One-Vehicle Accident Saturday Claims Life Of Golden Resident

A one-vehicle wreck, which took place around 10 p.m. Saturday near Belmont, has claimed the life of a Golden resident.

According to reports, the victim of the accident was 21-year-old Francisco Marin-Diaz, a native of Vera Cruz, Mexico who lived in Golden.

Diaz was traveling west on County Road 14 when he crested a hill and apparently lost control of his 1993 Mercury Cougar. Tishomingo County Deputy Donald Thomas said that the vehicle left the roadway, became airborne, hit a tree, then wrapped around a second tree. The car was resting on its left side when officers arrived. Diaz was ejected from his car and landed approximately 14 feet from where the vehicle

came to rest. Deputy Thomas said it was approximately 99 feet from where the vehicle left the roadway to the place it eventually landed.

While the exact cause of the accident is not known, the officers at the scene speculated that the driver was traveling at an excessive rate of speed which caused him to lose control of the vehicle.

The victim was pronounced dead at the scene by Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon. Diaz was transported from the site by Deaton Funeral Home.

Also assisting at the accident scene, along with Deputy Thomas, was Deputy Greg Mitchell. The officers wish to thank Belmont Policeman Scotty Hughes for his assistance in the incident.

Francisco Marin-Diaz, 21, of Golden, died Saturday, April 28 as a result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident. He was a native of Vera Cruz, Mexico and was an employee of Belmont Homes where he had worked for three years. He was a Catholic.

Services will be Friday, May 4, at Deaton Funeral Home Chapel in Belmont, with visitation being this evening, Thursday, May 3, from 6 to 9 p.m. Burial will be at Pantion Munisipal Yanga Ver., Vera Cruz, Mexico.

Survivors include his mother, Dulce Maria Diaz-Hernandez of Cuitlahauc, Mexico; and three sisters, Maribel Marin-Diaz of Belmont; Rosa Maria Marin-Diaz and Xochitl Marin-Diaz, both of Cuitlahauc, Mexico.

Tri-State Commerce Park's Advisory Board Named

The advisory board of the Tri-State Commerce Park, located north of Iuka (the former NASA site) at Yellow Creek, is comprised of nine members whose main responsibility is to approve or disapprove of industry wanting to locate in the industrial park.

The nine-member board is comprised of three members from Tishomingo County and two members each from Alcorn, Prentiss and Itawamba Counties.

One of the newest members of the board is Stanley McAnally of the Tishomingo area who was appointed by Mississippi Governor Ronnie Musgrove.

He fills the slot left vacant by the resignation of Iuka resident Dr. Kelly Segars, who left the board on June 13, 2000.

Other members of the board, in addition to McAnally, include Jimmy Marlin of Iuka, who is chairman of the group; Billy Tidwell of Dennis; Kenneth Williams of Alcorn County; Lamar Fields a supervisor from Alcorn County; Dr. Roy McAlilly of Itawamba County; Gary Franks of Itawamba County; Jimmy Murphy of Prentiss County and Glen Green of Prentiss County.

In addition to having final say-so on who becomes a tenant in the park, the group is also responsible for reviewing

the budget for the park. They meet on an "as-needed" basis.

Another fairly recent newcomer to the state-owned and managed site is Bill Burnette, the park's manager, who came on board approximately seven months ago.

The park is under the operation of the Mississippi Development Authority (formerly the Mississippi Department of Economic and Community Development). The park, formerly owned by the federal government, was turned over to the state in 1996. Presently, nine industries are located there which provide approximately 450 jobs.

New Mayor For City Of Iuka, Burnsville Alderman Advances To General Election

Aldermen George Long & Beth Davis Move To Run-Off Primary

The voters in the city of Iuka have chosen a new mayor to lead them.

Iuka Alderman Jackie Bryant ousted incumbent Iuka Mayor David Nichols in Tuesday's Democratic Primary by a vote of 545 to 390. Bryant will move to the June general election ballot where he is unopposed.

Nichols had held the position for three terms. Bryant had been a member of the city's board of aldermen for two terms—from 1989 to 1993 and from 1997 to the present time.

In the race for aldermen,

candidates Martha L. Biggs, Buddy James, Ellis R. Strickland, and Amos Bates move directly to the June ballot. Biggs led the ticket with 630 votes, followed by James with 606, Strickland with 559 and Bates with 507.

Other candidates received the following: George A. Long—445, Beth Davis—417, Judy Walker—409, Scotty Skinner—338, Richard "Ricky" Smith—198, Alvia Johnson—154, Anthony "Andy" Bailey—124 and George Drexel—90.

According to Iuka City Clerk Benny Gray, there will

be a run-off primary on May 15 between candidates George Long and Beth Davis.

In the town of Burnsville, Alderman Truman South defeated candidate Billy Blakney and now moves to the June 5 general election ballot where he will face four-term incumbent Bobby H. Johnson, Alderman David Nixon and candidate Rollen Dainie Lambert, who are all running as independents.

South received 119 votes and Blakney received 93.

Rumors About Gaming Facility Hoping To Locate In County Still Unconfirmed

While no official word has been given, rumors that a Native American group is planning to locate a gaming facility in Tishomingo County have spread throughout the area.

At press time, a state official did unofficially admit that a band of Choctaws from

Louisiana were viewing the area in hopes of purchasing land on which to build a gaming facility—it is not known if this facility would be a bingo hall or a casino.

The official said that the representatives of this group indicated that, if this project

does materialize, it will open up many jobs in our area. Other businesses, such as restaurants, lodging, shopping centers, etc., would soon follow.

At press time, records in the Tishomingo County Courthouse showed no purchase of land by this group recorded.

Alliant Buys Out Thiokol Propulsion, Awarded Multi-Million Dollar Boeing Contract

Alliant Techsystems, Inc. (or ATK), a tenant in the Tri-State Commerce Park near Iuka, has announced that they have purchased Thiokol Propulsion from Alcoa, Inc. for \$685 million in cash.

According to a press release from the company, the sale was approved in January of this year, and was completed in April.

Alcoa is the world's leading producer of primary aluminum, fabricating aluminum and alumina, and participates in all segments of this industry including the mining, refining, smelting, fabricating and recycling of the products.

Contract Awarded

In another news release from Alliant, the company announces the awarding of a multi-million dollar contract from the Boeing Company

which will extend until calendar year 2008.

Under this contract, ATK would be manufacturing composite structures for the Boeing Delta II, Delta III and Delta IV space launch vehicles.

While some of the work on these vehicles will be done at Alliant's Clearfield, Utah facility, the majority of the work will be done in their Iuka facility.

The local facility, known as ATK's Southern Composites Center, is a 325,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art production facility which was opened in 1998.

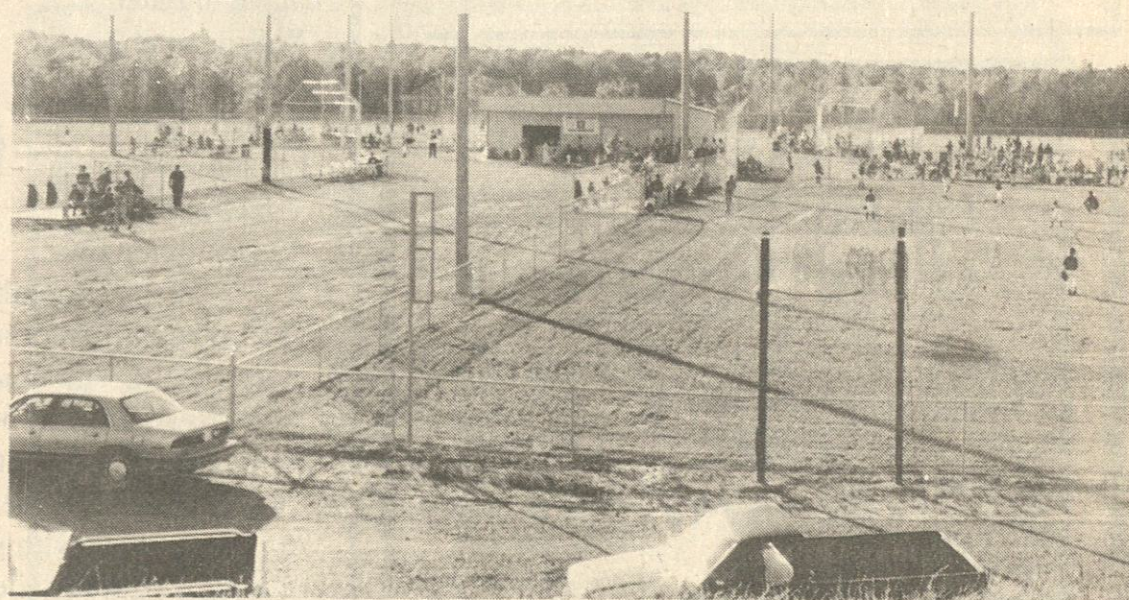
According to Jim Nichols, director of programs at ATK's Aerospace Composite Structures Company, this contract is a natural expansion of the work the company currently is doing on the next-generation Delta IV vehicle at the Southern Com-

posites Center, where it manufactures 16 separate Delta IV structures.

"Under this new contract, we will significantly increase our structures production on the Delta II and Delta III vehicles beyond the rocket motor casings we currently manufacture to encompass a number of vehicle components as well," Nichols stated. "In addition, our involvement on Delta IV will grow."

ATK Aerospace Composite Structures Company is headquartered in Magna, Utah.

ATK is a \$1.6 billion aerospace and defense company with leading positions in munitions, precision capabilities, propulsion and composite structures. The company, headquartered in Hopkins, Minn., has two business segments—aerospace and defense.

measures, too. After showering, use a daily shower cleaner to prevent soap scum buildup and mildew growth. Leave the shower curtain or door open after showering to help keep mold and mildew from getting a start in moist places.

Vacuum carpets weekly. At least 20 seconds back and forth over each area will remove the dirt and dust that hide between carpet fibers. The vacuum attachment is a great way to quickly get all those crumbs off the kitchen floor.

Dusting should also be a weekly task. Feather dusters and dry clothes simply relocate the dust. A better solution is to use a furniture dusting product and a clean cloth to capture and remove dust.

Use a toilet-bowl cleaner to sanitize the toilet and a spray cleaner for tubs, tiles, and sinks.

Thoroughly clean doormats. As the first line of prevention against tracked-in dirt, they should be clean enough to operate efficiently.

Monthly Cleaning

Set aside an hour or two once a month for larger tasks. On the monthly "to do" list: Clean and disinfect trashcans using a disinfectant cleaner, or a solution of three-quarters cup of bleach to one gallon of water. Rinse and dry with a clean rag.

Clean the refrigerator. Check for fruits, vegetables, and leftovers that have overstayed their welcome. Discard, as necessary. Then remove and clean each shelf. Work one shelf at a time so food doesn't have to stand out at room temperature. Remove the shelf and place it on a towel to allow it to adjust to room temperature. Then, put it in a sink of warm water and a drop

or two of hand dishwashing detergent. Gently scrub with a nylon brush or sponge.

Seasonal Cleaning

At the start of each season, give the refrigerator a more thorough cleaning. Accumulated dust and lint can reduce cooling performance. Remove the toe grille and

vacuum the coils or use a long-handled brush to clean them. If it's not built in, pull the refrigerator away from the wall and vacuum or sweep behind it. Sponge-clean the door gaskets with a solution of four tablespoons of baking soda per quart of warm water. Rinse and dry with a soft, clean cloth.

On a semi-annual schedule, deep clean carpets and upholstery. Turn and vacuum mattresses. Clean blinds. Launder washable curtains. Call in a professional to take care of dry-clean-only window treatments.

Annual chores are more ambitious tasks that call for the cooperation of family members and/or professional services. This "to do" list includes having the chimney inspected for creosote buildup and making sure the chimney cap and flue are in good working order. If necessary, have the chimney cleaned. Heating vents should be vacuumed to keep air circulating freely and to save energy. Clean ceiling bulbs and fixtures. Remove dust and dirt from ceiling fans and air-conditioner vents. Wash walls, cabinets, baseboards, and woodwork. Reseal wood floors to prevent scratches and scrapes from marring the wood.

What Causes Tears?

Tears are a product of the lacrimal system which manufactures, conveys, and delivers the tears to the eye. The production takes place in the lacrimal gland which is located in the upper temple side of the eye. The tears flow through ducts down to the cornea and other structures which are moistened by the tears. The tears then flow through little holes called "puncta" which are located on the medial part of the upper and lower lids. A punctum can be observed by pulling the lower lid slightly and noting the hole on the margin of the lid towards the nose. As the tears fill the entire eye area, they then flow through these holes into channels about 8 mm long. There they flow into the lacrimal sac which drains through a duct into the area behind the eye and then down into the throat. This is why, when inserting eye drops, can often taste medication. It has its way into the throat then, by swallowing and the saliva, the taste is partially returned to mouth.



Cantankerous Canker Sores

At least 80% of Americans suffer from canker sores some time. Canker sores are painful ulcers inside the mouth that most often follow injury to oral tissue, although heredity can also play a role.

Current research suggests that an underlying nutritional deficiency - iron, folic acid, vitamin B12, or a combination - may cause the problem in a small percentage of people who have recurrent canker sores. Some people claim to get canker sores from eating chocolate or drinking too much white wine or juice, although a relationship between these foods or drinks has not been proven.

History Of Iuka Little League

Who in Iuka has never played Iuka Dixie Youth Baseball? Iuka now has a new baseball complex in the Iuka area - 4 beautiful fields with Woodall Mountain as a backdrop. These fields will accommodate any boy ages 4 to 15 from the Iuka area who wishes to play baseball.

The history of Iuka Little League: During the 1950's, Mr. Herman Bullard and Mr. Brison Mann started the Iuka baseball league by taking the time to gather a few boys together at the Mineral Springs Park to play baseball. Some years later, the Jaycees of Iuka sponsored the Iuka Little League and the boys played games on the old football field, which was located across from the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. (where the Tommy Dean Field now stands).

After the Jaycees' tenure ended, John Lyles and Ray Curtis took responsibility of the league, although never officially being elected. The league had no equipment, so Mr. Lyles bought the equipment that was needed and was then repaid with the proceeds from the concession sales. The concession stand consisted of only tables, which were usually brought to the field by Mr. E. N. Allen. Sodas were stored inside the water plant each week, since it was located nearby and there was space available. The drinks would then be brought to the field for sale before each game. The original baseball field did not have an outside fence, so Mr. E.N. Allen, who was Treasurer of a Civic Club

which no longer existed, told Ray Curtis that the league could use the remaining money from the Civic Club to build the much needed outfield fence. While construction of the fence was taking place, Scottie Dean stopped by and said he would give \$200 Dollars if the builders would go ahead and complete the fencing around

the sides of the field. Sometime later in the 70's, a permanent concession building was constructed consisting of a tin roof over a front, thus providing a place for concession supplies to be stored.

Upon Ray Curtis's son, Jimmy, moving up to the Pony League, Ray Curtis did not seek a renewal of his tenure as President of the league. Earl Walker was then elected President of the Iuka Dixie Youth Baseball League. The Pony League field, located by the Iuka Elementary School, had no concession stand; therefore, the community constructed the concession stand and the bathroom facilities that presently exist today at the Pony League field.

During the transition period from Ray Curtis's tenure and Earl Walker's recent election, a decision was made to build a more suitable concession stand at the Dixie Youth Field. The next couple of years saw the smaller field added and saw lights installed at the Dixie Youth Fields with the help of several community members and the local Power Company. Upon the completion of the construction of the smaller field and the installation of the lighting system, the league next sought

to place fencing completely around the newly added smaller field. Once the fencing, lighting, and concession stand were completed, the league was given the opportunity to host the District Tournament, with Donnie Carson serving as the Tournament Director. Ever since, Iuka has been given the opportunity to host numerous tournaments at the Dixie Youth Fields.

Around 1984, Jerry Holly was elected President of the Iuka Dixie Youth organization and remained in that position for many years. During his tenure, a 2-story press box with a storage building located

directly underneath was constructed, which allowed for the announcing of ballgames and provided ample space for field equipment to be housed. The league also saw continuous improvements on both fields under Mr. Holly's leadership. The Iuka Dixie Youth Organization hosted a tournament every year following Mr. Holly's election as President of the League.

After Mr. Holly retired, Greg Dawson became President of the League, followed by Heath Morgan, Keith Wimberly, and now Malcolm Brown. During 2000 and 2001, a new baseball complex has been constructed, the league is now known as Iuka Baseball, Incorporated. The State Coach-Pitch Tournament will be hosted in July. The facility includes all boys ages 4 to 15, and on Saturday, May 5, 2001, the new facility will be officially opened for boys to enjoy for many years to come.



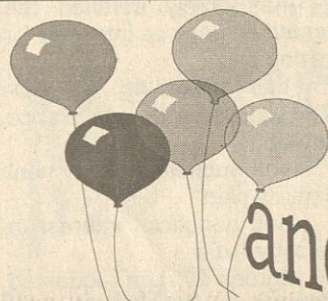

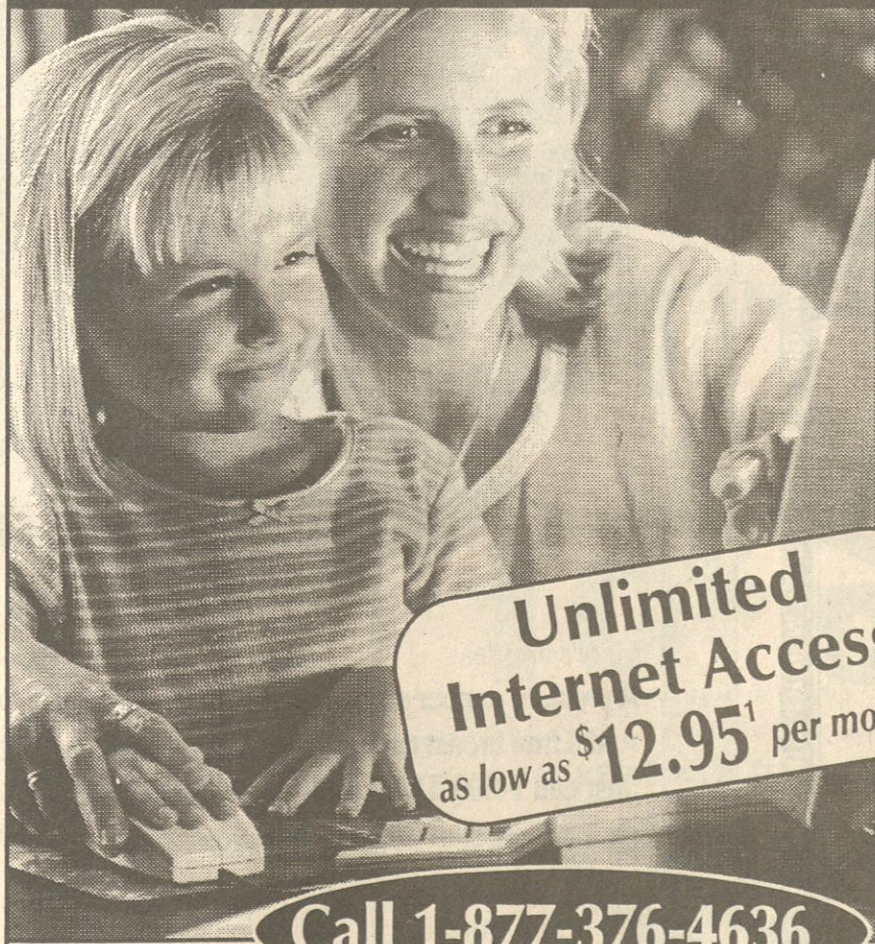

- plants a 2001 crop of wheat, oats, or barley on a PFC farm and grazes the crop with livestock rather than harvesting

it in any other way

- has timely certified the planted acreage as intended for grazing only

- has submitted an AD-1026 (conservation compliance provisions)

- has submitted a payment eligibility plan

- has beneficial interest in the commodity

- agrees that the requested acreage is not eligible for marketing assistance loans or LDP's

- requests the GRAZE-OUT payment by not later than August 31, 2001

The GRAZE-OUT payment rate will be the LDP rate in effect for the applicable commodity on the date the application is received in the FSA office. The GRAZE-OUT payment yield will be the higher of the:

- farm program payment yield for the commodity for PFC purposes

- the Olympic county average yield for the commodity based on NASS yields for the county for the 1995 through 1999 crops (if NASS data is not available, other sources will be used to establish the county yield)

The GRAZE-OUT payment is calculated by multiplying the grazed acreage by the GRAZE-OUT yield, by the LDP rate in effect for the commodity on the date of application.

Mixes such as wheat/oats or wheat/ryegrass are not eligible.

Remember, the application start date may differ from county to county; however, the

GRAZE-OUT payment is May 1, 2001. The final date to file an application is August 31, 2001. (This applies to all counties).

Applications received after August 31, 2001, will not be approved. Eligible acreage for the GRAZE-OUT program is any acreage of the 2001 crops of wheat, oats, and barley that meet all the following:

- is planted on a farm that is enrolled under a Production Flexibility Contract (PFC)

- is timely certified on a planted acreage report as acreage of the commodity intended for grazing

- is not harvested by any means other than grazing

- is grown on land classified as cropland on FSA farm records, or has been cropped in the last 3 years

2001 Crop GRAZE-OUT Payments

The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 provides for GRAZE-OUT payments for the 2001 crops of wheat, oats, and barley. These payments are available to eligible producers who use 2001 crops of wheat, oats, and barley for grazing by livestock and agree to forgo any other harvesting of the commodity for the 2001 crop year.

Application for the GRAZE-OUT begins on the first day the County FSA Committee determines that mechanical harvest of the crop begins. Since the county committee establishes the application start date, it may differ from county to county. In Alcorn & Tishomingo Counties the first day you may apply for the

GRAZE-OUT payment is May 1, 2001. The final date to file an application is August 31, 2001. (This applies to all counties).

Applications received after August 31, 2001, will not be approved. Eligible acreage for the GRAZE-OUT program is any acreage of the 2001 crops of wheat, oats, and barley that meet all the following:

- is planted on a farm that is enrolled under a Production Flexibility Contract (PFC)

- is timely certified on a planted acreage report as acreage of the commodity intended for grazing

- is not harvested by any means other than grazing

Board Approves Land Purchase For Iuka Airport

Angela Lambert
Members of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors approved Monday purchase of land necessary for the expansion of the Iuka Airport.

The present runway is 60 feet wide and 3,200 feet in length. The proposed expansion of the airport will make the runway 75 feet wide and 6,000 feet in length.

By expanding the runway, it will make it possible for corporate jets, such as those used by the CEOs and other officials of large industry, to

land in our county. These officials will be much more likely to want to locate in our area if they can come directly to our county and not have to land in another county, such as Alcorn, and then drive here. Many never make it out of Alcorn county—opting to locate there—for this reason. Their airport is a very important fac-

tor in the 16,000 plus jobs which have located in their county including companies

such as Caterpillar, World Color, etc.

"With this improvement to our airport, we will be much more likely to attract these large industries and provide jobs for our local people," Airport Board Chairman Dr. Kelly S. Segars stated. "This will be a key ingredient in helping our area prosper."

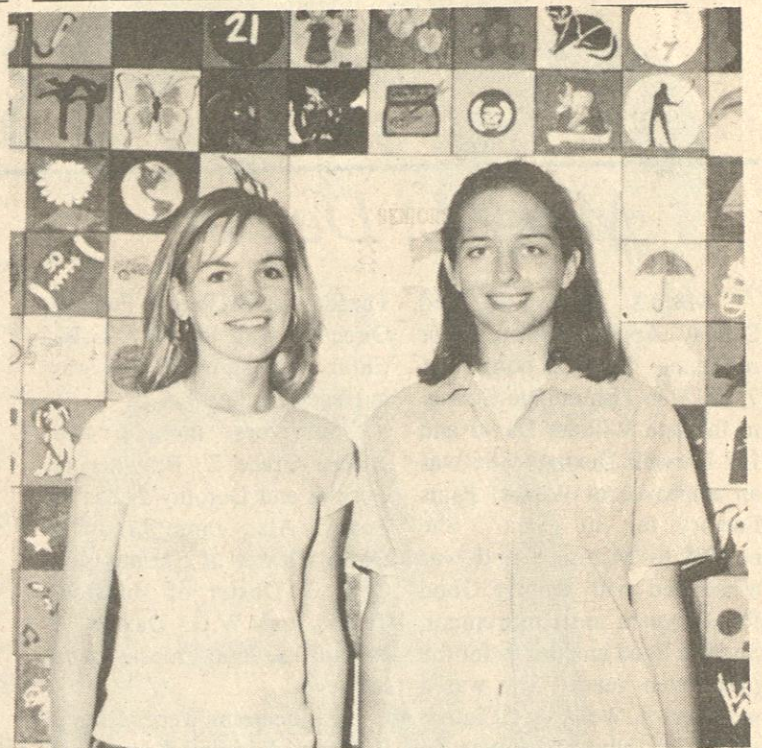
Another great advantage of the expansion is that jets from medical facilities will be able to land here.

Presently, if a jet from Birmingham, Ala. or Houston, Texas hospitals needs to transport a cardiac patient or other critically ill patient out of our area to their facilities, they would have to call ahead and have local law enforcement block off a portion of Hwy. 72 in order for them to land. This is very time consuming and a patient with immediate needs loses valuable time waiting for this to be done. With this expansion, precious minutes will be saved, possibly meaning life, instead of death, for many patients.

Much of the money for the airport improvements has been acquired through grants. Additional grant money will be sought in order to complete the project, according to officials.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR...

and called it "politics."

We have coveted our
neighbor's possessions and
called it "ambition."

We have polluted the air
with profanity and

aired this prayer on "The Rest
of the Story," and received a
larger response to this program
than any other he has ever
aired. With the Lord's help,
may this prayer sweep over our
nation and wholeheartedly
become our desire, that we
again can be called One Nation
under God.
