

Emergency Storm Warning Sirens To Be Tested Today!

Sirens will sound when severe storms approach Iuka

Emergency weather warning sirens will sound this Thursday morning in testing activities for the new Emergency Weather Warning System. All residents should be aware that Thursday's sounding of the sirens are for testing purposes only.

Last spring, the City of Iuka secured funding to install an Emergency Weather Warning System; and this Thursday, the sirens will be sounded for the first time to test the system.

In the event of severe weather and/or approaching tornadoes, this system will be used to forewarn residents. A sophisticated computer system connected to the National Weather Service will send weather warnings to the Iuka computer, housed in Iuka City Hall; and in turn, Iuka employees and/or the computer can turn the three rotating sirens on.

The three large warning sirens are located atop poles

Grayco Construction Co. of Falkner was awarded the contract to do the necessary earthwork for the runway expansion at the Iuka Airport. Grayco received the contract at the Monday, Sept. 23, Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors' meeting.

Grayco submitted the lowest of the eight bids submitted at a cost of \$133,113. The next closest bid was for \$149,311; and the highest bid was for \$418,127.

According to Kirby McRae

of Dean McRae Engineering Co. of luka the estimated cost of the project was \$167,333.

This project will prepare the earthwork on the north end of the runway necessary for the 800 ft. expansion of the runway. Clearing, seeding and erosion control are also included in the contract. Paving of the runway will begin next year after additional funds are secured. Eventual plans call for the runway to be extended another 1,500 to 2,000 feet.

4-H TALK By Mary C. Baldwin, Extension 4-H/Youth Agent

As you read this, the Tishomingo County Fair is underway. For those of you who don't know, the Extension Service staff and volunteers work to get the building ready and make improvements in the days leading up the the fair. Needless to say, it's a very stressful time.

I thought this would be a good time to share some of the things that can help relieve stress when it builds to a breaking point. This information comes from the 4-H Health Rocks! lessons.

Think about the last time you felt stress. Was the stress based on outside factors, such as friends or parents who were hassling you? Was in based on an adrenaline rush, such as nervousness before a game or speech? Was it based on something that you believe you can't change about yourself?

If stress comes from outside factors, certain techniques such as: rethinking the event, imagery relaxation, listening to music and being with others may help reduce stress.

CARPE DIEM

Tishomingo and adjoining counties: \$18 per year

Other Areas: \$25 per year

If stress comes from adrenaline or fear, certain other techniques such as relaxation exercises and breathing control may help reduce stress.

Our minds and bodies are like a sponge. They keep filling with stress like a sponge fills with water until finally, we can't hold anymore. We can find good ways of getting rid of stress or find ways to reduce the amount of stress that comes in.

If you feel STRESSED, you need to make it SMALL! Here are some steps you can take.

1) Spotlight your talents and hard work!

2) Make parents and those that judge you real. They'll respect you no matter what happens.

3) Always take one step at a time.

4) Life is full of big events and tests. Chill!

5) Leave for a brain road

trip! Burn rubber and leave the stress behind, heading straight for your goal!

Think about the last event that stressed you out. Use the above five steps to visualize making an event SMALL!

Sometimes when we are stressed, we tense our muscles. This makes us physically ache and feel tired. Here are some relaxation exercises that can help d-stress our bodies.

1) Think of a magic word. It's a word that only you know.

2) Form a fist. Hold it as tight as you can for a count of five. Slowly relax your fist until it's like it was before. Now, can you relax it further? Say your magic word quietly when you are done.

3) Clench your jaw. Hold it as tight as you can for a count of five. Slowly relax your jaw until it's like it was before. Now, can you relax it further? Say your magic word silently when you are done.

4) Hunch your shoulders way, way up. Hold them as tight as you can for a count of five. Slowly relax them until they are like they were before. Can you relax them further? Whisper your magic word when you are done.

5) Tense your leg or foot. Hold it as tight as you can for a count of five. Slowly relax your foot or leg until it's like it

magic word, you might ask. Using your magic word reminds you to relax when you are tense.

I hope these simple tips will help relieve some of the stress in your life. I plan to use them to relieve some of my stress over the next several

*keeping any cards or information on documents such as driver's license, insurance cards, social security cards, deposit slips, withdrawal slips, credit card purchase receipts, financial institution statements, credit card statements, investment updates, credit card solicitations, etc .- where they will be

safe. *shredding of any of these items before disposal,

*putting trash out only shortly before pickup so garbage cannot be pilfered.

*mailing payments, etc. and other items that contain personal information at a dropbox rather than from rural boxes,

*not giving any personal information in person, over the phone or Internet or Websites that do not use encryption or other secure methods to protect them. (Firewalls should be put on highspeed Internet connections.) *not using familiar items in establishing PINs (Personal Identification Numbers)

*examining credit card and financial statements immediately upon

receipt to determine whether there were any unauthorized transactions. Report any unauthorized transactions that you find immediately.

*obtaining credit reports annually from each of the three major credit reporting agencies to be sure they are accurate, and asking to be removed from telephone solicitation lists. (You may remove your name from the lists of national marketers by writing to the DMA Telephone Preference Service at PO Box 9014, Farmingdale, NY 11735-9014.).

*contact the three major credit reporting agencies to put yourself on Fraud Alert and request a copy of your credit report:

The three major crediting reporting companies are Equifax-800-525-6285; Experian-800-397-3742 or TransUnion-800-680-7289; *cancel all accounts that have fraudulent activity; and *contact local law enforcement agencies,





Squirrel Hunting Opens

One of the most anticipated days of the year is just ahead for northern Mississippi hunters. It's the opening of squirrel season in Zone 1, according to the Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks.

The season there opens Sept. 28 and continues through Feb. 28.

Zone 1 is that area of Mississippi north of Highway 82 plus those portions of Sunflower and Washington counties south of Highway 82.

The daily bag limit is eight, and the possession limit is 16. A possession limit is not permitted on the opening day of any season.

Hunters must have a valid hunting license signed and on their person before going to the woods.

Shooting hours for squirrel hunting are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.



Also, waterfowl hunters must have their shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells.

Old Tishomingo Traces

by June Bullard

Back in 1936 during the building of Pickwick Dam, the Works Progress Administration had interviews with local people about the history of the area. Later these stories were put on microfilm. Brenda Whitfield bought some of those tapes and was kind enough to let me use them for this column. Following is some of the stories I transcribed from these tapes:

TREES

At the old Reddin Burt Place there are some cedars and some old mulberry trees. At the Henry Burt place now known as the John Hodge Place was an initial pine tree near the roadside. Many people have carved their initials and the dates in the bark of the friendly old pine tree. Insects infested the body causing it to die some years ago.

In the yard of our late G. P. Hammerly is a row of cedars, and just a few feet nearer the house is a row of water oaks. Just recently the cedars have been cut, on account of their dense shade in the yard. Nothing has been done to preserve these trees, anymore than keeping them from being broken, when they were young and tender. They are on an average of 54 inches around and about 50 feet high. On the east side of the home stands a catalpa, the largest one of those trees, it has about the same height but is 75 inches through. It grew from a small twig found near the stair of an old frame building owned by Mr. Hammerly. Three trees are about 62 years old according to his daughter, Mrs. Laura

Hammerly Copeland. The George P. Hammerly home was built in 1852.

CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS

Theodore Francis Gross was born in W. Virginia. He left his home and enlisted in the Civil War in April 1861. He was in Co. A. He was never discharged from his command and was not in active service at the surrender in 1865.

Mr. Gross was captured and kept in prison up north for some time. When he was let out



health and fell into the fire when she was alone and burned to death. The print of her toes, when she was burning stayed there until a new floor was built.

When Mr. Harris lived there, a lady, McNairy Smallwood, who was visiting them, cut her throat. She lived only a B few days.

Whit Bryant lived there for a short time, then Mr. Clement bought it. Mr. Jack Ford bought it from Mr. Clement for \$600 in 1904. His son Paul Ford bought it after his father's death. Then George Gardner, a Baptist preacher, bought it. After that Jim Ford bought it and still owns the house, orchard, pasture and garden. 

of prison, he stayed in the north for awhile and then started for home. He stopped at the place where Sheffield now is and worked some. There at that place he made a boat and drifted down the river to Tishomingo County. He settled in the county and spent the remaining part of his life here. In the latter part of his life, he talked of going to see his people but never did. Ref. His widow Mrs. Fannie Gross, Burnsville, MS.

Mr. Thomas Blakney voluntarily enlisted in the Civil War September 24, 1862. He was hospital steward and made many trips to New Orleans, LA after medicine. He served for three years and was given a discharge at the headquarters at Fort Gaines, AL June 14, 1865. Henry Clark was his regiment commander. Ref. Mrs. Edna Gross Blakney, Burnsville, MS April 29, 1936.

Mr. Joe Ford of Burnsville enlisted in 1863. He was in the Federal Army in Co. A. He guarded soldiers.

OLD HOMES

The house known as The

Old Ford House, located northwest of Burnsville was built three or four years before the Civil War for Jerry Burns. Burnsville was named for him. There are six rooms, two large 20' rooms, kitchen, dining room, small bedroom, pantry and a large closet hall. The rooms are sealed with wide, hand-planed lumber and painted. The two chimneys are built in with large closets on either side of the large fireplaces, about 1/4 of the land north of the railroad belonged with that place when it was first built.
