Iuka Soldier Competes In Best Ranger Competition

The 20th Annual David E. Grange Jr. Best Ranger Competition was held recently at Fort Benning, Georgia with Staff Sgts. Roy Anthony Young, 24, of Iuka and his partner, Adam Nash, 25, of Hyannis, Mass., competing as one of ten teams representing the Fort Benning-based 3rd Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment.

This year's competition was particularly brutal as planners kept teams off-balance by keeping information — such as when certain events were completed — away from them. Of the 47 two-man teams that started the competition before dawn on a Friday morning, only 12 crossed the finish line on Sunday after covering some 40 sleepless and hungry miles and three days of physically and mentally challenging tasks.

The Ranger buddy-team of Young and Nash, finished fifth overall in their first attempt at the prestigious "Best Ranger" competition. "Our goal was to gain as much experience as we could," said Army Staff Sgt. Roy Young, son of Vickie Young of Iuka. "I don't know what next year, but I want to come back."

The two young men were teamed together after competing in a "mini-Best Ranger" competition earlier this spring. During the mini-competition each competitor was required to complete an information form listing his strengths and weaknesses and indicating his preferred teammate. After reviewing performances in the mini-competition and comparing the information forms, Master Sgt. Martin Berreras, of the 75th Ranger Regiment's

coach, put the teams together.

"We try to match guys who are equally strong," Berreras said. "We also match the strengths of one guy with the weaknesses of the other."

And while competition rookies rarely win their first time out, Berreras said first-timers Nash and Young were a team to watch in the future.

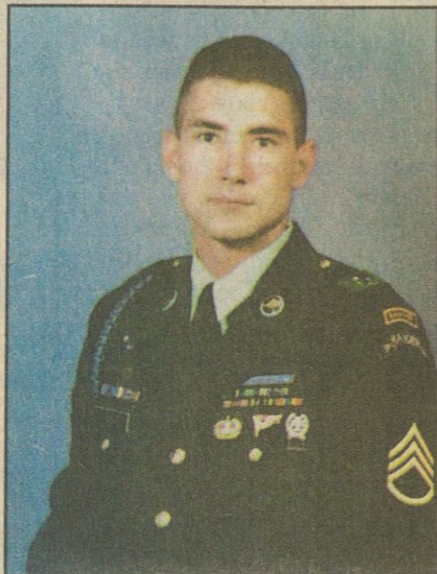
The young men said they had been meeting with past winners to get tips on what it takes to win.

"Experience has a lot to do with the competition," Nash said. "It takes a lot of the mental aspect out of the game."

This is important because, for many competitors, their bodies will keep working long after their mental faculties have been exhausted, veterans of the competition say.

"Because Rangers are in such good shape, a lot of times your mind will shut down before your body does," said Lt. Marc Messerschmitt, who won the competition in 2000.

On Thursday competitors completed an obstacle course, a distance run, a parachute jump from a helicopter and rifle and pistol marksmanship tests. On Friday night, they completed a road march of about 20 miles while hauling a 60-pound ruck sack within six hours. But Saturday night's "Land Navigation Course" usually determines who's in and who's out. It's in this competition that most of the teams that won't finish "hit the wall." The teams must navigate up to 25 miles through the woods, collecting bonus points by finding certain

navigation markers.

It's here where competitors can enter what Rangers call "the drone zone."

According to the team's coach Berreras, "you see guys trying to put a dime in a tree thinking it's a Coke machine." "He'll kick it and try to shake it. You can't tell him it's not a Coke machine. You just have to tell him it's out of Coke."

"The competition is not just to see who is the toughest or the most physically fit, it is to see who is mentally the strongest — the most determined to finish," said the competition's namesake, retired Lt. Gen. David Grange.

Once a low-profile competition among U.S. Army Rangers, the contest now includes all Ranger-qualified military personnel and was featured last year on ESPN. This year, the Outdoor Living Network covered the competition and will run three one-hour segments on the competition. The network will also run all three of them back-to-back on Memorial Day. Retired U. S. Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North, Continued on page 13

"CLICK IT" OR "TICKET" MHP Is In Tish. County

The Mississippi Highway Patrol was out in full force on Monday of this week issuing tickets to those who are not properly using their seat belts.

MHP was in Tishomingo County on Monday morning, and they issued several tickets to those who were not properly following seat belt and child restraint laws.

Ferrous Metal Processing Expands MS Plant's Services With New Cut-To-Length Line Now Running Full-Speed

One-Of-A-Kind CTL Features Herr-Voss Leveler With 'Laser-Quality' Production Capabilities

Ferrous Metal Processing has strengthened its Iuka, Miss., toll processing plant with the addition of a new Herr-Voss laser-quality cut-to-length line.

Ferrous President Ed Gonzalez said the special features of his new CTL now provide Iuka with capabilities to satisfy customers with laser-quality leveling.

"The new line is the only one of its kind in the world," Gonzalez said. "Rather than the typical nine work rolls, ours has 11 five-and-a-half-inch work rolls and is powered by a 500-hp-motor. The line is producing steel that after leveling has no memory, which is a major benefit for those who are burning parts. This is the first non-temper mill leveler capable of producing laser-quality leveled blanks in this gauge range."

Iuka's new line flattens up to 100,000 psi yield steel as thick as .500 inch and as wide as 96 inches.

"We invested in this new equipment to provide our Iuka customers with better quality and greater flexibility in marketing their products," Gonzalez said, noting that the Mississippi plant is running material for steelmakers, service centers

and OEMs.

The new CTL-leveler proceeded smoothly through start-up and is in full operation, completing another step in the ambitious expansion plans of Ferrous Metal Processing Co., a division of Cleveland-based Ferragone Corp. founded by Gonzalez in 1983.

Other processing equipment in Iuka includes an 80,000-pound slitting line, the largest south of the Mason-Dixon line, and a UM (universal mill) narrow width leveler.

Ferrous Metal Processing recently announced it is installing a United 17" X 56" X 66", 66,000-pound, coil-to-coil, four-high reversing mill in Cleveland and plans to have it in operation by early 2003. That mill will join pickling, slitting, leveling and shearing services already being performed in Ferrous' Cleveland operation.

"When it comes to steel processing, he who ships least profits most," Gonzalez said.

The Iuka plant is located in the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority's complex on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, in the Northeast corner of Mississippi, just across the river from Tennessee and Alabama.

Are You Ready To Be Home Alone?

With school ending this week, many children may be facing staying home alone for the first time. This is a big moment for parent and child, but one that the law and child experts say should not be rushed.

According to the Mississippi Department of Human Services' Child Protective Services website, the age at which a child is old enough to be left alone depends on the maturity of the child. This means it is up to parents to decide when the child is mature enough to take on the responsibility of their own care for brief periods.

While the decision is left to

parents, those who make poor decisions can be charged with neglect abuse, defined in part as a consistent lack of supervision.

In addition to knowing that a child is mature enough to be left alone, parents should consider the community they live in. If you live in a safe neighborhood that is supportive and stable, then your decision would probably be different from someone who lives in a less supportive area. Children should be responsible, and have clear decision-making skills and the willingness to accept responsibility before being left alone.

The child's safety is the main concern. Children should never be left alone if there is any concern about potential

danger.

If the child is too young to make decisions or is unable to make good decisions and know where to go for help, then the child is too young to be alone. If you and your child both decide the child is ready to take on the responsibility, talk about what that responsibility involves.

Discuss what is a real emergency and when the child should call 911 instead of calling a parent or another adult. Post house rules and make sure the child is familiar with them. List phone numbers, including those of emergency services, by the telephone.

It is recommended that parents plan activities to keep the child occupied when home alone. These can include a snack, homework, and chores. A routine is important, but be sure it avoids activities that require adult supervision.

Things to remember when you're home alone:

When you are left at home alone, even for a short time, there are certain things you should remember. 1) Keep your doors locked. 2) Don't open the door to strangers. Make sure you know who is at the door before you open it. 3) If you have an answering machine, let it answer the phone. If you don't have an answering machine, don't tell anyone your parents aren't home or that you're home alone. Tell them your parents can't come to the phone right now; ask if you can

take a message. 4) Don't use any appliances that your parents have not approved for you. For example, most of you know how to use the TV/VCR but not all young people know how to use a microwave oven or stove safely. 5) If there is a fire or if you smell gas, leave the house immediately and call 911 from a neighbor's house or your cell phone (if you have one). Don't stop to try to save anything or turn anything off. 6) Know where to go in case of an emergency. Do you know which neighbors stay home during the day?

Remember, when you're home alone, only you are responsible for what does and doesn't get done. If you are expected to wash the dishes and vacuum the floor before your mother gets home make sure it gets done. This will help your parents trust you to do more things.

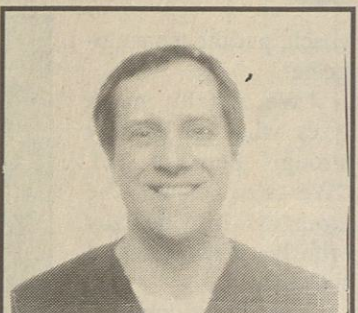

Which Is Better For Your Teeth: Waxed Or Unwaxed Dental Floss?

There's no significant difference between the two. If you have had extensive dental work, however, it may be easier to use a waxed floss between the teeth.

Dental researchers have investigated whether waxed floss leaves a residue on teeth. Repeated testing has indicated that this is not a problem.

Waxed or not, properly used dental floss promotes oral health by removing plaque and food particles from between the teeth and under the gumline.

Nonetheless, flossing is a skill that must be learned. When you visit our office, we can review the process for you. Here are some tips for better flossing:

If you do not have good finger dexterity, you may find it helpful to use a commercial floss holder. Ask us for advice on what type to use.

Children may find it easier to use a loop of floss. To do this, take a piece of floss about 10 inches long and tie the ends together, into a circle. Then hold the floss lightly between the thumbs and forefingers and proceed. Most children cannot floss their own teeth until about age 10, and even then flossing should be done under parental supervision.

When flossing, think of your mouth as having four sections. Floss half of the upper teeth, then the other half. Do the same for your lower teeth. Establish a regular pattern and time for flossing, so that you don't miss any of your teeth.

Remember to be gentle when inserting the floss between your teeth and under the gumline.

With all due modesty, I can honestly say that I have played the roll of a one man Humane Society for several years. This was not by choice or intention, but by circumstances. I live on a dead-end road, which is near a wooded area. Many dogs have been deliberately abandoned in his area. I never went out of my way to do so, but each time I would take my two dogs walking, I would see dogs half starved, lost, and afraid. Some of these dogs would follow me home; and having a reverence for life, I would feed them. In time there were about fourteen dogs enjoying my some-what reluctant hospitality. After seeing these dogs chasing children, harassing anyone who tried to walk down the road, blocking the road each

time someone tried to travel by, interfering with those checking water and gas meters, destroying personal property of all descriptions, I called out for help

to every government agency in the County. I would be referred back and forth by all of them, with none of them offering any assistance in ending the dog problem. I was beginning to think that no one in the County was the least concerned about the dogs or the people whose lives they were affecting, and even endangering. Fortunately, a lady in the Courthouse gave a letter I had written to a Supervisor to Officer Royce Howie of the Mississippi Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks Department. Officer Howie came by, investigated, listened to my fears that these animals were a menace to the safety and well-being of everyone in the neighborhood. He agreed with me that action should be taken to make the neighborhood a safer place, free of the harassing and potentially dangerous dogs. Officer Howie made several trips to attend to this problem and he promptly, professionally, and humanely ended what could have been a tragic situation with the mauling of a child or adult. I will always be grateful to Officer Howie and the Lady who asked him if he could help me - he certainly did. It is pathetic that the State Officer had to resolve what was really a county matter.

As a concerned citizen and as one who has personally experienced the magnitude and the seriousness of the animal problem as it exists in Tishomingo County - as have many others - I believe an Animal Shelter in the County is not the frosting on the cake, but a part of the cake itself. I respectfully ask each citizen in the County to promote and help make the proposed Animal Shelter a reality. Then all of us can be proud to have been a part of a united and successful project, one that will make Tishomingo County an even

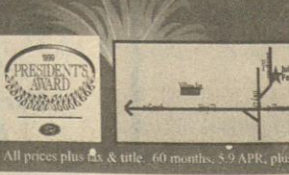

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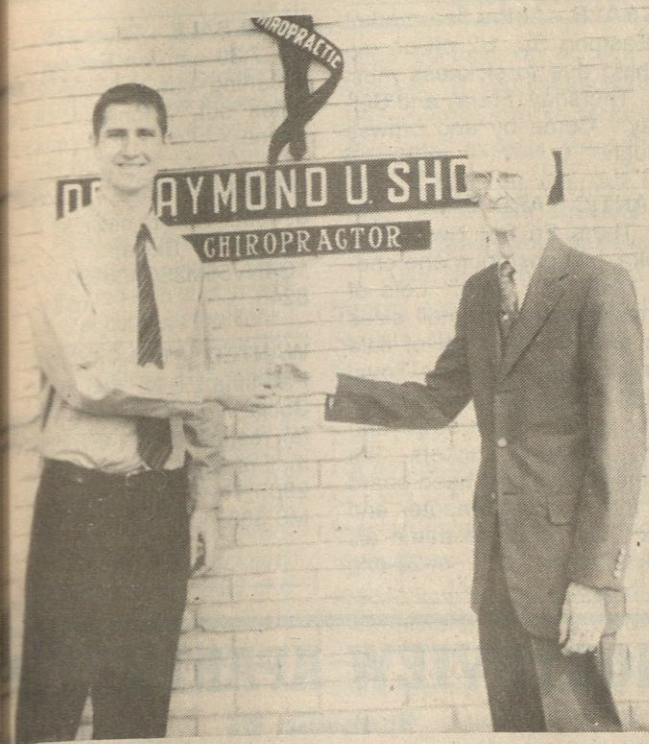

Dr. Shook said it was a pleasure to hand the office keys over to Ramey, who has just finished his four years of schooling at Life University in Marietta, GA. From 1969 until 1986, Dr. Shook wore a "different hat"

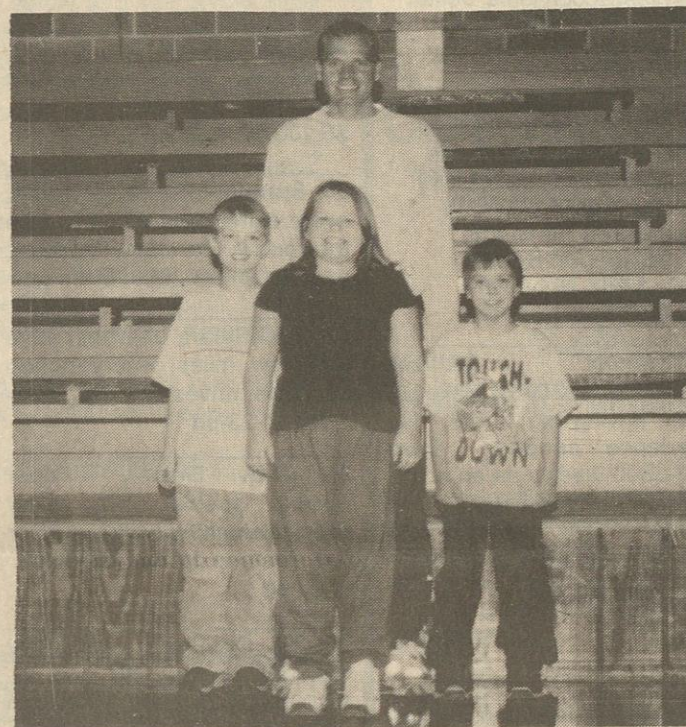

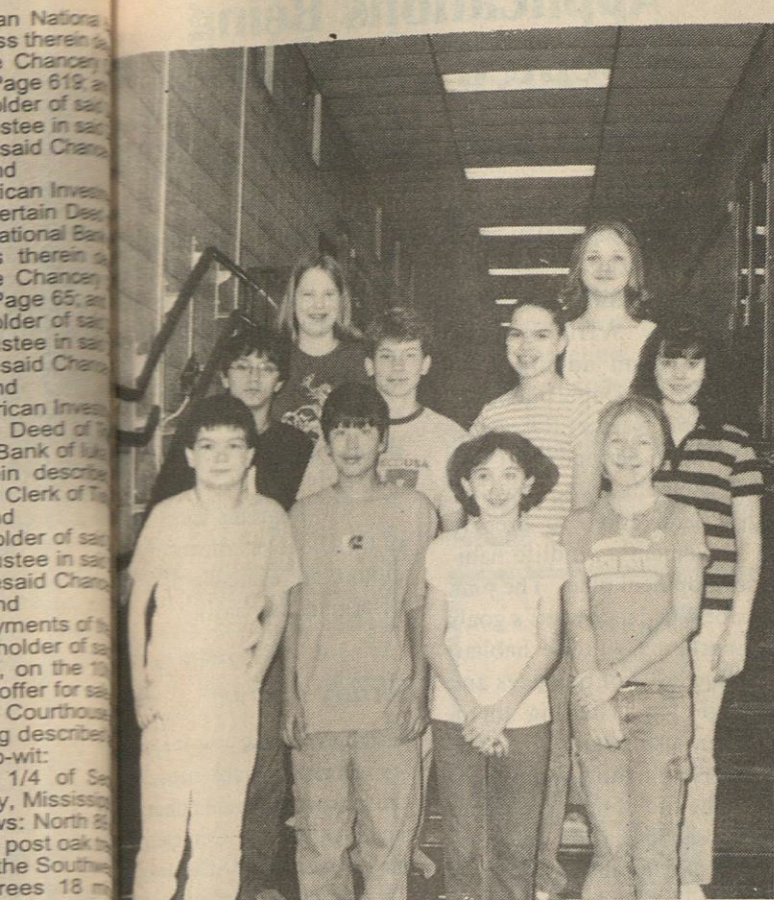

Applications Being Accepted For Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program

The Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) is for people who want to develop and improve wildlife habitat on private lands. WHIP is a voluntary program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

Participants who own or control land agree to prepare and implement a wildlife habitat development plan. The plan describes the landowner's goals for improving wildlife habitat, including a list of practices and schedule for installing them. The plan also details the steps necessary to maintain the habitat for the life of the agreement. The agreement lasts 5-10 years from the date the contract is signed. The landowner agrees to maintain the cost-shared practices and allow USDA or its agent access to monitor the effectiveness of the practices.

The NRCS agrees to provide technical assistance and pay 75 percent of the cost of installing the wildlife habitat

practices. Cost-share payments may be used to establish or replace practices. Land is not eligible for WHIP if it is currently enrolled in the Water Bank Program, Conservation Reserve Program, Wetlands Reserve Program, or other similar programs.

Under WHIP, applications are ranked. Habitat factors and point values will be assigned to the land or tract that is submitted for WHIP. Native habitat improvement and other types of improvements that are installed will govern the ranking of indi-

vidual applications.

Applications are being accepted at local offices. The application line will be May 31, 2002. For more information contact local county NRCS at 615 West Church, Booneville, or call 724-Ext. 3.

Local Water vigilantly safeguards its water supplies and once again we are very proud that our system has not violated a maximum contaminant level or any other water quality standard. This report shows the results for our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2001. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies.

Do I need to take special precautions?

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. Our water is purchased from the City of Iuka which consists of four (4) wells; three that draws from the Paleozoic Aquifer and one drawing from the Fort Payne Chert Aquifer.

Currently, our source water assessment is being prepared by the Mississippi State Department of Health. When completed you will be notified and copies will be made available upon request.

Why are there contaminants in my drinking water?

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Students Prepare For Rural Medical Needs

Mississippi's increasing need for doctors has spurred an opportunity for local students to prepare themselves for careers in the medical field.

"With one out of five doctors in Mississippi approaching retirement age, the state's need for doctors willingly escalate," said Bonnie Carew, rural health policy coordinator for Mississippi State University's Extension Service.

As the state with the fewest doctors per capita, almost half of Mississippi's population does not have access to a primary care provider. To help with this shortage and to keep future medical experts close to home, the Mississippi Rural Health Corps, a collaboration of the state's junior and community colleges and MSU's Extension Service, launched an intense summer learning program for interested students.

For six weeks each summer, high school students can preview college life by attending zoology and college algebra classes while staying in MSU residence halls. In addition to earning credits in those classes, students observe physicians in clinics and hospitals in Jackson, West Point, Tupelo and Columbus. Doctors provide an integral part of the learning experience by volunteering to let students see what they do on typical workdays.

"Without the experience of shadowing, it could be eight years before students know what their future careers will be like," Carew said.

Almost 100 students have taken advantage of the program since it began in 1998 and it continues to gain in popularity. The fee is only \$35, but the six-week experience could be invaluable. Admission requirements include a composite score of at least 25 on the ACT, completion of the junior year in high school, residence in Mississippi and a desire to learn about the field of medicine. 


Cindy Hudson Honored as Parent of the Year
