Downtown Iuka Gets a Face Lift As Spring Arrives

People were as busy as in downtown Iuka when the beautiful Spring brought out the work-

to begin putting up a new facade on the front of the old Masonic Lodge building that is currently being remodeled for the WOWL, Fun 91, Radio Station. According to Rick Biddle, owner of FUN 91, the remodeling is scheduled to be completed in 3 to 4 weeks and broadcasting is scheduled to begin in WOWL's new office in 8 weeks after the remodeling is complete, the licenses, etc. have been secured, and the equipment is moved to town from the current location.

This new location for FUN 91 is in one of Iuka's oldest downtown structures. Before the WOWL purchase, the building's most previous owners, Bob-o Brown and Barbara Jim Brown Turner, had some property near the Tishomingo Shoe Factory the Masonic Lodge building after the lodge downtown. The Masons had bought the downtown property from the estate of Mrs. P. Jourdan. The Masonic Lodge is now located in the old Shoe Factory and Barbara Jim and Bob-o sold the vacant building downtown

Three Arrested In Connection With February Burglary Of Home

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department has apparently solved a burglary which occurred on February 26th at the residence of Hal and Debbie Crandell of 149 CR 6 in Belmont, reports Investigator Donald Thomas.

A DVD player and some of the approximate \$14,765 worth of missing jewelry taken in the burglary have been recovered.

According to Thomas, part of the jewelry was dropped as

the suspects exited the residence and the rest was recovered during the arrests.

Arrested and charged with burglary and entry and grand larceny were suspects William Matthew Puckett, 19, 576 Doc Ashley Road, Golden, MS, and Jason Matthew Taylor, 19, 1775 Antioch Rd., Golden, MS.

A third party, Jason Russelle Rhodes, 24, of 2455 CR 961, Dennis, MS was charged with accessory after

the fact.

All three suspects are out on \$20,000 bond.

Assisting in the solving of the case were Belmont Police Chief Donald Reno, and Belmont Investigator Sammy South.

Sheriff David Smith urges citizens to please contact his office if they are approached by anyone trying to sell questionable jewelry.

This case remains under investigation.

Jena Band of Choctaws Withdraws Application

The Jena Band of Choctaw Indians has withdrawn its application to the Bureau of Indian Affairs to establish a reservation in Tishomingo County.

The Jena Band had planned to build a casino on the reservation.

In June of 2002, many Tishomingo County residents expressed through a non-binding straw poll their opposition to a casino in Tishomingo County. Residents were joined by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors in the rejection of the Choctaws' proposal. Also, Mississippi Governor Ronnie Musgrove wrote a letter of opposition to the U.S. Secretary of the Interior, overseer of the Bureau of Indian Affairs urging rejection of the application.

According to a press release, Jerry Jackson, Jena Band Tribal Council Member, Jena Band of the Choctaw

Indians said, "We couldn't generate any support over there locally. The ministers served to make it a moral issue. Neither the county nor the governor wanted to negotiate with us, so we decided to look elsewhere."

Jackson also added, "The Jena Band viewed this solely as a business proposition, which would have brought a large amount of money and a large number of jobs into the county."

Local opponents representing the American Family Association of Tishomingo County were pleased that the application has been withdrawn. Several Iuka City Aldermen reserved their comments for a later time. Iuka Mayor Jackie Bryant was on the coast on business, and Tishomingo County Board of Supervisor's President Danny Ryan could not be reached on Friday for comment.

Husband Shot By Wife

A Corinth man is in stable condition in the North MS Medical Center following a shooting March 15 in Tishomingo County.

James Albert King, Jr. of 116 CR 161 Corinth, was apparently shot at the home of his father, on CR 989 (in the Steel Bridge area) by his wife, Rebecca Lynn King, states Tishomingo County Sheriff's Dept. Investigator, Donald Thomas.

King was shot in the upper chest with a .380 caliber handgun. According to Deputy Thomas, the couple had come to the elder King's home to discuss some checks written on the elder Mr. King's account. After examining just one check, Ms. King shot the younger Mr. King.

Rebecca King is being held in the Tishomingo County Jail, charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

The case is still under investigation.

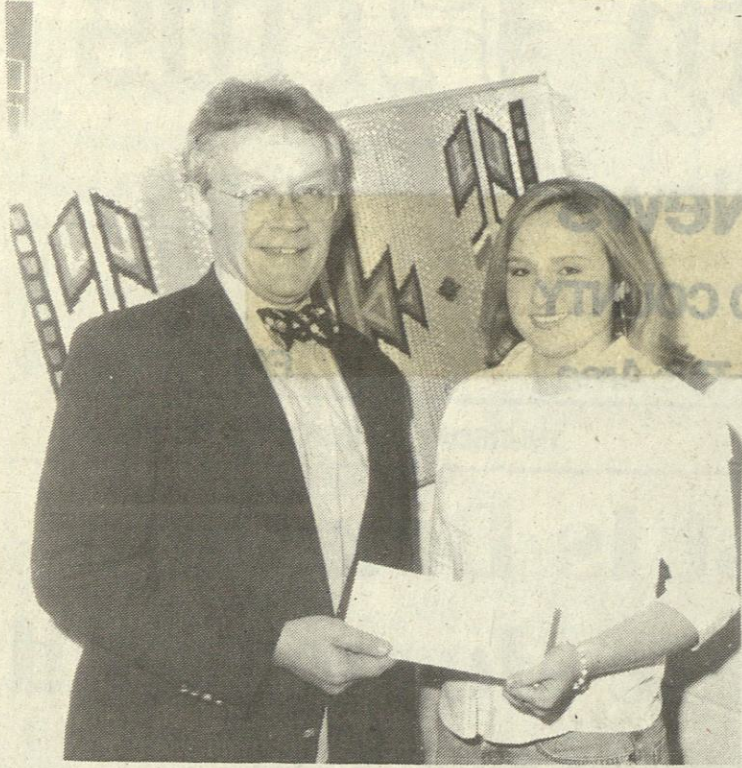

4-H TALK

Start Now To Chase Away Summer Boredom

"I'm bored. There's nothing to do." This is a tune parents often hear when school is out, especially during the summer. To stop the boredom and give children purpose and responsibility, start planning now for that home garden.

That's right. Give your children their own small garden space and watch not only plants but your children grow as well. To start, assign your child a small space of his or her own in an existing flower or vegetable garden.

One of the first things you should help them with is taking a soil sample from their plot of land. Instructions for doing this are available from the county Extension office. This sample is sent to Mississippi State University's Soil Testing Lab where it is analyzed for the nutrients available to the plants.

Next, help them choose what they want to plant and make sure water is available for those long dry spells. Now is the time to also check the area's drainage. This can be done using a coffee can with both ends cut out of it. Place the can in a 4-inch deep hole and press soil firmly around the outside. Fill it with water and measure the water's height after one hour.

If the water level is dropped at least 2 inches, the area has normal drainage. If more than 5 inches are gone in an hour, the garden has excessive drainage; if the water has barely drained at all, the area is poorly drained.

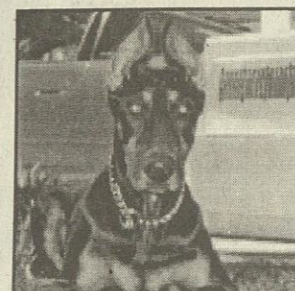
To improve soil that drains too fast or too slow you should add organic matter. To increase a garden's organic matter, add compost, shredded leaves, bark, peat moss or grass clippings mixed with something like shredded leaves to prevent the grass from mildewing.

Once the bed is ready, it's time for the plants. Gardeners of all ages should plant flowers or vegetables that they actually like. I like to plant things that come back each year, so my yard has a lot of flowers that grow from bulbs like daffodils, tulips, iris and day lilies.

Show children how to read the seed or bulb packets so that they'll know how deep to place

the seeds and how far apart they should put them. Children should plant vegetables that they like. This could limit a vegetable garden to corn and watermelon. Help your gardener choose varieties that grow well in our part of the state.

As you teach your children to enjoy watching things grow, they'll learn patience as they wait for things to sprout, grow and ripen. They'll also learn to be responsible for fertilizing, watering and weed and insect control in their own space. They will become weather conscious as they look for rain to come when it's dry. They will be able to tell the difference between a weed and a flower and what good insects to look



Expect Early Onset Of Allergies In Four- Legged Friends...

Veterinarians in the southeastern United States are bracing for an early onset of spring allergies in our canine and feline patients. Our very mild winter with only a couple of nights below freezing have allowed some plants to bloom earlier than usual. Additionally, the mild winter has not reduced the flea population as much as usual, and we have seen several dogs and cats in the last couple of weeks with large numbers of fleas.

When we started seeing pine pollen in fecal flotation tests a couple of weeks ago, that was a marker that other early spring plants were blooming. And just as expected, allergic cats and dogs that had a season of relief for the last few months (are starting to itch and scratch and break out). They're not all allergic to pine, but the "Mickey Mouse ears" of the large pine pollen grains are an easy-to-spot indicator that tells us that many different plants are starting to bloom.

People who are allergic to things they inhale usually have respiratory symptoms, but our pets almost always demonstrate these allergies through dermatologist signs. And veterinary dermatologists are now telling us that some allergens may be absorbed through the skin, which wasn't given as much weight just a short time ago. Skin inside the ears, on the face, in the armpits, and on the lower abdomen and legs becomes inflamed and itches due to the release of histamine in certain skin cells, and it's downhill from there.

The pet begins to scratch and chew, causing damage to the skin, and allowing bacterial infections to develop in areas where there is damage. Seborrhea, an overproduction of skin cells and secretions, can create an environment that is more favorable for both bacterial and yeast infections. These infections add to the itching.

Flea bite hypersensitivity, an allergy to protein in flea saliva, characteristically causes the majority of its symptoms over the lower back and rear end area.

And all the allergies a pet has will add up to produce symptoms, so controlling all of them is important.

Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith wishes to invite all county residents, age 55 and above, to the monthly TRIAD meeting.

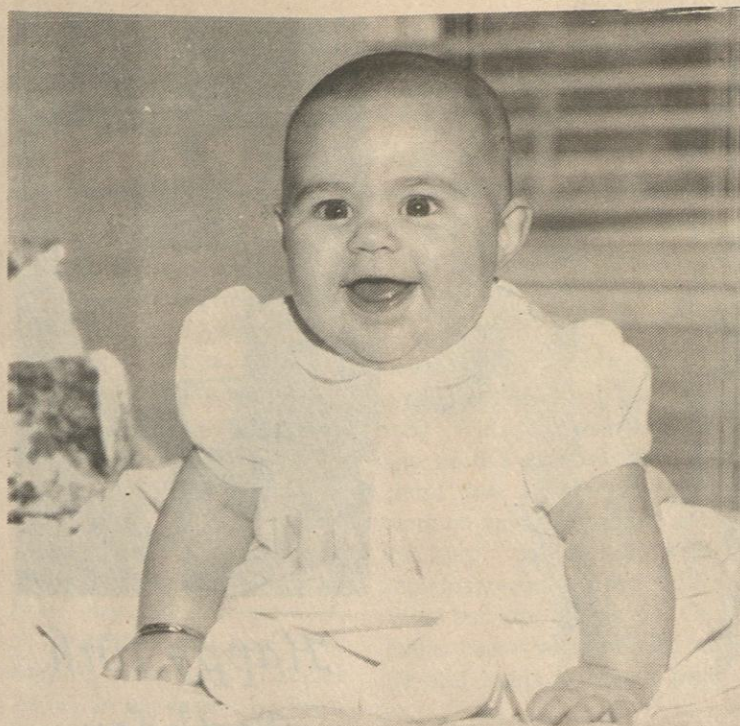
The meeting, sponsored by the Sheriff's Department, is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. on March 26th in the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

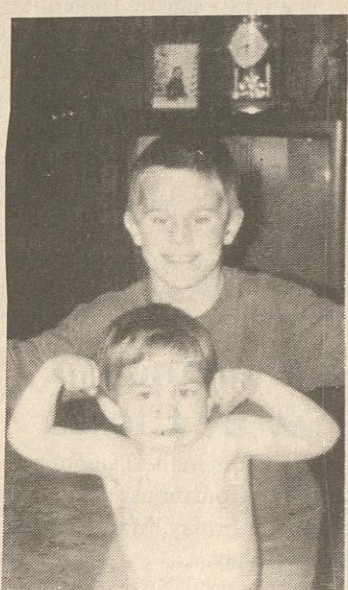

Turkey Hunting Opens March 23rd

Besides spring break, one of the most awaited days of the year is just around the corner - the opening of the spring turkey season, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

Mississippi's wild turkey season for gobblers opens Mar. 23 and continues through May 1. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

The bag limit is one adult gobbler or one gobbler with a six-inch or longer beard per day, not to exceed three gobblers during the season.

Consult the "2001-02 Outdoor Digest," or your local county conservation officer for closed areas.

Sportsmen hunting on state

wildlife management areas should consult the area regulations for opening and closing dates.

According to the latest figures from the state wildlife department, more than 40,000 hunters take to the woods during the spring season and harvest slightly more than 30,000 birds.

Enforcement officials remind hunters to have a valid hunting license signed and on the person before going in the woods.

Hunter safety officers say that even though turkey hunting is a safe sport, hunters should always exercise caution when using a firearm. They offer the following safety tips for hunters:

- * See and accurately identify the whole turkey. Don't shoot at just one piece of what may be an illegal or unsafe situation.
- * Never shoot at movement or

sound.

- * Don't stalk a turkey or sneak up for a shot.
- * If you use a head net, make sure your vision is not obscured.
- * If you are hunting with a buddy, know exactly where he or she is.
- * When you harvest a gobbler, completely conceal the bird in a sack or backpack before walking out of the woods.

Conservation enforcement authorities remind hunters that legal weapons for use during the spring turkey season is restricted to shotguns with shots no larger than No. 2, and compound, recurve, and longbows.

Quadruplegics may hunt turkeys with a rifle.

Hunter Hobbs, age 7, killed his first turkey on Saturday, March 16th while hunting on the Waterway with his dad during the Youth Turkey Hunt. The gobbler weighed 20 lbs. 14 ozs., and had a 10 3/4" beard and 1" spurs. He killed it with a 20 Ga. shotgun.

Tishomingo County Families First Takes Action To Prevent Dating & Domestic Violence With The Powerful Educational Theater Program: *The Yellow Dress*

A recent Journal of the American Medical Association article based on data from Massachusetts schools found that one in five girls are victims of dating violence. Students, administration and faculty at TCHS are working to prevent the problem of dating violence in our school. This week, students will see *The Yellow Dress*, a powerful and dramatic one-woman play with music. The *Yellow Dress* will be performed at TCHS on Thursday, March 21st at 8:30 a.m. Sue Kirkpatrick, Parent Educator says that the play and the required follow-up discussion raises awareness about relationship abuse.

S.A.F.E. Inc. is bringing the program to young people in Tishomingo County in an effort to prevent dating and domestic violence. "This program helps students identify the warning signs of abusive behaviors, learn how to help friends and family members and develop school community awareness of the issue" said Kirkpatrick. "Our hope is to develop a school and community culture that does not endorse, promote or accept violence in relationships."

The *Yellow Dress* program is produced and directed by Deana's Fund, a non-profit organization based in Stoneham, MA that is dedicated to promoting healthy relationships. Deana's Fund was established in 1994 after the death of Deana Brisbois, a young woman from Topsfield, MA who was a victim of dating violence. The organization provides theater and arts - based educational programs to schools and communities around the United States.

According to Sher Quaday, Executive Director of Deana's Fund, The *Yellow Dress* Program is a good first step to developing an effective dating violence prevention program. "Schools report that the program has both an immediate and long-term effect on students," she said. "The *Yellow Dress* is an incredibly powerful performance. It is a great tool, and when used together with a curriculum and other school and community efforts, it has great potential to effectively reduce the incidence of teen dating violence."

The *Yellow Dress* was written by Deborah Lake Fortson and originally produced by Sydney Hayes Patton who also wrote the original music.

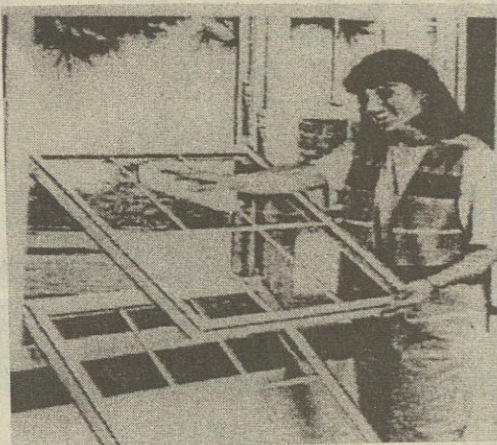

Wicker Praises Economic Impact Of Tenn-Tom Waterway

Recent news coverage of selected U. S. Army Corps of Engineers water projects reminded me of a controversial Mississippi project which came before Congress in the early 1980's. As a member of then-Sen. Trent Lott's staff on Capitol Hill two decades ago, I was closely involved in the fight to win approval of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

Critics said the Tenn-Tom was a costly boondoggle which would produce limited economic benefits and do great harm to the environment. Its backers, including the entire Mississippi Congressional delegation, pointed to the potential for job creation and long-range development opportunities.

The waterway has been open for 17 years now, and a review of the facts indicates that it has become a key component in the nation's transportation system. The Tenn-Tom's operations have been a benefit to the American economy as a whole and produced jobs for Mississippians.

Since barges began moving in 1985, more than \$3.5 billion in new and expanded industrial development has located in the region. The list includes Fortune 500 companies as well as countless smaller

corporations and small businesses. The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority estimates that more than 50,000 new jobs have been created from the economic activity.

The Tenn-Tom is a 234-mile waterway which begins at the northern end of Pickwick Lake on the Tennessee River, flows through northeast Mississippi and west Alabama and connects with the Warrior-Tombigbee system at Demopolis, Alabama. From there, it flows south to Mobile, Alabama, and other destinations along the Gulf Coast.

Using the waterway cuts 800 miles off the distance required for manufacturers and producers to transport goods from mid-America to ports along the Gulf of Mexico. By the year 2000, it was carrying more than 10 million tons of commodities annually. Even during the recent economic downturn when tonnage has decreased, the value of goods shipped continues to increase.

The waterway is also moving more specialized high-tech products. Earlier this month, it was used to ship the first Delta IV rocket components made at the Alliant Techsystems facility in Iuka to the Boeing Plant in Decatur, Alabama, for assembly. The rocket will be used by NASA

to launch future space shuttles.

A recently completed study also highlights additional recreational and tourism benefits along the Tenn-Tom. The survey found that pleasure boat traffic on the waterway generates more than \$5.5 million in revenues each year. This activity is in addition to the estimated \$200 million in annual receipts produced by visits from three million tourists, fishermen, campers, and boaters.

Some Tenn-Tom opponents feared that its construction would harm the environment. History has proved those fears to be unfounded. Two environmental education centers are in operation along the waterway today, and the wildlife habitat is more protected now than at any time in the past. Many engineering and construction techniques designed to protect the environment when the Tenn-Tom was built are used as models for similar projects across the nation.

As lawmakers deliberate the wise use of American tax dollars, we are still engaged in the same type of healthy debate today which I heard 20 years ago about the Tenn-Tom Waterway. In that instance, an objective consideration of the record would show that Congress made the right decision.

Perkins at the Iuka Animal Clinic during high school. Melissa is the daughter of Tommy and Kathleen Pounders of Tishomingo. She is the granddaughter of Mattie Faye Edmondson and the late Otha Edmondson of Tishomingo, and T.C. and Avoc Ponders of Dennis.

As Editor-in-Chief, McAnally is the chief executive officer of the Review. She will be ultimately responsible for production of the Review. 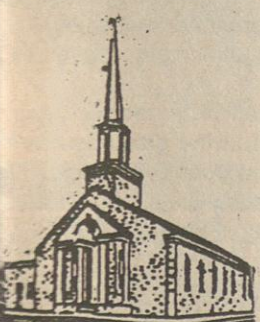

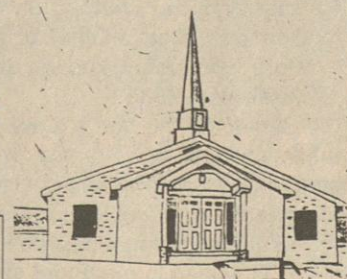

Home Economics Tips

National Poison Prevention Week Strategies For Keeping Children Safe

"Children Act Fast...So Do Poisons!" is the theme of National Poison Prevention Week, March 17 to 23, 2002.

Small children are constantly exploring their surroundings and are prone to put many things into their mouths; therefore they are at great risk for unintentional poisonings. Many unintentional poisonings occur when adults are distracted for just a few moments by everyday occurrences.

To further prevent accidents, chemicals and medicines should be safely stored away at all times. Cleaning products should be stored in a locked cabinet away from food and out of the reach of children. Also be sure to always check to make sure the container is properly closed. Products should be

kept in their original containers with their product labels intact. Many of these labels have instructions on what to do in case of an accidental ingestion.

Never mix cleaning products. Some products are safe when used alone, but may become dangerous when mixed with other products. Chlorine bleach or any product that contains chlorine bleach, including some tub and tile cleaners, mildew removers, all-purpose cleaners and automatic dishwashing detergents, should never be mixed with ammonia or products that include ammonia compounds (e.g. some window cleaners, hand dishwashing detergents, or acidic products, such as toilet bowl cleaners or rush removers). Dangerous gases can be released.

Even empty containers can pose hazards.
