KRIS LANGE

Kris Lange is the son of Henry and Carolyn Terry and is a 2000 graduate of Tishomingo County High School.

An accounting major at Northeast, Lange served as president of the Student Government Association and was a member of the Campus Democrats, PTK and Phi Beta Lambda. He was the HEADWAE (Higher Education Appreciation Day-Working for Academic Excellence) student honoree from Northeast in 2002 and was listed on the President's List four consecutive semesters.

This fall Kris will attend the University of Mississippi on the Del-roach and Ray Scholarship of Accountancy to continue his pursuit of a master's degree in accounting. He also plans to attend law school.

The son of Lewis and Donna Wood and also a 2000 graduate of Tishomingo County High School, Brian Wood was a member of PTK. Wood was named Who's Who Among American Community/Junior College Students and was on the President's List his last three semesters at Northeast. He plans to major in chemical engineering at Mississippi State University this fall.

School Superintendent Mullins Resigns, Board Hires Moore, Parker To Top Positions

At the regular board meeting of the Tishomingo County Special Municipal School District on Tuesday evening, County School Superintendent John C. Mullins resigned his post after four years in the position.

Mr. Mullins, who took the job in 1998, will be leaving July 1, 2002.

Mullins, a native of Clarksdale, MS has accepted a job in Arab, AL, as superintendent.

According to an article in *The Huntsville Times* by Laranda Nichols, Mullins, one of five interviewed for the job, was the unanimous choice of the Arab City Board of Education.

He is scheduled to begin his duties on July 21 with a contract that calls for a \$92,500 annual salary over a three-year period.

John B. Moore Hired As Superintendent of the Tishomingo County School District

The Tishomingo County School Board voted unanimously Tuesday evening to hire John B. Moore, principal of Belmont High School, as the new Superintendent of Education for Tishomingo County.

Moore was hired to serve from July 1, 2002, until June 30, 2005, at an annual salary of \$80,000.

Also hired was Nancy Parker, the current principal at Luka Elementary, as the assistant superintendent to replace Terrell Kirkpatrick, who had resigned earlier this year.

Newly appointed Superintendent, John Moore began his career in Red Bay where he taught math for two years. He then came to the Tishomingo County Vocational School and taught math for the related vocational courses for another two years. He served as a Vocational Counselor at Vo-Tech for the next four years. He left the teaching profession to help his dad in the family business, Moore Chevrolet, for seven years.

In 1983-84 Moore rejoined the school ranks as principal at Belmont. He has been the principal there for the last 19 years.

John B. Moore, 55, said this job opportunity was a big surprise. Moore said he will bring his heart, work ethics, and love for Tishomingo County into the position. He also added that he plans to be fair, honest

and consistent in everything he does. Even after all of his years in education, he states he is still in the learning process, and is willing to learn something new each day. He wants to work with both students and parents to give Tishomingo County a better learning atmosphere.

Moore plans to keep the high standards that have already been set for Tishomingo County in motion. He wants Tishomingo County to continue to be one of the leading school districts in the state.

Moore also added that he plans to use the help and expertise of Ms. Nancy Parker to keep Tishomingo County one of the leading districts. He said he believes Ms. Parker will help bring a continuance of expertise to the district. Her knowledge of curriculum, testing, Mississippi standards, and methods of working with the elementary grades will continue to enhance Tishomingo County Schools.

Moore, who is a Tishomingo county native, said he plans to live here, be here and serve all of Tishomingo County.

Pickwick Lake Site of Memorial Day Weekend Boating Accident

In the first official holiday weekend of the summer, the first reported boating accident occurred on Saturday, May 25, 2002, on Pickwick Lake.

Saturday evening about 7:00 p.m. two boats apparently ran together on Pickwick Lake in Mississippi waters. Both boats involved were heavily damaged, and people in both crafts sustained injuries. According to MS Fish & Wildlife Officer, Rick Cornelison, the injured on the scene were transported to

the shore and then on to area hospitals, where they were treated. As of presstime, both had been released with minor injuries.

The injured included a 3-year-old boy from Brighton, TN, and a 43-year-old woman from Greenwood, MS. Names were withheld because the accident is still under investigation.

A second accident also occurred on Saturday, but details about this wreck were unavailable. Reports of an accident

involving a Wave Runner in Tennessee were also reported; however, this report could not be confirmed as of presstime.

Officer Cornelison, along with other Mississippi officials and Tennessee officials urge all boaters to be especially careful when boating in the highly congested waters of our area. Summer is just beginning and people need to make themselves aware of all the rules and regulations involved in operating boats and wave runners.

Tishomingo Librarian, Kathy Byram, To Retire

This week an institution in Tishomingo is retiring. Now, for the most part, you may think of an institution being made up of many persons and their work, but in this case, it is just one hard-working lady. Mrs. Kathy Byram is leaving her post as Librarian of Tishomingo's Margaret McRae Memorial Library after nine years.

She will be honored by the Town, many friends and library patrons with a reception Thursday afternoon from 3:30 to 4:30 at the Library.

"This is the third time I have retired, so maybe this time is the charm," said Mrs. Kathy, who for many years ran Kathy's Corner, a store and restaurant at the corner of Highway 25 and the Tishomingo State Park road. She is retiring from the library for health reasons.

Many Changes in Library

When Kathy Byram was talked into accepting the town librarian position by Anita McRae (who was then the librarian), the library occupied the same space on Main Street it does now (former location of Pro's Pool Hall from the 1950's through 70's), but it looked much different. There were perhaps half as many books in the building that had the same wooden door and pane-glass windows as it had had for many years. Dayton McRae (Anita's father) had donated the building to the Town in memory

of his beloved wife Margaret, and it had no air conditioning and a 5-brick gas heater to heat the whole building, according to Kathy.

A grant that was already in the works when Kathy was hired allowed for the renovation of the building. The result was the well-lighted, centrally-heated-and-cooled facility with large Main Street display windows that makes the Tishomingo Library the inviting place it is today. Retained in the renovation were the original ceilings and floors that add to the charm of the library.

"One thing I would still like to see done is a sign that says 'Margaret McRae Memorial Public Library'," said Mrs. Kathy. "We have never been able to put one up that said more than Tishomingo Library."

The Tishomingo Library serves not only the Town of Tishomingo, but residents of the surrounding area. As a part of the Northeast Regional Library Sys-

tem, patrons of the Tishomingo library have access to all the books in the other 13 member libraries and to the Internet and all the resources found there. The circulation and usage of the Tishomingo Library rank favorably when compared to other comparable small town libraries. Plus, many visitors to this small town make a point to visit the library.

Representing the Town
Like the friendly people visitors meet at Tishomingo State Park or the grocery store, Kathy is one of the people that represents Tishomingo to out-of-town visitors. During a library visit by this writer, she was heard giving directions and information about obtaining some of the Tishomingo stone for which this area is well known. There are many people in this town that when asked where to obtain Tishomingo Stone would have been able to offer nothing but a blank look. There is more than shelving books to the job of Tishomingo Librarian!

"Every year I have been here we have received visitors from other states and even foreign countries," reports Kathy. This year it was a group of six French students touring the United States on bicycles. They stopped at the Tishomingo Library to check their email and send their families email before heading towards Nashville. The Natchez Trace, and especially Tishomingo State Park, bring visi-

Weigh in begins at 4:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. Pulling begins at 7:00 p.m.

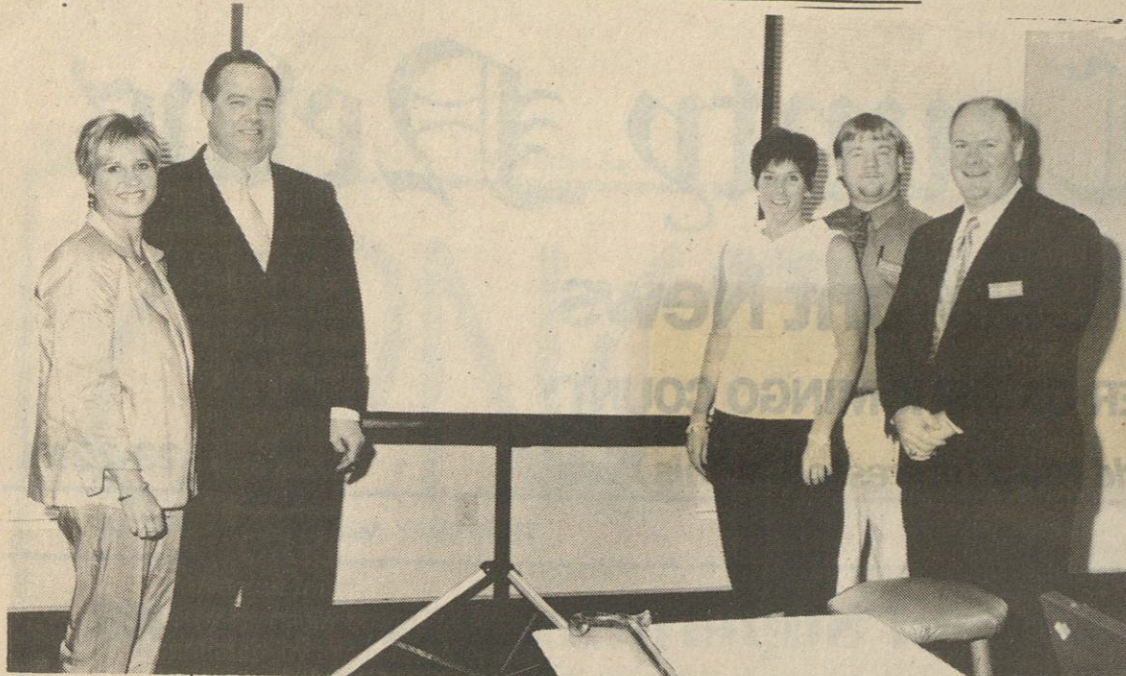

New Home For Nuisance Bear

After receiving complaints from some Mississippi and Alabama residents about a nuisance black bear, wildlife officials captured and moved the bear to the Jackson Zoological Park recently, announced Barbara Piazza, zoo director.

"The zoo is providing a safe, new home for this wild Louisiana black bear while offering the public a chance to see one of Mississippi's most rare creatures in captivity," said Piazza. "And, although Louisiana is part of this bear's official name, the Louisiana black bear is a native species to our state."

The Louisiana black bear, a federally protected subspecies of the American black bear, is typically elusive and humans seldom have an opportunity to see one in the wild. "But this bear," according to Bo Sloan, district supervisor for USDA Wildlife Services in Mississippi, "became a nuisance because someone started spreading corn in their backyard to feed wildlife. The bear got used to eating an easy meal and when the corn supply stopped, the bear started getting into people's garbage." Sloan added, "Yes, this was a problem bear but it was not born that way. We have to get the message across that people must not feed bears because it changes the bears' normal behavior."

Fortunately for this Louisiana

black bear, several agencies from two states cooperated and turned a potentially bad situation into a success story," said Richard Rummel, bear coordinator for the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks (MDWFP). "But we do want people to know that if there is a nuisance bear out there, we will take care of it so it will not be a problem to the community or to the bear itself."

This bear's story started back in November 2000 when residents

in Pearl River County, Mississippi reported a bear on their porch. Personnel with MDWFP and USDA Wildlife Services in Mississippi trapped, ear-tagged and radio-collared the bear. Then they relocated it to Old River Wildlife Management Area about 25 air miles away. The bear stayed only 13 days before heading back to Pearl River County. Residents began reporting bear sightings again but after a couple of weeks, the sightings stopped.

Ten months later, and more than 100 miles away, USDA Wildlife Services officials in Alabama contacted their counterparts in Mississippi to get information or a radio-collared, ear-tagged bear they had been seeing in Mobile County. The

Mississippi information identified the bear as the one from Pearl River County. In Alabama, the bear demonstrated similar nuisance behaviors such as getting into garbage and eating dog food around people's homes.

Such nuisance bear behaviors cause problems by increasing the risk of conflicts between humans and bears and usually results in capture and confinement for the bear or, as a last resort, euthanasia. However, this bear, being a protected species, had several



agencies working to keep it alive. After discussions between the MDWFP, USDA Wildlife Services, Black Bear Conservation Committee, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Mississippi Black Bear Restoration Task Force, Alabama Wildlife Federation, Alabama Black Bear Alliance, and the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources - Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division, all agencies agreed that life in the wild was no longer an option for this bear. Fortunately, the Jackson Zoological Park came to the

rescue.

Historically, there was life in the wild for many Louisiana black bears in Mississippi until 1900. "Habitat loss and human exploitation contributed to a population decline for this black bear subspecies causing it to be listed in 1992 as threatened under provisions of the Endangered Species Act," said Ray Aycock, field supervisor for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Mississippi Field Office. "But, the good news is the Louisiana black bear population has a chance to be recovered as long as agencies and people continue working together to benefit the bear."

Among other requirements, black bears need large blocks of land to live in the wild. Landowners, individuals and agencies are currently working together to identify remaining bear habitat, connect large land parcels and restore potential bear habitat like bottomland hardwoods through programs like the Wetlands Reserve. Because of this

cooperative effort, there may be a future opportunity to bring the Louisiana black bear back into the Mississippi landscape.

The federally threatened Louisiana black bear is protected in parts of Mississippi, Louisiana and east Texas and anyone harming this bear subspecies will face penalties described under the Endangered Species Act.

Why Regular Check-Ups?

How often should you have your eyes examined? People who know they have vision problems probably should see their eye doctor at least once a year. This is especially true for children and young people whose bodies are still growing and changing.

Once they reach adulthood and their eye problems seem under control, some people are content to stretch this time out a little longer. From my experience, I would recommend remaining on the annual schedule. There's a good reason for this.

Most people are aware of major changes in their vision. They know when printed words are becoming blurred at normal reading distance, or when they are experiencing headache or eyestrain. However, what they are NOT aware of are the subtle changes that come on slowly, such as early symptoms of glaucoma or retinal problems. These can be treated successfully if caught early and the only way to do that is by having a regular professional examination.

Summer Heat Problems

Summertime can be fun time for you and your pet. Unfortunately, the weather also increases chances for certain health problems. Ask your veterinarian what you can do to reduce the summer accidents.

Heat Stroke
Each summer many die of heat stroke. leave your pet in the car. Even with the windows cracked, an automobile heat up to over 100 degrees in a matter of minutes.

Insects, Snakes and Ticks
Dogs and cats are naturally curious creatures so they tend to probe defensive attacks of insects, snakes and ticks. The way to avoid problems is to supervise your pet's outdoor activities.

However, if your pet is stung by an insect, grab it by the collar and take it to a gentle cleaning area a gentle cleaning remove the stinger and apply ice. DO NOT give your pet aspirin, Tylenol or any other pain reliever intended for humans! A pet taking aspirin or Tylenol can suffer permanent damage, even death.

To avoid snakes, keep your pet away from swamps, rocky areas. If your pet is bitten, identify the snake and see a veterinarian immediately. Toads release a poison called bufotoxin that can make your pet ill. If your pet licks or bites a toad, wash out his mouth with large amounts of water.

Parasites
Warm weather brings with it an increased risk of internal and external parasites. To protect your pet from hookworms, roundworms, and whipworms, remove feces from your yard weekly or the litter box daily. Try to prevent your pet from eating soil, rodents and insects which may transmit worms. Bring a sample of your pet's stool to the veterinarian at least once a year. If your pet has a chronic problem with internal parasites, a veterinarian can prescribe preventive medication.

help avoid fleas and ticks. Keep the yard vegetation trimmed and mow the lawn often. By preventing exposure to fleas, you reduce the chance of tapeworms. Ask your veterinarian about a complete flea control program. Your veterinarian can recommend spot-on collars, and dips that are toxic to fleas, but non-toxic to you, your family or your pet.

Trauma
Because pets tend to roam more in the summer, their chance of being involved in an accident coming into contact with animals, people, automobiles also increases. Many cats are killed because windows are open and screens are not secure.

Tishomingo County SWCD Annual Convention Held April 9th, 2002

The Tishomingo County Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD) held their 2002 Annual Awards Banquet on April 9, 2002 at Tishomingo County High School Cafeteria. Chairman Gary Taylor welcomed guests and District technician Eddie Woodruff offered the invocation. Approximately 75 landowners, Earth Team Volunteers, and award winners were in attendance to hear the guest speaker, Paul Dillard. Mr. Dillard, Area 1 Natural Resources Conservation Service Resource Conservationist, spoke on current gov-

ernment programs now available to landowners.

Award winners were recognized for their outstanding efforts in natural resource management. Issac, Donnie, and Frank Williams, Jr. won the Pastureland Award. These brothers collectively own and work approximately 260 acres in Eastport, 70 acres in Indian Creek, and 50 acres in Mill Creek Communities. They have planted fescue and Bermuda grasses using no-till planting method, apply fertilizer, and spray for pest.

Eastport Wildlife Conser-

vation League won the Wildlife Award. The league is primarily

a deer hunting organization that controls 8,320 acres of land. Approximately 40 acres are utilized as "refuge" land with "No Hunting" whatsoever. There are approximately 70 food plots with about 300 pounds of mineral salt spread each year. The goal of the league is to maintain a viable, huntable population of deer and turkey for generations to come.

Ruth Rutledge won the Forestry Award. She has a total of 424 acres in forest land. There are 76 acres of Wetland under protection and 36 acres of upland hardwood left for wildlife. According to her field representative, she is a model person to work with.

The Cropland Award was granted to Johnny Vanderford. Johnny grows soybeans on his 110-acre farm in the Holts Spur Community. He applies a variety of conservation practices including terraces, contour farming, nutrient management and pest management. He reserves part of his crop each year for wildlife.

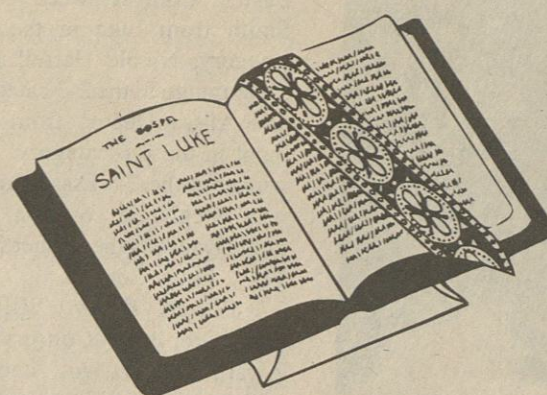

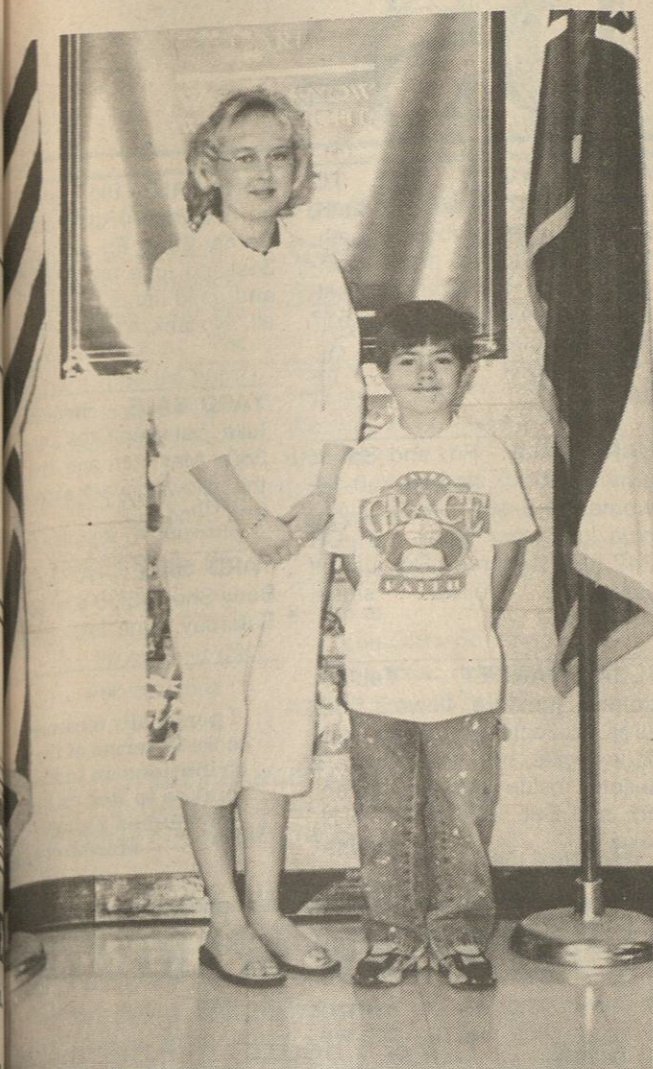

Komen Foundation - Tupelo affiliate has provided funding for some screening mammograms for medically underserved women in 15 counties in North Mississippi and you could qualify for one.

The American Cancer Society is helping to facilitate these free mammograms as an adjunct to its Tell A Friend program. If you think you qualify go to the Community Outreach Center - room 101 in the basement of the courthouse in Iuka on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. to fill out an application.
