## Sheriff's Deputies Stop Home Repair Scam Aimed At Elderly Residents

### Three Charged In Multi-State Operation

The quick action by an Iuka woman and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department landed two "gypsy travelers" in the county jail after they apparently scammed an elderly couple.

According to John David Murphy, Human Relations Officer with the Sheriff's Department, he and Chief Deputy Rodney Pannell answered a call Thursday afternoon, January 9th, that led to the arrest of two men, Teddy E. Girton and Manuel Cooper, who were wanted throughout several states for theft by deception.

Officer Murphy said he and Pannell received a call around 1:00 Thursday afternoon from an elderly lady who lives on Hwy. 25 north of Iuka in the Old Central School area. She reported that she was suspicious of two men who had come to her home wanting to do repair work on her roof. She had a metal roof, and they indicated they had put the metal roof on her house and they wanted to tighten some loose screws. She did not know the men and refused to let them do the work. She immediately called the Sheriff's Department and gave them a description of the pickup the men were traveling in.

Officers Murphy and Pannell answered the call and traveled Hwy. 25 North to the State Line looking for the truck. As they were returning to Crossroads they spotted a late model white Dodge extended cab, short-wheel-base truck at a home near the railroad bridge in the Poplar Springs area. When the officers stopped to check out the truck, they found one suspect standing near the truck and another suspect in the back yard with the elderly couple who lived there. The men had already "sprayed" the couple's house with what appeared to be black tar on their red roof. The men had apparently charged the

couple \$450 for the work, but some \$2000 was missing from the couple's home. It was also discovered that the phone line to the house had been cut.

As the deputies questioned the men, one of the suspects, Teddy Girton, fled on foot. Pannell and Murphy, called for backup, and the pursuit of the suspect began. Some time later Girton was caught on the railroad track by Officer Murphy.

According to Sheriff David Smith, the two men, and two females who were picked up on Thursday night after attempting to make bail for the men, are

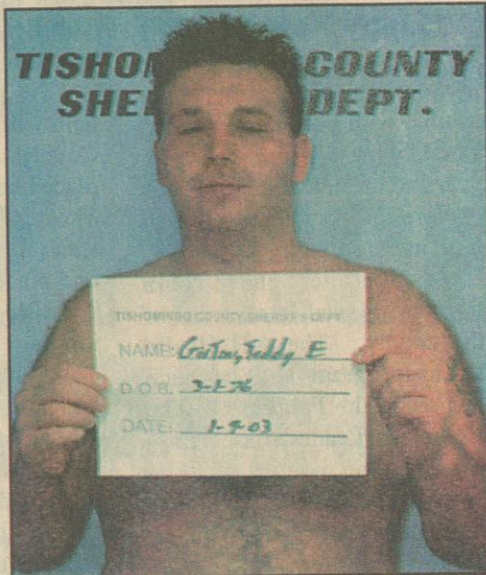
believed to be part of a nation-wide tribe of "gypsies" who travel from state to state scamming people. Girton and Cooper are wanted for questioning in South Carolina, Alabama, Woodstock, Ill.,

Tennessee, and Kentucky. The men had prior charges of theft by deception and home repair fraud in La Grange, Kentucky, Woodstock, Ill., and Waukegan, Ill.

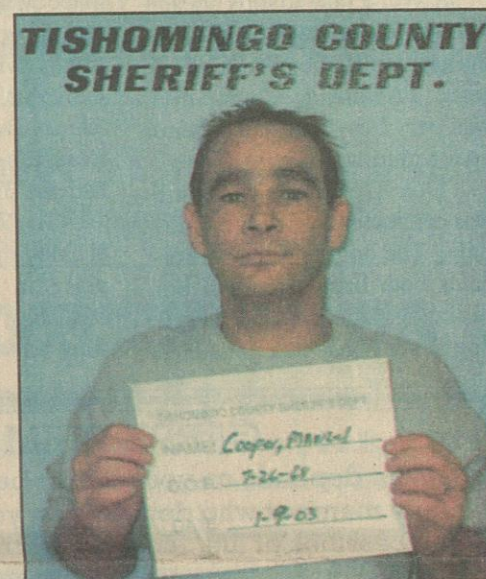
According to Chief Investigator, Bobby Flynt, Girton and a female accomplice, were being sought by the local department for questioning in connection with the December 18, 2002 scam of an elderly Tishomingo lady. The suspects did a repair job on a home on CR 958. They apparently sprayed water on the roof and asked for over \$8,000. The lady wrote them a check then later stopped payment on the check. The couple tried to cash the check at BankcorpSouth but fled before the authorities could catch them.

#### CHARGES

Arrested were Teddy E. Girton 26, of Mt. Juliet, Tenn. and Manuel Cooper, 34, of Benton, Ark. Also arrested in connection with the scam were the men's wives Levie Linda Stanley Girton, 30, and

Rhonda Cooper, 31. Teddy Girton has been charged with two counts of felony false pretense and resisting arrest. He is currently being held on a \$10,000 bond. Manuel Cooper and Levie Girton were both charged with one count of felony false pretense. They are both being held on \$5,000 bond each. Rhonda Cooper was held for questioning, but was released without charges on Monday. Other charges are possible as the investigation is ongoing. All of the charges in this case fall under the Senior Citizens Vulnerability Act, according to investigator Bobby Flynt.

The sheriff's department is releasing photos of the suspects and a copy of their business card. If these men have approached you or your loved ones in the past, please contact the sheriff's department at 423-7000. It is important that people report any suspicious characters who come to their homes, and also take notice of suspicious cars or characters who are at your neighbors' homes.

According to TRIAD Coordinator Walter Vaughn, the capture and arrest of those involved in the home repair scam in our county last week is a direct result of the education of our local officers and elderly residents by Sheriff Smith through program such as TRIAD.

"Sheriff Smith has made the senior citizens a priority and has made sure that his officers do the same," Vaughn stated. "Because of this training, the suspects in this latest home repair scam were caught in the act."

## Segars Family Initiates Educational Loan Fund At NEMCC

Dr. Kelly Segars of Iuka, his wife Martha and their children have established the Segars Family Educational Loan Fund at Northeast Mississippi Community College to offer short-term loans to students.

Administered by the college's development foundation, the primary use of the loan fund will be for students in need of funds to purchase textbooks, according to Patrick Eaton, director of NEMCC's Development Foundation.

In the fall of 2002, approximately 120 students were issued charge forms due to incomplete financial aid files. Historically, approximately 40 percent of students are eligible for some type of financial aid. This data suggests that such a fund could serve at least 50 students per semester, Eaton said.

"Many students, including single parents, working adults, or adults with several children on a fixed or limited income have no place to turn for temporary financial assistance.

"Many times, as a result, stu-

dents either do not register or start the term at the risk of falling behind in classwork because of their lack of textbooks. This revolving loan fund for the purchase of books addresses this problem. It will allow students to borrow aid until financial aids forms are complete. Students may pay the loan off in installments or in one lump sum during the semester.

"Textbook costs range from \$70 to \$90 per course," Eaton said. A student enrolled in five courses (15 credit hours) can expect to spend approximately \$350 to \$450.

"Dr. and Mrs. Segars and the entire Segars family are to be commended for the generosity they have shown to the students of NEMCC.

"I am so very pleased they feel Northeast is worthy of such a tremendous gift," Eaton added.

Eaton stated that the fund should be available for 2003 summer terms and will continue as long as funds are available.

Northeast's Development Foundation, a non-profit corporation, is specifically responsible for gift programs involving estate

planning, real estate, insurance, endowments, annuities, trusts, pooled income funds or other special gifts that require ongoing management or binding agreements. Equally important, the Foundation manages and invests all private gifts to the college. It exists to serve Northeast MS Community College by providing programs and benefits not fully provided by other sources.

The Foundation is governed by a board of directors which establishes policy for all its functions - fund raising, public relations, administration, accounting, and investments. Members of the Northeast Foundation board of directors establish policy for all its functions - fund raising, public relations, administration, accounting, and investments.

The board is composed of 19 members representing the five counties the college serves. Rickey Settlemyres of Ripley is currently president of the board. Members include Paul Haynes of Baldwyn; Dr. Bill Jackson, Mary McLendon, Larry McCollum, and Kenneth Williams of Corinth; Danny Dilworth of Rienzi; Art

Jumper, Thomas D. Keenum and Don Murphy of Booneville; Bobby Martin and Troy Holliday of Ripley; Kenny Hill of Blue Mountain; Dr. Phillip Gray, Harold Lomenick, and Jack Ramsey of Iuka; Greg

Pharr of Belmont; Brenda Reedy of New Albany; and NEMCC Student Government Association president Chris Martin of Columbus.

4-H leaders have club meetings planed in all areas of the county. The 4-H Health Rocks program will be back beginning in February. The Volunteer Leader Association is sponsoring a series of scrap booking workshops with the first one scheduled for January 23rd.

Not only is the beginning of the year a time to look ahead, it's also a time to look back at the accomplishments of the past year. Tishomingo County 4-H was very busy and had several honors during 2002.

Dog Obedience Training was conducted over two months time. The dogs and the participants both learned quite a bit, including patience. We have a dog at our house that graduated

and will still set and heel on command. He had a late start so he has trouble with "stay" but no trouble with "come".

Robert Martin represented Tishomingo County and Mississippi at the National 4-H Conference held at Washington, DC in April 2002. He brought back some great stories as well as opportunities to serve on many 4-H planning committees in Mississippi.

Three additional leaders were trained in the 4-H Field and Stream program. This was great since this is one of the fastest growing 4-H programs in the county. Through this program Tishomingo County 4-H had two members qualify for the State 4-H Invitational

Shooting Match last June. From this event, one member qualified and attended the National 4-H Shooting Sports Event in Raton, New Mexico. The Mississippi Air Rifle Team placed in the top ten.

At the North half Event held in May, Tishomingo County Junior 4-H members placed 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in the 5 meter Air Rifle Junior 2 division (10 and 11 year olds) and one placed 3rd in the 5 meter Air Rifle Junior 1 division (8 & 9 year olds). Tishomingo County also had the winning junior in the BB Shoot at the Mid-South Fair 4-H Day in Memphis, Tennessee.

Northeast District 4-H Project Achievement Day is held each June. This year Tishomingo County had 3 first place winners, 6 blue ribbon rosette winners, 2 blue ribbon trophy winners, one 3rd place individual and one 3rd place team. During State 4-H Club Congress, Tishomingo County had one 3rd place winner.

The Tishomingo County 4-H Modeling Squad won 2nd place in the first ever State Modeling Squad Show Down. This was held during the Mis-

issippi 4-H Centennial Celebration in Jackson. The Mississippi 4-H Museum groundbreaking ceremony was held at the same time. If anyone has any 4-H mementos you would like to donate or loan to this museum, just give me a call.

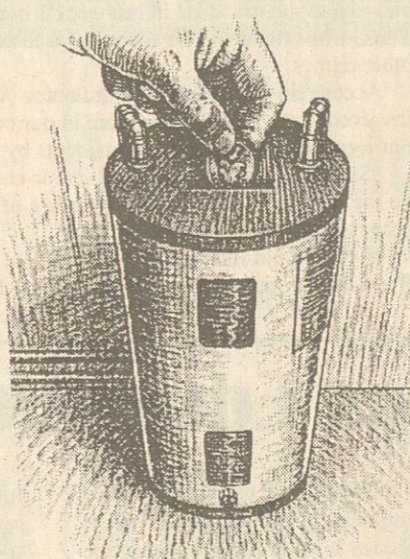

#### Bloodshot Eyes

If your eyes have been exposed to smoke, smog, dust, or fatigue you may find that your eyes have become bloodshot. This can also be caused by certain diseases and other eye problems, however, that require immediate treatment.

In a bloodshot eye, the reddish or pinkish color results when the tiny blood vessels on the white of the eye become swollen. When the eye is normal and healthy, these tiny blood vessels are almost invisible. When it becomes bloodshot, however, even though you may think the condition is temporary and not threatening, don't try to treat it yourself with an eyewash or eyedrops. The natural tear fluid in your eye will do a much better job automatically.

Your tears are not just water. Among other things, they contain antiseptics, including a marvelous substance called lysozyme. This is a germ killer that's stronger than carboic acid but harmless to your eyes. It helps to keep them clear and white. However, be sure to have your bloodshot eyes examined by your eye doctor.

One female cat can be responsible for 450 kittens in 7 years.

One female dog can be responsible for 67 puppies in 7 years.

Can you imagine many puppies and kittens? One male dog and 1 male cat can be responsible for an estimated 20,000 animals were put to sleep last year in the USA.

With these facts in mind, we must be made aware of pet birth control. Female cats can have a spay (ovariohysterectomy) when they reach at least 2 pounds of weight. This is before they come into heat.

Female dogs need to have a spay (ovariohysterectomy) before 6 months of age. Some dogs will begin their heat cycle at 6 months of age.

Male cats need to be neutered (castrated) early as 7 months of age. Male dogs can be neutered (castrated) early as 6 months of age.

Remember these are the earliest dogs and cats need to be neutered (castrated) or ovariohysterectomized. At these ages surgery can be performed at anytime on your veterinarian's recommendation for your cat or dog.

Main Street's Antiques Roadshow  
Lunch Break  
January 21, 2003 - 12 o'clock

Treasure hunting in the antique and yard sales is getting to be quite the thing these days, whether you are looking for a bit of Shabby Chic to fit your own personal decorating style or hoping to find a rare copy of the Declaration of Independence hiding behind some tattered needlepoint.

This will be a two-part extended program for the community, brought to you by the friends of the Iuka Library. Our host for this treasure hunt will be Earl Mitchell from It's A Wonderful World: Antiques and Primitives here in Iuka. During the first part of the program Earl will present a short slide show that gives an overview of the antique business as it is today. The topic of antiques is such a broad subject, covering works of art, furniture and decorative artifacts from countless earlier periods, that Earl jokes that

he'd like to "talk about it from about 30,000 feet." He will tell us how the internet has changed the business and what to look for when buying online. He will tell us important things to look out for, and tips on how to spot and identify reproductions.

For the second part of

Tuesday's lunch program Earl will host our own, mini Antiques Roadshow, or as Earl refers to it, "Stump the Antique Dealer." That's where we need your help. Bring in your small antique pieces for Earl to appraise. Don't bring anything big, "They should bring small stuff," Earl says, "I hope they don't roll in their great grandmother's bed...bring in a small piece. If you're going to bring in China, just bring in a representative piece, preferably with a signature on the bottom. Of course a lot of the things will be unmarked." Earl will give us his best guess on when your antiques were made and their

ballpark value. "There's no way that anybody can know everything about this business," Earl says, "You'll notice when they have the Antiques Roadshow they have experts in different areas." And if Earl isn't able to identify a piece? "I'm not afraid to say I don't know, but maybe we can identify characteristics and get it within a certain time frame." The roadshow may run beyond an hour, you're welcome to stay as long as you can. We hope to get to discuss every piece brought in.

Earl is a native of Iuka, the son of the late Jordan (Notch) and Elizabeth Mitchell. His interest in antiques began early on. The house he grew up in had been in his family since 1883 and much of the furniture was original to the house. He remembers his mother going to antique stores in Corinth to buy pieces. After graduating high school, he attained the rank of 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers during the Vietnam War. After service, Earl returned to Berea College in Kentucky to finish his degree in Economics. He then began, with Bell South, a distinguished 28 year long career in Bell System services. After the Bell System breakup Earl was reassigned to AT&T where he completed his MBA in Global Business at Pennsylvania State University in the AT&T Executive Education Program. His job allowed him to travel extensively around the world and afforded the child who loved antiques to see firsthand some of the best examples the world has to offer.

We are indeed fortunate to have Earl Mitchell to take us on a fascinating journey into the world of antiques.

The story of a loving, unselfish gift of a kidney from a young man to his mother was featured in the December 2002 issue of SDO Signals, a publication by TRW.

The brave young man is Myron Mitchell, Jr., grandson of Joe Ann Mitchell of Iuka, and son of Myron Mitchell Sr., a native of Iuka.

According to family members, the transplant was a success at an Indianapolis hospital and Myron and his mother are both doing fine.

### The Gift of Life By Donna Shelley

On January 16, 1979, at Memorial Hospital in Michigan City, Indiana, Myron Eugene Mitchell Jr. was given the Gift of Life by his mother, Pamela. Fast forward to December 18, 2002, at University Medical Hospital: Myron returned the Gift of Life by donating his kidney to his mother, Pamela.

Myron, an only child, and his mother have always been close. Most of his life, Myron was raised by his devoted single mom. Pamela spent all her adult years working at the Michigan City Public Library to support the little family. She says that while Myron wasn't perfect, he was a good son.

After graduating with a Bachelor of Science degree in Computer Technology from Purdue University, in May, 2001, Myron joined TRW as a Software Engineer on 4171. Outside of work, he enjoys softball, recreational basketball, and playing poker with several co-workers. Not surprisingly, he also works as a community volunteer. Most recently, Myron helped organize an inter-city neighborhood ac-

tivity with vendors and games for the kids. Myron and his high school sweetheart, Alisha Thomas, live in the Carson, California home he bought last March.

Although owning his own home was a dream-come-true for Myron, the close of escrow also brought bad news, when his mother was hospitalized for what she thought was the flu. Unfortunately,

it was much more serious as Pamela was diagnosed with kidney failure, which the doctors attributed to ten years of undetected high blood pressure. When Myron saw his mother hooked up to a dialysis machine, he knew what he had to do.

Myron called his mother's doctor to ask about being a kidney donor. The initial response wasn't encouraging, so he decided to talk to his doctor in California. Subsequently, he underwent blood and tissue testing, which revealed that his kidney was a match. Myron was overjoyed. He didn't want his mother to spend her life rising at 4 a.m., three times a week, to undergo 3 1/2 hours of dialysis treatments. Myron wanted his mother to enjoy a normal, healthy life.

Myron donated his kidney on December 18th, just one day

after his mother's 44th birthday. It was the first time she had been hospitalized since childbirth. Although both of Pamela's kidneys are weak, her prognosis is good because the body only requires one functioning kidney. Neither Myron nor his mother smoke or drink, which contributed to the success of the implant.

When asked if the kidney donation would be a risk to his health, Myron quietly replied that he hadn't asked and it didn't matter. Myron was raised by a loving, unselfish mother and these virtues were obviously transplanted from mother to son. Myron has the unique opportunity to repay his mother, in a way that few experience. The bond that has existed between Myron and his mother throughout their lives will be even stronger now, both physically and spiritually.

NEMCC Seeks Community Input

Northeast Mississippi Community College President Charles W. Chance says the college is looking for direction in future growth and is seeking assistance from the citizens of Tishomingo County.

"It's all about access," Chance said. "We are looking at establishing a presence in Tishomingo County and we need the help of the people!"

Recently Northeast conducted a community interest survey in the district to obtain information about educational services and training needed in the community. Officials are now utilizing an automated telephone calling service to obtain additional community information.

"Our goal is to determine the number of adults in Tishomingo County households who are not attending college who might be interested if classes were offered in closer proximity."

A random sample of residential households in Tishomingo County will be contacted during the week of January 20 by an automated telephone service. Calls will last approximately two minutes and three attempts will be made, one in the evening and two additional either in the morning or evening hours. The caller identification will read "Northeast Mississippi Community College." A call back number will be left on the recording if there is no answer at the residence. Recipients are encouraged to respond.

Approximately 700 households will be surveyed in

Tishomingo County. It is imperative that the individual responding to the survey be at least 18 years old. Questions will be related to age, gender, educational level and interest in college level courses.

"One of the nation's most progressive community colleges, Northeast has met the challenge of higher education throughout her history by providing quality academic programs of study, by responding quickly to the regional and state educational needs, by supporting instruction with modern and advanced technological equipment, and by compassionately reacting to the citizenry of Northeast Mississippi.

"For over fifty years, the college has served the traditional college student very, very well. We have a sincere desire to extend the availability of a college education to those who are not able to attend classes on the Booneville campus.

"Northeast and the state community college system implemented the Virtual Community College in recent years to offer a wide variety of courses on the Internet. Making classes available in other areas of our district is just another means of serving our people," Chance added.

According to Chance enrollment at Northeast has experienced a steady increase through the years. During the 1970's, full time academic, technical and vocational enrollment averaged 1700 students. It grew to an average of 2400 students during the 1980's and

an average of 2800 during the 1990's. The enrollment trend has reflected strong growth over the past two decades. From 1948 until 2001, the college increased its student population from approximately 569 to 2903 and the enrollment for the fall 2002 semester was 3147, the highest in the history of the college.

Projections reflect a continuation in enrollment growth. Positive industrial expansions coupled with an increasing demand for both in-state and out-of-state students attending Northeast will continue the strong growth pattern. Northeast has already experienced an increase in the number of non-traditional student enrollees. A weekend college program was implemented in the 2000 fall semester. Students are able to earn a two-year degree attending classes on Friday evenings and Saturdays. The first class of week-end college completers graduated during May 2002 commencement exercises.

"So," according to Chance, "offering a wider variety of coursework to the people of Tishomingo County in Tishomingo County is just another step in meeting the needs of the citizens in each community in our district.

"We are very sincere about responding to the needs of all who seek a college education."

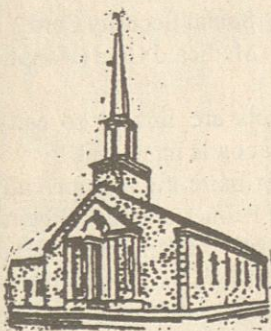

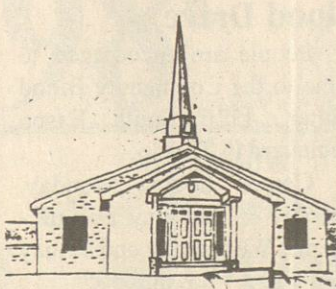

The Helpful Samaritan Food Pantry would like to thank all of you who helped us feed over 200 families this past Christmas season.

Just think only 6 years ago the Helpful Samaritan Food Pantry helped 18 families the entire year of 1986. The need in our area is growing daily. A young mother with children moving to our area, a husband losing his job because of a factory closing, an elderly couple trying to make the decision to buy food or their medicine.

In our active file we have 35 families listed. Of those 35 families we have 567 children. These families and children are from Tishomingo County. All donations stay in Tishomingo County to feed the people of Tishomingo County.

Food distribution is based

on the number of people in the household. All of our food items are donated or purchased with donated funds. Over 95% of donated money are used to purchase food with only 5% going toward utilities and office expense. No board member or volunteer of the HSFP receives any salary.

A family of 4 would receive 6-cans of vegetables, 4-cans of meat (tuna, spam, or can ham) 4-cans of soup. The family also receives either corn meal or flour, corn flakes or oatmeal, Peanut butter and jelly, can fruit, 2-packages of dry beans, Spaghetti Sauce and noodles or rice. If the family has young children we add juice, diapers, cookies and other treats.

### A NATIONAL HOLIDAY OBSERVED

A powerful tribute to Dr. King's philosophy and stature. November 2, 1983 Legislation for National Holiday was signed by President Ronald Reagan. On January 20, 1986 - the first observance of Dr. King's birthday as a Legal Holiday - Nationwide.

Dr. M.L. King, Jr. birthday. The official holiday, on the third Monday of January. This was the first new holiday since 1948, when Memorial Day was created as a "prayer for peace" day. And it's only the third this century (the other is Veteran's Day), created as Armistice Day in 1926 to honor those who died in World War I.

Dr. King delivered his last speech, entitled "I've been to the Mountain Top," at the Ma-

son Temple, the national headquarters of the Church of God and Christ, in Memphis, Tennessee on April 3, 1968.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., minister, civil rights leader, intellectual, social reformer, author, recipient of countless accolades and awards, winner of the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize, parent, and charismatic leader seeking peace in the volatile social transformation taking place in America during the 1950's and 1960's - was suddenly taken from this earth at the hands of an assassin's bullet on April 4, 1968. This solitary man, within a span of thirteen years, did something that changed the way America viewed and treated a portion of its citizens, who were historically faced with racist, restric-

tive laws as part of their living.

"I have the audacity to believe that people everywhere can have three meals a day with their tired bodies, education and culture for their spirit, and believe that what self-centered men have torn down, men centered can build up. I believe that one day men will bow before the almighty God and be crowned triumphant over war and death, and non-violent resistance will proclaim the rule of the land 'and the lamb shall lie together and every man sit under his own vine and tree and non shall be afraid still believe that we shall come.'"
