Tishomingo County ARC To Meet Monday Night

The monthly meeting of the Tishomingo County ARC (Association for Rights of Citizens with Developmental Disabilities) will be held on October 15, 2001, at 7:00 p.m. in the Education Center at Iuka Hospital. A representative from the Social Security Administration will provide information regarding benefits that are available, who qualifies for those benefits and the application process.

The Tishomingo County ARC is an organization of parents, volunteers, family members, professionals, and others concerned with the well being of children and adults with developmental disabilities. At least 44,000 citizens in Mississippi have developmental disabilities. The Tishomingo County ARC is an affiliate of The ARC of Mississippi and The ARC of the United States. The Tishomingo County ARC works with the ARC/MS and the ARC/U.S. to provide parent support services, parent training and information regarding education for children, public awareness, behavior management training, information and referral, as

well as many other services. The ARC is committed to securing for all people with developmental disabilities the opportunity to choose and realize their goals of where and how they learn, live, work, and play.

The Tishomingo County ARC chapter was formed in 2000 by local parents/care givers of children with all types of disabilities. One of the many goals of this group is to educate our communities and create an awareness of the impact that the community has on the lives of special needs citizens.

With the growing number of special needs citizens in Tishomingo County we need to join together to make our community more accessible to special needs citizens of all ages. We hope to build a support system so that families do not have to feel so alone in their battles.

Mississippi State Superintendent Of Education, Richard Thompson, Praises Tishomingo County Educators

Dr. Richard Thompson, Mississippi's State Superintendent of Education was in Tishomingo County on Monday, October 1, 2001, to applaud and praise the Tishomingo County School District's accomplishments for the last year.

For the second consecutive year, Tishomingo County students in Grades 2 - 8 scored the highest in Mississippi on the TerraNova test, which is taken by all students in these grades across the state. Dr. Thompson applauded the Tishomingo County students and teachers for their outstanding performance on this test.

Dr. Thompson also congratulated all of the district's school personnel when they met at Tishomingo County High School for an impressive Employee Celebration.

Tishomingo County Superintendent, John Mullins, welcomed everyone. Mr. Mullins pointed out that this was a happy, yet sad day for the district. He noted that all were happy for the accomplishments of the schools, but it was a sad time as the teachers and students had been distressed by the recent terrorism in the United States, and were also saddened over the two deaths in the school family last week when Austin Carr and Cotton Waffird were killed in acci-

dents. Austin was the son of Tishomingo teacher, Joyce Carr, and Cotton was the husband of Iuka Elementary teacher, Christy Waffird. All personnel grieve with these teachers.

Mr. Mullins briefly recapped many of the accomplishments of the district during this last school year. He noted Tishomingo County's efforts both in and out of the classroom. Some of the other accomplishments named were a 2-A State Basketball Championship at Belmont; 4th highest ACT (22.8) scores in the state; state winners in FBLA at Belmont, Tishomingo County High School, and Tishomingo County Vo-Tech; National winners at Tishomingo County Vo-Tech in FBLA and Metal Trades; students leaving kindergarten already reading; no bus accidents; an A+ Certification in Computer Technology for a student; and a huge amount of scholarship money provided to seniors to Community Colleges and State Universities. These mentioned are just a few of the many noteworthy accomplishments.

Dr. Richard Thompson, introduced by Mr. Kirkpatrick, Assistant Superintendent, then offered his congratulations. Dr. Thompson offered his sympathy and prayers to the Carr and Waffird families. He thanked

the county personnel for all the hard work they have done in setting a good example for students and for being surrogate parents to the children during the September 11 disaster; for having the highest scores on the TerraNova for the second straight year (He noted that it takes everyone to be successful.); for helping Mississippi make more progress than any other state in bringing the graduation rate (now 75%) up; for continuing to be pioneers in education; and for being role models for students and adults in Tishomingo County. Dr. Thompson added that he is determined to improve academic achievement in Mississippi and that he is proud that Tishomingo County is joining him in this effort.

The meeting adjourned with everyone singing *America*, led by the voices of the Tishomingo County School Choir.

Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center Receives Grant

The Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center received a TANF Grant (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2001. This is a federally funded grant administered through the Mississippi Department of Human Services and will permit the continued operation of the Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center located on the campus of Tishomingo County High School. The Tishomingo County School District oversees the daily operation of the center and its three paid staff members. The staff includes Becky McNeely, Director; Sue Kirkpatrick, Parent Educator; and Janet Fulton, Resource Clerk.

Although hard to describe, Tishomingo County Families

First Resource Center provides many services to the families of Tishomingo County and the surrounding counties, including Prentiss and Alcorn Counties. The most visible program is the after-school Tutoring Program at each school in the county. This program provides assistance to students that need a little extra help with schoolwork four afternoons a week. The tutors are certified teachers in that school. They include Christy Pharr, Belmont Elementary; Becky Copeland, Belmont High; Sherry Barnes, Burnsville; Lisa Holt, Iuka Elementary; Tammy Hampton, Iuka Middle; Farcellina Brock, Tishomingo; and Joyce Key, Tishomingo High. Through their efforts, many students are experiencing success rather than failure. At present there

are over 150 students in the tutoring program.

Other programs available include Parenting Education, Life Skills Programs, Seven Habits Programs and a new Technology Assistance Program. A "Seven Habits of Highly Effective Families" seminar will be offered on Saturday, October 20, 2001, at Crow's Neck from 9:00-6:00. The program is FREE to families who participate. Lunch will be provided. You MUST call 423-7318 to register as this will be limited to 25 families.

TISHOMINGO COUNTY 4-H MEMBER COMPETES IN NATIONAL EVENT

Dewayne Morgan, 22 Silhouettes, .22 Light Rifle Member of the Sportsman 4-H Club, competed in the 2001 National 4-H Shooting Sports Invitational held in San Antonio, Texas this summer. He qualified in the rifle discipline through two state matches held at the 4-H Field and Stream Center in West Point, Mississippi. Only the top six 4-H members from Mississippi qualified for the national event. The Mississippi 4-H Rifle Team came home with a 3rd place finish. In the national event, which took place over three days, Dewayne competed in

and 3-position 10-meter Sporter Air Rifle. In the silhouette competition, shooters must knock down four sizes of metal targets at four distances. Each size has ten targets. They receive points only for those that are knocked off the stand. Dewayne scored fourteen out of forty in this event for a 12th place finish. In the Light Rifle competition he scored a 339 out of a possible 400, giving him a 21st place finish. In the Sporter Air Rifle event his score was 240 out of 300 which placed him 18th. This was the first

Tishomingo County 4-H member to qualify for a national shooting event and we plan to have many more in the future. Other disciplines covered under the 4-H Field and Stream program are Shotgun, Pistols, Muzzleloaders, Archery, and Wildlife Habitat Evaluation. Home Economics Tips

HEALTHY TO THE CORE

Nothing captures the essence of fall better than a freshly picked apple. The scents of warm apple cider, applesauce and apple pie complement the chilly air. The crisp bite of a raw apple echoes the crunch of dry leaves underfoot. And the colorful variety of apples reflects the

many colors of fall: Red Delicious, Ginger Gold, green Granny Smith.

What's the Appeal? Like all fruits and vegetables, apples contain no fat, sodium or cholesterol. A medium apple has only 80 calories, yet it provides an impressive five grams of fiber. (The Recommended Daily Value

for fiber is 20-35 grams.) You'll get the most fiber if you eat the whole apple, from peel to core.

Apple Advice:

- * Choose firm apples with no bruises.
- * Handle apples carefully to avoid bruising.
- * Refrigerate apples keep them fresh longer.
- * Store apples in a ventilated plastic bag; keep away from strong-odored foods.
- * Wash apples before using to rinse off dirt and pesticides.

* Coat apple slices with lemon, orange or apple juice to prevent browning.

Whether you pick them from the tree or the produce aisles, apples are a perfect "anytime" food. Dip apple wedges in nonfat vanilla yogurt as part of a quick, healthy breakfast. A whole apple makes a perfect portable snack. Slice apples onto a sandwich; stir them into stuffing; chop them into a salad; or bake them, stuffed with raisins, for savory dessert.

With over 100 varieties of apples grown in the U.S., there is an apple for everyone and every occasion. In general, sweet apples are best for eating raw and tart apples work best for pies, applesauce and other baked goods.

Correcting Irregular Cornea

The normal cornea is perfectly curved and helps the eye to focus sharply. Occasionally, nature distorts this curvature, so that the surface of the cornea, instead of being round, becomes cone-shaped and irregular. This is called conical cornea, or keratoconus.

Before the days of contact lenses, people with keratoconus suffered from poor vision which became gradually and increasingly so distorted that even with glasses they could perform only the crudest tasks. Worse still, this ailment often struck young adults who found their jobs or their careers interrupted at a critical time in their lives.

Today, people with this problem are more fortunate. Miraculously, use of a contact lens can restore good vision to those suffering from this condition. The irregular surface of the eye can be "paved over" with a perfectly curved contact lens. This allows the image passing into the eye to remain sharp and clear..

THE IMPORTANCE OF HEALTHY DOG PARASITIC DIAGNOSING DISEASE

By carefully observing and feeling (palpating) your dog's body, a veterinarian often can detect disease. Further diagnostics may be necessary either to confirm that disease is present or to differentiate between diseases. One in 10 dogs has heart disease, but acquired heart disease mainly affects older dogs. Although signs may not be visible, heart disease can be diagnosed during a clinical exam and in many cases can be managed successfully with early detection and treatment.

Some of the most common tests that may be performed are examining stool samples and urine, drawing blood for blood chemistry evaluation, cell count, and to check for parasites; and checking skin scrapings for parasites or fungus. Early diagnosis of disease will help your dog remain healthy. If you notice any of the following in your dog, ask your veterinarian for advice.

- * Abnormal behavior: sudden viciousness, or lethargy.
- * Abnormal discharge from nose, eyes, or other body openings.
- * Change in appetite that lasts a few days (this can include an increase or decrease in appetite.)
- * Excessive head shaking, scratching, or licking.
- * Abnormal lumps: limping, or difficulty in getting up or lying down.
- * Foul breath or excessive tartar and deposits on teeth.
- * Changes in urination or drinking habits.
- * Persistent vomiting or diarrhea.

Domestic Violence: Is Someone You Know A Victim?

Many people, especially women, are victims of domestic violence without even knowing it. Domestic violence is also known as family violence, spouse abuse and/or battering. All of the terms may be defined as intentional repeated acts meant to cause physical OR emotional harm. Sexual abuse and destruction of property and/or pets are also included in the dynamics of domestic violence.

The following is a list of what domestic violence includes:

Physical abuse includes: Pushing, shoving, slapping, punching, kicking or choking. Assault with a weapon. Holding, tying down or restraining the victim. Leaving the victim in a dangerous place. Refusing to help the victim when the victim is sick or injured.

Emotional abuse includes: Threats of harm. Threats of harm to children. Physical and social isolation. Extreme jealousy and possessiveness. Deprivation. Intimidation. Degradation and humiliation. Calling the victim names. Constantly criticizing, insulting and belittling the victim. False accusations, blaming the victim for everything. Ignoring, dismissing or ridiculing the victim's needs. Lying, breaking promises, destroying trust. Driving fast and recklessly to frighten the victim.

Sexual Abuse: Trying to make the victim perform sexual acts against her/his will. Pursuing sexual activity when he or she is not fully conscious. Pursuing

sexual activity when victim is not asked or afraid to say "No". Hurting the victim physically during sexual activity. Coercing the victim to have sex without protection. Criticizing the victim and using sexually degrading names.

Destruction of Property and/or Pets:

Breaking, burning or damaging the victim's property/common property. Tearing, destroying or burning the victim's property. Destroying family property or heirlooms, such as Bibles, china, etc. Damaging the victim's vehicle. Hurting, maiming or killing the family pets.

The above list was adapted from the "Ohio Physicians' Domestic Violence Prevention Project, 1995".

We meet every Thursday evening at 6:00 p.m. at the Families First Resource Center located on the Tishomingo County High School campus. We are

not here to judge; we only want to listen and help, if possible. This support group is sponsored by the Families First Resource Center and S.A.F.E., Inc. (Shelter and Assistance in Family Emergencies) in Tupelo. If you need further information, please call (662) 423-7318. of Iuka is a member of the MS Municipalities Liability Program.

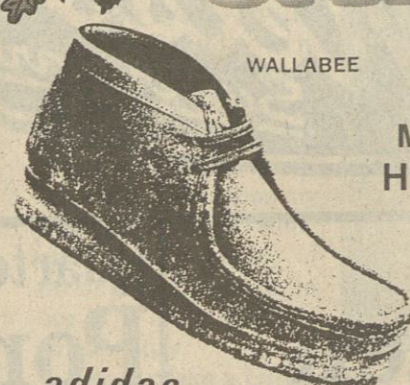

It's Been A Horrible Day in the Neighborhood!

Mr. Rogers retired a few weeks ago. Like most folks I didn't pay much attention as he put on his coat and shoes and bid farewell. To my generation, Rev. Fred Rogers was a "grown up," but he was also a friend who taught us many lessons, including those of kindness and respect for other people.

My brother, John, and I reminisced the other night remembering how we once spent our days watching and in a real way inviting Ernie and Bert, Cookie Monster, Kermit, Grover, and Big Bird into our home. They would visit, educate, and entertain us. Those were days of youth and innocence. We awoke to Captain Kangaroo, Mr. Green Jeans, Mr. Moose and Bunny Rabbit. We sat in front of a big Curtis Mathis television in our red pajamas drinking Nestle's Quick and eating a bowl of Applejacks or a Pop Tart, warm from the toaster. Man, how things change!

Back then we had REAL heroes! You remember, don't you?—Heroes like Sheriff Andy Taylor and Deputy Barney Fife, or the other officers on Adam 12, Hawaii Five-O or Dragnet. I wanted to be a doctor on Medical Center worker or a firefighter and paramedic like the guys on Emergency. Now those people always got the bad guy, always saved the patient and always made you proud.

I guess I grew up and forgot about the real live heroes for the most part. Yes, you see them out doing roadblocks or directing traffic. You see them at a wreck or house fire on the news. We read their mention in the paper without actually considering what training they go through to be the best at what they do.

We also played with red Tonka fire trucks, G. I. Joes, and the little plastic Army men. We played fun games like Operation. Girls played with Nurse Barbie. And, you always had to flip a nickel to see who would wear a mask and a black

Widespread but only partial news coverage was given recently to a remarkable editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian television commentator. What follows is the full text of his trenchant remarks as printed in the Congressional Record:

Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When earthquakes hit distant cities, it is the United States that hurries in to help. This spring, 59 American communities were flattened by tornadoes. Nobody helped.

The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplane. Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the Lockheed Tri-Star, or the Douglas DC10? If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all the international lines except Russia fly American Planes?

Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon? You talk about Japanese technocracy, and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy, and you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy, and you find men on the moon—not once, but several times and safely home again.

You talk about scandals, and the Americans put theirs right in the store window for everybody to look at. Even their draftdodgers are not pursued and hounded. They are here on our streets, and most of them, unless they are breaking Canadian laws, are getting American dollars from ma and pa at home to spend here.

When the railways of France, Germany and India were breaking down through age, it was the Americans who rebuilt them. When the Pennsylvania Railroad and the New York Central went broke, nobody loaned them an old caboose. Both are still broke.

I can name you 5000 times when the Americans raced to the help of other people in trouble. Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the Americans in trouble? I don't think there was outside help even during the San Francisco earthquake.

Our neighbors have faced it alone, and I'm one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them get kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of those."
