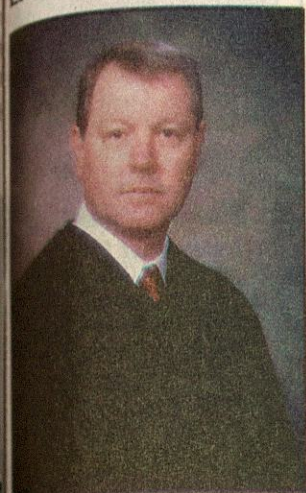

Judge Richard Bowen Seeks Election On November 5th, 2002

Judge Richard Bowen announces his candidacy for Circuit Court Judge of the First District of Mississippi, which includes the Counties of Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Monroe, Pontotoc, Prentiss and Tishomingo. Judge Bowen has served as your Circuit Court Judge since October, 2000.

Having lived in Tishomingo County since 1977, Judge Bowen is a native of Webster County, Mississippi, and is married to the former Vicki Jordan of Corinth. He was born in Eupora and grew up just outside Mathiston where he graduated from high school in 1968. Judge Bowen attended Holmes and Wood Junior Colleges and graduated from Mississippi State University in 1972. That same year he entered the University of Mississippi School of Law wherein he received his Juris Doctor in 1974. Judge Bowen served on the staff of the University of Mississippi Law Center and left

the position of Director of the Intern Program there to become an Assistant District Attorney for this same seven county district in 1979. Judge Bowen remained in that position, until October 1988, and during part of that time also served as County Prosecuting Attorney for Tishomingo County, a position to which he was twice elected, as well as City Attorney and Prosecutor for Iuka, Belmont and Golden and as a Special Master in Chancery Court. Judge Bowen was in private practice from 1988 until his appointment as Circuit Judge.

Judge Bowen attended the National Judicial College in Reno, Nevada and has completed the required course for Mississippi judges. Since his appointment as Circuit Judge, he has presided over numerous trials in every county in this district, both civil and criminal. Judge Bowen is a judge for the decent, law-abiding and working men and women, and his record proves it. Serving as Circuit Judge, Richard Bowen has brought needed changes to the First Circuit Court and has worked hard to solve problems and effectively deal with a heavy caseload. This district is one of the three largest in the state, geographically and by population and workload. As Judge Bowen's record clearly demonstrates, he works hard to make sure the Court's business is handled in an expeditious manner.

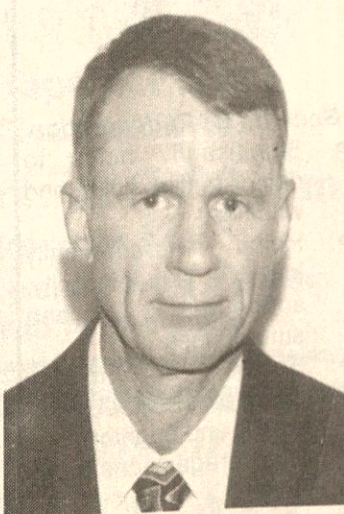
George Waddell Candidate For District 5 State Senator

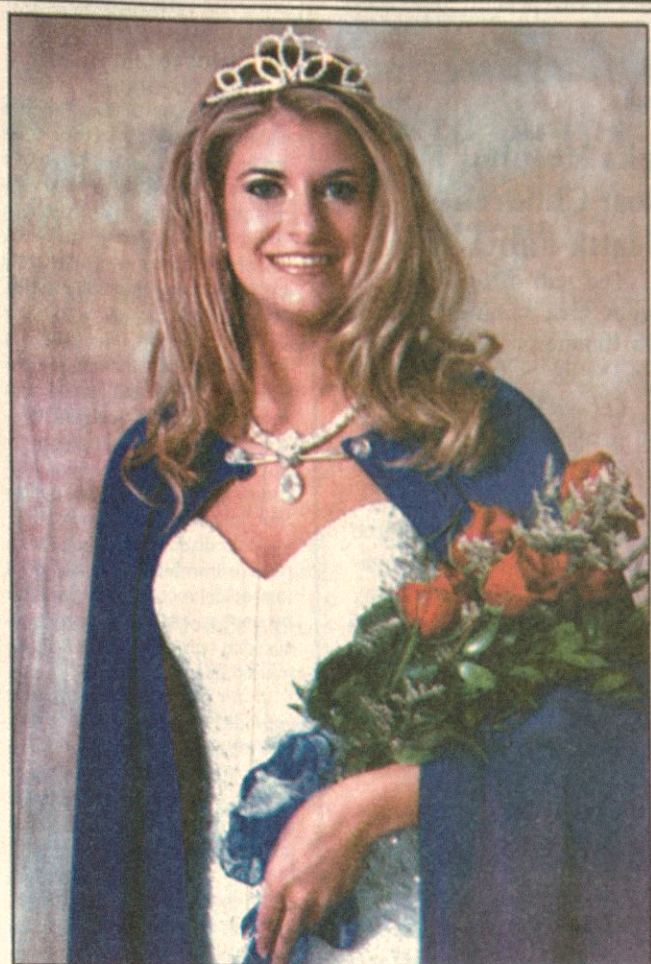

Bush-Hog Accident Results In Death of Burnsville Resident

A tragic accident with a tractor/bush-hog last Friday afternoon claimed the life of long-time Burnsville resident Junior Dotson.

He got off the tractor/bush-hog to fix whatever was wrong, and it apparently rolled backwards trapping him. A family member, looking out a window, realized that something was wrong and immediately called 911. Emergency personnel from Burnsville, Holts Spur, and Iuka responded. An EMT traveling on Hwy. 365 stopped at the scene. AirEvac was notified, and they transported Mr. Dotson to North Mississippi Medical Center where he later died. The family is very thankful to all those who responded to the accident.

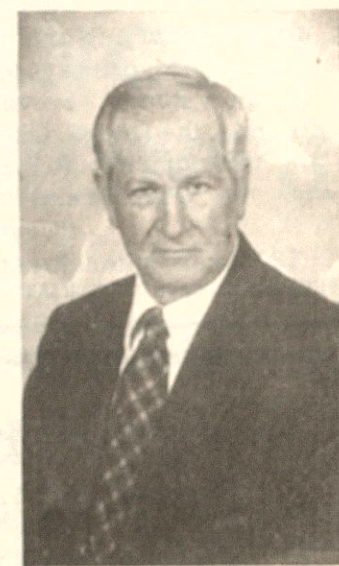

1. Gather and organize all work materials before beginning to study.

5. Make a list in a daily planner or calendar of homework to be done each day.

MORE THAN MIGHT BE SUSPECTED RECOVERING FROM AN INJURY

The longer it takes for an injured person to recover from an injury, the greater his or her pain and suffering and consequential damages. With this in mind, those injured in accidents, for which liability may ultimately be found with the other party, should work closely with their doctors to report their progress (or lack thereof). Making regular visits to a physician, weeks and months after an accident, provides a record that an injury required ongoing attention. Furthermore, visits to the doctor that involve reports of continuing pain discomfort, and/or stiffness or immobility will be noted in medical records that can later be sent to the other party's insurance company as part of the injured party's claim.

If an injury has interrupted your life, it might be wise to talk to a legal professional about the possibility of receiving compensation. If you need assistance with matters involving personal injury, car wrecks, wrongful deaths, medical malpractice, civil rights claims, product liability, train accidents, or insurance bad faith, we would be happy to help. HINT: If you can show that an injury sustained in an accident left a long-lasting or permanent effect ("residual injury"), the amount of your damages award could go up significantly.

Safety Glasses

Millions of people should be wearing some form of eye protection while engaged in hazardous activities, whether on the job or while pursuing hobbies at home. The type and degree of eye protection depends on the nature of the hazards which they face.

All corrective lenses prescribed by doctors of optometry are, by law, impact resistant. Impact resistant spectacles provide LIMITED frontal protection against flying particles. However, "impact-resistant" lenses will break.

"Safety glasses", on the other hand, contain lenses which meet industrial safety lens standards which are significantly more stringent. These glasses offer considerably more protection than those which are merely "impact resistant".

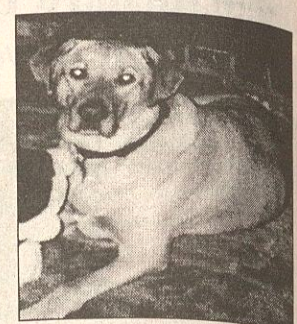
For maximum protection, especially against the hazard of flying particles, safety thickness goggles are recommended. These may be worn over regular glass and offer both frontal and side protection.

Tapeworms In Dogs What are tapeworms?

Tapeworms are flattened intestinal worms that are made up of many small segments - about 1/4-1/2 inch (3-5 mm) long. Unlike roundworms that live freely in the intestinal tract, tapeworms attach to the wall of the small intestine by hook-like mouthparts.

The most common tapeworm of dogs and cats is *Dipylidium caninum*. The adult worms may reach up to 8 inches (20 cm) in length. The individual segments are developed from the head end and gradually mature, finally being shed at the opposite end, either singly or in short chains. These segments are passed in the feces when the dog defecates. They are about 3 mm (1/8") long and look like grains of rice. Occasionally they can be seen moving on the hairs around the anus or on freshly passed feces. As the tapeworm segment dries, it becomes a golden color and the fertilized eggs are released into the environment.

Unlike roundworms, dogs cannot be infected by eating fertilized tapeworm eggs. Tapeworms must first pass through an intermediate host, a flea, before they can infect a dog or cat.

How do dogs get tapeworms?

When the infected eggs are released into the environment, they have to be swallowed by immature fleas (larvae) also in the environment. Once inside the larval stage of the flea, the tapeworm egg then develops into an infective tapeworm in the adult flea. During grooming or in response to a flea's bite, the dog can ingest the flea with the infective tapeworm and the life cycle is completed.

Are tapeworms dangerous for my dog?

Tapeworms do not normally cause serious health problems in dogs. Occasionally dogs will drag their bottoms on the ground (scooting) in order to allay this irritation but this behavior can be for other reasons such as impacted anal sacs.

In puppies, heavy tapeworm infestation can be more serious. Lack of growth, anemia and intestinal blockage can occur. Occasionally, the head of the tapeworm (scolex) detaches from the intestinal wall. The worm can then be passed either in the feces or vomited.

How is diagnosis made?

Clinical diagnosis is usually made by observing the white mobile tapeworm segments in the feces or crawling around the anus. They often look like grains of rice.

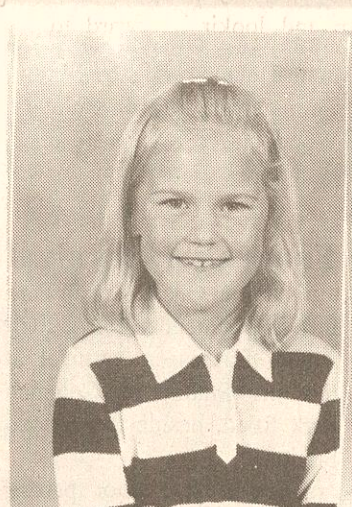
Burnsville School Student Of The Month (K-4)...

their home?

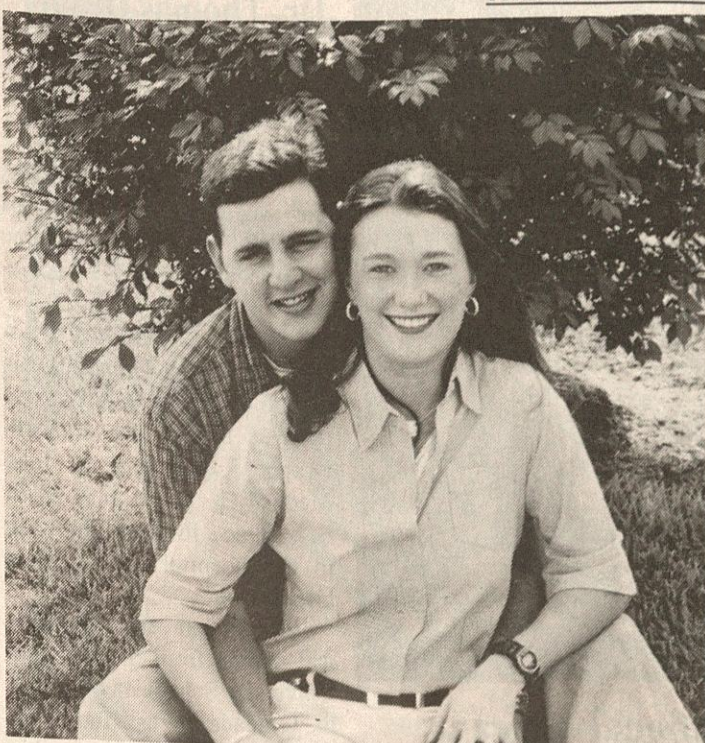

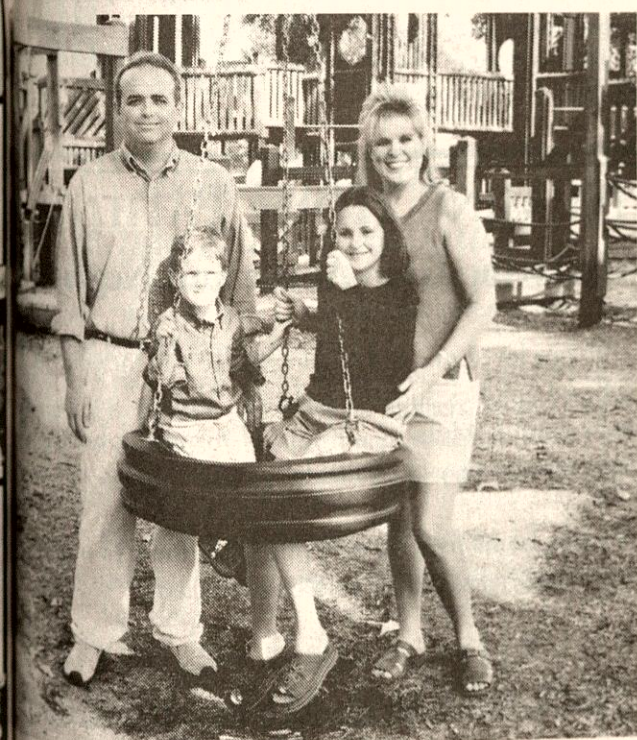

My Pa-Paw and my best friend.

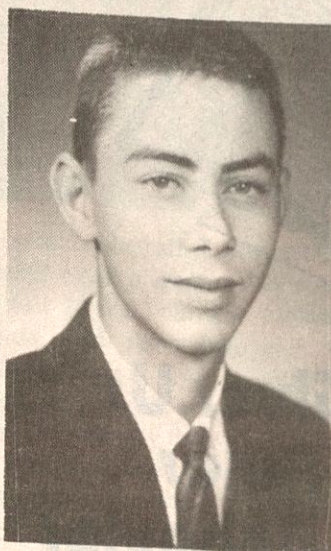

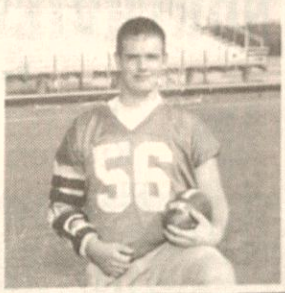
the end of the first quarter was Oxford 21, TCHS 0.

Feb. 2, 1893 Thomas Davis of Yellow Creek neighborhood left for Texas last week. He carried his stock and house trailer with him by a chartered

Nov. 16, 1893 James Ganong left Sunday for Hill Co., Texas. This makes five Iuka families to leave for Texas in the last 30 days.

Nov. 2, 1893 Z.H. Woodall and family left here Sunday for Hill Co., Texas. Mr. Woodall is an old citizen of this place and is well known throughout the county. He served as town marshal in Iuka for several years and was on one or two terms as high sheriff.

Nov. 14, 1893 The following families left for Texas on Tuesday morning last: Bud Pollard and family, T.L. Gates and family, Alfred Tarver and family, and A.A. Green.

Nov. 16, 1893 Dr. James M. Burt leaves this week for Texas, where he expects to make his future home.

Nov. 23, 1893 George Reagin and family leave this week for Texas, where they expect to make their future home.

Nov. 20, 1893 Mills, Nov. 20, 1893 Prof. R. M. Burt, of this place, left Iuka last month for Texas, where we learn he is located and will continue to teach music. I have lately read his valedictory poem while reading it thought of many classes he has successfully taught in Tishomingo and adjoining counties. I regret the earnestness, zeal and courage with which this man went forth teaching those who were amid the cry of hard

times, with small pay, thus giving every evidence that he was not teaching for the money, but to impart knowledge to the pupils, to ameliorate that of the worship of God, and to advance the cause of Christ. He will be sadly missed in our ranks. Indeed the work he

has done here, in the field of song will live on for many years after Brother Burt has passed on to the Brighter Shore.

Through the kindness of The Reporter, I give Bro. Burt's valedictory press to his many friends, feeling that it will largely be appreciated:
