





"Inny" Or "Outy" Lenses?

Do you know why your glasses are shaped the way they are? If the lens curves inward, this is a concave lens. It pushes the focused rays of light backward to the retina to correct for nearsightedness. If you didn't have those glasses, your eyes would be focusing too soon, causing your vision to blur.

If the lens curves outward, it's a convex lens. This is designed to push the focused rays of light forward to the retina, correcting for farsightedness. Without convex lenses, your eyes would focus too late also causing blurred vision.

For people with astigmatism (two points of focus instead of one), the lens will be either concave or convex, depending on the kind of astigmatism. It can be either farsighted or nearsighted.

If the problem is presbyopia (the inability to use the near-focusing muscles), the lens will be convex, just as it is for the farsighted person.

The board approved purchasing from the Expressed Product List the components necessary to build 120 computers. Superintendent John Mullins explained that this project of buying computer parts from the "state list" can save the school many dollars. A \$1,400 computer can be build for around \$700. The school now has around 1200 computers in the district. Some 10% of these are 9 or 10 years old and need to be removed. Using money from utility and gas funds (which were not depleted this year) and technology funds, the school can rebuild some 120 computers and replace the outdated ones.

The board approved and board president Harold Sparks signed the Federal Program Application, Assurances, and Budget Narratives. This means the system will receive around \$458,000 from the Federal Government.

The board approved the Summer Betterment Plan and noted several changes that will be made to the program this year. This program, which is a reinforcement for children needing help, will be held at a central location this summer. Having all the children gather at the Tishomingo School facility will help children of the same grade levels be grouped together for better learning. One bus will

run from Burnsville and pick up the Iuka students and one will run from Belmont. Parents will be responsible for getting the children to the bus pick-up site at the schools. A \$3,700 grant is being used for this program and students will pay on the basis of a sliding scale.

In his book, "Mississippi: Society," Closed The University of Mississippi history professor James W. Silver wrote of Mr. Lambert's position during the integration crisis at Ole Miss, "In a heated legislative debate after the riot, Senator Flavous Lambert charged that he had been told either Senator John by McLaurin or Senator George Yarbrough that they were going to provoke the Kennedys into sending troops into Mississippi."

As a senator, Mr. Lambert championed development of rural Mississippi, especially the economically-depressed northeastern portion of the state. He was a prime sponsor of state legislation that resulted in the development of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, which he saw as a great potential benefit to Mississippi. During his tenure, Mr. Lambert also sponsored highway important construction and education legislation and was the chief sponsor of the bill creating the J. P. Coleman State Park in Tishomingo County.

Mr. Lambert later served as Sergeant at Arms of the state senate, an official of the Mississippi Department of Public Welfare and a public relations consultant.

He resided in Raymond, MS, with his wife, Christine Lambert. His marriage to Jean Keeton Lambert ended in divorce.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by a daughter, Jean Lambert Aldridge of Athens, AL; sons David F. Lambert, III, of Alexandria, VA; Mark K. Lambert of Belmont, MS; and Christopher Lambert of Jackson, MS; and two grandchildren, Katye and JED Aldridge of Athens, AL.

He was the son of the late David F. Lambert and Lora Clement Lambert of Belmont, MS.

Memorial services were held Monday, May 13, 2002 at 11 A.M. at Belmont United Methodist Church. Burial was in Belmont City Cemetery. Deaton Funeral Home, Belmont, MS was in charge.







Any persons violating any provisions of this Ordinance wherein there is not a specific penalty, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$1,000.00, or imprisonment in the County Jail not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, unless otherwise provided for in this Ordinance. Each days violation shall be deemed as a separate offense.

To avoid your pet(s) being picked up and having to pay unnecessary fees to get your pet back and possible being fined as stated in section 19, please keep all animals under restraint.





Manage Your Money Better - Be Money Smart

This week I met with some people to talk about ways to better manage money. I thought this information would be helpful to almost everyone. These are just a few things you should remember to be "Money Smart."

We all have a set income each month. This is the amount of money that we actually get to bring home after taxes are taken out. How we spend this money depends upon the needs and wants of your family. The amount of money that each of us has to spend is limited.

Each family has items on which the money needs to be spent. These are things like food, housing, utilities, transportation, medicine, childcare, insurance, clothing and credit. How much you pay for these expenses each month is decided by you.

The secret to being a good money manager is to make smart decisions about how much money to budget for the different things your family needs and wants. It's important to stick with your plan so that your family's needs and wants are met.

Decisions about spending

money are based on the values you have and the goals you set. Values are your personal strong beliefs of what is worthwhile and important in your life. Goals are the things you want, things that you are willing to work toward and save for.

come should be counted. To find the amount of your income you can list it on a piece of paper.

After you know how much comes in, you can begin listing how much goes out. List all your expenses as either regular (those things that must be paid) or changing expenses. The regular expenses should not go unpaid because you want to spend the money on something else. Regular expenses include house or rent payment, insurance payments, utilities, and installment payments.

Other expenses change in amount from one payment to the next. If you need to cut spending, these are usually easier to change than your regular expenses. You can decide which of these expenses are more important to you as a family and which are less important.

After all the expenses are written down, add them all together. This tells you how much your family spends each month. The next step is to see how your income and expenses balance. Which is higher? If your income is higher than expenses then you have extra money to set aside for emergencies or for saving. If your income is the same as the expenses you are ready to build a budget. If your income is less than your expenses you should make changes to bring your

spending in line with your earnings.

Once your income and expenses balance and you know how much you will be spending for each of your expenses, you can set those amounts aside. Budgeting takes selfcontrol on the part of each family member. Avoid impulse buying and keep close track of all spending, including the small things such as getting a drink and a candy bar with that
