

Hunter Killed Near Midway In Deer Stand Accident

A tragic hunting accident involving a deer stand has claimed the life of 42 year-old Steve Tucker, of the Farmington Community near Corinth.

"freak" accident The occurred Thursday, January 3rd as he deer hunted in Tishomingo County in the Midway Community near his parent's home on Rutledge Salem Road.

He had entered the woods early Thursday morning and when he didn't return in the late afternoon, family members began searching. Young Lloyd Tucker, a nephew, found his uncle at one of their favorite hunting sites around 6:00 Thursday night. According to family members he was found hanging from the tree by the safety strap which was still around his chest. Rescue workers assisted in freeing Steve, but reviving efforts were in vain. Family members and rescuers who were the first on the scene saw no signs that would indicate a struggle during the fall.

According to Tishomingo Coroner, County Wilemon, the bottom of the deer stand Steve was using had apparently fallen down the tree leaving him with nothing to stand on.

Wilemon added that he received a provisional autopsy report on Monday that indicated the cause of death was consistent with asphyxia.

The final ruling as the cause of death will not be made until other tests are completed.

Stephen Lynn Tucker, born March 25, 1959, was a loving husband, father, son and brother. He will long be remembered for his warm generosity to others, his sweet smile, and his devotion to his family and friends. He was blessed with many friends, both young and old, and he was always willing to help those who needed him. "He was a man who loved and was loved by his family and friends, and enjoyed life to the fullest."

An avid sportsman, he enjoyed hunting and fishing with his buddies and traveling with his family.

A member of Ridgecrest Baptist Church, Steve was very active in assisting with the youth groups, served as an usher, and was a member of the church choir.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at Magnolia Funeral Home in Corinth with the Rev. Charles Stephenson officiating. Burial was in the Tishomingo City Cemetery. Survivors include his wife,

Jim Nelson Named Assistant Secretary For Business Regulation and Enforcement


Secretary of State Eric Clark has named Jim Nelson of Madison as Assistant Secretary of State for Business Regulation and Enforcement.

FIGHT BACK ON YOUR ELECTRIC BILL

As electricity becomes more scarce and expensive, you can help yourself, the environment and the economy by taking some simple steps to conserve power.

As is evident in California, utilities can't do much in the short term to add capacity. The best bet is for consumers to reduce consumption, especially at peak

According to surveys of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), lighting accounts for 20 to 25 percent of all electricity sold in the United

It is recommended that you install energy-efficient lighting devices. This can have a big impact by significantly reducing electric consumption.

Here are four tips that can take the effort out of saving dollars on your electric bill.

1. Install dimmer switches. By dimming the lights in a room you use less electricity. For example, a light bulb at 50 brightness approximately 40 percent less electricity. A dimmer switch also extends the life of your bulbs. A bulb at 50 percent brightness will last approximately 20 times longer.

Install occupancy sensors. An occupancy sensor automatically turns lights on when someone enters a room, and then turns them off after the person leaves the area. They're ideal for closets, hallways, the

laundry room and garages - all the where lights may needlessly be left on for hours, or even days. Wall-switch models are designed to replace standard wall switches, so they're easy to

3. Install motion detectors outside. Many homeowners know that good outdoor lighting makes their home less appealing to a burglar. But keeping outdoor floodlights on all night can be expensive. Instead, install a motion detector to control your outdoor security lights. Motion detectors are programmed to react to body heat. When they detect the presence of a person, they automatically turn on the outside lights. They also turn the lights off when they no longer detect the presence of body heat.

4. Install digital timers. If anyone in your family has left a bathroom exhaust fan or a heat lamp on all day, you'll appreciate the evidence of timers - and the fact that they can reduce energy consumption. The latest digital timers are installed right in the wall, wherever you would put a standard wall switch. Many versions come from the factory with preset time intervals, and others offer programmable time settings. To use a timer with a preset interval, simply push the button for the length of time you want the fan or lamp to be on. The timer will turn it off automatically. You can use digital timers with longer time intervals to control your outdoor landscape lighting.

So, instead of telling your

family to turn off the lights when they leave a room, which seldom produces the desired results, consider installing one or more of these new electrical devices. They take the effort out of saving electricity and they'll pay for themselves quickly with the amount of electricity they save.

Which Is Better For Your Teeth: Waxed Or Unwaxed Dental Floss?

There's no significant difference between the two. If you have had extensive dental work, however, it may be easier to use a waxed floss between the teeth.

Dental researchers have investigated whether waxed floss leaves a residue on teeth. Repeated testing has indicated that this is not a problem.

Waxed or not, properly used dental floss promotes oral health by removing plaque and food particles from between the teeth and under the gumline.

Nonetheless, flossing is a skill that must be learned When you visit our office, we can review the process for you. Here are some tips for better

If you do not have good finger dexterity, you may find it helpful to use a commercial floss holder. Ask us for advice on what type to use.

Children may find it easier to use a loop of floss. To do this, take a piece of floss about 10 inches long and tie the ends together into a circle. Then hold the floss lightly between the thumbs and forefingers and proceed. Most children cannot floss their own teeth until about age 10, and even then flossing should be done under parental supervision.

When flossing, think of your mouth as having four sections. Floss half of the upper teeth, then the other half. Do the same for your lower teeth. Establish a regular pattern and time for flossing, so that you don't miss any of

Remember to be gentle when inserting the floss between your teeth and under the gumline.

To prevent careless breeding, the best solution is to have your dog spayed or neutered between the ages of six months and one year. Contrary to popular belief, the operation will not make your dog fat and lazy. Exercise and the proper amount of food can control their weight. It will also not change the basic personality of your pet. What it will do is keep your male from roaming and getting into fights and your female from attracting all sorts of suitors and winding up pregnant.

On the other hand, if you do wish to breed your dog, you should be prepared to keep a family of puppies eight weeks or more and be sure that you can find a good home for each and every one.

BE PREPARED FOR AN ICE STORM

Snow, sleet and freezing temperatures can strike anytime un during the winter months. That's why it is best to be prepared in case of an ice storm. Keep the following items together so they'll be at your fingertips if the lights go out



A battery-operated radio. When outages occur or emergencies arise, local radio stations will keep you informed with timely updates.



Flashlights, extra batteries, large candles, matches. Make sure there's a flashlight on every floor of the house and one for every family member. If you use candles for light, be sure to keep them away from small children and from flammable objects.



Bottled water, non-perishable food items. Keep plenty of bottled water on hand in case of an emergency. (Count on one gallon per person per day.) Remember family members with special needs, such as baby formula.



Emergency numbers. Keep the numbers for emergency personnel, including your electric cooperative, posted near the telephone or another handy place. Before you call to report an outage, make sure you haven't blown sa a fuse or tripped a circuit. Also look outside to see if your neighbors' lights are off. Be prepared to tell if you heard any unusual sounds or can see downed lines in the neighborhood.



Remember, telephones with answering machines rely on electricity to operate. Use a phone connected directly to the phone jack.

Mrs. Cindy Phillips, State Regent, presented a very interesting program on her goals for Mississippi Chapters and the many challenges facing our state and nation.



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


"We appreciate every person that comes out, every group that shares their talent or time with the residents," Trussell said. "One person can make a difference." Lots of Laughs

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY INCENTIVES PROGRAM

Applications for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) are being taken in the USDA Service Center's Farm Service Agency and Natural Resources Conservation Service offices for FY 2001 funding until February 8, 2002.

EQIP was established in the 1996 Farm Bill to provide a voluntary conservation program for farmers and ranch-sources. In Tishomingo County, producers may apply for technical and financial assistance to solve natural resource problems in any of the following categories of Statewide Concerns: Grazing Lands, Water Quality-Sedimentation, Quality-Animal Waste, Water Quantity, and Conservation for Limited Resources Farmers.

Some of the practices eligible for cost-share assistance under the Statewide Concerns include: Improving or Establishing Permanent Vegetation on pastures and critical acres, Planned Grazing Systems, Pest Management, Ponds, Sediment Basins, Grade Stabilization Structures (Pipes/Weirs), Well Decommissioning, Filter Strips, Buffers, Grass Waterways, Animal Waste Management Systems, and Tree Establishment (Limited

Resource Farmers only). A NRCS conservationist will conduct a field visit for all eligible applicants. The Conservationist will visit with you on your land to evaluate the conservation needs, determine approximate costs of treatment and determine an offer index. You may be offered several alternatives of which you must choose one. This offer index will be used to rank and select applications for EQIP contracts at the state level for which funds are very limited. Applicants with the lowest offer index will be funded.

FORESTRY INCENTIVES PROGRAM

Landowners seeking USDA assistance to establish trees may apply at the NRCS office for the Forestry Incentive Program (FIP). Applications for this year will be accepted through March 1, 2002. Applications for open field tree planting receive highest priority under. FIP. Cost-share is approximately 50% of tree establishment and post herbaceous release (if recommended by the Mississippi Forestry Commission). In past years, cost-share has been limited to 40 acres per tract, due to low program funding. Cost share funding is for 2002-2003 planting

CONSERVATION RESERVE **PROGRAM**

Producers interested in enrolling eligible land into the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) Continuous Sign-Up should apply at the Farm Service Agency office in Corinth. Eligible cropland may be enrolled in grass or riparian forest buffers (along streams). Contracts can be signed for 10 or 15 years. Fields eligible

must be adjacent to streams, creeks and rivers. The riparian forest buffers range in width from 35-180' and filter strips range in width of 20'-120' wide. Eligible acreage is determined by NRCS and FSA. Eligible marginal pastureland may be enrolled in the riparian forest buffer practice only.

Buffer practices carry an attractive financial incentive package that pays a signing bonus of up to \$150.00 per acre. This is in addition to a 20% added incentive to the annual soil rental rate that is paid for the length of the contract. A financial incentive has also been added to the regular 50% cost-share payment for establishing permanent cover.

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

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Latest MSU Student Team Participants In Sea-Worthy Research

Eight Mississippi State recently students classrooms and campus residence halls for the decks and bunks of a research ship sailing the Gulf of

The wildlife and fisheries majors were part of a weeklong collaborative project between the university and the National Marine Fisheries Service. Aboard the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration research vessel Gordon Gunter, they conducted trawl surveys off the Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana coasts to determine the status of marine resources fisheries environments.

The 2001 MSU team included William Cupit of Rosepine, La.; Ben Davis of Belmont; Rohasliney Hashim of Penang, Malaysia; Randall Kidwell of Crossville, Jason Olive of Florence, Ala.; Sara Palmisano of Pearl; Sam Shephard of Galway, Ireland; and Matt Thomas of Colorado Springs, Colo.

Davis, Olive and Palmisano are seniors; the others are pursuing master's degrees.

"The students gained experience in sampling techniques, fish handling and identification, and collection of environmental data, among other topics," said Donald Jackson, the department of wildlife and fisheries professor who directs the program. "They also became oriented to the disciplines of living and working at sea on a research vessel."

The fall semester experience marked the fourth consecutive year such hands-on training has been offered by the College of Forest Resources as a component of Jackson's fisheries science course. Prior to sailing, participants must complete water safety and survival swimming training, also conducted by Jackson.

Additional Retail Jobs Drop State Unemployment Rate

The addition of retail jobs helped drop the state's unemployment rate in November to 5.2 percent, the Mississippi **Employment Security Commission** (MESC) announced Friday.

Some 3,100 jobs were added to the Mississippi economy in the retail trade segment during November, according to Curt Thompson, Executive Director of MESC. "Those jobs were added for the holiday buying season which appears to be stronger in Mississippi than on a national

The November rate of 5.2 percent was down from 5.3 percent The national in October. unemployment rate in November was 5.3 percent.

Thompson said most counties saw their rates decrease, except in some agricultural areas where rates went up as harvest activities came to a close. Issaquena County had the state's highest rate at 15.3 percent while Lafayette County had the state's lowest rate at 1.9

Thirty-three counties had unemployment rates at or less than the 5.2 percent state rate, while twelve counties had rates above 10 percent. Layoffs in some counties caused rates to increase. Due to confidentiality requirements,

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

CONSERVATION CORNER

Antlers, Not Horns

In many deer camps throughout Mississippi, it is not uncommon to hear someone refer to a whitetail buck's headgear as "horns'. In reality those "horns" are actually antlers. In fact, I even had to correct my father when he was defining a "rub" to my nephew, Parker, this past Thanksgiving. There is a difference.

Horns are made of a bony core covered by thin layers of keratin. Horns are slow growing and permanent and are usually grown by both sexes. Horns grow in yearly rings which may be an age indicator.

Antlers, on the other hand, are made of fast growing bone and are shed every year (except in rare cases). Antlers are usually grown by males and are branched instead of singular like a cow horn.

White-tailed bucks in Mississippi grow their first set of antlers during the first 1 1/2 years of their life and generally that first set of antlers are spikes. Young deer are growing rapidly during this time and most of their nutritional intake is used in muscle and bone development. In cases where young deer have excellent sources of nutrition, it is not uncommon for a 1 1/2 year old deer to have six or maybe even eight points.

A whitetail buck's antlers begin to grow around June. During this growing period the antlers are covered in a soft skin which is called "velvet". The velvet is made up of blood vessels which supple calcium, phosphorus, and protein to the growing antlers. By October the antlers are

completely formed and are no longer growing. When this occurs the blood vessels begin to dry up and the velvet detaches from the antlers.

Bucks speed up this process by rubbing their antlers on trees. This rubbing process also helps to polish the antlers and strengthen the bucks neck muscles which will be important during the rut.

A whitetail buck's antlers generally increase in size with each year of his life, dependant on availability of food and nutritional intake. After about 4 and 1/2 years, a bucks body will stop growing and almost all nutritional resources will go into antler development. If a whitetail buck is allowed to mature to this age, this is when he can really grow some impressive antlers. Whitetail bucks in the wild will generally peak out around their 5 1/2 or 6 1/2 year and from then on antler growth usually diminishes.

Around late February a buck will shed his antlers due to a change in hormone levels following the end of the rut. But these shed antlers do not go to waste. The shed antlers provide a rich source of nutrients (calcium and phosphorous) to small mammals such as squirrels, chipmunks, and other
