School Superintendent Mullins Resigns, Board Hires Moore, **Parker To Top Positions**

At the regular board meeting of the Tishomingo County Special Municipal School District on Tuesday evening, County School Superintendent John C. Mullins resigned his post after four years in the posi-

Mr. Mullins, who took the job in 1998, will be leaving July 1, 2002.

Mullins, a native of Clarksdale, MS has accepted a job in Arab, AL, as superintendent.

According to an article in The Huntsville Times by Laranda Nichols, Mullins, one of five interviewed for the job, was the unanimous choice of the Arab City Board of Educa-

He is scheduled to begin his duties on July 21 with a contract that calls for a \$92,500 annual salary over a three-year period.

John B. Moore Hired As Superintendent of the Tishomingo County **School District**

The Tishomingo County School Board voted unanimously Tuesday evening to hire John B. Moore, principal of Belmont High School, as the new Superintendent of Education for Tishomingo County. Moore was hired to serve from July 1, 2002, until June 30, 2005, at an annual salary of \$80,000.

Also hired was Nancy Parker, the current principal at Iuka Elementary, as the assistant superintendent to replace Terrell Kirkpatrick, who had resigned earlier this year.

Newly appointed Superintendent, John Moore began his career in Red Bay where he taught math for two years. He then came to the Tishomingo County Vocational School and taught math for the related vocational courses for another two years. He served as a Vocational Counselor at Vo-Tech for the next four years. He left the teaching profession to help his dad in the family business, Moore Chevrolet, for seven years.

In 1983-84 Moore rejoined the school ranks as principal at Belmont. He has been the principal there for the last 19 years.

John B. Moore, 55, said this job opportunity was a big surprise. Moore said he will bring his heart, work ethics, and love for Tishomingo County into the position. He also added that he plans to be fair, honest

and consistent in everything he does. Even after all of his years in education, he states he is still in the learning process, and is willing to learn something new each day. He wants to work with both students and parents to give Tishomingo County a better learning atmosphere.

Moore also added that he plans to use the help and expertise of Ms. Nancy Parker to keep Tishomingo County one of the leading districts. Pickwick Lake Site of Memorial Day Weekend Boating Accident

weekend of the summer, the first reported boating accident occurred on Saturday, May 25, 2002, on Pickwick Lake.

Saturday evening about 7:00 p.m. two boats apparently ran together on Pickwick Lake in Mississippi waters. Both boats involved were heavily damaged, and people in both crafts sustained injuries. According to MS Fish & Wildlife Officer, Rick Cornelison, the injured on the scene were transported to

In the first official holiday the shore and then on to area involving a Wave Runner in hospitals, where they were treated. As of presstime, both had been released with minor

The injured included a 3year-old boy from Brighton, TN, and a 43-year-old woman from Greenwood, MS. Names were withheld because the accident is still under investigation.

A second accident also occurred on Saturday, but details about this wreck were unavailable. Reports of an accident

Tennessee were also reported; however, this report could not be confirmed as of presstime.

Officer Cornelison, along with other Mississippi officials and Tennessee officials urge all boaters to be especially careful when boating in the highly congested waters of our area. Tishomingo Librarian, Kathy Byram, To Retire

This week an institution in Tishomingo is retiring. Now, for the most part, you may think of an institution being made up of many persons and their work, but in this case, it is just one hard-working lady. Mrs. Kathy Byram is leaving her post as Librarian of Tishomingo's Margaret McRae Memorial Library after nine years.

She will be honored by the Town, many friends and library patrons with a reception Thursday afternoon from 3:30 to 4:30 at the

This is the third time I have retired, so maybe this time is the charm," said Mrs. Kathy, who for many years ran Kathy's Corner, a store and restaurant at the corner of Highway 25 and the Tishomingo State Park road. She is retiring from the library for health reasons.

Many Changes in Library

When Kathy Byram was talked into accepting the town librarian position by Anita McRae (who was then the librarian), the library occupied the same space on Main Street it does now (former location of Pro's Pool Hall from the 1950's through 70s'), but it looked much different. There were perhaps half as many books in the building that had the same wooden door and pane-glass windows as it had had for many years. Dayton McRae (Anita's father) had donated the building to the Town in memory

of his beloved wife Margaret, and it had no air conditioning and a 5-brick gas heater to heat the whole building, according to

A grant that was already in the works when Kathy was hired allowed for the renovation of the building. The result was the wellcentrally-heated-andcooled facility with large Main Street display windows that makes the Tishomingo Library the inviting place it is today. Retained in the renovation were the original ceilings and floors that add to the

charm of the library. "One thing I would still like to see done is a sign that says 'Margaret McRae Memorial Public Library'," said Mrs. Kathy. "We have never been able to put one up that said more than Tishomingo Library.

The Tishomingo Library serves not only the Town of Tishomingo, but residents of the surrounding area. As a part of the Northeast Regional Library System, patrons of the Tishomingo library have access to all the books in the other 13 member libraries and to the Internet and all the resources found there. The circulation and usage of the Tishomingo Library rank favorably when compared to other comparable small town libraries. Plus, many visitors to this small town make a point to

visit the library Representing the Town

Like the friendly people visitors meet at Tishomingo State Park or the grocery store, Kathy is one of the people that represents Tishomingo to out-of-town visitors. During a library visit by this writer, she was heard giving directions and information about obtaining some of the Tishomingo stone for which this area is well known. There are many people in this town that when asked where to obtain Tishomingo Stone would have been able to offer nothing but a blank look. There is more than shelving books to the job of

Tishomingo Librarian! "Every year I have been here we have received visitors from other states and even foreign countries," reports Kathy. This year it was a group of six French students touring the United States on bicycles. They stopped at the Tishomingo Library to check their email and send their families email before heading towards Nashville. The Natchez Trace, and especially Tishomingo State Park, bring visi-

New Home For Nuisance Bear

from some Mississippi and Alabama residents about a nuisance black bear, wildlife officials captured and moved the bear to the Jackson Zoological Park recently, announced Barbara Piazza, zoo director.

"The zoo is providing a safe, new home for this wild Louisiana black bear while offering the public a chance to see one of Mississippi's most rare creatures in captivity," said Piazza. "And, although Louisiana is part of this bear's official name, the Louisiana black bear is a native species to our

The Louisiana black bear, a federally protected subspecies of the American black bear, is typically elusive and humans seldom have an opportunity to see one in the wild. "But this bear," according to Bo Sloan, district supervisor for USDA Wildlife Services in Mississippi, "became a nuisance because someone started spreading corn in their backyard to feed wildlife. The bear got use to eating an easy meal and when the corn supply stopped, the bear started getting into people's garbage." Sloan added, "Yes, this was a problem bear but it was not born that way. We have to get the message across that people must not feed bears because it changes the bears' normal behavior."

Fortunately for this Louisiana

black bear, several agencies from two states cooperated and turned a potentially bad situation into a success story," said Richard Rummel, bear coordinator for the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks (MDWFP). "But we do want people to know that if there is a nuisance bear out there, we will take care of it so it will not be a problem to the community or to the bear itself."

This bear's story started back

Mississippi information identified the bear as the one from Pearl River County. In Alabama, the demonstrated similar nuisance behaviors such as getting into garbage and eating dog food around people's homes.

Such nuisance bear behaviors cause problems by increasing the risk of conflicts between humans and bears and usually results in capture and confinement for the bear or, as a last resort, euthanasia. However, this bear, being a protected species, had several



agencies working to keep it alive. After discussions between the MDWFP. USDA Wildlife Services, Black Bear Conservation Committee, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Mississippi Black Bear Restoration Task Force, Alabama Federation, Alabama Black Bear Alliance, and the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources - Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Division, all agencies agreed that life in the wild was no longer an option for this bear. Fortunately, the Jackson Zoological Park came to the

Historically, there was life in the wild for many Louisiana black bears in Mississippi until 1900. "Habitat loss and human exploitation contributed to a population decline for this black bear subspecies causing it to be listed in 1992 as threatened under provisions of the Endangered Species Act," said Ray Aycock, field supervisor for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Mississippi Field Office. "But, the good news is the Louisiana black bear population has a chance to be recovered as long as agencies and people continue working together to benefit the bear.

Among other requirements, black bears need large blocks of land to live in the wild. Landowners, individuals and agencies are currently working together to identify remaining bear habitat, connect large land parcels and restore potential bear habitat like bottomland hardwoods through programs like the Wetlands Reserve. Because of this

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cooperative effort, there may be a future opportunity to bring the Louisiana black bear back into the Mississippi landscape.

The federally threatened Louisiana black bear is protected in parts of Mississippi, Louisiana and east Texas and anyone harming this bear subspecies will face penalties described under the Endangered Species Act.

The program will be in


