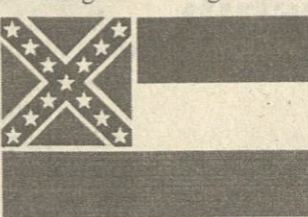
## County & State Votes To Keep Original 1894 Flag

Voters throughout

voters chose to retain the old flag.

Tishomingo County and also the state of Mississippi voted, by an overwhelming margin, Tuesday to keep the state's current flag which was originally adopted in 1894.

Statewide, voter turnout was heavier than expected for the special election which had only the flag issue on the ballot. The unofficial totals for the state were 462,867 in favor of the old flag and 249,213 in favor of the new flag. This means that 65 percent of

In Tishomingo County, 5,095 votes were cast for the old flag and 516 votes were cast for the new flag.

Mississippi did not take the same stance as the states of South Carolina and Georgia whose legislatures approved the change of their state flags because they contained the Confederate flag within their designs. Mississippi's legislature put the issue into the hands of voters who decided to stick with the traditional flag.

## Two Suspects Arrested In Connection With Local Burglary

A Cherokee, Ala. man and a Tishomingo man were arrested recently in connection with the burglary of a local lumber company office building.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, the two men, Richard Tyler, 20, of Cherokee; and Jimmy Borden, 19, of Tishomingo, were arrested on April 11, and charged with breaking and entering and grand larceny of a commercial building in connection with the March 25 break-in at Jourdan's Lumber Company.

Sheriff Smith said he and his department, and Iuka Police Department worked together on the case which led to the two arrests.

On Sunday, March 25, a call came into the Sheriff's Department reporting that someone had broken into the business, located on Airport Road, Iuka. Apparently, an employee of the company had

gone to the building and found the front, glass door broken.

Among the items taken from the business were a variety of tools including ratchets, sockets, four nail guns, a grinder and other items. Several items had been vandalized including a snack machine, Coke machine, the time clock and a computer monitor.

Tishomingo County Deputy Bob McCarley responded to the call and was assisted by Iuka Police Officer Anita Mitchell.

At press time, none of the stolen items had been recovered.

A bond of \$10,000 was set for each of the suspects. Tyler has been released on bond; however, Borden remains in custody.

Sheriff Smith said he would like to thank Iuka Chief of Police Randy Stringer and the members of the Iuka Police Department for assisting in this case.

## Golden Manufacturing Company Awarded \$14.7 Million Contract

A Tishomingo County manufacturing plant has been awarded a \$14.7 million contract to make cold weather field jackets for the United States Military.

U.S. Rep. Roger F. Wicker and Sens. Thad Cochran and Trent Lott announced recently that Golden Manufacturing Company has been chosen by the Defense Logistics Agency to receive the contract which calls for the manufacturing of approximately 300,000 cold weather camouflage coats.

The Golden plant

employees approximately 300 workers in Tishomingo County. The company also has a facility in Marietta which employees approximately 150 workers.

According to a spokesman for Golden Manufacturing, Charles Carr, their plants already make these coats and this contract will give them another year of manufacturing. Carr said that they are the only manufacturer in the country who makes the M-65 winter field jackets for all branches of the U.S. armed forces. The plant also makes BDU shirts and Navy coveralls.

One Iuka Middle School fifth grader will be spending a portion of his summer break playing in the Switzerland Basketball Invitational after being selected for the U.S. youth basketball team.

Ryan C. Williamson, the son of Tim and Tina Williamson of Iuka, was recently selected to be a member of the United States People to People Sports Ambassadors Program to France this summer. He will be participating in the special 10-day tournament with youth teams from throughout the world.

Ryan was spotted by a scout who attended the youth basketball state tournament in which he was a participant last year in Itawamba County. The scouting agency contacted Ryan and his parents and set up a meeting with them in Huntsville where they told Ryan about the program, interviewed and evaluated him and finally, invited him to be a participant.

People to People was started in 1956 by then-President Dwight Eisenhower. Eisenhower, who initiated other programs such as Project HOPE, Pen Pals and Sister

Cities during the same time, believed that if people from different cultures could come together in peace and friendship, so would countries. Ryan will be the first participant in the program from the state of Mississippi.

Beginning Aug. 3, 2001, Ryan will travel, first, to France where he will practice with his teammates for a few days. Also while there, he will be able to visit historical sites in the country and interact with foreign students his own age. From France, he will travel to Zurich Switzerland where the tournament will take place Aug. 8 - 15, with the championship game being held on Aug. 16. He will fly back home on Aug. 17.

levels of horizontal shaking that have a 1-in-10 chance of being exceeded in a 50-year period. Shaking is expressed as a percentage of g (g is the gravitational acceleration of a falling object).

Although strong earthquakes are less frequent in the eastern United States, damage in this area could be catastrophic in a powerful quake because most buildings and other structures have not been designed to withstand severe earth shaking.

Damage to buildings, dams, levees, highways, power lines and similar structures only partly depend on the amount of energy released during an earthquake. Certain kinds of earth materials enhance their vibrations. In Mississippi, structures built on thick, loose sediments of river floodplains (the Delta) and filled areas are more likely to be damaged than structures built on bedrock. In fact, seismic intensity may increase as much as one full unit on the Modified Mercalli Intensity Scale if loose sediment is present. Also, loose sediment with a high moisture content can turn to liquid when shaken.

### Retinal Detachment

When fluid collects between the sensory and pigmented layers of the eye, the retina is lifted. This separation often starts as a tear or hole in the retina allowing a loosening and finally detachment. The patient usually experiences flashing lights or floaters which is a sudden shower of black dots in the peripheral field. It may appear that a curtain is lowered over one eye or there may be a sudden painless loss of vision in that eye. This vision loss will remain until the retina is surgically reattached. The surgical reattachment usually restores most vision and the prognosis is generally favorable. It may take up to six months or more to restore useful vision.

The retina must be reattached as soon as possible. This should be considered an emergency. The surgery is designed to seal off the hole or tear that caused the problem and then to force the sensory and the pigmented layers of the retina together. After surgery, it is wise to limit certain physical activities such as running and jumping.

## "Honey Bear Hamlet" THE ARRIVAL OF SPRING

Unfortunately, Spring marks the beginning of problems for many dogs. Two common diseases caused by ticks: the disease that dogs can get from ticks is the same that can affect humans, though we cannot get it from our dogs, nor can we get it from us.

The disease is transmitted when a tick bites and injects bacteria into the dog. The bacteria finds its way to the joints and causes pain and lameness. It also causes red spots on the skin that usually go away in about three weeks. Some dogs simply will not feel well and may develop a fever. The disease requires a veterinarian's help. Treatment with antibiotics. Since Lyme Disease is widespread, you should check with your veterinarian to see if it is prevalent in your area.

is, your veterinarian will prescribe a vaccine to protect your dog.

Tick paralysis is caused by the female tick of certain tick species. The tick injects a toxin that makes the dog progressively weaker. He cannot move at all. Once the offending tick is removed, the paralysis clears up, but, consult your veterinarian because complications can occur.

In the tick infested areas use a good flea and tick control product to keep ticks from biting your dog. If you find a tick on your dog and you choose to remove it, wear gloves. The tick is carrying Lyme Disease, avoid exposing any open wounds on your hand to the blood. See methods work to remove attached ticks.

The safest and most effective method is to spray the dog with a flea/tick spray and let it die.

Or, you can cover the tick with petroleum jelly and wait. (When it can breathe, it lets go.)

Also, you can grab the tick close to the skin and pull slowly. The tick releases; however, this isn't the best option because the tick's head remains in the skin and become infected.

## Conservation Corner

Several weeks ago, an earthquake rocked Hiroshima, Japan. The Pacific Coast of the United States is also a major center for earthquakes. Although most people don't consider Mississippi, we are also in a fault zone.

In the winter of 1811-1812, three of the largest earthquakes in North America occurred in the Mid-South. All had magnitudes greater than 8.0 on the Richter Scale and altered the landscape significantly. The effect of these earthquakes caused

church bells to ring in Boston, Massachusetts, which was nearly 1,000 miles away.

Since that time, two major-damage level earthquakes have occurred in the Mid-South. An earthquake with a magnitude of 6.5 occurred near Marked Tree, Arkansas in 1843, and one with a magnitude of 6.8 happened near Charleston, Missouri in 1895.

In addition, earthquakes of smaller magnitudes were felt in the past and continue to be felt today. Since the installation of seismic instruments throughout the

Mid-South, it is known that earthquakes happen all the time in the New Madrid Seismic Zone (about 150 per year), but most are too small to be felt by people.

The largest earthquakes felt in this region in recent times occurred in 1976 (magnitude 5.0 with 4.5 after shock) and in 1990 (magnitude 4.8).

National maps of earthquake shaking hazards provide information essential

to creating and updating the seismic design provisions of building codes used in the United States. The 1996 U.S. Geological Survey shaking-hazard map for the United States is based on current information about the rate at which earthquakes occur in different areas and on how far strong shaking extends from quake sources. Airports Are For Everyone.

What does the Iuka airport mean to you? It has potential to create jobs and income; saves lives; helps enforce the laws of the land, is a terminal destination for passengers, freight; and mail; and lowers the cost of food, clothing, pharmaceuticals, and more. The airport can be considered one of Iuka's principal resources because what the airport does best is serve people who do not fly.

An airport, regardless of its size, is a community's access point to our nation's major mode of transportation. An airport serves the same basic purpose as the river harbors of a century ago, as represented in the Tenn/Tom Waterway today, or the train depot of a generation ago. Increasingly, America travels by air, and having an airport in a community is like finding an oil well in your neighborhood.

An airport is a vital part of the local economy. In many communities, the airport is also the location of an industrial park, chosen by many corporations because of the proximity to the airport. General aviation airports like the Iuka Airport play a vital role in the health of the nation's economy, employing 537,000 earning more than \$13 billion annually, but the economic benefits of a general aviation airport go far beyond direct

jobs and salaries.

Studies indicate that a dollar spent by aviation dependent businesses generates an additional \$4.50 in economic activity. These studies do not address the contribution to a region's economy that is more than the amount funded by state and local funds.

Examples are the rescue helicopters, Mississippi state Highway Patrol, and the U.S. Coast Guard, which could easily base an operation here, which would provide airborne law enforcement throughout this region. These are all public activities supporting the population as a whole.

General aviation airports in America provide a service to a nation that become more and more dependent on transportation. Air travel in America the non-negotiable items we all need of...time. Coupled with tremendous social economic benefits it provides an airport is a valuable resource because of what an airport does; SERVE PEOPLE WHO DO NOT FLY!

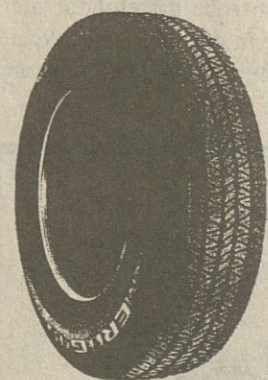

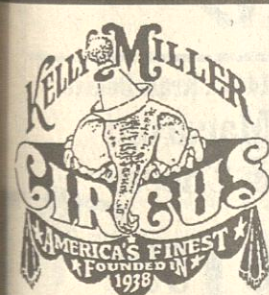

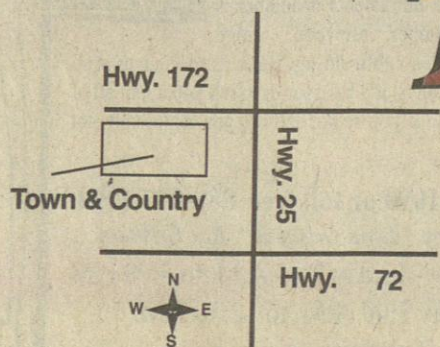
