Historic Iuka Landmark Destroyed By Fire

Investigators Called In To Determine Cause

The 110-year old home of Harold T. "Dickie" and Estelle Lomenick located at the corner of Pike and Indian Streets in Iuka was destroyed by a raging fire early Sunday morning, December 30th.

The fire at the historic landmark was spotted by a passerby who reported the fire to authorities at 12:18. Iuka Fire Chief Brian Grissom who lives next door in the "old Bostick home" answered the call immediately. He reported that he could see that the kitchen area of the home was already engulfed with flames as he ran from his back door.

Two trucks from the Iuka Fire Department, two from Harmony Central and one from Midway and personnel from Iuka, Midway, and Coleman Park Fire Departments were on the scene until about 10:30 a.m. Sunday morning.

According to Fire Chief Grissom, it appeared that the fire began on the back patio of the home just left of the kitchen door. Grissom stated that the cause could not be determined as intentional or accidental from the evidence found on the porch. State Farm Insurance investigators will do forensic testing on the site this week and make the final determination of the cause.

The Lomenicks were not home at the time of the fire. Dickie and Estelle are currently residing at Southern Magnolia Assisted Living Center while recuperating from illnesses. They were planning to return home in mid-February.

According to Chief Grissom, firemen fought the fire for hours. Upon arrival at the scene the firemen were able to get inside, but after about 30 to 45 minutes of interior attack, they were forced outside. The brave men were not able to bring the fire under control.

The firemen then changed to "surround and drown control" on the outside. The firemen used two 2 1/2" hand lines as well as two deck guns on the fire trucks. Firemen finally brought the fire under control after a long 10-hour battle.

Officers from the Iuka Police Department and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department aided the firemen in traffic control. Firemen and police officers assisted family and friends as they removed some antiques, pictures, and other items from the burning house.

According to the Lomenick's eldest son, Harold, the two-story house located near Mineral Springs Park was built in 1892 by Mr. R. D. Edwards, who was a train conductor. Mr. Edwards had many wagon loads of dirt brought into the area to build the land up to its current level. Local carpenters spent about two years building the old Victorian-style house. Mr. Edwards lived in the house until he sold it to the Waddey family around the turn of the century. The Waddey's lived there until the mid 1940's. At that time, Dickie Lomenick's uncle, Kerry Thorne purchased the house from the Waddey's. Some time around 1950 to 1951, Dickie and his uncle

traded houses with some money to boot, because the Thorne's needed a smaller house, and the Lomenick's needed a bigger house. Young Harold was about three years old when his Mom and Dad moved into the big house.

Harold remembers many good times in his boyhood home. Mrs. Icie Lomenick, his grandmother had a Kindergarten in a building just behind the house. Kindergartens were a rare thing in the 1950's and many of Iuka's children attended "Miss Icie's". They have fond memories of playing in the large yard that surrounded the big, beautiful white house on

the corner. Harold also remembers his Aunt Patsy's wedding, which was held in the house.

Rooms and apartments in the house were also rented out over the years. Many young couples started their marriages in the "Lomenick home" and have fond memories of the old house.

Harold, Gary, and younger brother Bob, who now lives in Holly Springs hold "dear" the time they spent growing up in the house.

In the late 80's and early 90's the lovely old home was completely restored and was placed on the National Registry in 1991. At that time it was

named "the Edward's Place," although many people still refer to it as the Waddey place.

The loss of this historic house is a great personal loss for the Lomenick family, for the community, and for the state. Although some things were saved, many personal ties to the past were destroyed.

Iuka Fire Chief Brian Grissom would like to thank the many volunteers who came to assist at this horrific fire. Nearby homes were saved by the fast action of the departments responding.

He would also like to thank Red Cross volunteers who came to the scene with drinks for the firemen.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL TAXPAYERS WHO FILE HOMESTEAD

Tishomingo County Tax Assessor's office personnel, Deputy Clerk - Shirley Maxwell, Clerk - James Johnson, and Tax Assessor - Diana Turner, are getting ready for the new Homestead Exemption season. The Tishomingo County Tax Assessor's Office will be an especially busy place with the coming of the new year. The state of Mississippi has a new computer system, and all tax assessor's offices across the state must be updated. All addresses must conform to the 911 system now being used across the state.

Everyone—even those people over 65—should call the Tax Assessor's office at 423-7059 to make sure that addresses have been changed.

Only new applicants for Homestead Exemption need to come by the office to sign up, but everyone needs to call to make sure your address has been updated.

HOMESTEAD NOTICE TO ALL TAXPAYERS

All Homesteads this year must be updated due to a new program ordered by the State Tax Commission. You do not have to sign an application, but you do need to call or come by our office before March 31st.

HOMESTEAD LEGAL NOTICE

The deadline for filing your 2002 Homestead Exemption is March 29, 2002. If you filed on the same residence last year and no changes have been made it is not necessary to file this year. If there are any changes to be made please come into the office and file a new application. If you became 65 before January 1, 2002 and have not filed for the special exemption, you will need to bring proof of age. If you became disabled before January 1, 2002 you will need to bring your Social Security Awards Letter. If you are filing on a new residence you will need to bring your warranty deed, your and your spouse's social security numbers, and your Mississippi license plate numbers. Your warranty deed must be acknowledged by December 31st, 2001 and recorded by January 1, 2002. The Homestead Exemption Law allows you to file on one residence only. If you are married, your and your spouse's name must both be on the Homestead application. You must be living in the residence January 1st of the year in which you are filing. If you have any questions concerning Homestead Exemption, please call the Tax Assessor's office @ 423-7059. Our office is open Monday through Friday. Our hours are 8:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. Remember the filing deadline is March 29. The LAST day to file Homestead Exemption would be on FRIDAY, MARCH 29th, 2002.

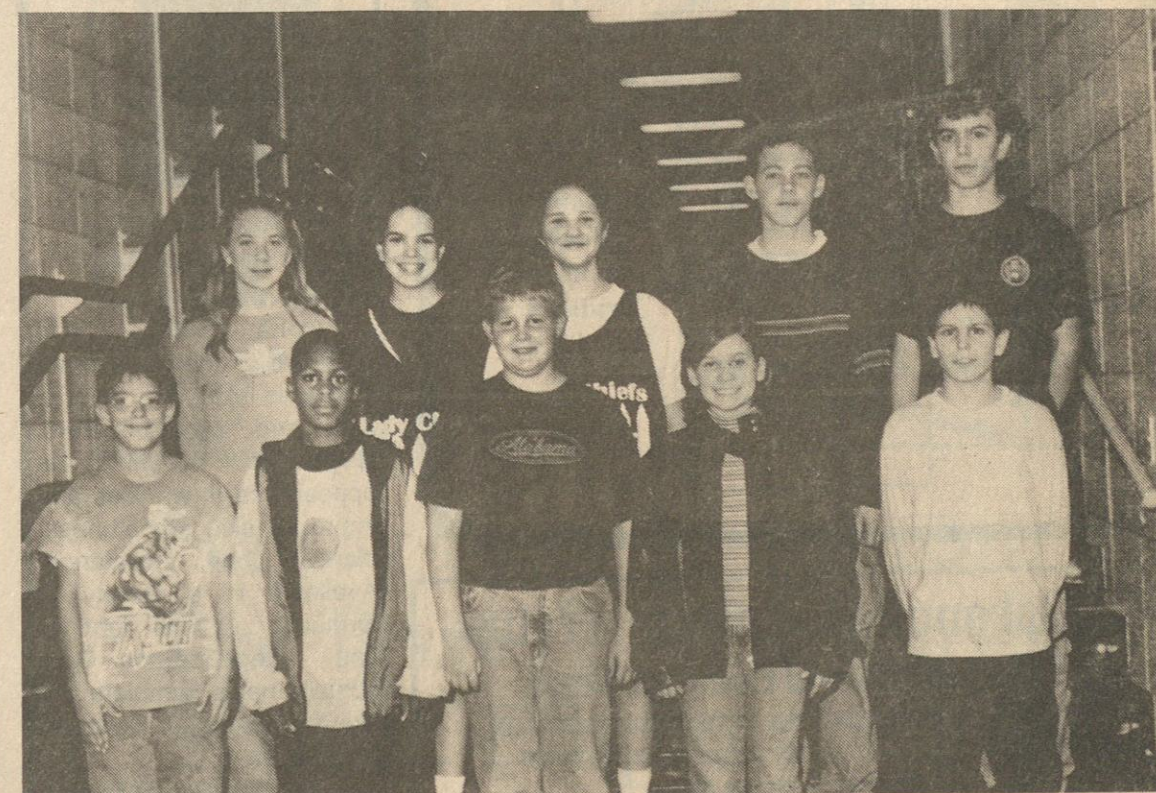
Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society To Meet...

Home Economics Tips

PLAN FOR 2002

Families come from all backgrounds and come in a wonderful variety of shapes, sizes and colors. But the one thing most of us have in common is a fast-paced lifestyle that makes finding family time a challenge. Now is the perfect time to resolve to spend more time, not more money, on the family.

When 1,500 school children were asked, "What do you think makes a happy family?" they most often answered, "Doing things together." The love and support of a family, as well as good nutrition and health care, help make strong, healthy individuals.

Here are some ideas to help keep the family together.

#1 Eat at least one meal a

day with your family.

Turn off the TV and visit with your family. You'll discover some delightful things about each other.

#2 Make time for children - it's fun!

Involve your children in your life, even when you're busy. Have the children help you with household chores. Read aloud. Help children with homework.

#4 Start a tradition of Family Time.

Choose one evening (or afternoon-whatever works for your family) in the week that the whole family reserves for family only. No friends or other outside activities are allowed. Rent fun videos and serve popcorn, play board games, tell stories, etc. It's a fun, special time for the family together.

TRAVELING SAFELY WITH CHILDREN

You've taught your kids not to talk to strange-looking strangers, but what about seemingly trust-worthy strangers? Children, by their very nature are trusting, and sometimes, they just don't know any better. A predator who says the right thing, ("Your mommy is sick and

she wants me to take you to her") is bound to penetrate the wall we build of not talking to strangers.

At 7 or 8, a child is on the "rest room cusp," and while a boy can be taken to the men's room by dad, he is just a bit too old to go with mom into the lady's room. Even now, a five year old is just about at that point. Fortunately, many airports have "Family Restrooms." These are unisex restrooms which many times have an outer room and a toilet area. Generally, they are located near the main restrooms and are easy to find.

If you are in an airport (or anywhere else for that matter) without such facilities where you can be separated from your children, consider a password approach to protect your children. For example, I have older children who grew up during actor and adman Jim Varney's heyday.

Remember, "Golly-gee-bob, Vernon"? that was our password. If anyone wanted to take them somewhere because I had told them to, the kids were to challenge the person with, "What's the password!" If the reply was not, "Golly-gee-bob, Vernon," they were to immediately begin yelling at the top of their lungs. "This man/woman is not my Dad/Mommy!" Thankfully, we never had to use it, but I'll bet they still remember it.

Picking a memorable password is very important. Consider using one of their childhood words, one that's unique and easy to remember. That way when your child asks, "What is the password," they will immediately know if the person is on the up and up. To this day, my five-year-old calls cars, "Bye Sees." Why? Well at 18 months or so, people would get in a car and say, "Bye-Bye, see you!" He shortened the phrase and made the connection that what the people were getting into was a "Bye See," and that's what he still calls cars when he is being silly. I have other words to use and this will not be our password, but I think you can see just how easy it is to pick a password that is know to immediate family only.

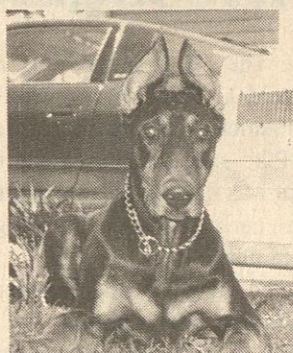

Highway Hypnosis

Staring straight ahead while driving long distances is a sure way to develop "highway hypnosis," a trance-like state in which you may lose your contact with reality and/or the ability to accurately judge the speed at which you're traveling. Here are some suggestions:

Keep your eyes moving, even if you're the only car on the road. Glance to the sides of the highway, check the rearview and sideview mirrors, and adjust your focus to various spots on the highway. Look at the dashboard briefly-then shift back to the long view.

Remember, tired eyes cause drowsiness and you can't beat fatigue forever. Be alert for signs of fatigue.

Do your eyes burn? Are you blinking more? Are lights bothering you? Does your own voice sound different. Are there time lapses you can't account for? Has your speed changed because you are not exerting the same pressure on the gas pedal. If yes is the answer to any of these, it's time to pull over and get some sleep.

Looking After Baby's Teeth

Teeth are one part of a baby's anatomy that many people don't think about for granted. But special people, pediatric dentists, have two good reasons to be concerned with a baby's oral health and dental hygiene.

Optimum oral habits-brushing, flossing, regular dental visits-maintained throughout pregnancy. Why? Hormonal changes during pregnancy may exaggerate gum's response to plaque on the teeth, causing unusually severe gingivitis, inflammation of the gums. Gingivitis is common during the eighth month of pregnancy. It may cause red, puffy, bleeding gums that tend to bleed when the teeth are brushed.

Some pregnant women have two good reasons to avoid dental care during a special time of their life. One reason may be their concern about the risk to the baby from exposure to x-rays.

Most routine dental procedures can be delayed during the second trimester, or second half of pregnancy; routine x-rays should be postponed until after the first trimester.

During the first trimester, emergency cleaning of the teeth and only procedures that are necessary are performed. The baby's teeth are forming during the first trimester and, in the second trimester, the mother's experience discomfort and she may experience undue stress.

BE PREPARED FOR AN ICE STORM

Snow, sleet and freezing temperatures can strike anytime during the winter months. That's why it is best to be prepared in case of an ice storm. Keep the following items together so they'll be at your fingertips if the lights go out.



A battery-operated radio. When outages occur or emergencies arise, local radio stations will keep you informed with timely updates.



Flashlights, extra batteries, large candles, matches. Make sure there's a flashlight on every floor of the house and one for every family member. If you use candles for light, be sure to keep them away from small children and from flammable objects.



Bottled water, non-perishable food items. Keep plenty of bottled water on hand in case of an emergency. (Count on one gallon per person per day.) Remember family members with special needs, such as baby formula.



Emergency numbers. Keep the numbers for emergency personnel, including your electric cooperative, posted near the telephone or another handy place. Before you call to report an outage, make sure you haven't blown a fuse or tripped a circuit. Also look outside to see if your neighbors' lights are off. Be prepared to tell if you heard any unusual sounds or can see downed lines in the neighborhood.



Remember, telephones with answering machines rely on electricity to operate. Use a phone connected directly to the phone jack.

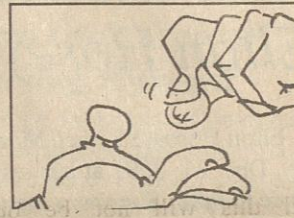


Luka Hospital Wellness Center To Offer "Body for You" Program

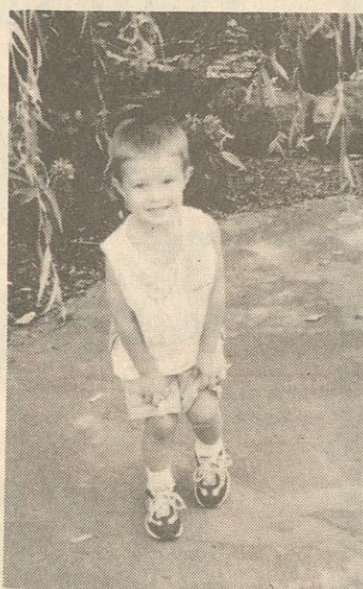

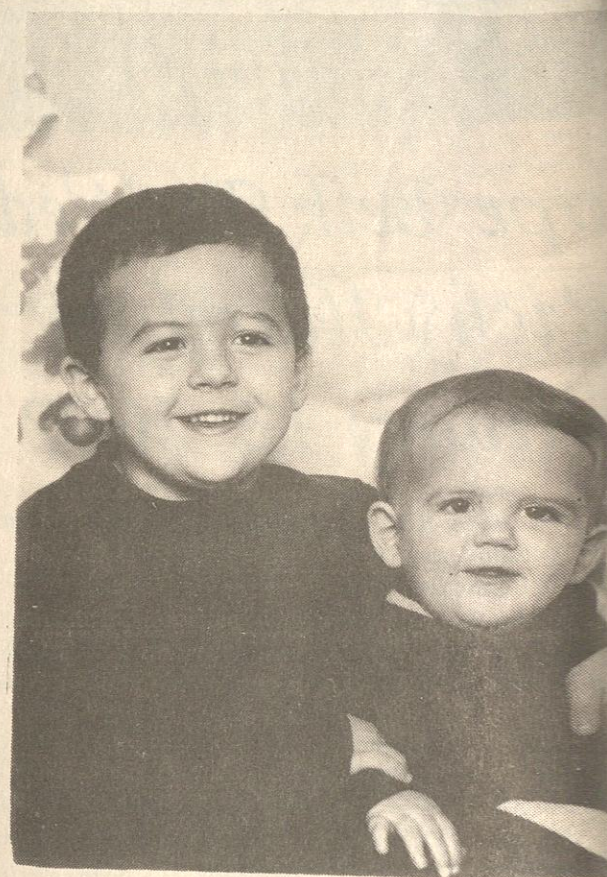

STETHOSCOPES: STILL ONE OF THE MOST VALUABLE DIAGNOSTIC TOOLS AVAILABLE

Although technological advancements have enhanced the way physicians diagnose disease, they still turn to their handy stethoscopes for valuable patient information.

"The stethoscope is one of the key aspects of a family physician's patient examination," says Ann Kenney, M.D., a board-certified family physician with the North Mississippi Medical Center Family Medicine Residency Center who also teaches family medicine residents. "This instrument is really an extension of the physician because we observe with our eyes, examine with our hands and listen with our stethoscopes."

Many varieties of stethoscopes exist, but a simple stethoscope consists of a bell-shaped structure that is placed on a patient's skin and is connected by plastic or rubber tubes to an earpiece for the health care examiner. Stethoscopes are most commonly used to examine a person's heart, lungs or abdomen.

"Learning to use a stethoscope is not easy and takes considerable experience. You have to learn to tune your ear, almost like a musician, to listen for and recognize the normal and abnormal sounds within the body," Dr. Kenney says. "At the NMMC Family Medicine Residency Center,

we have recordings available that our residents can listen to so that they can train their ears to hear these sounds."

When physicians listen to a person's heart, they are listening for the normal heart sounds, the lub-dub. Each lub-dub represents one contraction of the heart, and the noises are made when heart valves close. Abnormal heart sounds, such as heart murmurs, also may be detected.

"If a quiet whoosh is heard after the lub-dub, this indicates a person has a heart murmur, which is an abnormal heart sound that results from the turbulent flow of blood through the heart," Dr. Kenney explains. "Although some heart murmurs are associated with cardiovascular disease, many people have innocent murmurs, which are caused by blood flowing through healthy valves in a healthy heart, and do not require treatment."

Physicians may conduct additional diagnostic tests if a patient exhibits symptoms of heart disease, or if the heart murmur indicates a more serious, underlying condition.

By placing a stethoscope on a person's chest and asking the patient to slowly breathe in and out, physicians can compare sounds heard in different areas of the lungs. Using the stethoscope, physicians listen for the quality and character of a patient's breath sounds, a decrease in the breath sounds or abnormal lung sounds.

"Breath sounds originate in the large airways where air velocity and turbulence induce

vibrations in the airway. These vibrations are transmitted through the tissue and thoracic wall surface where they are heard with a stethoscope."

James Fay, M.D., a certified internal medicine physician and pulmonologist with IMA-Starkville Physical Office, one of more than 100 physician offices affiliated with the North Mississippi Services in Tupelo, says that sounds can be classified into categories, normal (adventitious (abnormal)). listening to normal lung sounds shouldn't hear sounds crackles or wheezes."

Crackles are explosive sounds that are heard when air is entering the lungs and most often suggest a patient has congestive heart failure. High pitched wheezes, or wheezes, occur when air is being forced out of the lungs and are usually heard in patients with obstructive pulmonary disease or asthma.

"Advancements in technology have enhanced the way physicians diagnose disease, but the stethoscope is still a very useful tool in the important part of a physical diagnosis," Dr. Fay says. "Stethoscopes are used by physicians in local problems and determine if further tests are needed to diagnose disease."

Meaning in Hebrew Place of Peace, the small area around a tiny church at Shiloh yielded to this point in the History of the United States one of the most costly and tragic battles ever. The name was ironic, in that the dead at Shiloh amounted to more Americans dead in every war and battle in U.S. history combined to that point.

Union General U.S. Grant's army, loosely assembled and unstrategically positioned, was assaulted by surprise on April 6th, 1862 by Confederate General Albert Sidney Johnston's forces. The following hours were filled with desperate fighting, and the battle field was soon strewn with dead, from both sides.

The final number of dead or missing was 13,000 on the Union side and 10,500 on the Confederate side. There were as many people killed at Shiloh

as there were at Waterloo. The difference between that Napoleonic war and the Civil War is that there weren't twenty more Waterloo's to come.

Shiloh was a decisive battle in the war. The South needed a win to make up for land lost in Kentucky and Ohio. It also needed to save the Mississippi Valley. Memphis and Vicksburg were now vulnerable to Union attack, and after Corinth there is now doubt that those cities would be the next targets.

However, Grant and his men had been rid of their overconfidence by the battle of Shiloh. They now knew that hopes for and easy victory over the south were ill-founded. Grant knew then that this war was going to be, in the words of a Union Soldier, "A very bloody affair."

Shiloh National Military Park was established in 1894 to preserve the scene of the first major battle in the Western theater of the Civil War. The two-day battle, April 6 and 7, 1862, involved about 65,000 Union and 44,000 Confederate troops. This battle resulted in nearly 24,000 killed, wounded, and missing. It proved to be a decisive victory for the federal forces when they advanced on and seized control of the

Confederate railway system at Corinth, Mississippi. The battlefield contains about 4,000 acres and has within its boundaries the Shiloh National Cemetery along with the well preserved prehistoric Indian mounds that are listed as a historic landmark. The park is located in Hardin County, on the west bank of the Tennessee River, and about nine miles south of Savannah, Tennessee.

WICKER BACKS BIOTERRORISM PROTECTION MEASURES

The House of Representatives has overwhelmingly passed legislation to strengthen the nation's public health network and provide new protections against bioterrorism. The measure is designed to help authorities and health care agencies become better prepared for the use of disease-causing organisms as weapons of terror.

The government's paramount responsibility is to protect its citizens, and the events of September 11 have brought that mission into even sharper focus. Congress and the President have acted quickly in response to the terrorist attacks. Measures were approved to prosecute the war on terrorism abroad, give law enforcement agencies more resources, and enhance the safety of our civil aviation system.

This bill represents a bipartisan effort to address another key homeland security issue - the once-feared threat of biological warfare which has now become reality. This wide-ranging measure would improve public health planning to counter this new danger. Tighter controls would be placed on laboratories which possess the 36 most deadly biological agents and toxins. It also adds new safeguards for the nation's food, drug, and drinking water supplies.

The Food and Drug Administration would be given more authority to inspect a greater percentage of imported foods and to develop methods of detecting contaminated foods. No one can predict or if - our country experience another terrorism, but this bioterrorism measure would ensure we are better equipped to meet the challenge should it come.

'Virtual Heart' Test Pinpoints Source Of Irregular Heart Rhythms

Physicians at North Mississippi Medical Center's Heart Institute are the first in Mississippi to use a new computer-generated, 3-D "virtual heart" to find the spot where odd heartbeats originate.

A new state-of-the-art cardiac catheter system allows physicians to more quickly and accurately map electrical current inside the hearts of patients who have irregular heart rhythms, known as arrhythmias. NMMC is one of only five hospitals in the entire Southeast with the new technology.

"Cardiac mapping looks inside a person's heart to map out the way the heart's electrical system works," explained Karl Crossen, M.D., an electrophysiologist with NMMC's Heart Institute. An electrophysiologist is a cardiologist who specializes in the diagnosis and treatment of heart rhythm disorders. "In much the same way that cardiac catheterization looks at the heart's pump and plumbing system, cardiac mapping looks for short-circuits in the heart's electrical system."

The procedure uses a catheter (long, thin, flexible wire) that is inserted into one of the heart's four chambers. The catheter is moved around to record the heart's electrical activity and feed that information into the computer. Without ever touching the walls of the heart, the system simultaneously picks up electrical impulses from more than 3,000 points within the heart chamber. This information is then displayed in a three-dimensional "picture" showing the heart's electrical activity. The process continues in each chamber until the catheter pinpoints the source of the irregular heartbeat.

Before the new technology, physicians mapped a heart chamber point by point - a process that can take hours. "With traditional cardiac mapping, we put in multiple catheters to record the heart's electric system and look for problem areas. It can be a challenge to map an irregular heartbeat that isn't always present, because if the irregular heartbeat occurs infrequently during the study, it's difficult to know from where it's originating," Dr. Crossen said.

The new system allows the physician to move the heart around on the screen in three dimensions and look at it from different sides, from above and below. "This new system is a giant leap forward because it gives us a clear picture of the heart chamber's electrical activity in only a few beats," he said. "With this information, we can identify the exact location of a patient's arrhythmia."

The procedure is usually done on an outpatient basis while the patient is mildly sedated. Surgery is rarely done to treat an arrhythmia. In most cases, physicians perform a procedure immediately after mapping known as radio frequency catheter ablation that destroys abnormal tissue in the heart. Cardiac ablation helps patients whose arrhythmias are not controlled by medication or those with acute episodes of dangerous heart rhythms.

Irregular heart rhythms may go unnoticed or the person may have palpitations, become dizzy or faint. While most arrhythmias are harmless, some can be serious and even cause sudden cardiac death.
