Local Anti-Gambling Group Meets To Discuss Casino

An afternoon rally Sunday in the gym at Tishomingo County High School focused on the possibility of a casino locating near Iuka and ways to keep it out.

Reports indicated that between 300 and 700 people came out to the event organized by a group calling itself "Concerned Citizens Against Gambling." Speakers, including local some government officials, spoke at the rally which was designed to set forth the evils of gambling.

Some area ministers, along with some local officials, are members of the committee.

A Native American pastor, the Rev. Calvin Gibson, of Philadelphia, spoke to the group concerning what he believed to be the down side of gambling in his hometown of Philadelphia where the Mississippi Band of Choctaws operate the Silver Star Hotel

and Casino.

Officials speaking at the rally stated that the Jena Band of Choctaw Indians of Louisiana are considering buying 100 to 120 acres of land in the area. If purchased, they would then seek to have it declared a reservation in order to locate the casino there. This could take place under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act which allows the possibility for Indian tribes to open casinos in any state that allows gambling; however, they would have to negotiate compacts with the state where they hope to locate, as well as with officials at the national level.

Reports have indicated that if the casino does locate in Tishomingo County, it would open up approximately 1,500 local jobs. The Jena Band of Choctaws have inquired of local authorities what the local area needs are and have offered to help in any capacity.



contributing to high blood pressure is extra weight. Our bodies have hearts that are designed to fit us individually. Keeping that in mind, we add extra stress to our hearts with extra weight. The heart must work extra hard to pump blood to the extra areas which we have added. The heart pumping harder and faster raises our blood pressure. High

blood pressure is not what will kill us. Some of these problems include stroke, heart attack, hardening of the arteries, and congestive heart failure.

We can tell that our hearts are working harder by the blood pressure reading. A good blood pressure is one that is under 140/90. If the blood pressure is higher than 140/90, it is considered too high. Have you ever wondered what the top number and the bottom number means? The top number is the amount of pressure the heart puts on the blood vessels to get the blood to the needed parts of our body. The bottom number is the amount of pressure that

remains in the vessels when the heart is at rest, which is why the bottom number is lower than the top number.

There are several ways that we can help prevent further problems because of hypertension. the first is to watch our sodium intake. Sodium makes our blood vessels constrict and if our hearts have to work harder for the extra weight, then we do not need to make it any harder for our hearts to push the blood through. Twenty-four hundred (2,400) milligrams of sodium or less per day is considered for a healthy goal by most health authorities. Yet, many people get significantly more than that. Foods that have large amounts of sodium are those with salt and preservatives. These foods include ham, smoked meats, olives, canned soups and vegetables, sauerkraut, sardines, packaged meats and ready-to-eat mixes/frozen meals. Learn to use less salt in cooking and at the table. It may be hard at first, but eventually you will learn to like the taste of less salty foods. Another way that we can

help lower our high blood pressure is to lose a few pounds. It is surprising how just five to ten pounds can reduce the workload on the heart. Healthy ways to drop those few pounds are to begin any exercise program, and to watch those extra calories. Before starting an exercise program, check with a

recommendations. Watching those extra calories can come in simple steps. Eating smaller portions, using less fat, and substituting fruit for cake and candies at dessert time can all help to reduce calories. Make changes that you can live with over time.

Limiting caffeine intake is also another good way that we can lower high blood pressure. Caffeine speeds up processes in our bodies. this is why so many people like a cup of coffee in the morning; it helps them to wake up and get moving. However, if we have high blood pressure, our hearts are already working hard and we do not need to make the heart work any faster. Good substitutes for caffeinated beverages are decaffeinated beverages.' Most teas, coffees and soft drinks come in decaffeinated versions.

We can help reduce high blood pressure and the problems it can cause by just making a few changes in our lifestyle. Do not let hypertension be your silent killer.

FSA Farm News

GENERAL PROVISIONS WHICH APPLY TO 2001-CROP CCC COMMODITY LOANS

1. CCC loans are available in Mississippi for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats, rice, upand cotton, seed cotton, peanuts, and oilseeds including soybeans).

For wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats, rice and upland cotton, any production by a producer on a farm enrolled in the Agricultural Market Transition Act program (AMTA) is eligible for loan. For oilseeds, (soybeans) any production is eligible for loan, even if produced on a farm not enrolled in ttle for AMTA.

the end Also, for all crops listed in be revealed in the item 1, producers must annuif some ally certify and comply with the following:

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a. Highly Erodible land Conservation/Wetland Conservation provisions (HELC/WC).

b. Planted acreage reorts must be filed.

L. Our c. Must obtain crop insurance coverage of an amount at least equal to catasrophic coverage for economically feasible crops, or provide a written waiver of all rights to emergency crop assistance in lieu of insurance.

> d. Must not violate controlled substance provisions.

> 3. Producers must have 100 percent beneficial interest in any commodity pledged to CCC as loan collateral.

> 4. Marketing assistance loans (loans which may be repaid at less than principal plus interest, depending on the world market or CCC determined value) ap-

ply to upland cotton, rice, wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats, and oilseeds (soybeans). 5. The commodity must be free and clear of all liens, judgments, or other encumbrances. If not, lien waivers must be obtained.

6. Commodities must be stored in CCC approved on-farm storage or in warehouses approved by the CCC for the storage of the particular crop.

7. Loans must be requested before the final loan availability to the 2001 crop. 13. There is a \$75,000 per year per person payment limitation on the total of the following:

a. gains from marketing assistance loan repayments b. loan deficiency

payments 14. The Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA) pro-

hibits loan extensions. Rules and regulations concerning the commodity loan program are very vast, detailed, and complicated. Provisions listed in this letter are very general in nature. Specific questions concerning individual crops or detailed information should be addressed to the County FSA Office serving you.

CONSOLIDATED FARM AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT ACT AUTHORIZES DESIGNATION OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY TO RECEIVE FSA DISASTER LOAN APPLICATIONS

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, and operators are available through the Alcorn County Office of the Farm Service Agency, Harold Mills, FSA Farm Loan Manager, said today.

Mr. Mills said this authority is pursuant to Acting Administrator Little's declaration on March 16, 2001, of the major disaster in Mississippi, caused by tornadoes that occurred on February 24, 2001. As a result of this disaster, Tishomingo County as a contiguous county in Mississippi is named as an area eligible for Federal Disaster assistance pursuant to Section 321 (a) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act.

Applications for assistance in the disaster-stricken county will be accepted by FSA through November 16, 2001.

Farmers qualifying for emergency loans may borrow up to 80 percent of their actual production loss or the amount needed to restore their operation to its pre-disaster condition, whichever is less. The new emergency loan and outstanding principal balance of any existing emergency loan owed by the applicant or any individual member of an entity . cannot exceed \$500,000.00.

FSA emergency loans cover losses from designated disasters and are made to qualified farmers who cannot obtain credit from other lenders in the local area.

The UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA) prohibits discrimination in all its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation.

8. Producers are responsible for maintaining the storability and quality of commodities mortgaged to CCC and stored onfarm.

9. Producers MUST obtain permission from the County FSA office BEFORE moving, delivering to buyers, selling, or feeding farm-stored commodities mortgaged to CCC. Severe penalties apply for noncompliance with this regulation.

10. Loans on all commodities, except upland cotton and seed cotton loans, mature on demand but no later than the last day of the ninth month after the month in which loan is made. Cotton loans mature on the last day of the tenth month from the first day of the month in which the loan is made, or earlier if CCC makes demand for payment. Seed cotton loans mature on the last day of the second calendar month after the month in which the loan is made or March 31,


2002, whichever is earlier.

11. The maximum quality alowed in delivery of a commodity to CCC is 110 percent of the loan quantity. Seed cotton loans cannot be delivered to CCC in settlement of the loan. 12. Loan Deficiency payments (LDP) may be available for 2001-crop rice, wheat, corn, sorghum, oats, upland cotton, and oilseeds (soybeans) in lieu of loans. Eligibility requirements for LDP are basically the same as eligibility requirements for loans, as listed in item 2 above. Beneficial interest in the commodity must be maintained by the producer through the date the LDP is requested. Exceptions to the beneficial interest requirements were made for the 2000-crop. These exceptions do not apply

Old Tishomingo Traces By: June Bullard

Thursday, February 21, 1895: IUKA'S OLDEST INHABITANT

Mr. Editor - It would probably interest your readers to have a brief sketch of the oldest person in the county and one among the first settlers of Iuka. I allude to Mrs. Eccles, wife of one of our best citizens, Mr. A. Eccles. On the 14th inst. she celebrated her 91st birthday. She was born February 14, 1804 in Fairfield District, about two miles from Weinsboro, South Carolina. Her maiden name was Garbrough. She first married Hugh Smith and moved to Georgia, while near the present town of Cartersville, Ga. Mr. Smith was accidentally drowned in Etowah River. By him she had quite a number of children of whom three are now living. Mr. Thomas B. Smith, who is and has been for a great number of years one of the most trusted and efficient employees of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, and two daughters, both widows and citizens of Iuka, Mrs. Millsaps and Mrs. Hughes. Mrs. Eccles has now living in Iuka four of her generations. Her daughter, granddaughter, greatgranddaughter and great

grandson, who is Paul, the little son of our hotel man, W.B. Leatherwood. Mr. D.R. Hubbard, who bought from the United States the land on which Iuka is located, married a granddaughter of Mrs. Eccles.

Her mind is still remarkably clear and strong, and she can give you the details of many things which happened 75 years ago. She remembers distinctly when war was declared in 1812 between the United States and Great Britain and she tells of many incidents of that war. She lived in Iuka all through the late war between the States, and while her husband was in the Confederate army she remained at home and was all the time a red-hot rebel, a real "chick of the old blue hen." At one time a Federal soldier attempted to enter her house and take her money when she put herself in front of him and defied his power, and it is said gave him a good rebel cursing, when he struck her across the head with his gun and gave her a big scar which today she is as proud of as a boy of his first breeches. Mrs. Eccles is a prominent member of the Hard Shell Baptist Church, and she very

Skinner was a licensed preacher for several years and in 1859 he was ordained to preach and furing his long ministerial life, it is supposed he has baptized between 1500 and 2000 persons. He was in the organization of the Tishomingo Baptist Association in 1860. There is only one minister living now who was present, Rev. W. M.

Henderson, of Kossuth, Miss. Bro. Skinner preached all during the Civil War and was never interrupted upon but one occasion by the Federals. He preached at Harmony Church 13 years in succession. He has preached all over Tishomingo County. The children who are living now are W. H. Skinner, Route 1, Burnsville, Miss; I. N. Skinner, Rt. 1, Iuka, Miss., Jno. Skinner, 1901 South 7th St., Waco TX; Dick Skinner, Petty, Tex; Walter Skinner, Dawson, Texas. Bro. Skinner has been deprived of attending to his church from ill health for about
