According to TRIAD Coordinator Walter Vaughn, there will be a variety of information for those in attendance which will help them be more informed consumers and avoid scams

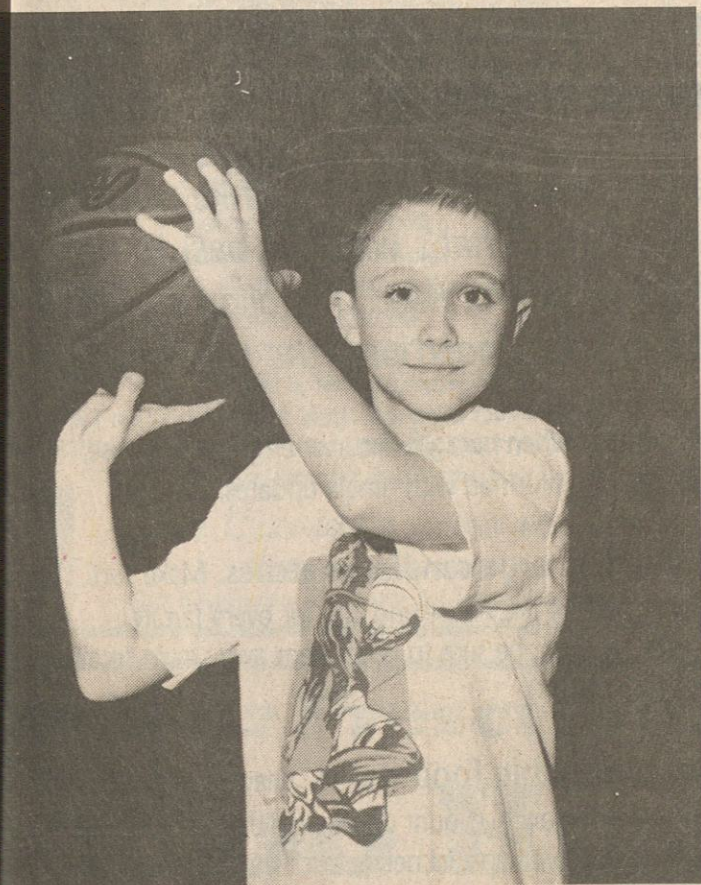

Seventeen Plead Guilty in January Term of Circuit Court Keifer Confesses to Six-Year-Old Murder

Six years ago a Tishomingo County man was shot and later died from his wounds.

The shooting went unreported until the victim, Billy Wayne Hopkins, was admitted to Northeast Mississippi Medical Center approximately a week after he had been shot. Initially, it was thought that Hopkins had one bullet in the neck. His condition continued to worsen and at his death several days later, further testing had revealed that Hopkins had a second bullet wound to his chest.

Before his death, Hopkins declined to give a statement to the Lee County Sheriff's Department so authorities had to begin their investigation with little knowledge concerning the situation.

Now, after six years, another former Tishomingo County resident has come forward and confessed to the crime.

According to Assistant District Attorney Jim Pounds, James R. Keifer, who had been serving time in California on an unrelated charge, confessed to the killing of Billy Wayne Hopkins. Pounds said, "The defendant stated he (Keifer) had found the Lord and wanted to come clean."

Pounds further stated that James R. Keifer, 33, formerly of Tishomingo County, pleaded guilty to manslaughter. He has been sentenced to 20 years in prison with 10 years suspended and 5 years of post-release supervision for the 1995 shooting death of Billy Wayne Hopkins. Keifer was also ordered to pay court costs, a \$2,500 fine, and \$6,000 in restitution to the victim's family.

In other court proceedings the following pled guilty during the January term of Circuit Court according to Arch Bullard of the District Attorney's office:

Jeffery Bonds, DOB 3-11-64, was charged with felony possession of a firearm and

DUI, 3rd offense. In the first charge, he was sentenced to 3 years; in the second charge, he was sentenced to 5 years with 2 suspended and 3 to serve. He was also ordered to pay a \$2,000 fine and court costs.

Anthony Branham, DOB 12-11-77, and Wesley Andrew Jones, DOB 7-30-82, both pled guilty to burglary of a vehicle. Both were sentenced to 7 years and placed in the RID (Regimented Inmate Discipline) program. Both received a \$1,000 fine plus court costs.

Nickey Dwayne Thompson, DOB 5-16-64, pled guilty to 3 charges—2 for aggravated assault and 1 for DUI, 3rd Offense. He was sentenced to 5 years and ordered to pay a \$2,000 fine for the DUI offense. On the two counts of aggravated assault, he was sentenced to 20 years with 6 suspended and 14 to serve. He was fined over \$7,000 and was ordered to pay restitution of over \$6,500 and court costs.

William Keeton, DOB 1-10-42, and Christopher Randy Keller, DOB 6-25-79, pled guilty to DUI, 3rd Offense. They both were sentenced to 5 years and placed in the ISP (Intensive Supervision Program) or House Arrest program. They were also ordered to pay court costs, and \$2,000 fines. They also received 4 years of post release supervision.

Gordon Dwayne Williams, DOB 9-14-58, pled guilty to 2 charges of DUI, 3rd Offense. In the first DUI charge, he was sentenced to 5 years with 4 suspended and 1 to serve. He was also placed on 4 years of Post Release Supervision. In the second DUI, he received 5 years, suspended, to run concurrent with the other charge. He also was ordered to pay a \$2,000 fine plus court costs.

Rufus Henry Jackson, DOB 11-1-62, pled guilty to uttering a forged instrument on 2 different causes. He was sentenced

to 8 years with the Mississippi Department of Corrections. Eight years were suspended with 5 years of post probation. He received a \$500 fine, ordered to pay court costs, and was ordered to pay \$200 restitution to the victims.

James Ricky Moss, DOB 10-31-55, pled guilty to obtaining a controlled substance by fraud. He was sentenced to 5 years and was given credit for time already served. The balance of the term was suspended, and he was placed on 4 years of Post Release Supervision. He was ordered to pay court costs.

Jeffie Foreman pled guilty to the sale of hydrocodone, oxycotin, and morphine. She was sentenced to 10 years in the Mississippi Department of Corrections; all were suspended. She was placed on 5 years probation. She was ordered to pay \$445 in restitution to the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, a \$1,000 fine, and court costs.

Eric Wiggington, DOB 1-28-80 pled guilty to possession of oxycotin. He was sentenced to 5 years, which were suspended. He was placed on probation and ordered to pay \$180 to the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, and \$125 to State Crime Lab, a \$1,000 fine, and court costs.

Phillip Harris, charged with 5 counts, pled guilty to 2 counts of simple assault on a police officer. He received 5 years, which were suspended. He was placed on 4 years of supervised probation. On the second count, he received 5 years running concurrent with the first sentence with the sentence to be suspended pending no further charges. The other counts were retired.

The other defendants pleading guilty to first-offense charges and/or non-violent crimes will have their names adjudicated if they satisfactorily meet all terms of their sentences.

Eighteen Lights at Iuka Airport Vandalized

Early last week someone maliciously destroyed property at the Iuka Airport. It appeared that someone in a truck had driven up and down and across the runway, clipping as many as 18 of the expensive lights off even with the ground.

Besides the expense of hav-

ing to replace the lights, actions such as this could result in the loss of someone's life. The lack of the lights after dark could cause a plane to crash. These lights are also used by other pilots as ground markings to aid in their navigation.

Airport laws are enforced by

the Federal Aviation Authorities, and laws governing these agencies are very strict. Breaking these laws can result in serious punishment.

Anyone having information about the destruction at the Iuka Airport is asked to call the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Should I Let My Cat Or Dog Have A Litter Before Having Her Spayed?

There are no medical or psychological advantages to allowing your female pet to have a litter before she is spayed. There are, however, several reasons not to wait.

Breeding your pet and allowing it to become pregnant puts that animal through all the medical risks of pregnancy. While most healthy pets come through a pregnancy in good condition, there is still the risk of complications, uterine infections (which can be fatal), damage to the reproductive system during delivery, and more. Just as the human pregnancy has its risks, so does pregnancy in cats and dogs.

Both cats and dogs may come into heat within their first year of life - but they are not fully grown at this age. Pregnancy in a young animal that has not reached her full size and maturity is even more risky than pregnancy in an adult animal. You would be, in a sense, allowing a young teenager to become pregnant. In addition, young animals may lack the maternal instinct to care for the litter, both during and after pregnancy. The myth that all female animals are natural mothers is, unfortunately, just that: a myth.

Your pet runs a much smaller risk if she is spayed before she ever goes into heat. Spaying a female dog before her first heat also drastically reduces her chances of developing mammary cancer.

Is Autoclaving The Only Way To Sterilize Dental Equipment?

No. Dental offices use various methods to sterilize and disinfect. All dental instruments are cleaned and then sterilized after each patient's visit by methods that kill the AIDS virus and other microscopic organisms capable of causing disease.

Common acceptable sterilization methods include an autoclave that uses steam under pressure, dry heat in an oven-like environment and chemical vapor sterilization.

Disinfection procedures are used on surfaces and equipment that cannot be removed for cleaning and sterilization, such as counter tops, drawer handles, X-ray unit heads and light handles. Disinfection is done in the treatment room between patients to assure that the room is clean for each patient.

Should You Switch Contacts?

If you've been wearing glasses, should you switch to contact lenses?

BE PREPARED FOR AN ICE STORM

Snow, sleet and freezing temperatures can strike anytime during the winter months. That's why it is best to be prepared in case of an ice storm. Keep the following items together so they'll be at your fingertips if the lights go out.

- A battery-operated radio. When outages occur or emergencies arise, local radio stations will keep you informed with timely updates.
- Flashlights, extra batteries, large candles, matches. Make sure there's a flashlight on every floor of the house and one for every family member. If you use candles for light, be sure to keep them away from small children and from flammable objects.
- Bottled water, non-perishable food items. Keep plenty of bottled water on hand in case of an emergency. (Count on one gallon per person per day.) Remember family members with special needs, such as baby formula.
- Emergency numbers. Keep the numbers for emergency personnel, including your electric cooperative, posted near the telephone or another handy place. Before you call to report an outage, make sure you haven't blown a fuse or tripped a circuit. Also look outside to see if your neighbors' lights are off. Be prepared to tell if you heard any unusual sounds or can see downed lines in the neighborhood.
- Remember, telephones with answering machines rely on electricity to operate. Use a phone connected directly to the phone jack.

Listed below: A few (Quotes) from Dr. King's most touching and memorable speech.

"I Have A Dream"

I am not unmindful that some of you have come here out of great trials and tribulations. Some of you have come fresh from narrow cells. Some of you have come from areas where your quest for freedom left you battered by the storms of persecutions and staggered by the winds of police brutality. You have been the veterans of creative suffering. Continue to work with the faith that unearned suffering is redemptive.

Go back to Mississippi, go back to Alabama, go back to Georgia, go back to Louisiana, go back to the slums and ghettos of our northern cities, knowing that somehow this situation can and will be changed. Let us not wallow in the valley of despair.

I say to you today, my friends, that in spite of the difficulties and frustrations of the moment, I still have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream.

I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of this creed: "We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal."

I have a dream that one day on the red hills of Georgia the sons of former slaves and the sons of former slaveowners will be able to sit down together at a table of brotherhood.

I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a desert state, sweltering with the heat of injustice and oppression,

will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice.

I have a dream that my four children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

I have a dream today.

I have a dream that one day the state of Alabama, whose governor's lips are presently dripping with the words of interposition and nullification, will be transformed into a situation where little black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls and walk together as sisters and brothers.

I have a dream today.

I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places will be made plain, and the crooked places will be made straight, and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together.

This is our hope. This is the faith with which I return to the South. With this faith we will be able to hew out of the mountain of despair a stone of hope. With this faith we will be able to transform the jangling discords of our nation into a beautiful symphony of brotherhood. With this faith we will be able to work together, to pray together, to struggle together, to go to jail together, to stand up for freedom together, knowing that we will be free one day.

This will be the day when all of God's children will be able to sing with a new meaning, "My country, 'tis of thee, sweet land of liberty, of thee I sing. Land where my fathers died, land of the pilgrim's pride, from every mountainside, let freedom ring."

And if America is a great nation this must be. So let freedom ring from the prodigious hilltops of California. Let freedom ring from the mighty mountains of New York. Let freedom ring from the heightening Alleghenies of Pennsylvania!

Let freedom ring from the snowcapped Rockies of Colorado. Let freedom ring from the curvaceous peaks of California.

But not only that; let freedom ring from Stone Mountain of Georgia!

Let freedom ring from the Lookout Mountain of Tennessee. Let freedom ring from every hill and every molehill of Mississippi. From mountainside, let freedom ring.

When we let freedom ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day of God's children, black and white men, Jews and Protestants and Catholics, able to join hands and sing words of the old Negro spiritual: "Free at last! Free at last! God Almighty, we are free!"

"I have the audacity to believe that people everywhere are three meals a day for the bodies, education and culture for the spirits. I believe that self-centered men have torn the world apart along the lines of the old Negro spiritual: 'Free at last! Free at last! God Almighty, we are free!' I believe that one day we will bow before the altar of peace and be crowned triumphant over war and bloodshed, and violent redemptive goodness will proclaim the rule of the lion and the lamb and down together and every man sit under his own vine and and none shall be afraid to believe that we shall over-

Home Economics Tips

SIX COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT OLDER HOME ELECTRICAL WIRING

Unlike fine wine, house wiring and outlets and switches don't get better with age. In fact, the older the wiring, the more chances there are for potentially serious electrical hazards. Wires were broken or brittle insulation and outlets worn out from years of use are frequently cited as the cause of house fires.

If your home was built more than 60 years ago, it is recommended that you call a licensed electrical contractor to inspect your home's wiring and wiring devices. This inspection is particularly important if you've added appliances that use a lot of electricity, such as clothes dryer, air conditioner, space heater or dishwasher.

Here are the most frequently asked questions homeowners have about older house wiring:

1. What are the signs of potential electrical hazards in the home?

Some things to look for: Room lights dim when the refrigerator or air conditioner kicks on; the television screen shrinks; circuit breakers frequently trip or fuses frequently blow; outlets or dimmer switches seem hot to the touch. These conditions indicate that the electrical wiring in your house is overloaded.

2. Is the old-fashioned fuse box a hazard?

The short answer is no, because fuses provide the same protection against overloaded wiring as circuit breakers. However, when fuse boxes were in widespread use, most homes

had only 30 or 60-ampere service.

Today's homes need at least 150 to 200 ampere service to safely supply power for major appliances. If you have a fuse box and you've added any large appliances over the years, it is recommended that you have an electrical contractor inspect your home wiring to make sure it's still safe.

3. How can I tell when an electrical outlet isn't safe?

There are three indicators of an unsafe outlet. If an outlet can no longer hold a plug snugly; if any parts of the outlet are broken; or if the outlet feels hot to the touch. If any of these conditions exist, the outlet should be replaced.

4. Can I add more outlets in the kitchen?

Most likely, yes. And don't forget to install GFCI outlets in the kitchen. You should also check your homeowner's insurance policy and local laws, since you may be required to have a licensed electrician do this type of work rather than a handyman.

5. How long does electrical wiring last?

That's a hard question to answer, since it depends on the type of use and abuse the system has experienced over the years. If you have any doubts about your wiring, or notice some frayed or broken insulation, have a complete inspection of your home's electrical wiring.

6. How long do outlets and switches last?

It depends on use. Electricians will tell you they see outlets more than 50 years old that still work fine, and others that are worn out after only a few years.

GED Testing/Adult Education Classes Resume

The high school equivalency (GED) testing will resume in February at the Tishomingo County Vocational Center. The tests will be given each month on the 3rd Thursday of the month. Applicants desiring to take the test must be residents of Mississippi for 30 days, be 18 years of age, not enrolled in high school, and be out of school for at least 3 months. Seventeen year-olds may be permitted to take the test if they meet certain criteria.

There have been recent changes in the test, which will require applicants to participate in a pre-registration/orientation session at the center. These sessions will be held on Monday and Thursday nights at 6:00 and will be in conjunction with the Adult Education classes that meet at this time.

The new version of the test has five sections: Social Studies,

Science, Mathematics, Language Arts Reading and Language Arts Writing. Calculators will be allowed on part of the new math test. An average of 450 on each of the five tests and a minimum score of 410 on each of the five tests are necessary to receive the GED certificate. Fees for testing are \$40 for initial testing on all tests and \$12 per test for the retest.

Individuals who seek help in preparing for the test may enroll in the Adult Basic Education (ABE) classes offered free of charge at the vocational center. These classes meet on Monday and Thursday nights at 6:00. These classes offer individuals a good opportunity to improve their academic skills before actually taking the GED test.

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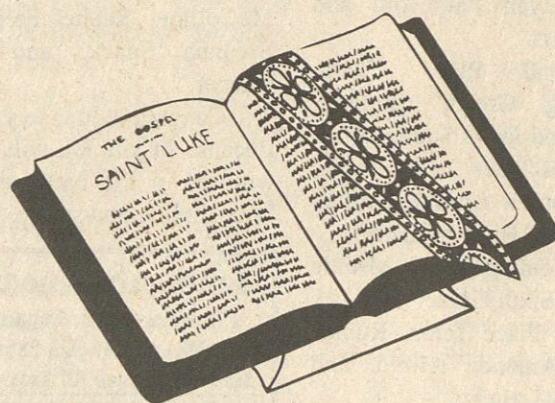

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

Health Rocks For Kids Or How To Reach Youth Before It's Too Late

Health Rocks! is a multi-year effort to develop, implement and evaluate a nationwide approach to help youth, ages 8-12, develop life skills, with a special emphasis on youth smoking prevention. The program curriculum is designed to engage youth and adults as partners in developing and implementing community strategies to prepare young people to make healthy lifestyle choices. Health Rocks! will help youth develop positive life skills and understand the issues and effects of tobacco use and other risky behaviors.

The Health Rocks! program is a nonformal education tool to help youth tackle the challenges of tobacco and drug use. Youth need strong decision-making skills to process their options, consequences, and actions related to the usage of tobacco, alcohol, and drugs. The program's approach is to ensure that youth and communities work together. Communities have an important role to play in keeping youth tobacco and drug free. They can nurture and build a protective environment and help kids learn critical life and decision-making skills that will help them grow into healthy adults.

Action Health Rocks! uses experientially based activities, with participants learning how to:

- Understand tobacco and drug use
- Take control of their choices
- Make decisions based on solid information
- Build enduring youth/adult partnerships to address healthy lifestyle choices

The course will be held at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech building every 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month, starting February 14th. The program will last until the end of June. Letters From Texas

The following two letters from Texas were taken from old Videttes that are on microfilm at the Iuka Library: Dawson, Texas July 7, 1910

I will give the readers of the Vidette a sketch of my 7 days travel over Texas. I left Dawson on Friday the 17th inst (traveling in a buggy) reached Malone that night. Next day was trades day at that place and of course I took that in. There was quite a large crowd in attendance. The most excitable feature of the day was a sham battle between the Indians and cowboys. The first scene in the play was an old one horse cart coming across the prairie with a crowd of women and children following. They stopped and stretched their tent; then we could see at a distance on the prairie a band of Indians coming in full speed. We could hear their war whoops as they dashed right into their camps, the children scattering and screaming to the top of their voices. The Indians were shooting and the children falling dead the Indians would scalp some of them and some of them they would carry off alive. Finally they set fire to their tents. At this time we could see the Cowboys coming at a distance but they were not long in getting there. I was in the Civil War but I never saw what appeared to be as bloody a battle as this. Now this was just the beginning of their play; it continued nearly all evening and was all home talent.

While there I stopped with W.J. Rockette, the depot agent at that place and a son-in-law of the writer. Next morning, I traveled a distance of about 15 miles and reached my friend L.O. Clinkscales who is holding down the Hammel Branch Depot some 12 miles north of Hillsboro, after quite a pleasant stay with him until the next morning I continued my journey and at 10 o'clock I reached Pluto. This town is in Ellis county. There I took dinner with Rube Clinkscales. In the evening in company with Rube I drove over the country to the home of Tom and Millard Blissit but neither of them was at home. They had gone to Iaasca for cotton choppers. Millard's two boys

and a hired negro were running 3 cultivators in front of the house. All were riding and sometimes their mules were in a trot. One of the boys told me they had 160 acres in cotton.

That night I stopped with our good old friend, Dr. W.A. Tankersley. That was certainly a feast to me. That evening I bid adieu to Pluto and, wending my way to Lovelace, this is

back in Hill county, there I put up with Mr. Walter Lovelace, son of E.W. Lovelace formerly of Tishomingo county. At this place I met Clark Burton and family. It is to be remembered that his wife was formerly Miss Lucy Venson, many of you old Vidette readers remember her. There I met her sister, Mollie Lovelace, also Rev. Taylor Hubbard and Pinkney Hanks. Many of you remember him as of small stature, now he weighs 180 lbs; he is quite fleshy. From Lovelace I went to Woodbury, accompanied by Mrs. Mollie Lovelace, spent the night with Mrs. Carmichael and family. She is a sister to Jim Lovelace, many of you remember him. From there we went to Hillsboro where I had a picnic shaking hands with old time friends. I will not attempt to mention all of their names but must say that I met Doogah, the most of you know that Doogah is a Vidette correspondent. I told him I was not going to expose him in the Vidette but if you want to know his real name just reverse his name and you have it. After the day was spent in Hillsboro we went back to Lovelace and spent the night. Next morning went to John Watson's and took dinner with him and then went to Cam Harvey's and spent quite a pleasant night with him but got precious little sleep. The next day was Saturday and I had been away from home over a week and my shirt was dirty and I began to study about my wife and I wanted to see her and then I thought about having plenty of good ripe watermelons at home so the temptation was so great that I bid adieu to Hill County and pulled out for Dawson in Navarro county, a distance of about 30 miles. I telephoned my wife I was coming. I got in about 5 that evening. My wife took out the refrigerator a long

white melon. I rather over did the thing and it made me sick so I haven't eaten any more melon since.

Now in conclusion will say that every name given in this letter is an ex-Tishomingoan.

Health very good. We have a good crop prospect in this county, the best in several years at this time.

Feed crops are ready to "lay by;" that is corn and maize. We have not planted our late cane yet, but will plant when we get another rain. Early cotton has begun fruiting - we see some forms in ours. We have 25 acres in cotton and have it about all cropped out. My son, Ellison Bonds, has 43 acres. He and I are cultivating the most of the farm. Mr. E.D.

Glenn has a hired hand and he, his hand and the children are working his entire farm. Mr. Will Glenn lost a valuable horse Monday morning from spasmodic colic. He had driven to church and back. Soon after his return, the horse was taken sick; thought it caused by eating green oats.

Farmers are very busy chopping cotton. We had several days of hot winds that hurt corn some. We had a good rain the 18th of last month but are beginning to need rain now as we have had so much. It has rained all around us, our time will come next, we hope. It is looking a little like rain this evening.

One year ago last Monday, wife and I left Stamford for Memphis. From there we went to Iuka, reaching there July 7th. We were speaking of the trip a few days ago and she wished we could go again, but we are trying to cultivate 50 acres of land and can't go this year, but hope to make another trip back there if the Good Lord wills.

The Tobacco Intervention & Prevention Program of Tishomingo County, a part of The Partnership For A Healthy Mississippi, recently completed its fourth annual "Gift of Life" essay contest. In their essays middle school students expressed their heartfelt desire for members of their families and community to stop using tobacco. According to the 2000 Mississippi youth Tobacco Survey conducted by the University of Southern Mississippi, current cigarette use by public middle school students showed a minor decline to 18.1% from the 23.0% in the 1999 survey. With peer pressure being one of the top reasons for teens to begin using tobacco, this puts them at a higher risk to take up the habit. Tobacco companies continue to spend billions on advertising, targeting our youth, as evidenced by a significant increase from 1999 in the number of youth who bought or received anything with a tobacco company name or picture on it.

Environmental tobacco smoke, also known as second-hand smoke, continues to be the third leading cause of preventable death and disability among non-smokers. The focus this school year of The Partnership For A Healthy Mississippi will be on clean indoor air for our children. 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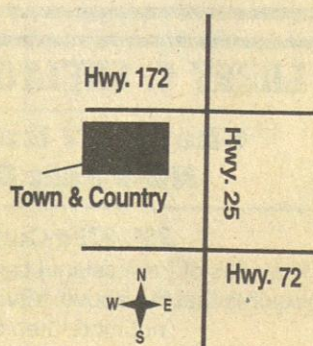
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
