Services Held For Cecil L. Sumners

Cecil L. Sumners, one of Tishomingo County's most distinguished politicians and noted local historian died Wednesday, March 27, 2002, at the Iuka Hospital. A native of Belmont, Mr. Sumners was born September 13, 1920, the son of the late Samuel Sumners and Laura Lacy Sumners.

Cecil Sumners was a graduate of Belmont High School, the University of Mississippi, and the University of Mississippi Law School.

He was an Air Force Veteran of World War II, serving his country for three years.

Mr. Sumners practiced law in Iuka for many years and was respected and loved by his many clients. He entered politics and was elected to serve as Tishomingo County Chancery Clerk before being elected to three terms as State Senator from the area.

While serving in Jackson, Senator Sumners and his colleagues were instrumental in completing several worthwhile projects, such as obtaining funding for four bridges on the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway and paving Coleman Park Road.

A true Southern gentleman, Cecil Sumners enjoyed life and especially loved meeting people and visiting with them. He was an avid historian and authored two books, *Chief Tishomingo*, and *Governors of Mississippi*. He also enjoyed collecting stamps and coins.

Mr. Sumners was a member of the Belmont Masonic Lodge,

a Shriner, a 32nd Degree Mason, a member of the VFW for many years, and also a member of the Iuka Baptist Church.

A loving husband, Cecil Sumners is survived by his wife, Gladys Kennedy Sumners. He was preceded in death by his beloved daughter, Dr. Pat Sumners Currie and his granddaughter, Meredith Currie.

Additional survivors include a self-adopted daughter, Joanne Horton and her husband, David, and son Bo; a niece, Syble Sumners of Fulton; and two nephews, Willard Smith of New Albany, and Sidney L. Sumners, Jr. of Houston, Texas.

Blake Melton Graduates From State Fire Academy

Blake Melton, of the Iuka Fire Department, was among twenty-four fire fighters that completed six weeks of intense firefighting instruction at the State Fire Academy.

The course which lasted from January 7 through February 15, 2002, was attended by fire fighters and was designed to meet the uniform minimum training standards stated in the Mississippi Code section 83-1-37. The course also met and exceeded the training standards set by the National Fire Protection Association for Fire Fighter Professional Qualifications.

Additional instruction was presented on Hazardous Materials for First Responders

and the Incident Command System. Each of the students returned to their department with an understanding of equipment found on fire apparatus, how the equipment functions and are able to test the safety of such items as hose and ladders.

The Mississippi Fire Academy is a division of the State Insurance Department. Commissioner George Dale and Academy Executive Director William Warren agree that these career fire fighters through their newly acquired skills and knowledge will be an asset to the fire departments they represent in implementing fire protection for their community.

RIGHT FROM BIRTH WORKSHOP CONTINUES AT FAMILIES FIRST

Right From Birth, a parenting series, is being offered as a six-week seminar by personnel at Tishomingo County Families First Resource Center. The program was developed by Mississippi Educational Television and may be seen by the public on local Mississippi ETV stations. The program follows the physical and emotional development of a child from birth through three years of age. While some parents are attending the seminar, the main focus of this session is on daycare workers. In order to be licensed by the state of Mississippi, daycare facilities are required to educate their employees through seminars such as this. "This is really a great learning experience for daycare workers," said Janice Moody, owner of The Big Blue House

in Belmont. "And beside that, it's free," she continued. She went on to say that most of the time employers had to pay for their employees to attend such training sessions.

On Tuesday, March 19th, the third session was conducted by Becky McNeely, Sue Kirkpatrick and Janet Fulton. Using a "rainbow" theme, the seven essentials to help infant devel-

opment were introduced. These essentials are encourage, mentor, celebrate, rehearse, protect, communicate and guide. At the end of the seminar the group had its own celebration by singing songs appropriate for children and eating cupcakes decorated with rainbows. Each group represented was asked to plan a celebration and share it at the next meeting on Tuesday, March 26th.

Contact And Allergic Contact Dermatitis

Contact Dermatitis and Allergic Contact Dermatitis are two separate conditions discussed together because they produce similar-looking reactions. Both are caused by contact with a chemical. Whereas all dogs coming into contact with irritating chemicals develop a skin reaction, there are some chemicals that cause a reaction only in dogs that are allergic to them. A dog will not break out with an allergic dermatitis unless exposed to the allergen repeatedly.

A contact dermatitis of either type causes itchy red bumps along with redness and inflammation of the skin. You may notice moist weepy spots, crusts, blisters, ulceration's and pus.

Common contact irritants are acids and alkalis, insecticides, detergents, solvents, soaps and petroleum by-products.

Common contact allergens are flea powders and collars, poison ivy and poison oak, plastic and rubber dishes and dyes found in indoor-outdoor carpets.

You will find contact dermatitis of both types on the feet, chin, abdomen, groin and scrotum (hairless parts likely to come in contact with chemicals). Since dogs lie on their hocks and stifles, these areas are affected, too.

Flea collar allergy causes local itching and redness followed by loss of hair, skin ulceration and crust formation beneath the collar. This condition may spread to other areas.

Food dish dermatitis affects the nose.

Skin disease easily mistaken for contact and allergic contact dermatitis are canine atopy, ringworm and seborrhea.

Treatment: First identify the skin allergen causing the problem and then keep your dog away from it. Treat infected areas with an appropriate antibiotic. Cortisone is of value because it stops the itching, biting and scratching. Use it only under a veterinarian's supervision.

Why Bifocals?

Bifocals are most commonly used to give people two vision corrections in one pair of glasses. The upper portion is used for far and middle distances and the lower portion for reading and other close work. They are most often prescribed for presbyopia, a natural change in vision that begins to affect the close-focusing ability of people after the age of 40. When the lenses are necessary only for near vision, a bifocal may be used with no prescription in the upper portion of the lens. Some types of crossed-eyes are likewise helped by the use of bifocals.

In addition, bifocals may be used in some instances in an attempt to control nearsightedness. Partially sighted patients can, many times, be given much better near vision through the use of bifocals. Each individual is different. Your optometrist must evaluate your personal needs and then prescribe the most suitable type of vision correction for you.

Don't plant trees under power lines

Tiny seedlings grow into trees with sprawling branches that can become entangled with power lines, causing outages or annoying blinks. And trees easily conduct electricity, putting children and others at risk of injury. So as Arbor Day approaches, remember to avoid planting trees under or near power lines.

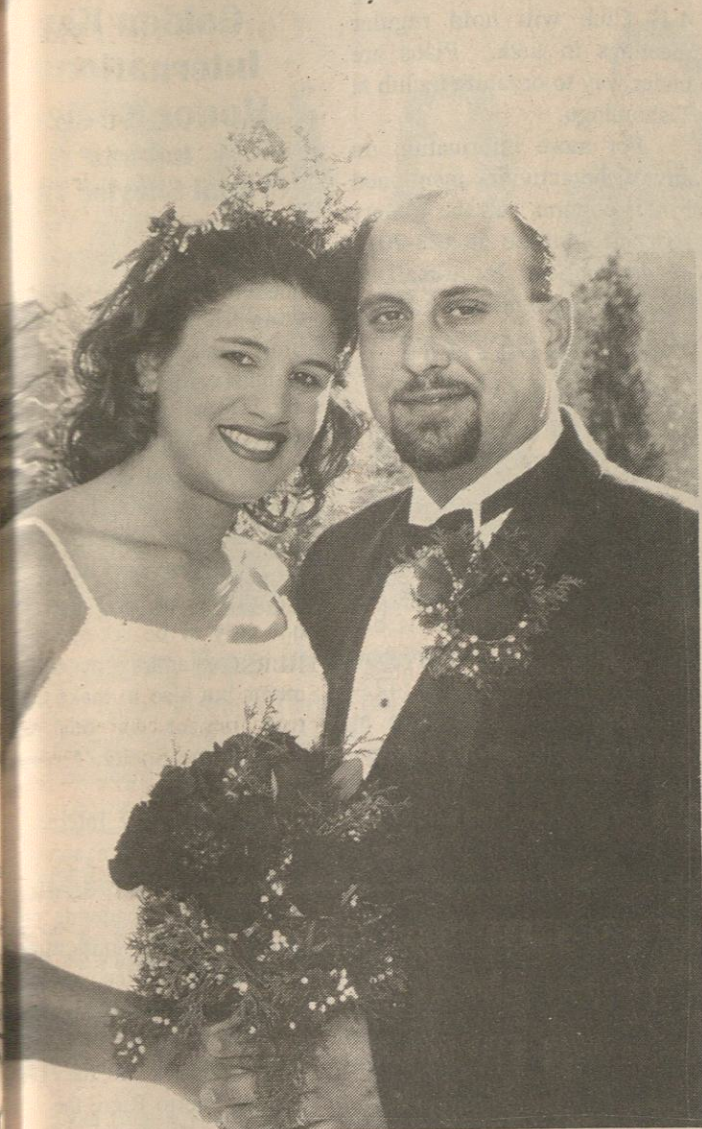
What a beautiful day! It's Tuesday morning, the sun is shining, birds singing, train whistle blowing, some spring flowers are blooming!

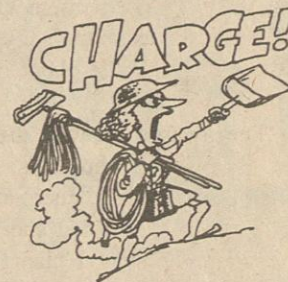

Hunley Coin, Replica To Be Featured At Shiloh 140th Reenactment

Whether or not the romance real, the coin is real, and re-enactors and spectators at the Anniversary Reenactment of the Battle of Shiloh will have the opportunity to examine it, and a full-scale replica of the CSS Hunley, the first submarine in the world to sink an enemy ship.

South Carolina State Senator Glenn McConnell, who chairs the Hunley Commission, will be giving a presentation on the raising of the Hunley and the discovery of the coin and other artifacts both Friday and Sunday as part of the 140th reenactment, to be held April 5-7 at Michie, Tenn. Shiloh National Military

The \$20 gold piece made it's way from Mobile, Ala. to the bottom of Shiloh in Tennessee, then to the bottom of Charleston harbor, where it lay for 136 years.

The discovery of the coin, during an excavation of the Hunley, confirmed a key portion of the epic love story between a Southern Belle named Queenie Bennett and a Confederate officer and George E. Dixon that had largely unsubstantiated since war.

The public will also be able to see an exact replica of the Hunley which was used in the filming of a Turner movie about the ship. Several thousand Civil War re-enactors will be on hand for full-scale re-creations of such famous battles as the Sunken Road, Hornet's Nest and Grant's After-Attack.

In addition, over 60 field pieces will be assembled to re-create the Battle of Shiloh. During the actual battle, the largest concentration of field artillery will be on hand for full-scale re-creations of such famous battles as the Sunken Road, Hornet's Nest and Grant's After-Attack.

The public is invited to spend the weekend learning about one of the most important battles in this chapter of American history.

The internal excavation of the Hunley submarine was completed

in December, perhaps leaving more questions than answers in the long run.

Researchers expected nine crewmen; they found eight. They expected crude engineering; they found technology far ahead of its time. They expected to find the reason the Hunley sank off the South Carolina coast, but that reason still eludes them.

But they did find the coin. Right where legend said it would be, in the pocket of Lt. George E. Dixon, commander of the Hunley.

"You can literally feel his thumbprint where he rubbed it for good luck," said State Senator Glenn McConnell, who has headed the effort to raise and explore the Hunley. "You can see where the bullet hit on the bonnet of Lady Liberty."

"I've held it in my hand. It gives you goose bumps. It's an incredible experience."

McConnell said that history has increased the coin's worth to between eight to 10 million dollars. Now it is hidden away, even moved often, to protect it. It has had a charmed existence so far.

The Legend
The legend of the romance behind the coin has never been substantiated. Like truly good legends, it seems to have started as a story told at the time, then picked up later and published.

The story goes that 14-year-old Queen "Queenie" Bennett, the daughter of a Mobile steamboat pilot, gave the gold piece to George E. Dixon, an engineer on one of the city's riverboats.

Bennett is described as Dixon's sweetheart, but no letters of the time are cited between them. She may have known him through her father, Robert Fielding Bennett, because Dixon worked on the river.

Dixon, a "fair-haired, blue-eyed boy of 22" as described by the March 11, 1900 edition of the Montgomery Advertiser, was mustered into Confederate service in Mobile on Oct. 13, 1861.

The rest of the legend comes from an article in the Mobile Daily Item, which ran April 26, 1910:

"Lieutenant George E. Dixon was born either in Kentucky or Ohio, and afterwards came to Mobile and was engaged as an engineer on one of the river boats which ran out of Mobile."

"At the outbreak of the war he

was second lieutenant in the Washington Light infantry (second company) Company E in the Twenty-first regiment of Alabama, which was the first regiment as a whole to leave Alabama."

According to the article, the coin was exchanged when the regiment left Mobile.

"The ladies of Mobile came out in full force to bid the boys adieu and say the loving farewell. Among those present was the sweetheart of George Dixon. Just before the departure of the train she handed him a \$20 gold piece, bidding him keep it for her sake."

The gold piece was minted in 1860. One side shows Lady Liberty; the other side, the federal shield and eagle.

On to Shiloh
According to the state archives, Lt. Dixon and the Twenty-first remained at Hall's Mills and Fort Gaines until March 1862, when they were ordered to Ft. Pillow.

After a few days, they moved to Corinth, MS and joined the 55,000 Confederates massing under Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston. They were to attack Grant at Pittsburg Landing on the Tennessee River, in rolling pastureland surrounding a small church called Shiloh.

Dixon fell the first day. According to letters from fellow soldiers, he was one of the first Confederate soldiers shot. However, the Yankee Minnie ball hit the gold coin in his pocket, saving his left leg.

The Mobile Daily Item of 1910 described it as: "he was shot down by a most painful wound in the groin. It was in a vital part and would have been mortal had not the ball first struck the gold piece and carried it into the flesh."

"When removed it was found that the coin was doubled up into such a shape as to form a bell, the bullet being firmly embedded in the metal. This was very highly prized by its owner, and is supposed to have been on his person at the time of his death."

The bullet struck the Lady Liberty side of the coin.

The 1910 Daily Item continues: "From this wound he never recovered, and was sent to Mobile. Although he could not give his bodily powers, nevertheless his mind was still in good condition."

Other reports say Dixon was from then on to walk with a limp.

Back to Mobile

Dixon was sent back to Mobile to recuperate. One of the first things he did, or had done, was to have his life-saving \$20 gold piece inscribed. One the side with the federal shield and eagle, a portion appears to have been sanded smooth, McConnell said. In that space are four lines of text, professionally inscribed, that read:

Shiloh
April 6 1862
My life Preserver
G.E.D.
The battle name is in a block

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Old English print. The rest of the inscription is in script. McConnell said the recovered coin has marks on its edges where it had been held in a vise during the engraving.

Meanwhile, a new project was underway in Mobile. James McClintock, Horace Hunley and Baxter Watson had fled from New Orleans to Mobile with plans for a submersible they had built in 1861 but scuttled when Gen. Benjamin Butler overtook the city.

However, they had secured a privateering commission to build another submarine from the Confederate government.

They built a second submarine vessel within months at a machine shop near the harbor. They lost it, too, after several failed attempts to propel this new submarine boat with an electric motor and a small, custom-built steam engine.

Then, they were joined by a group of Southern engineers who had close ties to the Confederate Secret Service. The group's leader was E. C. Singer. This team began work on a third submarine.

One of these Southern engineers was Dixon. He was joined by fellow engineer from the 21st Alabama, William A. Alexander.

With Dixon's help, the third submarine was equipped with a hand-crank operated by four of the crew and used to propel the submarine instead of the earlier steam engine. It was completed in July of 1863. This third sub would later be named the *H. L. Hunley* for the man that financed it.

On Aug. 7, it was transported by rail to Charleston, SC, which had struggled in the grip of a Union blockade.

The *Hunley* sank twice, killing two crews, including the sugar-broker Hunley.

Following the second sinking on Oct. 15, P.G.T. Beauregard, Confederate commander at Charleston, refused to allow further experimentation with it. "I can have nothing more to do with that submarine boat. It's more dangerous to those who use it than the enemy," he wrote in November 1863.

Then, Alexander wrote, "As soon as the news that the boat had been lost again was verified, we discussed the matter together and decided to offer our services to Gen. Beauregard, to raise and operate the boat for the defense of Charleston Harbor."

"After this tragedy I refused to permit the boat to be used again but Lieutenant Dixon, a brave and determined man...applied to me for authority to use it against the Federal steam sloop-of-war Housatonic."

Given permission, Dixon left Mobile for Charleston.

According to writer David Perlmutt in an Aug. 6, 2001, article in the Charlotte Observer, Dixon talked to his sweetheart

before he left. He reported Dixon went to Queenie to tell her he had to go to Charleston to persuade Beauregard that the *Hunley* was capable of waging war. He assured her he wouldn't meet the same fate as the previous crews. He would return and they would be married.

In Charleston, Beauregard ordered the boat raised and its crew buried in the city's Magnolia Cemetery. Dixon arrived and persuaded Beauregard to put him at the *Hunley's* helm. That came with the condition that Dixon warn the third crew that sub duty was "desperately hazardous," Perlmutt reported.

Two weeks later, Dixon set out with crew in the *Hunley*.

The crew of the *Hunley* approached the Union blockade ship, Housatonic. On the front of the *Hunley* was a 22-foot wooden tip called a "spar" with a 135 pound explosive charge stuck on the end and attached by rope.

The *Hunley* rammed the torpedo inside the hull of the Housatonic below the waterline. Then the *Hunley* reversed direction and backed away from the doomed Union vessel. The *Hunley* flashed a pre-arranged signal indicating success, then disappeared.

"Lieutenant, acting with characteristic coolness and resolution, struck and sunk the Housatonic on the night of February 17th, 1864; but, unhappily, from some unknown cause, the torpedo-boat was also sunk, and all with it lost."

According to the Alabama archives, the fate of Dixon and his men was not known until after the peace, "when his boat was found by the side of the Housatonic, and in its air-tight walls were encoffined the skeletons of the

brave crew."

Shiloh National Military Park To Host 140th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Shiloh

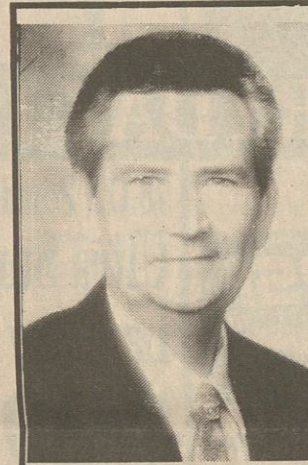

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Big Bad Love by Oxford Native, Novelist Larry Brown is Subject of Feature Film

Hollywood mines another gem from one of Oxford's celebrated favorite sons, novelist Larry Brown, whose claimed short story collection *Big Bad Love* is the basis for a new movie.

(Larry Brown is a cousin to a resident, Clara Barlow.)

The University of Mississippi (UM) hosts a special preview screening of *Big Bad Love* April 11 at 8 p.m. in Fulton Chapel. A former Oxford firefighter, Brown joins a panel of writers and the film's featured actors for a brief introduction before the screening.

"*Big Bad Love* will bring the attention of the nation and the world again to northern Mississippi, not only for the fact that it is the center of American storytelling but because it is the center of American blues rock music," said Dr. Joseph Urgo, chair of the UM Department of English.

Sponsored by UM and the City of Oxford, the event is free and open to the public, but attendees need tickets to reserve seating. Only one ticket per person will be issued, available April 1 at the UM Central Ticket Office in the Student Union or at the Oxford Tourism Council on the Oxford Square.

The preview screening tips kick off the Ninth Oxford Conference for the Book, April 14, at UM-Oxford.

The film, which opened in New York in February, is set in north Mississippi hill country and is billed as the staggering tale of one man's relentless pursuit of imperfection.

"Audiences around the world will find that all things familiar to them about American storytelling come from Mississippi, and that the soundtrack to their lives is composed right here, in the same red dirt and heat," said Urgo.

In the story, Vietnam vet and alcoholic Leon Barlow - a "honky-tonk hillbilly" with biting talent - tries to turn his life around amid quiet chaos: there's an ever-present ex-wife he still loves, he seems unable to be a father to their two children, and his mother sees in him the return and demise of her husband.

It is the directorial debut of Arliss Howard, who plays Barlow in the film and also cowrote the screenplay with his brother, James. *Big Bad Love* features voice-overs and a soundtrack enriched by Mississippi blues. Arliss Howard is probably best known for starring in Stanley Kubrick's *Full Metal Jacket*.

Married to director Howard in real life, actress Debra Winger produces and stars in the 111-minute film. Other actors include Angie Dickinson, Rosanna Arquette, Paul Le Mat and Michael Parks. Veteran Mississippi guitarist and blues localist R. L. Burnside and his band, including members Penny Brown and Cedric Burnside, also appear in the film.

Brown's work has won

many prizes, most recently the 2001 Thomas Wolfe Award. He began writing fiction in 1980 and published his first collection of stories in 1988.

Brown lives with his wife, Mary Annie, and their children in the Yocona community in Lafayette County, where they raise beef cattle.

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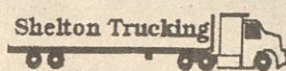

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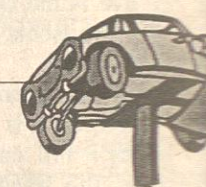

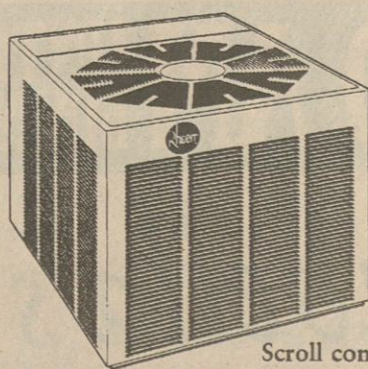
