## Citizens & Merchants Beware!!!! Counterfeit Bills Being Circulated in Area

Iuka Police Chief, Randy Stringer, wants all area citizens and business owners to be aware that several counterfeit bills have surfaced in the area over the last two weeks.

Several \$100 and \$10 bills have been collected during this period. He asks that citizens pay close attention to your bills

to make sure they are not counterfeit.

Counterfeit bills feel different; the ink sometimes rubs off on your skin; they might not be centered exactly; and a fake bill would not have a visible watermark. Special ink pens also can be used to spot the fake bills. If you are

not sure, you may take your bills to the bank.

Stringer says that his office has picked up the surfaced bills, and they have been turned over to the Secret Service for further investigation. Chief Stringer urges everyone to use extreme caution with their money.

## Home Economics Tips

### SAFE FOOD HANDLING

Never had food poisoning? Actually, it's called foodborne illness. Perhaps you have, but thought you were sick with the flu. Some 7 million Americans will suffer from foodborne illness this year. Why? Because at the right temperature, bacteria you can't see, smell, or taste can multiply to the millions in a few short hours. In large numbers they cause illness.

Food poisoning doesn't have to happen, though. Some 85 percent of cases reported could be avoided if people just handled food properly. So here's what to do...

**WHEN YOU SHOP - BUY COLD FOOD LAST; GET IT HOME FAST.**

\*When you're out, grocery shop last. Take food straight home to the refrigerator. Never leave food in a hot car!

\*Don't buy anything you won't use before the "use-by" date.

\*Don't buy food in poor condition. Make sure refrigerated food is cold to the touch. Frozen food should be rock-solid. Canned foods should be free of dents, cracks, or bulging lids which can indicate a serious food poisoning threat.

### WHEN YOU STORE FOOD - KEEP IT SAFE; REFRIGERATE

Check the temperature of your refrigerator with an appliance thermometer you can buy at a variety of hardware store.

To keep bacteria in check, the refrigerator should run at 40 degrees F, the freezer unit at 0 degrees F. Generally, keep your refrigerator as cold as possible without freezing your milk or lettuce.

\*Freeze fresh meat, poultry, or fish immediately if you can't use it within a few days.

\*Put packages of raw meat, poultry, or fish on a plate before refrigerating so juices won't drip on other raw food. Raw juices often contain bacteria.

**WHEN YOU PREPARE FOOD - KEEP EVERYTHING CLEAN; THAW IN REFRIGERATOR.**

\*Wash hands in hot soapy water before preparing food and after using the bathroom, changing diapers, and/or handling pets.

\*Bacteria can live in kitchen towels, sponges, and cloths. Wash them often. Replace sponges every few weeks.

\*Keep raw meat, poultry, and fish and their juices away from other food. For instance, wash

your hands, cutting board, and knife in hot soapy water after cutting up the chicken and before dicing salad ingredients.

\*Use plastic cutting boards rather than wooden ones where bacteria can hide in grooves.

\*Thaw food in the microwave or refrigerator, NOT on the kitchen counter. The danger? Bacteria can grow in the outer layers of the food before the inside thaws.

Marinate in the refrigerator, too.

## Conservation Corner

President George Bush signed the Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) into law in 1990 as part of the Farm Bill. Over the past 10 years it has become the most popular, cost effective and successful, voluntary, incentive-based conservation program in our Nation's history. However, unless Congress funds this program this year, WRP will be "history".

WRP is administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). Landowners who qualify are compensated for the value of their land in exchange for wetland restoration. Enrolled lands are mostly marginal, high-risk, flood prone agricultural wetlands. Mississippi, which has restored over 100,000 acres of wetlands, ranks second in the Nation in enrollment.

Since three-fourths of the wetlands in the United States are controlled by private landowners, the funding of WRP is more important than ever. There are more than 500,000 acres of unfunded applications from approximately 2,700 landowners.

The Administration, which "zeroed" it out in the budget, should realize the cost savings associated with WRP. The program is good government at its finest. Land enrolled in WRP saves much taxpayer dollars. The government doesn't have to fund expensive disaster assistance programs and crop insurance programs on these acres, which has almost become an annual cost and is often abused.

Population is growing more slowly than food supply. With the current oversupply of commodities throughout the world, we have seen prices plummet and Congress spend billions in aid. It will get worse before it gets better. Europe will get its act together. Africa will soon harness the benefits of fertilizer, pesticides and plant breeding, further reducing prices.

Restored wetlands used for duck hunting have far more value than most marginal cropland in Mississippi. The same thing is happening in

1975 - Costal Pet Products introduces a double-ply nylon web collar for dogs.

1975 - Few of the more than 4,000 dogs recruited to serve and protect U.S. troops return home at the end of the Vietnam War. "These heroic dogs were responsible for saving a minimum of 10,000 Americans from death or injury," said Tom Mitchell, chairman of the Vietnam Dog Handlers Association.

1976 - Elaine Smith and her German Shepherd Dog, Phila CDX, are among five adult and six dogs to visit St. James Nursing Home in Chattam, N.J., during the first pet-therapy visit by her volunteer group, Therapy Dogs International.

1978 - The animal poison control center opens at the University of Illinois Veterinary School and still fields calls from frantic pet owners at (800) 548-2423.

1978 - Parvovirus, a highly contagious virus, emerges. It attacks the white blood cells, intestinal tract and sometimes the heart muscles of dogs of all ages and breeds.

1980 - Late-night talk host David Letterman debuts "Stupid Pet Tricks."

1980 - Anaheim, Calif., - based Veterinary Pet Insurance offers medical coverage for pets.

1982 - The Dog Museum of America opens in New York. It moves five years later to St. Louis before changing its name to the American Kennel Club Museum of the Dog.

1982 - Football star Herschel Walker's chaperone at the Heisman Memorial Trophy banquet is Uga, the bow-tie-clad Bulldog mascot of the University of Georgia.

1984 - Supported by the Morris Animal Foundation, the University of Pennsylvania Veterinary School begins improved methods of early diagnosis of canine hip dysplasia. Studies also help define hip dysplasia as an inheritable genetic disease.

1985 - Rescue International begins sending search-and-rescue dogs to public safety agencies that request help free of charge.

### "Old Man's Eyes"

The word "presbyopia" is Greek in origin and means "old man's eyes." Presbyopia comes to all of us if we live long enough. It's part of the process of aging.

Presbyopia is a condition that exists when vision at reading distances becomes difficult and blurry due to a gradual decrease in the focusing ability of the lens of the eye. Presbyopia usually begins to affect those between 40 and 50 years of age. It is characterized by a need to hold reading matter farther away, needing brighter light to read, and symptoms of eyestrain and headaches.

Though presbyopia cannot be prevented, properly prescribed reading glasses or bifocals will correct for the progressive loss in near-focusing power and make reading at normal distances clear, sharp and comfortable. If you are having difficulty reading printed matter, don't put off an eye examination. It's a simple procedure and can make reading and close vision work a pleasure again.

## A METER READER'S NIGHTMARE



For meter readers, dogs pose a dangerous threat. They don't know whether a barking dog is just being playful or if it aims to attack.

Our meter readers need access to your meter to make sure your electric bill is accurate. Keeping your dog confined or restrained will prevent it from chasing or attacking the meter reader and possibly causing serious injury.

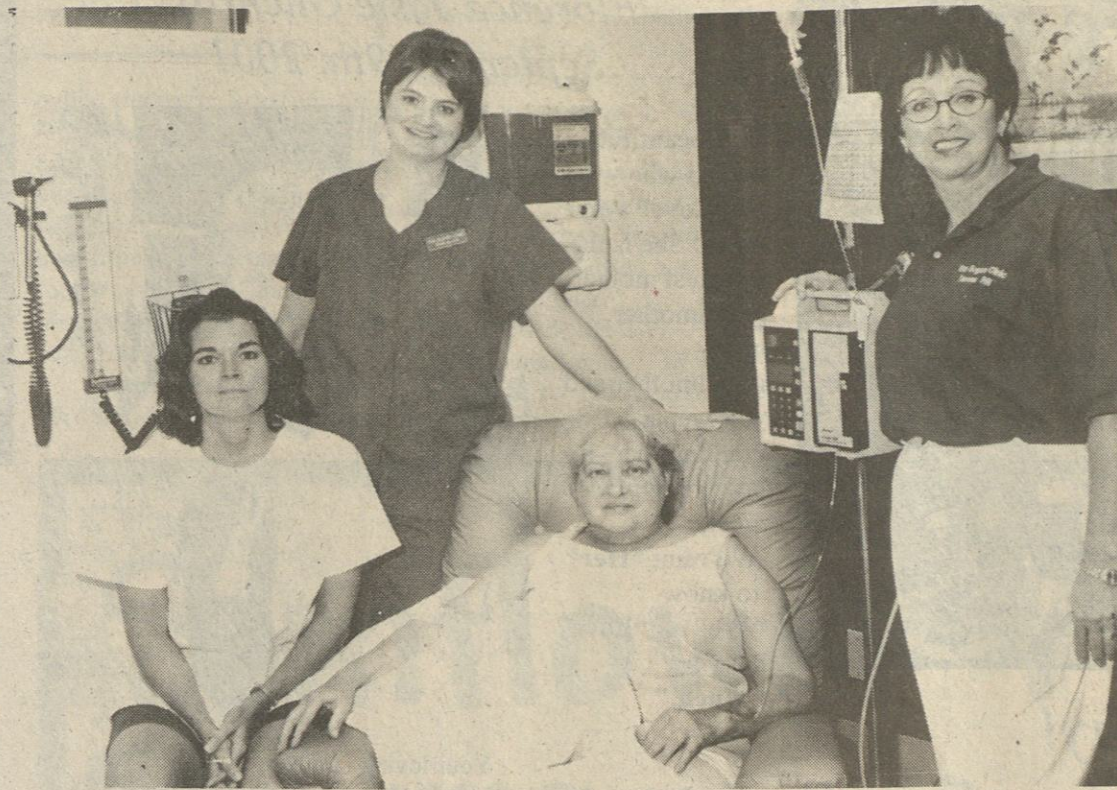
## Brenda Wilkerson Believes in "God Sent Help"

In late April of 2001, Brenda Wilkerson was stepping out of her shower one morning when she heard and felt something pop in her back. Her husband got her into the car, and they went to Segars' Clinic in Iuka. She had a CAT scan and went to her father's house to rest. After doctors looked at the CAT scan, she was called and immediately went to Memphis to the hospital for treatment of a broken back. After many, many more hours of extensive testing, Brenda was discovered to have a bone disease that has left her bones as eggshells. She was referred to a specialist, Dr. Enrico Palmieri at The West Cancer Clinic in Memphis, TN. The doctor's plan of treatment included chemotherapy treatments much like those used to treat cancer patients. Brenda would also have to have intravenous doses of magnesium to keep her from slipping into cardiac arrest. He insisted that she could not receive her medicine without constant monitoring.

After staying in the hospital several days, Brenda began to want to go home, but the doctor, again insisted, that she could have to have monitored while she received treatment, and he did not know how she could get this care unless she was in the hospital. Brenda was desperate to find somewhere to get the treatments she needed, and she started looking.

In her search, someone mentioned to her that the Segars Clinic in Iuka was offering multiple kinds of IV therapies often ordered by specialists for specific needs. These treatments frequently save patients from having to go out of town to get needed treatments.

Excited that she might have an alternative, Brenda called one of the nurses at the Segars'

Clinic late that night to find out about her possibilities. She was instructed to have her Memphis doctor call the clinic to see if the treatments could be given in Iuka. The next day, her doctor called the clinic and arranged the treatments Brenda would need.

The bone disease robbed her body of many necessary nutrients, and she became very weak. She had to wear a body brace. She could not walk without the help of a walker. She had to depend on her family to do everything for her.

The treatments she receives take about 3 1/2 hours per session. She is now taking treatments two days a week instead of the three days a week with which she originally started. Besides the treatments, she also takes 50,000 units of Vitamin D a week and has to drink liquid calcium 3 days a week. She also gets a daily shot of caltonium.

Brenda is married to Billy Wilkerson, and they have lived in Savannah, TN, since the early 80's. They own a construction company in Savannah.

Brenda is very thankful to still have family in Iuka where she spends Monday and Thursday nights after receiving her treatments.

She has two children—Teresa Enlow Holland and Paul Enlow, Jr. Teresa and her husband, Randall, live in Adamsville, TN. Paul and his wife, Darlene, live here in Iuka. Paul and Darlene are the parents of Cody, Brenda's only grandchild so far. Paul, Sr. has also been very helpful by making phone calls for and helping to transport Brenda during her illness. Brenda is so thankful for all the help her family has given her.

Brenda was reared in the Iuka area and attended Iuka High School through her junior year. She is a graduate of Henry Ford High School in Detroit, MI. Her father, Grady Hudson, lives on Eastport Road here in Iuka. Brenda lost her mother, the late Mollie Hudson, about four years ago to Alzheimer's disease.

Brenda said, "I am so very thankful that I have a place to receive the treatment I need and not have to go to Memphis and stay in the hospital to get it. I just don't think the people of

Iuka and the surrounding area have any idea of how lucky they are to have such caring doctors and nurses in their hometown. I also don't think that the Segars' Clinic would brag on themselves like I can. I am able to stay at home and get the professional care I need. Again, I think people just don't realize just what they have right here at home."

## Old Tishomingo Traces

August 23, 1894:

Death of Capt. R. H. Watson  
This week we make the sad announcement of the death of one of our most prominent citizens. Last Sunday evening Capt. Robert H. Watson passed into that dreamless sleep that marks the line between time and eternity. This news will bring sadness to many hearts in Tishomingo county, for he was well known and widely loved. His death will bring to mind many courtesies and acts of kindness which he was always willing and glad to do. No better evidence of the high esteem in which this true hearted man was held is needed than to watch and count the immense throng of people which followed him to his last resting place.

The funeral services were conducted at the Methodist Church by Rev. J.G. Lowe of Okla. The friends and acquaintances of the deceased turned out enmasse and all could not find room in the church. The bier was made beautiful by loving hands with floral decorations. The ceremony was brief and simple but touching and appropriate. He was a brave and loyal man, a friend and father, a loving husband and useful citizen to whom we rendered tribute. The long procession followed the remains to the cemetery where the lifeless body was tenderly laid to rest.

Capt. Watson spent most of his life in Tishomingo county. He was born August, 1832, in York district, S.C. He came to this county very young. At the age of 20 he began clerking at Eastport with R.B. Brown. In three years he went to Pleasant Site, Ala., and began business as a merchant, planter and miller. He was highly successful and soon amassed considerable property by economy and good management. He married Miss Martha J. Harrison, of Lauderdale county, Ala., and by her had five children, two of whom are yet living - John H. and Charles L. Watson. His first wife died in Jan. 1878. He married again in 1879 to Miss Morilla Cross, daughter of Dr. Gross of Lauderdale County, Alabama who still survives him.

When the call for troops was made in 1861, Capt. Watson was among the first to respond. He was made captain of Company B. of the 27th Alabama Infantry. This position he held for one year and was made captain of a cavalry company, and engaged in many important battles and skirmishes. He was captured at Fort Donelson but made his escape. He had many other exciting experiences and narrow escapes during his service in the army. He was finally paroled at Iuka in the year 1865.

In 1884 he removed to Iuka and went into the mercantile business. In 1890 he bought the famous Iuka Springs Hotel and made many additions and improvements.

Many years ago he joined the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and remained a faithful member until his removal to Iuka, when he, with his lovely wife, united himself with the Methodist Church at this place. He was a firm believer in the Christian religions and died in the belief that he was going to a better world.

He was a man of wonderful physical endurance and until stricken down last November was always in good health. He had been a sufferer for several months and the end was not unexpected; however, it was a shock to his relatives and friends who had hoped against hope for his recovery.

He will be missed in Iuka for he was public spirited and progressive in his views. He was always ready to foster any

public enterprise, helpful to the churches and the cause of education. The mortal part of him is dead, but his memory will never die. Let us emulate his virtues and remember him for the good he has done.

December 13, 1894:

Miss Ella Kay

On the night of November 27, 1894, Miss Ella Kay died at

her father's house 6 miles northwest of Iuka, Miss. Ella was about 26 years old and was a member of the Methodist Church. Weep not, father, your daughter has gone to join her mother in the sweet by and by. Brothers and sisters prepare to meet your sisters in the land of the blest. You will hear Ella's voice no more around the fireside; the Master has said, "Come up higher."

December 13, 1894:

Belmont, Miss. Died on the 5th inst. D.J. Anglin of abscess of the liver. The

bereaved family have our sympathies.

Died on the 2nd inst. infant of W.I. Threadgill. The bereaved parents will please accept our sympathy.

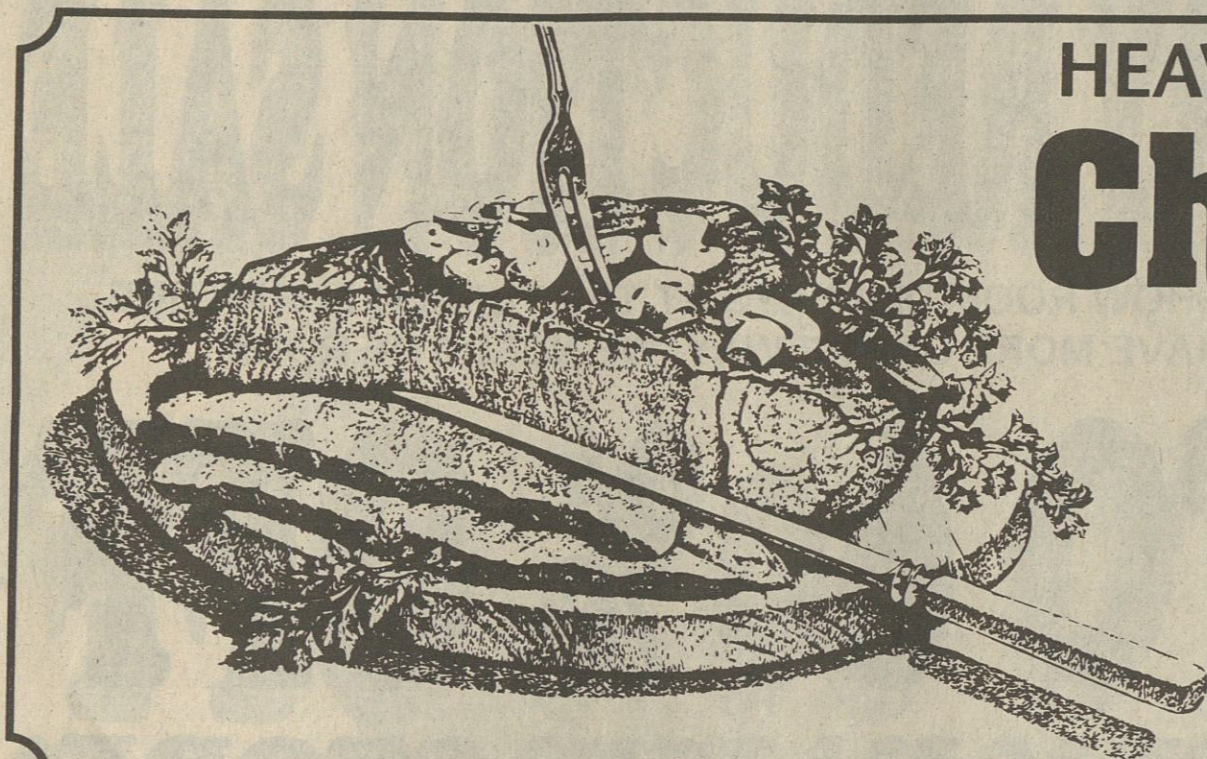

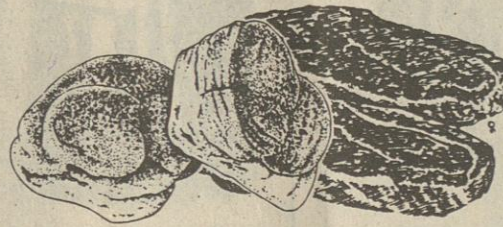

## Home From The 600

This was the fifth year of the Tennessee River 600-mile ride for charity. Seventy jet skis participated in the event that began in Knoxville and concluded at Paris Landing, TN. Twelve states were represented, the furthest being California. When support crew and family members were added in, over 140 people joined in the seven days of fun.

The purpose of the Tennessee 600 is to raise funds for the Children's Miracle Network. In 2000, over \$18,000 was donated. This year, it looks like the \$20,000 Mark will be exceeded. Donations are still coming in so the final number hasn't been tallied.

The riders launched near Knoxville's Calhoun's Restaurant on Sunday, July 28th, under cloudy skies with rain threatening. At 8:30 a.m., the whistle sounded, jet drives roared into life and the ride was on.

Soon the rain began to fall and the riders were forced to don their raingear for most of the following 10 hours on the river. Two dams and about 140 miles later, the group lodged for the night in Dayton, TN.

Day 2, Monday. From Dayton to Chickamauga

Marina near Chattanooga was the shortest day of the ride. Riders enjoyed lunch at the Marina and then were transported to the Chattanooga Choo Choo for an afternoon off. The downtown of Chattanooga has undergone a great renaissance the last few years and the group shopped and visited the sights.

Day 3's ride was through the area known as the Grand Canyon of the Tennessee. These 35 miles of high bluffs and wilderness islands are beautiful. Lunch was at Hale's Bar Marina, near the abandoned ruins of Hale's Bar Dam. The only structure left from the original dam is the powerhouse. The foundation slowly failed and the dam was replaced by the Nickajack structure. After lunch and fueling, the riders were off to Gunter'sville, another 95 miles in the distance. Too Covenant Cove for the night.

Gunter'sville's Covenant Cove Lodge allowed a much-deserved day of rest on Wednesday. Some worked on their jet skis, some rested for long hours on the quiet cove and still others went shopping in the quaint downtown.

Thursday dawned bright and sunny and the riders

headed for the dam to begin the journey to Wheeler State Park. Not far from Wheeler, we joined friends to explore the Elk River (a tributary of the Tennessee) for the forty-mile ride. The Elk is unique in that the shoreline is dotted with homes but the water is so shallow in some places that only a jet ski can navigate it. The Elk was a delight. And as always, the Wheeler staff and accommodations were among the best we visited.

Friday, Day 6, had the worst of the weather. The morning went well. Wheeler Dam was no problem. In fact, the short run from Wheeler to Wilson is the location of the annual "drag race" of the 600. As soon as the dam lock is cleared, those from California and Wisconsin stage a grudge match between hopped-up Wave Runners and hot rod Sea Doo's. This year the California Wave Runners won. Mississippi's Larry Kain won among stock skis.

The riders luck ran low at Wilson Dam, however. They endured almost three hours of waiting in the hot sun on the lock. A large tow had broken loose and jammed the lock wall so that no traffic could enter or leave. Finally that problem was solved, and the group entered Pickwick. Things went well for a few miles and then one of the famous Pickwick storms moved in. From Seven Mile Island to Bear Creek a hard squall blasted the participants. Some sought shelter on the bank, others rode on. Finally, Pickwick Landing State Park gave kindly refuge to all.

The last, Day 7, the longest ride of them all awaited. From Pickwick to Paris Landing, approximately 150 miles. Everything was ok for the first 100 or so miles. Lunch was great at Clifton Marina and the sun was shining. Then as we entered the wide part of Kentucky Lake beyond Cuba Landing, the wind turned to the north and built the calm river into swells and chop.

The last 45 miles of the ride were the most miserable. Even the Pickwick storm didn't beat the travelers like the 3-4 foot waves on Kentucky Lake. Machines and riders were

severely tested along the entire finishing run.

Then Paris Landing loomed in the distance. A wonderful sight to see. The finish line.

Will we do it again next year? It's like the old saying, "Good Lord willing and the creek don't rise", yeah, we will. In fact, we've already requested an entry form. Come join us, you'll have a great time.

Also the heavy workload of the Technology Administrator and ways to solve the problem were addressed.

Plans for buying a new van for the county office were also discussed. The Educational Price List cost would be \$18,508. Each school will surrender their cars to the central office for a trade-in and 5 used trucks between \$3,500 and \$5,000 will be purchased for the schools to replace the cars. The teaching of Foreign Languages via the electronic classroom was also addressed by Cindy Hudson. She asked why the electronic classroom was being used when the school had a full time language teacher who is now being used to teach English. Ms. Hudson had done research which proves that distance education should be used to provide classes that are not available in a

traditional learning environment to enhance the current curriculum and to enrich the learning experience. In distance learning there is no face to face interaction so there is difficulty in assessing when students are on task when teachers have little or no cues of student's comprehension. Engaging a student's attention more difficult via internet video, and the class size should exceed 35 students.

Students who are best at distance learning must be self directed, motivated, organized and accountable learners. They must have a sense of responsibility and a passion for learning.

According to her research the USDE web site, distance learning should be a stepping stone to hiring regular classroom instructors, should be used less commonly taught languages and is usually used with levels of commonly languages.

Thus, why is distance learning used to teach French when there are other qualified English teachers in the Belmont, Burnsville, and TCHS schools who may be used to teach English? Tishomingo Middle School board of taking the one foreign language teacher to teach English? board promised that they study this situation.

The meeting adjourned approximately 9:00 p.m.

## A Special Tribute To Yvonne Starkey

Mary Yvonne Starkey, known by her friends and family as "Yvonne" and "Nana," died Friday, August 24, 2001. A resident of Tishomingo, Yvonne Starkey was sixty-six years old.

She was born in 1935 to Zeb and Lessie Deaton and grew up in the Boggs Chapel Community with sisters Peggy Hoover and Jean Luttrell and brother Aaron Deaton. Yvonne graduated from Paden High School in 1952 and moved to Memphis, Tennessee, where she worked and played on a local women's basketball team. She returned to Tishomingo and began to date Ed Starkey who was in the U. S. Army and was stationed at Fort Gordon, Georgia. Later, Yvonne and her family returned to Tishomingo, where they built their home on Carter's Branch Road. While her children were completing school and college, Yvonne worked a variety of jobs, including assisting her husband with farming; working in local manufacturing plants; and organizing and running the bakery at the Piggly Wiggly Grocery in Iuka.

Yvonne was a gifted cook and opened two bake shops in Tishomingo and with her sister Jean in Paden. Many people still have fond memories of her apple fritters, donuts, and cookies. Yvonne also made beautiful wedding cakes, including several for her children and other family

members. Her specialty was personalized birthday cakes for family and friends. A recurring theme in her cakes was the dreaded "old man" who appeared on the cake to let the birthday person know that time was passing.

Yvonne also found time to attend Northeast Community College and the University of North Alabama to take education classes and to pursue hobbies such as painting, ceramics, and stained glass design.

The passing of time requires much of us, and Yvonne along with her sisters, Peggy and Jean, rose to the occasion in taking care of their elderly parents in their last years. Yvonne provided loving care for her husband Ed after his stroke and until his death in 1998.

The Starkey place became a second home for many extended family members and friends of the children. Yvonne had a particular knack for welcoming people into her home and making them a part of her family. Many people have fond memories of gatherings during the holidays, singing around the fire, or simple quiet time spent on the deck. Yvonne's home was eulogized by Rev. Earl MacAnally as being a "safe place" for many in these times of change.

Those who knew Yvonne Starkey admired and enjoyed her true passion for life, for "Livin'" every day to its fullest. Her passions were many and diverse and included maintaining the family home, fishing, homemade ice cream, collecting rocks from the travels of her children, guineas, riding her four-wheeler in "the bottom," and singing.

She was most passionate about her family. She was a devoted daughter to her parents and wholly committed to her husband, Edward. She unconditionally loved her children and their families. Her grandchildren, Bryant Starkey & Starkey-Morgan Ludlam of Muscle Shoals, and Ellis and Jake Starkey of Merigold, Mississippi were "Nana's"

special pride and joy.

Yvonne was said to be a collector of "strays." In addition to stray animals, Yvonne seemed to also collect stray people. Many extended family members, neighbors, and friends of the children came to view Yvonne as their special friend. These "strays" stayed with Yvonne as special members of her family, often referring to her as Mamaw Starkey or as Nana.
