New Iuka City Officials Sworn In On July 2nd

A new Mayor of Iuka and a new Board of Aldermen were sworn in on Monday morning, July 2, 2001, in front of an overflow crowd of family, friends, and city and county supporters at the Iuka City Hall. The incumbent Chief of Police, Andy Stringer, was also sworn

in. Mayor Jackie Bryant, with his family, where his daughter, Angela, is competing on the national level.

After Judge Bowen swore in the aldermen, he swore in Randy Stringer as Chief of Police.

Then the newly elected mayor, Jackie Bryant, took the oath of office. Mayor Bryant opened the floor to the newly elected officials, and Buddy James spoke on behalf of the board. Mr. James thanked everyone for coming out to support the new officials. He promised the board would work to do their best for the city. He also responded that the board was honored to have been elected by the people and that they are looking forward to the next four years and working hard to make our city grow.

Mayor Bryant then said that he will be in city hall on a day-to-day basis and that he wants to bring everyone in the community together for the good of the community. Mayor Bryant believes that the Lord has blessed us here in Iuka very much and that we need to promote our city. He said that he and the Board are looking forward to bringing the community together even though he knows that there will be some differences of opinion. He said that he and the board will work together to solve our problems while promoting the City of Iuka. Ed Temple, new minister at Iuka United Methodist Church, dismissed the group with prayer, and refreshments were served to the large crowd that filled Iuka City Hall.

Casino Issue Defeated By 701 Votes In County

First District's Strong "Yes" Vote Not Supported By Rest of Tishomingo County

On Thursday, June 29, 2001, about 50% of the approximately 15,000 voters in Tishomingo County went to the polls to show support for or against the casino issue in a non-binding straw poll.

The results were 3,923 voting against and 3,222 voting for. This was a 55% vote "against" - 45% "for" margin of the 7,145 registered voters who went to the polls.

Results from the Circuit Clerk's office showed the following totals. The First District had 876 (53%) voting "for" and 788 (47%) voting "against." Totals from the Second District were 702 (49%) "for" and 729 (51%) "against." The Third District had 764 (49.6%) "for" and 775 (50.4%) "against." The Fourth District voted 589 (42%) "for" and 781 (58%) "against." The Fifth District had 311 (27%) "for" and 850 (73%) "against."

The most votes for the casino came from the Iuka area while the most votes against came from the south end of the county. (See Casino Poll Chart for individual precincts.)

With the straw poll behind them, the Supervisors met on Friday morning, June 29, to officially cast their ballots.

The meeting began at 10:00 a.m. when Sheriff David Smith escorted the Supervisors into the courtroom, which was filled with proponents and opponents of the casino. The Third District Supervisor, Danny Ryan, made the motion to not oppose the establishment of

the reservation, and thus not to oppose the casino. Ryan's motion was seconded by First District Supervisor Dale Price. Price's district was the only district to vote in favor of the casino issue. Supervisors Arlie South, Leon Cook, and David Sanders voted against the motion. The meeting was adjourned, and the sheriff escorted the Supervisors out of the courtroom.

After the vote, Supervisor Ryan was the only one who was willing to make a statement. He said that he was disappointed that we have turned down the 2,000 plus jobs and all the revenue from which the county could have benefited.

After their initial meeting, the Supervisors met again to take care of regular county business.

Those for and against the casino left the courtroom and congregated once again outside the courthouse to see if

there would be any more of the continued conflict that had previously erupted the night before. TV and other reporters sought out the squabbles between proponents and opponents to put on the news, however, residents soon disbanded and returned to normal routines.

Although the Jena Tribe of the Choctaw Indians does not require the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors' approval to locate in Tishomingo County, the tribe does need the support of Gov. Ronnie Musgrove, who has publicly opposed the casino. Mr. Jerry Jackson further stated that the tribe would not come if the residents do not want the casino.

Note: The straw poll, which was conducted to serve as an indicator for the Board of Supervisors, cost the county about \$11,000 to conduct according to the Circuit Court's Office.

Home Economics Tips

A Recipe For Safe Summer Food

As July 4th and Labor Day celebrations approach, outside gatherings can be quite fun. However, summertime cookouts can pose a food safety hazard if precautions are not taken. With the high temperatures, foods reach the "danger zone" quickly. The "danger zone" is the dangerous temperature area between 40 degrees and 140 degrees F where bacteria quickly grow. These bacteria cause illness, even death.

Seniors are at an increased risk for foodborne illnesses because the body's ability to fight off infection and bacteria decreases. There is a decrease in the secretion of acid in the stomach which fights off bacteria. Also, the sense of taste and smell are altered so that spoiled meat or milk can't be detected. Seniors may

decrease their chances of foodborne illness by following the rules below.

* Wash hands and all surfaces before and during preparing food. Use soapy water to wash hands, dishes, utensils, cutting boards, and counter tops. Wash hands often, including every time a raw food comes in contact with hands. Wash cutting boards, utensils, counter tops, etc. each time a different food comes in

contact with it. This helps prevent cross-contamination from raw foods to cooked foods.

* Keep it safe, refrigerate or freeze. Refrigerator temperature should be 40 degrees F or less. Freezer temperature should be 0 degrees F or less. Keep cold foods in a cooler packed with ice when cooking outside. Keep cold foods cold and hot

foods hot!

* Never thaw food at room temperature. Always thaw food in the refrigerator or under cold running water, if it will thaw in less than 2 hours, or in the microwave. Foods thawed in the microwave should be cooked immediately. Microwaves do not cook evenly, therefore, thawing in the microwave causes "cold spots" in the food. Do not thaw large foods like whole turkeys in the microwave. Thaw them in the refrigerator. A rule of thumb for thawing large cuts of meat in the refrigerator is to allow 1 day for each 5 pounds of meat.

Never leave perishable food items out of the refrigerator for more than two hours. Food should not be left out for more than an hour if the temperature is above 90 degrees F. Again, harmful bacteria quickly multiply

between 40 degrees and 140 degrees F. Refrigerate leftovers within two hours. Divide large quantities into small, shallow containers to cool quickly or cool them in an ice water bath. Reheat leftovers only one time then discard if not completely used or eaten. Remember, when in doubt, throw it out!

* Thoroughly cook raw meat, poultry and fish. Cook meat and poultry until juices run clear. Always check internal temperatures of foods with a thermometer before serving them. The minimum internal cooked temperature for ground beef is 160 degrees for 15 seconds and beef steak is 145 degrees F; poultry is 180 degrees F. Cook fish until the outside is flaky and internal temperature is 145 degrees F. Reheat all leftovers to a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees F.

* Separate raw foods from cooked foods. Juices from raw foods that come in contact with other foods can lead to contamination. Never place cooked foods on a plate or surface that has held a raw food. Put packages of raw meat; poultry or fish on a plate before refrigerating so their juices won't drip on other foods. Store them on the bottom shelf of the refrigerator or below any ready to eat foods.

Following this recipe for safe food handling will ensure safe and fun gatherings for the season. Have a great summer!

Is Autoclaving The Only Way To Sterilize Dental Equipment?

No. Dental offices use various methods to sterilize and disinfect. All dental instruments are cleaned and then sterilized after each patient's visit by methods that kill the AIDS virus and other microscopic organisms capable of causing disease.

Common acceptable sterilization methods include an autoclave that uses steam under pressure, dry heat in an oven-like environment and chemical vapor sterilization.

Disinfection procedures are used on surfaces and equipment that cannot be removed for cleaning and sterilization, such as counter tops, drawer handles, X-ray unit heads and light handles. Disinfection is done in the treatment room between patients to assure that the room is clean for each patient.

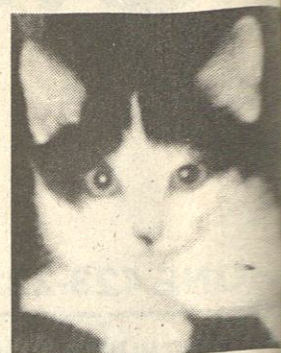
Understanding Astigmatism

One of the eye problems that causes blurred vision is astigmatism. This happens when the cornea, or "window of the eye," is out of shape. A normal cornea has a perfect curve, with the same degree of slope on all sides. Light rays that pass through the cornea come together at a single point on their way to the retina.

This simply isn't possible in the astigmatic eye. The rays of light don't come together at the same point. There are two separate images. This doesn't mean that people with astigmatism see double, but it does blur their vision.

There are three kinds of astigmatism, depending on the eye's point of focus. It's "nearsighted" if the focus takes place before the image gets to the retina; "far-sighted" if the focus takes place after the image reaches the retina; or it can be a combination of the two. In all cases, fortunately, vision can be corrected with properly prescribed eyeglasses.

"Sampson Balcom" Flea Control Product For Cats

An effective flea control program requires treating the environment indoors and outdoors and animal at the same time.

When treating environment, you should concentrate on the sleeping areas and secluded areas where immature fleas may be lodged. Vacuuming and mopping floors before treatment helps eliminate many of the immature stages of fleas indoors. Steam cleaning carpets kills flea eggs. Remove organic debris outdoors makes spraying or dusting more effective. Treat every two to four weeks under house and porches recommended. In the Northern part of the United States, temperatures kill fleas outdoors during the winter.

There may be resistance to insecticides which should be considered when selecting a flea product. For example, in New York it appears that fleas are becoming resistant to carbaryl products. A quick flea population, but provide residual coverage to prevent immature fleas from developing into adults. Reading labels on different products is crucial. It has been recommended that products containing different chemicals be used to avoid problems with toxicity or resistance.

Several chemicals currently on the market are contraindicated for use on cats. Organophosphates are not to be used except for malathion and phosalone. Not all permethrin (pyrethroid) formulations have been approved for use on cats. Dips are permethrin have been reported to cause death. Carbamate powders should not be used on kittens less than 4 weeks of age. Lindane is toxic to cats, therefore should not be used.

Because many people prefer not to use chemical flea control, many natural flea products are currently available. Shampoo sprays, and collars are which contain oils of pennyroyal, sassafras, cedarwood and eucalyptus. Ultrasonic flea collars, feeding garlic or Brewer's yeast have been purported to repel fleas. However, scientific data supports these claims. In one study, Brewer's yeast is used to feed flea larva in a laboratory.

Mechanical methods of eliminating fleas can be helpful. Flea combs designed to remove fleas from the cat's hair by breeding colonies. These cages should be a minimum of 10 inches above the floor. Height acts as a physical barrier since fleas are capable of jumping a distance of several inches.

Future directions for flea control will focus on biological insecticides. Insect growth regulators including inhibitors of cuticle formation are being examined. These will be a low risk factor for cats. Iuka Animal Clinic, Dr. James F. Perkins, 2389 Veterans Memorial, Iuka, MS 38852, 423-3470.

Mr. Stanley Magill Retires from Tishomingo County School System

Mr. Stanley Magill is retiring from the field of education after spending 30 years as a teacher, principal, and assistant superintendent. He started his tenure at Burnsville High School where he taught junior high social studies and Algebra. After spending one year, 1966, at Burnsville, he transferred to Iuka High School where he taught American History, American Government and Mississippi History for several years as he continued to work advanced degrees at Blue Mountain and the University of North Alabama. Mr. Magill has been an administrator in the central office since the beginning of the consolidated district. His retirement will be effective on June 30, 2001.

When asked how he plans to spend his time as a new retiree, Mr. Magill said, "I really don't know. I still have so many things I want to do. I do have 2 or 3 specific things in mind, but they will take a little time to get started. I do plan to continue pastoring, and I would like to play a little golf. When the weather cools off, I would also like to do a little deer hunting—that is until the weather gets too cold. I don't like cold weather." Mr. Magill also said that the best part of being an educator is that he and his wife, Martha, an employee at the Farm Services Agency, have been able to watch the people he has taught become useful members

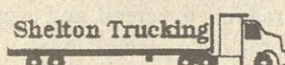

Conservation Corner

The Largemouth Bass (*Micropterus salmoides*) is one of the most sought after game fish in Mississippi. Each year thousands of anglers take to the water with hopes of catching that once-in-a-lifetime bass.

The largemouth bass is the largest of the basses, known as black bass. Black bass are members of the sunfish family but differ from other sunfishes because of their longer, more streamlined body. Other black basses which are native to Mississippi's waters include smallmouth bass and spotted bass. Largemouth bass get their name from their very large mouth in which the upper jaw reaches far beyond the rear margins of the eye.

Adult largemouths' average around 10 to 20 inches in length and generally weigh between 0.50 and 4.50 pounds. Bass in excess of 8.0 pounds are not uncommon and the present state record boasts a weight of 18.15 pounds. It was caught in Natchez State Park, not too far from the Mississippi River. Bass in deep southern waters may live to be 10 years of age and therefore have the ability to gain more weight.

Largemouth bass are a dark greenish color along their back and across the upper side of their body. The midside has a broad, blackish strip and below the lateral line the color is gradually lighter and turns to white along the belly and underside. The tail fin in young bass exhibits a bicolor arrangement with the rear part of the fin being much darker than the basal part.

The largemouth bass is tolerant to various conditions, but is more commonly suited to waters with no noticeable current. Studies show that largemouths' prefer a temperature range of 77 to 86 degrees F.

Largemouth bass are commonly found around underwater structure (logs, brushpiles, artificial structures). Largemouth bass are predators and use this underwater structure as cover which enables them to move quickly on prey species. Largemouth bass can often be found cruising the shallows and feeding during low light conditions. The major food source for adult largemouth bass consists of crayfish, large insects, frogs and shad. Young bass feed mainly on small insects.

Bass begin spawning when the water temperature reaches the mid 60's. Males will chose nest sites in 1 to 4 feet of water. The female will lay her eggs in one or several nest sites. A female will generally drop between 2,000 and 7,000 eggs. Exhausted from laying eggs the female will retreat to deeper water to recover for a period of 2 to 3 weeks while the male stays behind to guard the nest. The male will attack any intruder and will constantly fan the nest keeping the eggs free of silt and debris. The eggs generally hatch within 3 to 5 days dependant on the water temperature.

Hatchlings, called fry, will quickly form schools and move to the nearest cover available to search for food and hide from predators. Of the 2,000 to 7,000 eggs laid, only 5 to 10 of these fish will survive to reach a length of 10 inches.

Gourds can make excellent bird houses, but after they are grown, one must know how to prepare them in the proper manner.

Gourds must be harvested when they are mature. One must leave three inches of stem on it. Rinse the gourds in warm vinegar water and dry them in a warm spot turning them every other day. Once the gourds are dry, cut holes in

them for the bird entrance. The size of the gourd will determine the species of birds that will utilize the gourd.

The large end of the gourd should be big enough for a bird to turn around in easily. Some birds prefer long, deep cavities in some kinds of gourds. The entrance hole should be round and all sharp edges removed. It's size must conform to the size of the bird. The holes may be cut with a key hole saw, circular saw or expansion bit. A few holes, using a 1/4 inch bit, in the bottom of the gourd will provide adequate drainage

that will enable the nest to stay dry. One hole through the top of the gourd will allow for a wire to be inserted for proper hanging.

The chart below shows the minimum size gourd needed and the size of the entrance hole required for many bird species found throughout Mississippi.

Bird - House Wren;
Minimum Diameter of Gourd Needed (Inches) - 4; Exact size Entrance Hole (Inches) - 1.

Carolina Wren - 5; 1-1/8.
Tufted Titmouse - 5; 1-1/2
Crested Flycatcher - 6; 2
Purple Martin - 6; 2-1/2

Flicker - 7; 2-1/2

The hole itself should be in the upper portion of the gourd since birds like to hop down into the gourd. This will also keep fledglings from falling out of the hole before it is time for them to leave the nest. A perch can be attached below the hole. A piece of gourd stem, twig or dowel rod can be used for a front perch.

After the inside of the gourd is cleaned out, several coats of varnish or shellac should be placed on the outside of it. Paint may be used, but

avoid using bright colors; is preferred since it does absorb heat as much as colors. Make sure the adequate space between houses because many birds do not want other birds too close. However, purple martins to live close together.

From the tiny white flickers - make openings the bird's size. Hang houses with the openings from the prevailing wind. Making birdhouses gourds is easy and interesting.
