," the condition, and the problems it fosters, is still persistent, particularly in our cities. The erosion of the family, teen pregnancy, drug and alcohol abuse, pornography, prostitution - all of these ills can be linked to poverty, but more specifically they are the result of a culture that is becoming increasingly valueless, and values are rooted only in religion.

The naysayers charge that the President's initiative violates the notion of separation of church and state. It clearly does not. Consider the Golden Rule of doing unto others as you would have them do unto you, a value that is arguably the root of all human outreach. This value is also based in religion, but I doubt even the most ardent atheist would argue against its application. Neither should they insinuate that democracy will fall with the application of this or any other universal value to today's pressing social ills. As it does in many other circumstances, government is simply buying a contract for services from these private and religious organizations - services which government has failed to perform.

These faith-based initiatives will not force theology on anyone. It is simply a reemphasis on existing law which allows voluntary participants to access federal block grants via charitable, religious and private organizations. If the participant still prefers that a nonreligious group to administer these funds, one is provided. Basically, this is simply the next progression of what has been a very successful welfare reform effort initiated by Congress four years ago.

The debate over this initiative has reminded me of how far our nation has strayed when it comes to religion's role. My friend, former Senator John Ashcroft, has been enduring sharp criticism from liberals since his nomination for Attorney General by President Bush. Confirmation can be a tough process, but it is truly a new and very sad day when a dedicated Christian is labeled by anyone as unfit for service because of his faith. The fact is, America has a strong religious strength which has until recent history worked in a successful concert with our national life. Without it, our nation has suffered.

Those who seek to exclude religion reject the notions of our founders like Thomas Jefferson who said religion was "deemed in other countries incompatible with good government, and yet proved by our existence to be its best support." The President's faith initiative may be the best way of re-tapping one of America's original strengths. It is indeed good

There is this potter who has an order for two vessels. One is vessel of honor (a nice vase), and the other is a vessel of dishonor (maybe a garbage container).

The proposition put forth is, who would question the right of the potter to take one lump of clay and use part of it for the honorable vessel and use the other portion for the dishonorable vessel? The obvious answer is that no one would question the potter's right to do as he pleased with the clay.

Now, this was given to illustrate the sovereignty of God in the disposition of His creatures.

God has the right to love Jacob and hate Esau (verse 13). He has the right to love and save Israel and hate and destroy Pharaoh (verses 16-18). He has the right to elect some to everlasting life and leave the rest to their own just condemnation (verses 11, 22-

When men have the notion to question the fairness of it all, the sovereign God simply asserts in verses 20 and 21, "Nay but, O man, who art thou that repliest against God? Shall the thing formed say to him that formed it, Why hast thou made me thus? Hast not the potter power over the clay, of the same lump to make one vessel unto honor, and another unto dishonor?"

Farm Service Agency Disaster Signup Begins

The United States epartment of Agriculture arm Service Agency began a mup period on January 18, D01, for the Livestock ssistance Program (LAP), rop Disaster Program (CDP) nd Noninsured Crop Disaster ssistance Program (NAP).

LAP provides direct ayments to eligible producers ho suffered grazing losses te to natural disaster during D00. Counties must be clared a disaster area by a claration from the President the United States or the cretary of Agriculture. All ississippi counties were clared a disaster for 2000.

Each county must request proval through the National arm Service Agency office to plement LAP. A county ust have suffered a 40 crcent or greater loss of azing production for three or ore consecutive months ring the LAP crop year and rtify grazing losses to the unty office. Eligible restock must have been vned or leased for at least ree months.

LAP payments will be sued only after the signup has ded and a factor determined; required. A national factor ill be determined if plication requests exceed the tional allocation.

CDP provides assistance producers who suffered oduction losses in excess of percent of a crop's

tablished yield. Insured ops, uninsured crops and ninsured crops are covered der this program provided

that losses sustained were weather related. To apply for assistance, each producer must report all acreage of crops on the unit, the production from those crops and sign a crop insurance agreement. Also, farmers must certify their gross revenue for the 1999 tax year, complete a farm operating plan for a person determination, if not already on file at the county office, and comply with the Highly Erodible and Wetland Conservation Compliance provisions.

Payments will be issued immediately after publication of the program in the Federal Register and after all required information is furnished. Crop Disaster Program payments will not be subject to a national payment factor

NAP is designed to reduce financial losses that occur when natural disasters cause a catastrophic loss of production or prevented planting of an eligible crop by providing coverage for which Federal Crop Insurance is not offered.

An eligible producer is a landowner, tenant ог sharecropper who shares in the risk of producing the crop and is entitled to share in the crop or would have shared had the crop been produced.

An eligible crop is a commercial crop or other

agricultural commodity for which crop insurance is not available and that is grown for food (including livestock feed as grass and hay) or fiber (except trees). Eligible crops include specifically aquaculture (including ornamental fish), floriculture, ornamental nursery, Christmas Trees, turfgrass sod, seed crops and industrial crops.

NAP coverage applies only to those losses in excess of 50 percent of the expected yield. Producers who wish to participate will be required to pay a service fee of \$100 for each NAP crop, not to exceed \$300 per county or \$900 per state

NAP coverage begins on the latter of 30 days after the application for coverage and fees are submitted, the date the crop is planted or the final planting date for crops you were prevented from planting.

In case of crop losses, a notice of loss must be submitted to the local FSA office within 15 days of the occurrence of the actual disaster, the final planting date for crops unable to be planted due to a natural disaster or the date damage to the crop becomes apparent to the producer.

The closing date for these signups has yet to be determined. For additional information on any of these programs, please contact your county Farm Service Agency office at Corinth, Mississippi.

County Agents Notes By Danny Owen County Agent

Planting time is still several weeks away for most vegetable gardeners. However, if you're really dedicated and ready for a few sunny day gardening projects, consider some of the following. They'll really payoff in terms of fewer disease and other pest problems after your garden is up and going next spring. Chore number one should be destruction and burial of last season's crop debris. Since many disease and insect pests live through the winner in old plants, cull piles, or plant stubble left in the garden, destruction of crop debris should be an annual project. This is a great way to cut down on early season disease pressure and you'll have less blight in your cabbage, broccoli, green beans, tomatoes, and other crops.

Debris from diseased plants should not be added to compost piles, since temperatures reached are not always sufficient to kill nematode eggs and other plant disease microbes. Remaining stubble and surface litter should be plowed under at least six inches before planting. This is effective because as debris decays, the disease microorganisms eventually deteriorate, and reduce the amount of fungus and bacterial inoculum that could cause problems in future crops. How

about those tomato stakes and bean support poles lying over in a corner in the garden? Before reusing, it's a good idea to disinfect them, since many disease-causing microorganisms are able to survive the off-season on

stakes, poles, cages and other plant support structures. To reduce the risk of disease, tomato stakes and cages can be disinfected by washing to remove soil, followed by dipping or spraying with a 10% bleach solution (one gallon of household bleach in nine gallon of water works great) prior to reuse. If you haven't already done so, collect soil samples to determine fertility needs. Plants which are fertilized according to recommendations based on a soil test are not as likely to have disease problems as plants which are low in nutrition or receive an imbalance of nutrients. While collecting a soil sample for fertility analysis, why not collect a duplicate sample to check for the presence of parasitic nematodes which feed

on the roots of many garden plants.

FIRE ANT CONTROL

When soil temperatures warm, fire ants increase in number and activity. Don't let them. Fire ant bait can be placed around mounds to control ants that seek refuge in lawns. For the home garden, label rates of an approved insecticide can provide good control. If a mound drench is used then it is important NOT to disturb the mound any more than necessary. Some type of sprinkler watering can will work well. In either case, don't destroy mounds before or during treatment. After a couple of weeks, don't be surprised if you see other mounds. Don't give up! Keep a bait convenient to get to and treat when you see new mounds.

SPRING LIME

Some producers in the county have recently received soil test results that call for applications of lime to correct soil pH. They have asked if they could apply lime this close to planting. Once applied, lime requires several months to react with the soil. Some of the finely-ground lime

will quickly particles neutralize soil acidity when lime is applied. The treatment will immediately help; the full benefits won't be apparent until the next growing season. Lime is more effective in neutralizing soil pH when applied in the fall, but it can and should be applied as soon as possible if pH needs correcting.





AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO MISSISSIPPI PROHIBITING THE PLACEMENT OF SIGNS ON POLES AND TREES AND LIMITING DURATION OF SIGNS

WHEREAS, the location of signs of signs on poles and trees within the City Limits of the Town of Tishomingo poses a danger to motorists and pedestrians using the streets and sidewalks of the Town, and has a significant negative impact on the aesthetic appearance of the Town, and when said signs and other signs fall into drainage facilities, they pose a significant risk to the Health and welfare of the citizens of the Town and it is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the Town that they be regulated:

THEREFORE, it is hereby declared by the Board of aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo that no signs of any type shall be placed or posted upon any Utility Pole, Guy Wire, Tree, traffic sign posts within the City Limits of the Town of Tishomingo.

Furthermore, signs advertising yard sales shall not be allowed

with the Town clerk in an amount as determined by the City Engineer to cover the costs of potential damage to city property, if, in the opinion of the City Engineer, a substantial danger of damage to Town property exists.

Mechanical equipment used in any project shall be used by the property owner or a licensed and bonded contractor.

Digging a excavation is defined for purposes of the Ordinance as any act which disturbs the surface of soil in such a manner as to disturb more than six inches deep of the surface, or that will disturb more than 100 square feet of surface of any depth such as clearing operations.

The penalty for violating this ordinance shall be \$1000.00 plus \$100.00 per day of violation, which penalty can be waived by the Board of Aldermen.

Because of the substantial and immediate danger to the health and welfare of the Town and its citizens due to underground utilities that may be damaged by digging and excavation, this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage.

ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO PRESCRIBING REQUIREMENT AND PERMITS FOR DIGGING AND EXCAVATION

WHEREAS, the public safety of the citizens of the Town of Tishomingo is best served by the location of utility lines in a manner such as will have minimal impact on the property and drainage in the Town.

THEREFORE, it is hereby ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo as follows:

Any person, or entity, before commencing any digging or excavation within the city limits of the Town of Tishomingo shall obtain a permit from the Town Clerk.

To request a permit, the person shall submit to the Clerk of the Town a detailed plan of the proposed project, including engineering and topographical reports, if available.

Any plan that is for installation of Utility lines or for drainage shall be reviewed by the City Engineer and town utility personnel.


The person shall also submit an affidavit that existing utility lines have been located and properly marked by all service providers other than the town.

Any excavation plan that includes the use of mechanical equipment shall also be accompanied by a \$500.00 permit fee.

This Ordinance does not apply to gardening, so long as the gardening project does not exceed 20 percent of the lot Mechanical equipment shall not include garden tillers, or small garden tractors. The Board of Aldermen may waive the permit fee for landscaping and improvement projects that enhance the aesthetic appearance of the town. The Board of Aldermen may also waive the permit fee for installation of service lines to a residence.

The issuance of the permit by the Town shall not constitute an easement by the Town where the proposed project requires crossing an alley or other property of the Town.

Old Tishomingo Traces By: June Bullard

Thanks to Irene Barnes for providing the information for this week's column. I really appreciate her friendship, and her willingness to share her knowledge of Tishomingo County with others. The first part is taken from WPA Preliminary Manuscript, Tishomingo County, Vol. LXXI:

Because of the diversity of sources and the fallability of human memory, it is suggested that documentary material be consulted in verifying data in this volume as much of the information was obtained through personal interviews.

April 18, 1938, Chapter 1

Formatting the County Eastport - founding date unknown

Rienzi - early trading post Bay Springs - founded about 1836

Iuka Methodist Church established in 1859. First stationed pastor, Rev. James Brooks, a young Englishman.

Flanningan Spring - 2 miles east of Tishomingo.

Scruggs Spring - 5 miles north of Iuka.

Mars Spring - 4 miles east of Iuka.

Waddle Spring - west of Golden

Jackson Spring - next to corp. limits of Tishomingo.

Blue Spring - north of Burnsville.

Chalybeate Spring - 12 miles west of Iuka.

Harris Spring - 2 miles east of Belmont

Iuka Springs - Iuka

Correction Tree - Eight miles north of Iuka on old Dexter Place stood a large oak tree behind house, near old plantation kitchen. Mr. Dexter sent children out to stand under this tree until they cooled off and he would allow them to come back into the house to the table but this old tree was killed when the Dexter house burned about 40 years ago (1898).

Mrs. Jennie Moore of Iuka Route 3, owns a coverlet 90 it was burned in a fire.

Louise Carr, Route 3, Iuka, has a center table about 60 years old made by her great uncle Dan Trotter.

Old Ellis home built for E.H. Reno in 1866. Mr. Reno, a jockey for Dr. Houston, a prominent man who lived there when the house was first built. Mr. Walter Ellis, lawyer of

Iuka, owned it since a young man.

E.N. Reid home known as Matthews home was built by T.L. Collier in 1857-58, formerly of old Eastport and one of the first carpenters in Iuka. Headquarters for Gen. Forrest and staff during the battle of Eastport. From here Col. D.C. Kelly went with a few men and sank and burned two boats loaded with Negro troops.

Cartersville established as voting precinct Oct. 1841 on Jacinto and Tuscumbia stage route. It is said to have been established before county organized, a large mercantile business by a Mr. Barton. P.O. still stands, slot in door and box inside for letters. Old home was first built. The Hodges owned it after the Bartons. Today the Blissits own it.

Interview with Mrs. Ida Moore of Iuka - Mrs. Moore says her grandfather Shelby Ussery was first white man to settle in Tishomingo Co. He settled where Iuka now is located at a place known as the Brinkley Place in 1836. Bought home from a half-breed Indian. Second white man in county was Mr. Guthrey. He owned a saddlery 3/4 mile north of Iuka. Mrs. Moore states Chief Iuka is buried in the north west part of town where the water tank stands. (This was torn down about 1997). He lived there when he died and is buried near it. M.C. Means occupied Iuka's house after his death. Mrs. Moore's mother often visited her friend that lived in Iuka's old home and heard stories of his life.

slave, was hanged. Refused 3rd term but was appointed Supt. of State Penitentiary but due to ill health did not accept. His wife died in 1852 and is buried at Jacinto. He entered business at Jacinto and later moved to Corinth in partnership with J.C. Terry. Stock of goods destroyed by Federals. He was a cotton buyer. Served as state senator. Died August 11, 1876 and buried in Henry Cemetery in Corinth.

> The Vidette, April 6, 1899 By G.P. Hammerly

An incident related to me by a Confederate veteran will doubtless be of interest to the survivors of a young lady who was the belle of Iuka in 1861 when Col. Arthur E. Reynolds with his 26th Miss. Reg. was in camp at this place.

An election was to be held on a certain day to decide a name for Co. F. commanded by Capt. H.C. Hyneman. Joe Bynum offered a fine, riding horse to Col. Reynolds if he would use his influence having the company named the Joe Bynum Rifles. Miss Anna Terry entered the Camp in her own interest won the hearts of the

company and secured the name of the Anna Terry Guards which they bore bravely until the close of the war. She wrote letters to them while in Virginia keeping them posted on affairs at home.

The Vidette, May 19, 1899

The Salem Cemetery is a historic spot. Here Gen. Price made a stand to check the Federal pursuit. On Sept. 20, 1862, a battalion stationed at the fork of the road about 200 yards south of the cemetery and hurdling grapeshot and shrieking shells passed directly over the burial place as they went forward on their errand of death into Federal lines which were just beyond. There were a few graves there at the time. The resistance of the retreating soldiers was so stubborn that the pursuit was abandoned by the Federals.

Robert Brown of Iuka had four sons in the Civil War: John B. Brown merchant at Eastport before enlisted in Roddy's war Command. He made captain and was in Shiloh, Iuka, Seven Day's Battle at Richmond, Tishomingo Creek and wounded in Battle of Forked Deer Creek. He married Elizabeth Akers during the war. After war, he was engaged in the mercantile business and farming, grist mill run by water power. He was father of nine: Dr. R.J. Brown and Mollie Brown Payne of Iuka, Prof. J.E. Brown of Blue Mountain, Miss Kate Brown of Tupelo, Mrs. Ellen Luker of Memphis, Mrs. Effie Rogers of New Albany, Mrs. Lizzie. Robinson of Iuka and Misses Nina

carded the wool and spun the thread. Mrs. Sarah Yarbrough wove it. It is muscadine color and in good condition. She also has a beautiful applique quilt made in 1861 with the following design: Stars and stripes, eagle and heart, olive, shield and dagger. The colors were red and green with white background. Also, has the following clauses embroidered: "God loves the friends of orphans," "Give me Liberty or give me death." In 1861 it was a present to W.M. Wimbish by M.L.T. Wimbish. The quilt was very neatly made. It was given to Mrs. Moore's husband, Mr. Will Moore, years ago by his cousin Bob Wimbish. Mrs. Jennie Moore also has a small square table 28 in. high. It has two drawers, one above the other. It is 70 years (1868). Her father made it when he began housekeeping.

Mrs. Eugenia Graham has a pair of glasses that belonged to her mother, Lina Dexter. They are 90 years (1848) old and in good condition. The string is still tied to the temple pieces where Mrs. Dexter put it.

Mrs. Mack Waters has a homemade bedspread made over 100 years ago, her mother's spinning wheel that has been in use 50 years or more.

Clayton Dean owns a cigar and match box in the form of a beer bottle, owned by a soldier in the Civil War. It has several patches on it that covers bullet holes. It's made of a bright metal that resembles silver. Mr. Dean also owns a sword that was used in the Civil War. It is still in its scabbard. It was not in good condition because

Cleopatria Ussery, Mrs. Moore's mother, was a charter member of Iuka Methodist Church. Mrs. Moore was born in 1856. She married first a Whitworth, father of Shelby Whitworth and second George Moore, an old confederate soldier.

John Williams, born Feb. 21, 1831, Montgomery Co., N.C., Martha Elizabeth Settle, died April 20, 1925. He wrote history of Iuka but never published it.

The Vidette, 1906 - The Body of D.W.H. Brame was exhumed one day last week and buried after having lain in the vault since 1868. He was buried on the Beall Place about

8 miles north of Iuka, near Indian Creek. The vault had become cracked exposing the coffin. At the time, Mrs. Brame lived in Ga. Mr. W.H. Dexter placed the remains in a new box and dug a grave in which the body was again laid away. Mrs. Brame is a relative of Mrs. E.S. Candler of Iuka

The Vidette, June 25, 1925 -Bart Hudson drowned in Tenn. River, age 20 years, son of M.E. Hudson.
