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

Mississippi State Superintendent Of Education, Richard Thompson, Praises Tishomingo County Educators

Mississippi's State Superintendent of Education was in Tishomingo County on Monday, October 1, 2001, to applaud and praise the Tishomingo County School District's accomplishments for the last year.

For the second consecutive year, Tishomingo County students in Grades 2 - 8 scored the highest in Mississippi on the TerraNova test, which is taken by all students in these grades. across the state. Dr. Thompson applauded the Tishomingo County students and teachers for their outstanding performance on this test. Dr. Thompson also congratulated all of the district's school personnel when they met at Tishomingo County High School for an impressive Employee Celebration. Tishomingo County Superintendent, John Mullins, welcomed everyone. Mr. Mullins pointed out that this was a happy, yet sad day for the district. He noted that all were happy for the accomplishments of the schools, but it was a sad time as the teachers and students had been distressed by the recent terrorism in the United States, and were also saddened over the two deaths in the school family last week when Austin Carr and Cotton Waffird were killed in acci-

Dr. Richard Thompson, dents. Austin was the son of Tishomingo teacher, Joyce Carr, and Cotton was the husband of Iuka Elementary teacher, Christy Waffird. All personnel grieve with these teachers.

Mr. Mullins briefly recapped many of the accomplishments of the district during this last school year. He noted Tishomingo County's efforts both in and out of the classroom. Some of the other accomplishments named were a 2-A State Basketball Championship at Belmont; 4th highest ACT (22.8) scores in the state; state winners in FBLA at Belmont, Tishomingo County High School, and Tishomingo County Vo-Tech; National winners at Tishomingo County Vo-Tech in FBLA and Metal leaving Trades; students kindergarten already reading; no bus accidents; an A+ Certification in Computer Technology for a student; and a huge amount of scholarship money provided to seniors to Community Colleges and State Universities. These mentioned are just a few of the many noteworthy accomplishments.

Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center Receives Grant

The Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center received a TANF Grant (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2001. This is a federally funded grant administered through the Mississippi Department of Human Services and will permit the continued operation of the Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center located on the campus of Tishomingo County High School. The Tishomingo County School District oversees the daily operation of the center and its three paid staff members. The staff includes Becky McNeely, Director; Sue Kirkpatrick, Parent Educator; and Janet Fulton, Resource Clerk.

Although hard to describe, Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center provides many services to the families of Tishomingo County and the surrounding counties, including Prentiss and Alcorn Counties. The most visible program is the after-school Tutoring Program at each school in the county. This program provides assistance to students that need a little extra help with schoolwork four afternoons a week. The tutors are certified teachers in that school. They include Christy Pharr, Belmont Elementary; Becky Copeland, Belmont High; Sherry Barnes, Burnsville; Lisa Holt, Iuka Elementary; Tammy Hampton, Iuka Middle; Farcellina Brock, Tishomingo; and Joyce Key, Tishomingo High. Through their efforts, many students are experiencing success rather than failure. At present there

are over 150 students in the tutoring program.

Other programs available include Parenting Education, Life Skills Programs, Seven Habits Programs and a new Technology Assistance Program. A "Seven Habits of Highly Effective Families" seminar will be offered on Saturday, October 20, 2001, at Crow's Neck from 9:00-6:00. The program is FREE to families who participate. Correcting Irregular Cornea

The normal cornea is perfectly curved and helps the eye to focus sharply. Occasionally, nature distorts this curvature, so that the surface of the cornea, instead of being round, becomes coneshaped and irregular. This is called conical cornea, or keratoconus.





Domestic Violence: Is Someone You Know A Victim?

Many people, especially women, are victims of domestic violence without even knowing it. Domestic violence is also known as family violence, spouse abuse and/or battering. All of the terms may be defined as intentional repeated acts meant to cause physical OR emotional harm. Sexual abuse and destruction of property and/or pets are also included in the dynamics of domestic violence.

The following is a list of what domestic violence includes:

Physical abuse includes: Pushing, shoving, slapping, punching, kicking or choking. Assault with a weapon. Holding, tying down or restraining the victim. Leaving the victim in a dangerous place. Refusing to help the victim when the victim is sick or injured.

Emotional abuse includes:

Threats of harm. Threats of harm to children. Physical and social isolation. Extreme jealousy and possessiveness. Deprivation. Intimidation. Degradation and humiliation. Calling the victim names. Constantly criticizing, insulting and belittling the victim. False accusations, blaming the victim for everything. Ignoring, dismissing or ridiculing the victim's needs. Lying, breaking promises, destroying Driving fast and trust. recklessly to frighten the victim.

Sexual Abuse:

Trying to make the victim perform sexual acts against her/his will. Pursuing sexual activity when he or she is not fully conscious. Pursuing

sexual activity when victim is not asked or afraid to say "No" Hurting the victim physically during sexual activity. Coercing the victim to have sex without protection. Criticizing the victim and using sexually degrading names.



Mr. Rogers retired a few weeks ago. Like most folks I didn't pay much attention as he put on his coat and shoes and To my bid farewell. generation, Rev. Fred Rogers was a "grown up," but he was also a friend who' taught us many lessons, including those of kindness and respect for other people.

Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When the railways of France, Germany and India were breaking down through age, it was the Americans who rebuilt them. When the Pennsylvania Railroad and the New York Central went broke, nobody loaned them an old caboose. Both are still broke.

I can name you 5000 times when the Americans raced to the help of other people in trouble. Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the Americans in trouble? I don't think there was outside help even during the San Fransico earthquake.

Our neighbors have faced it alone, and I'm one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them get kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of those.'
